AMENDMENT IN THE NATURE OF A SUBSTITUTE TO H.R. 9770

OFFERED BY MR. GREEN OF TENNESSEE

Strike all after the enacting clause and insert the following:

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Providing Individuals
3 Various Opportunities for Technical Training to Build a
4 Skills-Based Cyber Workforce Act of 2024" or the "Cyber
5 PIVOTT Act".

6 SEC. 2. CISA EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAMS AND 7 RESOURCES.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle D of title XIII of the
9 Homeland Security Act of 2002 is amended by adding at
10 the end the following new section:

11 "SEC. 1334. CISA EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAMS 12 AND RESOURCES.

13 "(a) EXPANDING EDUCATION AND TRAINING PRO14 GRAMS AND RESOURCES TO COMMUNITY COLLEGES AND
15 TECHNICAL SCHOOLS.—

- 16 "(1) STUDENT QUALIFICATIONS.—
- 17 "(A) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the
 18 Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security

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1 Agency (CISA) of the Department shall seek to 2 enter into partnerships or other arrangements with community colleges (as such term is de-3 4 fined in section 5002 of the William M. (Mac) 5 Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act 6 for Fiscal Year 2021 (15 U.S.C. 9401) and 7 technical schools (as such term is defined in 8 section 411.167 of title 20, Code of Federal 9 Regulations) (in this section referred to as 'par-10 ticipating institutions') to establish education 11 and training programs and facilitate internship 12 and post-graduation Federal job opportunities 13 at participating institutions. Such programs 14 shall be known as the 'Providing Individuals 15 Various Opportunities for Technical Training to 16 Build a Skills-Based Cyber Workforce Program' 17 or the 'PIVOTT Program' (in this section re-18 ferred to as the 'Program'). 19 ELIGIBILITY.—The following "(B) cat-20 egories of students are eligible to participate in 21 the Program: 22 "(i) Students enrolled in but who have 23 not yet started a two-year cyber or cyber-

relevant associate's degree program or

comparable technical certification, as de-

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termined by the Director of CISA, at a
 participating institution.

"(ii) Students currently enrolled in their first semester of a two-year cyber or cyber-relevant associate's degree program or comparable technical certification, as determined by the Director of CISA, at a participating institution.

"(iii) Students identified by the Direc-9 10 tor of CISA who are eligible and qualified 11 to enroll in a two-year degree cyber or 12 cyber-relevant associate's program or com-13 parable technical certification at a participating institution, such as individuals who 14 15 are pursuing a career change, have a high 16 school diploma or equivalent, or would be 17 considered entry-level.

18 "(iv) Students enrolled in technical 19 certifications at participating institutions 20 that are less than two years to complete 21 but align with Tasks, Knowledge, and 22 Skills (TKS), as defined by the National 23 Initiative for Cybersecurity Education 24 (NICE) Cybersecurity Workforce Frame-25 work (NIST Special Publication 800-181,

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revision 1), and prepare students to serve in Federal, State, local, Tribal, or territorial government cyber or cyber-relevant roles.

5 "(C) SCHOLARSHIPS.—The Secretary, act-6 ing through the Director of CISA, shall provide 7 students participating in the Program with full 8 tuition scholarships, including academic fees, 9 lab fees, travel, lodging, per diem, stipends, in-10 ternship costs, costs associated with virtual par-11 ticipation, certification testing fees, and any 12 other expenses the Director determines nec-13 essary to complete any requirement under the 14 Program, including for participation in one in-15 person exercise in accordance with paragraph 16 (3)(B), including travel, lodging, meals, in-per-17 son or in-laboratory post-course assessments 18 fees, and other necessary expenses as deter-19 mined by the Director.

20 "(D) SERVICE OBLIGATION.—
21 "(i) IN GENERAL.—Students who par22 ticipate in and complete the Program shall
23 fulfill a two-year service obligation in a
24 cyber role, as defined by the National Ini25 tiative for Cybersecurity Education

1	(NICE) Cybersecurity Workforce Frame-
2	work (NIST Special Publication 800-181,
3	revision 1) or the Department of Defense
4	Cyber Workforce Framework, to advance
5	the cyber mission of an executive agency
6	(as such term is defined in section 105 of
7	title 5, United States Code) or a State,
8	local, Tribal, or territorial government.
9	"(ii) EXCEPTION.—The service obliga-
10	tion specified in clause (i) shall not apply
11	to students who—
12	"(I) have completed a term of
13	service in the Armed Forces that is
14	equal to the service obligation speci-
15	fied in clause (i);
16	"(II) are currently serving in the
17	Armed Forces; or
18	"(III) pursue service in the
19	Armed Forces in a cyber or cyber-rel-
20	evant role during or immediately after
21	completion of the Program.
22	"(iii) Delayed service.—Students
23	who, immediately after completion of the
24	Program, enroll in a four-year degree pro-
25	gram may complete the service obligation

- specified in clause (i) after receiving such
 four-year degree.
- 3 "(E) PROGRAM COMPLETION TIMELINE.—
 4 "(i) IN GENERAL.—Students shall
 5 complete participation in the Program
 6 within four years of starting the Program,
 7 or pursuant to participating institution
 8 rules if such rules are in effect at the time
 9 such a student begins such participation.
- 10 "(ii) PROCESS FOR UPDATED COM-11 PLETION TIMELINE.—A student who expe-12 riences extreme hardship during participa-13 tion in the Program may submit to the Di-14 rector of CISA an application to waive the 15 application of the timeline specified in 16 clause (i). The Director, in consultation 17 with the appropriate participating institu-18 tion, shall determine on a case-by-case 19 basis whether such student may be granted 20 additional time to complete the Program.
- 21 "(2) INSTITUTIONAL REQUIREMENTS.—A com22 munity college or technical school is eligible to par23 ticipate in the Program if such college or school is—

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"(A) a participant in the National Centers 2 of Academic Excellence in Cybersecurity 3 (NCAE-C) program; or "(B) determined eligible by the Director of

4 5 CISA, taking into consideration whether the 6 virtual or in-person course offerings at such a 7 college or school aligns with pathways as de-8 fined by the National Initiative for Cybersecu-9 rity Education (NICE) Cybersecurity Work-10 force Framework (NIST Special Publication 11 800-181, revision 1), and the presence of a cy-12 bersecurity clinic on campus.

13 "(3) Program components.—

14 "(A) IN GENERAL.—In accordance with 15 subparagraph (C), students participating in the 16 Program shall complete a minimum of four eli-17 gible skills-based exercises described in subpara-18 graph (B).

19 "(B) ELIGIBLE SKILLS-BASED EXER-20 CISES.—Eligible skills-based exercises described 21 in this subparagraph may include the following: 22 "(i) Laboratory work. "(ii) 23 Competitions such as 24 hackathons, challenges, and capture the

1	"(iii) Virtual programming.
2	"(iv) Table-top exercises.
3	"(v) Industry training workshops.
4	"(vi) Exercises in a box.
5	"(C) Provision.—
6	"(i) In general.—The Director of
7	CISA shall coordinate with participating
8	institutions to provide at least one skills-
9	based exercise under subparagraph (A)
10	each semester.
11	"(ii) Student requirements.—Stu-
12	dents participating in the Program shall
13	complete at least one of the four skills-
14	based exercises under subparagraph (A)
15	in-person.
16	"(iii) Administration of exer-
17	CISES.—The Director of CISA, in coordi-
18	nation with participating institutions, shall
19	offer at least one in-person skills-based ex-
20	ercise to Program participants every two
21	years.
22	"(iv) Coordination.—The Director
23	of CISA shall coordinate and may jointly
24	offer the skills-based exercises under sub-
25	paragraph (A) with the following:

1	"(I) Other Federal agencies, such
2	as the Department of Defense, the
3	Federal Bureau of Investigation, the
4	National Security Agency, and the Of-
5	fice of the National Cyber Director, as
6	appropriate.
7	"(II) Non-Federal entities with
8	cyber or cyber-relevant expertise, in-
9	cluding cybersecurity clinics.
10	"(v) Exception.—A student partici-
11	pating in the Program who is unable to
12	complete a skills-based exercise under sub-
13	paragraph (A) may submit to the partici-
14	pating institution a proposal for a com-
15	parable skills-based exercise, as determined
16	by the Director of CISA.
17	"(D) INTERNSHIPS.—
18	"(i) IN GENERAL.—The Director of
19	CISA and participating institutions shall,
20	as a core requirement of the Program, co-
21	ordinate with appropriate entities to place
22	students participating in the Program in
23	an approved cyber or cyber-relevant intern-
24	ship, as determined by the Director, with
25	any of the following:

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1	"(I) A State, local, Tribal, or ter-
2	ritorial government entity.
3	"(II) A critical infrastructure
4	owner or operator that is located in a
5	rural community or is considered to
6	be a high-risk sector, as determined
7	by the Director of CISA.
8	"(III) A Federal department or
9	agency, including with the CISA Re-
10	gional Security Advisors program.
11	"(ii) Prioritization.—A student
12	who has communicated in writing to the
13	Director of CISA or the participating insti-
14	tution during the internship placement
15	process that such student intends to serve
16	in a Federal Government position beyond
17	the obligations of the student under para-
18	graph $(1)(D)$ shall be prioritized for Fed-
19	eral cyber internship opportunities that re-
20	quire a security clearance.
21	"(iii) CURRENT FEDERAL EMPLOY-
22	EES.—The Director of CISA shall coordi-
23	nate with the heads of appropriate Federal
24	agencies to establish an approved cyber or
25	cyber-relevant internship program for stu-

1	dents participating in the Program who
2	are Federal employees.
3	"(iv) Security clearances.—The
4	Director of CISA shall take such actions
5	as may be necessary to begin, not later
6	than one year before an appropriate stu-
7	dent under this subparagraph completes
8	participation in the Program, the process
9	to provide such student with an appro-
10	priate security clearance.
11	"(4) Outreach initiatives.—
12	"(A) CISA.—The Director of CISA shall
13	carry out the following:
14	"(i) Conduct regional outreach initia-
15	tives, including at institutions designated
16	as National Centers of Academic Excel-
17	lence in Cybersecurity (NCAE-C), and pro-
18	vide informational materials about the Pro-
19	gram—
20	"(I) at each CISA regional office;
21	and
22	"(II) to industry partners to pro-
23	mote the Program.
24	"(ii) Seek to engage with industry
25	stakeholders to produce an annual report

1	on industry-relevant skills intended to in-
2	form the skills-based exercises offered in
3	the Program, which report may include
4	input from an advisory committee, estab-
5	lished by the Director of CISA and com-
6	prised of university-level educators.
7	"(B) RECRUITMENT FAIR.—The Director
8	of CISA, in coordination with the National
9	Cyber Director, shall host a voluntary Federal
10	Government recruitment fair that includes Fed-

of CISA, in coordination with the National Cyber Director, shall host a voluntary Federal Government recruitment fair that includes Federal Government agency representatives who seek to recruit for open cybersecurity positions each fiscal year. Information regarding such fair shall be posted on a dedicated job board hosted by CISA. Each such fair may be hosted online or in-person at a minimum of five Program participating institutions.

18 "(5) Program completion benefits.—

"(A) DATABASE.—The Director of CISA,
leveraging existing educational content repositories, shall maintain an online database of
cyber training and education resources, mapped
to job roles set forth in the National Initiative
for Cybersecurity Education (NICE) Cybersecurity Workforce Framework (NIST Special Pub-

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lication 800-181, revision 1), and Federal job opportunities in cyber or cyber-relevant fields. Such database shall be available for access, as appropriate, by students who have successfully completed the Program.

6 "(B) CERTIFICATION PROGRAM.—The Di-7 rector of CISA shall establish and update annu-8 ally a list of existing cyber certification pro-9 grams developed or offered by entities in the 10 private sector, academia, nonprofits, or other 11 institutions, as determined by the Director. The 12 Secretary, acting through the Director, may 13 fund, through vouchers requested by a student 14 participating in the Program, up to three cer-15 tifications and associated certification examina-16 tions per student from such list for such stu-17 dents who complete the Program within ten 18 vears of such completion.

"(C) ADDITIONAL SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS WHO COMPLETE THE
PROGRAM.—The Director of CISA may select,
pursuant to an application process designed by
Director, up to ten students per year who completed the Program and have been employed by
the Federal Government for at least seven years

1	to be eligible for scholarships to be applied to
2	cyber or cyber-relevant degree programs offered
3	at institutions designated as NCAE-C. Scholar-
4	ship amounts under this subparagraph shall be
5	determined by the Director, subject to the avail-
6	ability of appropriations for such purpose.
7	"(6) TERMS OF PROGRAM SCHOLARSHIP.—A
8	scholarship recipient under this section shall be lia-
9	ble to the United States for repayment of a scholar-
10	ship awarded to such recipient as provided under
11	subsection (d) if such recipient—
12	"(A) fails to maintain an acceptable level
13	of academic standing at the participating insti-
14	tution, as determined by the Director of CISA;
15	"(B) is dismissed from the participating
16	institution for disciplinary reasons;
17	"(C) withdraws from the eligible degree
18	program before completing the Program;
19	"(D) declares that such recipient does not
20	intend to fulfill the post-award employment ob-
21	ligation under this section; or
22	"(E) fails to maintain or fulfill the post-
23	graduation government service or post-award
24	obligations or requirements of such recipient.
25	"(7) EXCEPTION.—A student who—

1 "(A) enlists or commissions in the Armed 2 Forces prior to completion of the Program, or "(B) has a documented history of dem-3 4 onstrated effort to secure a position with a Fed-5 eral, State, local, Tribal, or territorial govern-6 ment within two years after completing the Pro-7 gram but who is not offered such a position, 8 may be, on a case-by-case basis, as determined by 9 the Director, exempted from liability to the United 10 States for repayment of a scholarship awarded to 11 such student. 12 "(b) MONITORING COMPLIANCE.—As a condition of participation in the Program, a participating institution 13 14 shall enter into an agreement with the Director of CISA 15 to monitor the compliance of scholarship recipients with 16 respect to their post-award employment obligations. 17 "(c) AMOUNT OF REPAYMENT.—If a circumstance described in subsection (a)(6) occurs before the completion 18 19 of one year of a post-scholarship employment obligation 20 under this section, the total amount of scholarship awards 21 received by an individual under this section shall— 22 "(1) be repaid immediately; or "(2) be treated as a loan to be repaid in accord-23

ance with subsection (d).

1 "(d) REPAYMENTS.—A loan referred to subsection 2 (c) shall—

"(1) be treated as a Federal Direct Unsubsidized Stafford Loan under part D of subpart 10
of chapter 2 of subpart 2 of part A of title IV of
the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1087a
et seq.); and

8 "(2) be subject to repayment, together with in-9 terest thereon accruing from the date of the scholar-10 ship award, in accordance with terms and conditions 11 specified by the Secretary (in consultation with the 12 Secretary of Education) in regulations promulgated 13 to carry out this subsection.

14 "(e) Collection of Repayment.—

15 "(1) IN GENERAL.—If a scholarship recipient is
16 required to repay a scholarship under this section,
17 the Secretary shall—

18 "(A) determine the repayment amounts
19 and notify such recipient of the amount owed;
20 and

21 "(B) collect such amount within a period
22 of time as determined by the Secretary, or such
23 amount shall be treated as a loan in accordance
24 with subsection (e).

"(2) RETURNED TO THE DEPARTMENT.—Ex cept as provided in paragraph (3), any repayment
 under this subsection shall be returned to the De partment.

5 "(3) RETENTION OF PERCENTAGE.—A partici-6 pating institution may retain a percentage of any re-7 payment such institution collects under this sub-8 section to defray administrative costs associated with 9 the collection of such repayment. The Secretary shall 10 establish a single, fixed percentage applicable to all 11 participating institutions.

12 "(f) EXCEPTIONS.—The Secretary may provide for 13 the partial or total waiver or suspension of any repayment 14 obligation by an individual under this section whenever 15 compliance by such individual with such obligation is im-16 possible or would involve extreme hardship to the indi-17 vidual.

18 "(g) TIMELINE FOR IMPLEMENTATION.—

"(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director of CISA and
participating institutions shall seek to enroll in the
Program, subject to the availability of appropriations, not fewer than 250 students for the first full
academic year of the Program that begins one year
after the date of the enactment of this section.

"(2) GROWTH OF PROGRAM.—Beginning with 1 2 the second full academic year of the Program, the 3 Director of CISA and participating institutions shall 4 seek to enroll in the Program each full academic 5 year, subject to the availability of appropriations, 6 not fewer than double the number of students en-7 rolled in the immediately preceding full academic 8 year until the number of such students reaches 9 1,000 each full academic year.

10 "(3) PLAN FOR 10,000 STUDENTS.—Not later 11 than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this 12 section, the Director of CISA and participating institutions shall develop a plan, subject to capacity 13 14 and administrative capabilities, to enroll by not later 15 than ten years after the date of the establishment of 16 the Program at least 10,000 students in the Pro-17 gram each academic year. The Director shall brief 18 the Committee on Homeland Security of the House 19 of Representatives and the Committee on Homeland 20 Security and Government Affairs of the Senate re-21 garding such plan.

"(h) REPORT ON ENROLLMENT GOALS.—If the Director of CISA and participating institutions fail in any academic year to meet the minimum quota specified in paragraph (1) or (2), as the case may be, of subsection (g), the Director of CISA shall brief the Committee on
 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives and
 the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental
 Affairs of the Senate within 30 days following the conclu sion of such academic year.

6 "(i) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

"(1) CYBER-RELEVANT.—The term 'cyber-relevant' means areas of national security that would
impact the cyber resiliency of the United States, including relating to operational technology, critical infrastructure, artificial intelligence, quantum computing, security awareness, or computer science.

13 "(2) SKILLS-BASED EXERCISES.—The term
14 'skills-based exercises' means condensed programs
15 lasting at least one day that focus on practice and
16 application, rather than research and study.".

(b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents
in section 1(b) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 is
amended by inserting after the item relating to section
1333 the following new item:

"Sec. 1334. CISA education and training programs and resources.".

(c) REVIEW OF CISA EDUCATION, TRAINING PROGRAMS AND RESOURCES.—Not later than 90 days after
the date of the enactment of this Act, the Director of the
Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)
of the Department of Homeland Security shall submit to

Congress a review of CISA's education and training pro grams. Such review shall evaluate the cost, reach, and cur rent demand of such programs, including relating to any
 resource gaps in any of such programs.

5 (d) PROMOTING CYBERCORPS SCHOLARSHIP FOR 6 SERVICE AS A GOLD STANDARD PROGRAM.—The Sec-7 retary of Homeland Security shall submit to the Com-8 mittee on Homeland Security and the Committee on 9 Science, Space, and Technology of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security 10 11 and Governmental Affairs and the Committee on Com-12 merce, Science, and Transportation of the Senate a report 13 on current support of the Department to the CyberCorps Scholarship for Service Program, including opportunities 14 15 to provide additional funding to such Program under existing training and education programs of the Department 16 of Homeland Security. 17

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
