1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

- 4 The Congress finds the following:
- 5 (1) Given the importance of the Internet to the 6 global economy, it is essential that the Internet re-7 main stable, secure, and free from government con-8 trol.

1	(2) The world deserves the access to knowledge,
2	services, commerce, and communication, the accom-
3	panying benefits to economic development, edu-
4	cation, and health care, and the informed discussion
5	that is the bedrock of democratic self-government
6	that the Internet provides.
7	(3) The structure of Internet governance has
8	profound implications for competition and trade, de-
9	mocratization, free expression, and access to infor-
10	mation.
11	(4) Countries have obligations to protect human
12	rights, whether exercised online or offline.
13	(5) The ability to innovate, develop technical
14	capacity, grasp economic opportunities, and promote
15	freedom of expression online is best realized in co-
16	operation with all stakeholders.
17	(6) Proposals have been, and will likely con-
18	tinue to be, put forward at international regulatory
19	bodies that would fundamentally alter the govern-
20	ance and operation of the Internet.
21	(7) The proposals would attempt to justify in-
22	creased government control over the Internet and
23	could undermine the current multistakeholder model
24	that has enabled the Internet to flourish and under
25	which the private sector, civil society, academia, and

4	of expression on the Internet in favor of government

10	tions have made a strong commitment to the multi-
11	stakeholder model of Internet governance and the
12	promotion of the global benefits of the Internet.
