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108 *The Chair. Welcome to our first full committee legislative markup of the 118th Congress. We will consider 109 20 bills from 3 of our subcommittees to help secure our 110 energy future and global competitive edge. 111 In 15 of the bills we are leading to ensure reliable, 112 clean, secure, and affordable delivery of energy. Energy is 113 foundational to everything. For centuries, it has driven 114 115 human progress and development, and it is why America has done more to lift people out of poverty and raise the 116 standard of living more than anywhere else. According to 117 data from 2017, 3.7 billion people are living in energy 118 That is half the world. They have a 10-year lower 119 life expectancy, 35 percent fewer years of education, and 120 many don't have electricity at all. 121 Our goal today is to celebrate how abundant energy 122 resources have unleashed prosperity and invited people from 123 across the globe to come to America to achieve their hopes 124 125 and dreams. We have accomplished this as a leader in reducing emissions, with the highest environmental and labor 126 standards in the world. We cannot afford to move backwards 127 with a reckless command and control, so-called climate agenda 128

129 that forces people to pay more and go without reliable energy. 130 131 Unfortunately, that is what we see right now, and what President Biden has pursued since his first day in office. 132 From the gas station to the grocery store, his war on 133 American energy is making life harder and more expensive for 134 the hardworking people of this country. Families, on 135 136 average, have been forced to pay \$10,000 more over the last 2 years for everyday goods and services. More than a third of 137 households say they have forgone food and medicine in order 138 to pay their energy bills. It shouldn't be this way. 139 President Biden is also weakening our security, and 140 making us dangerously dependent and reliant on China's supply 141 chains that are more harmful to the environment and use slave 142 labor. China's overall share of energy minerals processing 143 surpasses OPEC's share of oil markets in many key areas, from 144 40 percent to 100 percent of key materials and processing. 145 146 DoE has noted that China's control of key materials in renewable energy is "across the board.'' 147 To win the future, we cannot allow our energy security 148 to be surrendered to the CCP. Our energy and climate 149

150 solutions before us today are just the beginning of our work to unleash American energy, lower costs, and secure our 151 152 supply chains. We want to lift barriers to expanding our energy supplies, remove red tape over exportation and 153 importation of LNG, and build more pipelines with our North 154 American allies and across the states. 155 We also want to repeal taxes that will harm communities, 156 157 shut down production, and raise prices across the entire 158 economy. We are leading to prevent bans on key energy 159 technologies and stop the Administration from closing off 160 markets that would increase prices even more. 161 All of this will help open critical markets for energy 162 to boost production, and help drive down cost. 163 Other bills focus on securing critical energy materials 164 to be less reliant on Chinese supply chains. That includes 165 bolstering the Department of Energy's responsibilities to 166 167 assess, identify, and address supply chain vulnerabilities. Further, several bills today reduce regulatory red tape 168 for onshoring critical minerals, processing and refining 169 facilities without compromising environmental protections. 170

171 That is how we beat China and advance prosperity for America. In addition to these energy and environment bills, we 172 173 are also taking action on several solutions from our Innovation Data and Commerce Subcommittee. We know that the 174 CCP wants to replace us as a global economic and 175 technological leader. We must protect American data from 176 CCP's malicious behaviors, and make sure technologies of 177 178 tomorrow are developed with our values. That is why we are leading on five solutions that will bolster our competitive 179 edge, and help secure people's personal information from the 180 CCP. 181 Overall, I look forward to our markup today, and I thank 182 all of my colleagues for their work. We have a long list of 183 bills to work through, and I know we will improve the lives 184 of those we serve and secure a better future here at home. 185 Thank you. 186 I now recognize the gentleman from New Jersey, 187 188 Representative Pallone, for five minutes for an opening 189 statement. *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman.

Today committee Republicans are continuing to push

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192 forward their partisan agenda and undermining our nation's bedrock environmental laws in the process. Republicans love 193 194 to talk about taking an all-of-the-above approach to building out our energy assets, but none of the bills we are marking 195 up today address or even reference clean energy. 196 Instead, Republicans are rushing through eight partisan 197 energy bills that have no chance of ever becoming law. Many 198 199 of these are the same bills that Republicans pushed through the last time they were in charge of the House, back when 200 there was a Republican President and a Republican-controlled 201 Senate, and they still couldn't get this legislation over the 202 finish line. But here they are again, attempting to move the 203 204 same old bills. And this is not serious legislating, in my opinion. 205 Republicans are posturing to their big oil and gas friends, 206 at the detriment of the American people. 207 H.R. 1058 is nothing more than a shadow approval of the 208 209 Keystone pipeline. It establishes that every single crossborder energy project is assumed to be in the public 210 interest, unless proven otherwise, a pretty major assumption 211 for Republicans to make unilaterally. 212

- 213 H.R. 1130 removes the requirement that the Department of Energy determine that LNG exports are within the public 214 215 interest. This Republican bill will lead to more American LNG being sent to China. And again, so much for Republican 216 claims of being tough on China. 217 Meanwhile, the seven environmental bills we are marking 218 up today endanger the health and safety of the communities we 219 220 represent. H.R. 1155 would circumvent consideration of safer 221 technologies to avoid chemical disasters. 222 H.R. 1158 seeks to undercut the Toxic Substances Control 223 Act, or TSCA, updates that were developed and passed on a 224 bipartisan basis by this committee in the Frank Lautenberg 225 Act in 2016. TSCA is the best tool we have for protecting 226 our communities from toxic chemical exposure, and it is 227 disturbing that Republicans are now looking to undermine the 228 very law we all worked so hard to update six years ago on a 229 230 bipartisan basis. Three of the bills would trade away public health 231 protections to further subsidize polluters. 232
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H.R. 1140 sets a dangerous precedent by allowing the

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- Environmental Protection Agency to waive any clean air requirements fee or standard for any critical energy resource.
- 237 H.R. 1070 grants Solid Waste Disposal Act permits to
 238 owners or operators of critical energy resource facilities
 239 without requiring basic public health and environmental
 240 safety standards.
- And H.R. 1131 would automatically grant a flexible air
 permit to every industrial facility linked to critical energy
 resources, even those with abysmal track records of Clean Air
 Act violations.
- Two bills would repeal programs enacted by the Inflation Reduction Act, programs that would reduce pollution, lower the deficit, and leverage private sector investments in clean energy projects.
- 249 H.R. 1023 would revoke the Greenhouse Gas Reduction
 250 Program, which invests \$27 billion to rapidly deploy low and
 251 zero-emission technologies.
- 252 H.R. 1141 targets the Methane Emission Reduction
 253 Program, which, at its core, ensures polluters pay for wasted
 254 methane, and not customers.

255 Now, taken together, these bills make clear that Republicans refuse to hold polluters accountable for the 256 257 damages they cause to our air, our water, our communities, and our climate. While Democrats delivered historic wins for 258 the American people by passing historic climate legislation, 259 legislation that has already created more than 100,000 good-260 paying, clean energy jobs, Republicans are here today 261 262 actively working to undermine that progress and do the bidding of their polluter friends, and I oppose all of these 263 bills. 264 We will also mark up five bills from Innovation Data and 265 Commerce Subcommittee. I support two of the bills that 266 direct the Department of Commerce to prepare reports 267 regarding ways to strengthen U.S. competitiveness. I also 268 support legislation requiring mobile applications that are 269 banned on Federal devices to clearly disclose that 270 information to all users who download or update the 271 272 applications. We will also consider two bills focused on data 273 disclosure. While I support giving consumers access to 274 information about their data, I remain concerned that these 275

276 particular bills have been rushed through the legislative process without proper consideration of whether the required 277 278 disclosures will be useful or just confusing to consumers or, even worse, I worry that they could contribute to notice 279 fatigue, reducing the likelihood that consumers will actually 280 focus on the disclosures when they receive them. 281 I continue to believe that we must work together to 282 283 protect consumers' data privacy, and I look forward to working together to achieve those shared goals. 284 And with that, Madam Chairwoman, I yield back the 285 balance of my time. 286 *The Chair. Chair reminds the members that, pursuant to 287 the committee rules, all members' opening statements will be 288 made part of the record. 289 Are there further opening statements? 290 The gentleman from South Carolina, Mr. Duncan, is 291 recognized for three minutes for an opening statement. 292 *Mr. Duncan. I am excited to be here at our first full 293 committee markup to take up a set of bills we moved through 294 regular order and out of the Energy, Climate, and Grid 295 Security Subcommittee last week. These bills will help 296

297 increase American energy production, restore our energy leadership for the United States of America. 298 299 The United States has an incredible energy potential. We have vast resources of oil, natural gas, and other 300 critical minerals essential for energy dominance. Only a few 301 years ago, we achieved energy independence, which benefits 302 our economic and national security. There is no national 303 304 security without energy security. Unfortunately, the energy agenda imposed by the Biden 305 Administration in the last couple of years has 306 disincentivized private-sector investment in our energy 307 infrastructure by implementing a top-down government 308 regulation on the energy sector. This has led to decreased 309 energy production, energy infrastructure development. 310 In fact, according to the Energy Information 311 Administration, in 2022 the least amount of interstate 312 natural gas pipeline capacity was added since it began 313 314 tracking that data in 1995. This is a direct consequence of the Biden Administration's anti-energy policies. 315 My state of South Carolina has seen its population grow 316 in recent years because it has been a haven for 317

manufacturing. We worry if we can maintain this reputation 318 over the next several years, solely due to the inability to 319 320 build out essential energy infrastructure. We have an abundance of natural gas in the northeast and Appalachia, 321 but, unfortunately, under the current regulatory structure, 322 it only takes one state to block access to this safe, 323 reliable energy source, and that will ensure continued growth 324 325 and prosperity in my state. And this issue is not unique to South Carolina. 326 The good news is that Republicans have solutions to 327 reassert our energy dominance and lower prices. The energy 328 bills we are taking up today will protect American energy 329 production from Federal bans. It will work to ease the 330 energy infrastructure permitting from pipelines to cross-331 border infrastructure. It ensures the importance of American 332 energy exports around the world; assess our critical energy 333 resources supply chains, which are key to wind, solar, 334 335 batteries, and EV technologies; explore ways to expand U.S. refining capacity; and condemn the actions of the Biden 336 Administration and cancellation of Keystone pipeline. 337 We all agree that affordable, reliable, resilient, and 338

sustainable energy is essential for all Americans. It is 339 time to work toward that goal by increasing American energy 340 341 production and restoring our energy leadership. I urge all my colleagues to support the bills in front 342 of us today so that we can achieve this goal, and I yield 343 back. 344 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. I now recognize 345 346 the Ranking Member DeGette for her opening statement, three minutes. 347 *Ms. DeGette. I thank the gentlelady, and I have got to 348 say I am a bit disappointed with the bills that we are 349 considering today, because almost all of the 20 bills are 350 partisan messaging bills that are just being rammed through 351 the committee. 352 Eight of the bills are from the Energy Subcommittee and, 353 unfortunately, all of them are partisan. The minority was 354 not consulted on a single one of them, and it was almost 355 356 unanimously opposed by all the Democrats last week. I suspect that will be the case again today. 357 These bills that my colleagues claim would make the 358 United States energy independent and bring down the cost of 359

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     energy, but, in fact, they would not achieve these goals.
     They wouldn't bring down the cost of energy at home.
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     wouldn't increase our nation's energy security, and they
     wouldn't strengthen our critical energy infrastructure.
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          And the reason why -- and forgive me if I am sounding
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     like a broken record, but I keep saying this -- the oil
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     market is an international market whose prices are subject to
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     the volatility of the international market, and these bills
     would embrace that volatile market and make natural gas
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     prices at home vulnerable to the same fluctuations in the
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     international market. And so that is why we can't drill our
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     way to energy independence.
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          These bills would only further our dependance on oil and
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     gas, and they don't do anything more than -- a giveaway to
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     the oil and gas industry, which once again is bringing in
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     record profits.
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          H.R. 1130, the Unlocking our Domestic LNG Potential Act,
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377
     would repeal a public interest determination required for the
     export of U.S. LNG, making American natural gas further
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     subject to the volatility of the global market, which only
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     will destabilize prices here at home.
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381 H.R. 1115, the Promoting Interagency Coordination Review for Natural Gas Pipelines Act (sic) would essentially require 382 383 FERC to rubber-stamp the construction of new natural gas pipelines, while running roughshod over the ability of other 384 agencies to review its work. 385 And two pieces of legislation, H.R. 1058 and H. Con. 386 Res. 14, would attempt to revive the Keystone XL pipeline, 387 388 which was terminated nearly two years ago. And so those are the energy bills. 389 From the Environment Subcommittee we have got seven 390 partisan bills that would gut our bedrock environmental laws 391 that protect the air we breathe and the water that we drink. 392 These are another gift to the oil and gas industry, and they 393 are going to undo critical programs that will put us on the 394 path to a better future. 395 And so the bills that we have today, they don't do 396 anything to protect our environment or ensure energy 397 398 security. Instead, they just send a message to the oil and gas industry that they get to call the shots. 399 But being an optimist, I have a word of positive thought 400 to say. We are getting these messaging bills out of the way. 401

402 I think that is a good thing, because maybe after this we can actually get down to the business of legislating in a 403 404 bipartisan way to have a clean energy future, to have energy independence, and to begin to bend the climate curve. 405 And with that, Madam Chair, I yield back. 406 *The Chair. The chair now recognizes the chairman of 407 the Innovation Subcommittee, Mr. Bilirakis, for three 408 409 minutes --410 *Mr. Bilirakis. Thank you. *The Chair. -- opening statement. 411 *Mr. Bilirakis. Thank you, I appreciate it, Madam 412 Chair. I want to thank you again for your including these 413 bills, the five Innovation Data and Commerce Subcommittee 414 bills, on today's markup, some of which have been introduced 415 and circulated for years, and finally get -- they are getting 416 a vote out of committee. So we appreciate that very much. 417 The bills we are considering today are essential to 418 419 cementing American energy -- American energy -- American leadership in technology, and providing Americans with 420 greater transparency regarding the websites and applications 421 they use. 422

423 Americans are the most innovative people in the world. Nobody can dispute that. And we must eliminate government 424 425 barriers to ensure Americans have -- the innovators are empowered to push the frontiers of innovation. One way to do 426 this is to encourage foreign direct investment from 427 responsible and trusted countries. Another way is to 428 increase transparency by providing consumers with the 429 430 information they need to make informed decisions. I want to thank Mr. Pence, my good friend, and for his 431 -- I want to thank him for his leadership on the global 432 investment in America, the Jobs Act. This bill will help us 433 understand the barriers to increasing investment from 434 friendly nations, and ultimately lead the globe in emerging 435 technologies. 436 I also want to thank my friend, Ms. Cammack from the 437 great state of Florida, for her bipartisan work with Mr. 438 Soto, also from Florida, on the CAUTION Act, which requires 439 440 app stores to clearly disclose if an app has been banned on Federal devices. Pretty clear. Americans should know when 441 they are downloading an application deemed a security threat 442 by the Federal Government. 443

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          Mr. Fulcher's bill, the Internet App ID Act, would
     require apps to disclose if they are owned by the CCP or a
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     business domiciled in the People's Republic of China.
     Failure to disclose Chinese ownership would be subject to
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     penalties enforced by the Federal Trade Commission. And Mr.
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     Fulcher's bill -- he has an amendment that I support. It
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     tightens up the bill a little bit, so he will actually
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     disclose that.
          So next is the TELL Act, introduced by Representative
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     Duncan, and would require tech companies to notify their
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     users if their platform stores data in the People's Republic
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                If an app or a website is sending or storing data
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     in China, Americans should know. Of course they should.
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          As we continue to advance legislation to improve
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     American competitiveness on the world stage, I want to
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     re-emphasize this committee's priority to pass a national
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     privacy and data security law. We are committed to getting
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     that legislation across the finish line.
          So, in my opinion, these are bipartisan bills, and we
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     should have a unanimous vote out of this committee.
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          So I appreciate you, Madam Chair, and I yield back the
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465 balance of my time. *The Chair. Further opening statements? The ranking 466 467 member, are you ready? No? Oh, okay. 468 Mr. Tonko is the Environment Subcommittee Ranking 469 Member, he is recognized for three minutes, opening 470 471 statement. 472 *Mr. Tonko. Thank you, Madam Chair. While I appreciate the opportunity for us to consider these bills through 473 regular order, I have major concerns with the energy and 474 environmental bills that will be before us. 475 I know that several members on both sides of the aisle 476 would like to have a serious conversation about permitting 477 reform. But unfortunately, these bills are not the basis for 478 that discussion. All seven of the bills advanced by the 479 Environment Subcommittee were on party line votes, and are 480 destined to be ignored by the Senate. 481 482 Two of those bills, H.R. 1023 and H.R. 1141, would repeal provisions of the Inflation Reduction Act, the 483 Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, and the Methane Emissions 484 Reduction Program. These are two of the most important 485

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provisions for achieving the pollution reduction goals of the
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     IRA. The GHG Reduction Fund, in particular, is essential to
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     ensuring that our clean energy transition benefits all
     Americans by enabling low-income households and disadvantaged
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     and rural communities to more easily access project funding
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     and financing opportunities.
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          Four of the other bills -- H.R. 1070, H.R. 1131, H.R.
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     1140, and H.R. 1158 -- would create new loopholes in our --
     some of our nation's most important environmental laws for
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     the benefit of broadly-defined "critical energy resources.''
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          I suspect we will hear the term "critical energy
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     resources'' be used interchangeably with critical minerals by
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     our majority colleagues, and I do believe we would actually
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     find some common ground on the need to explore policies that
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     will lead to more resilient and sustainable supply chains for
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     critical minerals. That is a worthy conversation, but this
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     is not the purpose of the bills before us. These bills, as
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     drafted, go well beyond the limited and knowable list of
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     critical minerals. Critical energy resources would allow
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     coal, gas, and oil to receive special treatment, and the
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     ability to skirt fundamental environmental protections.
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507 If members want to work together on critical mineral issues, I would welcome that. But I have no interest in 508 509 giving sweetheart deals to the fossil fuel companies under the guise of our national critical mineral needs. 510 Our environmental laws exist to protect Americans from 511 harmful pollution, and they have a strong track record of 512 success, improving public health and addressing climate 513 514 change while preserving energy security and growing our economy. Unfortunately, the bills from the environmental 515 subcommittee are not going to protect our constituents' air 516 and water, and therefore I must urge their opposition today. 517 With that, Madam Chair, I yield back. 518 519 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. I now recognize the chairman of the Environment Subcommittee, Mr. Johnson, 520 for three minutes for the purpose of an opening statement. 521 Thank you, Madam Chair. Last week the *Mr. Johnson. 522 Subcommittee on Environment, Manufacturing, and Critical 523 524 Materials favorably forwarded seven bills to the full committee for consideration, and each of those bills will be 525 marked up today. 526

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These bills are part of an effort to end the outsourcing

528 of our long and -- or short and long-term energy security needs to foreign countries, particularly those that don't 529 530 like us very much, and actively leverage their resources against the United States and its allies. 531 Before critics claim these bills would harm the 532 environment, I want to ask a few questions and ask them to 533 consider this. 534 535 Is the goal to lower emissions or to eliminate specific types of energy sources? 536 Does outsourcing mining and manufacturing activities for 537 green technologies to countries with poor environmental and 538 labor standards improve the environment? 539 Can America have reliable, resilient, available, and 540 affordable energy for our grid and transportation if we don't 541 have the energy resources to make that a reality? 542 And will we do anything to solve that issue? 543 We have learned over the last few years that we need to 544 545 do something more than just throw money at a problem. we will do just that. 546 For instance, Representative Carter's bill addressing 547 permitting for refining and processing of critical energy 548

549 resources. Right now there is no refining of critical minerals in the United States. 550 551 Representative Curtis's legislation addresses innovation in cleaner energy systems, technology, and sources that are 552 currently languishing on the desks of bureaucrats at the EPA. 553 On the issue of national security, Rep. Pence's 554 legislation gives the EPA explicit, though limited, authority 555 556 to address both energy and national security needs. legislation is patterned after the Federal Power Act, and is 557 in line with 22 other waiver authorities in the Clean Air 558 559 Act. Mr. Crenshaw's bill tackles the practical and economic 560 problems posed by an EPA regulation on gasoline refining that 561 could intentionally destroy our domestic refining capacity, 562 and increase prices at the pump. 563 For synchronizing U.S. energy spending and policy, we 564 are considering legislation to clarify the use of EPA's 565 566 existing flexible permit program for critical energy resources and the natural gas tax, and address the Democrats' 567 big green slush fund that was jammed through the last 568 reconciliation package. 569

570 Madam Chair, I want to clarify that this isn't all that needs to be done in these and other areas to better unleash 571 572 American energy, reinvigorate innovation in energy technologies, and bolster our domestic supply chains. But it 573 is a big step in the right direction. I look forward to 574 reporting these bills to the House floor, and working with 575 members on both sides to address these challenges and more 576 577 going forward. 578 And with that, I yield back whatever remaining time I have, Madam Chair. 579 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there 580 further opening statements? 581 582 No further opening statements? The chair calls up H.R. 750, and asks the clerk to 583 report. 584 *The Clerk. 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613 *The Chair. And without objection, the lady is recognized for five minutes. 614 615 *Mrs. Cammack. Thank you, Chairwoman Rodgers, for holding this markup today to consider a number of very 616 important pieces of legislation. I am glad that we are 617 considering the CAUTION Act, which I am proud to lead with my 618 friend and colleague from Florida, Mr. Soto. 619 620 TikTok, which is owned by Bytedance, a privately-held company that is headquartered in Beijing, has become a topic 621 of recent discussion. However, one important fact to 622 remember about the so-called private companies in China is 623 that there is nothing private about them at all. Every 624 single technology company operating in China is subject to 625 Chinese laws which require companies to provide user data to 626 the CCP. In short, the government owns them and, by 627 extension, everything they collect data on. 628 Just yesterday, FBI Director Chris Wray testified in an 629 630 open Senate Intelligence Committee hearing, and discussed threats TikTok poses to national security. When asked by my 631 fellow Floridian, Senator Marco Rubio, the FBI director 632 discussed how CCP could use TikTok to control data on 633

millions of Americans, to control software on millions of 634 Americans' devices, and to use the app to drive narratives 635 636 that divide Americans against each other. On December 29th of 2022, recognizing the security risks 637 of TikTok, the President signed into law the No TikTok on 638 Government Devices Act, which prohibits TikTok from being 639 downloaded or used on any device issued by the United States 640 641 Government or a government corporation. The bill we are considering today, the CAUTION Act, 642 would build off the prohibition of TikTok on Federal devices 643 to inform consumers of the security risks posed by using this 644 Specifically, this bill would require any person who 645 sells or distributes TikTok to disclose the use of the 646 application as prohibited on government-owned devices under 647 law in a clear and conspicuous manner before any individual 648 downloads or updates the application. The FTC would enforce 649 this requirement under the bill. 650 Every single person using TikTok in the United States, 651 at minimum, deserves to know that the Federal Government has 652 banned the use of the app on Federal devices due to 653 legitimate security risks. 654

655 Again, I would like to thank Mr. Soto for helping lead this effort with me, and would like to thank Chair Rodgers 656 for considering the CAUTION Act in today's markup. 657 I encourage all of my colleagues and members of this 658 committee to support it, and I yield back. 659 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there a 660 discussion of the amendment, further discussion? 661 662 The gentleman from California, Mr. Obernolte, you are recognized for five minutes. 663 *Mr. Obernolte. Thank you very much, Madam Chair. 664 move to strike the last word. 665 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized. 666 *Mr. Obernolte. I share very much the author's concerns 667 about the privacy implications of Americans' data being 668 collected and stored in China. Certainly, we had those 669 concerns about TikTok. I am looking forward to questioning 670 the President of TikTok when we have him in our hearing here 671 672 shortly. We took the step of banning TikTok from government-owned 673 devices, which I think was very appropriate, and we did that 674 out of an abundance of caution, because even though we don't 675

676 really have constructive knowledge that that data is being acquired by TikTok, we are concerned enough about it to take 677 678 that step. But this bill, I do have some concerns about. First of all, I tend to be a little skeptical of 679 government-required warning notices in general. But I feel 680 like, if we are going to warn people about something, we need 681 to be very clear about what we are warning them about, and 682 683 why it is important for them to know this. This bill would simply require app stores to notify 684 people before they download an app like TikTok that has been 685 banned on ungoverned devices that the app is banned on 686 government devices. It gives them no useful knowledge about 687 688 what they should be concerned about. If you own a restaurant, and you are in a place where I, 689 like, live, where it might have snow and ice on a deck and it 690 might be slippery, if you tell people, "If there is ice on 691 the deck, please be careful, it is slippery, don't fall,'' 692 693 that that gives people useful information about why they should be concerned, and what they should do. Merely telling 694 people that the government has banned an app on government-695 owned devices doesn't provide that information. 696

697 And in fact, as an app developer myself, I can tell you I have thought a lot about consumer behavior. I can tell you 698 699 that there, in our youthful generation, is a strong anti-authoritarian streak. I am concerned that perhaps this 700 would incentivize more of our youth to download the app. 701 Even if this was effective in discouraging the use of 702 TikTok, I am concerned that it is easily evaded. Bytedance 703 704 could just simply publish a new app called TikTak -- well, probably not, that is trademarked, probably, but TockTick, 705 something like that. It changed the name, and in that way it 706 would no longer be on the list, and they could continue doing 707 that until we passed a more comprehensive solution. And I 708 would certainly not bet on the ability of the United States 709 Congress to be more nimble than a private company in keeping 710 ahead of requirements like that. 711 So I share the author's concerns about this. I think 712 713 the real solution is that we need comprehensive Federal 714 digital data privacy legislation. And I know the Chair has been working hard on this. I know the committee has been 715 working hard on it. I am very hopeful that legislation like 716 that will pass out of the committee and pass the Congress 717

718 this year, because this is the way to solve this problem. I am concerned that just putting a warning notice on it 719 720 creates a meaningless barrier without actually solving the problem, and that is why I am in respectful opposition. 721 I yield back. 722 723 *The Chair. Further discussion on the amendment? Mr. Walberg from -- the gentleman from Michigan. 724 725 *Mr. Walberg. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman. You know, I share some of those same concerns, but I 726 also see this legislation as an important step. We all know 727 that TikTok is a threat to our national security, its 728 privacy, and the well-being of our young people. 729 Unfortunately, we have only banned its use on Federal 730 devices. A clear and conspicuous notification to all new and 731 current users would go a long way, at least in starting to 732 convince people to reconsider the use of the app, and to 733 force us, even on this committee, to do still more, 734 especially in relationship to what we must know about China's 735 intentions related to the U.S. and the world. 736 Yesterday, for example, Michigan finally banned the use 737

of TikTok on state-issued devices. After letters coming from

738

739 my colleagues in Congress to the administration, it was finally banned, though Governor Whitmer, unfortunately, 740 741 exempted herself from that ban for promotional purposes only. That shows that there can be a sieve that will continue, and 742 I think further pressure that comes with us taking action, 743 highlighting the problem that we are experiencing, and noting 744 that the vast majority of states who have taken the same step 745 746 are presenting this to their people, as well. It is a constant battle. We have to constantly be up to 747 date on it. We know that the Chinese and other bad actors 748 will find other ways around, but that shouldn't stop us from 749 doing what we can at the present. So I certainly support 750 this legislation, and support further steps as we move along, 751 and hope that my governor will figure out something better 752 than just promotional purposes to justify her staying on a 753 danger to security in our state and in our country. 754 755 Thank you, I yield back. *The Chair. Is there further discussion? 756 Seeing none, if there is no further discussion, the vote 757 occurs on the amendment. 758

965 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes to strike the last word. 966 967 *Mr. Fulcher. Thank you, Madam Chair. I offer an amendment to H.R. 784, the Internet Application Integrity and 968 Disclosure Act, and I want to give a special thank you to 969 Congressman Chris Pappas in New Hampshire for co-leading, and 970 his work on this bill. 971 972 So this was introduced in the Innovation, Data, and Commerce Subcommittee last month, and it passed by voice. 973 But there were some that thought that some of the language is 974 too broad. So we went back to take a closer look at that. 975 And so this amendment makes some changes, and it tightens the 976 language to say that the requirement is for a person who 977 owns, provides, or controls websites, including online 978 sellers, distributors of web and mobile-based applications to 979 disclose that those applications are domiciled in China. 980 That previously was -- that is tightened-up language. That 981 was previously "located in China,'' and "maintain those 982 sites,'' so this tightens it up significantly. 983 It is basically a warning label to individual users, 984 business users, Internet servicers, mobile service providers 985

986 in disclosing the origin of applications or websites prior to downloading or using them, particularly if those origin 987 988 applications are within the People's Republic of China. And I made this statement last month, I will say it 989 again: China has earned our distrust. And so applications 990 that are owned, provided, and controlled in China are often 991 de facto arms of the CCP, aided by a complex web of laws and 992 993 policies that compel organizations to carry out the wishes of the Chinese Communist Party, and thereby it gives them access 994 to sensitive information regarding application service 995 providers and users, including geolocation, online user 996 patterns, and the content of private user conversations. 997 So the idea with this bill and this amendment is to 998 protect individuals and businesses who might download such an 999 app or use a website, ensuring transparency and disclosure of 1000 the origin. And Madam Chair and members of the Committee, 1001 this is important because the Chinese Government has 1002 1003 infiltrated our private market, and they seek to continue to collect information on Americans. 1004 I want to thank the committee for making changes to 1005 address these entities, making the changes to domicile, to 1006

1007 own, provide, or control, and putting companies only on the hook if they provide false information. Previously, the 1008 1009 language said misleading or false. We changed that to just false, because it is difficult to quantify misleading 1010 1011 sometimes. So H.R. 784 adds statutory leverage to ensure people 1012 know the potential risks of their data and online behavior 1013 1014 when they download an application owned, provided, or 1015 controlled by the Chinese Communist Party. And Madam Chair, I believe we have addressed the 1016 concerns that were previously discussed on this bill, while 1017 maintaining its intent. And I fully understand there may be 1018 1019 more comprehensive solutions moving forward, and when those come along I will probably wind up supporting that. But we 1020 have to start someplace. This is definitely a step in the 1021 right direction. 1022 With that, I urge passage of my amendment, and yield 1023 1024 back, Madam Chair. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1025 further discussion on the amendment? 1026 The ranking member is recognized, Mr. Pallone. 1027

1028 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman. I move to strike the last word in opposition to the amendment and the 1029 1030 underlying bill. So today we are marking up two bills: the Internet 1031 Application ID Act and the TELL Act that share a flaw, in my 1032 They haven't been properly vetted, and may have 1033 unintended consequences that harm consumers and American 1034 1035 businesses. 1036 I made these concerns known during last month's subcommittee markup, and while I expressed my hope that the 1037 majority would work with the Democrats before full committee 1038 markup, I still think the bills before still fail to fully 1039 1040 address key concerns of consumer groups, subject matter experts, American businesses, and Federal agencies of 1041 expertise. 1042 Committee Democrats did outreach to stakeholders after 1043 subcommittee markup, and provided edits to our Republican 1044 1045 counterparts that we hoped would address some of the concerns received. At the same time, we acknowledged that other 1046 issues remained unresolved. Some, but not all, of our 1047 proposed revisions have been incorporated into the ANS. 1048

1049	But unsurprisingly, over the last few days, we have
1050	heard from stakeholders sounding the alarm about remaining
1051	issues with these bills. A letter from the National
1052	Consumers League Act, the App Association, and the Software
1053	and Information Industry Association, Computer and
1054	Communications Industry Association, and the Consumer
1055	Technology Association. And I would ask for unanimous
1056	consent for these letters to be entered into the record,
1057	Madam Chair.

1063 *Mr. Pallone. So thank you. So valid concerns have been raised by consumer groups and businesses. 1064 1065 A key concern is notice fatigue. We know consumers get tired of receiving notices that they find confusing, and then 1066 ignore other, more important notices. We have all clicked 1067 past things that we should probably read, and these two bills 1068 contribute to the problem by repeatedly triggering notices 1069 1070 that provide no meaningful information to consumers, or at least that they can understand. 1071 So I think we need to move away from the failed notice 1072 and consent regime, which puts the burden on the consumer to 1073 understand appropriately respond to various privacy pop-ups. 1074 1075 These bills don't protect consumers from dangerous design features or empower consumers with meaningful control over 1076 their data, in my opinion. 1077 So just let me be clear. The sponsors of these bills 1078 have identified a real problem: websites and apps, including 1079 1080 those that may be under the control or substantial influence of the Chinese Communist Party, have free rein to collect, 1081 process, and transfer consumers' sensitive personal 1082 information, and store it anywhere in the world. I do not 1083

1084 doubt that the sponsors are trying to do the right thing, but these notice bills do not solve the problem, in my opinion. 1085 1086 Tech accountability and data minimization is a better answer. Last Congress this committee overwhelmingly passed 1087 the American Data Privacy and Protect Act, transformational 1088 legislation that will meaningfully restrict the amount of 1089 consumers' data collected, processed, and transferred by 1090 1091 websites and apps. That bill does include language requiring companies to include in their terms of service whether they 1092 store information in or transfer data to several foreign 1093 adversaries. But unlike these bills, that legislation, the 1094 ADPPA, does not cause additional, confusing notices to 1095 consumers. And unlike these bills, it provides clear 1096 quidance to businesses and the FTC. 1097 And I appreciate that the TELL Act and the Internet 1098 Application ID Act have been around for multiple congresses, 1099 but there is no expiration date on concerns about flaws in 1100 1101 legislation. And with the issues unaddressed that I mentioned, I can't support these bills today, and I yield 1102 back, Madam Chair. 1103 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1104

1105 further discussion on the amendment? For what purpose does the gentleman from Florida seek 1106 1107 recognition? *Mr. Bilirakis. To strike the last word on the 1108 1109 amendment. *The Chair. The gentleman --1110 *Mr. Bilirakis. Thank you. 1111 1112 *The Chair. -- is recognized for five minutes. 1113 *Mr. Bilirakis. I want to thank my colleagues for raising these concerns on compliance, though I seriously 1114 1115 disagree with them. I want to note that the two bills the ranking member 1116 1117 Pallone just referenced have been available for review and 1118 edits for years. They even had a legislative hearing last Congress. Our nation's tech companies, especially the 1119 largest tech companies like Apple or Google, have the know-1120 your-customer compliance regimes to understand who they are 1121 1122 conducting business with. 1123 While I understand the concerns with compliance, the legislation before us today require -- all the legislation 1124 requires a knowingly standard, which should ease concerns 1125

1126 about mistake in non-compliance. Understanding who you are signing a contract with, and conducting due diligence is 1127 1128 something we expect American businesses to do. When we vote 428 to 1 on the House floor to ban the use 1129 of Uyghur slave labor in our supply chains, we had a much 1130 stricter standard, requiring that companies receive an 1131 explicit exemption from Customs and Border Patrol to use 1132 1133 goods from Xinjiang. In contrast, the bills before us have a much lower standard. 1134 The TELL Act requires that an app or website which 1135 knowingly stores and maintains data in the People's Republic 1136 of China alert -- it alerts the users to that fact. 1137 The CAUTION Act requires that phone app stores alert 1138 their users that an app has been banned on Federal devices. 1139 Americans should know that they are downloading spyware. 1140 The Internet App ID Act requires that apps or websites 1141 which are knowingly owned in part or in full by the Chinese 1142 1143 Communist Party or an entity domiciled in the People's Republic of China disclose this fact to their users. Once 1144 data is in China, the Chinese Communist Party has unfettered 1145 access to it. 1146

1147 Companies who are knowingly giving the Chinese Communist Party access to American data should be required to disclose 1148 1149 this fact to their users; it is as simple as that, Mr. Chair, so -- Madam Chair. 1150 So, in any case, I urge my colleagues to pass these 1151 bills, as amended, and I yield back the balance of my time. 1152 Let's get them on the floor as soon as possible. 1153 1154 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Does anyone else seek to be recognized? 1155 The lady from California, for what purpose do you seek 1156 recognition? 1157 *Ms. Eshoo. To strike the last word, Madam Chairwoman. 1158 1159 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five 1160 minutes --*Ms. Eshoo. Thank you. 1161 *The Chair. -- to strike the last word. 1162 *Ms. Eshoo. I have long been a champion of privacy and 1163 1164 data protection. I have also warned about the dangers of America's data and technology in the hands of the PRC for 1165 many years. I was one of the first to raise the alarm about 1166 Huawei years before -- actually, well over a decade before 1167

1168 others did. We all agree that we need to ensure America's data is 1169 1170 protected from the exploitation of the PRC, but this can't be accomplished with messaging bills. If we really care about 1171 keeping the data of the American people safe from the PRC, we 1172 should work together to ensure that the legislation we pass 1173 out of this committee accomplishes that goal. Unfortunately, 1174 1175 the bills we are considering today really don't do that. 1176 This legislation places an enormous burden and uncertainty on American businesses. They aren't clear about 1177 how companies would be able to verify the ownership and 1178 control of the apps or the websites. They aren't clear about 1179 1180 which companies would be responsible for verification in the first place, and they will overburden consumers with 1181 countless notices that serve them no good. 1182 There are legitimate concerns with the collection and 1183 use of Americans' data by the PRC, but poorly drafted 1184 1185 legislation is poorly drafted legislation, and it can undermine America's technological leadership, and have no 1186 positive effect on protecting our data from being exploited 1187 by the PRC or anyone else. 1188

1392 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill, 742? 1393 For what purpose does the gentleman from South Carolina 1394 seek recognition? 1395 *Mr. Duncan. Mrs. Chairman, I move to strike the last 1396 1397 word. *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 1398 1399 minutes to strike the last word. *Mr. Duncan. Thank you so much. I rise today to speak 1400 on behalf of my bill, H.R. 742, the Telling Everyone the 1401 Location of Data Leaving the U.S. Act, or TELL Act, and this 1402 amendment in the nature of a substitute that is being brought 1403 1404 up. TELL makes a simple requirement of all mobile 1405 applications and websites: if you store and maintain data in 1406 the People's Republic of China, or if users' data is in any 1407 way accessible by the Chinese Communist Party or any other 1408 1409 Chinese state-owned entity, you must disclose that to the consumer. The Americans have the right to know. 1410 Due to past actions, I believe, by past congresses, you 1411 now have to agree to allow apps to track you, and you have to 1412

1413 be warned or notified that cookies may be downloaded by websites to your computers and devices. The American people 1414 1415 deserve to know which apps on their phone or programs on their laptop are collecting personal data to give to the 1416 Chinese in quantities far greater than those from the big 1417 white balloon, and in far greater depth. 1418 The bill also provides that failure to disclose is a 1419 1420 violation under the unfair or deceptive acts clause, and it gives the FTC enforcement authority to fine companies who 1421 either fail to disclose or who knowingly disclose false 1422 information. 1423 The big white Chinese spy balloon was a wake-up call to 1424 This bill should be a wake-up call to Big Tech, 1425 which is why they are squirming. Our constituents are sick 1426 and tired of their data being exposed to the CCP, and we 1427 wonder what it is being used for. Our message to Big Tech is 1428 simple: If you don't like the disclosure requirements in 1429 1430 this bill, knock off storing China -- storing data in China, or be prepared to tell our constituents why you have chosen 1431 to be so cavalier with their personal information. 1432 I want to thank my Democrat co-lead on this bill, the 1433

1434 gentlelady from Ohio, Marcy Kaptur, especially for her leadership in fighting against Chinese abuses over the 1435 1436 entirety of her long and distinguished career. This bill is proof that we can work together. We can 1437 work across the ideological spectrum and across party lines 1438 to protect Americans, all of our constituents, from the 1439 predators of the Chinese Communist Party. In that bipartisan 1440 1441 spirit, the ANS we are voting on includes clarifying amendments suggested by the minority after our subcommittee 1442 markup, ensuring that we are focused on data related to 1443 individual Americans, and protecting those Americans from the 1444 1445 Chinese Communist Party. 1446 It is time to shine the sunlight on what the CCP has been doing behind the scenes to get access to volumes and 1447 volumes of Americans' data. I ask for your support on this 1448 legislation, and I yield back the balance. 1449 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Does anyone 1450 1451 seek to be recognized on the bill? The gentleman -- the ranking member -- recognized for 1452 five minutes --1453 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam --1454

1455 *The Chair. -- the last word. *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair. As I previously 1456 1457 mentioned, I have concerns about this bill that remain unresolved. And I do appreciate Mr. Duncan's incorporating 1458 some of the things that we suggested. But I still think the 1459 bill has not been properly vetted with stakeholders to 1460 analyze potential unintended consequences, and may -- and it 1461 1462 may trigger multiple unhelpful notices to consumers, causing confusion and, again, notice fatigue. 1463 It has vague language, I think, that creates confusion 1464 for both industry and the agency tasked with enforcing it --1465 that is the Federal Trade Commission. 1466 The scope of the bill is very broad, and it may lead to 1467 a deluge of meaningless and misleading notifications to 1468 consumers. Based on the language in the bill, it appears 1469 that if a website or mobile application collects and stores 1470 in China any data about more than one consumer who resides in 1471 1472 the United States, it must notify every other person who resides in the United States and uses that website or 1473 downloads the application that it stores such data in China, 1474 and whether the Chinese Communist Party or a state-owned 1475

1476 entity has access to the data. Now, I think that consumers receiving that notice will have no way of knowing if their 1477 1478 data is stored in China, nor any recourse, for that matter. Now, unsurprisingly, we have heard from both consumer 1479 and industry advocates that this bill needs more work. 1480 National Consumers League warns that the bill is, and I 1481 quote, "overly broad in scope, and seeks to substitute the 1482 1483 fig leaf of disclosure for real data protections.'' So again, I think that we can ultimately come to an 1484 agreement on the bill, but, you know, right now I think there 1485 are too many problems. And based on this, I cannot support 1486 the legislation. 1487 And with that, Madam Chair, I yield back. 1488 The gentleman yields back. The companies that are involved 1511 1512 know where they are storing your data. They know where the data is being stored. I would say that it is more difficult 1513 for a company to track your shopping patterns, your travel 1514 patterns, your lifestyle patterns than it is to just 1515 acknowledge that they are storing your data somewhere else, 1516 and let you know that it is being stored outside of the 1517 United States in the People's Republic of China. I don't 1518 understand why this is so difficult and would seem so costly 1519 or difficult for the companies, because they know where their 1520 data centers are. 1521 1522 Now, if China is hacking into a data center and stealing your information, that is a whole other issue. But these 1523 companies, when you download an app, you visit a website, you 1524 sign on to a company where you are buying a product, they 1525

1526 know what they are collecting and where it is stored. Just tell the American people, "Hey guys, we are storing your data 1527 1528 in China, and you can opt in or opt out on whether you want your data stored there, or whether you even want to visit the 1529 website, participate in the app application on your device.'' 1530 Let's just inform the American people where their data may or 1531 may not be. 1532 1533 And with that, I yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1534 further discussion of the amendment? 1535 If there is no further discussion, the vote occurs on 1536 1537 the amendment. 1745 *The Chair. And the gentleman is recognized for five minutes in support of his amendment. 1746 1747 *Mr. Pence. Thank you, Madam Chair. I thank my colleague, Ranking Member Schakowsky, for working with me on 1748 this amendment. 1749 This amendment to H.R. 813 includes technical fixes and 1750 clarifying updates to strengthen the legislation and move 1751 1752 forward on a bipartisan basis. The Global Investment in American Jobs Act seeks to 1753 improve the attractiveness of foreign investment from allied 1754 nations and identify barriers that are holding back American 1755 1756 competitiveness. 1757 Over 200,000 Hoosiers are directly employed by international companies, 56 percent of which are in the 1758 manufacturing sector. Because of our long, storied history 1759 as a leader in the manufacturing industry, companies across 1760 the world have keyed into Indiana. Before companies started 1761 1762 outsourcing operations to China and other countries, company towns have lifted small and rural communities across the 1763 Hoosier State. Take Cummins Engine Company, for example. I 1764 have lived in Columbus, Indiana my entire life, and nearly 1765

1766 every family, my own included, has some connection to the company that has helped build and grow our city. 1767 1768 Beyond Indiana, communities across the country share similar stories where foreign investment has lifted up 1769 communities with stable, good-paying jobs. International 1770 companies in the U.S. employ 8 million workers, and over the 1771 past 5 years have created 400,000 new manufacturing jobs. 1772 1773 companies across the world rethink their partnerships with the Chinese Communist Party, we have an opportunity to 1774 leverage investment from allied nations. 1775 Importantly, this legislation would also seek to uncover 1776 actions from the Chinese Communist Party to gain access to 1777 1778 the U.S. markets and circumvent national security laws. For decades China has built a calculated strategy to corner 1779 global supply chains through IP theft and free market 1780 manipulation. H.R. 813 addresses anti-competitive practices 1781 of the CCP to undermine innovation and to gain footholds in 1782 1783 next generation technologies. I urge support of this bill, and I yield back the 1784 balance of my time. 1785 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1786

That is certainly for sure. But we must 1798 1799 also understand its importance for American workers. The --China is -- and China is not the only adversary that --1800 foreign direct investment from -- among other countries that 1801 we ought to pay attention to. And thank you for including 1802 that in the amendment. 1803 1804 And the bill is stronger for our bipartisan collaboration. I appreciate it so much. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 2097 word. 2098 *The Chair. The gentleman, Mr. Pence, is recognized for 2099 2100 five minutes to strike the last word. *Mr. Pence. Thank you, Madam Chair. I urge my 2101 colleagues to join me in supporting H.R. 752, the Securing 2102 Semiconductor Supply Chains Act, which I co-led with 2103 Congresswoman Eshoo. This bipartisan bill seeks to uncover 2104 barriers to expanded foreign direct investment into domestic 2105 manufacturing for semiconductor chips. 2106 Over the past few years, Hoosiers in southern Indiana 2107 felt the ripples in our economy caused by shortages of 2108 semiconductor chips. Auto manufacturers like Honda in 2109 2110 Greensburg and engine developers like Cummins told me firsthand the potential impacts on day-to-day operations 2111 because of this chip shortage. We learned the hard way that 2112 our economy cannot rely solely on adversarial nations to 2113

2114 secure semiconductor chips. My greatest priority in Congress has been fighting for 2115 2116 policies that have the opportunity to create good-paying jobs for Hoosiers and all Americans. I urge support for this 2117 bill, and I yield back the balance of my time. 2118 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 2119 further discussion on the amendment? 2120 2121 The lady from California, Ms. Eshoo, for what purpose do you seek recognition? 2122 *Ms. Eshoo. I move to strike the last word, Madam 2123 2124 Chairwoman. *The Chair. The lady is recognized for five minutes --2125 *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you. 2126 *The Chair. -- to strike the last word. 2127 *Ms. Eshoo. In 1990 the United States manufactured 2128 nearly 40 percent of all semiconductors. Today the United 2129 States manufactures about 12 percent. Not a good number. 2130 2131 This lack of domestic semiconductor manufacturing poses -and we all know this -- it poses a significant risk not only 2132 to our economy, but our national security. As we witnessed 2133 recently, the supply chain is fragile and can be disrupted 2134

2135 easily with really serious consequences. Last Congress I was proud to vote for the CHIPS and 2136 2137 Science Act. This is a generational investment to rebuild America's semiconductor industry and our manufacturing 2138 economy. Now, to continue this work, Representative Pence 2139 and I introduced this legislation, which we are proud of. 2140 And I thank him and I salute him, not only for his 2141 2142 leadership, but for his partnership. This is an important piece of legislation because it 2143 will direct the Department of Commerce's SelectUSA program to 2144 develop strategies to attract investment in U.S. 2145 semiconductor manufacturers and supply chains. It will 2146 2147 leverage the considerable downpayment that Congress just made, and expand opportunities for the private sector to 2148 invest in American manufacturing. 2149 The United States was once a great manufacturer of 2150 semiconductors. My congressional district, actually, was 2151 2152 named for the materials that go into semiconductors. the Silicon Valley District of California. This bipartisan, 2153 bicameral bill, along with the investments made in the CHIPS 2154 and Science Act, will bring the U.S. back to be what we want 2155

2156 it to be, number one in the world in semiconductor manufacturing, and maintain leadership in technological 2157 2158 innovation. So I thank Mr. Pence for his leadership and, with that, 2159 Madam Chairwoman, I yield back the balance of my time. 2160 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Does anyone 2161 seek to discuss the bill? 2162 2163 For what purpose does Ms. Matsui seek recognition? 2164 *Ms. Matsui. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last word. 2165 *The Chair. The lady is recognized for five minutes to 2166 2167 strike the last word. 2168 *Ms. Matsui. I want to first thank Mr. Pence and Ms. Eshoo for this bill. 2169 As the lead House Democrat on the CHIPS Act, I am no 2170 stranger to the challenges we face in securing a resilient 2171 domestic supply chain of semiconductors. The critical 2172 2173 technology truly underpins our modern economy, but we are not where we need to be. When Congressman McCaul and I 2174 introduced the CHIPS Act, this issue was not receiving the 2175 attention we felt it deserved. That was until the pandemic 2176

2177 exposed the vulnerabilities in both the global and domestic supply of semiconductors. 2178 2179 Thankfully, Congress stepped up to the plate and passed our bill. And just last week, Secretary Raimondo released 2180 the first notice of funding opportunity. And I have been 2181 heartened by her progress, and remain committed to working 2182 with her to get this money out the door quickly. But we all 2183 2184 know there is more work to be done. I am glad to see this committee keeping the drumbeat up on this issue, because our 2185 adversaries aren't waiting. 2186 The policies in this bill will help ensure we maximize 2187 the impact of the \$52 billion we secured in the CHIPS Act. 2188 2189 What we are doing now poses the potential to reassert American leadership for a generation. I am committed to that 2190 work, and I am sure all of us are. Our work is still not 2191 done, but I am excited to help everyone here advance this 2192 bill. 2193 2194 Thank you very much. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 2389 2390 For what purpose does the gentleman from Indiana seek recognition? 2391 I move to strike the last word. 2392 *Mr. Bucshon. *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 2393 minutes. 2394 2395 *Mr. Bucshon. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman. grateful that this bill, H.R. 1068, Securing America's 2396 Critical Minerals Act, made its way through the Energy 2397 Subcommittee to be part of today's full committee markup. 2398 2399 This bill will provide the Department of Energy a small 2400 but significant tool to help secure our nation's energy needs by ensuring that the Secretary of Energy is engaged 2401 productively in addressing this multi-faceted issue. 2402 Currently, many of our critical energy minerals is sourced 2403 outside of the United States. 2404 2405 The U.S. could produce critical energy minerals cleaner and safer than other parts of the world, where production is 2406 tied to dangerous working conditions, child labor 2407 exploitation, and extremely low pay. But to do that, DoE 2408

2409 needs information, and the authority to properly utilize that information. This bill will help them do so. 2410 2411 As a supporter of an all-of-the-above energy approach, it is crucial that we take steps to safeguard and secure the 2412 energy resources necessary to keep the lights on, rates down, 2413 and emissions low. Let's unleash American energy. 2414 I urge my colleagues to support the bill, and I yield 2415 2416 back. 2417 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there further discussion on the bill? 2418 *Mr. Tonko. Madam Chair? 2419 *The Chair. The gentleman from New York for -- seeks 2420 2421 recognition for what purpose? 2422 *Mr. Tonko. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last word. 2423 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 2424 minutes. 2425 2426 *Mr. Tonko. Thank you, Madam Chair. At last week's subcommittee markup I raised my concerns about H.R. 1068, and 2427 I would like to reiterate my opposition today. 2428

2429

As I mentioned in my opening statement, I believe that

2430 there are -- there is potentially real bipartisan interest in strengthening our nation's critical minerals supply chains. 2431 2432 I acknowledge these minerals are going to be needed for a successful clean energy transition. I want to make certain 2433 they are being sourced in a sustainable, ethical, and 2434 certainly environmentally sound manner. 2435 I appreciate that H.R. 1068 indicates the need to 2436 2437 improve reuse and recycling technologies. I believe there is substantial work to be done in establishing both safe and 2438 effective pathways for critical mineral recovery and reuse. 2439 Recycling may not meet all of our estimated needs, but it 2440 certainly can help. Not only would this approach support 2441 domestic jobs, but it would be an alternative that would 2442 avoid the worst -- the human rights, environmental and energy 2443 security concerns raised by some of the more troubling 2444 critical mineral sources. 2445 I also acknowledge that the Department of Energy is 2446 2447 playing a leading role in developing and securing these supply chains. Their efforts, which includes funding from 2448 the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to support battery 2449 manufacturing and critical mineral recycling, are resulting 2450

2451 in major private sector investments and jobs throughout the country. 2452 2453 I certainly do not have a problem with codifying this work into DoE's responsibilities, but this bill goes well 2454 beyond that goal, and that is because this bill encompasses 2455 much more than critical minerals. There are several 2456 potential lists of critical minerals we could instead rely 2457 2458 The U.S. Geological Survey regularly reviews and updates its list using up-to-date scientific methods to 2459 evaluate mineral criticality, and the Inflation Reduction Act 2460 included a list in the tax code for the purposes of a clean 2461 2462 vehicle credit. 2463 But the bill before us is -- goes well beyond those lists. Under the bill's definition of critical energy 2464 resources, almost energy -- any energy-related product could 2465 be determined to be critical, including oil, gas, and, 2466 indeed, coal. 2467 2468 I am also concerned this bill would have DoE stepping into responsibilities that are currently led by EPA and the 2469 Department of the Interior. If this bill were narrowed to 2470 give DoE responsibilities based on the Department's expertise 2471

2472 to consider critical mineral needs in support of our clean energy transition, I would look forward to working with my 2473 2474 colleagues on it. So I hope we may return to this issue at a later date, 2475 and work together on policies that will be focused on 2476 enhancing our critical minerals supply chains, including by 2477 bringing added transparency to them. In order to protect 2478 2479 human rights and uphold high labor and environmental standards, we must be able to see where minerals are coming 2480 from and going to. This would also help support domestic 2481 sources of these minerals, including from recycling 2482 2483 processes. 2484 I believe trying to authorize DoE's work on this effort would be a focused response to a real critical mineral 2485 challenge. But unfortunately, with the overly-broad 2486 definition of "critical energy resources,'' I cannot support 2487 H.R. 1068. With that, I encourage members to oppose this 2488 2489 bill. My amendment makes some clarifications to the underlying bill, following 2516 technical assistance and discussion on the bill last week. 2517 It is safe to say that everyone on this committee 2518 recognizes the importance of critical minerals and other 2519 2520 energy resources necessary to provide for American energy needs. We also know we must consider the potential 2521 vulnerabilities of existing supply chains and domestic 2522 production and processing capacity. This should be a 2523 2524 bipartisan goal. 2525 My Democrat colleagues previously raised concerns that this bill has the potential to expand DoE authority over 2526 domestic production. The legislation, with my amendment, 2527 will provide the Department of Energy with durable cabinet-2528 level authority to assess supply chains for critical energy 2529 2530 Those are the materials of our advanced energy systems, materials that are required for a diverse, all-of-2531 the-above energy transition. 2532 Additionally, my amendment clarifies that DoE, in 2533

2534	consultation with other agencies, shall facilitate strategies
2535	to strengthen our energy supplies without intruding on areas
2536	led by other agencies, consistent with DoE's central role
2537	over American energy policy. The amendment makes clear that
2538	DoE's assessment will include how energy security of the
2539	United States is affected by the reliance of the United
2540	States on imports of critical energy resources. DoE is the
2541	right agency to do this.
2542	The goal is to enable DoE to keep with its historic role
2543	assuring our nation's energy security to help address supply
2544	chain vulnerabilities, shortages, and to combat China's
2545	dominance of critical mineral and material supply chains.
2546	This legislation and the amendment will address supplies of
2547	the broader set of energy-related resources important for

2773 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 2774 For what purpose does the gentleman from South Carolina 2775 seek recognition? 2776 *Mr. Duncan. I move to strike the last word. 2777 *The Chair. Mr. Duncan is recognized for five minutes 2778 to strike the last word. 2779 2780 *Mr. Duncan. Thank you, Madam Chair. My bill, Protecting the American Energy Production Act, is pretty 2781 straightforward. It prohibits the president from declaring a 2782 moratorium on the use of hydraulic fracturing, unless 2783 2784 Congress authorizes the moratorium. 2785 I remind the committee that hydraulic fracturing happens 2786 in many states: Oklahoma, North Dakota, Colorado, Texas, Pennsylvania, just to name a few. 2787 It also expresses the sense of Congress that states 2788 should maintain primacy for the regulation of oil and gas 2789 2790 production on state and private lands. You know, after the 2008 economic downturn, the states 2791 that actually did well economically were the energy-producing 2792 states, many of which I mentioned a minute ago. 2793

2794 Natural gas is affordable, it is reliable, it is safe, and it is abundant. It keeps the lights on when the wind 2795 2796 isn't blowing and the sun is not shining. It can be used as feedstock to create fertilizer to help the nation feed 2797 itself. It can be transported safely across state lines 2798 through pipelines, and can be exported across the ocean to 2799 fuel our allies abroad in times of need. The American people 2800 2801 need natural gas, and one man should not be able to single 2802 handedly end fracking without the consent of Congress. The Administration has been extremely hostile to fossil 2803 fuels in the midst of an energy crisis. We are already 2804 beginning to see the consequences of poor energy policies. 2805 2806 Blackouts are becoming normalized in states like California that have become increasingly reliable -- reliant on 2807 renewable energy, while shutting down access to reliable 2808 baseload power. 2809 I entered into the record during the subcommittee an 2810 2811 article from the Wall Street Journal where PJM, which is a utility provider, said this: "Fossil fuel power plants are 2812 retiring much faster than renewable sources are getting 2813 developed, which could lead to energy imbalances.'' That is 2814

a delicate way of saying that you can expect shortages and 2815 blackouts if you take that energy generation out of the mix. 2816 2817 Of course, wind and solar is cheaper when the taxpayer is subsidizing the cost. Unfortunately for the ratepayer, 2818 this is a poor investment. The reality is not all energy is 2819 the same. Wind and solar energy are simply not as valuable 2820 as energy stored and natural gas. 2821 2822 Now we truly need an all-of-the-above energy matrix, and I think most Republicans support that. We need one that is 2823 diversified, and ensures we have baseload generation. 2824 has to include natural gas. Factories and hospitals do not 2825 close on a cloudy day. And where renewables fail, natural 2826 2827 gas can be reliably ramped up to meet that demand. We saw that on Christmas Eve. We saw that in Texas. 2828 We don't need to go backwards. Grids don't have to be 2829 unreliable in the 21st century. Americans should not have to 2830 settle with blackouts. We need to build out our natural gas 2831 2832 infrastructure in order to achieve American energy dominance, and it begins with our ability to extract it through 2833 hydraulic fracturing. 2834

2857 The aim of this bill, H.R. 1121, is to tie the hands of the president to protect communities and special places where 2858 2859 hydraulic fracturing should not happen. Fracking can be dangerous, destructive, and hazardous to the human health. 2860 It can contaminate our drinking water, pollute the air. 2861 Pregnant women, mothers, and babies are at particular risk 2862 from the toxic chemicals -- from toxic chemical exposure. 2863 2864 is known to be tied to possible infertility, miscarriage, and 2865 cancer. The Congressional Research Service has also said that 2866 fracking produces a large amount of wastewater, approximately 2867 10 barrels of wastewater for every barrel of product. 2868 2869 toxic stew also often leaches into the groundwater, including the processes of construction, drilling, chemical spills, 2870 leaks, discharge of wastewater. 2871 And if that is not enough, fracked gas is an instigator 2872 of methane pollution. Methane traps 80 times more heat in 2873 2874 the atmosphere than carbon dioxide. Methane leaks from oil and gas operations, including pipelines, are accelerating the 2875 costly impacts of the climate crisis. 2876 We need to do more to protect our communities. We need 2877

2878 to make sure that the administration has every tool to protect special places and the people back home. And 2879 2880 thankfully, we passed the Inflation Reduction Act in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law last Congress that is now 2881 expanding cleaner, cheaper energy across America. It is 2882 lowering costs, it is creating jobs, and it is helping us to 2883 build healthier communities. 2884 2885 So let's vote no on this bill, and elevate the people's interests over the polluters' interests, because this bill 2886 does not protect the interests of the American people or 2887 their pocketbooks. It puts the profits of polluters and Big 2888 Oil and Gas over the people's interests. 2889 2890 So I encourage my colleagues to vote no on this bill, and I yield back. 2891 *The Chair. The lady yields back. Is there further 2892 discussion on the bill? 2893 The gentleman from Texas, for what purpose do you seek 2894 recognition? 2895 I move to strike the last word. 2896 *Mr. Burgess. *The Chair. Dr. Burgess is recognized for five minutes. 2897 *Mr. Burgess. Look, this only ties the hands of a 2898

2899 president who needs his hands tied right now, because the American people are suffering under the effects of these 2900 2901 executive orders that this President has pushed forward. And look, you don't have to take my word for it. Look 2902 at the price at the pump. Look at the price at the grocery 2903 This President's unilateral war on energy has been --2904 has decimated the American economy, not to mention put us at 2905 2906 greater risk, as far as our foreign policy. 2907 Now, look, if Congress decides that there is going to be greater restrictions, then that is on us. That is the 2908 Congress. That is what we are supposed to do. But what this 2909 bill says is that the president cannot change current law. 2910 2911 Current law was established by this committee in 2005 in the Energy Policy Act, and did not place regulations on fracking 2912 on purpose. Fracking, at the time, was relatively new on the 2913 scene. But what happened subsequently was the boom in 2914 natural gas production, so much so that it alarmed Vladimir 2915 2916 Putin and he tried to get this country to rein in fracking because he couldn't compete. He could not compete. 2917 Now, look, the good news is that, since the fracking 2918 revolution happened, the amount of carbon in the atmosphere 2919

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      has diminished year over year since 2005, and America has led
      the way on that. Let us continue to lead the way. Do not
2921

      give the president the authority to unilaterally undo what
      the people's house, what the people's house did back in 2005.

           So I thank the chairman of the subcommittee for bringing

But we are a representative democracy, and that should 2944 be the purview of the United States Congress, the House of 2945 Representatives. We have already spoken on this. 2946 needs to be changed, we should be the ones to make that 2947 2948 change, not the President of the United States. I yield back. 2949 *Mr. Griffith. Would the gentleman yield for a 2950 2951 question? 2952 *Ms. DeGette. Thank you for calling me a young woman. 2953 *Mr. Burgess. I am happy to yield to the -- Mr. Griffith. 2954 *Mr. Griffith. So is the gentleman saying that part of 2955 the reason for this, in his opinion, is that when the 2956 President did the Keystone XL pipeline, and then we bring 2957 2958 legislation in today, we are told, "Well, it is already done, the President has already done it, that is past history,'' we 2959 are trying to be proactive and eliminate the possibility so 2960 that we don't have to hear our colleagues on the other side 2961

2962 say, "Well, the President has already done that, it is too late to do something''? We are trying to be ahead of it, and 2963 make sure that we are protecting energy in advance, is that 2964 2965 correct? That is absolutely correct. Once again, 2966 *Mr. Burgess. I thank the gentleman from Virginia for making me sound 2967 smarter than I am. 2968 2969 *Mr. Duncan. Will the gentleman yield? *Mr. Burgess. I will yield to the gentleman from South 2970 Carolina? 2971 I thank the chairman, and I want to thank 2972 *Mr. Duncan. the gentleman from Virginia for pointing out that we are a 2973 constitutional republic. We have three branches of 2974 2975 government. The Democrats, you know, they didn't want a Republican 2976 president unilaterally making law, and that is what this 2977 President would be doing: unilaterally making law or 2978 2979 overriding existing law, as the gentleman from Texas pointed 2980 out. Congress has a role in governing this nation: 2981 legislating, debating, talking about the issues our 2982

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      constituents care about, debating it, and letting the winner
      win on a floor vote, and passing that bill to an executive

           *Mr. Pallone. Thank you. I don't disagree with the
2997
      idea that the legislature has -- in this case, Congress --
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      should continue to exercise its power. I do think too much
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3000
      authority has been granted to the executive branch, not only
      -- you know, over the last 30, 40 years, if not beyond.

           But the point I am trying to make -- and I think Ms.
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      DeGette made it -- is that we don't have any reason to
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3004 believe that the President is going to do this. I mean, I don't know, he may have made some statements in the past, but 3005 3006 there is no indication that the White House is going to seek this kind of moratorium. 3007 And I just think -- you know, part of my problem here 3008 with so many of these bills today on the Republican side, 3009 particularly in the energy and environmental areas, is that, 3010 3011 you know, I think we are wasting our time, and they are just message vehicles because, you know, if there is no 3012 expectation that something like this is going to happen, it 3013 is highly unlikely that the Senate would take it up, or even 3014 consider it. 3015 3016 And I just think that we should be spending our time on things that -- you know, problems that we actually have to 3017 face, rather than, you know, message vehicles that say, oh, 3018 well, he may do this, and so therefore we should preclude it 3019 because we think that the legislature has that authority. I 3020 3021 mean, you could do that for -- you know, we could spend days and months just on things like that, and I think it is more 3022 important for us to deal with things that are actually likely 3023 to happen. 3024

3025 So, I mean, you know, I would oppose the bill or the resolution, in part, because it is anticipating something 3026 3027 that we have no reason to believe is going to happen. You know, the issue of fracking itself is very complex, but there 3028 is really no reason to believe that the President is going to 3029 move forward with this. And so I just think it is kind of a 3030 waste of time. 3031 3032 I yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 3033 further discussion on the bill? 3034 The gentleman from Texas, for what purpose do you seek 3035 recognition? 3036 3037 *Mr. Pfluger. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 3038 word and speak in support of this bill. *The Chair. Mr. Pfluger is recognized for five minutes 3039 in support --3040 *Mr. Pfluger. I thank the chairwoman. 3041 3042 You know, in answering the question of whether or not we have reason to believe that the President would do something 3043 like this, I think we can point to dozens of examples. And I 3044 will start just after the inauguration in 2021, when we had 3045

3046 multiple executive orders that were issued assaulting this industry. And it was a salvo of different ways to target the 3047 3048 industry, and it actually started with the permitting and the leasing on Federal lands, of which the Permian Basin has 3049 quite a few acres of Federal lands. I represent Midland-3050 Odessa. 3051 And you look at the ways since then which the 3052 3053 Administration has targeted, and you can go to virtually any agency in the United States Government, any department in the 3054 United States Government, and look at the over-regulatory, 3055 over-burdensome posture that they have taken to deny the 3056 industry from actually operating efficiently, and providing 3057 3058 affordable, reliable energy that needs to be delivered to American families, which is one of the leading causes of 3059 inflation that we have seen. 3060 So, yes, I do believe that we have reason to believe 3061 this, because we have seen it, we have heard it. It is in 3062 3063 the rhetoric, and it is in the actual execution of almost every piece of legislation, executive orders, and regulatory 3064 posture that we see coming from the Biden Administration. 3065 And furthermore, I don't think that this is putting 3066

3067 polluters over people, because you see the decrease in emissions and the increase in production that we have shown 3068 3069 over the past decade or so. And it is just amazing, compared to other countries around the world. I think it is high time 3070 to put Midland over Moscow, and not the opposite. 3071 I yield back. 3072 *Mr. Palmer. Would the gentleman yield? Would the 3073 3074 gentleman yield? *Mr. Pfluger. Of course I will yield. 3075 *Mr. Palmer. I thank the gentleman. I move to strike 3076 the last word and speak in support of this, but I want to 3077 respond to that comment you just made about elevating Midland 3078 3079 over Moscow. 3080 There are numerous reports that indicate that Russians' propaganda machine has influenced our energy policy in the 3081 United States. I have got some of these reports here. I am 3082 doing additional research into this, but I really think this 3083 3084 committee needs to look into that, Mr. Chairman. I mean, this goes all the way back to 2016, when 3085 Secretary of State Hillary Clinton made a statement in a 3086 speech to a private audience and she said, "We are even up 3087

      against phony environmental groups and I am a big
      environmentalist.'' She said, "But these are funded by the

      Russians.'' Now, why would the Russians have so much
      interest in undermining our energy security? It might be to

      their economic benefit, Mr. Pfluger, would you agree with

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. You know, we have 3112 had a long bipartisan history of not wanting fracking in 3113 It has been a bipartisan coalition that dates back 3114 to our Florida legislative days, and now here in the 3115 Congress. We have also seen a similar coalition with 3116 3117 offshore drilling. We get our water from the aquifer. Our top industries 3118 are tourism and agriculture. In fact, many of you may enjoy 3119 beef or orange juice from our state, or enjoy the beaches, 3120 which -- I know I have heard a lot of folks on both sides of 3121 the aisle talk about that. 3122 You know, President Biden, as do I, recognize there are 3123 traditional energy states. We heard about Texas, obviously, 3124 Pennsylvania and other areas. 3125 3126 And look, the good news is natural gas production is increasing. It was 98.02 billion cubic feet per day in 2022. 3127 In 2023 it will estimated to be at 100.34 billion cubic feet 3128 per day, and in 2024 it will be estimated to be at 102.29 3129

3130 billion cubic feet per day. And natural gas is a bridge fuel, right? It has been helping our state, like Florida and 3131 3132 others, wean off coal and be a bridge. So we aren't seeing this just be attacked or go down. We are seeing production 3133 continue to rise in the Biden Administration at a responsible 3134 level. 3135 We are concerned about tying the President's hands. 3136 3137 There was an attempt, if you could believe it, to try to frack in the Everglades region, a region we are spending 3138 billions of dollars to restore. So especially when we are 3139 talking about our national parks and areas around them that 3140 affect them, presidents need to have some discretion. 3141 share the ranking members concern that this committee plays a 3142 3143 big role in that. And also, one of the biggest blows to Russia and China 3144 is the Inflation Reduction Act, boosting renewable energy, 3145 clean energy, getting away from the petro state that is 3146 3147 Russia, and putting together major laws that are going to allow us to compete with China on the Green Revolution. 3148 Whoever is able to help harness more solar, green hydrogen, 3149 wind, and hydro resources, you know, is going to dominate the 3150

3151 21st century. And I heard people mention gas. You know, it is around 3152 3153 \$3 a gallon in central Florida right now, where we are seeing things finally get back to a level that I know we all care 3154 3155 deeply about. So as we are looking at this, we need to make sure the 3156 President has discretion so that traditional energy states 3157 3158 can thrive, while states like mine where tourism and agriculture are top state, that we have the discretion to 3159 work with the President to protect key areas of the country. 3160 And I yield back. 3161 *Mr. Duncan. Will the gentleman yield to the chair? 3162 3163 Will the gentleman yield? *Mr. Soto. Sure. Only if you allow me --3164 *Mr. Duncan. I just wanted to point out -- and you said 3165 something about national parks -- this deals with state and 3166 private land, so no national parks would be involved. 3167 3168 fact, the existing law already prohibits any sort of drilling or energy production, even transmission lines and gas lines, 3169 on national parks. And --3170 *Mr. Soto. Thank you, Chair. Reclaiming my time --3171

- 3172 *Mr. Duncan. Yes, sir. *Mr. Soto. What happened is private land around the 3173 3174 Everglades that was connected to it people attempted to frack on in Collier County. So it was private land adjacent to the 3175 3176 Everglades. So I get your point that it doesn't directly affect 3177 natural park -- national parks, but it was on the private 3178 3179 land right next to the national park that this controversy happened. So that is why we still have that concern. But I 3180 recognize the legislation --3181 *Mr. Duncan. Understood, yes. 3182 *Mr. Soto. -- doesn't make that distinction. 3183 *Mr. Duncan. I thank the gentleman. Does anyone else 3184 seek to be recognized? 3185 *Mr. Soto. I yield back. 3186 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman from Texas, Mr. Weber, is 3187 recognized for five minutes. 3188
- 3189 *Mr. Weber. I move to strike the last word, Mr.
- 3190 Chairman, and thank you for the recognition.
- To Mr. Palmer's point that Russia has indeed a stake in
- this matter, in 2017 Chairman Lamar Smith, Science Committee,

3193 and myself, the chairman of the Subcommittee on Energy, sent a letter to Steve Mnuchin, because it had been uncovered that 3194 3195 Russian oligarchs were sending money to a shell corporation in Bermuda, who was then forwarding that money to fight 3196 against fracking, pipelines, nuclear energy to organizations 3197 like Greenpeace, Sierra Club, and others. 3198 And so our letter to Steve Mnuchin -- and true enough, 3199 3200 President Trump was in office -- to Secretary Mnuchin was that we thought it violated two Federal laws: the Foreign 3201 Agent Registration Act and also money laundering. 3202 whatever reason, it was never looked into. 3203 Of course, to Mr. Palmer's point, Russia has, indeed, a 3204 stake in this matter. That is easy to see. They have been 3205 trying to downplay our fossil fuel, our fracking, our energy 3206 production for a long time. And sadly, a lot of people have 3207 bought into that. So that is something that we need to 3208 overcome, number one. 3209 3210 Number two, yes, we are trying to preempt the President of the United States from banning fracking. Of course we 3211 are, because he doesn't understand the energy that is 3212 available in this country, and how important it is to 3213

national security. 3214 When you talk about the Keystone pipeline that comes 3215 3216 into my district over by Beaumont, 830,000 barrels of product a day, you remember that the Colonial pipeline system was 3217 hacked into a couple of years ago, shut down for four or five 3218 That system, which feeds the entire part of -- the 3219 southeast part of the United States, carries 3.1 million 3220 3221 barrels of product: gas, diesel, and jet fuel. At 830,000 barrels of crude oil a day, the Keystone pipeline is over 3222 one-fourth of the productivity and output of the entire 3223 Colonial pipeline system. 3224 The President -- to prove that he doesn't understand, 3225 notwithstanding his comments and, as Gary pointed out, during 3226 the campaign that he was going to do a number on fossil 3227 fuels, to prove that he doesn't understand, furthermore, he 3228 goes to Venezuela, he goes to Saudi Arabia with a gas can in 3229 hand, and begs them to produce more oil. 3230 3231 And we are saying, "Mr. President, why don't you come to Texas and beg us to produce more oil? There is more oil 3232 available right here in the United States. There is more 3233 natural gas available right here in the United States. Let's 3234

3235 depend on American energy, American jobs, American ingenuity, American know-how, jobs for us.'' 3236 So that is the reason that we are -- indeed, this bill 3237 is a good bill. And with that, Mr. Chairman, I yield back. 3238 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman yields back. Anyone else 3239 seeking recognition on the bill? 3240 The gentleman from Georgia is recognized for five 3241 3242 minutes. *Mr. Allen. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Just a little bit 3243 of history. Under the Reagan Administration we were 3244 producing about nine million barrels. In the Obama 3245 Administration we dropped to six million barrels. Under the 3246 3247 Trump Administration we increased to almost 13 million barrels. And currently we are back down to about 10 million 3248 barrels of oil. 3249 We consume about 20 million barrels of oil a day. And 3250 so, obviously, we have to make up that difference. And we 3251 3252 have -- and, of course, when we were producing 13 million barrels of oil, the price of a barrel of oil was between 30 3253 -- market price was between \$30 and \$40 a barrel, we were 3254 energy dominant, and we controlled the cost of a barrel of 3255

3256 oil. That is economic power that we no longer have. The other problem with natural gas, which -- it was 3257 3258 mentioned -- and what I am told by those producers is they can't get the natural gas where it needs to go. We need 3259 permits for pipelines. Now, that is what the people on the 3260 ground are saying. Natural gas burns 42 percent cleaner than 3261 anything out there compared to coal. 3262 3263 So somewhere in this Administration, they are holding up the production of natural gas and the distribution of natural 3264 gas and the production of oil. What this legislation does, 3265 it says we are going to put this back in the hands of the 3266 Congress of the United States, because we are the people's 3267 house, and we are hearing from the people, and they are tired 3268 of paying, you know, the cost of a gallon of gasoline and one 3269 month of their salary. 3270 So we -- I support this legislation, and I yield back. 3271 *Mr. Curtis. Will the gentleman, Mr. Allen? 3272 3273 *Mr. Allen. I yield. *Mr. Curtis. Thank you. I would like to just point out 3274 that it was only 15 years ago that Europe was producing as 3275 much natural gas as Russia. Just 15 years ago. Well, what 3276

3277 happened? They decided they were too good to frack. So today they buy fracked natural gas from Russia. 3278 3279 And I just -- as I listen to this conversation, I have to ask myself -- that is great to ban it in certain states, 3280 and I certainly respect states' ability to do that. 3281 think that they are using less natural gas because they have 3282 banned it, it is coming from someplace. And by the way, my 3283 3284 district thanks you, because a lot of it is coming from Utah, so we are happy to help with that. 3285 But I think it is sometimes a mistake to say, look, we 3286 are too good for fracking, but we are okay buying fracked 3287 natural gas from our enemies, or from someplace that is not 3288 3289 as clean as ours. This legislation will give us the answers 3513 we need to restore America's ability to meet the energy 3514 demands of our constituents and into the future. 3515 I urge my colleagues to approve H.R. 1085 and, Mr. 3516 3517 Chairman, I yield back the balance of my time. 3518 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman yields back. Does anyone else seek to be recognized? 3519 The gentleman -- ranking member from New Jersey is 3520 3521 recognized. 3522 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Chairman. I would like to 3523 speak in opposition to H.R. 1085. Frankly, there are a number of issues with this bill 3524 that are inspiring my opposition. The first is that the bill 3525 requires that the National Petroleum Council carry out the 3526 3527 study on U.S. refining capacity. Now, while the NPC is a valuable consultative body for the Department of Energy, it 3528 is, at the end of the day, an advisory body representing the 3529 views of the oil and gas industry. So the commercial 3530

3531 interests of NPC's various members are impossible to disentangle from its recommendations. And it is not the 3532 3533 proper body, in my opinion, to write an objective report to Congress on declining refining capacity. 3534 If the majority wanted an unbiased report, they could 3535 have asked the GAO to write the report. They even could have 3536 asked the GAO to consult with the NPC if they wanted to make 3537 3538 sure that industry's perspectives were included. But the fact that there is not an unbiased author involved in the 3539 process gives away the majority's game here a bit, and I 3540 don't think this committee needs to indulge the industry 3541 3542 anymore. 3543 I also want to note something that is lacking in the requirements for the report. The bill asks the NPC to assess 3544 any Federal or state executive actions, regulations, or 3545 policies that have caused the decline in American refining 3546 capacity. But unfortunately, the bill purposely, I think, 3547 3548 leaves out statutory changes such as the lifting of the crude oil export ban from the list of changes that the NPC is 3549 directed to consider. 3550 The lifting of the crude oil export ban in 2015 is the 3551

3552 main driver of the refinery closures we have seen over the last 7 years. A GAO analysis published in 2020 found that 3553 3554 the repeal of the crude oil export ban narrowed margins for crude oil refineries, refineries that, at least on the East 3555 Coast, eventually went out of business. Refineries on the 3556 East Coast were particularly hard hit, as they depended on 3557 supplies of domestic crude, crude, which after the export ban 3558 3559 was lifted, was shipped internationally rather than to these refineries here in the United States. 3560 So according to the data from the Energy Information 3561 Administration, the refining capacity of East Coast 3562 refineries has decreased by 36 percent since the lifting of 3563 3564 the ban in 2015. And I know that at one of the hearings that we had this year, this was brought out dramatically. 3565 So, you know, the problem is the bill addresses none of 3566 these factors that I am raising. It puts its thumb on the 3567 scale for the report, weighing in for a pre-determined and 3568 3569 desired outcome from the -- you know, influenced by oil and gas, and I can't support it, and I would urge members of this 3570 committee to oppose the bill. 3571 And I yield back. 3572

Trade of oil, natural gas, and electricity between the 3796 United States, Mexico, and Canada has created an integrated 3797 market for energy products. Canada, one of our closest 3798 allies, is one of our most important and largest energy 3799 3800 product trading partners. The expansion of cross-border 3801 energy infrastructure is an essential part of strengthening our alliance and increasing energy trade across the North 3802 American continent, yet there is a surprising lack of statute 3803 governing cross-border infrastructure build-out. 3804 3805 Congress has never asserted its authority to establish a regime for permitting cross-border energy projects. Instead, 3806 agencies have relied on a series of executive orders, 3807 creating a process that is ad hoc at best, and political at 3808 worst. 3809 3810 As Mrs. Fletcher noted during the Energy Subcommittee markup, developers need regulatory certainty when 3811 constructing energy infrastructure projects, and the current 3812 system fluctuates every four years following a Presidential 3813

election. A statutory process like that established through 3814 H.R. 1058 would be more efficient, transparent, and effective 3815 3816 for project developers. It is important to note that this bill is not new, and 3817 the committee has a long history with promoting cross-border 3818 energy infrastructure. Similar versions of this bill have 3819 been subject to hearings, markups, and passed the House with 3820 3821 bipartisan support. 3822 This committee has heard testimony from FERC, stakeholders, and expert witnesses about the implementation 3823 and benefits associated with this bill. That said, we need 3824 to clarify some tired misconceptions surrounding H.R. 1058. 3825 First is regarding a presumption of public interest. As 3826 I mentioned earlier, both Canada and Mexico are significant 3827 trading partners. Encouraging connected markets, strong 3828 multinational relationships, and increased energy trade 3829 between our nearest neighbors is certainly within the public 3830 3831 interest. Several of my colleagues have also raised concerns about 3832 what they perceive as contradictory deadlines in the bill. 3833 There are two deadlines of note. The first is a 30-day 3834

3835 deadline in subsection B for FERC to approve the import or export of natural gas to and from Canada or Mexico. 3836 3837 other is a 120-day deadline in subsection A for agencies to issue the relevant permits for facilities. These deadlines 3838 do not contradict one another. The first reference is 3839 applications for import or export from existing facilities; 3840 the second applies to the issuance of certain certificates to 3841 3842 construct a facility after a NEPA review is completed. 3843 Lastly, some have expressed concern about the State Department or Department of Defense not being involved in the 3844 cross-border permitting process. Nothing in this bill 3845 prevents FERC from coordinating with either of these 3846 3847 agencies. FERC is the primary energy regulator, and should be where a large portion of this authority should rest. 3848 It is time to take the politics out of infrastructure 3849 project development, and provide a clear and simple statutory 3850 structure to foster regulatory certainty and streamline 3851 3852 project development. I urge a yes vote on the Promoting Cross-border Energy Infrastructure Act because ad hoc and 3853 political project denial has gone on for long enough. 3854 And with that, I yield back. 3855

Members, I think we will have to be careful not to pass 3882 bills that elevate the profits of polluters over the 3883 interests of the people we represent back home. 3884 important, especially in light of the testimony we received 3885 3886 during the subcommittee hearing around the tie -- the correlation between increased LNG exports to increased 3887 prices, the fact that this bill would -- and this is a quote 3888 from the witness testimony -- encourage the construction of 3889 cross-border pipelines to Mexico designed to re-export U.S.-3890 produced natural gas from LNG terminals in Mexico. 3891 I am very worried about the unintended consequences 3892 here, because let's -- I see higher prices for my folks at 3893 home, and here is why. Just this week in Florida, the Public 3894 Service Commission approved a rate hike of 9.8 percent for 3895 3896 electric bills starting next month. This is directly tied to the fact that -- I know this is going to surprise you because 3897 Florida is the Sunshine State, but in Florida 74 percent of 3898 our state's electricity generation is tied to fracked gas. 3899

3900 So when you have increased frack gas prices, this means that folks in my state have higher AC bills, electric bills. 3901 3902 It is a cost on businesses. Millions of Floridians can expect higher electric bills next month. If they live in the 3903 Florida Power and Light service area, their bill will go up 3904 from about \$130 per month to \$149 per month. If you live in 3905 the Duke Energy Service area, it is estimated your bill will 3906 3907 go up from about \$165 per month to \$172 per month. area, in the Tampa Electric Company, bills are predicted to 3908 rise from about \$147 a month to \$161 per month. 3909 So my amendment would prohibit the bill from going into 3910 effect until the Secretary of Energy certifies that the bill 3911 will not increase oil, gas, diesel, natural gas, or electric 3912 That is it. If my friends and colleagues on the 3913 bills. other side of the aisle maintain that this bill will lower 3914 prices, that is fine, then they should support my amendment. 3915 However, I am very concerned about this, because these 3916 3917 are very high bills. This is a -- we should be investing in cleaner, cheaper energy, using the abundant resources that 3918 are free, come from the sun, come from the wind, come from 3919 energy efficiency, rather than doubling down on these 3920

3921 expensive volatile fuels. But in any event, this bill will help us ensure that 3922 3923 electric bills and other bills are not going to rise by promoting the cross-border provisions. 3924 So I urge you all to support my amendment, put the 3925 people's interest over polluted profits, and I yield back my 3926 time. 3927 3928 *Mr. Duncan. The gentlelady yields back. *Mr. Walberg. Mr. Chairman? 3929 *Mr. Duncan. Mr. Walberg is recognized. 3930 *Mr. Walberg. I would like to strike the last word to 3931 3932 speak in opposition to this amendment, and to support the bill. 3933 Responsibly increasing energy infrastructure will help 3934 decrease prices for consumers. In the past two years we have 3935 witnessed how hostile this Administration is to producing 3936 more American energy. This amendment guts the bill by 3937 3938 effectively delaying implementation of this important provision by allowing the Secretary to not act on a permit 3939 application. 3940 H.R. 1058, the Promoting Cross-border Energy 3941

3942 Infrastructure Act, would establish a more uniform, transparent, and more modern process to authorize 3943 3944 construction, operation, and maintenance of international border crossing facilities for oil and natural gas, and the 3945 transmission of electricity. 3946 By taking the approval power away from the political 3947 impulses of the White House, and firmly placing it with the 3948 3949 expert agencies, FERC and Department of Energy, H.R. 1058 will increase regulatory certainty for cross-border 3950 facilities, and improve project outcomes. 3951 Despite concerns we heard from my Democrat colleagues, 3952 and hear now with this amendment, it explicitly states that 3953 3954 both FERC and DoE can consult other appropriate Federal agencies in issuing certificates. It doesn't cut the 3955 Department of State or DoD out of the process. 3956 The legislation also includes the text of my PIPES Act, 3957 which prohibits the president from revoking any presidential 3958 3959 permit or authorization for the construction, operation, or maintenance of any cross-border oil or natural gas pipeline 3960 or electric transmission facility. The amendment was 3961 included with bipartisan support. 3962

3963 During the subcommittee markup I heard statements that questioned whether these cross-border pipelines and 3964 3965 facilities are in the public interest. So let me go through briefly just a few of the reasons they are. 3966 Pipelines are safer and more environmentally friendly to 3967 transport oil and gas than both rail and truck. We have seen 3968 that recently. Canada and Mexico are some of our closest and 3969 3970 most important allies. Spurning them through inconsistent 3971 action from the White House impacts all three countries' economies. 3972 Just one pipeline, Line 5 in Michigan, transports the 3973 majority of Michigan's propane needs that people use to heat 3974 their homes, as well as hundreds of thousands of barrels per 3975 day of light crude oil and light synthetic crude. It is how 3976 the planes that we take back and forth from many places, 3977 including Michigan to D.C., are fueled. If we close the 3978 pipeline, nearly 34,000 jobs could be lost across the 3979 3980 Midwest, and could result in a \$20.8 billion loss in economic 3981 activity. As a reminder, the legislation isn't just about 3982 pipelines. We are talking cross-border transmission lines, 3983

4233 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes in support of his amendment. 4234 4235 *Mr. Veasey. Madam Chair, when the House last debated this bill in 2017, I filed an amendment to the bill on the 4236 floor, and Representative Gene Green, who was then a member 4237 of the committee, was kind enough to offer it for me then. 4238 The amendment was simple. It just clarified that 4239 4240 nothing in the bill impacted the scope of any environmental review required under NEPA for a cross-border energy project. 4241 I can say that the amendment passed the House by a voice 4242 vote six years ago, with bipartisan support. Markwayne 4243 Mullin, who is now a member of the other body, supported my 4244 amendment, so I was surprised when I saw that -- the bill 4245 before us at last week's markup, because this bill is, 4246 literally, identical. It is identical to the version that 4247 was passed on the floor six years ago, with three exceptions. 4248 Two of those exceptions are technical changes. The third is 4249 4250 that my bipartisan amendment is gone. My amendment that I am bringing forward today would 4251 simply restore the exact text that my amendment added six 4252 years ago. I sincerely hope that the exclusion of the 4253

4254 language was simply careless drafting, rather than a more purposeful exclusion, again, since we have already done this 4255 4256 in a very bipartisan manner. With that, Madam Chair, I thank you, and I yield back. 4257 *The Chair. Is there further discussion on the -- the 4258 gentleman yields back. Is there further discussion on the 4259 amendment? 4260 4261 The gentleman from North Dakota, for what purpose do you 4262 seek recognition? *Mr. Armstrong. Madam Chair, I would like to speak in 4263 opposition to the amendment. 4264 *The Chair. Mr. Armstrong is recognized for five 4265 4266 minutes in opposition. *Mr. Armstrong. Thank you, Madam Chair. 4267 The amendment is unnecessary. The underlying bill does 4268 not change any environmental law agencies, any environmental 4269 law agency must follow in issuing certificates for cross-4270 4271 border electric transmission or oil and gas facilities. I wasn't here six years ago, but I would have opposed it 4272 then, as well, if the underlying legislation was the same, 4273 because the underlying bill does not alter the requirements 4274

4275 for any agency under an existing environmental law, including NEPA. 4276 4277 The amendment is, in my opinion, a messaging amendment that does not functionally change the underlying bill, and is 4278 4279 unnecessary. And so with that, I would yield back. 4280 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 4281 4282 further discussion on the amendment? 4283 The ranking member. *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair. I would like to 4284 express support for my colleague Mr. Veasey's amendment. 4285 I also note that, while the amendment represents an important 4286 addition to the bill, it unfortunately does not fix the 4287 underlying problems with the bill. 4288 The underlying bill still gets rid of traditional FERC 4289 and Department of Energy consultations with the Departments 4290 of State and Defense for natural gas pipelines and 4291 transmission lines. It asks FERC and DoE to transform 4292 themselves from energy regulators into referees of 4293 international affairs. It also asks FERC to site oil 4294 pipelines, an activity the agency has never done before, 4295

4691 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the resolution? 4692 4693 For what purpose does the lady from Arizona seek to be recognized? 4694 *Mrs. Lesko. Madam Chairwoman, I would like to explain 4695 my bill. 4696 *The Chair. The lady is recognized for five minutes. 4697 4698 *Mrs. Lesko. Madam Chairwoman, I am proud to sponsor House Concurrent Resolution 14, expressing disapproval of the 4699 revocation by President Biden of the presidential permit for 4700 the Keystone XL pipeline. 4701 On September 16, 2019, President Biden said, "I want you 4702 to look at my eyes. I guarantee you, I guarantee you, we are 4703 going to end fossil fuel.'' Canceling the Keystone pipeline 4704 was just Biden's first step. 4705 This is a simple resolution, and I hope my colleagues on 4706 both sides of the aisle will support it. The Keystone XL 4707 4708 pipeline was once a bipartisan issue that at least one of our Democrat colleagues on this committee supported. 4709 It is important, as members of this committee, to 4710 periodically express our disapproval when the president makes 4711

4712 unwise, unilateral decisions that affect millions of Americans and costs the U.S. Treasury billions of dollars. 4713 4714 This is the first time that this committee has had the opportunity to voice our opinion on this disastrous decision; 4715 the previous Congress largely ignored this issue. 4716 Canceling the pipeline was a reckless, out-of-touch 4717 decision, and it must be addressed. President Biden's 4718 4719 actions were wrong in five ways. Canceling the Keystone pipeline did not actually stop 4720 the drilling or exporting of the Canadian oil sands, as the 4721 environmentalists thought. The 830,000 barrels per day of 4722 crude oil from Alberta, Canada set a record for exports in 4723 The cancellation of the pipeline also did little to 4724 stop emissions. In fact, oil is now transported by rail and 4725 trucks, which have higher emissions than a pipeline. 4726 Number two, President Biden insulted our best ally, 4727 Canada. 4728 4729 Number three, the developer, TransCanada Energy, a Canadian company, is suing the United States under provisions 4730 of the free trade agreement, and they will likely recover 4731 over \$8 billion in damages. 4732

4733 Number four, the local communities where the pipeline was to be located will continue to lose millions in lost tax 4734 4735 revenues. And finally, number five, the ultimate cost of this 4736 reckless executive order is now reported to be as much as 4737 59,000 jobs, and up to \$9.6 billion that would have helped 4738 our economy thrive. 4739 4740 During our subcommittee markup I heard from some of my Democratic colleagues that this resolution isn't needed 4741 because the pipeline developer has withdrawn their request. 4742 However, President Biden continues to make unilateral 4743 decisions that will increase the cost of energy in this 4744 4745 country for decades into the future. And now it is deja vu. Not only can you voice your disapproval for the Keystone 4746 decision, but now you can send a message to President Biden 4747 about the Willow Project in Alaska. The Willow Project is 4748 the Keystone Project on steroids. It provides tremendous 4749 4750 financial and national energy security benefits. Once again, however, President Biden is listening to the 4751 environmentalists who want to destroy American energy 4752 independence by canceling that project. 4753

4754 The Willow Project enjoys bipartisan, bicameral support, and near unanimous support from the Alaska Federation of 4755 4756 Natives, the North Slope Borough, the Inupiat community of the Arctic Slope, and numerous labor unions. The lease was 4757 acquired in 1999, and Willow has passed all Federal, state, 4758 and local permitting requirements, and all environmental 4759 approvals. 4760 4761 If we don't express our disapproval of Biden's Keystone decision, we may be greenlighting the horrific upcoming 4762 decision on Willow. Now is the time to show whose side we 4763 stand on. I hope all of you will vote for this resolution. 4764 4765 And I yield back. *The Chair. Is there further discussion? 4766 4767 For what purpose does the lady from Colorado seek recognition? 4768 *Ms. DeGette. I move to strike the last word. 4769 *The Chair. Ms. DeGette is recognized for five minutes 4770 4771 to strike the last word. *Ms. DeGette. Thank you, Madam Chair. 4772 I talked about this resolution at the Energy 4773 Subcommittee markup, so I will be brief today. But this 4774

4775 resolution, as the sponsor even acknowledges, is looking backward, not forward, because the Keystone XL pipeline 4776 4777 project has been dead for two years now. Originally, it was commissioned in 2010, which was 13 years ago. 4778 The debates around Keystone XL are just as tired as the 4779 pipeline itself. We spent weeks and weeks of floor time 4780 during the Obama presidency attempting to override the 4781 4782 President's decision on Keystone XL. This all came to I don't really know why we are talking about this 4783 naught. now. It is not -- there is no indication that Keystone is 4784 going to be revived. And even though this resolution is sort 4785 of styled as a disapproval resolution, in fact it is not a 4786 joint resolution of congressional disapproval. It would have 4787 no force of law, even if it were passed by the House and 4788 4789 Senate. And so, irrespective of what you think about the merits 4790 -- I could have a long debate about the merits of this 4791 4792 pipeline, but I am not going to do it, because the fact is it is not coming back. 4793 And so what I think we should do -- sounding like a 4794 broken record again -- is, instead of revisiting past issues 4795

4796 and past irritations, we should be working together in a bipartisan way to find an energy blueprint that works in the 4797 4798 future, and that gets us to the climate goals that we need, that gets us to the energy independence that we need, instead 4799 of fighting about something that is just not coming back, no 4800 matter what resolutions or bills we pass. 4801 And so I really stand ready to work with my colleagues 4802 4803 on meaningful energy policy. This resolution is not that 4804 policy. And I yield back. 4805 *The Chair. For what purpose does the gentleman from 4806 Florida seek recognition? 4807 *Mr. Dunn. I move to strike the last word. 4808 4809 *The Chair. Dr. Dunn is recognized for five minutes to strike --4810 Thank you, Madam Chair. *Mr. Dunn. 4811 On President Biden's first day in office, he shut down 4812 4813 the Keystone pipeline. With one stroke of the pen, the President single-handedly eliminated 11,000 jobs of Americans 4814 immediately and, ultimately, over 50,000 jobs were lost. 4815 That is why we must support H.Con.Res. 14, which expresses 4816

4817 disapproval of the revocation by President Biden of the presidential permit for the Keystone XL pipeline. 4818 4819 While many people naively thought that the cancellation would only affect the companies building the project, the 4820 impact of this irresponsible decision was felt nationwide, 4821 including in my own district. This action by the 4822 Administration has had a chilling effect on investment in the 4823 4824 most reliable, efficient, and inexpensive forms of energy we have. Countless jobs have been lost due to the Biden 4825 Administration mistake, and the damage continues to grow. 4826 Keystone would have guaranteed a safe transportation of 4827 a great deal of energy, thus overall improving our 4828 environment and safety. It would have also been a boon to 4829 trade with one of our very best allies, Canada. Every 4830 country seeks to provide its people with the energy they need 4831 and demand to survive and prosper. The security of American 4832 energy and that of our allies is of paramount national 4833 4834 security interest. We cannot take that for granted. Our openly hostile adversaries, China, Russia, Iran, jealously 4835 guard their energy security. As a matter of critical 4836 national security interest, we should do the same. This war 4837

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on domestic energy must end.

5049 Reinstating the export ban is wrong policy. It would shrink the market available to American crude oil and other 5050 5051 petroleum products, and this will lead thereby to deter domestic investment by oil and gas companies. This would 5052 ultimately risk higher prices at the pump and higher home 5053 energy bills for hardworking Americans. 5054 And it also -- reinstating the export ban jeopardizes 5055 5056 our national security. American oil and gas exports help make us and our allies less dependent on OPEC, plus countries 5057 -- and Venezuela, Russia. If you make yourself dependent on 5058 dictators, you make yourself vulnerable to dictators. We 5059 have seen this play out in Europe, in its rush to go green, 5060 ban domestic fracking, and cut off other fossil fuels before 5061 reliable alternatives were available, and resulted in 5062 European countries becoming more dependent on Vladimir Putin 5063 and Russian energy. 5064 Russia has leveraged its energy sector over NATO allies 5065 5066 and other European partners. Russia's oil and gas sector has also, in large part, funded Russia's illegal and unprovoked 5067 invasion of Ukraine. However, since the invasion, U.S. LNG 5068 exports have helped our European allies replace Russian 5069

5070 energy imports, helping keep homes heated across Europe during the winter, while also cutting off resources to 5071 5072 Putin's war machine in Ukraine. If we reverse course and reinstate the export ban 5073 without our own reliable energy alternatives, our European 5074 partners will once again be at the mercy of foreign dictators 5075 like Putin, undermining their national security and ours. 5076 And without American exports on the global market, Americans 5077 will suffer and pay higher prices. 5078 I have seen some documentation where people say, well, 5079 we need to reinstate the ban, but not if it -- not the ban 5080 that directly helps Ukraine or our allies in Europe. And I 5081 5082 can tell you, meeting with high-elected officials, some of our European allies, they say that we need to export LNG. 5083 And someone made the comment that their ports were so 5084 full they couldn't receive more American LNG. And these 5085 high-level government officials who are left of center said 5086 5087 put it on the world market. If we lower the price, it will help us. Even though we can't import more, what we import 5088 will be lower, if we lower the price. 5089 It also lowers the price that Putin will receive for his 5090

5219 celebrates the 2015 lifting of the export ban, but does nothing to talk about the impacts that it created in 5220 5221 communities like mine in New Jersey. 5222 My amendment corrects the record. It notes that the U.S. has lost 10 refineries since we lifted the crude oil 5223 export ban, including a third of the refining capacity on the 5224 East Coast, a direct result of the lifting of the export ban. 5225 5226 It also notes that, since we lifted the export ban, the amount of oil and petroleum products being sent to China has 5227 surged. By 2020 we tripled the amount we sent to China, and 5228 2 months ago Republicans were on the floor, aghast at the 5229 prospect of sending our strategic oil reserves to China, but 5230 5231 apparently they only care about that 2 percent of our oil exports to China and not the other 98 percent, which 5232 continues to surge. 5233 And finally, my amendment restores common sense to this 5234 resolution, expressing support for restrictions under the 5235 5236 Energy Policy and Conservation Act if exporting oil is not in 5237 the public interest. So for all these reasons, I would urge adoption of my 5238 amendment, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 5239

5664 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 5665 For what purpose does the gentleman seek recognition 5666 from Ohio? 5667 *Mr. Johnson. Madam Chair, I ask to strike the last 5668 word to speak on --5669 *The Chair. Mr. Johnson is recognized for five minutes 5670 to strike the last word. 5671 5672 *Mr. Johnson. Thank you, Madam Chair. Now, last week I spent some time refuting the accusation 5673 that my legislation would raise natural gas prices for the 5674 American people. And the bottom line is that we have plenty 5675 5676 to go around, and there is more than enough for us to significantly increase our exports. There is no evidence, in 5677 fact, that LNG exports, which have risen exponentially in the 5678 last decade, have caused skyrocketing domestic natural gas 5679 prices. Prices haven't skyrocketed; it simply is not true. 5680 5681 My legislation would simply bring natural gas exports in line with other important American commodities that we sell 5682 to the world, like oil. This is a good thing. 5683 I know this is a surprise to some of my colleagues on 5684

5685 the Democrat side, but selling American products overseas creates jobs here at home, sends money from around the world 5686 5687 into our constituents' pockets, and increases American influence across the globe. 5688 Now, recently, critics of this legislation have said, if 5689 we sell LNG on the global market, China might buy some of it, 5690 and that is bad for America. Well, you know what I say to 5691 5692 that? Let them buy it. After all, it is a lot cleaner and better for the environment than the dirtier fuels the Chinese 5693 are currently using to fuel their economy. 5694 But there seems to be a rare bipartisan agreement right 5695 now on the global threat of the Chinese Communist Party. 5696 5697 With dangerously thin supply chains for things like critical minerals and rare earths that are controlled by the Chinese 5698 Communist Party, wouldn't it be nice to make them dependent 5699 on us for a change? 5700 American energy dominance on the global stage will only 5701 5702 become more crucial from here, and LNG exports are a key part of that, as the world becomes a more dangerous place. 5703 Now, I do want to follow up from something else I 5704 mentioned last week about how the Department of Energy 5705

5706 responds when they get an LNG export application. They have been known to sit on these for months and even years before 5707 5708 approving them, almost randomly. And when they do approve them, they do so at highly convenient times, very suspect. 5709 For example, the night before the Energy Secretary was 5710 about to come before our committee last year, they approved 5711 an export permit. And now, as we are looking to send LNG 5712 5713 legislation to the floor, we just got word this week they have approved another one. An LNG exporter who already has 5714 an existing operation, asked the Department of Energy if they 5715 could export a bit more LNG than they were previously 5716 approved for. The Department of Energy said yes -- over 500 5717 5718 days later, after they asked. To my colleagues, we can do better than this. America 5719 can do better. As I said last week, this is how -- this is 5720 low-hanging fruit if anyone is serious about permitting 5721 reform in this country. 5722 So, Madam Chair, I will conclude with this, which I call 5723 the three pillars of American LNG. 5724 As I said, American energy exports project our 5725 geopolitical power overseas, making the world rely less on 5726

5727 cruel, energy-rich dictators like Russia's Vladimir Putin or the Chinese Communist Party's President Xi. 5728 Next is the carbon benefit. American natural gas is the 5729 cleanest in the world. Our producers do it better than 5730 anyone else. And the only question is, will the next billion 5731 people be lifted out of poverty fueled by clean burning 5732 American natural gas or much higher carbon-emitting fuels? 5733 5734 And lastly, while unleashing LNG exports is beneficial to the exporting companies and to the competition against 5735 China and Russia, at the end of the day the reason I 5736 championed this legislation isn't solely because of all of 5737 The most important pillar of our LNG strategy, at the 5738 5739 end of the day, what this legislation is about, is what American energy dominance is about, and what it means back 5740 To the critics of this legislation I want to tell you 5741 home. LNG exports and American energy production aren't a political 5742 football. 5743 5744 This is real life to the oil and gas workers, truck drivers, pipeline builders, and small businesses in rural 5745 Appalachia that sit atop the Marcellus and Utica Shale plays. 5746 I have seen firsthand the benefits of the shale revolution in 5747

What this bill proposes to do is to remove the 5772 requirement that natural gas exports to countries that the 5773 United States lacks a free trade agreement with will be 5774 examined by the Department of Energy to see if they are in 5775 5776 the public interest. I really disagree with that policy. During our Joint Energy and Environment Subcommittee hearing 5777 that increased LNG exports increases prices for home, we 5778 heard testimony that that would happen. I mean, we did hear 5779 5780 that testimony. 5781 Now, I for one, do not think that we should stop exporting natural gas. Let me say that again: I support 5782 exporting natural gas. But I do think that, if we are going 5783 to export natural gas, we should have -- we should make sure 5784 that every facility that is doing it does it in consistent --5785 5786 consistent with the public interest. What this article talks about is how China is continuing to snap up American LNG, and it notes how 5802 5803 this deal would make it harder for our European allies to secure LNG in the long term. So what it is about is us 5804 sending China LNG instead of our European allies. 5805 So even if my colleagues don't think that many LNG 5806 exports should be subject to public interest determinations, 5807 5808 surely I would say LNG exports to China that will make more -- life more difficult for our European allies should go 5809 through public interest review. The committee simply can't 5810 just rubber-stamp efforts by China to snap up LNG before 5811 5812 Europe has a chance. 5813 And I, for one, find it a little ironic that on the floor we are voting on legislation to prohibit exporting oil 5814 and gas from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve to China, but it 5815 is apparently okay if we export LNG without a public interest 5816 determination whether this is going to harm the U.S. or our 5817 5818 allies. And so that is why I am proposing this common-sense amendment. It restores public interest review for any LNG 5819 exports to China, Russia, North Korea, Iran, and any other 5820 country under U.S. sanctions. 5821

5822 I think it is common sense that exports to those countries should go through scrutiny, and so let's find some 5823 5824 common ground here. Let's vote for this amendment. And I vield back. 5825 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. And 401 has been weaponized by one state to the detriment of citizens of several states. An example is 6325 the Atlantic Coast pipeline bringing energy to the Carolinas. 6326 Because we lack the necessary natural gas 6327 infrastructure, New England states are forced to rely on 6328 Russia, Iran, Venezuela for energy, or burn dirtier heating 6329 oil, rather than cleaner burning U.S.-burned -- produced 6330 natural gas. 6331 I want to note that this amendment still preserves the 6332 authority of the states to raise legitimate water quality 6333 6334 The state would recommend mitigation conditions to FERC to ensure compliance with water quality standards. It 6335 would preserve their ability to raise legitimate water 6336 quality claims, but prevent liberal, anti-fossil fuel states 6337

6338 from using water quality as a pretext to block projects for political reasons through section 401 to the detriment of 6339 6340 states like mine. This amendment has no effect on NEPA or any other 6341 environmental laws. It actually helps the states work in 6342 tandem with the Federal agencies. 6343 If we want to continue to lead the world in emission 6344 6345 reductions and energy production, we must build out our pipeline infrastructure to deliver affordable, reliable, and 6346 clean American energy to all Americans, and I urge my 6347 colleagues to adopt this amendment. 6348 And I yield back. 6349 *Mr. Pallone. Some places in my district that is over three times as much. 6467 is disproportionately impacting the segment of our population 6468 that can least afford to pay it. That is the working class 6469 and the people who are impoverished. That is a very real 6470 6471 problem for my district. Unfortunately, this shortage has been exacerbated by the 6472 actions of both Federal and state governments. For example, 6473 in my district in 2019 the State government passed a new 6474 regulation prohibiting the leasing of any state lands for the 6475 purpose of natural gas pipelines, making the supply shortage 6476 even more acute. 6477 Natural gas remains the predominant source of 6478 electricity generated in California, particularly so because 6479 our hydroelectric capacity has been cut in recent years 6480 6481 because of the drought. That is one of the reasons why, with the spike in natural gas prices, that electricity prices that 6482 my constituents pay are over twice as high for residential 6483 electricity as in neighboring states, over three times as 6484

6690 *The Chair. The lady from Colorado, Ms. DeGette, is recognized for five minutes in support of her amendment. 6691 6692 *Ms. DeGette. Thank you, Madam Chair. Aside from the fact that this bill limits the government's ability to 6693 evaluate the environmental harms new gas pipelines may cause, 6694 it also creates unnecessary, adversarial relationships 6695 between FERC and other Federal and state agencies and local 6696 6697 and tribal governments involved in the pipeline authorization 6698 process. Also, parts of this bill continue to erode the rights of 6699 people who oppose having a pipeline on their land. Not even 6700 to veto having a pipeline on their land, but just to have an 6701 6702 opportunity to have their voices heard and have a fair fight about the issue. 6703 My amendment attempts to even the playing field. It 6704 simply says that FERC may not allow a pipeline developer to 6705 invoke eminent domain authority under the Natural Gas Act, 6706 6707 unless FERC finds that the use of eminent domain authority is 6708 in the public interest. The Natural Gas Act has no requirement that FERC make a 6709 finding of public interest before issuing a certificate of 6710

6711 public convenience, a necessity that allows a natural gas pipeline to begin construction and operations. But that 6712 6713 means that it requires no investigation of public interest before allowing any pipeline developer to utilize eminent 6714 domain authority. 6715 Frankly, Madam Chair, I think this should be a 6716 bipartisan issue, because Republicans and Democrats should be 6717 6718 concerned about the implications of anybody being allowed to use eminent domain authority without a review about whether 6719 usage is in the public interest or not. 6720 And so this was a bipartisan amendment in the last 6721 Congress that was offered by then-Energy Subcommittee Ranking 6722 Member Rush and, somehow, Mr. Griffith also supported it when 6723 he offered this amendment six years ago. And so I am hoping 6724 everybody on this committee will support this amendment, and 6725 I urge its adoption, and yield back. 6726 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there 6727 further discussion on the amendment? 6728 6729 The gentleman from Texas is recognized, Mr. Burgess, for five minutes. 6730

6732 So the amendment actually rewrites the Natural Gas Act, introducing new standards, and upending decades of precedent 6733 6734 with respect to the use of eminent domain. This amendment is not necessary. Eminent domain is a 6735 tool of last resort, very rarely used. 6736 The Natural Gas Act already contains robust public 6737 interest protections. No person may construct a pipeline 6738 6739 unless FERC determines that the proposed pipeline will serve the public convenience and necessity: existing law, current 6740 law. The Natural Gas Act, the public interest standard is 6741 transparent and effective. 6742 This amendment would add a new and potentially 6743 conflicting standard that has never been the subject of any 6744 hearing. We have never heard from FERC on this, and we have 6745 no idea how, in fact, it would be implemented. 6746 I share my colleague's concern about the use of private 6747 lands, but I have concerns that this amendment is only 6748 6749 designed to stop pipelines and deprive the American people of the energy that they so desperately need. 6750 And I will yield back. 6751 *The Chair. 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6957 *The Chair. The ranking member is recognized for five minutes in support of the amendment. 6958 6959 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you. Nearly six years ago, when Republicans last had control 6960 of the House, they moved this bill, H.R. 1115, through this 6961 committee. And at the time they had control of the House, 6962 but also controlled the Senate and the White House. 6963 bill did not make it into law. They then reintroduced this 6964 bill earlier this year, and did not change a single word. 6965 Now, keeping up with that theme, my amendment has not 6966 changed since I first offered it six years ago either, 6967 because the problem with this bill is fundamentally the same. 6968 The bill includes provisions putting data from aerial surveys 6969 on the same footing with data collected from on-the-ground 6970 surveys for purposes of the siting review process. 6971 And there is a fine balance here between giving agencies 6972 too much leeway and not enough, and this provision clearly 6973 6974 fails this test. If a state agency feels that aerial data is insufficient for it to make a determination to authorize a 6975 pipeline under, for example, the Clean Water Act, then that 6976 is the decision of that state agency. We, as the Federal 6977

6978 Government, after having given state agencies the power to make these decisions, I don't think should dictate to them 6979 6980 what methods they must accept if they think those methods are 6981 deficient. And this is an issue, Madam Chair, that is personal to 6982 my district. Years ago, before the Penneast pipeline project 6983 was canceled, homeowners in my home state of New Jersey 6984 6985 reported that companies were surveying their property by air without notification or consent. And this meant that they 6986 received formal notifications that their property was being 6987 evaluated for a natural gas pipeline far too late in the 6988 process, with limited opportunity to intervene. 6989 6990 So when a bill that I think is filled with bad policy -obviously, I oppose the underlying bill -- but this remote 6991 survey provision, I think, really takes the cake. It should 6992 be stripped from the bill, and I would urge all my colleagues 6993 to support my amendment for that reason. 6994 6995 And I vield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 6996 further discussion on the amendment? 6997 The gentleman from Texas, Mr. Burgess, is recognized for 6998

6999 five minutes. *Mr. Burgess. I thank the chair. I do want to speak in 7000 opposition to this amendment. It is, in fact, unnecessary, 7001 7002 and it does, in fact, strike an important environmental 7003 safequard. The underlying bill allows pipeline operators to perform 7004 aerial remote surveys on rights of way to obtain preliminary 7005 7006 environmental data. For example, remote surveys allow operators to examine wetlands without disturbing sensitive 7007 plants and animals. And under the bill, remote surveys are 7008 supplemental. Any information gathered must be verified by 7009 7010 ground surveys. 7011 The amendment itself has just one purpose: it is there to stop pipelines. Unfortunately, the energy demands of this 7012 country are such that pipelines are going to continue to be 7013 necessary. 7200 *The Chair. And the gentlelady is recognized for five minutes in support of her amendment. 7201 7202 *Ms. Castor. Thank you, Madam Chair. Madam Chair, I have serious concerns about the underlying legislation. It 7203 short circuits environmental reviews of gas pipelines and 7204 again elevates the profits of fossil fuel companies over the 7205 interests of the public. 7206 7207 I had these concerns, like chair Ranking Member Pallone stated, six years ago, when the committee last examined this 7208 bill. I proposed a similar amendment. 7209 My amendment today would provide that the bill would not 7210 go into effect until FERC certified that three simple 7211 7212 criteria are satisfied. 7213 First, is this even necessary? There is nothing in the record today that justifies the short circuiting of public 7214 health and environmental considerations when you are -- when 7215 FERC is reviewing gas pipelines. 7216 7217 Two, is it duplicative of other Federal efforts in place to improve the timeliness and predictability of Federal 7218 environmental reviews and authorizations for gas pipelines? 7219 I will be honest, Madam Chair. I have deep concerns 7220

7221 that portions of this bill are duplicative requirements of FAS 41 and other permitting efforts. I would have liked to 7222 7223 have asked the FERC commissioners their opinions on this, given the concerns that FERC staff expressed when they 7224 appeared before this committee years ago, six years ago, but 7225 we were not given the time to receive detailed public 7226 technical assistance from FERC on this. So given that, I 7227 7228 have no choice but to put this -- to offer this kind of 7229 condition on the effectiveness to ensure that the bill is not duplicative. 7230 And three, the third, will it -- will this bill result 7231 in any wasteful government spending? Given the current 7232 discussions over the debt ceiling and the budget, this is an 7233 obvious provision that everyone can agree on. 7234 If FERC can certify these three criteria, then it can go 7235 into effect as written. If not, then the bill is stayed 7236 until such time as FERC can certify those conditions. 7237 7238 None of these conditions should be objectionable to anyone. I am simply asking that, in your rush today to aid 7239 oil and gas companies, that you not elevate the oil and gas 7240 company profits over what is in the best interest of families 7241

7242 and communities at home. So I urge you to support my amendment. 7243 7244 And I yield back the balance of my time. *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there 7245 further discussion on the amendment? 7246 7247 The gentleman from Texas, Mr. Burgess, is recognized. *Mr. Burgess. I thank the chair. Stop me if you have 7248 7249 heard this before, but this amendment is unnecessary. And here is the deal. The underlying bill already 7250 addresses FERC certification of public convenience and 7251 necessity, and avoids both duplication and wasteful spending. 7252 Affirming FERC as the lead agency for environmental 7253 reviews ensures that multiple agencies are not competing for 7254 the same duplicative assessments. I ask to strike the last word, and speak 7632 in favor of the bill. 7633 *The Chair. Mr. Carter is recognized for five minutes 7634 to strike the last word. 7635 7636 *Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I would like to speak in favor of H.R. 1070. I think it is all too appropriate that 7637 this bill came up in the very first markup of the renamed 7638 Environment, Manufacturing, and Critical Minerals 7639 Subcommittee last week. The name change reflects our very 7640 7641 real shared desire and need to bring more manufacturing and critical mineral supply chains to the United States. 7642 Again, they aren't called critical minerals for nothing. 7643 They are the minerals that fuel our modern advanced economy 7644 and high standard of living. They are in each one of our 7645 7646 pockets with our own cell phones. They are in solar panels and wind energy. I am a medical professional by training, 7647 and they are needed in everything from technologies for 7648 surgery to Xrays to fighting the common cold. 7649

7650 We need to look at ourselves and acknowledge that we don't have enough in the United States to ensure we have 7651 7652 enough of these essential materials to supply our country. don't care who you are. My colleagues across the aisle may 7653 point to all the money they have borrowed from our children 7654 as examples of investments we will make. But those 7655 investments will be wasted if it takes years and billions 7656 7657 more dollars than they intended because of excessive regulations and permitting requirements. That is why we need 7658 this bill. Today it can take anywhere, anywhere from 7 to 7659 over 20 years -- 7 to 20 years -- to bring a new mineral to 7660 market with millions, if not billions of dollars required. 7661 7662 No wonder companies' investors have looked elsewhere to do 7663 this work. I said it last week, but I will say it again: No wonder 7664 China supplies us with the vast majority of these critical 7665 minerals. They don't just dig it out of the ground. 7666 7667 are also, by far, the world's biggest refiner of these minerals. We are behind in this race, and it is not even 7668 close. The time to act is now. 7669 My bill would take a step in the right direction to 7670

7671 demonstrate that the U.S. is back in the business of processing critical minerals. My bill would simply allow for 7672 7673 facilities dealing with critical energy resources like these minerals to receive an interim status permit for handling, 7674 storing, or treating on-site hazardous waste. This will 7675 allow projects to continue, be constructed, and have the 7676 certainty that operations will be able to occur, instead of 7677 7678 being held hostage by the EPA or other authority waiting for their paperwork to get approved. 7679 I am not advocating or even saying we should blindly let 7680 these processing -- let those processing these minerals 7681 haphazardly handle hazardous material and waste. I am saying 7682 7683 that I trust our system and its numerous existing protections that have made us the cleanest energy producer in the world. 7684 I want to repeat that: I am saying that I trust our system 7685 and its numerous existing protections that have made us the 7686 cleanest energy producer in the world. 7687 7688 In fact, under existing EPA regulations, interim permit holders must comply with notification, waste treatment, 7689 storage, and disposal requirements, as well as specific 7690 hazardous waste and waste facility standards. Mines and 7691

- other facilities are already subject to over dozens of
 Federal and state laws. This bill is just one part of a much
 larger effort to fix permitting in our country, and extend
 the official invitation to those who seek to come build in

Not only that, 7719 7720 but we don't even register globally when it comes to processing those materials in the United States. 7721 Mr. Carter's bill, my colleague from Georgia, H.R. 1070, 7722 takes a step forward in assuring investors that putting their 7723 money into new American manufacturing is not a lost cause. 7724 7725 Under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, a mineral processing facility that generates Resource 7726 Conservation and Recovery Act-regulated waste needs a permit 7727 if it does one of three things on site: it stores the waste 7728 for 90 days, treats the waste, or disposes of the waste. 7729 7730 This permit must be applied for 180 days before physical construction of the facility can begin, and no facility can 7731 operate without a permit. 7732

I understand the Resource Conversation and --

7733

7734 Conservation and Recovery Act permitting process can take years to be finalized, as my colleague addressed. Under the 7735 7736 Carter bill, a facility that processes or refines critical energy resources can apply for and automatically be given an 7737 interim permit, helping provide some level of assurance to an 7738 7739 investment. And I want to be clear. This bill does not -- is not a 7740 7741 blank check to evade environmental and safety safeguards. The permit establishes the site-specific administrative and 7742 technical standards that the facility must meet. The interim 7743 permit cannot be given to anyone who has been denied a 7744 permit, or if authority to operate the facility was 7745 7746 terminated under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. Moreover, EPA or a state-delegated Resource Conservation 7747 and Recovery Act Hazardous Waste Program can call at any time 7748 for a facilities permit in review, review it to see if it 7749 qualifies for a longer-term permit. 7750 7751 My colleague's bill will jumpstart construction and domestic investment, is limited to facilities that process or 7752 refine critical energy resources, helps rebuild our supply 7753 chains, and doesn't short circuit environmental protection. 7754

These are not the wastes that we want facilities to be storing, treating, or 7810 disposing of without strict regulations and accountability. 7811 Unfortunately, due to the overly broad definition -- and 7812 I quote -- "critical energy resource" in this bill, the 7813 7814 Secretary of Energy could decide that these hazardous wastes are covered by this vaque definition, and exempt processing 7815 facilities from needing to obtain common-sense operating 7816 permits. We have already heard about the dangerous potential 8046 impacts of H.R. 1070. This bill would allow any vaquely 8047 defined critical energy resource facility to treat, store, 8048 and dispose of hazardous waste without having to obtain a 8049 8050 permit under the Resources Conservation and Recovery Act, or RCRA. 8051 At the Environment Subcommittee markup, Democratic 8052 members highlighted the sweeping pitfalls of this proposal, 8053 and explained that granting the Secretary of Energy enormous 8054 latitude to label any resource critical to exempt it from 8055 bedrock environmental laws puts our communities and the 8056 environment at great risk. 8057 As drafted, this bill is entirely unclear what does and, 8058 more importantly, what does not fall under the definition of 8059 8060 critical energy resource. My amendment would clarify some of the uncertainty stemming from the bill's imprecise drafting. 8061 My amendment would simply exclude waste derived from 8062 explosives manufacturing from the definition of critical 8063

8064 energy resources, making it ineligible for the bill's exemptions from hazardous waste permit requirements. For 8065 8066 context, the category of explosives manufacturing waste 8067 includes, first, wastewater treatment sludges from the manufacturing and processing of explosives; second, spent 8068 carbon from the treatment of wastewater containing 8069 explosives; three, wastewater treatment sludges from the 8070 8071 manufacturing formulation and loading of lead-based initiating compounds; and four, pink and red water from TNT 8072 operations. 8073 The EPA uses two hazard codes to identify these wastes: 8074 R, which stands for reactive; and T, which stands for toxic. 8075 8076 As their hazard codes indicate, these wastes pose serious dangers to the communities near the facilities that manage 8077 them and the surrounding environment. It is imperative that 8078 these facilities operate under common-sense permits to 8079 protect the health and safety of those around them. 8080 8081 As drafted, this bill would give facilities, even those with a history of violating RCRA permits, free rein to 8082 mismanage our hazardous waste, freely pollute the 8083 environment, and endanger the communities nearby. 8526 *Mr. Johnson. Does anyone wish to speak on the bill? The gentleman from Pennsylvania, Dr. Joyce, is 8527 8528 recognized for five minutes. *Mr. Joyce. Mr. Chairman, I seek recognition to strike 8529 the last word in support of H.R. 1131. 8530 *Mr. Johnson. The gentleman is recognized. 8531 *Mr. Joyce. In the past, the American people have lost 8532 8533 faith in the congressional process because it has been conducted behind closed doors and without regard for normal 8534 procedure. 8535 I want again today to thank Chair McMorris Rodgers for 8536 her efforts to return us to regular order. The legislation 8537 that we discuss here today is vital to the interest of the 8538 American public, and it is encouraging to see our committee 8539 hold hearings, markups, and pass bills. This is the way our 8540 founders intended. 8541 The discourse that we have here ensues our legislative 8542 8543 process, and it is thoughtful and it is meaningful. already seeing in the first two months of the 118th Congress 8544 why regular order is so important. House Republicans have 8545 promised the American people transparency, and I am proud to 8546

8547 see us act accordingly. H.R. 1131 provides critical energy resource facilities 8548 8549 the ability in EPA's flexible air permitting program 8550 providing these facilities with the flexibility to anticipate and adapt to operational changes such as increase in market 8551 demand or disruptions in supply. This EPA program is 8552 actually already in existence, and has been utilized by both 8553 Republican and Democrat administrations to increase the 8554 production of a needed resource. 8555 For example, Intel was able to use this program to 8556 successfully build one of its vital semiconductor fabrication 8557 plants in Oregon to keep up with increased demand. 8558 Congress has a chance to give all critical energy resource 8559 facilities the same opportunity. 8560 8561 Serving on this committee, we have heard repeatedly that China's mineral dominance is a threat to our national 8562 security. The Chinese Communist Party is a threat to our 8563 8564 national security. The Chinese Communist Party controls alarming portions of the mineral supply chain, and nearly 90 8565 percent of all rare earth element processing, from large 8566 commercial products like airplanes and industrial machinery 8567

8568 to retail goods like televisions and cell phones. Chinese minerals have made their way into our daily lives, and, 8569 8570 literally, probably into the pockets of everyone here today. Energy security is needed national security. We cannot 8571 afford to submit to the whims of adversarial nations. 8572 Instead, we need to invest in our own energy potential 8573 beneath the feet of my constituents to jumpstart our domestic 8574 8575 production. Unsurprisingly, the roadblock that American industry 8576 faces is short-sighted regulation, government delay-spurred 8577 backlogs. And viable projects and applications wither on the 8578 vine before they can begin. We cannot expect to grow our 8579 8580 domestic capacity while suffocating in bureaucratic red tape. Make no mistake, environmental regulations are 8581 important. To be clear, this bill does not lift 8582 environmental requirements, but instead facilitates the 8583 opportunity for permitting certainty. Again, to clear up any 8584 8585 misconceptions, this does not lift any environmental obligations. Participants will have to comply with all Clean 8586 Air Act requirements. 8587 H.R. 1131 is not about cutting regulations, but giving 8588

8589 critical resource producers certainty. It allows the EPA administrator to consider broader use of flexible air 8590 8591 permits. It does not foresee the administrator to grant 8592 flexible permits. This is the sort of common-sense permitting reform that 8593 we have been talking about in this committee, and we should 8594 be able to find common ground on it. Entities with flexible 8595 8596 market operations with five-year permits can cut time, 8597 delays, and costs associated with the permitting approval process. The benefits that these programs provide are clear 8598 regulations, the ability to grow, and the assurance that 8599 8600 operations meet environmental standards. 8601 H.R. 1131 is a start toward pulling private capital off the sidelines to finance new projects that can deliver the 8602 resources that we need in our modern economy. 8603 For too long, regulations have scared off investment in 8604 desperately-needed sectors. We saw recently with the supply 8605 8606 chain issues caused by the pandemic how easy it is for our economy to be disrupted by shortages. The only way to 8607 quarantee American access is to utilize American resources. 8608 From processing facilities to mining operations, American 8609

8610 industry is ready to get to work. Providing the private sector with permitting certainty is the first step in 8611 8612 breaking China's tight hold over the global critical mineral supply, and reclaiming American energy dominance. 8613 Thank you, Mr. Chair, and I yield. 8614 *Mr. Johnson. The gentleman yields back. Do other 8615 members wish to -- Mr. Pallone is recognized for five 8616 8617 minutes. *Mr. Pallone. Thank you. I am -- just wanted to say --8618 and, you know, I am not trying to make things difficult. I 8619 know the time is short, but Dr. Joyce mentioned regular 8620 order. And, you know, I just want you to know that I really 8621 appreciate the fact that Chairwoman Rodgers is proceeding 8622 with regular order on these bills, but I think both of us 8623 have tried whenever we have been in charge to proceed with 8624 regular order. 8625 The problem is that, from time to time, you know, we get 8626 8627 the House leadership -- be it a Democrat or Republican -that, because they want to act quickly, don't go through 8628 regular order. And we saw that with your leadership in the 8629 first month or so, where many bills came to the floor that 8630

8684 *Mr. Johnson. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes in support of his amendment. 8685 8686 *Mr. Tonko. Thank you, Mr. Chair. H.R. 1131 would compel the EPA administrator to 8687 authorize use of flexible air permits for any and all 8688 critical energy resource facilities. As we have heard, this 8689 term is very loosely defined, and could include almost any 8690 type of industrial facility. Specifically, a flexible air 8691 permit contains approaches that allow the source to make 8692 certain types of operational changes without further review 8693 or approval by the appropriate permitting authority. 8694 permits are considered and granted by states and the EPA on a 8695 8696 case-by-case basis, and include terms and conditions for each unique facility. 8697 At the Environment Subcommittee markup I expressed my 8698 concerns with this legislation. Since no efforts were made 8699 to address my concerns, I feel the need to reiterate the 8700 8701 glaring problems with this legislation. As I said at the subcommittee markup, the use of flexible air permitting may 8702 make sense in specific situations. However, we have 8703 witnessed egregious abuses of flexible air permits. 8704

8705 A recent example is at the Limetree Bay refinery in the Virgin Islands. After being shuttered for almost a decade, 8706 8707 the Trump Administration granted this troubled facility a flexible air permit, allowing it to reopen, continue to 8708 operate, increase pollution, and evade stricter air pollution 8709 Despite this sweetheart deal from the Trump 8710 Administration, the company refused to comply with simple 8711 8712 tasks like air monitoring. The Biden EPA yanked the flexible air permit when a malfunction just a few days after the 8713 refinery restarted sent oil droplets into the air, and a 8714 series of chemical releases into the environment sickened 8715 8716 nearby communities. 8717 Flexible air permits need to be considered on a case-bycase basis, as each facility has its own unique set of 8718 circumstances that may warrant this type of regulatory and 8719 operational flexibility. As drafted, this bill would force 8720 the EPA administrator to put public health and the welfare of 8721 8722 communities surrounding these so-called critical energy resource facilities at risk by granting blanket air permits 8723 even to facilities that have previously violated the Clean 8724 Air Act. 8725

8726 My amendment would address this problem by excluding facilities that have previously violated the Clean Air Act 8727 8728 from being eligible for flexible air permits. Air permits are one tool that EPA has to protect our 8729 communities and the environment from dangerous pollutants. 8730 Forcing the EPA administrator to grant more flexible air 8731 permits to facilities that have a history of violating their 8732 8733 past permits simply does not make sense. Why should we reward sources if they have a bad track record in order to 8734 make certain we are quarding against bad actors that have 8735 demonstrated they are willing to put our constituents and the 8736 environment at risk? 8737 So, Mr. Chair, I urge my colleagues to support this 8738 amendment. And with that, I yield back. 8739 *Mr. Johnson. The gentleman yields back. Are there 8740 other members seeking recognition? 8741 Dr. Joyce from Pennsylvania. 8742 8743 *Mr. Joyce. Colleagues, the Clean Air Act is the most important 8955 Federal law protecting the air that we breathe from harmful 8956 pollution. Many vulnerable and working-class communities 8957 suffer disproportionate risk from daily exposure to air 8958 8959 pollution. Often they bear the burden of cumulative impacts. We see this often in our neighborhoods for our Black 8960 neighbors, Latino neighbors, working-class neighborhoods. 8961 The EPA has found that living near sources of air pollution 8962 like industrial facilities can lead to health problems like 8963 asthma, reduced lung function, cardiovascular disease, and 8964 premature death. 8965 This amendment would make sure that, before this 8966 legislation can take effect, the EPA administrator publish a 8967 determination that the legislation will not cause a 8968 8969 disproportionate burden of adverse human health and environmental effects, and will not result in disparate 8970 economic impacts to vulnerable and low-income communities. 8971 The -- there was a witness that appeared during the 8972

8973 Environment Subcommittee who testified about all the bills, but I think it is particularly appropriate, applicable to 8974 8975 this bill. He said that it creates a false narrative aimed at circumvention of critical environmental and public health 8976 protections in order to greenlight harmful corporate 8977 polluters at the expense of frontline communities and 8978 vulnerable people. 8979 8980 In addition, the -- this -- just saying you have carte blanche if you are a critical energy resource facility is --8981 it is just too -- it is a bridge too far. It is entirely 8982 vaque. It creates a massive loophole. If Mr. Joyce would 8983 like to work on refining some of this, I would be happy to 8984 8985 work with him on it. 8986 And the good news is that the last Congress passed the Inflation Reduction Act and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law 8987 that is establishing the policies necessary to lower costs, 8988 to clean up the air, to create jobs across America in the 8989 8990 clean energy economy. And we are -- since they have passed, we have seen all sorts of important clean energy investments 8991 happening all across America. There is money being put back 8992 into the pockets of all of our neighbors. And really, I 8993

- think our time would be better spent working together to do

 just that.

 So there are better ways about going -- there are better

 ways to go about increasing the amount of critical energy
- 8998 resources in America. And thankfully, we are on track to do
- 8999 that already.
- 9000 So I urge my colleagues to adopt my amendment to protect
- 9001 vulnerable and low -- lower-income communities from the

Like most of the bills in today's markup, H.R. 1140 9464 would waive bedrock environmental laws, specifically the 9465 Clean Air Act and the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 9466 for vaguely defined "critical energy resource facilities.'' 9467 9468 My amendment is very simple. It ensures the bill will not go into effect until the EPA administrator certifies that 9469 it will not adversely impact environmental justice 9470 communities. 9471 Environmental justice communities are -- environmental -9472 - but are not -- environmental justice communities are this. 9473 They -- communities that are low-income communities, 9474 under-served communities, communities next to highly 9475 polluting facilities, and communities with poor air quality. 9476 No, I didn't just describe Texas. Like I pointed out, I just 9477 9478 described environmental justice communities. I will be willing to bet that each of us has at least 9479 one community like this in each one of our districts. And 9480 why is that? It is because when we didn't know any better as 9481

9482 a growing amazing economy, we polluted communities and we did things unbeknownst to us that it was causing harm not only to 9483 9484 the people of those communities, but in many cases would cause harms for decades to come. But we know better now. 9485 Like I said before, and I will say it again, Members of 9486 Congress, we have a duty to ensure that all communities we 9487 represent, even those that have historically been left 9488 9489 behind, are protected. And as members of this committee, we have an obligation to put forth solutions that advance our 9490 nation's energy independence, while ensuring a healthier 9491 future for our children and grandchildren, including those 9492 that live in environmental justice communities. At a bare 9493 minimum, we should be making sure that the bills we pass 9494 aren't exacerbating the negative impacts of pollution on 9495 those most vulnerable among us. 9496 Considering this Administration's commitment to 9497 environmental justice and equality, we should be taking steps 9498 9499 to forward and strengthen our nation's critical environmental safequards. My amendment would ensure we fulfill our 9500 commitment and duty to all of the people in our great 9501 country, not just some communities. So it is really 9502

Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 10123 10124 For what purpose does the gentleman from Utah seek recognition? 10125 *Mr. Curtis. Madam Chair, I request to strike the last 10126 word to speak on the amendment. 10127 *The Chair. The gentleman, Mr. Curtis, is recognized 10128 10129 for five minutes to --10130 *Mr. Curtis. Thank you. *The Chair. -- to strike the last word. 10131 *Mr. Curtis. Thank you. I would like to kind of start 10132 at a 30,000-foot view with the Elimination of Future 10133 Technology Delays Act. The bill deals a lot with how we deal 10134 10135 with risk, and how we interpret risk. And I would like to point out, for those who feel like no risk is ever 10136 acceptable, that we all drive an automobile, we put a 10137 seatbelt on, and there is a risk of an accident. Yet that is 10138 10139 an acceptable risk. Some actually drive an automobile without a seatbelt, and text, and that is an unacceptable 10140 risk. And I think this bill tries to find the right place 10141 between what is an appropriate risk and what is not. 10142

Also, I would like to, as we start talking about this, 10143 10144 tie this into renewables, all right? Many of my colleagues 10145 and my Democratic colleagues support the fact that we want to enhance our renewables. There is a risk that lithium 10146 batteries can explode, wind turbines can kill birds, solar 10147 panels can catch fire. However, the benefits of these 10148 technologies outweigh the risk. 10149 This brings me to the bill today, the Elimination of 10150 Future Technology Delays Act. H.R. 1158 focuses only on the 10151 unreasonable risk approach to critical energy resources, 10152 those that DoE has determined are essential for the energy 10153 sector and energy system, and for which the supply chain is 10154 10155 vulnerable to disruption. If you believe reducing carbon emissions by technology 10156 innovation is important, this bill is for you. The bill 10157 prevents EPA from proactively asking a new technology maker 10158 to suspend or withdraw their application, unless EPA has 10159 10160 first reviewed their notice. That sounds pretty reasonable. Recently, GAO found that EPA missed 100 percent of 10161 statutory deadlines for new chemical reviews. This is on the 10162 top of the fact that it takes EPA three times the legal limit 10163

10164 to make any decision. This creates an obvious loophole: make these products overseas, and ship them to the United 10165 10166 States as the alternative. Not only is failure to act slowly our ability to combat climate -- is slowly impacting our 10167 ability to work on climate change, it is shipping American 10168 10169 jobs overseas. This bill would not prevent EPA from considering risks 10170 10171 to human health and the environment, as it makes no changes to EPA's statutory review, determination and risk management 10172 standards. Therefore, this bill would not prevent EPA from 10173 looking at unreasonable risks to potentially exposed 10174 populations. 10175 10176 It prevents the kind of no-risk perspective currently at EPA that threatens to de-industrialize America and threaten 10177 our high standard of living. 10178 It also stops EPA from bullying an innovator into 10179 forfeiting a timely review and its fees paid by that company. 10180 10181 EPA should not be compensated for poor performance. They should meet the law's deadlines, and without 10182 intimidating others, particularly when the companies 10183 themselves are funding the process. 10184

I urge my colleagues to support this bill, and I yield 10185 my time. 10186 10187 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there further discussion on the bill? 10188 *Mr. Burgess. Madam --10189 *The Chair. The gentleman -- oh, the gentleman from 10190 Georgia, Mr. Carter, is recognized for five minutes. 10191 10192 *Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I would like to strike the last word in support of H.R. 1158, introduced by my friend 10193 from Utah. 10194 This legislation only covers chemical substances that 10195 are a critical energy resource that the Secretary of Energy 10196 10197 has determined is essential to the United States energy sector and systems whose supply chain is vulnerable to 10198 disruption. If the chemical substance is not a critical 10199 energy resource, these provisions do not apply. 10200 This bill does not prevent the EPA from deciding on new 10201 10202 chemicals and new uses of a chemical. That mandate still 10203 applies to EPA. This bill does not force EPA to approve chemicals 10204 regardless of their toxicity. EPA has its full complement of 10205

10206 authority to make determinations and regulate new chemicals 10207 and new uses. 10208 This bill makes no changes to the fact that EPA, under statute, still must assess for the existence of and 10209 adequately control an unreasonable risk to a potentially 10210 exposed or susceptible population identified by EPA. 10211 This bill also does not change that a potentially 10212 10213 exposed or susceptible population is broadly defined in TSCA. 10214 This bill does not put corporate profits over the public interest, because the substance is critical. The bill asks 10215 EPA to consider the economic, societal, and environmental 10216 costs and benefits. If a substance could cost effectively 10217 address climate change, address our urban heat islands, do 10218 you want that factor ignored or killed due to theoretical 10219 10220 risk? In addition, existing TSCA section 5 authority removes 10221 excuses for blowing deadlines and not deciding, yet EPA is 10222 10223 becoming increasingly proficient at it. If EPA is stuck because it needs more information, the EPA can stop the clock 10224 to order it. This bill does not change that feature. 10225 EPA has been missing deadlines, and this bill also 10226

prevents EPA from leaning on applicants to withdraw their 10227 notices because after six months EPA couldn't bother to see 10228 10229 what the applicant wanted to make. This bill says when you have the information to decide, do it. Don't stall. 10230 avoid it. Don't lean on the applicant to withdraw. 10231 make excuses. Just do it. 10232 Finally, to those that point to GOP votes for this final 10233 10234 TSCA bill, this committee unanimously -- and the House, with 398 votes -- originally passed TSCA reform without any 10235 changes to new chemical programs to avoid this very mess. 10236 We cannot move forward until we can better balance 10237 benefits and risks. We cannot continue to be paralyzed by 10238 10239 the fact risks exist. As my colleagues have pointed out many 10240 times, we have ways of mitigating risk, and we will do just that. 10241 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 10242 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 10243 10244 further discussion on the bill? The gentleman from South Carolina is recognized for five 10245 minutes. 10246 *Mr. Duncan. Thank you, Madam Chair. It has been a 10247

10248 long day. I want to thank the gentleman for this. I move to strike the last word and speak in favor of the bill. 10249 10250 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized. *Mr. Duncan. The technology we need to take us into the 10251 future have not been invented. What has been invented are 10252 the technologies to make electric vehicles work. 10253 I remember a hearing that we had, and we had the CEO or 10254 10255 a high-ranking official from Ford Motor Company sitting at that table right there. And I asked him, with this rush to 10256 green and this push for EVs, what is going to happen at the 10257 end of life of these batteries? We all know the tremendous 10258 cost to the consumer of having to replace the battery systems 10259 that make EVs work. When those batteries fail to hold a 10260 charge and need to be replaced, there has been spent a lot of 10261 money to replace the batteries. But what happens to the 10262 batteries they take out of that car? Who has got the 10263 liability for the cleanup? Because these are highly toxic. 10264 10265 We dealt with Superfund sites in this nation. I dealt with it in the state legislature. We have dealt with it in 10266 Congress. It has been a tremendous burden and cost to the 10267 taxpayers of America. There will be toxic dead batteries 10268

            My fear is that that consumer will dispose of those
10283
       batteries themselves, because the manufacturer won't take

       those batteries back. They either dispose of them on their

       property, or throw them in the ditch on the way to the
       landfill, or throw them in the landfill themselves. And then
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       you have a Superfund site. Or they stack them in a closet on
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       the ground floor of a condominium complex that they live in,
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10290 and then we have an inclement event like a hurricane that 10291 puts salt water into that closet, and creates a fire where 10292 there might be children living upstairs in another apartment that get caught up in that fire. 10293 Where does the liability fall at that point? Is it with 10294 the manufacturer, or is it with that car owner that replaced 10295 his battery? Is with the battery manufacturer? Is it with 10296 10297 the state? Ultimately, is it going to be with the taxpayers? These are things we have to think about. 10298 I want to look -- talk about the forward-thinking of 10299 this bill, and I think it is very well-founded, and I support 10300 it. But we have got to do more, especially in the recycling 10301 10302 and end-of-life process for these batteries, because it is coming, and the price tag could be coming due for my 10303 constituents. And I don't want to pay for landfill Superfund 10304 cleanup sites in Indiana or wherever they may be. I am not 10305 -- Indiana just happened to come to mind, I don't want 10306 10307 anybody to get mad at me there. But ultimately, taxpayers have to pay for that. 10308 We can deal with this now. We can deal with this today, 10309 and we need to deal with it yesterday. 10310

And with that, I yield back. 10311 *The Chair. Is there further discussion on the bill? 10312 10313 *Mr. Johnson. Madam Chair? *The Chair. The gentleman from Ohio, for what purpose 10314 10315 do you seek recognition? *Mr. Johnson. Madam Chair, I seek to strike the last 10316 word in support of the bill. 10317 10318 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 10319 minutes. *Mr. Johnson. Section 2 of TSCA states two things. 10320 First, it is the United States policy that authority over 10321 chemicals should not unduly impede nor create unnecessary 10322 10323 economic barriers to technological innovation. Second, Congress intends TSCA to be implemented in a "reasonable and 10324 prudent manner,'' and EPA must consider "the environmental, 10325 economic, and social impact of any action the administrator 10326 takes or proposes to take.'' 10327 10328 Unfortunately for new chemicals, what the statute says and what EPA does could not be more different. TSCA prevents 10329 innovation without EPA permission, and the law requires EPA 10330 to decide in 90 days, or 180 days if the EPA needs time. 10331

10332 data shows that the EPA is dragging its feet to make decisions, considers risks of any magnitude to be 10333 10334 unreasonable, that all conditions of use are foreseeable, regardless of likelihood, and is getting worse with no real 10335 10336 effort to change. GAO recently noted EPA is getting -- has been getting 10337 worse with time, with a dramatic spike in inefficiency coming 10338 10339 in the last 2 years: 79 percent of reviews didn't meet the 10340 mark, and 100 percent failed last year. I know some of my colleagues claim that more money in 10341 government bodies can solve the issue, or the fault lies with 10342 the innovators, not the government. This disregard for 10343 10344 American innovators has real consequences. New pre-manufacturing notices have dropped by almost 10345 two-thirds in the last seven years. Domestic research and 10346 development on new products dropped by 80 percent from 2019 10347 to 2021, a loss of at least 6.2 billion in U.S. gross 10348 10349 domestic product is expected if nothing is done. Jobs and innovation are moving overseas. We need a course correction 10350 now, Madam Chair. 10351 This legislation will right some serious flaws and 10352

provide durable relief. It does not undermine the EPA's 10353 authority to review submissions. And again, I urge support 10354 10355 for the bill and a more sustained effort to help American innovation. 10356 And with that, I will yield back. 10357 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 10358 further discussion on the bill? 10359 10360 *Mr. Pallone. There are no amendments? 10361 *The Chair. Are there any bipartisan amendments? Are there other amendments? 10362 *Mr. Pallone. Partisan amendment. 10363 *The Chair. How about we -- how about -- okay, how 10364 10365 about we break? Okay, we will come back and do the amendments immediately following the votes on the floor. 10366 So the committee is at recess for the purpose of votes 10367 on the floor, and we will return after that to debate the 10368 10369 amendments. 10370 [Recess.] *The Chair. The committee will come to order. We are 10371 going to continue consideration on H.R. 1158. We were 10372 getting started on amendments. 10373

Are there any bipartisan amendments? I already asked 10374 that. 10375 10376 Are there amendments to 1158? For what purpose does the lady, Ms. Clarke, seek 10377 10378 recognition? 10379 *Ms. Clarke. Madam Chairwoman, I would like to strike the last word. 10380 10381 *The Chair. The lady is recognized for five minutes to strike the last word. 10382 *Ms. Clarke. Madam Chair, I have an amendment at the 10383 desk. 10384 *The Chair. The clerk will report the amendment. 10385 *Ms. Clarke. Yes, it is titled 1158 FCN-01. 10386 *The Clerk. Amendment to H.R. 1158, offered by Ms. 10387 Clarke. Add at the end the following: non-application to 10388 PFAS. Notwithstanding subparagraph D, this paragraph shall 10389 not apply with respect to any chemical substance that is a 10390 10391 perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substance. *Ms. Clarke. I hate when that happens. 10392 *Mrs. Lesko. It is PFAS. 10393 *Mr. Curtis. This is where the chair says, "You don't 10394

*The Chair. The lady is recognized for five minutes on 10403 10404 her --10405 *Ms. Clarke. Thank you, Madam Chair. This bill creates an unnecessary and harmful regulatory 10406 process essentially circumventing critical health protections 10407 for so-called critical energy resources, an incredibly vague 10408 and overly broad term. Under this misquided bill, a chemical 10409 10410 classified as a critical energy resource would be allowed to be put on the market without any determination of the risk to 10411 the public health, effectively allowing potentially dangerous 10412 chemicals into our homes and communities. 10413 It would also require EPA to consider non-risk factors 10414 when making safety determinations about these designated 10415 chemicals, essentially prioritizing economic costs over 10416 safety. 10417 I am disturbed how this legislation could bypass risk 10418 evaluations for untested PFAS chemicals for the sake of 10419 10420 energy innovation. PFAS chemicals are a class of manmade chemicals that have been linked to a range of serious health 10421 consequences including cancer, heart disease, diabetes, and 10422 serious reproductive and developmental issues. Research has 10423

10424 found that these chemicals are harmful, even at extremely low doses. 10425 10426 So I am gravely concerned with the potential of this bill unleashing PFAS into our water sources. A report by the 10427 Physicians for Social Responsibility found PFAS was used in 10428 fracking in over one 1,200 oil and gas wells, including wells 10429 in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Colorado, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas, 10430 10431 and Wyoming. This bill would allow the oil and gas industry to flood water systems with untested PFAS without any 10432 considerations on the health effects on our communities. 10433 Instead of taking action to help clean up PFAS 10434 contamination and protect our most vulnerable populations 10435 10436 from exposure, Republicans want to create a new, watered-down regulatory scheme to fast-track the approval of new and 10437 potentially more harmful PFAS. And why? Because it could be 10438 critical to energy development? That is not only dangerous, 10439 but unnecessary. 10440 10441 The EPA already has the authority to consider critical and essential uses of chemicals like uses in energy 10442 industries when they define the protocols for risk 10443 management. It is wholly unnecessary to sacrifice public 10444

10445 health and safety by circumventing reviews for PFAS chemicals. That is why I am offering this common-sense 10446 10447 change. This amendment simply excludes PFAS from being 10448 considered under the regulatory pathway created under this 10449 In light of the growing evidence around PFAS 10450 contamination and health risks, we should be strengthening 10451 10452 protections against PFAS exposure and providing communities resources to protect themselves from harmful effects, not 10453 creating more pipelines for cancer-causing chemicals into our 10454 air, drinking water, and homes. 10455 If Republicans really want to unleash American energy, I 10456 10457 invite them to stop attempts -- attempting to roll back 10458 critical climate and environmental programs, and work with us to build a brighter future for all by investing in clean 10459 energy and bolstering our environmental safeguards. 10460 I urge my colleagues to support this common-sense 10461 10462 amendment that would protect workers, families, and children from harmful PFAS chemicals. 10463 And with that, Madam Chair, thank you, and I yield back 10464 the balance of my time. 10465

*The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Anyone else 10466 10467 speaking on the amendment? 10468 The gentleman from Utah, Mr. Curtis, is recognized for five minutes. 10469 Thank you, Madam Chair. I oppose this 10470 *Mr. Curtis. amendment, and urge the members to vote no. 10471 As I was listening to my colleague from New York -- and 10472 I greatly appreciate her perspective, but it made me wonder 10473 if we were even talking about the same bill. And I hope my 10474 colleagues have taken time to read this bill, and to study 10475 it. And I think they will see that it actually helps them 10476 accomplish a lot of their objectives. 10477 10478 This amendment that is being proposed does not permit the bill to cover projects with PFAS. Why is this a problem? 10479 I remember being on the Health Subcommittee last year when we 10480 talked about this. The number of things that -- where PFAS 10481 is used in medicine and implants and things like that, that 10482 10483 are critical and lifesaving, you know, there is over 12,000 PFAS -- different types of PFAS, as identified by the EPA. 10484 And this amendment doesn't even define what a PFAS is. 10485 Moreover, PFAS is a diverse class of chemicals, most of 10486

which do not have health effects. And the information from 10487 10488 the EPA is clear on that. PFAS is used in many solar panels, 10489 and windmills, and other technologies that are part of our green future. 10490 The amendment is anti-science, and drives fears rather 10491 The idea of section 5 is that every chemical 10492 gets an independent review, rather than a decision based upon 10493 10494 notions. This amendment is the opposite of that. I might point out, as far as risk, too, I mentioned in 10495 my earlier remarks about the bill that there are risks that 10496 we all accept every day in society. And to give you one 10497 clear example of what EPA might struggle with in this risk 10498 10499 assessment, I learned of a company that, in order to comply with clean air requirements, they use what is called EPS, 10500 electrostatic precipitation, to capture particulates. There 10501 is a byproduct when they use EPS, and that byproduct is 10502 packaged in this company and sent to the landfill. 10503 10504 found that this byproduct can be used in glass and paper, and actually reduce the amount of pulp in paper. But EPA will 10505 not let them use that chemical because their employees might 10506 come in contact with that. So instead, their employees 10507

10508 package it, coming in contact with it, and send it to the landfill. 10509 10510 And that is the type of risk that EPA must determine is -- may be an acceptable risk for them to determine that it is 10511 as dangerous for them to send that to the landfill as to use 10512 10513 it otherwise. And so I urge a no vote, and yield my time back. 10514 10515 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there further discussion? 10516 Mrs. Dingell from Michigan is recognized for five 10517 minutes. 10518 *Mrs. Dingell. Thank you, Madam Chair. And with all 10519 10520 due respect, first of all, I want to -- I move to strike the last word. 10521 *The Chair. The lady is recognized to strike the last 10522 word for five minutes. 10523 *Mrs. Dingell. And I would like to speak in support of 10524 10525 the gentlelady's amendment, which would ensure that PFAS chemicals do not circumvent reviews under the Toxic 10526

With all due respect for my colleague -- and I love him

Substances Control Act, or TSCA.

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10529 dearly, and we are working on bills together, some important ones -- PFAS is a forever chemical that is in 98 percent of 10530 10531 the people's blood. The firefighters who were in town the last two days -- I cannot believe anybody in this committee 10532 did not talk to them -- they are scared to death about the 10533 PFAS that is in their firefighting equipment. They are --10534 one of them today, someone I have met from a Republican 10535 10536 member's district, actually, told me that 75 percent of their firefighters in their group are getting cancer. 10537 This is -- H.R. 1158 -- and I don't know that that is a 10538 fact, by the way, that was just an emotional statement made 10539 to me, but it is how they feel. H.R. 1158 guts critical 10540 public health protections for chemicals classified under the 10541 vague term "critical energy resources.'' 10542 If this legislation were to pass, a chemical determined 10543 to be a critical energy resource could enter commerce without 10544 determination of safety, potentially allowing toxic chemicals 10545 10546 into our communities. EPA would also be required to consider non-risk factors 10547 when making safety determinations about these designated 10548 chemicals, thereby prioritizing economic costs over safety. 10549

10550 I am deeply disappointed that my colleagues specifically 10551 mentioned using this authority to streamline the review of 10552 critical uses of PFAS chemicals in the name of energy innovation. PFAS chemicals have been linked to cancer, 10553 developmental issues, and other serious health problems at 10554 extremely low doses. Communities across the nation, 10555 including my own in Michigan, are looking to us to address 10556 10557 the contamination that they are seeing in the air, the soil, the water, wildlife, and in our own bodies. 10558 That is why I am concerned that Republicans are willing 10559 to speed up the review of PFAS chemicals, and without 10560 critical public health protections this committee passed in 10561 10562 the Lautenberg Act. EPA should be doing a thorough review that follows the science, not a company's bottom line, to 10563 ensure that any PFAS chemical entering the market is 10564 regulated to prevent harmful exposure to workers and 10565 communities. 10566 10567 And to be clear, EPA has the authority to consider critical and essential uses of chemicals. There is no 10568 evidence that we need to compromise between public health and 10569 a clean energy future. In fact, under current new chemical 10570

10571 reviews, EPA is able to support the introduction of new energy-related chemicals into the market while protecting 10572 10573 human health and the environment. It is crucial that chemicals for these technologies be 10574 produced and used in a manner that does not harm vulnerable 10575 groups such as workers and frontline communities. I support 10576 my colleagues amendment. It would ensure that considering 10577 10578 the mounting concerns and evidence that at least some PFAS chemicals may pose health risks, EPA conduct thorough health 10579 protective reviews and manage the risks associated with the 10580 chemicals before workers and families are exposed. 10581 10582 I say to my colleagues people used to think I am a lousy cook. I use Teflon pans. Teflon had the PFAS. 10583 It is in socks. It is in cosmetics. It was in food wrappers. It --10584 we just got a new study showing that it was 100 percent in 10585 every fish that was caught in the Great Lakes. That is why I 10586 have championed the PFAS Action Act, and why I will continue 10587 10588 to advocate for a strong regulatory framework for PFAS 10589 chemicals. I urge my colleagues to support my -- Ms. Clarke's 10590 amendment. I strongly encourage my Republican counterparts 10591

So we have been talking about the Lautenberg Act today, 10823 obviously, which is the TSCA reform bill passed back in 2016. 10824 And by the way, it was passed with overwhelming bipartisan 10825 support. I think there was only three Republicans on the 10826 10827 House floor who did not support it. Every Republican in this committee reported it when it was -- or supported it when it 10828 got reported out, and I think there is still 13 Republicans 10829 here from that time that supported the bill. 10830 So I wanted to emphasize that the Republican support for 10831 creating a framework by which the EPA could review these 10832 chemicals up until this point has been pretty solid. 10833 that included strengthening the new chemicals program so that 10834 chemicals wouldn't enter the market without the appropriate 10835 EPA review, and the appropriate regulation that would go with 10836 10837 that. The bill that is being proposed here, the Elimination of 10838 Future Technology Delays Act, undermines these bipartisan 10839 reforms. As some of my colleagues have pointed out, it 10840

reverses key public health protections in the name of 10841 streamlining the reviews. And my concern -- and it is 10842 10843 shared, I think, by many certainly on our side of the aisle -- is that is going to endanger the health and safety of 10844 workers and consumers. 10845 Now, there has been a lot of talk about delays at EPA, 10846 and that is sort of being cited as the rationale for this 10847 10848 proposal. But the GAO report that has been cited here that 10849 did, yes, recognize and acknowledge there were some delays also pointed out that there is workforce capacity issues at 10850 the EPA. And that is really what needs to get addressed. 10851 In other words, it doesn't make sense to set up a 10852 10853 framework and say go do these important reviews, but then, because the agency doesn't have enough capacity and resources 10854 to conduct the reviews, to then immediately start dismantling 10855 the framework that you established. That is a backwards 10856 approach. And I am worried that that is what is happening 10857 10858 right here. In that GAO report there was a recommendation that EPA 10859 create a strategic plan to develop long-term strategies for 10860 recruiting, developing, and retaining the staff that you need 10861

10862 to support the increased workload of the office. In other words, we created that extra workload for the agency by 10863 10864 saying here is what you need to go do to protect Americans from these chemicals. Now that extra workload and the fact 10865 that we haven't provided enough support for them to do it is 10866 becoming the excuse to go undo the authority that they have. 10867 And again, that doesn't make any sense. 10868 10869 So the amendment that I am proposing here would require that EPA conduct the workforce planning efforts that were 10870 cited by the GAO before the act goes into effect. 10871 In other words, before this proposal that you put forward would go 10872 into effect, make sure that EPA is undertaking the efforts to 10873 10874 address the workforce issues. It would require GAO to certify that EPA has developed a workforce plan to support 10875 the chemical reviews conducted under the new chemicals 10876 program. 10877 So if you all really want to speed up the reviews -- and 10878 10879 you keep talking about these delays, the impact it is having in terms of critical energy resources, and so forth -- let's 10880 make sure the office has the tools, the capacity, the 10881 workforce to do these reviews in a responsible way. 10882

10938 *Mr. Tonko. Thank you. So back to the support of Representative Sarbanes's amendment. 10939 10940 At the subcommittee markup I expressed my concerns about this bill. I really do not believe that any given Secretary 10941 of Energy should be assumed to be an expert so as to 10942 determine a chemical's potential risks to public health 10943 workers or the environment. So I cannot support allowing a 10944 10945 DoE determination to short circuit EPA's new chemical review 10946 process, or allow costs to be taken into consideration in the risk assessment stage. 10947 There is no question that the Lautenberg Act, which 10948 transformed TSCA, asked EPA to do much more. Before TSCA 10949 10950 reform, nearly 80 percent of new chemicals entered commerce without a formal determination from EPA about the chemical's 10951 safety. The Lautenberg Act provided EPA with new authorities 10952 to better protect Americans from chemical risks, including 10953 requiring an affirmative determination on every new chemical 10954 10955 before it entered the market. And for several years following that bill's enactment, EPA was asked to do more 10956 with less. 10957 During the Trump Administration we saw budget requests 10958

Madam Chair, I seek recognition to speak in favor of 1141. 11423 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 11424 minutes. 11425 *Mr. Pfluger. Thank you, Madam Chair. 11426 11427 Yesterday Secretary Granholm said that she is so grateful for the relief high American oil and natural gas 11428 production has brought to Europe in the wake of Russia's 11429 invasion of Ukraine. And while I couldn't agree more, this 11430 is quite a departure from the Administration's rhetoric for 11431 11432 the past two years, and an even bigger departure from their 11433 policies. Climate advisor John Kerry also recognized the 11434 unbelievable technological capacity of U.S. natural gas and 11435 oil companies, and he is right to do so. As of 2021, the 11436 11437 U.S. emission intensity level was three times lower than China, four times lower than India, and over four times lower 11438 than former Soviet Union countries. This decline in 11439 emissions is due to increased production of U.S. natural gas. 11440

Even as the industry sets production records, methane 11441 emissions from oil and gas have continued their downward 11442 11443 trend nearly 9 percent since 2005, 4 percent since 2020, and, all in all, for several decades, almost 15 percent without 11444 the government telling them to do any of this. 11445 Between 2005 and 2019, CO2 emissions from the U.S. power 11446 sector declined by 28 percent, with the generation of power 11447 11448 from natural gas accounting for more than half of said 11449 decline. American producers accomplished these reductions in emissions while increasing production and helping wean Europe 11450 off Russian gas due to free market policies, not government 11451 11452 intervention. My legislation being marked up today, the Natural Gas 11453 Tax Repeal Act will repeal the ill-conceived tax included in 11454 the IRA, which, if implemented, will handicap technological 11455 innovation, reduce supplies of affordable energy, and 11456 increase both cost and emissions. 11457 11458 I would like to enter a letter for the record, Madam Chair, that was written in 2021 by members of this -- several 11459 Democratic members of this committee, in fact, a Democratic 11460 letter to the former leadership, including Speaker Pelosi. 11461

It will move America further away from energy independence, and it will 11482 slow technological advances towards more efficient ways of 11483 doing business. It is unfortunate that, even when writing 11484 this letter, they still voted in favor of the IRA bill. 11485 11486 If you really want to start reducing greenhouse gases, then produce here. Remember when a witness in this room just 11487 several weeks ago said, and I quote, "Air knows no 11488 boundaries.'' He was a climate activist, and he was right. 11489 And because of that we should reward the location and the 11490 area where we are producing cleaner and more efficiently, 11491 where we have done much more than the rest of the world, and 11492 not because the government is telling us, but because 11493 industry and innovation lead, and they do the right thing, 11494 and it is because they are providing affordable, reliable 11495 11496 energy here and for our allies. But instead, the President wants to reward China, 11497 Russia, OPEC, and foreign producers instead of actually 11498 cutting emissions. Air knows no boundaries, but yet we are 11499

11500 outsourcing the production of energy, which is much less efficient and dirtier, with higher methane emissions and 11501 11502 other toxins than our own production and our own reductions. Every witness that we have had in this Congress has 11503 testified that hydrocarbons and fossil fuels will continue to 11504 increase, and that they are here to stay. Any realistic view 11505 of energy demand understands that they are going to grow in 11506 11507 quantity. Let's reward quality. Stop this madness. Stop the assault. Produce here. 11508 So I urge a yes vote on the passage of H.R. 1141 to 11509 repeal this tax, unleash American energy, and stop punishing 11510 American producers. 11511 11512 With that, I yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 11513 further discussion? 11514 The ranking member is recognized for five minutes. 11515 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair. And I respect 11516 11517 Mr. Pfluger, but I just want to say that I really disagree with your analysis of what this methane provision in the 11518 Inflation Reduction Act would do. 11519 First of all, I want to say that methane has a warming 11520

11521 capability 80 times greater than carbon dioxide. literally a super pollutant. More than half of the warming 11522 11523 that we will experience over the next 20 years will be from the continued release of methane and other short-lived 11524 pollutants due to current emissions. And we have to work to 11525 limit methane emissions immediately if we want to effectively 11526 tackle climate change and protect public health. 11527 11528 When we -- when some of us -- and there were some Republicans, too -- came -- went to the Paris -- the last 11529 Paris conference -- I can't remember if it was in Egypt, I 11530 think it was in Egypt -- we were very proud of the fact that 11531 we could go there and say that the United States was taking 11532 11533 the lead on reducing methane, because it really was one of the major, if not the major thing that countries, pursuant to 11534 the Paris Agreement, were trying to effectuate. 11535 And what I want to stress is really two things, that if 11536 you cut methane pollution from oil and gas, it is one of the 11537 11538 most immediate and cost effective ways to slow the rate of global warming but at the same time improving air quality and 11539 protecting public health. And if you focus on this super 11540 pollutant, it will bring much-needed protection to 11541

11542 communities living near these polluting facilities, many of which are in my home state of New Jersey. 11543 11544 But what I really want to stress is to talk briefly about how we got to this, because I think there is a lot of 11545 confusion on the part of the Republicans about what this 11546 provision does that you are trying to repeal. The original 11547 provision in the House-passed Build Back Better Act basically 11548 11549 was a mandate to industry to eliminate methane pollution over 11550 a period of time. And I guess you would have called that maybe a command and control provision. 11551 But there were Democrats in the Senate who refused to 11552 adopt this procedure. They said that in their states that 11553 they believe that industry could support a methane reduction 11554 plan if certain conditions were met. And that is what we 11555 did. They said, first of all, we don't want it to be a 11556 regulation, we want it to be an incentive through a tax to 11557 actually address this issue. 11558 11559 And they said that what they were really trying to do was to make sure that, if they got a permit to capture the --11560 to set up the pipes and capture the permit so it could be 11561 reused, which they supported, and we didn't impose any kind 11562

11563 of a fee while they were trying to accomplish that, or even if they couldn't get the permit, that we would extend it and 11564 11565 there would be no fee until they actually had the permit and provided them with financial incentives before there was any 11566 fee, that they could support this. 11567 And so the program actually provides \$1.5 billion to 11568 fund and provide assistance to accelerate reduction from 11569 11570 petroleum and natural gas systems. And about half of that was for small producers. The biggest concern was for the 11571 small producers. 11572 So what I want you to understand is that this was done 11573 with industry. I am sure there is always going to be some 11574 industry people that say, well, let's repeal it. But it 11575 really was done with industry. It was done as a way of 11576 trying to capture the methane and reusing it, and it was done 11577 in a way that provides the money up front before any penalty 11578 would actually be imposed. And if the EPA didn't give you 11579 11580 the permit because it was taking too long -- because there was some concern about that -- you didn't have to pay any fee 11581 until you actually got the permit. 11582 So I don't know how to -- I guess the reason I am so --11583

11584 I mean, in many ways, I think that this bill is kind of the most egregious to me, because we went -- of everything that 11585 11586 is being discussed today -- because we went so far to, you know, deal with the industry, come up with something that 11587 wasn't command and control, come up with something that was 11588 actually going to have a significant impact on reducing a 11589 terrible pollutant without really hurting anybody in any 11590 11591 significant way. And I know my time is about to run out, but I really 11592 think this is a step in the wrong direction. And I think --11593 and I don't want to tell you that you don't know what you are 11594 doing, but I really think that if you look at what is 11595 actually being accomplished here, it is not at all what you 11596 think. It is not this mandate. It is not a command and 11597 control. It is an -- actually, a way of trying to 11598 incentivize the oil and gas industry to do the right thing. 11599 And for the most part, they don't object to it. 11600 11601 So, you know, again, I don't -- you know, I don't know if you are going to believe me, but this is the history of 11602 what we were trying to accomplish. And I just wanted you to 11603 know that. 11604

So, you know, that is why I oppose this bill, for all 11605 these reasons. Thank you, Madam Chair. 11606 11607 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there further discussion? 11608 The gentleman from Texas, for what purpose do you seek 11609 recognition? 11610 *Mr. Burgess. Thank you, Madam Chair. I seek to yield 11611 11612 time to Mr. Pfluger for the purpose of response. 11613 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 11614 minutes. *Mr. Pfluger. Thank you, Madam Chair. I appreciate the 11615 dialogue, but I think the facts here don't support what we 11616 11617 just heard. 11618 First off, there was no Republican say in the IRA. There was no Republican discussion. There was no work that 11619 was done across the aisle with any Member of the opposite 11620 11621 party. 11622 And in the field hearing, which I referred to in our subcommittee markup, we went to Midland, Texas. We talked to 11623 the producers. We engaged with local trade organizations, 11624 and we had these conversations. And quite frankly, not a 11625

11626 single one of them likes this. But I think the thing we can agree on is every single 11627 11628 one of them talked to us about the methods, tactics, techniques, and procedures that they have demonstrated 11629 reducing methane over the past couple of decades. 11630 have done it at a level -- while we have increased crude oil 11631 production to the tune of 1 million barrels to now over 5.5 11632 11633 million barrels in the Permian Basin, they have done it to the level where natural gas production has now risen to a 11634 level where we, as the United States of America, are the 11635 11636 number-one producer. And so I appreciate the ability to have this discussion. We are already doing this. And so no, I 11637 11638 don't believe that industry was consulted. Those that have the most to lose on this are the 11639 independent producers who produce 85 to 90 percent of the 11640 crude oil, natural gas, and hydrocarbon production in our 11641 country. And that is why this is, to me, egregious, is 11642 11643 because we should be celebrating the fact that they are doing this on their own, and not actually penalizing them. 11644 should be penalizing countries like China and others in the 11645 form of near-shoring production here, keeping the jobs in the 11646

11731 Inflation Reduction Act in late August, it had already passed the House. It was discussions with Senate Democrats who, you 11732 11733 know, we wanted to make sure that they supported this, who changed it from the Build Back Better Act. It was not Senate 11734 11735 Republicans. But it was definitely with the small producers. 11736 want you to think that this was something that, you know, 11737 11738 Exxon or Mobil, whatever, came to us and wanted to do. was the small producers who were concerned about having to 11739 meet a permit deadline and not having the resources to 11740 achieve it. And that is where we said -- I think, of this 11741 1.5 billion, about 800 million was specifically for those 11742 small, independent producers that you mentioned. 11743 And I am not going to go through the list here, I don't 11744 have the document, but they were the ones that were concerned 11745 that, if we just mandated this as opposed to providing a 11746 financial incentive up front to them before they actually had 11747 11748 -- were forced to pay any kind of a fine or fee, and specifically that if there was a problem getting the permits 11749 to do the pipes and capture the methane, that they -- that no 11750 penalty or fee would be imposed on them until they were 11751

11752 actually able to get the permit. So that is what I am talking about. We did go out of 11753 our way to change this significantly to achieve that purpose. 11754 And again, I am sure, if they had a choice, they would say, 11755 "Well, just repeal this thing outright rather than do what 11756 you are doing, Pallone.'' But it was definitely done in that 11757 regard, and it changed significantly from what was in Build 11758 11759 Back Better because of the conversations and negotiations with those small, independent producers. 11760 I mean, you don't have to believe me, but I just wanted 11761 you to know -- I had to state this, because I do think that 11762 this is a kind of a win-win situation for everybody: you 11763 reduce this terrible super pollutant, you achieve the goals 11764 of the Paris Agreement. And sure, maybe China is not going 11765 to go along with it, but we set the precedent that we are the 11766 best actor, if you will, which I don't think is a bad thing. 11767 And I don't think we do it in a way that is really harmful to 11768 11769 anyone or raises costs. And remember, once this methane is captured it is 11770 reused. So it is even -- I mean, from -- I think it is a 11771 total win-win situation. 11772

And just to give you a little flavor, 11809 colleagues, of the -- what is in these letters, first from 11810 11811 the Evangelical Environmental Network, "As pro-life evangelicals, we have a special concern for the unborn. 11812 We want children to be born healthy and unhindered by the 11813 ravages of pollution even before they take their first 11814 The medical community has long known that unborn 11815 11816 children are especially vulnerable to environmental impacts. Of these impacts, fossil fuels are the most serious threat to 11817 children's health worldwide. 11818 Currently, 17.3 million Americans, including 3.9 million 11819 children under 18, live within a half mile radius of an 11820 active oil and gas production operation. In Pennsylvania 11821 alone, that amounts to 1.4 million total individuals and over 11822 200,000 children. This makes addressing fugitive and leaking 11823 methane from both existing and new oil and gas facilities a 11824 biblical and moral mandate to defend the unborn and all of 11825 God's children.'' 11826 Then, from the Climate Action Network that includes the 11827 Environmental Defense Fund that has done extensive work on 11828 methane control, they write, "Reducing oil and gas methane 11829

11830 emissions is one of the most efficient and effective ways to 11831 address climate change, reduce needless waste, and protect 11832 the health of millions of Americans living in or around active oil and gas sites. 11833 11834 AFTER 6:00 p.m. Congress made clear that addressing methane was a 11835 priority when they passed the Methane Emissions Reduction 11836 11837 Program in the Inflation Reduction Act last year. The groups listed below strongly oppose efforts to repeal the MERP by 11838 passing the Natural Gas Tax Repeal Act or through other 11839 means. Doing so would harm the climate, impair public 11840 health, increase waste, and cost our economy valuable jobs." 11841 11842 I think, like Ranking Member Pallone stated, this bill is dangerous, and it is why it is attracting so much 11843 opposition all across the spectrum. Methane pollution is a 11844 potent greenhouse gas. It causes 25 percent of today's 11845 global heating all across the chain, from extraction to 11846 11847 distribution to burning it. Cutting methane waste and pollution from oil and gas production is the fastest way to 11848 slow the harmful, costly impacts of the climate crisis. 11849 There was a report out just this week from the 11850

International Energy Agency that laid out a scary surge that 11851 11852 is going on in methane pollution and waste from oil and gas. 11853 We are at the highest levels right now, measured, when it comes to methane pollution. 11854 While it is a very significant threat, cleaning up 11855 methane also presents an enormous opportunity to create jobs, 11856 to create jobs plugging the wells, plugging the leaks, 11857 11858 reducing pollution. And at a time that we know that the oil and gas industry has banked enormous profits, I do not think 11859 it is too much to ask that we work through this initiative in 11860 a collaborative way to plug the leaks, eliminate waste, work 11861 together on developing the modern tools necessary to find and 11862 11863 repair these leaks and phase out flaring. And if all of that wasn't enough, my amendment is pretty 11864 simple. Another major problem with this Republican bill is 11865 that it will increase the Federal deficit. So yes, on the 11866 day that the President submits his budget, we are all focused 11867 11868 on ways to cut the debt and the deficit. The bill will eliminate billions of dollars in revenue. And that is why my 11869 amendment would require CBO to certify that it will not 11870 increase the Federal deficit before this act can go into 11871

effect. If our GOP colleagues believe this bill will not 11872 increase the Federal deficit, no harm in supporting my 11873 11874 amendment. 12240 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 12241 12242 Yes, the gentleman from Alabama, Mr. Palmer. Thank you, Madam Chair. I would like to *Mr. Palmer. 12243 speak in favor of H.R. 1023. 12244 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 12245 minutes to strike the last word to speak in favor. 12246 12247 *Mr. Palmer. Thank you, Madam Chair. My bill to repeal 12248 the Greenhouse Reduction Fund is a great opportunity to right some of the wrongs that were in the misnamed Inflation 12249 Reduction Act. 12250 While millions of American families and senior citizens 12251 12252 are struggling to make ends meet because of inflation caused in large part by the -- by higher energy costs, Congress 12253 should not have established this \$27 billion slush fund for 12254 green advocacy groups. 12255 For almost a decade, climate alarmists have advocated 12256 12257 for a national green bank to fund the rush to green. idea wasn't popular enough to pass in stand-alone 12258 legislation. So in pure Washington, D.C. fashion, it was 12259 stuffed into the 700-page Inflation Reduction Act and jammed 12260

12261 through Congress. Meanwhile, more and more Americans with less means were being pushed into energy poverty by these 12262 12263 left-wing energy policies. Democrat and Biden Administration energy policies have 12264 driven up household energy costs and the cost of all goods 12265 and services. These policies have undermined our economic 12266 security and, I believe, undermined the security of millions 12267 12268 of American households. There are over 20 million American households right now that are behind on paying their 12269 household energy bills. That is one in six households that 12270 can no longer afford their utility bills. And because of 12271 much higher inflation, they are struggling with higher food 12272 12273 and medicine prices, higher costs for school supplies and clothing for themselves and their children. 12274 These are the realities of Democrat and Biden 12275 Administration policies undermining our economic security and 12276 now, I believe, our national security. 12277 12278 As I pointed out previously, the modern world depends on four things: cement, steel, plastics, and fertilizer. As a 12279 result of the cutbacks in energy and the changes in energy 12280 policy that we have experienced in the last few years, we are 12281

12282 losing these energy intensive industries to China. China now produces 61 percent of the world's cement, 31 percent of the 12283 12284 world's plastics, and 50 percent of the world's steel, all of which is needed for the construction of turbines and solar 12285 arrays, and all of which are needed to raise people out of 12286 poverty and are essential to our national security. 12287 As we should all have learned from the war in Ukraine, 12288 12289 no nation should allow itself to become dependent on an 12290 adversarial nation for anything essential to our economy and our national security. That is exactly what the Democrat and 12291 Biden Administration policies are doing by forcing America to 12292 rely on solar arrays and wind turbines for the energy we need 12293 12294 to power our economy and our homes, and their goal of eliminating the use of natural gas. We would make America 12295 dependent on China, which -- and China, with the Communist 12296 Party in charge, is very clearly a powerful adversary. 12297 We are facing enormous threats to our energy security, 12298 12299 reliability, and affordability. This is not due to a shortage of resources. It is the result of the failure to 12300 improve and expand our natural gas hydrocarbon 12301 infrastructure. It is due to policies that undermine 12302

12303 investment and that have created disincentives because of 12304 excessive regulations. It is due to the reckless closing of 12305 hydrocarbon energy generation facilities and attempting to replace them with renewables. This has resulted in a net 12306 loss of power output that we are being warned will lead to 12307 rolling blackouts, not just in California but across the 12308 nation. 12309 12310 As I have already stated, this is no longer just about our economic security. It is a matter of national security 12311 that we must take action to address. The North American 12312 Reliability Corporation has warned that the greatest threat 12313 to the U.S. power grid is changing the resource mix. 12314 12315 has also stated that natural gas is a critical, reliable source for power generation. It is the reliability fuel that 12316 keeps the lights on and keeps manufacturing plants, offices, 12317 grocery stores, retail businesses, and hospitals open. NARC 12318 and other energy experts are already warning that whole 12319 12320 sections of America will face rolling blackouts. Again, this will not only compromise our economy and hurt American 12321 households, but also compromise our national security. 12322 The Chinese Communist Party understands what is at 12323

They are building a coal-fired power plant every two 12324 weeks, and reports indicate that the CCP has built 14 outside 12325 12326 of China. Taking this into account, along with the fact that we will not reach net zero by 2050 should make it clear that 12327 it is pure folly to continue to dismantle our hydrocarbon 12328 energy infrastructure, which is exactly the intent of the big 12329 green slush fund. 12330 12331 Aside from borrowing money that increases our debt, these funds will be used to continue the Democrat and Biden 12332 Administration assault on America's hydrocarbon 12333 infrastructure. The United States is literally an energy 12334 superpower with energy resources that far exceed our needs, 12335 12336 resources that can meet the needs of Europe and Latin America, that can lift billions out of poverty from among the 12337 world's poorest regions, that can save millions of lives. By 12338 expanding our ability to meet these needs, we can not only 12339 generate much-needed revenues to reduce our deficit, but 12340 12341 create tremendous goodwill and better geopolitical relations. I urge my colleagues to support H.R. 1023, and I yield 12342 back. 12343

12369 *Mr. Johnson. The gentlelady is recognized for five minutes in support of her amendment. 12370 12371 *Mrs. Dingell. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Here is a reality: the climate crisis is an existential threat to our 12372 way of life and the planet. And anybody who has seen the 12373 wildfires, the hurricanes, the floods in the Midwest knows 12374 that something is happening in our lives. 12375 12376 In a 2022 report by the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, it is clear the scientific community 12377 expects more extreme conditions over the next 30 years, 12378 regardless of what we do. But the experts still believe we 12379 have a window of time to collectively act and avert the worst 12380 12381 scenarios. That is why Congress passed the Inflation Reduction Act, a historic package that will provide resources 12382 and incentives to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions and 12383 address climate change. 12384 And to my colleague, I want to see that steel, that 12385 12386 concrete, and automobiles and about 1,000 other products -how about pharmaceuticals -- brought back home and produced 12387 here. But it is far more complex than the simplicity of --12388 they -- China is attacking us for many reasons. 12389 That is

12390 another day. 12391 In fact, analysis indicates that, as a result of this 12392 significant legislation, the United States will reduce its emissions by over 42 percent. This is a notable decrease in 12393 our greenhouse gas emissions, putting us on a path to meet 12394 our climate goals. 12395 Included in the IRA was the creation of the Greenhouse 12396 12397 Gas Reduction Fund. As one of its original authors, this program will provide \$27 billion to state, local, and non-12398 profit entities to accelerate clean energy deployment and 12399 reduce greenhouse gas emissions. This fund will leverage 12400 private investment, amplifying the impact for communities 12401 12402 nationwide, especially those that will be disproportionately burdened by our warming climate. 12403 We have seen it work, and that is why I am deeply 12404 disappointed that my Republican counterparts are working to 12405 repeal this program. And it is not just wind and solar. 12406 12407 should be looking at hydrogen and fuel cells and many other alternative sources of energy. My amendment would ensure 12408 that the U.S. Government is able to meet its climate goals 12409 before repealing sections of the most significant climate law 12410

in history. 12411 Specifically, before this legislation could go into 12412 12413 effect, my amendment would require the EPA administrator to certify that the United States will reduce its emissions by 12414 at least 42 percent below 2005 levels: the expected emission 12415 reduction as a result of passing the Inflation Reduction Act. 12416 Climate change is real. It is warming. And we must 12417 12418 take action to address our greenhouse gas emissions if we have any hope of mitigating the worst impacts of climate on 12419 communities across the nation. 12420 This bill is aimed at repealing this transformational 12421 program without a plan to address climate crisis, and robbing 12422 12423 communities of a once-in-a-generation opportunity. Instead 12424 of working to address the climate crisis, my colleagues want to live in the past. 12425 Look, I am a car girl. I told the industry we had to 12426 change, and we are working at it. 12427 12428 Continuing down this path comes at the expense of clean air, the health of American families, good-paying, clean 12429 energy jobs, and, frankly, our future. This novel program is 12430 meant to strengthen our domestic energy independence and 12431

lower greenhouse gas emissions. 12432 I urge all my colleagues to support this important 12433 12434 amendment. Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and I yield back. 12435 The gentleman from -- what is the purpose 12436 *Mr. Johnson. for -- why does the gentleman from Alabama seek recognition? 12437 *Mr. Palmer. I move to strike the last word and speak 12438 12439 in opposition to the amendment. 12440 *Mr. Johnson. The gentleman is recognized for five 12441 minutes. *Mr. Palmer. First of all, one of the things that 12442 really disappoints me in regard to my colleagues is that they 12443 12444 have been misinformed about particularly what the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has said about 12445 extreme weather, and floods, and things like that. 12446 latest report concludes that there is no consensus that human 12447 activity has had any influence. Read the report. Read the 12448 12449 report. I will be happy to read it to you, if you can't read it, if you can't understand it. I mean, there is physics 12450 involved here with the production of energy. 12451

I mean, this idea that you are going to move your

12452

12453 concrete and your steel back to the United States without 12454 natural gas, I mean, I worked for two international 12455 engineering companies, I have a really good idea of what it takes to produce energy, to build things. I worked in 12456 environmental systems to reduce air pollution. We built the 12457 systems to reduce air pollution, and we have reduced the 12458 criteria gases that the EPA tracks emissions by 86 percent, 12459 12460 and we have reduced CO2 emissions on a per capita basis by 32 percent. It is because we have converted to natural gas. 12461 Ιf you eliminate natural gas completely, you will reduce the 12462 world food supply by half. 12463 I mean, I don't know where you come up with some of this 12464 12465 stuff, but I think we are in a existential crisis right now. China is an existential threat. There is no question about 12466 it. Our debt is an existential threat. We need to be 12467 investing in infrastructure that will allow us not only to 12468 meet our own economic needs, to meet our food needs, but also 12469 12470 to create a geopolitical alliance with the rest of the world that allows us to provide for them, as well. 12471 And I just don't get this, Mr. Chairman, where folks are 12472 coming from with this. Our objective here is to make sure 12473

that American people have the economic security that they 12474 need, that senior citizens can afford to adequately heat and 12475 12476 cool their homes, that they can afford their food and medicine. You -- we have already seen a massive increase in 12477 inflation because of the Biden Administration's energy 12478 policies. Everything you consume, everything you use, 12479 everything you come in contact with has an energy cost, and 12480 12481 you are driving it through the roof through these 12482 inflationary policies. So I urge my colleagues to reject this amendment, and 12483 support the passage of H.R. 1023. 12484 I yield back. 12485 12486 *Mr. Johnson. The gentleman yields back. Do other members wish to speak on the amendment? 12487 *Ms. Castor. Yes. 12488 *Mr. Johnson. For what purpose does the gentlelady from 12489 Florida seek recognition? 12490 12491 *Ms. Castor. To strike the last word to speak in favor 12492 of the Dingell amendment. *Mr. Johnson. The gentlelady is recognized for five 12493 minutes. 12494

12495 *Ms. Castor. Well, thank you very much, Mr. Chairman. 12496 You know, you don't have to listen to the world's top 12497 scientists to understand we are in a climate crisis. But what the ICPP recently said in their last report is there is 12498 a rapidly closing window for us to avoid the catastrophic, 12499 costly impacts of the climate crisis. 12500 And thank goodness people across the country came 12501 12502 together last year to support the Inflation Reduction Act, our historic climate law that pairs very well with the 12503 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law in rebuilding America's 12504 manufacturing and supply chains through the CHIPS and Science 12505 12506 Act. 12507 One of the most important pieces of the Inflation Reduction Act is this innovative Greenhouse Gas Reduction 12508 Fund. And I want to thank Mrs. Dingell for working so hard 12509 over a number of years to chart the course for this 12510 innovative financing tool, along with a lot of other members 12511 who have worked on it here. It is a first-of-its-kind 12512 initiative that will provide competitive grants to mobilize 12513 financing to leverage private capital for clean energy and 12514 climate projects that reduce climate pollution. 12515

12516 We have a -- we pay special attention to the communities across America that have long carried the -- a 12517 12518 disproportionate burden of pollution to make sure that they are participating in the benefits, the cost savings that 12519 cheaper energy, clean energy will provide. Think of it as a 12520 clean energy and sustainability accelerator. 12521 Financers are very excited about this, and others back 12522 12523 home are thrilled about it because it does provide some flexibility, and it allows America's entrepreneurs and the 12524 scientific community to develop the tools that we need to 12525 compete and to help the entire world transition to a clean 12526 12527 energy economy. 12528 In fact, I will ask unanimous consent to submit for the record a letter from the National Association of Counties, 12529 National League of Cities, the U.S. Conference of Mayors, our 12530 folks back home who are close to the ground. And really, 12531 they say they are encouraged. They see the Greenhouse Gas 12532 12533 Reduction Fund as a way to award grants and loans for zeroemissions technologies. They think, if this bill is enacted, 12534 local governments across the country will lose access to 12535 critical funding needed to bring affordable, clean energy to 12536

12571 doesn't mean you don't believe it is real. Obviously, you think that climate change is real, and that we should be 12572 12573 doing something about it, which is what you said. 13082 Refineries Act. And my colleagues are looking at me like they want me to, instead of, you know -- I will only spend 45 13083 13084 minutes on this, so everyone just calm down. [Laughter.] 13085 *Mr. Crenshaw. Look, this just rolls back a misquided 13086 EPA rule that seeks to eliminate refineries that use 13087 hydrofluoric acid. For some reason the EPA has decided that 13088 13089 hydrofluoric acid is super dangerous, and that they have to switch to sulfuric acid, which is not exactly something you 13090 would bathe in. 13091 Also, you have to use three times more sulfuric acid, 13092 and transport it three times more. So if anything, there is 13093 13094 three times more likely to have a big accident with sulfuric acid. I am not sure why we would want to switch to that. 13095 Hydrofluoric acid refineries make up about 50 percent of 13096 our capacity, nationwide. So if you try to eliminate those, 13097 you are going to see a skyrocketing price in gas, and I don't 13098 13099 think our public wants that very much. Now, of course, industrial processes have risks, but no 13100 industry is more scrutinized by the busybodies at EPA than 13101 oil and gas, who has the refining industry at the top of its 13102

13103 enforcement list. And some of those regulations are probably 13104 good things, but not -- it doesn't mean that 10 more are 13105 actually better. We have got to dispel a couple of myths, too, number one 13106 that the EPA rules just wants to require an analysis for 13107 safer alternatives. Okay, but we know how policy works here, 13108 right? You do that analysis, and then you create a narrative 13109 13110 about why you have to actually ban it. And I have noticed that the folks who are for this have literally said they 13111 think these refineries should disappear. So I think the cat 13112 13113 is out of the bag. I have already addressed the myth number two, that 13114 13115 sulfuric acid is safer. It is not. According to the CDC, it 13116 is corrosive, destructive to the skin, eyes, teeth, lungs. Severe exposure can result in death. Again, you wouldn't 13117 want to bathe in that, either, so I am not sure why that is a 13118 safer alternative. 13119 13120 Now, there is two particular incidents that are used to justify this EPA rule, one at Torrance and one in 13121 Philadelphia. But at the instance at the Torrance refinery, 13122 no hydrofluoric acid was released. It is based on this idea 13123

13124 that a piece of debris might have hit a tank of hydrofluoric acid. In Philadelphia, a bunch was released, but the 13125 13126 Chemical Safety Board said it was unaware of any offsite impacts from the impacts of the HF release. So I am not sure 13127 what is going on here. 13128 We have also heard that blue-collar workers are 13129 demanding this EPA rule. That is interesting, because 13130 13131 actually in Torrance, when there was a big push from environmentalists to limit the use of hydrofluoric acid, it 13132 was the labor unions, and including the steelworkers, that 13133 actually fought back against it. And so in 2019 the South 13134 Coast Air Quality Management District voted against banning 13135 13136 the acid used at refineries in the state. Actually, a spokesperson for United Steelworkers at Local 675 said, "If 13137 we are going to advocate that our folks' jobs be gone, we 13138 have to be able to show them that we are taking care of their 13139 interests. Trade union leaders who advocate for social 13140 13141 policy that eliminates members' jobs without having alternatives are not trade union leaders for very long." 13142 But apparently, the EPA now thinks it knows better than the 13143 people and the workers of Torrance. 13144

13145 So, look, I just don't think we should be nonchalant about proposals that will lead to such devastating 13146 13147 consequences. This EPA rule could vastly constrict supply and drastically increase gas prices. 13148 Our problem in this country isn't that we have unsafe 13149 refineries. Our problem is that we don't have enough 13150 refineries. So let's not make the problem worse, and I urge 13151 13152 my colleagues to vote for my bill, which would roll back this ridiculous EPA rule. 13153 Thank you. I yield back. 13154 *Mr. Johnson. I have serious concerns with the bill under consideration, the Keeping 13179 America's Refineries Act, which would stop refineries from 13180 doing common-sense hazard assessments or assessments of safer 13181 technology options. 13182 13183 My amendment limits the impact of this bill by ensuring that refineries with poor safety records must still adhere to 13184 all the regulations set forth by the chemical disaster rule 13185 currently being undertaken by the Biden Administration. 13186 Refineries that have had actual or threatened accidental 13187 release of a regulated or extremely hazardous substance, or 13188 have been found in violation of the risk management program 13189 in the last 10 years would be covered by this amendment. 13190 This would make sure that refineries like the one in 13191 Philadelphia that had an explosion would need to explore how 13192 13193 it can limit its risk to the community. To really highlight why this amendment is important, I 13194 want to share a quote from a conversation I had with Jim 13195 Savage, a steelworker who worked at the PES refinery when it 13196

13197 had its explosion. And he said, and I quote, "I worked in the south PES refinery for 27 years until its closure in 13198 13199 September 2019. On June 21st, 2019, at 4:00 a.m., I was working in the refinery when it experienced massive 13200 explosions at the HF alkylation unit." 13201 And this continues, "There are about 30 people on the 13202 face of the Earth who were closer to the explosions than I 13203 13204 was. It was terrifying. Nobody should ever have to experience what me and my co-workers went through, either 13205 during the explosions or the unfortunate aftermath.'' Now 13206 Jim now works for the United Steelworkers as a legislative 13207 representative, pushing back against harmful bills like H.R. 13208 13209 1155. And his personal story is so important, I believe, in times like this. 13210 When the Chemical Safety Board did their investigation 13211 of the PES refinery incident, one of the recommendations was 13212 for EPA to require new and existing petroleum refineries with 13213 13214 HF alkylation units to conduct a safer technology and alternative analysis, and to evaluate the practicability of 13215 any inherently safer technology identified. And this bill 13216 would block EPA from implementing those critical 13217

Thank you very much, Madam Chair. 13577 I think both sides can agree that refineries are 13578 critical infrastructure for our nation. Because of that 13579 status, they can also be targets for external threats. My 13580 13581 position on the Homeland Security Committee has taught me that the best way to reduce the risk is to reduce the target. 13582 If hydrofluoric acid is a risk to the facility, the workers, 13583 the surrounding community, and the first responders that have 13584 to respond to a catastrophic event, then that facility has a 13585 13586 higher risk value than one using a safer alternative like 13587 sulfuric acid. The national security community has long outlined the 13588 potential threat posed by facilities using high-risk 13589 chemicals, as leaks and explosions have the potential to kill 13590 13591 and injure thousands. It is obvious to me that, to protect a critical facility, we should be promoting safer technology 13592 analysis so businesses know the full scope of options 13593 available for safety and risk management. I would much 13594

13595 rather these facilities look ahead at their options and plan for the worst case scenarios than allowing another tragic 13596 13597 chemical disaster to happen. We should not allow chemical infrastructure to continue 13598 operating as usual without considering future safety and risk 13599 mitigation; it is shortsighted and dangerous. With recent 13600 attacks on other critical infrastructure like those in North 13601 13602 Carolina and Washington on substations, it is vital that we secure potential targets like refineries, rather than making 13603 them more hazardous. 13604 So my amendment is simple. It would delay the effective 13605 date of the bill until the EPA administrator and any relevant 13606 13607 agency heads confirm that none of the provisions within this bill would increase the vulnerability of these facilities to 13608 external security threats. 13609 I see no reason why my colleagues can't agree to this 13610 amendment, and I recommend we all vote yes on this amendment. 13611 13612 Madam Chairwoman, I yield back.
