To amend the Public Health Service Act to direct the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to provide for informational materials to educate and prevent addiction in teenagers and adolescents who are injured playing youth sports and subsequently prescribed an opioid.

A BILL

To amend the Public Health Service Act to direct the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to provide for informational materials to educate and prevent addiction in teenagers and adolescents who are injured playing youth sports and subsequently prescribed an opioid.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “John Thomas Decker
5 Act of 2016”.

1 **SEC. 2. INFORMATION MATERIALS AND RESOURCES TO**
2 **PREVENT ADDICTION RELATED TO YOUTH**
3 **SPORTS INJURIES.**

4 Part J of title III of the Public Health Service Act
5 (42 U.S.C. 280b–1f et seq.) is amended by adding after
6 section 393D (42 U.S.C. 280b–1f et seq.) the following
7 new section:

8 **“SEC. 393E. INFORMATION MATERIALS AND RESOURCES TO**
9 **PREVENT ADDICTION RELATED TO YOUTH**
10 **SPORTS INJURIES.**

11 “(a) REPORT.—The Secretary shall—

12 “(1) not later than 24 months after the date of
13 the enactment of this section, make publicly avail-
14 able a report determining the extent to which infor-
15 mational materials and resources described in sub-
16 section (b) are available to teenagers and adolescents
17 who play youth sports, families of such teenagers
18 and adolescents, nurses, youth sports groups, and
19 relevant health care provider groups; and

20 “(2) for purposes of educating and preventing
21 addiction in teenagers and adolescents who are in-
22 jured playing youth sports and are subsequently pre-
23 scribed an opioid, not later than 12 months after
24 such report is made publicly available and taking
25 into consideration the findings of such report, de-
26 velop and, in coordination with youth sports groups,

1 disseminate informational materials and resources
2 described in subsection (b) for teenagers and adoles-
3 cents who play youth sports, families of such teen-
4 agers and adolescents, nurses, youth sports groups,
5 and relevant health care provider groups.

6 “(b) MATERIALS AND RESOURCES DESCRIBED.—For
7 purposes of this section, the informational materials and
8 resources described in this subsection are informational
9 materials and resources with respect to youth sports inju-
10 ries for which opioids are potentially prescribed and subse-
11 quently potentially lead to addiction, including materials
12 and resources focused on the dangers of opioid use and
13 misuse, treatment options for such injuries that do not
14 involve the use of opioids, and how to seek treatment for
15 addiction.

16 “(c) NO ADDITIONAL FUNDS.—No additional funds
17 are authorized to be appropriated for the purpose of car-
18 rying out this section. This section shall be carried out
19 using amounts otherwise available for such purpose.”.
