178 *The Chair. And the gentlelady is recognized for five minutes to speak on her amendment. 179 180 *Ms. Blunt Rochester. Thank you, Chair Rodgers. First I want to thank Mr. Bucshon for working with me to 181 find a bipartisan path forward on supply chains. Together we 182 found a way to create a comprehensive, credible, and robust 183 supply chains package that will strengthen both our economy 184 185 and our national security. In this committee we have seen the consequence of 186 weakened supply chains. From drug shortages before the 187 pandemic to masks and gowns during the pandemic, from lumber 188 and glass shortages impacting housing affordability and 189 availability to chips and minerals that power our consumer 190 electronics, defense systems, cell phones, and cars, bottom 191 line, supply chains touch the lives of every American, 192 whether they know it or not. And strengthening those supply 193 chains means making our lives better and products cheaper. 194 195 Today, after months of good-faith bipartisan negotiations, we are considering the bipartisan Promoting 196 Resilient Supply Chains Act that will help us map, monitor, 197 predict, and strengthen supply chains. It will make more 198

199 critical goods right here at home, and create good-paying jobs while lowering consumer costs. 200 201 The legislation I am proudly supporting today incorporates all of the key elements of the Supply Chains 202 Act, legislation that I am proud to have cosponsored with 203 Representatives Dingell, Kelly, and Wild. That legislation 204 garnered the support of over 160 organizations from labor to 205 206 the chamber. With this amendment, today's bipartisan legislation will 207 support steady government leadership by assigning the 208 responsibility for supply chain and American manufacturing 209 resilience to an assistant secretary in the Department of 210 Commerce. And I want to extend a special note of thanks to 211 Secretary Gina Raimondo, along with the team at the 212 Department of Commerce, for their partnership and leadership 213 on this vital issue. 214 The bill will support American innovation and take back 215 216 global leadership by setting the rules of the road with robust guidelines and best practices that will ensure 217 American businesses are a step ahead of their competitors. 218 Our bill will no longer position our country as passive 219

220 reactionaries to a supply chain crisis or shock by mandating the creation of a national strategy that elevates supply 221 222 chain resilience to the forefront of U.S. national policy. This comes at a time when events like the war in Ukraine are 223 increasing the price of goods for American families, or 224 American jobs are threatened by foreign actors like China on 225 the other side of the globe. 226 227 Finally, our bill will ensure important stakeholders are consulted while the Department of Commerce does its important 228 work, and it will ensure sensitive business information is 229 safeguarded while maintaining the normal course of legal and 230 judicial review. 231 232 Today we are taking action to ensure we win the global competition for our country's economic future, and the surest 233 way to win is to follow a simple premise: If we can make it 234 in America, then we should. 235 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 236 237 *The Chair. I am very pleased that my legislation, H.R. 5398, the Advancing Tech Startups Act, was included in 836 today's full committee markup. This bipartisan legislation 837 would require the Department of Commerce to study and report 838 on the impact of technology startups on the U.S. economy. 839 It also promotes a national strategy for encouraging 840 more tech-focused startups and small businesses in all parts 841 of the United States. As I have said before, you don't have 842 to be in Silicon Valley to successfully launch a tech 843 startup. The talent, sustainable cost structure, and 844 845 opportunity are available in many locations across the 846 country. Importantly, the study established by this legislation 847 also requires the development of a comprehensive list of 848

849 Federal agencies asserting jurisdiction over entities and industry sectors dedicated to the creation and growth of tech 850 851 startups, and to also identify all Federal rules and regulations as they relate to states, cities, or geographic 852 areas committed to the creation of technology startup 853 companies. This information can help identify barriers that 854 may hinder technology and small business startups from taking 855 856 root across the country. The last few years have served as a painful reminder of 857 the importance of creating products, supply chains, and 858 intellectual capital here at home. We can't rely on China or 859 anyone else, and we shouldn't. And we don't need to. 860 While we must ensure our supply chains are resilient in 861 a global economy, we must also be self-sufficient in critical 862 assets or critical areas. Is there 1077 further discussion? 1078 1079 The chair recognizes the ranking member for five 1080 minutes. *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair. I don't support 1081 the Advancing Gig Economy Act because there is already an 1082 extensive body of research on the gig economy and no 1083 justification, in my opinion, to spend Federal funds 1084 repeating that work. And at least some of those existing 1085 studies look at the positive and negative impacts of the gig 1086 economy. By contrast, the Advancing Gig Economy Act pre-1087 supposes that the gig economy is a net positive, ignoring the 1088 1089 harmful effect that this industry has on workers, consumers, safety, and the environment. 1090 Unlike workers classified as employees, gig workers are 1091 not entitled to minimum wage, overtime pay, unemployment 1092

1093 insurance, workers compensation, paid sick days, paid family leave, health and safety protections, the right to unionize, 1094 1095 and discrimination and sexual harassment protections. And without such core protections, it should be no surprise that 1096 14 percent of gig workers earn less than the Federal minimum 1097 wage, more than 29 percent of gig workers make less than the 1098 state minimum wage, and well over half of gig workers report 1099 1100 that they are seeking a new job. Now, some studies suggest that ride sharing drivers are 1101 far more likely to be involved in accidents than other 1102 drivers and ride hailing services contribute to more 1103 congestion and carbon emissions. Short-term rentals have 1104 1105 been scrutinized for lacking basic safety features typically found in traditional hotels like carbon monoxide detectors 1106 and fire safety protections. Directing the Department of 1107 Commerce to study only the benefits of the gig economy is not 1108 sound policy, in my opinion. 1109 1110 And the Advancing Gig Economy Act also fails to provide the Department of Commerce resources to carry out the study, 1111 which may have been diverted from the agency's other core 1112 functions. House Republicans are advancing legislation that 1113

would cut the Department of Commerce's funding by 13 percent, 1114 which is nearly \$2.7 billion below the President's budget 1115 1116 request. So can we really expect the Department of Commerce to do more with less? I don't think so. 1117 And for all these reasons, I oppose the bill and yield 1118 back, Madam Chair. 1119 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1120 1121 further discussion? Are there yes, for what purpose does Ms. Schakowsky 1122 seek recognition? 1123 *Ms. Schakowsky. Crucially, this 1228 information reporting does not affect the amount of tax a 1229 payee owes. It is simply a tool that helps ensure that tax 1230

1231 filers pay the amount they legally owe. This reform is projected to save an estimated \$9.7 billion in revenues from 1232 1233 non-compliance from 2023 to 2033, according to the Joint Committee on Taxation. 1234 The amendment directs the Department of Commerce to 1235 merely focus on the effect of this crucial reform on the gig 1236 economy, not on tax compliance or our efforts to reduce the 1237 1238 Federal deficit. That is just not balanced. 1239 Further, the Treasury Department, after careful study and evaluation, has recently delayed in the imposition of 1240 rules implementing the reform to reduce any potential 1241 confusion the new gig rules might create. Treasury has 1242 announced that they will phase in the reform to further 1243 reduce confusion and allow more time for taxpayers to prepare 1244 for these rules. Treasury is striking a sensible balance 1245 between supporting taxpayer awareness and compliance with 1246 existing tax law. 1247 1248 I encourage my colleagues to oppose this amendment, and I yield back the balance of my time. 1249 *The Chair. and Pittsburgh Pirates, I always enjoy going to a ball game. 1614 My hope is that fans of their respective ball clubs can enjoy 1615 1616 a seamless ticket-buying experience and attend games of course, concerts, too without hassle. 1617 H.R. 3950 will require ticket issuers, secondary market 1618 issuer and secondary market issuers, to clearly and 1619 conspicuously disclose at the beginning of the transaction 1620 1621 and throughout the ticket purchasing process the total ticket price for the event. We are ensuring that consumers know 1622 what the price will be of their event up front, preventing 1623 deceptive practices, confusing checkouts. 1624 I want to add also, given the significant support and 1625 we do have a letter of support, many letters of support from 1626 stakeholders from across the country and, of course, 1627 different communities that I have recommended to Chair 1628 Rodgers, and she has agreed that we combine the TICKETS bill 1629 with the STOP Act. I would like to ask my good friend and 1630 1631 vice chairman of the committee, Mr. Armstrong, to offer the AINS because he has been working with me very closely on this 1632 particular issue. That would then mean we do not bring up 1633 the STOP Act as a stand-alone bill. So this is an approach I 1634

1635 have been in touch with the minority knows all about this, and they have agreed. 1636 1637 Stakeholders spanning from consumer groups to businesses of all sizes agree that this common-sense price transparency 1638 measure addressed in our bill is definitely needed. 1639 In terms of the underlying bill's language that 1640 addresses disclosures related to so-called speculative 1641 1642 tickets, we have heard significant concerns that it may 1643 inadvertently be misinterpreted as legitimizing this practice. I don't believe that is the case, but we have 1644 heard this. I have worked hard to go further with 1645 1646 stakeholders on prohibiting the questionable practice of selling tickets that one doesn't possess. In that regard I 1647 am looking forward to the discussion we have on the AINS that 1648 will combine our language with the language of the STOP Act 1649 proposal we worked on, as well, which prohibits this 1650 practice. 1651 1652 I am thankful again for the chair and ranking member for working with us, as well as Ranking Member Pallone and 1653 Representative Pascrell. I know he has been working on this 1654 for many years. 1655

1656 I am glad we were able to address some of the priorities included in the Boss and Swift Act. They have been seeking 1657 1658 such progress, again, for some time now, and I am glad we could find consensus among Congress and stakeholders on 1659 portions of this bill. 1660 And again, I want to thank my ranking member on the 1661 subcommittee, Jan Schakowsky. She has really been great to 1662 1663 work with. So let me say this, too. This legislation has shown 1664 this committee can really deliver the entire markup, that 1665 is the case. And I hope it demonstrates to my friends across 1666 the aisle on and off the committee I have met with again on 1667 1668 the name image likeness bill. I wanted to get that in on college sports. I think that needs to be done right away in 1669 a bipartisan fashion. I look forward to working with them. 1670 I urge support for the AINS, which will be offered by 1671 Mr. Armstrong, and final passes for the biggest ticket reform 1672 1673 in years. So let's go. Thank you very much, and I appreciate it very much, 1674 Madam Chair, and I yield back. 1675 *The Chair. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 1676

1691 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes. 1692 1693 *Mr. Armstrong. Thank you, Madam Chair, and thanks to everybody on both sides of the aisle, particularly Chair 1694 Bilirakis, on working to, what he said, bring the most 1695 substantial change to this practice in a very, very long 1696 time. 1697 This amendment in the nature of a substitute makes 1698 conforming changes to the TICKET Act to reflect text that has 1699 passed the Senate's Commerce Committee, as well as inclusion 1700 of the Speculative Ticket Oversight Prohibitions, or the STOP 1701 1702 Act. 1703 This AINS includes the TICKET Act's inclusive ticket price disclosure provisions that will provide consumers with 1704 clear total price listings for an event ticket. 1705 The AINS also includes the STOP Act, which features a 1706 ban on speculative ticket sales unless the seller has actual 1707 1708 or constructive possession of the ticket. However, the bill allows for secondary sellers to offer a consumer a service to 1709 obtain an event ticket under certain controls, including 1710 clear disclosures that the service is not a ticket nor 1711

1712 quaranteed purchase of a ticket; or that the requirements to separate ticket event sales and the service with a separate 1713 1714 purchasing process; and finally, requirements for a full refund to the consumer for cost of the service and the ticket 1715 if the specified ticket is not procured or a comparable 1716 1717 ticket is considered insufficient, which is determined by the 1718 consumer. 1719 The bill also requires clear disclosures to guard against deceptive websites that seek to mislead customers. 1720 Finally, I understand concerns still remain over the 1721 specifics of the itemized disclosure for all-in ticket 1722 I remain committed as I as do other members on 1723 1724 this committee to working toward an agreement on that issue to ensure that consumers have accurate descriptions of the 1725 total cost of tickets and each associated fee. 1726 And with that I yield back. 1727 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1728 1729 further discussion? For what purpose does the ranking member seek 1730 recognition? 1731 *Mr. Pallone. To strike the last word, Madam Chair. 1732

1733 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes. 1734 Thank you, and I just wanted to start by 1735 *Mr. Pallone. applauding Chair Bilirakis, Ranking Member Schakowsky for all 1736 the work that they have done producing a bipartisan ticketing 1737 bill with strong protections for consumers. 1738 And I also commend my friend and colleague, 1739 1740 Representative Pascrell, for his years of leadership on improving in improving the ticketing experience for 1741 consumers and, in particular, all the hard work he has put 1742 into the Boss and Swift Act. 1743 1744 Now, regarding the amendment before us, I am pleased to 1745 see it incorporates my amendment from the subcommittee markup that mandates refund requirements and provides transparency 1746 for consumers. Consumers should not be left on the hook if 1747 an event is canceled or postponed, and should have the option 1748 to receive a full refund or comparable ticket to a 1749 1750 rescheduled show or game. Consumers should also know what they what the policy 1751 regarding refunds is for an event, and how to obtain a refund 1752 before they purchase a ticket. Both these concerns are 1753

1754 addressed in the amendment before us today, and I again thank the Ranking Member Schakowsky, Chair Bilirakis, and 1755 Representative Armstrong for working to ensure that language 1756 is included. 1757 Today the committee is taking an important first step in 1758 restoring fairness and transparency to the event ticket 1759 marketplace by mandating all-in pricing disclosure, banning 1760 1761 speculative ticketing, requiring refunds for cancellations or postponements, and prohibiting deceptively named websites. 1762 And while I believe there is still more that can be done to 1763 address anti-consumer practices in the ticketing space, this 1764 amendment and the underlying bill before us today will go a 1765 1766 long way in improving the ticket-buying experience for all 1767 fans. Bipartisan bills like the one before us exemplify how 1768 the members of this committee can work together to deliver 1769 meaning [sic] and impactful legislation for all consumers. 1770 1771 And again, I urge all my colleagues to support this amendment and the underlying bill. 1772 And I thank the chair. 1773 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1774

I 1823 1824 commend the work of my colleagues, Ms. Schakowsky and Mr. Bilirakis, to ensure this through their TICKET Act. 1825 I also commend the inclusion of a study to look at FTC 1826 enforcement in the years following the enactment of my bill, 1827 the Better Online Ticket Sales Act, or the BOTS act. 1828 1829 BOTS Act prohibits the use or sale of bots software, empowering consumers to fight back against tech savvy 1830 scalpers and print and price manipulators in the ticket 1831 industry. 1832 However, since it was signed into law by President Obama 1833 1834 in 2016, the FTC has settled just one case against defendants charged with violating the statute. Without enforcement, bot 1835 operators continue to act with impunity. The study is a good 1836 start, but the FTC must get serious about using the full 1837

1838 force of the BOTS Act to level the online ticket playing field for our consumers. If they report that they need 1839 better legal tools to stop bots, Congress should step in to 1840 further bolster the authority of the FTC in this fight 1841 against hackers, scalpers, and bots. 1842 I thank my colleagues for their work on this issue, and 1843 yield back, Madam Chair, the remainder of my time. 1844 1845 *The Chair. Thank you. The gentleman yields back. Ιs there further discussion? 1846 Mrs. Dingell, for what purpose do you seek recognition? 1847 *Mrs. Dingell. I move to strike the last word. 1848 *The Chair. They are driving up costs, and we know 1856 they are stifling competition in industries nationwide. And 1857 it is great to be working in a bipartisan way to proactively 1858

1859 take on junk fees to ensure corporate accountability and protect consumers. 1860 1861 The TICKET Act was spurred on by President Biden's initiative to target junk fees in consumer-facing industries. 1862 I would be remiss not to recognize, as the Ranking Member 1863 Pallone has did. He worked closely with Representative 1864 Pascrell on legislation to make ticket pricing transparent 1865 1866 and to improve the consumer experience through their legislation over the last several years. 1867 I know we can all agree that surprise junk fees for live 1868 events are an issue that must be addressed. Live events have 1869 been consistently cited as the source of confusion related to 1870 junk fees. I want to make sure everybody knows what they are 1871 paying for, but I have concerns around whether this bill 1872 should be applied to movie tickets. As the TICKET Act 1873 continues to move through the legislative process, I hope 1874 that we can talk about that, because we don't want to see, 1875 1876 inadvertently, ticketing for movie theaters to rise up in costs because of this. 1877 So I would ask that and thank you, Madam Chair, and I 1878 yield back. 1879

a micromobility device. 3275 There have been multiple fires related to this in 3276 3277 Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, especially due to defective batteries in hoverboards. These hoverboards were sold 3278 improperly without going through any testing by underwriter 3279 laboratories. There were two fires tied to this incident. 3280 The batteries were not compatible with the chargers that were 3281 3282 included with the hoverboards. 3283 It is important that we not only protect consumers, but also the first responders who are now being burdened by 3284 increased calls and the risk of death to put out fires 3285 related to these products. I urge my colleagues to help 3286 3287 protect consumers and first responders with this legislation. Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 3288 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 3289 further discussion? 3290 The chair for what purpose does Ms. Clarke seek 3291 3292 recognition? *Ms. Clarke. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 3293 word. 3294 *The Chair. 3296 minutes. Thank you, Madam Chair. I am glad to see 3297 *Ms. Clarke. 3298 this committee take up this meaningful legislation to protect consumers from faulty batteries in e-bikes and scooters. I 3299 am proud to support the Setting Consumer Standards of Lithium 3300 Ion Batteries, and urge my colleagues to do the same. 3301 Introduced with my colleagues from New York, 3302 3303 Representatives Torres, Garbarino, Ryan, Bowman, D'Esposito, Espaillat, and Goldman, this bill, which advanced unanimously 3304 at the subcommittee level, directs the Consumer Product 3305 Safety Commission to set a mandatory safety standard for 3306 lithium ion batteries in personal mobility devices such as 3307 3308 electric bikes and scooters. 3309 Fires caused by lithium ion batteries in e-bikes and other devices have already killed 18 people and injured a 133 3310 others in New York City this year. And we can add to that, 3311 unfortunately, this past Sunday another individual was killed 3312 3313 and six others injured. Since 2021 unsafe micromobility devices have been linked to hundreds of fires and over two 3314 dozen fatalities. By advancing this legislation we can 3315 protect consumers from fires caused by micromobility devices 3316

Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 3512 word and speak on the bill. 3513 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 3514 minutes. 3515 3516 *Mr. Balderson. Thank you, Madam Chair. The awning, I say that all the time, "yawning'' Awning 3517 Safety Act will add critical protections to these potential 3518 hazardous products. The bill requires the Consumer 3519 Protective Product Safety Commission, or CPSC, to develop a 3520 standard related to the fixed or freestanding awnings 3521 commonly seen in homes. This safety standard will prevent 3522 unexpected injuries and deaths. 3523 This past August the State of Ohio and this committee 3524 were struck tragically when Michael Nat, Olivia Shields's 3525 3526 father, began a seemingly mundane home project: taking down the retractable awning from the one-story home he and his 3527 beloved wife, Jill, had just purchased in 2022. Michael was 3528 on the ladder when the spring-loaded arm of the awning 3529

3530 unexpectedly shot out at him, forcing his ladder to tip and to fall. Upon impact he suffered a severe spinal cord injury 3531 3532 and lost consciousness nearly immediately. Jill, his wife, rushed to call 911, and she performed 3533 CPR on her husband for six minutes until the police and the 3534 paramedics arrived and took over. Michael was taken to 3535 Kettering Health's main campus, the same hospital where he 3536 3537 worked as a physician, and where he was surrounded by all his five children and son-in-laws within hours. He also received 3538 his last rites from a Catholic priest. 3539 After several agonizing days on life support, Michael 3540 3541 was pronounced dead, passing away at age 62. 3542 The owner's manual passed along to him by the home's previous owners did not include any warnings about the 3543 awning's retractable arms or safe ladder placement. 3544 I want to take a moment to speak about what an 3545 extraordinary person Michael was. 3546 3547 On August 9, a day after Michael passed, his colleagues, residents, and fellows lined the hallways of the hospital 3548 honoring Michael as he was taken to donate his organs to 3549 people in need of a second chance in life. 3550

3551 Following Michael's death, news spread throughout the many communities Michael impacted. As a physician in 3552 3553 maternal fetal medicine, Michael cared for and loved all people before they were even born. Michael was a faithful 3554 man and a devout Catholic. He was humble, calm, nurturing, 3555 and ready to jump into action to help those around him. 3556 Olivia, who is with us here today, showed me some of the 3557 3558 many Facebook posts where people shared her father's acts of kindness, many of which his family had never heard about. 3559 Ιn fact, one woman described him as having a heart of gold. 3560 many occasions, Michael gave his patients money for gas, 3561 meals, and warm clothes in the winter. He even bought one 3562 3563 woman a microwave. Olivia recalls one instance when he brought a mom her 3564 newborn baby and two other children into their home for a few 3565 days until he found them a safe and stable place to live, and 3566 another when he took his family to an Amish farm to pick up 3567 3568 eight children so they could spend Christmas with their mother who was battling cancer and just delivered a newborn 3569 boy. 3570

Two years ago The New York Times 3834 revealed how online suicide assistance forums, websites that 3835 3836 operate in the shadows of the Internet, encourage and facilitate suicide. Their activities have contributed to a 3837 rise in suicides using this chemical, sodium nitrite, which 3838 in low concentrations is safe and often used to cure meat and 3839

3840 However, in high concentrations sodium nitrite is toxic, at levels comparable to cyanide. 3841 3842 If that is not bad enough, it gets worse. While anonymous users promote the poison as a painless way to die 3843 by suicide, survivors tell a different story, detailing 3844 experiences of nausea, vomiting, intense stomach pains, heart 3845 palpitations as the substance chokes off oxygen delivery to 3846 3847 critical organs. When notified by my office of the product's 3848 popularization as a suicide method, many websites, including 3849 Amazon, that sold the product have taken down their listings 3850 or limited sales only to other businesses with a proven use 3851 3852 for it. But there are bad actors out there looking to capitalize on people experiencing suicidal ideation by 3853 creating websites for the sole purpose of selling this 3854 chemical as a suicide kit. And right now there is no law on 3855 the books to stop them from doing so. Madam Chair, the Youth 3856 3857 Poisoning Protection Act changes that by prohibiting the consumer sale of sodium nitrite products with a concentration 3858 higher than 10 percent, the usefulness threshold agreed upon 3859 by independent experts. 3860

I am thrilled to be able to introduce the Consumer 4143 Safety Technology Act, along with my dear friend from Texas, 4144 Representative Burgess, as well as Representatives Trahan, 4145 Guthrie, and Castor. 4146 4147 As technology continues to improve, we need to make sure our agencies are embracing new technologies. In short, the 4148 bad guys, they already have AI and other technologies that 4149 they are using. And so it is important that cops on the beat 4150 4151 have these technologies as well. 4152 We are excited to see that FTC will be able to will be 4153 doing studies on digital tokens. We will see the both consumer protection be enhanced by using artificial 4154 intelligence through the Consumer Product Safety Commission, 4155 and also to look at the application of blockchain technology 4156 4157 to prevent and mitigate fraud. For that and more, I am excited to be able to introduce this. 4158 And the AINS makes technical and conforming changes such 4159 as to the word "token,'' and conforms to other bills that are 4160

To speak on the amendment in the nature 4166 of a substitute. 4167 4168 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 4169 minutes. *Mr. Burgess. Well, I want to thank Mr. Soto for the 4170 amendment in the nature of a substitute to make the technical 4171 and conforming changes that were delivered to us by the 4172 request for technical assistance from the agencies. 4173 So the underlying bill requires the Department of 4174 Commerce, the Consumer Product Safety Commission, and the 4175 Federal Trade Commission to explore the use of emerging 4176 technologies in evaluating consumer products and safety. 4177 4178 Specifically, this bill requires the CPSC to use artificial intelligence in a pilot program to do at least one 4179 of the following: track trends and injuries involving 4180 consumer products; identify consumer product hazards; monitor 4181

4182 the sale of recalled consumer products; or identify consumer products that do not meet specified importation requirements 4183 4184 related to product safety. Fifteen years ago in this committee we heard testimony 4185 from a manufacturer, a major toy manufacturer, right before 4186 the Christmas buying season, that some of his toys had been 4187 painted with lead paint that painted with green paint that 4188 4189 was contaminated by lead. These were products that were made 4190 in China. Although he admitted that these products should be recalled, there was no plan to turn the boats around in the 4191 ocean and take them back to China. They were delivered to 4192 this country, and unloaded and stored in warehouses. 4193 4194 Bobby Rush, who at the time was chairman of the Commerce, Trade, and Consumer Protection Subcommittee, was 4195 concerned that these products would find their way into 4196 discount houses in his low-income neighborhoods. And I think 4197 it was a valid concern. The problem was there was no real 4198 4199 way to deal with that. But now, 15 years later, using this new artificial intelligence technology, there will be a way 4200 to identify those products, isolate them, and keep them out 4201 of the stream of commerce, and to identify them in resale 4202

4203 shops should they show up there. So it is an extremely valuable, legislative change that 4204 4205 we are undertaking here. I want to thank Mr. Soto for recognizing the fact that the agencies had offered us 4206 technical assistance in the language. And adopting their 4207 technical assistance as part of the underlying bill is the 4208 purpose of the AINS. But I do urge support of the underlying 4209 4210 bill. It is important. It is time we did this. 4211 And I will yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. I briefly want to offer my support for the amendment to 4408 Expanding Seniors' Access to Lower Cost Medicines Act of 4409 This bipartisan legislation would enable greater 4410 patient access to biosimilar products by allowing for 4411 4412 mid-year changes in Medicare Part D insurance plans that for specific biosimilar products. 4413 Today our nation's seniors are facing an uphill cost 4414 battle by allowing biosimilars inclusion through mid-year 4415

formulary adjustments. This piece of legislation will drive 4416 down costs for seniors who are eligible for these 4417 4418 medications. In fact, the cost estimates for this bill have shown significant savings for patients and beneficiaries. 4419 Medicare alone estimated it could save over \$2 billion if it 4420 had access to these biosimilars. 4421 When at home and I am speaking to seniors, the cost of 4422 4423 prescription drugs is one of the most common concerns that I hear. By expanding access to biosimilar drugs for certain 4424 4425 conditions we will be able to lower costs and ensure quality health care and treatments for our nation's seniors. 4426 We should be seizing every opportunity that we can to 4427 ensure that health care is more affordable, that treatments 4428 are more accessible, and that patients and beneficiaries are 4429 not subject to any undue burden exclusions. This bill will 4430 go a long way to ensure more rapid biosimilar access that 4431 will save both patients and taxpayer money. 4432 4433 I would like to thank my friend, Mr. Peters of California, for working with me on introducing this important 4434 legislation, and I urge my colleagues to support it as well 4435 with this amendment, and to support the critical bipartisan 4436

legislation. 4437 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 4438 4439 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. The chair recognizes Mr. Peters to strike the last word for five 4440 4441 minutes. *Mr. Peters. Thank you, Madam Chair. 4442 The Expanding Seniors' Access to Lower Cost Medicines 4443 4444 Act, my bill with Congressman John Joyce, stems from a bipartisan letter we sent in January to the Department of 4445 Health and Human Services. In the letter we urged the agency 4446 to do what it can to make FDA-approved generic biological 4447 medicines, or biosimilars, more accessible to seniors. 4448 4449 A Health and Human Services inspector general report found that Medicare Part D beneficiaries could enjoy 4450 significant out-of-pocket savings if biosimilar use 4451 increases. But that same report showed that the lack of 4452 biosimilar coverage on part D formularies could prevent us 4453 4454 from achieving these access gains, and that is unacceptable. Seniors in San Diego and across the country should have 4455 access to lower-cost prescriptions when they become 4456 available. They shouldn't be forced to wait until the 4457

4458 beginning of the next coverage year as they do under current law. Our bill will fix that. 4459 4460 It will also help increase access to biosimilars by curbing prescription drug plans' incentives to preference 4461 more expensive medicines over cheaper alternatives that are 4462 just as effective. 4463 The Senate Finance Committee marked up a similar policy 4464 4465 this year, and I urge my colleagues to vote yes on this bill. Thank you, and I yield back. 4466 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 4467 further discussion? 4468 For what purpose does the ranking member seek 4469 recognition? 4470 4471 *Mr. Pallone. To strike the last word in support of the bill and the AINS. 4472 *The Chair. Okay, you are recognized for five minutes. 4473 *Mr. Pallone. 4479 Allowing Part D plans to enact mid-year formulary changes to when new biosimilars come to market increases 4480 4481 competition, drives down prices, and encourages greater utilization of these drugs now and in the future. And there 4482 is bipartisan support for strengthening our biosimilar 4483 marketplace, and I believe this policy will help. 4484 However, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services 4485 4486 have also put forward a similar proposed regulation for plan 4487 year 2025 that would permit Part D sponsors to substitute biosimilar products on their formularies and consider them 4488 maintenance changes that could take effect within 30 days. 4489 It is important that we align the statutory policy with CMS's 4490 proposed regulatory policy to ensure that biosimilars can be 4491 substituted for the referenced products in a streamlined, 4492 efficient manner. 4493 And while I support the policy as drafted today for the 4494 purposes of committee consideration, I believe the policy 4495 4496 must continue to be refined before it is considered on the floor to make clear that any changes to the Part D statute to 4497 permit biosimilar formulary substitutions should be in line 4498 with CMS's proposed rule. 4499

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4714 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes in support of the amendment. 4715 4716 *Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I would like to offer this bipartisan amendment that I am leading with Representative 4717 Lisa Blunt Rochester. 4718 This legislation will protect seniors from harmful PBM 4719 practices that are making health care inaccessible and 4720 4721 unaffordable for millions of Americans. PBMs currently get compensated by charging fees calculated as a percentage of 4722 the cost of medicine. When PBMs have misaligned incentives 4723 to favor medicines with higher list prices, it can lead to 4724 higher costs for patients who face cost-sharing and 4725 4726 deductibles and co-insurance that is typically based on list 4727 price. The Wall Street Journal recently reported that across a 4728 selection of so-called specialty generic drugs, Cigna and 4729 CVS's prices were at least 24 times higher on average than 4730 4731 roughly what the medicine's manufacturers charge. also mean patients have fewer and higher cost choices when 4732 PBMs disfavor generic or lower priced brand competitors. 4733 example, the 3 largest PBMs continue to block more than 1,150 4734

4735 treatments from their formularies, including a low-cost insulin alternative. 4736 4737 We know that patients are being deprived of billions and discounts at the pharmacy counter. According to a recent 4738 report from the GAO, Part D beneficiaries pay more than their 4739 insurers for 79 of the 100 most highly rebated drugs under 4740 the program. Delaying action any longer on this bill will 4741 4742 result in increased costs for patients. 4743 You know, my patients never asked me to dispense them a medication with the highest-priced medicine. Why do the PBMs 4744 think that is what is best for our patients? 4745 Our bill would only allow PBMs to earn income from 4746 selling services their clients value at transparent, flat 4747 dollar prices their clients are willing to pay. That is how 4748 a free, competitive market works, and that is the kind of 4749 affordable marketplace taxpayers and patients deserve. 4750 And our bill would prohibit PBMs from taking earnings 4751 4752 from secret and opaque schemes to manipulate drug prices, retain rebates, and link patient costs to high-list drug 4753 prices that PBMs never pay. Taxpayers and patients don't 4754 deserve that. They deserve access to lifesaving prescription 4755

4756 drugs at fair market prices. Our bill would restore that to 4757 them. 4758 By delinking administration fees paid to PBMs from the price of medicines, this proposal will help to correct this 4759 these misaligned incentives and bring relief to the patients 4760 at the pharmacy counter. The Congressional Budget Office 4761 estimates that delinking in Part D will save more than \$200 4762 4763 million in Federal spending. Representative Lisa Blunt Rochester and I are proposing 4764 this bipartisan bill that will help patients afford their 4765 medicine and protect them from harmful PBM practices. I 4766 greatly appreciate the work of this committee. 4767 4768 Let me repeat that. I greatly appreciate the work of this committee and so many of my colleagues to start to rein 4769 in these PBM tactics and put patients first. But we must 4770 continue to do more. That is why I urge my colleagues to 4771 support this bill, the Protecting Patients Against PBM Abuses 4772 4773 Act. Thank you, Madam Chair, and I would like to yield the 4774 remainder of my time to you. 4775 *The Chair. I thank the gentleman for yielding. 4776

4777 I want to thank Representative Carter for his hard work, his leadership on this critically important issue. 4778 4779 Today we are moving forward on numerous policies to lower drug costs for seniors and the Medicare program, as 4780 well as ensure that those seniors have access to independent 4781 pharmacies. This legislation includes a critically important 4782 reform to ensure that PBM compensation in Medicare Part D is 4783 4784 transparent, accountable, and does not come with a 4785 consequence of higher drug costs. I am grateful for the work of Representatives Carter and 4786 Blunt Rochester on these important reforms, and I also agree 4787 with them that more needs to be done. 4788 4789 Earlier this year this committee banned spread pricing in Medicaid, and it only makes sense that we would take this 4790 step in Medicare too. There is also language from the 4791 underlying bill that we hope to move forward with more work 4792 to address reimbursement disparities between vertically 4793 4794 integrated pharmacies and independent, in-network pharmacies. This committee has worked hard to highlight the effects 4795 vertical integration can have on the cost in the health care 4796 system. We have and will continue to work hard towards 4797

4798 reversing consolidation across the board. I commit to working to advance both provisions as we reconcile PBM 4799 4800 legislation in hopes of bringing it to the House floor. I thank, once again, Representative Carter, for your 4801 tremendous leadership, and I yield back. 4802 *Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I want to thank you for 4803 making those commitments. They are important. As you heard 4804 4805 me say earlier, I appreciate staff and I appreciate they work on this. 4806 But I have to tell you that I am disappointed with how 4807 this process played out. As you pointed out, we have got 4808 we did ban spread pricing in Medicaid, and there is no reason 4809 why we shouldn't ban it in Medicare, as well. 4810 And to my colleagues across the aisle who may not be 4811 listening at this time, I hope you will listen because this 4812 is bipartisan. This impacts Democrats, Republicans, 4813 independents. It impacts patients. And we will be guilty if 4814 4815 we do not if we don't do something. Madam Chair, I am disappointed how the process played 4816 out, but I am pleased to hear that you are committed to 4817 working with me to advance both provisions as we reconcile 4818

PBM legislation. As you know, pharmacists are some of the 4819 most accessible health care professionals in America. 4820 4821 Ninety-five percent of Americans live within five miles of a 4822 pharmacy. *The Chair. Buddy 4823 *Mr. Carter. Okay. 4824 *The Chair. The gentleman's time has expired. 4825 4826 *Mr. Carter. And I will yield back. *The Chair. Is there further discussion on the AINS? 4827 The chair recognizes for what purpose does Ms. Blunt 4828 Rochester seek recognition? 4829 *Ms. Blunt Rochester. Madam Chair, I move to strike the 4830 4831 last word. *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five 4832 minutes. 4833 *Ms. Blunt Rochester. Thank you, Madam Chair, for your 4834 commitment to continue this important work. 4835 4836 And I especially want to recognize and thank my colleague, Representative Buddy Carter, for your leadership 4837 and your partnership on this bill. It is one of the things 4838

that I hear about from my constituents, and I know we all do.

4839

4840 While I am grateful that this committee is moving forward with key PBM reforms from our bill that will reduce 4841 4842 perverse incentives to ensure that PBM business models benefit patients, I want to echo the concern of 4843 Representative Carter and call on our committee to continue 4844 working on the policies that will better support the pharmacy 4845 community, particularly independent pharmacies. 4846 4847 Pharmacies are a pivotal part of our communities, and play a vital role in the management of chronic diseases, 4848 delivering resources to those with social needs, and 4849 educating us in amplifying public health initiatives. Almost 4850 90 percent of the U.S. population lives within 5 miles of a 4851 community pharmacy, which demonstrates the enormous reach and 4852 potential that pharmacies can have in increasing access to 4853 health care and improving public health. 4854 Unfortunately, a number of community pharmacies have 4855 been dwindling and going away due to unfair reimbursement 4856 4857 arrangements that sometimes don't even cover the cost of pharmacy ingredients or operational costs. 4858 I will continue working with my colleague, Mr. Carter, 4859 on furthering policies that protect independent pharmacies 4860

4861 and curb adverse PBM practices, and I hope that the committee will commit to doing so, as well. We will specifically 4862 4863 focuses on policies focus on policies that preserve patient access to the pharmacists of their choice I am going to say 4864 that again: focusing on the pharmacy of their choice; number 4865 two, to prevent PBMs from paying affiliated pharmacies more 4866 than unaffiliated pharmacies; and number three, ban spread 4867 4868 pricing in Medicare Part D. These are bipartisan, bicameral, and, in my opinion, 4869 common-sense policies that will help ensure that PBMs are 4870 lowering the cost of medications at the pharmacy counter and 4871 working in the best interest of their clients, Delawareans, 4872 and the American people. 4873 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 4874 *The Chair. 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4903 90 percent of Americans live within 5 miles of a pharmacy the most accessible health care professionals in America. 4904 4905 All of us, whether you are a Republican or Democrat or independent, you want the same thing. You want accessible, 4906 affordable, quality health care. Accessibility is going to 4907 continue to decrease if we don't keep independent pharmacies 4908 in business. We have now got pharmacy deserts in rural and 4909 4910 underserved communities where the neighborhood pharmacy may be the only health care provider for miles. 4911 We know that four percent four percent of all 4912 independent retail pharmacies go out of business every year. 4913 We also know that up to 1,300 pharmacies are going to close 4914 next year. That is affecting the accessibility and 4915 affordability and the quality of health care, which is 4916 exactly what this committee should be striving to improve. 4917 That is why it is so important that we work to reinstate our 4918 language that protects pharmacies from some of the most 4919 4920 egregious practices of PBMs, which are spread pricing and patient steering. 4921 A recent MedPAC report indicated that vertically 4922 integrated PBMs in Medicare Part D are benefiting from higher 4923

5050 that coming to Congress, for me, part of that was to lower prescription drug prices. And I think that the Protecting 5051 5052 Patients Against PBM Abuses Act is one such piece of legislation. It is a much-needed legislation that will 5053 eliminate the misaligned PBM incentive to drive up list 5054 prices for medications. 5055 De-linking PBM compensation from the actual cost of 5056 5057 drugs will lead to savings at the pharmacy counter and lower premiums for Medicare beneficiaries. This is not the only 5058 avenue or the only bill. It is only one facet of lowering 5059 prescription drug prices. However, this is a great first 5060 step in fixing the broken drug pricing system to work for 5061 patients, not the middlemen who exploit rebates at the 5062 5063 expense of patients. While I am fully supportive of Mr. Carter's legislation, 5064 Medicare isn't the only part of the health care system. And 5065 if we really want to help lower costs for patients, we need 5066 5067 to enact these reforms in the commercial markets, as well. Otherwise, PBMs will find ways to shift costs from Medicare 5068 patients to those under commercial plans. 5069 CBO has estimated that this proposal will save the 5070

5071 government 650 billion, and will not result in premium increases. 5072 5073 I ask that the chairwoman and ranking member continue to work with me and Representative Carter and others on finding 5074 common ground to move this patient-centered proposal forward 5075 to ensure we build on the committee's great work on drug 5076 pricing reform. 5077 5078 With that, I yield back. *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there 5079 further discussion? 5080 For what purpose does Mr. Allen seek recognition? 5081 *Mr. Allen. I move to strike the last word. 5082 5083 *The Chair. 5092 Too often Americans have to choose between prescriptions and household expenses, which is absolutely unacceptable. 5093 5094 This is why I have been actively advocating for reforms in the PBM space, with rebates and administrative fees paid to 5095 PBMs being tied to medicines' list price. We are seeing 5096 blatant preference of medicines with high list prices and 5097 larger rebates on drug formulary formularies for the purpose 5098 5099 of maximizing PBM revenue. This is because currently rebates' administrative fees paid to PBMs are tied to a 5100 medicine's list price, which only results in higher costs for 5101 5102 patients. I want to thank my colleague from Georgia, Mr. Carter, 5103 5104 for introducing legislation to address this egregious issue by prohibiting PBMs from earning a profit based off of a 5105 Medicare Part D drug list price, or de-linking PBM 5106 compensation, and instead limiting PBM compensation to a flat 5107 dollar amount service fee. 5108 5109 As cosponsor of H.R. 2880, I encourage my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill and to help restore transparency 5110 and patient-centered solutions to our health care system to 5111 put downward pressure on the cost of pharmaceuticals at the 5112

The gentleman is recognized for five 5310 minutes. 5311 *Mr. Griffith. Madam Chair, my bipartisan bill, H.R. 5312 5313 5393, the Transparency and Fairness for Pharmacies Act, will take important steps to help rein in and bring more 5314 transparency to Direct and Indirect Remuneration, DIR, fees 5315 and all pharmacy fees by pharmacy benefit managers, PBMs, 5316 that we have just heard so much about. It will require the 5317 Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services, CMS, to create 5318 standardized quality metrics for health plans and PBMs to use 5319 when determining payments to pharmacies. 5320 Now, PBMs often charge fees that are subjective to 5321 pharmacies based on how well the pharmacy performs. 5322 5323 performance measures, however, known as quality measures, are not always transparent and subjective. The pharmacies are 5324 forced to pay these fees that the PBMs put into place and say 5325 they have to do to perform better in order to stay within 5326

5327 health plans' networks. Those fees can be applied retroactively, sometimes many months after the drug is 5328 5329 dispensed. PBM pharmacy measures that are unfairly applied against 5330 all pharmacies have contributed to over a 107,000 percent 5331 growth 107 percent 107,000 percent growth in pharmacy DIR 5332 fees, according to CMS, undercutting pharmacy reimbursements 5333 5334 and increasing patient drug costs. 5335 Currently, PBMs use quality measures that are often unknown, unpredictable, inconsistent, and beyond a pharmacy's 5336 control, which then figures significantly into DIR fees 5337 pharmacies are forced to pay. Over time, PBMs have been 5338 5339 allowed to operate virtually unchecked, leading to abuse of pharmacy performance evaluations and lack of transparency in 5340 pharmacy payments. My bill seeks to end these practices. 5341 This is one of the main issues I hear about when 5342 traveling throughout my district, and the importance to help 5343 5344 correct the opaque system currently in place. One small pharmacy in my district, if they continue to dispense every 5345 medication for patients as they did in 2023, has a 5346 conservative estimate that they will pay up to \$80,000 in DIR 5347

5348 fees during the first 3 months of 2024. The amount this pharmacy must pay in DIR fees is more than they make, and 5349 5350 they are worried they will have to close their doors if this issue is not addressed and addressed soon. 5351 These DIR fees have led to pharmacy closures all across 5352 the country and in my district, as well. It is not just the 5353 rural community pharmacists that are hurting from this. 5354 5355 Everything from independent to retail to specialty pharmacies are also hurting. 5356 This is one small step to bring more transparency and 5357 certainty to pharmacies when dispensing drugs, but lots of 5358 work is left to be done. I am encouraged to see that CMS 5359 5360 will be implementing a new Part D rule targeted at pharmacies in January of 2024. The rule will require DIR fees to be 5361 assessed at the point of sale, and hope to help mitigate 5362 these outrageous DIR retroactive clawbacks. 5363 While I think this rule is well intentioned, I am 5364 5365 interested to see how the new rule will play out, and if it will truly stop these clawbacks while also monitoring the 5366 effect it has on patient premiums. 5367 We also need to do more to protect our pharmacies, and I 5368

I would like to offer this amendment in the nature of a substitute to H.R. 133, the 6756 MERIT Act, which incorporates feedback from the Centers for 6757 Medicare and Medicaid Services, CMS, and removes duplicative 6758 6759 language. 6760 I want to thank Representative Buchanan for his 6761 leadership on this important bill that we co-led together. This past November was National Alzheimer's Disease 6762 Awareness Month, which recognizes the hardships of those 6763 living with Alzheimer's, as well as the families and 6764 caregivers who sacrificed their time, money, and resources to 6765 care for their loved ones. The Awareness Month also serves 6766 as a reminder that we must commit to invest in scientific 6767 research and increase access to treatment options to ensure a 6768 brighter future for all Americans facing Alzheimer's. 6769 6770 Today about 7 million Alzheimer's 7 million Americans suffer from Alzheimer's, and rates are expected to increase 6771 as Baby Boomers age. As new treatments are approved, 6772 millions of Americans living with Alzheimer's and other 6773

6774 diseases cannot afford delays in accessing these treatments. One barrier patients currently face in accessing FDA-6775 6776 approved Alzheimer's treatments is a broad national coverage determination by CMS, which effectively denied Medicare 6777 coverage to all monoclonal antibodies directed against 6778 amyloid for the treatment of Alzheimer's disease. 6779 decision by CMS to deny coverage for an entire class of drugs 6780 6781 was devastating for Alzheimer's patients and families like mine, who want their loved ones to have access to medication 6782 that can slow progression of the disease. 6783 The MERIT Act would address this issue by requiring CMS 6784 to evaluate treatments individually and based on their own 6785 merits, rather than as a broad class of drugs. This bill is 6786 a critical first step to improve how CMS approaches future 6787 Medicare coverage decisions. 6788 I look forward to continuing to work with my colleagues 6789 on both sides of the aisle to build on this step through my 6790 6791 bipartisan bill, the Access to Innovative Treatments Act, which I co-led with my colleague, Representative Joyce. I want to offer my support for my amendment to H.R. 5371, the Choices for 7247 Increased Mobility Act. 7248 This amendment makes the necessary changes to the bill 7249 that will establish separate healthcare common procedure 7250 7251 coding system codes, which are the HCPCS for ultra lightweight manual wheelchairs. By creating a new code for 7252 ultra lightweight manual wheelchairs under Medicare Part B, 7253 this amendment will remove a barrier to access that has, 7254 since 2016, has impeded access to lightweight, durable 7255 7256 medical equipment for individuals who live day by day with mobility impairments if deemed medically necessary. 7257 Again, this legislation will allow Medicare 7258 beneficiaries the opportunity to decide whether a titanium or 7259 7260 a carbon wheelchair is right for them, in consultation with 7261 their doctor. 8306 frankly, why I am very disappointed, if not outright upset that we are not considering the Preserving Patient Access to 8307 8308 Home Infusion Act legislation I led with Representatives Harshbarger, Sewell, and Buchanan. This legislation would 8309 provide critical technical clarifications to the existing 8310 Medicare home infusion benefit to ensure it is working the 8311 way it was intended. 8312 8313 In 2016 the 21st Century Cures Act established a Home Infusion Professional Services benefit for Medicaid Part B 8314 infusion. But despite Congress's intent, the Centers for 8315 Medicare and Medicaid Services have improperly implemented 8316 this benefit by requiring a nurse to be physically present in 8317 the patient's home in order to be reimbursed. This fails to 8318 account for the extensive clinical and administrative 8319 services that are provided remotely by home infusion 8320 clinicians. As a result, provider participation in 8321 Medicare's home infusion benefit has dropped sharply, and 8322 8323 beneficiaries have experienced reduced access to home infusion over the last several years. 8324 The Preserving Patient Access to Home Infusion Act would 8325 provide a necessary fix to remove the physical presence 8326

requirement and ensure the full scope of professional 8327 services provided in home fusion are included in the 8328 8329 reimbursement structure. While I am glad that this committee is advancing the Joe 8330 Fiandra Access to Home Infusion Act, and I am going to urge 8331 all of my colleagues to support it because we do know people 8332 do can do it, can give themselves injections without having 8333 8334 to have that professional in the house, we have to continue working to ensure the existing home infusion benefit is 8335 working properly so more beneficiaries can receive safe and 8336 adequate care in the comfort of their own homes. 8337 So I hope, pray, beg that we will consider the 8338 8339 Preserving Patient Access to Home Infusion Act without delay. I would like to speak in support of my bill, H.R. 5555, as amended, 8605 the Durable Medical Equipment Point of Service Relief Act, 8606 and I am grateful for the committee's consideration of this 8607 critical bipartisan legislation. 8608 8609 Over 66 million Medicare beneficiaries receive services 8610 under the DMEPOS benefit. The benefit allows patients to receive medically-needed treatment such as oxygen, 8611 wheelchairs, and medical supplies in the comforts of their 8612 home, keeping them out of expensive in-patient settings such 8613 as hospitals and nursing facilities. 8614 Due to the implementation of the DMEPOS competitive 8615 bidding program which applied pricing derived from highly-8616 populated competitive bidding areas to all areas of the 8617 country, there has been a significant decrease in payment 8618 8619 rates which caused a significant number of DMEPOS location 8620 closures. Just this last year about 11 percent of the DMEPOS 8621 locations closed, further diminishing beneficiary access to 8622

8623 DMEPOS suppliers. The loss ultimately leads to far less patient access and choice. The bid program was put on hold 8624 8625 in 2018 due to a need to update the bidding process, and it was put on hold again in 2020 due to no additional savings. 8626 In all, the bid program has been on hold for the last five 8627 years, resulting in DMEPOS payments continuing to be based on 8628 rates from the flawed bidding program. 8629 8630 My legislation, H.R. 5555, as amended, which I am proud to be leading, would provide much-needed rate relief in 8631 former bid areas and non-rural areas which will help protect 8632 patient access to cost-effective, home-based care. 8633 According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, among 8634 8635 Medicare beneficiaries and traditional Medicare, most, 86 percent, had some type of additional coverage in 2020, either 8636 through Medigap, 36 percent; employer coverage, 31 percent; 8637 Medicaid, 17 percent; or other source, 1 percent. 8638 Without relief to DMEPOS competitive bidding and non-8639 8640 competitive bidding areas, Medicare beneficiaries may lose access to the medical equipment they need, forcing them to go 8641 to an emergency room or a long-term care facility. 8642 would increase cost to the Medicare program as well as the 8643

8644 beneficiary. I am aware that some of my colleagues on the other side 8645 8646 of the aisle are opposing this legislation over grievances of an unrelated policy relating to this State Health Insurance 8647 Assistance Program. Like my Democrat colleagues, I too want 8648 to assure that Americans are aware of their public health 8649 care options. However, unlike this DME policy, the SHIP 8650 8651 program still receives discretionary funding. Patients will lose access to lifesaving equipment without relief for DME 8652 providers, and it is good policy. 8653 I urge my colleagues to support the AINS and the 8654 underlying bill, H.R. 5555, and I yield back the balance of 8655 8656 my time. Thank you. *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there 8657 further discussion on the amendment? 8658 8659 *Mr. Pallone. On the *The Chair. On the amendment. The chair recognizes the 8660 8661 ranking member for five minutes. Thank you. Thank you, Chair Rodgers. 8662 *Mr. Pallone. The bill, H.R. 5555, extends a program to prop up 8663 payment rates for Durable Medical Equipment, exempting them 8664

8665 from the full effect of the DME competitive bidding program. And the DME competitive bidding program was passed into law 8666 8667 over two decades ago. In 2020, in response to the pandemic, Congress provided 8668 temporary relief to DME suppliers to address the 8669 reimbursement challenges posed by COVID-19, and this relief 8670 expires on December 31, 2023. And we are now being asked to 8671 8672 extend this temporary relief again and create a new extender policy that Congress will have to continue to address in the 8673 future and find bipartisan offsets. 8674 Additionally, extending these higher rates could result 8675 in increases in out-of-pocket costs for our Medicare 8676 8677 beneficiaries. Now, I understand the desire to extend this temporary 8678 relief program to help the Durable Medical Equipment 8679 industry, but the majority continues to refuse our request to 8680 move legislation to extend another important program that 8681 8682 actually directly helps Medicare beneficiaries and has historically been bipartisan, and that is H.R. 5360, Helping 8683 Low-Income Seniors Afford Care Act, led by Representative 8684 Craig that extends existing programs like the State Health 8685

8686 Insurance Assistance Program, SHIP; the Area Agencies on Aging, AOAs; and the National Center for Benefits Outreach 8687 8688 and Enrollment to help low-income Medicare beneficiaries enroll in Medicare and access benefits that lower their out-8689 8690 of-pocket costs. Now, too many low-income seniors struggle with the 8691 rising cost of health care, and millions of seniors can't 8692 8693 afford their prescription drugs, causing them to forgo or delay necessary treatment. According to a recent survey by 8694 the Commonwealth Fund, one-third of Medicare beneficiaries 8695 said it was difficult to afford health care costs, and more 8696 than one in five beneficiaries reported delaying or skipping 8697 needed health care because of the cost. 8698 These outreach and enrollment programs help our nation's 8699 most vulnerable low-income beneficiaries access assistance 8700 for prescription drug coverage and other essential Medicare 8701 benefits. Because of these programs, approximately 3.5 8702 8703 million Medicare beneficiaries have received assistance, and the number of seniors enrolled in the low-income subsidy 8704 program increased from 11.8 million in 2014 to 14.2 million 8705 in 2020. 8706

8707 Now, these programs are particularly critical as major changes to the Part D benefit are underway that are already 8708 8709 saving beneficiaries money through a \$35 cap on insulin, no cost sharing for vaccines, and soon a \$2,000 out-of-pocket 8710 cap on prescription drug costs overall. We need outreach and 8711 enrollment education to ensure beneficiaries understand these 8712 benefits and are enrolled in the best plan for them in order 8713 8714 to take advantage of these savings and changes. A broad coalition of 57 organizations support the 8715 extension and expansion of the outreach and enrollment 8716 programs which have been extended 11 times with bipartisan 8717 support over the past 15 years. Republicans refuse to extend 8718 8719 funding for these programs in the continuing resolution, allowing them to lapse this past September. And I am 8720 extremely disappointed that Republicans failed to include the 8721 Craig bill in today's markup, because these outreach and 8722 enrollment programs have longstanding bipartisan support. 8723 8724 I am also disappointed I should say I am disappointed today that I have to vote no on this bill, but I want to send 8725 a message loud and clear to my Republican colleagues that you 8726 cannot hold up programs that help our seniors with outreach 8727

8728 and enrollment, like the Craig bill, hostage and then expect Democrats to just work with you on industry priorities. 8729 8730 While I am disappointed that the Craig bill was not included in today's markup, I am going to continue to fight 8731 to lower costs and expand access to care for Medicare 8732 beneficiaries and oppose policies that could result in 8733 increased premiums or additional out-of-pocket costs for 8734 8735 seniors. So for all these reasons, I do urge our Democratic 8736 members to join me in opposing H.R. 5555, and I yield back, 8737 Madam Chair. 8738 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. In Congress I have made helping those with neurological 8908 disorders one of my top priorities for more than a decade. I 8909 have long led efforts related to Alzheimer's, the other top 8910 neurological disorder facing Americans. These past few years 8911 8912 I have been honored to expand my championship for Americans facing Parkinson's, as well. I first learned more in depth 8913 about Parkinson's from a dear friend who suffered with it. 8914 So when the opportunity arose to partner with Congressman 8915 Bilirakis and we have worked on this over a number of years 8916 8917 on this very meaningful effort, I jumped right in and made it my personal mission to get this done on behalf of the 8918 millions of people living with Parkinson's. 8919 As you may know, currently, more than one million people 8920 in the United States live with Parkinson's disease, and there 8921 8922 are no treatments to cure, prevent, or significantly slow down its progression. Parkinson's is the second most common 8923 neurological disease, and is unfortunately growing and 8924 growing fast. 8925

8926 Our bipartisan, no-cost legislation will, for the first time, unite the Federal Government in a mission to cure and 8927 8928 prevent Parkinson's, alleviate financial and health burdens on American families, and reduce government spending over 8929 This pioneering legislation is greatly needed. 8930 bill will bring Federal stakeholders and non-Federal experts 8931 together to implement a national plan to prevent and cure the 8932 8933 disease, improve diagnoses and treatment options, and lessen the burden for caregivers and families. 8934 The bill text is modeled off the successful National 8935 Alzheimer's Project model, which brought together many parts 8936 of the Federal Government to improve the Federal response. 8937 Once signed into law, this bill will do for Parkinson's what 8938 the national plan has done for Alzheimer's, and bring 8939 together coordination, care, and research, all to help those 8940 with Parkinson's as well as their loved ones. This would 8941 help bring a strong focus to a cure, treatment, and also 8942 8943 prevention. It will shine a needed light on the suffering related to Parkinson's. 8944 Sadly, we recognize that environmental triggers are 8945 likely a part of Parkinson's, but so much is still unknown. 8946

8947 More research and coordination are critical to getting answers to these questions. 8948 8949 So I thank the Michael J. Fox Foundation for everything that they have done, but especially all the for especially 8950 the work on this bill. 8951 And thank you to the New York-based groups and advocates 8952 who stood by my side demanding action on this bill and giving 8953 8954 a face to Parkinson's. The study found that 9060 Black, Hispanic, and Asian people with Parkinson's have a 9061 lower quality of life than White people, and that some health 9062 disparities and management differences persist, and it was 9063 9064 important to address these disparities as part of our work as we moved forward with any Federal efforts on Parkinson's 9065 research and treatment. 9066 So we were able to land on language today to ensure that 9067 9068 minority and under-represented communities are included in the Advisory Council membership. 9404 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five minutes in support of her amendment. 9405 9406 *Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Thank you, Madam Chair, and I thank you for including this critical piece of bipartisan 9407 legislation in the markup today. 9408 While the costs of running a medical practice have gone 9409 up 47 percent, physician payments have declined 26 percent 9410 9411 from the period of 2001 to 2023 when adjusted for inflation. This makes it next to impossible for small, rural, and low-9412 income-serving practices to stay operational. 9413 In recent years many non-partisan government 9414 stakeholders have repeatedly expressed concerns about the 9415 failure of Medicare payments to keep pace with the rising 9416 cost of running a medical practice and the damaging impact it 9417 could have on patient access to care, especially in rural 9418 areas like southeastern Iowa. 9419 Even with the repeal of the SGR, we continue to find 9420 9421 ourselves in an end-of-the-year scramble to avoid cutting physician reimbursement by multiple percentage points. 9422 Unfortunately, this year is no different. However, this year 9423 we have drastically increased prices and cost of labor that 9424

9425 we had seen at the end of the COVID-19 pandemic. This method of legislating is unsustainable, and it puts patients and 9426 9427 providers at great risk. The Physician Fee Schedule Update and Improvements Act, 9428 which is the first doc fix legislation to move through 9429 regular order, makes much-needed changes to the way in which 9430 physicians are reimbursed under Medicare, including raising 9431 9432 the budget neutrality threshold from 20 million to 53 million, and using timely updates to direct costs which are 9433 used to calculate practice expenses. 9434 Additionally, this legislation extends the bonus doctors 9435 receive for participating in alternate payment models, which 9436 is vital to continue to transition away from fee-for-service 9437 to value-based arrangements. 9438 The amendment is the text of the original, but with the 9439 conversion factor changed from 3 percent to 2.5 percent, and 9440 an update to the alternate payment model language. 9441 9442 am not pleased with this, and I think that the original conversion factor of three is more appropriate, given the 9443 cost of inflation and cost of medical practice updates, this 9444 conforms with the Senate, and I am pragmatic in wanting to 9445

Thank you, Madam Chair. 9473 9474 The bill we are considering today addresses the critical needs of both Medicare patients and providers. 9475 legislation extends critical programs to provide payment 9476 stability for doctors and ensure Medicare beneficiaries can 9477 receive high-quality care. And this important bipartisan 9478 legislation provides relief for providers by averting cuts, 9479 expanding the budget neutrality threshold, and requiring 9480 timely updates to clinical costs to ensure payment rates 9481 align with the most recent cost data. 9482 And I am pleased we are able to reach a bipartisan 9483 9484 agreement on these policies. It is my hope that these changes provide long-term stability and less year-over-year 9485 variation for the provider community that will hopefully 9486 avert the need for the continual annual scramble to find 9487

9488 bipartisan offsets to address funding cliffs resulting from the regulatory action. 9489 9490 Now, I am particularly pleased that bill includes H.R. 6369 led by Representative Schrier. The legislation would 9491 extend bonuses for providers participating in advanced 9492 alternative payment models, and includes an increase in the 9493 bonus for providers taking on a higher level of risk. 9494 9495 Evidence shows that these models have been successful in improving patient care, and I believe extending this 9496 incentive will encourage uptake of these models. 9497 continue to ensure that our robust financial incentives for 9498 providers in Medicare fee-for-service to move from volume to 9499 9500 value. However, I have to say I am disappointed that H.R. 6545 9501 does not include the full APM bonus under current law from 9502 Representative Schrier's bill, and I believe it is important 9503 that we extend the bonus that the current level of 3.5 9504 9505 percent, and hopefully we will work with our Republicans to ensure this is addressed before floor consideration. 9506 I don't have to tell anybody here that Medicare is the 9507 main source of health care for our nation's seniors and 9508

9509 disabled. We have to continue to work on both sides of the aisle to advance legislation that ensures the Medicare 9510 9511 program continues to deliver the highest quality of care. And I urge support, obviously, for the AINS and the 9512 underlying bill. And thank you, Madam Chair, I yield back. 9513 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 9514 further discussion? 9515 9516 For what purpose does the Mr. Bucshon seek 9517 recognition? *Mr. Bucshon. Madam Chair, I rise to speak on the AINS. 9518 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 9519 9520 minutes. *Mr. Bucshon. I am supportive of the underlying 9521 legislation and grateful for the committee's work in marking 9522 up a bill that improves the status quo for doctors paid by 9523 the Medicare physician fee schedule. 9524 Currently, a 3.4 percent cut will occur on January 1, 9525 9526 The underlying bill makes an upward adjustment to the conversion factor by three percent, not a total mitigation, 9527 but close. It takes steps towards improving budget 9528 neutrality at CMS, which is very important. It extends the 9529

9530 Geographic Practice Cost Index payments and the alternative payment model bonuses, all things I support. 9531 9532 Unfortunately, the AINS isn't quite in line with my overall priorities to mitigate reimbursement cuts. I am 9533 disappointed in the additional 0.5 percent cut to the 9534 conversion factor correction compared to the underlying bill. 9535 I understand that Congress is limited to spending certain 9536 9537 amounts of money, I just disagree where the spending is being allocated, particularly in the health care space. 9538 I want to talk about what we have been spending over the 9539 last couple of years: the American Rescue Plan, \$3.5 9540 trillion; Inflation Reduction Act, \$740 billion; we are going 9541 to extend DSH payments to hospitals in the lower-cost, more 9542 transparency bill, which I support, by \$16 billion. 9543 And I want to remind everyone our annual inflation rate 9544 in 2021 was 4.7 percent and, in 2022, 8.0 percent. 9545 [Chart] 9546 9547 *Mr. Bucshon. And I also want to have people look at this first graph here, which shows that physicians don't get 9548 an annual update based on inflation when everybody else does. 9549 And I have shown this at the subcommittee mark. Even if we 9550

9635 to 2023 when adjusted for inflation. That is a huge decline, and patients are the ones who suffer the most in this 9636 9637 situation. To compound these issues, our provider reimbursement 9638 systems have created uncertainty that has intensified the 9639 burden on providers. That is why this bill, which provides 9640 some much-needed stability, is so important. By preventing 9641 9642 the steepest cuts; extending alternative payment model, APM, bonus payments; expanding the budget neutrality threshold; 9643 and revisiting calculations for practice expense RVUs, this 9644 bill would ease what could amount to catastrophic impacts for 9645 9646 doctors. 9647 I again want to commend my colleagues for coming to this bipartisan agreement on this for the sake of patients' access 9648 to care and all the providers. I know there are more 9649 proposals that will help move these fixes along, including 9650 the bill I co-led with Bilirakis on providing relief 9651 9652 specifically for clinical labor cuts, and I hope to see engagement on that, as well. But the bill before us today 9653 AFTER 6:00 p.m. 9654 amounts to a win that will be hugely consequential for 9655

9656 doctors and patients alike. I urge my colleagues to support this bill, and I yield 9657 9658 back. Thank you, Madam Chair. *The Chair. Is there further discussion? 9659 For what purpose does Mr. Joyce seek recognition? 9660 *Mr. Joyce. Madam Chair, I wish to strike the last word 9661 and speak in support of the underlying bill. 9662 9663 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 9664 minutes. *Mr. Joyce. I would also like to thank my fellow 9665 physician, Dr. Miller-Meeks, for introducing this critical 9666 legislation, H.R. 6545, the Physician Fee Schedule Update and 9667 Improvements Act. This is important, and we need to 9668 underscore the dire need of additional reforms in immediate 9669 relief from the latest annual cuts to the Medicare providers. 9670 As you know, if Congress fails to act, Medicare 9671 providers face a substantial cut as of January 1. And when 9672 9673 coupled with increasing medical inflation, the real impact will place an undue burden not only on the doctors, but on 9674 the patients that they care for every day and the access that 9675 those patients need to Medicare providers. 9676

9677 First and foremost, as a physician, I understand the negative impact that these significant, year-after-year cuts 9678 9679 will have on reimbursement for providers. Now extrapolate that and compound it with already-existing workforce 9680 shortages in underserved areas like my district in rural 9681 Pennsylvania. I can assure you that the repercussions are 9682 dire. 9683 9684 From the period of 2001 to today, Medicare physician reimbursements have actually gone down 26 percent when 9685 adjusted for inflation. It is not sustainable for physician 9686 practices, and it has a detrimental impact on beneficiaries 9687 losing access to their preferred doctor. This has also led 9688 9689 to a consolidation of practices and driving physicians out of rural and underserved areas. 9690 While this bill is a necessary first step, and I am 9691 pleased to see the improvements from what we considered at 9692 subcommittee, we still need to do more to avert this cut from 9693 9694 going into effect January 1 of next year. I look forward to continue our work on this bill to ensure that our seniors are 9695 protected from the impacts of these cuts. 9696 I urge my colleagues to support this bill, and I yield. 9697

I move to strike the last word, and 9701 thank you for indulging me in presenting the desert darlings, 9702 the dynamic duo, my twin daughters, Sky and Sage, and to 9703 welcome my wonderful, beautiful wife, Monica; my mother-in-9704 9705 law, Sally; and my sister-in-law, Wendy, who are in the audience right now. Thank you for allowing me to do so. 9706 *The Chair. You are welcome. 9707 I am pleased you are here. It is great to meet you, Sky 9708 9709 and Sage. 9710 *Voice. Thank you. Thank you, thank you. 9711 *Mr. Ruiz. So at previous hearings in this subcommittee we have 9712 examined policies to improve seniors' access to health care. 9713 We have identified the challenges within our health care 9714 9715 system that create barriers to patient access to care. For years physicians have been experiencing cuts to 9716 their Medicare reimbursements, even while other Medicare 9717 providers have experienced increases for inflation, as Dr. 9718

9719 Bucshon's graph so eloquently demonstrated. From 2001 to 2023, inflation-adjusted payments for physicians declined by 9720 9721 26 percent, even amid the rising costs of running a medical practice. 9722 On top of that, physicians received a two percent 9723 across-the-board cut to their Medicare conversion, and that 9724 Medicare conversion factor in 2023, and are facing another 9725 3.37 percent cut in 2024. This can create barriers to care 9726 for our most vulnerable patients, especially in rural areas, 9727 that often bear the brunt of health care workforce shortages. 9728 We can't afford for doctors to close their doors or to 9729 take fewer Medicare patients because they can't afford to 9730 treat them. The physician fee schedule is broken and needs 9731 to be fixed. The Physician Fee Schedule Update and 9732 Improvements Act is a step in the right direction. 9733 Specifically, this bill would increase the Medicare 9734 physician fee schedule conversion factor from 1.25 percent to 9735 9736 3 percent for the calendar year 2024. However, this provision is only temporary, and we need to look at the big 9737 picture. We need to look at long-term solutions. We need to 9738 fix the Medicare physician fee schedule so that we can ensure 9739

9740 access to care for patients, and so that Congress does not have to revisit this issue over and over every year to 9741 9742 prevent payment cuts. While H.R. 6545 is a good start, more still needs to be 9743 done to adequately address the core problems with the 9744 Medicare physician fee schedule and implement lasting 9745 solutions. My bill, my bipartisan bill with Drs. Bucshon and 9746 9747 Miller-Meeks, the Strengthening Medicare for Patients and Providers Act, H.R. 2474, is that permanent solution to this 9748 challenge. This bill will adjust Medicare physician 9749 reimbursement rates based on inflation by tying 9750 reimbursements to the Medicare Economic Index. Tying 9751 9752 Medicare reimbursement rates to rising inflation will go a long way towards ensuring reliable access to care for 9753 9754 patients. I urge this committee to consider H.R. 2474 in future 9755 markups. And with that my daughter Sky and Sage and I yield 9756 9757 back. *The Chair. All right, very good, yield back. 9758 Is there further discussion? 9759 The chair recognizes Ms. Schrier for five minutes. 9760

9761 *Ms. Schrier. Thank you, Madam Chair. I move to strike the last word and speak on the AINS and the underlying bill. 9762 9763 *The Chair. I am proud to have worked on 9765 *Ms. Schrier. this bill with my colleagues, Dr. Miller-Meeks, Dr. Bucshon, 9766 and Representative Kelly. 9767 9768 Dr. Burgess specifically and Representative Kelly specifically, I just want to thank you for, in your comments, 9769 framing this discussion about fair physician reimbursement in 9770 your personal experiences, because fundamentally fair 9771 reimbursement impacts physicians. It respects the work that 9772 they do, and it keeps those physicians' practices open and 9773 available to all patients so that we and our family members 9774 and your family members can get the care we need. 9775 I also want to associate myself with the comments that 9776 you have already heard from all of my doctor colleagues, 9777 9778 explaining the dramatic contrast between flat provider pay over the past 20 years and significant inflation in costs and 9779 in compensation of other professions over the past 20 years. 9780 Fundamentally, maintaining appropriate reimbursement for 9781

I am pleased there is bipartisan support for ensuring we have a robust 10288 biosimilar marketplace. 10289 Incentivizing the development and utilization of 10290 biosimilars as critical to driving down drug prices and 10291 10292 reducing the high cost of specialty medications, particularly in the Medicare Part B program, and that is why we passed 10293 into law an important policy that created a five-year 10294 temporary payment increase for qualifying biosimilars of 10295 Medicare Part B in which the Medicare program will pay the 10296 10297 average sales price for a biosimilar plus eight percent of the reference biological product's average sale price when 10298 the biosimilar is separately payable in physicians' offices. 10299 By increasing the ASP add-on, physicians are 10300 incentivized to prescribe the biosimilar over the referenced 10301 10302 biologic, driving down cost to the Medicare program and increasing access to lower cost drugs. So I urge my 10303 colleagues to join me in supporting this amendment. It would 10304 extend the temporary payment increase of ASP plus eight 10305

percent for biosimilar products in Part B for an additional 10306 five years, and that is a common-sense solution that achieves 10307 10308 the bipartisan goal of growing and incentivizing a strong biosimilar market. 10309 And thank you, Chair. I yield back. Oh, I yield to Mr. 10310 Cardenas. 10311 *Mr. Cardenas. The gentleman yields? 10312 Thank vou. I want to thank Ranking Member Pallone for bringing up 10313 this amendment, which I believe will help to grow the number 10314 of biosimilars in the market.
