## <u>Chairman Graves Statement on the Committee's Budget</u> Submission:

- Thank you, Chairman Steil and Ranking Member Morelle.
- I appreciate the opportunity to share with you the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure's budget request for the 119<sup>th</sup> Congress.
- In consultation with the Ranking Member, the Committee has requested a 7 percent increase over funding levels for the Committee last Congress.
- That level reflects an increase that will provide the Committee with the necessary resources to tackle our aggressive agenda for the 119<sup>th</sup> Congress.
- On the legislative front, we have already begun discussions on reauthorizing several major agencies and programs under the Committee's vast jurisdiction.
- These include the following:
  - The Coast Guard for Fiscal Years 2024 and 2025;
  - The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA);

- The Committee also plans to undertake the regular review of Army Corps projects and programs and other water infrastructure legislation.
- And the Committee's biggest undertaking, the reauthorization of our nation's surface transportation programs, which are set to expire on October 1, 2026.
- Equally important, the Committee must provide oversight over the many laws and funding that was passed last Congress including the following:
  - Implementaiton of the 5-year FAA reauthorization;
  - WRDA 2024;
  - Reauthorization of the Economic Development Agency (EDA) which I might point out was successfully reauthorized for the first time since 2008;
  - And our Public buildings reform efforts to ensure efficient utilization of federal real estate.
- As part of developing our robust infrastructure agenda, the Committee plans to travel extensively to conduct field hearings, roundtables and listening sessions across America and provide opportunities

to visit and review infrastructure projects and programs.

- Infrastructure impacts every corner of the country, and each community has diverse needs. We intend to get out there and see that firsthand as we did in the 118<sup>th</sup> Congress.
- In addition, the budget accounts for the fact that the staff salary cap was again raised, and the Committee is lucky to have many long tenured staffers with vast institutional knowledge.
- Our proposed budget will help the Committee with staff retention but also allows us to be competitive in bringing on new staff to deliver on our agenda this Congress.
- Particularly on the Majority side, we are having to compete directly with the new Administration and new Senate Majority to bring in and retain top staff.
- It is in the best interest of the House for both sides to continue to have strong teams that are so necessary for the important work we do.
- With that, I look forward to answering your questions and I yield back the remainder of my time.
