John Roth was the Inspector General for the Department of Homeland Security, having been appointed by the President to that role in March 2014, and retiring from that position in 2017 after 32 years of government service. Prior to his appointment as Inspector General, John led the Food and Drug Administration's criminal enforcement program, and for 25 years worked in the Department of Justice in a variety of operational and policy roles in Republican and Democratic administrations, including in the Office of the Deputy Attorney General. John also wrote the seminal treatise on terrorist financing during his time as team leader on the 9/11 Commission. After his public service, John worked in the financial services industry, focusing on ethics and compliance issues. He currently is on the board of the Project on Government Oversight, a nonpartisan independent watchdog that investigates and exposes waste and corruption and advocates for reforms to achieve a more effective, ethical, and accountable government.
