Work in Progress

(Book) Putting the Public Back in Public Opinion with Jon Green and William Minozzi (exp. 2026): 18th-century reformers contrasted the king’s whims with “public opinion” — citizens discussing the common good in public. 20th-century market researchers developed opinion surveys to measure individuals’ *private* preferences. By extending these methods to politics, however, they inverted the meaning of “public opinion.” Democracy became just another market transaction. Researchers acknowledge this problem but persist in their “drunkard’s search,” looking for public opinion in well-understood but poorly-adapted surveys. We combine theoretical and computational advances to measure public opinion in ways that restore its authentic role in democracy.

Data Sets (Selected)

Connecting to Congress Deliberative Town Hall Experiments

Ninety field experiments pairing incumbent elected officials with random samples of their constituents. Most involved members of Congress or legislators from Australia, the UK, Chile, Nigeria, or N. Ireland, an expert with a sample of constituents via an online platform. Various vendors and methods of recruitment. Random assignment to treatment (deliberative session) and control. Each experiment had up to six survey waves — Baseline survey — Background materials survey — Experimental session survey — Post experimental session survey — Follow-up survey one week after experimental session - Post-election survey, early November 2006, 2007, 2019-present. Approximately 500 variables across the 6 waves. Codebook available. Data not publicly available. Funding source: NSF Digital Government Program (IIS-0429452).

Cooperative Congressional Election Study Datasets (2006-08, 2010-12, 2014; 2016-2018)

Public opinion surrounding immigration and border security policy. Polimetrix weighted sample. Extensive question wording experiments. Three rolling cross sections, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2010, 2011, 2012. Two waves for each cross section, late summer (pre-election) and early November (post-election). 1000 responses for each year. Approximately 700 variables per year. Codebook available. Data not publicly available. Funding sources: Ohio State University; UCR; UC Berkeley.

Codes indicators of the content and quality of legislative websites for both House and Senate. Coding categories include issue quality, constituent communication, usability, and technology.
