RE: **Support for the Ensuring Lasting Smiles Act (H.R. 1379)**

Dear Chairman Pallone and Ranking Member Walden:

We are writing on behalf of the American Society of Plastic Surgeons (ASPS) and state and regional plastic surgery societies in support of Reps. Collin Peterson's (D-MN-07) and Denver Riggleman's (R-VA-05) legislation, the *Ensuring Lasting Smiles Act* (H.R. 1379). This important legislation will help increase patients' coverage for craniofacial and other birth anomalies. Collectively, our societies, represent more than 7,000 plastic surgeons and 93 percent of all board-certified plastic surgeons in the United States. Our mission is to advance quality care for plastic surgery patients and promote public policy that protects patient safety.

Children with a congenital anomaly or birth defect or disorder who do not receive treatment at an early age face long-term physical and psychological injuries. Despite the ability of reconstructive surgical efforts to improve the outlook for these children, many insurers often claim that these services are "cosmetic" in nature, especially subsequent stage surgeries. However, the American Medical Association defines surgery performed on abnormal structures of the body caused by congenital defects or developmental abnormalities as reconstructive, not cosmetic. Furthermore, insurers frequently overlook the dental and orthodontic needs of these patients – which are essential to their achieving normal form and function – and mislead affected patients and the public when deeming these procedures cosmetic.

This important legislation will address the problem of insurance denials for reconstructive surgery and necessary adjunctive care for children suffering from congenital or development deformities. With your leadership, we can help children suffering from deformities and disfigurement receive coverage for the treatment they need.

For the reasons outlined above, we thank you for your consideration of this legislation and encourage the Committee to pass this legislation.
