# A BILL

- To establish the Stop, Observe, Ask, and Respond to Health and Wellness Training pilot program to address human trafficking in the health care system.

## **3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

This Act may be cited as the "Stop, Observe, Ask,
and Respond to Health and Wellness Act of 2017" or the
"SOAR to Health and Wellness Act of 2017".

### 1 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

2 In this Act:

3 (1) HUMAN TRAFFICKING.—The term "human
4 trafficking" has the meaning given the term "severe
5 forms of trafficking in persons" as defined in section
6 103 of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of
7 2000 (22 U.S.C. 7102).

8 (2) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
9 the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

#### 10 SEC. 3. PROGRAM ESTABLISHMENT.

11 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall establish a program to be known as the Stop, Observe, Ask, and Re-12 13 spond to Health and Wellness Training Program or the SOAR to Health and Wellness Training Program (in this 14 Act referred to as the "Program") to provide training to 15 16 health care providers and other related providers, at all levels, on human trafficking in accordance with the pur-17 18 pose described in subsection (c).

(b) GRANTS.—The Secretary may carry out the Program through the award of grants to health care sites that
represent diversity in—

- 22 (1) geography;
- (2) the demographics of the population served;
  (3) the predominant types of human trafficking
  cases; and

(4) health care provider profiles.

(c) PURPOSE.—The purpose of the Program shall be
 to train health care providers and other related providers
 to enable such providers to—

4 (1) identify potential human trafficking victims;
5 (2) implement proper protocols and procedures
6 for working with law enforcement to report, and fa7 cilitate communication with, such victims, in accord8 ance with all applicable Federal, State, local, and
9 tribal requirements, including legal confidentiality
10 requirements for patients and health care providers;

(3) implement proper protocols and procedures
for referring such victims to appropriate social or
victims service agencies or organizations;

- 14 (4) provide such victims care that is— 15 (A) coordinated; 16 (B) victim centered; 17 (C) culturally relevant; 18 (D) comprehensive; 19 (E) evidence-based; 20 (F) gender responsive; 21 (G) age-appropriate, with a focus on care 22 for youth; and 23 (H) trauma-informed; and 24 (5) consider the potential for integrating the
- training described in paragraphs (1) through (4)

with training programs, in effect on the date of en actment of this Act, for victims of domestic violence,
 dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, child abuse,
 child neglect, child maltreatment, and child sexual
 exploitation.

6 (d) FUNCTIONS.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—The functions of the Pro8 gram shall include the functions of the Stop, Ob9 serve, Ask, and Respond to Health and Wellness
10 Training program that was operating on the day be11 fore the date of enactment of this Act and the au12 thorized initiatives described in paragraph (2).

13 (2) AUTHORIZED INITIATIVES.—The authorized
14 initiatives of the Program shall include—

15 (A) engaging stakeholders, including vic16 tims of human trafficking and any Federal,
17 State, local, or tribal partners, to develop a
18 flexible training module—

(i) for achieving the purpose describedin subsection (c); and

22 settings, health care providers, and other

24 (B) providing technical assistance for25 health education programs to implement health

1	care protocols, or develop continuing education

#### 13 SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

There is authorized to be appropriated to carry out
this Act \$4,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2018 through
2022.
