

**Michelle Richardson** is a Legislative Counsel with the American Civil Liberties Union's Washington Legislative Office, where she focuses on national security and homeland security issues such as cybersecurity, the Patriot Act, the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, material support and state secrets. She drafts legislation, congressional testimony, white papers, letters to the Administration and Congress, blogs, talking points, and op-eds about the effect these issues have on civil liberties and privacy. Richardson also plays a key role in the design of lobbying, grassroots and messaging strategies for ACLU members and activists and for legislative coalitions.

In addition to working at the ACLU, Richardson is a member of the American Bar Association's Cybersecurity Taskforce and a non-residential fellow at Stanford Law's Center for Internet and Society. A frequent commentator on national security issues, she has been quoted by The Associated Press, The Washington Post, The New York Times, NPR, Los Angeles Times, Wired, CQ, Politico, The Hill, Salon, National Journal and more.

Before coming to the ACLU in 2006, Richardson served as counsel to the House Judiciary Committee where she specialized in national security, civil rights and constitutional issues for Democratic Ranking Member John Conyers (D-MI). She received a B.A. from the University of Colorado and a J.D. from American University, Washington College of Law.
