The Committee will come to order. 121 The chair recognizes herself for an opening statement. 122 Today the Committee on Energy and Commerce is taking 123 action on important legislation to improve the lives of the 124 This includes solutions to modernize our American people. 125 critical pipeline infrastructure, make important improvements 126 to our air quality standards process, strengthen the health 127 128 and well-being of patients and caregivers, and secure America's communications infrastructure from foreign 129 adversaries like China. 130
- The breadth of solutions we are considering is just the

132 latest example of the Energy and Commerce Committee working together to deliver real results for the American people. I 133 134 applaud my colleagues on both sides of the aisle for their hard work on all of these bills. 135 We will begin by considering legislation that will 136 protect our communications infrastructure from the threats 137 posed by the Chinese Communist Party and other foreign 138 139 adversaries. China poses a serious threat to America's national security across the board, including to our critical 140 communications infrastructure. We know that the CCP will 141 utilize every tool at its disposal to exploit vulnerabilities 142 in our communications networks, which is why this committee 143 has taken decisive action in these areas. 144 Failure to address these exceedingly complex threats not 145 only jeopardizes our economic competitiveness and national 146 security, but also risks ceding ground to an adversarial 147 power intent on undermining American leadership. 148 will continue to build on our efforts this Congress to make 149 our communications networks safer and more resilient to 150 attacks by our adversaries. 151 Next we will advance over a dozen bipartisan pieces of 152

153 legislation that will strengthen the health and well-being of the American people. Many of these bills reauthorize 154 155 important programs that are due to expire September 30. committee is doing its job to renew them in advance of that 156 deadline through regular order. 157 I am especially excited that we are considering my 158 legislation to authorize the INCLUDE Project at the National 159 160 Institutes of Health. The INCLUDE Project has already accomplished so much, and this bill will further help people 161 with Down syndrome live their lives to the fullest potential 162 and inform research efforts for all Americans affected by 163 diseases like Alzheimer's and cancer. 164 We will include conclude the markup with important 165 legislation to further advance America's energy 166 infrastructure and economic and environmental leadership. 167 meet growing domestic and international energy demands, we 168 must modernize and expand our pipeline infrastructure. 169 170 The Pipeline Safety, Modernization, and Expansion Act, led by Chairman Duncan, will reduce energy prices for the 171 American people, strengthen pipeline and LNG facility safety, 172 and drive innovation in new technologies. It is an 173

174 opportunity to lay the foundation for America's energy leadership for decades to come. 175 176 We will also advance the Air Quality Standards Implementation Act of 2024, led by Subcommittee Chair Carter. 177 This legislation ensures efficient, effective, implementation 178 of air quality standards for states that will ensure that 179 measures to implement health protections are realistic and 180 181 balanced in their approach. Protecting public health and our economy are not 182 mutually exclusive goals, but to achieve this requires that 183 we rethink how to address pollution levels that are outside 184 our control. For decades America has been the number-one 185 186 place to do business while maintaining the best, highest air quality in the world. This legislation is essential to 187 ensuring we continue that legacy for decades to come. 188 Throughout the 118th Congress this committee has led on 189 solutions to make life better for the American people. 190 191 are doing the work the American people sent us to do. proud of what we have done and what we continue to accomplish 192 as we plow the hard ground necessary to legislate. Today we 193 will add to those accomplishments. 194

195 Thank you to all the members and staff for their hard work and service. I look forward to advancing these bills to 196 197 the full House. I now recognize the gentleman from New Jersey, Mr. 198 Pallone, for five minutes for an opening statement. 199 *Mr. Pallone. I thank the chair. Today the committee 200 will consider 28 bills, and we will begin with consideration 201 202 of six partisan bills that advanced out of our Energy Subcommittee, one pipeline safety reauthorization bill and 203 five bills that would undermine energy efficiency standards. 204 It is unfortunate that the Republican majority is moving 205 forward on a partisan pipeline safety bill that has very 206 little to do with safety and everything to do with gutting 207 environmental reviews to build more pipelines. Ensuring the 208 safety of our nation's pipelines has long been a bipartisan 209 cause, but Republicans have refused to work with us to make 210 this a bipartisan bill. And by moving forward with a 211 212 partisan bill, the Republican majority has told us all we need to know, that they are not interested in passing durable 213 legislation that can make it to the President's desk. 214 Meanwhile, the House Transportation Committee has moved a 215

216 bipartisan pipeline safety bill that could be the basis for legislation that passes the Senate and is signed by the 217 218 President. I am also disappointed that we are considering five 219 anti-energy-efficiency bills that would raise costs for 220 American families. These bills are designed to obstruct the 221 Department of Energy's appliance efficiency program. 222 223 yet another unfortunate handout to industry at the expense of everyday Americans who would be stuck with higher utility 224 bills if these were signed into law. But thankfully, for the 225 American people, these bills stand no chance of being signed 226 into law. 227 228 And next we are going to consider H.R. 7650, which advanced out of our Environment Subcommittee. 229 legislation undermines the backbone of the Clean Air Act. 230 Ιt also allows corporate industry profits to override science in 231 setting air quality standards, provides amnesty to new 232 233 polluting facilities at the expense of existing manufacturing, and removes incentives to cut pollution. And 234 this bill would guarantee that people living in areas with 235 poor air quality would continue to breathe unhealthy air for 236

237 generations to come, and Democrats are simply not going to support this or allow this to happen. 238 239 We will then consider 17 bills that advanced out of the Health Subcommittee, which collectively are intended to 240 reaffirm this committee's commitment to strengthening our 241 nation's public health infrastructure, improving quality of 242 care for patients, and supporting our health care workforce. 243 244 And I am especially pleased that we will be considering H.R. 6829, the HEARTS Act, which I introduced last year. 245 This bill was inspired by two New Jersey families who each 246 tragically lost a child to sudden cardiac arrest during high 247 school sporting events. Sadly, more than 2,000 children and 248 adolescents die this way every year. And my goal in 249 introducing this bill is to help prevent future deaths of 250 cardiac arrest by preparing schools to respond to cardiac 251 emergencies when they occur. The HEARTS Act will raise 252 awareness about the causes of sudden cardiac arrest, and 253 254 ensures schools are more prepared to deal with cardiac emergencies in order to help save lives. 255 Now, while I support the vast majority of the bills from 256 the Health Subcommittee under consideration today, there is 257

258 one bill I can't support. I continue to have significant concerns with H.R. 5074. I believe it would impede seniors' 259 260 access to necessary medication and raise their health care costs by further delaying the inclusion of oral-only drugs to 261 treat end stage renal disease into Medicare Part B. 262 drugs are crucial for over 60 percent of patients on dialysis 263 who rely on them for necessary care, and right now about 20 264 265 percent of Medicare patients on dialysis do not have Part D 266 coverage. Congress has delayed inclusion of these drugs into the 267 ESRD bundle for a decade now at the expense of some seniors 268 without access to prescription drug coverage. And I don't 269 agree with supporters of this legislation who argue that the 270 system is not ready for the transition. I think it is time 271 for the delays to stop, and for Congress to ensure patients 272 can access the treatments and care they need. 273 Finally, we will consider four bills that advanced out 274 275 of the Communications and Tech Committee or Subcommittee with unanimous bipartisan support. Taken together, these 276 bills will help protect American networks from security 277 threats, while also allowing our country to remain a global 278

279 leader in communications technology. And I am pleased that we are considering legislation in 280 281 particular led by Subcommittee Ranking Member Matsui, H.R. 1513, the FUTURE Networks Act. This bill will establish a 282 task force at the FTC at the FCC to study sixth-generation, 283 or 6G, technologies, and identify potential supply chain and 284 cybersecurity vulnerabilities. As the next generation of 285 286 tech is developed, this legislation will help us understand the potential risks to best protect our networks and 287 strengthen the technology's design. 288 And with that, Madam Chair, I yield back the balance of 289 290 my time. 291 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. The chair reminds members that, pursuant to the committee rules, all 292 members' opening statements will be made part of the record. 293 Are there further opening statements? 294 The chair recognizes Mr. Latta for three minutes for an 295 296 opening statement. *Mr. Latta. Well, thank you, Madam Chair. Today we are 297 considering four pieces of legislation from the Subcommittee 298 on Communications and Technology that passed with bipartisan 299

300 support. The Chinese Communist Party poses a significant threat 301 302 to American communications networks. Companies with ties to the CCP can be called upon to support, assist, and cooperate 303 with China's national intelligence work wherever they 304 operate. As a result, the presence of equipment from the 305 Chinese vendors in our network poses a significant threat to 306 307 our national security. This committee, on a bipartisan basis, has prioritized 308 addressing this threat. We passed the Secure and Trusted 309 Communications Networks Act to remove Huawei and ZTE 310 equipment from our networks, and we passed the Secure 311 Equipment Act which prohibits the Federal Communications 312 Commission from authorizing equipment from untrusted vendors. 313 Today's legislation builds on this work. 314 I am pleased to lead H.R. 7589, the ROUTERS Act. This 315 legislation will require NTIA to study whether certain 316 routers and modems produced by companies with ties to our 317 adversaries pose an unacceptable risk to our national 318 security. Routers from untrusted vendors, particularly those 319 with ties to the CCP, contain vulnerabilities that could be 320

321 exploited for nefarious purposes, so we need to remove them from our networks. This bill was an important step towards 322 323 securing our networks from the core to the edge. We are also considering H.R. 2864, the Countering CCP 324 Drones Act; H.R. 820, the Foreign Adversary Communications 325 Transparency Act; and H.R. 1513, the FUTURE Networks Act. 326 These bills would prohibit the FCC from authorizing DJI 327 328 drones to operate in the United States due to the threat they pose to national security; require the FCC to annually 329 publish a list of entities with ties to China, Iran, North 330 Korea, or Russia that hold an FCC license, authorization, or 331 other authority; and establish a 6G task force to ensure the 332 U.S. maintains its wireless leadership internationally. 333 I want to thank the minority for working with us in a 334 bipartisan fashion on these bills. I look forward to 335 advancing these bills for House consideration. 336 Madam Chair, I yield back the balance of my time. 337 338 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there further opening statements? 339 The chair recognizes Ms. Eshoo for three minutes. 340 *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman, and good 341

342 morning, colleagues. Today we are considering 28 bills, with 16 unanimously 343 344 advanced by the Health Subcommittee. Most of the bills reauthorize critical public health programs at CDC and HRSA. 345 Several of the health bills support patients with traumatic 346 brain injuries, Alzheimer's disease, and other health 347 conditions, as well as their caregivers. Other bills 348 349 reauthorize Federal programs focused on improving care for children in emergencies, and supporting rural emergency 350 medical services. 351 Four bills were advanced unanimously by our 352 Communications and Technology Subcommittee to maintain our 353 nation's leadership in developing sophisticated 354 telecommunications technology. 355 Seven other bills before us today are partisan attempts 356 to undermine energy efficiency, clean air standards, and 357 pipeline safety. 358 I applaud the work of members that went into the 359 bipartisan proposals before us today, and I am glad our 360 committee is not allowing critical programs Americans rely on 361 to languish. So thank you, Madam Chairwoman, all of the 362

363 members and their good work, and I yield back. The gentlelady yields back. I now *The Chair. 364 365 recognize Mr. Guthrie for three minutes for the purposes of offering an opening statement. 366 *Mr. Guthrie. Thank you, Madam Chair, for holding 367 today's important markup hearing. 368 The legislation before us today will help detect, 369 370 diagnose, and treat chronic diseases and health conditions at earlier stages, improve the quality of life for individuals 371 with disabilities and their families, help ensure Americans 372 in rural communities have access to lifesaving care, and 373 provide additional resources to assist in the development of 374 375 cutting-edge innovation. Over the past few weeks we have heard from numerous 376 stakeholders about how the bills we are considered today have 377 helped improve health outcomes for patients across the 378 country, as well as each of these programs and how they can 379 380 be improved. I thank my Health Subcommittee colleagues for their 381 tireless work to ensure these programs can continue, and 382 working hard to get our work done earlier for the programs 383

384 that expire on September 30. I am also proud to report that the Health Subcommittee 385 386 held a markup last week, and almost all the health care bills we are considering today passed unanimously. 387 I look forward to our continued work today on these 388 important health care bills and getting these signed into 389 390 law. 391 Thank you for the time, and I yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. The chair 392 recognizes Ms. DeGette for three minutes. 393 *Ms. DeGette. Thank you so much, Madam Chair. 394 The PHMSA Office of Pipeline Safety is charged with 395 regulating the safety of onshore pipelines in the United 396 States. PHMSA sets the safety standards that pipelines must 397 comply with, and it inspects interstate pipelines. 398 In 2020 Congress passed the PIPES Act of 2020, which 399 reauthorized PHMSA's pipeline safety activities for three 400 401 The safety provisions included in this act are very They mandate that the pipeline operators carry 402 important. out leak detection and repair programs on their own 403 pipelines, require strengthened standards for the safety of 404

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     LNG facilities, and expand safety requirements and
     regulations to nearly 500,000 miles of gathering pipelines.
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          And as we know from past occurrences, pipelines are
     dangerous when they are neglected. And unfortunately, there
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     are fatal incidents every year. On an average, there are
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     over 600 pipeline safety incidents resulting in 31 injuries
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     and 10 deaths.
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          The Pipeline Safety Authorization bill, enacted in 2020,
     expired last September. The committee Republicans didn't do
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     anything last year towards reauthorizing the program, and now
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     we have this draft bill full of partisan poison pill
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     provisions.
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          Ranking Member Pallone and I sent a letter to Chairs
     Rodgers and Duncan in September, asking for an oversight
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     hearing. But this didn't happen. Unfortunately, we didn't
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     go through the regular bipartisan reauthorization process,
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     and this is the opposite approach.
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          So you know, instead of actually looking at pipeline
     safety, this bill will allow industry to build more
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     pipelines. And the funding in this bill would be for a $42
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     million cut below current authorized levels.
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426 The Energy and Commerce Subcommittee also marked up five anti-efficiency bills that would delay and weaken popular 427 428 energy efficiency programs. Those bills were intended to get the Department of Energy's ability to finalize and enforce 429 efficiency standard related to different household 430 appliances. 431 The bills didn't have legislative hearings. They will 432 433 hurt the regular consumer. And yet the Republicans are standing in the way of this progress. So I want to just say 434 vote no on this. 435 But on a different note, I want to thank the chair for 436 her leadership on the Deondra Dixon INCLUDE Project. We have 437 worked together closely on this bill for many, many years. 438 And it specifically authorizes a key NIH project focusing on 439 that people with Down syndrome are included in medical 440 research that can help them and all of us, and I want to end 441 on that happy note. 442 443 I yield back. *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. The chair 444 recognizes Mr. Carter for three minutes for the purposes of 445 an opening statement. 446

*Mr. Carter. Thank you, Chair Rodgers, for recognizing 447 me during today's markup. 448 449 One of the bills we are considering today is my legislation, the Air Quality Standards Implementation Act of 450 This legislation would make critical, common-sense 451 updates to the National Ambient Air Quality Standards-setting 452 process, and provide the states necessary flexibility so they 453 454 can proactively mitigate wildfire risk. This is an essential piece of legislation that the committee must pass to place a 455 check on just one piece of the EPA's regulatory onslaught. 456 According to the American Action Forum, in 2023 alone 457 the Biden EPA finalized regulations costing Americans 458 American industry \$70.6 billion. And that is if you take the 459 EPA's cost calculations at their word. But they did not stop 460 there. Just 3-and-a-half months into 2024, the EPA has 461 already finalized another whopping \$17.7 billion in 462 regulatory actions. And that is not counting today's 463 finalized tailpipe standards. These totals dwarf all other 464 Federal agencies. 465 Notably, the Securities and Exchange Commission clocked 466 in as the second-largest regulatory cost contributor in 2023, 467

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     adding $19.6 billion in costs on industry, more than $50
     billion less than the EPA's activity.
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          While our Democratic colleagues seem to think these are
     just numbers on a sheet of paper, their costly agenda is
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     harming American families and communities across the country.
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     Just last week an aluminum manufacturing plant in Missouri
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     with enough capacity to produce as much as 30 percent of the
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     country's supply of aluminum, closed its doors and took 400
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     jobs with it. In February, a tin mill facility in West
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     Virginia that once employed 6,100 people shut its doors
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     permanently.
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          These heartbreaking stories and countless others are
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     becoming all too frequent, and in a recent survey from the
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     National Association of Manufacturers, a majority of
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     respondents stated that the Biden Administration's new
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     regulations may undermine their day-to-day business

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support it. 489 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 490 491 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there further opening statements? 492 The chair recognizes Mr. does Doris Matsui have any? 493 Matsui, does she have one? 494 *Mr. Pallone. Yes, she does. 495 496 *The Chair. The chair recognizes Ms. Matsui for three 497 minutes. *Ms. Matsui. Thank you very much, Madam Chair. 498 As both Chairman Latta and I noted in last week's 499 Communications and Technology Subcommittee markup, the stakes 500 for continued U.S. technological leadership couldn't be 501 higher. If we fall behind our global adversaries, the 502 implications for both our economy and national security will 503 be severe. 504 As we have seen across the technological landscape, 505 506 China, Russia, Iran, and others are stepping up efforts to undermine America's interests. This is especially true for 507 the industries under our subcommittee's jurisdiction. 508 is why I am glad we are advancing a slate of bills to counter 509

510 these targeted influence campaigns and reassert American 511 leadership. 512 I am particularly glad the FUTURE Networks Act is on the agenda today. To maintain our lead in wireless 513 communications, we need to be taking steps now to prepare for 514 the next generation of networks. 515 As China leans on Huawei and other companies to advance 516 517 its interests in international standard-setting bodies, the U.S. needs to stay vigilant and engaged. This bill would 518 assemble our nation's brightest minds from industry, 519 government, and academia on a 6G task force. The task force 520 would provide vital insights on the development of 6G and the 521 strategically important standards body. The bipartisan bill 522 will make a crucial downpayment on American leadership by 523 ensuring the U.S. is taking the necessary steps to lead. 524 And our subcommittee has also advanced legislation to 525 combat the influence of adversarial governments across the 526 527 technological landscape. I am glad this committee will be reporting them to the floor soon, and I hope they receive a 528 529 vote soon. With that I yield back the balance of my time. 530

531 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. The chair recognizes Mr. Duncan for three minutes. 532 533 *Mr. Duncan. Thank you, Madam Chair, for recognizing me. Six of the bills we are marking up today will continue 534 our work in delivering affordable and reliable energy to all 535 Americans. 536 We will be taking up my bill, H.R. 7655, the Pipeline 537 538 Safety and Modernization and Accountability Act of 2024. We will also call up a series of bills to stop the Biden 539 Administration's war on Americans' homes through aggressive 540 and unlawful appliance standards. 541 On pipeline safety, the United States has more than 3.4 542 million miles of pipelines. To meet this country's growing 543 energy demands we must modernize and expand our pipeline 544 infrastructure. That is exactly what H.R. 7655 does. It 545 would reauthorize the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety 546 Administration or PHMSA, as it is more commonly known, a 547 548 pipeline safety program for five years and update policies to construct and operate pipelines. It will reduce energy 549 prices for Americans, strengthen the safety of pipelines and 550 LNG facilities, increase energy reliability, and encourage 551

552 innovation and investment in new technologies. This legislation is a product of the committee process. 553 554 We held a legislative hearing on the discussion draft, where we heard from both PHMSA Deputy Administrator Tristan Brown, 555 as well as a stakeholder panel representing those responsible 556 for delivering liquid fuels safely and reliably to millions 557 of Americans. Based on their testimonies we incorporated 558 559 additional provisions to the bill, many of which were included in the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee's 560 bill. 561 This committee has also heard testimony from energy 562 reliability experts, grid operators, state public utility 563 commissioners, and FERC commissioners that the lack of 564 pipeline capacity in this country has contributed to 565 reliability issues. This bill responds to these warnings by 566 incorporating policies focused on pipeline expansion as well 567 as safety. 568 The Energy and Commerce Committee plays a critical role 569 in reauthorizing PHMSA, and I hope my colleagues will support 570 this legislation. 571 On home appliances, another avenue by which the Biden 572

573 Administration has threatened affordability for Americans is through its aggressive and overreaching energy efficiency 574 575 mandates. This Administration is using efficiency and appliance standards to pursue climate objectives over 576 consumer choice. They started last year by trying to ban gas 577 stoves, and they are now working to impose mandates on every 578 appliance in your home. These bills that we are considering 579 580 today will prohibit the Secretary of Energy from imposing new efficiency mandates and/or enforcing existing standards for 581 washing machines, clothes dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, 582 freezers, and room air conditioners unless the standards are 583 cost effective and technologically feasible, save the 584 consumers money, and save a significant amount of energy. 585 I hope my Democrat colleagues will join us in supporting 586 the efficiency standards that save money and energy for all 587 Americans, including their constituents, and I urge my 588 colleagues to support these measures. 589 590 And with that, Madam Chair, I will yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. The chair 591 recognizes Mr. Tonko for three minutes. 592 *Mr. Tonko. Thank you, Madam Chair. Unhealthy air 593

594 quality is incredibly dangerous to human health. And as we generate more robust and precise scientific evidence, our 595 understanding of these health effects becomes more and more 596 That is why the National Ambient Air Quality 597 Standards are so important. This standard-setting process 598 requires regular reviews and updates to ensure public health 599 is adequately protected, and this process has been incredibly 600 601 effective. We have been able to significantly grow our economy while reducing pollution and protecting Americans. 602 But today we will consider the Air Quality Standards 603 Implementation Act of 2024, which would completely undermine 604 the Clean Air Act. This bill fails to appreciate just how 605 bad unhealthy air is, and that so many Americans live with 606 unsafe air today. There is no doubt that numerous provisions 607 in this proposal will make EPA less likely to strengthen 608 standards in the future, even if the scientific evidence 609 would warrant it. So I would encourage members to oppose 610 611 this bill, and instead celebrate the Clean Air Act. The existing process has a 50-plus-year track record of 612 success, driving innovation in pollution control technologies 613 and enabling the cost-effective reduction of pollution. 614

615 There is no doubt that the progress that has been made would not have been possible absent this law, and there is clearly 616 617 still work to be done. This bill will take us backwards, and I must encourage members to oppose it. 618 Despite my disappointment with the Environment 619 Subcommittee's bill, I would like to express my appreciation 620 to Chairs Rodgers and Guthrie and Ranking Members Pallone and 621 622 Eshoo, and the committee members and staff who have worked to advance three critical Alzheimer's bills today. 623 I also want to thank New York's capital region community 624 living with Alzheimer's, who inspired me to help lead this 625 fight. I see your pain and struggles, but also your strength 626 627 and your resilience. I look forward to moving forward the National 628 Alzheimer's Project Act Reauthorization Act, the Alzheimer's 629 Accountability and Investment Act, and the BOLD 630 Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Reauthorization Act. 631 632 are meaningful bills that will bring investments, bring coordination, and bring hope to so many Americans that are 633 part of the Alzheimer's community. 634

SHINE 1927 1928 for Autumn is not new to this committee, because we passed it 1929 in the last Congress. But the need to enact it into law is still urgent. 1930 Stillbirth is a public health crisis in the United 1931 States, with over 21,000 stillbirths every year, almost 60 1932 1933 babies dying every day. And like too many other maternal and child health issues, there are persistent and longstanding 1934 disparities with Black women more than twice as likely to 1935 experience stillbirth than White women. At least one out of 1936

1937 every four stillbirths are estimated to be preventable, but there is still so much that we do not know. That is why we 1938 1939 need real change that will lead to measurable improvements in outcomes for families. 1940 And the SHINE for Autumn Act would improve surveillance 1941 and data collection relating to stillbirth nationwide, and 1942 invest in research to examine the causes and risk factors. 1943 1944 Additionally, it would seek to increase education and 1945 awareness around stillbirth. We need a clearer picture as to why babies are dying if we want to make progress towards 1946 reducing stillbirth rates and improving outcomes. 1947 timely and accurate data, we can begin to understand the 1948 1949 underlying causes and guide our policy actions and much-1950 needed strategies for prevention. Together our committee can address the serious maternal 1951 and infant health crisis that is tearing families apart and 1952 causing significant pain and trauma. I understand that 1953 1954 committee staff are working in a bipartisan manner to move the bill forward, and I want to thank them for their efforts. 1955 So while I do support the passage of this bill, 4581, I urge 1956 us not to forget the urgency or the need to pass the 1957

I am so grateful to see my bill, the Charlotte Woodward Organ 2147 Transplant Discrimination Prevention Act, included in today's 2148 markup. 2149 As many of you know, this bill is named for Charlotte 2150 2151 Woodward, who is here with us today. 2152 *The Chair. Denial of an organ transplant based upon disability that 2232 is not medically significant is absolutely critical for 2233 fairness as we are going forward and we are looking at 2234 2235 critical health care rules, especially those with a support network. We need to give folks a chance. It has been 24 2236 years since we saw the Americans with Disabilities Act 2237 passed, and we still have a long way to go. 2238 But I am excited that this is a step closer to the grand 2239 2240 promise of that Act. I offer my amendment in the nature of a substitute to the Traumatic 3615 Brain Injury Reauthorization Act, and this AINS makes one 3616 bipartisan change from our subcommittee markup to amend the 3617 matching grant program to be more equitable for the states. 3618 3619 As we know, the goal of these state partnership programs is to ensure that every state has coordinated systems of care 3620 in place that provide resources to people with brain injury 3621 and their families, with a focus on improved long-term 3622 outcomes. And this change will be another step forward in 3623 meeting this mission. 3624 I would like to thank not only the chairwoman, our 3625 colleagues, and the staff for supporting the underlying bill 3626 and working with me on the reauthorization, I also want to 3627 thank my colleague from New Jersey, Mr. Pascrell, for his 3628 3629 tireless advocacy in support of people with brain injuries. More than two decades ago, Congressman Pascrell founded 3630 the bipartisan Congressional Brain Injury Task Force, and 3631 since then they have enacted laws and secured hundreds of 3632

3633 millions of dollars in funding to support accident victims, veterans, athletes, and others experiencing traumatic brain 3634 3635 injury. Representative Pascrell's interest in brain injuries began during his first campaign for Congress in 1996, when he 3636 met a soon-to-be-constituent named Dennis John Beningo. 3637 After suffering a traumatic brain injury at the age of 15, 3638 Mr. Beningo began advocating for more TBI research and 3639 3640 funding to close the knowledge gap and search for a cure. But sadly, Dennis John passed away earlier this year. But 3641 the bipartisan work today by our committee is our chance to 3642 honor his and so many others' legacy affected from TBIs. 3643 So again, I urge support of this AINS and the underlying 3644 bill before us to continue HHS's critical work until 2029. 3645 And again, I thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 3646 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 3831 minutes. 3832 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair. I am proud that 3833 3834 today we are advancing my bill, H.R. 6829, the Cardiomyopathy Health Education, Awareness, and Research and AED Training in 3835 the Schools Act, or we call it the HEARTS Act. 3836 This important bill tackles the crisis of sudden cardiac 3837 death among our country's school-aged children and 3838 adolescents. I introduced this bill last December after 3839 hearing about two New Jersey families who had each lost a 3840 child to sudden cardiac arrest or in high school sporting 3841 events. And thousands of school-aged kids die this way every 3842 single year. 3843 3844 But the good news is that bystander intervention can help save many of these lives. So the HEARTS Act utilizes 3845 evidence-based principles to drastically increase the chance 3846 of survival for children who experience a cardiac emergency 3847

3848 in school. The bill directs the Secretary of Health and Human Services, in consultation with the director of the 3849 3850 centers for Disease Control and Prevention, to develop educational materials on common, high-risk cardiac 3851 conditions, as well as quidelines on the placement of 3852 Automated External Defibrillators, or AEDs, in schools. 3853 also provides resources to schools to help them implement 3854 3855 cardiac emergency response plans, and reauthorizes a Federal 3856 grant program to help them purchase AEDs. This multi-pronged approach ensures that schools not 3857 only have the resources to secure lifesaving AED technology, 3858 but also the teachers and school administrators are 3859 3860 knowledgeable and prepared to intervene using CPR and AEDs in the case of a cardiac emergency. 3861 Additionally, the HEARTS Act supports sudden cardiac 3862 arrest survivors and others living with cardiomyopathy. 3863 bill instructs the CDC to report its findings on current 3864 3865 research and surveillance activities related to cardiomyopathy across the lifespan. It also allows the 3866 National Institutes of Health to expand and coordinate 3867 research activities with respect to cardiomyopathy, similar 3868

We also know that there is a critical transition point 4080 4081 as patients grow from pediatric to adult care, requiring specialized medical attention and coordination to ensure 4082 continuity of care. 4083 Too often, due to workforce challenges and education 4084 gaps, patients with CHD face significant barriers in access 4085 4086 to care. That is why I am glad the subcommittee, we in the subcommittee, we were able to include language that requires 4087 HHS to issue a comprehensive assessment regarding the acute 4088 needs of congenital heart patients nationwide, examining 4089 4090 research gaps, and evaluate and provide recommendations on 4091 how to improve the workforce and strengthen training for providers to help reduce these barriers. 4092 HHS will be required to consult on long-term strategies 4093 with stakeholders and the patient and provider community so 4094 we will we can learn how best to address shortages, 4095 4096 increase awareness, and offer best practices. We will be bringing together the relevant researchers and agencies such 4097 as CDC, HRSA, and NIH together to examine these needs and 4098 foster collaboration. That is the key, as far as I am 4099

concerned: collaboration. Together we can improve long-term 4100 health outcomes and quality of life for congenital heart 4101 4102 for the community. And I believe H.R. 7189 will take a significant step towards improving our continued efforts to 4103 research and care for patients with CHD. 4104 I want to thank my fellow leads on this legislation, 4105 bipartisan effort: Representative Soto, Carter, Schiff, 4106 4107 Salazar, and Cardenas for their support on this initiative, as well as Senators Durbin, Young in the Senate. And I have spent a long time thinking 4450 about individuals with Down syndrome because there was never 4451 4452 any research done about this, people just sort of neglected this whole population. 4453 And in 2018 and you and I had a lot to do with this 4454 NIH launched the INCLUDE Project, which investigated 4455 conditions that affect individuals with Down syndrome and the 4456 4457 general population like Alzheimer's disease, autism, cataracts, celiac disease, congenital heart disease, and 4458 diabetes. But even though they have been doing the research 4459 for six years, there is no specific authorization in statute 4460 for the project. 4461 And so this bill creates the authorization. It helps 4462 4463 ensure the continuation of the program. Individuals with Down syndrome, they have a different disease spectrum from 4464 people without Down syndrome. And so if you include 4465 individuals with Down syndrome in research, it not only 4466 4467 benefits them, it benefits the general population. And that is why this is such an important piece of legislation. 4468 I am happy to support this, happy to support the AINS 4469 4470 and the underlying bill, and I yield back.

4859 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes in support of his amendment. 4860 4861 *Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I would like to offer this bipartisan amendment that I am leading with Representatives 4862 Kuster, Carol Miller, and Sewell. The Kidney PATIENT Act, 4863 which preserves patient access, choice, and coverage, and 4864 phosphate management for patients with end stage renal 4865 4866 disease, is a must-pass policy. There are more than one in seven adults, or about 35.5 4867 million people, living with chronic kidney disease in the 4868 United States. Many of these patients have kidney failure, 4869 and are on dialysis up to three days a week, often leaving 4870 fatigued. One of the biggest challenges patients with kidney 4871 failure experience is managing high levels of phosphate in 4872 their blood, which can heighten the risk for heart attack, 4873 stroke, or amputations if left untreated. 4874 The standard of care for high phosphate is medication 4875 4876 known as Phosphate-Lowering Therapies, or PLTs, and these drugs must be taken outside of the dialysis setting since 4877 they must be taken with food, and you are prohibited from 4878 eating in the dialysis setting. Patients and their 4879

prescribing physicians currently have access to these drugs, 4880 but that would change under CMS's plan to add phosphate-4881 4882 lowering therapies into Medicare Part B end stage renal disease prospective payment system by 2025. 4883 Failing to act now will threaten kidney disease 4884 patients' access to lifesaving medications and increase 4885 patient out-of-pocket costs for their dialysis treatments. 4886 4887 Furthermore, once these drugs move to Part B, many patients will have a higher co-pay for certain binders that 4888 they currently have in Part D. According to the 4889 Congressional Budget Office, moving the phosphate-lowering 4890 drugs into the bundle will increase Medicare Part B premiums 4891 for all beneficiaries. 4892 4893 I am also aware that since this policy was put into place a majority of patients have since selected Medicare 4894 Advantage, and now have prescription drug coverage. Moving 4895 these drugs into the bundle is bad for the practice of 4896 4897 nephrology. It is bad for patient care, and it increases costs to both the system and to Medicare patients. 4898 The Kidney PATIENT Act is common-sense legislation that 4899 will ensure patients with severe kidney disease who are on 4900

I encourage my colleagues to support this amendment to 4923 the Kidney PATIENT Act, and protect end stage renal disease 4924 patients across the country. 4925 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 4926 *Mr. Bucshon. Does the gentleman yield? Will the 4927 gentleman yield? 4928 4929 *Mr. Carter. I will yield to Dr. Bucshon. *Mr. Bucshon. I will be brief. As co-chair of the 4930 House Kidney Caucus, I am in support of this amendment and 4931 the underlying bill. 4932 I think, you know, feeling that you can put these drugs 4933 4934 into the bundle, that more patients will get access is actually, the opposite is true. If this happens, it will 4935 further limit access to these medications, which Mr. Carter 4936 outlined very thoroughly. 4937 And so as a physician and, again, as co-chair of the 4938 4939 House Kidney Caucus, I am in strong support of the amendment and the underlying bill, and I yield back to Mr. Carter. 4940 *Mr. Carter. Anyone else need time? 4941 Madam Chair, I yield back. 4942

4943 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there further discussion? 4944 4945 Mr. Pallone is recognized. *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair. I move to strike 4946 the last word in opposition to the AINS and the underlying 4947 bill. 4948 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five 4949 4950 minutes. *Mr. Pallone. I will say maybe partially in tongue in 4951 cheek to Mr. Carter that I am not impressed by Ways and Means 4952 action. 4953 4954 [Laughter.] 4955 *Mr. Pallone. Not today or any day. But that is okay. My concern is that this bill would keep a single class 4956 of drugs, namely oral-only phosphate binders, out of the 4957 Medicare end stage renal disease ESRD prospective payment 4958 system bundle. I believe that another two-year delay in 4959 4960 bringing this class of drugs into the ESRD bundle will prevent seniors from accessing necessary medication and raise 4961 health care costs for Medicare beneficiaries. 4962 In 2008 Congress passed the Medicare Improvements for 4963

4964 Patients and Providers Act, or MIPPA, which created a bundled payment for renal dialysis services. A bundled payment for 4965 4966 all items and services gives beneficiaries predictability and protection from high out-of-pocket costs, ensuring they are 4967 not hit with surprise bills for items and services outside of 4968 the ESRD bundle. 4969 While oral-only drugs were intended to be included in 4970 4971 the ESRD bundle in 2014, Congress has since delayed their inclusion on three separate occasions, amounting to an 11-4972 year delay. Now, a decade later, manufacturers of these 4973 drugs are once again pushing for another delay so they can 4974 keep drug prices high at the expense of seniors. 4975 4976 Oral-only phosphate binders are currently the only item that remains outside the ESRD bundle payment, other than new 4977 technologies which are separately paid on a temporary basis. 4978 These oral-only ESRD drugs are crucial for over 60 percent of 4979 patients on dialysis who rely on them to regulate their 4980 4981 phosphate levels. I also understand that dialysis patients take, on 4982 average, between 7 and 15 prescribed medications, resulting 4983 in them taking up to 19 pills per day, a pill burden that 4984

4985 contributes to high out-of-pocket drug costs and difficult decisions about which medications they should prioritize. 4986 4987 In fact, the price of one of the newer drugs in this class of phosphate binders is a whopping \$35,520 per year. 4988 That is approximately \$2,960 a month for patients without 4989 Part D coverage. It is nearly the cost of providing dialysis 4990 for an entire year to a Medicare beneficiary. The drug 4991 4992 companies that manufacture this drug know that they will not be able to charge this price once phosphate binders are 4993 incorporated into the ESRD bundle, which is why they are 4994 working so hard to ensure that the drug stays out of the 4995 4996 bundle. 4997 Now, one in five Medicare patients on dialysis do not have Part D coverage. These Medicare beneficiaries currently 4998 struggle to access the necessary medications, and they have 4999 to pay hundreds of thousands of dollars in out-of-pocket 5000 While proponents of this bill argue without evidence 5001 5002 that these beneficiaries have access to other forms of coverage, it is not accurate. According to MedPAC, 36,000 5003 Medicare beneficiaries on dialysis have no other forms of 5004 credible coverage. And this is tens of thousands of dialysis 5005

5006 patients who have to pay hundreds or even thousands of dollars in out-of-pocket just to access these medications. 5007 5008 I am also concerned that this bill would further exacerbate gaps in health outcomes. Black patients are three 5009 times more likely to experience kidney failure, and one in 5010 three Black Medicare beneficiaries will be diagnosed with 5011 chronic kidney disease in their lifetime. Additionally, 5012 5013 Black patients are more likely to report difficulty affording their prescription drugs. Another delay would extend unequal 5014 access to necessary medications and result in high out-of-5015 pocket drug costs for minority and medically underserved 5016 5017 communities. Now, CMS has found that inclusion of oral drugs into the 5018 bundle actually increases access for minority communities. 5019 In 2018 oral calcimimetics were incorporated into the bundle, 5020 and subsequently CMS observed increased access and 5021 significant increases in utilization among all patients, with 5022 5023 a more significant uptake among Black and Hispanic patients. I would like to address the arguments made by some 5024 stakeholders that a two-year delay is necessary because the 5025 dialysis industry is not ready for these changes. In fact, 5026

5027 CMS has communicated that they are ready to include these drugs in the ESRD bundle beginning in 2025, and GAO has 5028 5029 confirmed that dialysis organizations have the capacity and the distribution system to dispense oral-only ESRD drugs to 5030 Medicare beneficiaries, which are already doing. 5031 Another delay is unnecessary, in my opinion, and will 5032 only harm patients' access to these drugs. For over a 5033 5034 decade, delays in moving oral-only drugs into the Part B ESRD bundle have resulted in lack of access to necessary 5035 medications for seniors. Another two-year delay in bringing 5036 this drug into the ESRD bundle will continue to lock seniors 5037 out of coverage for necessary medications, or force them to 5038 5039 pay thousands of dollars in out-of-pocket costs. So I think it is time for Congress to close this 5040 loophole, and I urge my colleagues to oppose both the AINS 5041 and the underlying bill. And with that I yield back. 5042 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. 5043 5044 further discussion? For what purpose does Mr. Sarbanes seek recognition? 5045 *Mr. Sarbanes. Thank you, and thank you for the Greek 5046 pronunciation of my name, I appreciate that. 5047

5048 [Laughter.] *Mr. Sarbanes. I just want to support what Ranking 5049 5050 Member Pallone just said. A couple of things I have concerns about the bill, many of the things that he mentioned. 5051 This delay, I don't think, is can be supported or 5052 justified at this point. I mean, we are talking about 5053 already a delay of more than a decade in terms of getting 5054 5055 these drugs into the bundling structure, and that has resulted in lack of access, as he said. 5056 The reliance of patients, over 60 percent of them, 5057 dialysis patients who need these phosphate binders to 5058 regulate their phosphate levels, that is incredibly important 5059 5060 and of consequence in this conversation. The fact that these drugs are covered under Medicare 5061 Part D, but 20 percent of the patients don't have that 5062 coverage, and therefore they are going to struggle with the 5063 and they are struggling with the expensive medications, and 5064 5065 we have discussed and the ranking member has indicated the number of pills that need to be taken per day here. So that 5066 is something that we have to take into consideration. 5067 We know the important role that dialysis facilities play 5068

5069 in ensuring Medicare beneficiaries receive appropriate These facilities already dispense other types of 5070 treatment. 5071 oral-only drugs, and have the capacity to dispense these oral-only drugs to Medicare beneficiaries. It matters to me 5072 that CMS has concluded that the dialysis centers have the 5073 capacity to make this change, and that including oral-only 5074 drugs in the bundle will increase access and utilization for 5075 5076 dialysis, which Representative Pallone indicated. note the GAO issued a report last year concluding that 5077 providers are ready to take to take this on. 5078 Let me just finish by noting that in a prior life, as an 5079 attorney, I represented a lot of health care providers that 5080 5081 were often in this position of having to navigate the payment mechanisms. In fact, I represented dialysis providers who 5082 had to navigate that. And I understand why there can be some 5083 anxiety when these adjustments get made on the payment side. 5084 But frankly, when I was in that role it meant something 5085 5086 to me that GAO would have done the work it did, that CMS had reached the conclusions that it has. That would be 5087 compelling. And I saw how providers, once those judgments 5088 had been made by these agencies, in fact, were in a position 5089

5090 to do this and do this well. So for those reasons I oppose the bill, and I yield back 5091 5092 my time. The gentleman yields back. Is there *The Chair. 5093 further discussion? 5094 Seeing none, the vote occurs on the AINS. 5095 Oh, for what purpose does Ms. Eshoo seek recognition? 5096 5097 *Ms. Eshoo. I seek recognition to strike the last word to speak on the amendment, Madam Chairwoman. 5098 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five 5099 minutes. 5100 5101 *Ms. Eshoo. I support the bipartisan amendment offered 5102 by Representatives Kuster and Carter. The amendment is a bipartisan agreement advanced by the 5103 Ways and Means Committee by a vote of 41 to 1. I know that 5104 Mr. Pallone has said that that doesn't mean anything to him, 5105 but I think it should be considered. 5106 5107 The amendment delays including oral-only phosphate binders in the end stage renal disease payment bundle for two 5108 That is a reduction from the 10-year delay called for 5109

in the original legislation.

5110

5111 Patient groups such as the National Minority Quality Forum, and nephrologists including Stanford nephrologist Dr. 5112 5113 Glenn Chertow, are concerned that if the phosphate binders move into the bundle, then dialysis centers will push 5114 patients toward cheaper calcium-based phosphate binders whose 5115 overuse and this has been documented over and over again, 5116 where overuse can cause vascular problems. 5117 5118 According to the GAO report published in November of last year, CMS has not yet developed quality measures to 5119 track whether patients experience poor outcomes from being 5120 pushed toward cheaper binders, so the two-year delay of the 5121 policy would give CMS the time to develop the quality 5122 measures needed to see if care is affected by the shift to 5123 the bundle. 5124 Also, according to the GAO report, dialysis centers 5125 still need to greatly expand their prescribing capacity 5126 before they are ready to dispense the phosphate binders. 5127 5128 Dialysis centers report needing to hire more staff, update their IT systems, establish storage space, and develop 5129 guidance for staff about administering the drugs. 5130 So for these reasons I am going to vote to delay this 5131

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5384 *Mr. Duncan. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 5385 5386 I recognize myself for an introduction of the bill. My legislation will strengthen and reauthorize PHMSA's 5387 pipeline safety program for five years, with increased 5388 funding for state pipeline safety inspectors and a big 5389 emphasis on technological innovation. Importantly, in 5390 5391 addition to improving safety, my legislation would also encourage the modernization and expansion of pipelines to 5392 lower energy prices and improve energy security and grid 5393 reliability for all Americans. 5394 Since the beginning of this Congress, the Energy and 5395 5396 Commerce Committee Republicans have reached across the aisle to see where we can find bipartisanship and compromise. 5397 Pipeline safety reauthorization is no exception. Last July 5398 Chair Rodgers and I released a draft framework, and we spent 5399 the last several months holding hearings and gathering 5400 5401 feedback from the American people on a wide range of pipeline operators and technical experts. The overwhelming message is 5402 that America needs to modernize and expand the three million-5403 plus miles of pipelines we have today to maximize the 5404

5405 economic and national security potential of our vast natural Two weeks ago we held a subcommittee markup where 5406 resources. 5407 we added almost a dozen bipartisan provisions to improve our draft framework. The bill before us today is a product of 5408 rigorous oversight and legislative compromise, but there is 5409 still important work to be done. 5410 H.R. 7655, the Pipeline Safety Modernization and 5411 5412 Expansion Act, will improve safety and promote innovation and 5413 new technologies. The bill requires PHMSA to update studies and regulations covering wide range of new fuels and 5414 technologies, including hydrogen blending, CO2 pipelines, and 5415 sequestration, leak detection, excavation damage, worker 5416 5417 safety, and LNG facility safety. The bill will also allow pipeline operators to modernize 5418 existing pipeline and expand pipelines and existing right-of-5419 ways to improve access to affordable and reliable fuel for 5420 The modernization expansion provisions in this 5421 5422 bill are essential to ensure that states like New York are no longer allowed to unilaterally block interstate pipeline 5423 construction and inflict harm on Americans residing in 5424 neighboring states. 5425

5426 The legislation also protects consumer choice by preventing a state or local government from banning the use 5427 5428 of natural gas, gasoline, or other fossil fuels for political 5429 purposes. I look forward to debating the bill and any amendments 5430 offered today before favorably reporting it to the full House 5431 for consideration. 5432 5433 I also look forward to working with our colleagues on the T&I Committee as they share jurisdiction over some of the 5434 provisions in this bill. We will continue to work toward 5435 getting this bill across the finish line. 5436 5437 And with that I yield back. Is any other member seeking 5438 to be recognized on the bill? Mr. Pence is recognized for five minutes. 5439 *Mr. Pence. Mr. Chairman, I would like to strike the 5440 last word. 5441 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman is recognized for five 5442 5443 minutes. *Mr. Pence. I strongly support H.R. 7655, the Pipeline 5444 Safety, Modernization, and Expansion Act. This legislation 5445 will help advance pipeline and LNG safety for our nation and 5446

5447 lower energy costs for hard-working families. Importantly, this legislation includes my amendment to 5448 5449 direct a study on the technical considerations for safely transporting blended hydrogen and natural gas through 5450 pipelines. Hydrogen is becoming a key fuel for next-5451 generation clean energy applications, many of which are 5452 taking place in my Hoosier State. Cummins Engine Company, 5453 5454 Wabash Valley Resources, and the hydrogen hub near the Whiting Refinery in northwest Indiana are examples. 5455 provision will help establish safe, effective, and efficient 5456 distribution opportunities needed to grow a domestic hydrogen 5457 5458 industry. 5459 I urge support of my colleagues and of the underlying bill, and I yield back. 5460 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman yields back. Any other 5461 members seeking recognition? 5462 Dr. Joyce, you are recognized for five minutes. 5463 5464 *Mr. Joyce. I wish to strike the last word. *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman is recognized. 5465 *Mr. Joyce. I am speaking today in support of the bill. 5466 Thanks to the shale revolution of the last two decades, 5467

5468 Pennsylvania has become an energy superpower. Pennsylvania is now the second largest energy producing state, leading our 5469 5470 country to be able to cut greenhouse emissions while continuing to provide reliable and affordable energy. 5471 The emerging problem Pennsylvania's natural gas industry 5472 is facing is simply limited pipeline capacity. The large 5473 energy reserves under the feet of my constituents cannot be 5474 5475 properly utilized without the pipeline infrastructure that is 5476 needed to support and transport the natural gas that is so desperately needed. 5477 Pipelines are the safest and the most efficient way to 5478 move energy across our country. That is why I coauthored 5479 H.R. 3500, the Mountain Valley Pipeline Completion Act, to 5480 complete the Mountain Valley Pipeline to bring Pennsylvania's 5481 natural gas to the energy-starved southeastern United States. 5482 It is also why I support the Pipeline Safety, Modernization, 5483 and Expansion Act to expand PHMSA with common-sense reforms. 5484 5485 To truly unlock Pennsylvania's and America's energy potential, we need to have the pipeline capacity to deliver 5486 significant quantities of natural gas across our nation, and 5487 continue to increase our liquefied natural gas exports to our 5488

5489 friends and to our allies. With that I urge my colleagues to support this bill, and 5490 5491 I yield the balance of my time. *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman yields back. Are there any 5492 other members seeking recognition? 5493 And the Ranking Member Pallone is recognized. 5494 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you. I move to strike the last 5495 5496 word. 5497 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman is recognized for five minutes. 5498 *Mr. Pallone. Mr. Chairman, I am opposed to the bill in 5499 its current form, and I intend to vote against it, and this 5500 5501 bill would make pipelines more dangerous, and it contains several non-safety provisions. 5502 We have made it very clear to the majority time after 5503 time after time that going back to a letter that the Energy 5504 Subcommittee Ranking Member DeGette and I sent in September 5505 5506 of last year, six months ago, that the non-safety provisions were a poison pill for committee Democrats. Unfortunately, 5507 nothing has changed in the intervening six months, and with 5508 those provisions left in place Democrats cannot support the 5509

5510 bill. I said this at the subcommittee's markup, but it bears 5511 5512 repeating: Building more pipelines is not pipeline safety. Carbon dioxide sequestration wells are not pipeline safety. 5513 Restricting the choices that states and municipalities can 5514 make is not pipeline safety. This bill covers all three of 5515 these topics. 5516 5517 And these provisions implicate FERC and EPA, and we had zero opportunity to receive testimony on these topics. We 5518 did attempt to ask questions of counsel on the provision 5519 relating to class six wells at the subcommittee markup, but 5520 frankly, that just added to the confusion, rather than 5521 5522 granting us any clarity. If Republicans want to move these provisions so desperately, it is within the right to do so, 5523 but they just cannot expect Democratic support for any bill 5524 that includes them. 5525 The bill also would enact deep cuts in PHMSA's pipeline 5526 5527 safety authorization levels. Over half the Republicans on this committee voted for the government funding bill two 5528 weeks ago that funded PHMSA, and now want to turn around and 5529 vote for a bill that would represent a \$22 million cut versus 5530

5531 what they voted for just two weeks ago. And that is pretty astonishing. 5532 5533 The bill also represents a substantial cut relative to the bipartisan bill that the Transportation and 5534 Infrastructure Committee passed last year, and this bill 5535 authorizes funding that is \$42 million per year less than 5536 that bill, which all Republicans on T&I voted for. 5537 5538 So, like I said in the Energy Subcommittee markup, this should be embarrassing in a sense. The other committee 5539 managed to proceed in the regular order that committee 5540 Republicans claim to love so much. They had an oversight 5541 hearing, they worked together for months to develop a bill 5542 5543 that they then had a markup on. By comparison, our Republicans did not have a hearing on pipeline safety until 5544 three months after PHMSA's most recent authorization expired. 5545 And we found out about their draft bill last year by press 5546 release, and we didn't even receive a heads up. 5547 5548 I appreciate that committee Republicans have claimed they want to work together on this, but their actions 5549 certainly are not showing it. During the Energy Subcommittee 5550 markup, Democrats offered ten different amendments 5551

5552 representing changes that we wanted to see in the bill. Republicans accepted zero of our amendments, even after we 5553 5554 had accepted two amendments of theirs. One side is willing to work together here, and the other is not. So I can't 5555 support this bill as it is currently drafted, and I urge all 5556 members to oppose it until Republicans can come back to the 5557 negotiating table with a serious offer. Until then, I plan 5558 5559 on voting no. 5560 And I yield back, Mr. Chairman. *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman yields back. Are there any 5561 other members seeking recognition on the bill? 5562 Mrs. Fletcher is recognized. 5563 5564 *Mrs. Fletcher. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I move to 5565 strike the last word. *Mr. Duncan. The gentlelady is recognized for five 5566 minutes. 5567 *Mrs. Fletcher. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 5568 5569 The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, or PHMSA, plays a key role in developing and 5570 enforcing Federal safety regulations for the nation's 5571 pipeline infrastructure. 5572

5573 It is important to realize how extensive this infrastructure is. And you said it earlier, Mr. Chairman. 5574 5575 There are more than 3.4 million, you said, miles of pipeline across the country. There are about 2.8 million miles of 5576 paved roads in the United States. Americans rely on this 5577 unseen infrastructure in every state and every community to 5578 heat our homes, fuel our vehicles, and power our economy. 5579 5580 And Americans rely on PHMSA. The work that PHMSA does is essential. I am glad that we are now moving a 5581 reauthorization bill six months after the last authorization 5582 expired. It is essential that we give PHMSA the tools and 5583 5584 the resources to fulfill its mission and ensure safety across 5585 the country. 5586 This bill is certainly better than the draft that was first introduced and the version that we marked up in 5587 subcommittee two weeks ago. Added language on issuing the 5588 class location rule, improving the pilot technology program, 5589 5590 something I have been working on since I got here, and the maximum allowable operating pressure are bipartisan issues 5591 that will help PHMSA operators and safety regulators work 5592 toward a shared goal of a safe and efficient system of 5593

5594 pipelines. But the fundamental issue that remains is that we are 5595 5596 still asking PHMSA to do more with less. Authorization levels in this bill are nearly 20 percent below current 5597 authorization levels. The T&I Committee bill, which passed 5598 unanimously a year ago, by contrast, increased the 5599 authorizations by an average of \$80 million a year. 5600 5601 something that is really important, and that is the direction that I think we should follow. I know we have some 5602 amendments to address that. 5603 But I think it is really important to reiterate that at 5604 our legislative hearing on this we heard from Deputy 5605 5606 Administrator Tristan Brown that department funding levels and lack of staffing resources are the biggest driver in the 5607 backlog of work from previous reauthorizations that remains 5608 unfinished at the department. This is really critical. 5609 Pipelines are the safest and most environmentally 5610 5611 responsible way to deliver oil and gas. A great deal of this is from a robust regulatory and oversight system at PHMSA 5612 that works effectively with industry. If we want PHMSA to 5613 succeed in the new directives that we are issuing in this 5614

5615 bill, we must authorize their funding at levels that will ensure their success. 5616 5617 I would also just note that I have concerns with whether this bill is the appropriate vehicle to include provisions on 5618 permitting reform. Reauthorization bills in the past have 5619 been focused on pipeline safety, which is the mission of 5620 PHMSA. But make no mistake, we need permitting reform, and 5621 5622 our committee can and should be working on a comprehensive 5623 set of reforms to address the many issues that we know need addressing. 5624 The siting process for all forms of energy, fossil and 5625 renewable alike, is not working, and Congress needs to 5626 5627 address it. This committee is the one to do it, and I hope that the committee will work to address these issues in a 5628 holistic and bipartisan way. I look forward to working with 5629 all of my colleagues on this committee, everyone in this room 5630 who wants to tackle these important challenges. 5631 5632 And with that I thank you and yield the balance my time. *Mr. Duncan. It would keep the pipeline safety bill about 5651 pipeline safety by striking two sections that have nothing to 5652 do with pipeline safety. 5653 The first provision it strikes has to do with so-called 5654 5655 aquifer exemptions for class 6 wells used to sequester carbon It would expand the use of these exemptions to 5656 dioxide. wells and drinking water aguifers that the exemptions were 5657 never designed for, and could potentially imperil safe 5658 drinking water across the country. Frankly, I am shocked 5659 5660 that we had no one in from the EPA to testify or provide feedback on this language. At our Energy Subcommittee markup 5661 there seem to be fundamental confusion as to the intent and 5662 purpose of the language, along with its real-world impacts. 5663 Having the EPA testify about this would have offered much-5664 5665 needed clarity, but the Republicans chose not to invite the 5666 agency. Now, the second provision that my amendment would strip 5667 is one that would provide FERC the authority to automatically 5668

5669 site any pipeline or expansion of a pipeline along a currently existing right-of-way. And this section 5670 5671 obliterates states' rights and federalism under the Clean Water Act. It is a direct attack on the states' ability to 5672 approve what it wants to happen to the waters within its 5673 borders, and it is unacceptable. 5674 I am particularly concerned about the right it would 5675 5676 give FERC to unilaterally approve hydrogen, carbon dioxide, and petroleum pipelines, the siting for which is all 5677 currently handled at the state level. FERC has no experience 5678 or practice siting these pipelines, and this bill would allow 5679 it to plow through any state opposition without any 5680 5681 quardrails. And I want to point out that nowhere in my description 5682 of these provisions did I ever use the word "safety.' It is 5683 because these provisions have nothing to do with pipeline 5684 safety, and they do not belong in a pipeline safety bill, as 5685 5686 we have told the Republican majority for many months now. long as the Republicans insist on including non-safety 5687 provisions with a pipeline safety bill, Democrats can't 5688 support it. 5689

What it 5934 does is it changes the authorization levels in the bill to 5935 the authorization levels included in the bill passed with 5936 bipartisan support out of the House Transportation and 5937 5938 Infrastructure Committee earlier this Congress last December. 5939 And it wasn't just bipartisan support, it was unanimous bipartisan support. 5940 So the reason why they did that, it was a compromise. 5941 And it was a good compromise, because what it does is it 5942 ensures that PHMSA will have the resources that it so 5943 desperately needs and that we heard repeatedly from Deputy 5944 Administrator Brownback in our Energy Subcommittee hearings 5945 that we had. It needs the resources not only to keep our 5946 nation's pipelines safe and secure, but to carry out 5947 5948 Congress's instructions in a timely fashion. And this is a real concern. PHMSA testified they are still working through 5949 mandates in the pipeline safety reauthorization from 13 years 5950 ago, so they just don't have the resources, but at the same 5951

5952 time we are asking them to do more. We know what the carbon dioxide and hydrogen pipelines 5953 5954 that are going to be built across the country. PHMSA is going to have that additional responsibility. They are going 5955 to have to publish rules on the safety of the pipelines, they 5956 are going to have to inspect them to make sure they are safe. 5957 All of that requires resources. And to starve PHMSA's budget 5958 5959 at the same time we are asking it to drastically expand its 5960 responsibilities is just really asking for trouble. And so I also want to make and emphasize a point that 5961 Ranking Member Pallone has made over and over again, which is 5962 if this bill were to be enacted into law, it would be a \$22 5963 million cut for fiscal year 2024 versus the appropriations 5964 that we just voted on two weeks ago. 5965 And I finally want to address one point that we made in 5966 the subcommittee when the Republicans asked me to withdraw my 5967 amendment so we could work together. Offering amendments is 5968 5969 working together. Democrats accepted two Republican-offered amendments at the subcommittee markup, and we could have 5970 you know, I guess we could work on this, too. And so I 5971 really urge that we support the amendment. 5972

5973 And I yield back. The gentlelady yields back. I recognize 5974 *Mr. Duncan. 5975 myself to strike the last word and speak in opposition to the amendment. 5976 H.R. 7655, the Pipeline Safety and Modernization 5977 Expansion Act, contains authorization levels that reflect 5978 prior-year appropriations, with a larger share going to 5979 5980 states, approximately 50 percent. The IIJA authorizes 1.2 trillion for 5984 5985 transportation infrastructure spending, with 550 billion of that figure going toward new investments and programs. 5986 PHMSA does not need a 20 percent increase in their budget to 5987 operate effectively, and I urge my colleagues to oppose the 5988 amendment. 5989 5990 And I yield back. Colleagues, this amendment allows private citizens to 6181 bring mandamus-type lawsuits against PHMSA when it fails to 6182 adequately enforce pipeline safety law. 6183 This issue of pipeline safety is not an abstract issue 6184 6185 In 2010 a Pacific Gas and Electric, PG&E, transmission line exploded in San Bruno, California, in San 6186 Mateo County, where I live, killing eight people, injuring 6187 dozens more, and destroying 38,000 homes. A National 6188 Transportation Safety Board investigation found that lax 6189 oversight and PG&E's inadequate safety program were 6190 contributing factors in causing the disaster. 6191 In the aftermath of the explosion, the City and County 6192 of San Francisco sued PHMSA for failing to meet its legal 6193 obligation to ensure PG&E's pipelines were safe. 6194 6195 Unfortunately, the Ninth Circuit dismissed the case and ruled that the law's citizen suit provision did not allow for 6196 lawsuits forcing PHMSA to perform its duties. Now, they are 6197 supposed to perform their duties. They don't do their duty, 6198

6199 but citizens can't do anything about it. This ruling weakened an important tool to hold the 6200 6201 agency accountable before a disaster happens. My amendment explicitly authorizes these lawsuits. It is particularly 6202 urgent because the bill before us cuts PHMSA's budget, which 6203 will give the agency fewer resources to enforce its safety 6204 standards, increasing the likelihood of safety incidents. 6205 6206 Moreover, the bill contains several other provisions that really have nothing to do with safety, including 6207 language blocking states and local governments from 6208 restricting natural gas connections to new developments. 6209 My Republican colleagues, I mean, we hear them talking 6210 all the time about states' rights. So I am disappointed they 6211 want to tie the hands of local communities to make their own 6212 decisions about their energy needs, including cities like 6213 Palo Alto, Menlo Park, and my congressional district. 6214 Other provisions, such as allowing FERC to overrule the 6215 6216 concerns of states and other Federal agencies in the 6217 permitting process suggests the true purpose of the bill is to build more pipelines. 6218

With over three million miles of pipeline stretching 6709 across our nation, I can't think of a reason why my 6710 colleagues wouldn't would oppose this language. Geological 6711 hazards like earthquakes or landslides have caused several 6712 recent pipeline failures. For example, in 2020 the failure 6713 on a carbon dioxide pipeline in Mississippi sent 45 people to 6714 the hospital, and in 2022 a rupture on a crude oil pipeline 6715 spilled 165,000 gallons of crude oil into a nearby creek. 6716 Both were caused by land movements, a type of geological 6717 6718 hazard. PHMSA has issued multiple advisory bulletins to pipeline 6719 operators on mitigating threats from geohazards, but has not 6720 created any specific requirements for operators to mitigate 6721

6722 geohazards. Frankly, my preference would be to insert language requiring PHMSA to require operators to include 6723 6724 geohazards in their threat mitigation plans. I recognize that some of my colleagues may feel that that goes too far. 6725 So in the spirit of bipartisanship, I would like to propose 6726 my amendment as a bipartisan compromise, a compromise that 6727 has already gained bipartisan approval. 6728 6729 This language that I am proposing was included in the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee's Pipeline Safety 6730 bill that passed out of committee with bipartisan support. 6731 This compromise would ensure that Congress and PHMSA are 6732 informed on the threats of geohazards, and are aware of any 6733 regulatory gaps. It would allow PHMSA to make its own 6734 requirements if it determines it is necessary, and could tee 6735 up Congress to be more informed during the next 6736 reauthorization cycle. 6737 While it has been made abundantly clear that Republicans 6738 6739 on this committee are committed to a hyper-partisan process at the expense of our constituents' safety, I think this 6740 amendment should be a no-brainer for all of us. 6741 report that Republicans and Democrats have already been able 6742

I am offering an amendment that makes technical modifications to two 6939 important provisions of the bill. 6940 The first provision my amendment addresses is section 6941 12, focusing on the maximum allowable operating pressure. 6942 6943 would address an issue that is important to many of my 6944 constituents in Texas who work in the gas transmission pipeline sector. 6945 And earlier Congresswoman Eshoo spoke about the pipeline 6946 tragedy in San Bruno, California that led a little over a 6947 decade ago to this committee advancing a bipartisan pipeline 6948 safety reauthorization bill aimed at addressing the issues 6949 that came out of that incident. It required PHMSA to ensure 6950 that all gas transmission pipelines be tested if they had not 6951 been previously tested. 6952 6953 In 2019 the final Gas Transmission Rule language promulgated contained multiple provisions that could require 6954 previously-tested gas pipelines to be retested, which was not 6955 the intent of Congress in the legislation. So section 12 of 6956

6957 this bill would help address the drafting error contained in the final rule. 6958 6959 My amendment would improve section 12 by making minor technical changes to ensure parity with our colleagues on the 6960 Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, so that the best 6961 applicable language is used to give PHMSA clear guidance of 6962 our intent. 6963 The second provision that my intent that my amendment 6964 modifies focuses on PHMSA's Technical Safety Standards 6965 Committees in section seven. My constituents in Houston work 6966 to ensure the safety that safe and reliable, 6967 environmentally responsible transportation of natural gas and 6968 6969 liquid fuels every single day. Unlike other Federal agencies, PHMSA has statutorily 6970 required advisory committees for both natural gas and liquid 6971 forms of energy to provide recommendations on complex safety 6972 and regulatory issues. The advisory committees provide an 6973 6974 excellent forum for the public, industry, safety advocates, and government stakeholders to have a voice in advancing 6975 pipeline safety. 6976 Section seven recognizes the value of the advisory 6977

6978 committees, and requires them to meet more frequently than they are required to do in existing law. While the agency is 6979 6980 not bound to follow advisory committee recommendations, it is required by law to provide a rationale for disagreement. 6981 It can be difficult to comb through final rules, which 6982 can be hundreds of pages long, to find the agency's rationale 6983 for disagreement. So my amendment builds upon the 6984 6985 transparency improvements contained in section seven to 6986 require PHMSA to report to Congress on areas of disagreement with its advisory committees the same day that final rules 6987 are published. 6988 In short, my amendment makes minor technical changes to 6989 6990 both provisions to align with the bipartisan bill in the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee that that 6991 committee has advanced. 6992 I am grateful to you, Chairman Duncan, for your 6993 inclusion of both provisions in the underlying proposal, and 6994 6995 I ask that my colleagues support my amendment to improve Thank you, and I yield back the balance of my time. 6996 *Mr. Duncan. These bills follow 7201 7202 the same pattern as so many other Republican attempts to weaken the Department of Energy's ability to finalize and 7203 enforce conservation standards for common household 7204 7205 appliances. They employ the same Republican tactics that we have seen over and over this Congress, and this strategy 7206 7207 doesn't make sense. Four out of the five of the appliances targeted by these bills were included in a consensus 7208 agreement between industry and efficiency advocates last 7209 September so even industry supports these standards, but 7210 Republicans continue to go after them. 7211 7212 In fact, at the subcommittee markup of these bills, Energy Subcommittee Chair Duncan talked about how Samsung is 7213 building appliances in South Carolina and creating jobs in 7214 his home state. Well, we reached out to Samsung to ask if 7215 they support these bills, and they told us these bills are 7216 7217 not something they would support. Samsung is a leader in manufacturing industry-leading energy-efficient appliances. 7218 A hundred percent of the washing machines they manufacture in 7219 South Carolina are Energy Star certified. 7220

7221 It is also surprising to me that these bills are even before us today. These five bills look similar to 7222 7223 Representative Lesko's H.R. 6192, the Hands Off Our Home 7224 Appliances Act, which passed the committee in December. H.R. 6192 applied similar changes to the entire efficiency 7225 program, as opposed to today's focused approach on individual 7226 appliances. Is the majority abandoning the Lesko bill and 7227 7228 its attack on the program as a whole for this more tailored approach? I can think of no other reason why applying the 7229 policies in her bill to a specific appliance would make any 7230 7231 sense. 7232 The thing is, we all know that none of these bills are 7233 becoming law. Rather than focusing on pressing issues, Republicans continue to waste our time with tired attacks on 7234 programs like energy conservation standards that are working 7235 well and helping Americans save money, and this is clearly 7236 designed to score some political points at the expense of 7237 7238 everyday Americans. Now I have to look at the titles of these bills. 7239 Liberty in Laundry Act. What does that mean? I can barely 7240 talk. 7241

7242 [Laughter.] *Mr. Pallone. Liberty for what, for industry and 7243 7244 special interests to decide what is best for consumers and 7245 the environment? And then there is the Refrigerator Freedom Act, the 7246 Refrigerator Freedom Act, freedom to pay higher energy bills 7247 because your refrigerator uses more energy? 7248 7249 Conservation standards are popular, and they are common They help Americans save money on utility bills and 7250 they reduce emissions. So I just wish the majority would 7251 realize their persistent attacks on energy efficiency are 7252 7253 really a waste of time. 7254 I urge my colleagues to vote against all five of these 7255 duplicative, unnecessary bills, and I yield back, Mr. Chairman. 7256 *Mr. Duncan. The gentleman yields back. I recognize 7257 myself to move to strike the last word and speak in favor of 7258 7259 H.R. 7673, the Liberty in Laundry Act, introduced by Representative Ogles of Tennessee. 7260 This bill would prohibit the Secretary of Energy from 7261 prescribing or enforcing energy conservation standards 7262

7263 related to clothes washers that are not cost effective or technologically feasible. This bill is straightforward. 7264 7265 clarifies intent of the Energy Policy Conservation Act, which requires the Department of Energy to find that new standards 7266 will result in a significant conservation of energy and are 7267 technologically feasible and economically justified before 7268 moving forward with the standard. 7269 7270 Unfortunately, the Biden Administration has repeatedly failed to satisfy these requirements. Just a few weeks ago 7271 the Department of Energy released the final efficiency 7272 standards for residential clothes washers and dryers. The 7273 final rule for residential clothes washers, published 7274 7275 February the 29th of this year, will apply to top-loading and 7276 front-loading washers. Compliance with the standards is required by March 1 of 2028. The new rule faces legal 7277 uncertainty, and will increase the already high cost of 7278 clothes washers. Some estimates predict the new standards 7279 7280 for washing machines would increase the per unit prices by as high as \$200 a unit. 7281 Under the EPCA, these standards are intended to save 7282 energy and money for the consumers. Unfortunately, the Biden 7283

- 7284 Administration has prioritized the priorities of the
- 7285 environmental groups over low-income residents, renters, and
- 7286 first-time home buyers, and resulted in standards that will
- 7287 increase prices for these critical home appliances, reduce
- 7288 consumer choice, and impair their performance.
- 7289 I urge all my colleagues to support this bill. It
- 7290 prioritizes affordability and consumer choice for all
- 7291 Americans.
- 7292 And with that I yield back. And are there any other
- 7293 members seeking recognition?
- 7294 Ms. Castor is recognized.
- 7295 *Ms. Castor. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I move to strike
- 7296 the last word for all five bills.

7305 They help us reduce climate pollution that is fueling other very costly impacts. Energy efficiency standards are 7306 7307 effective, and they are widely popular. And it was the Congress that decades ago directed the 7308 Department of Energy to work with appliance manufacturers and 7309 consumer groups and anyone else who wanted to weigh in on how 7310 we routinely improve the appliances that help us at home. 7311 7312 Energy efficiency standards over the years have been a great 7313 success, an American success story especially at helping consumers save money. 7314 But here is a red alert that should go out to families 7315 all across this country. In essence, Republicans now are 7316 7317 reaching into your pocketbooks to take those savings away. And it is no wonder that you all didn't have any 7318 legislative hearings on this bill. You don't want consumers 7319 to understand the millions and billions of dollars that you 7320 are taking from them. None of these bills received a 7321 7322 legislative hearing. None of them. Republicans are rushing action on them in an attempt to 7323 stop the Department of Energy from improving Americans' 7324 household appliances so that they can appease their corporate 7325

7326 polluter friends. I think they are also doing this to obscure from the 7327 7328 great success of Democratic policies on helping American families lower costs and move to clean energy. The Biden 7329 Administration's past and planned energy efficiency actions 7330 will save Americans \$570 billion and reduce greenhouse gas 7331 pollution by more than 2.4 billion metric tons over the next 7332 7333 30 years. This translates into real savings for our 7334 neighbors back home. For example, newly proposed standards for water heaters 7335 alone could save households over \$200 per year. But don't 7336 take it from me. Take it from the Association of Home 7337 7338 Appliance Manufacturers. They are not the ones pushing these bills that reach into our neighbors' pocketbooks and take 7339 their take money out of their wallets. 7340 I am going to quote from their the September 13, 2023 7341 agreement. "Home appliance manufacturers, together with 7342 7343 consumers, climate, and energy and water efficiency advocates today announce a consensus plan to improve energy and water 7344 efficiency for refrigerators and freezers, wine chillers, 7345 clothes washers, clothes dryers, dishwashers, and cooking 7346

7347 products. The jointly recommended standards are projected to save nine quadrillion BTUs of energy, reducing costs for 7348 7349 families and cutting greenhouse gas pollution, while allowing home appliance manufacturers to continue to deliver highly-7350 efficient products with the features consumers want and 7351 expect.' ' 7352 "The home appliance industry has played an undeniable 7353 7354 role in enhancing household energy efficiency, ' ' said the president of the and CEO of the Association of Home 7355 Appliance Manufacturers. "This agreement, if adopted by the 7356 Department of Energy, will allow home appliance manufacturers 7357 to continue to offer a complete range of energy efficient 7358 products with the features consumers depend on every day. 7359 The home appliance industry will continue to work to find 7360 ways to approach regulations that preserve historic 7361 efficiency gains while advancing innovation.' ' 7362 So why are you doing this? It is clear, because it has 7363 7364 been a theme this Congress. Polluters and corporations that can bank more money have too much influence in this Congress. 7365 When you say it is okay for consumers to pay higher electric 7366 bills, despite the fact that home appliance manufacturers are 7367

7368 for these energy efficiency standards, something wrong 7369 something is rotten in Denmark. Something is rotten right 7370 here. So I urge my colleagues to side with people over 7371 polluters for a change in this committee. Let's not allow 7372 our Republican colleagues to reach into the wallets and 7373 pocketbooks of our neighbors. They deserve these cost 7374 7375 savings, and the appliance manufacturers deserve a pat on the back for working together to make sure that they continue 7376 can continue to offer innovative products. So vote no on all 7377 five of these bills. 7378 Thank you, I yield back. 7379 7380 *Mr. Duncan. The gentlelady yields back with two 7381 seconds to go. The bill was introduced by Congressman Mike Ezell from Mississippi. The bill is 7708 straightforward. It clarifies the intent of the Energy 7709 Policy Conservation Act, requires the Department of Energy to 7710 find that new standards will result in a significant 7711 7712 conservation of energy and technologically feasible, economically justified before moving forward with the 7713 7714 standard. Again, unfortunately, the Biden Administration has 7715 repeatedly ignored these requirements, and the bill is 7716 7717 especially prudent, given that the Department of Energy recently set final efficiency standards for residential 7718 clothes dryers and washers. The final rule for residential 7719 dryers, published February 29, 2024, will apply to both 7720

I move to strike the last word. 7913 *Mr. Duncan. The gentlelady is recognized for five 7914 minutes. 7915 7916 *Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Thank you, Mr. Chair. I would like to speak in support of my legislation, H.R. 7637, the 7917 Refrigerator Freedom Act, and I thank Chair McMorris Rodgers 7918 for including this bill in our markup today. 7919 The Department of Energy and Environmental Protection 7920 Agency under the Biden Administration has done nothing but 7921 continue to pass outrageous regulations that only serve to 7922 limit consumer choice, increase energy prices, and control 7923 everything Americans are able to do on a day-to-day basis, 7924 from forcing every American to buy an electric vehicle to 7925 7926 preventing the sale of gas stoves, and now even to what refrigerator you can buy or dishwasher or washing machine. 7927 On January 17 the Biden Administration issued a direct 7928 final rule to regulate refrigerators and freezers. These 7929

regulations only serve to increase prices for these essential

7930

home appliances, reduce consumer choices, and impair their 7931 7932 performance while claiming to fix a problem that does not 7933 exist. The DoE argues that new efficiency mandates will 7934 eventually save consumers money. But how many years do you 7935 have to wait until you save that money? According to the 7936 7937 DoE's technical support documents, the simple payback period for refrigerator freezers could be ten years, ten years for a 7938 product that is only expected to last 14 or 15 years, and we 7939 don't even know the lifespan of these new products. 7940 Furthermore, let me just answer some of the comments 7941 7942 that I have heard in this hearing about this cadre of bills 7943 in appliances. First and foremost, consumers are going to have to pay 7944 higher electric bills. We have seen that in California, we 7945 see that in Germany with their energy policies that they put 7946 7947 forth. So any savings is probably going to be evaporated by the high electric prices they would pay. 7948 Furthermore, there is nothing that prevents an appliance 7949 manufacturer from producing and manufacturing more energy-7950

7951 efficient appliances. However, there is not demand. Ιf there in fact was a market demand signal, they would want to 7952 7953 be produced. And let me just say that we can certainly go back in 7954 time. I have an antique washer, if you want to hand crank it 7955 yourself. It requires zero electricity. I also have 7956 clothespins. You could air dry them and not use any 7957 7958 electricity. We can do dishes by hand. That is still how I do my dishes, and I air dry them. And so I don't use any 7959 electricity on my appliance. And I have a hand-cranked 7960 washer and I have an icebox. So why don't we just go 7961 backwards about 100 years and save a lot of electricity by 7962 7963 utilizing devices that were actually changed and updated and progressed in order that individuals would be able to save 7964 7965 time in doing household chores? Furthermore, my bill simply prohibits the Department of 7966 Energy from prescribing or enforcing energy efficient 7967 7968 standards that are not cost effective or technologically feasible. Any person can go into any place to buy an 7969 appliance, and they can look at the energy efficiencies and 7970 determine whether saving \$9 a year on electricity is worth 7971

- spending 100 to 200 to 500 more on an appliance.
- Tet's let consumers use the job of their brains to
- 7974 determine if they think they are going to save any money
- 7975 through this. Otherwise, we are just going to continue to
- 7976 see higher prices and less choice.
- 7977 With that I urge my colleagues to support my bill, and I
- 7978 yield back.
- 7979 *Mr. Duncan. The gentlelady yields back. Is there any

But instead of working together on areas where we 7997 can find common ground, the majority is rushing through this 7998 misquided bill. 7999 8000 The efficiency standards targeted by this bill are the result of a joint recommendation from a wide range of 8001 stakeholders, including the Association of Home Appliance 8002 Manufacturers, Consumer Federation of America, and energy 8003 8004 efficiency advocates. If we are going to disrupt that 8005 consensus recommendation, I think it is important for the committee members to and the public to understand who is 8006 asking us to take this step. 8007 I have a question for counsel. 8008 Counsel, may you please share how many letters of 8009 8010 support the committee has received for H.R. 7637, Refrigerator Freedom Act, and the names of the organizations 8011 that sent those letters? 8012 *Counsel. Thank you, Congresswoman, for the question. 8013

8812 *Mr. Carter. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 8813 8814 The chair recognizes himself for five minutes to speak on the bill. I am proud to be the lead sponsor of this 8815 legislation, which makes common-sense, practical reforms to 8816 help states implement National Ambient Air Quality Standards, 8817 and I am grateful we will consider it this morning. 8818 8819 As I have described in previous hearings, these issues are not esoteric to me. My district is poised to become the 8820 industrial and manufacturing hub of the southeastern United 8821 States. With the second largest port on the East Coast, 8822 access to rail and interstates, affordable and reliable 8823 energy, and a supportive business environment, we are ready 8824 8825 to grow. But to grow we need permits, and we need a law that works for people, not one that works against their 8826 livelihoods and welfare. 8827 Unfortunately, recent EPA actions to set more stringent 8828 particle particulate matter standards underscore the 8829 problem and have threatened to make 80 percent of new and 8830 expanded projects impossible because of an inability to 8831 obtain air permits. We can fix this. 8832

8833 Congress came together in the late 1970s, and again in the late 1980s to update the Clean Air Act. Those actions 8834 8835 helped set the course for massive improvements in air quality. But as air quality has improved dramatically, the 8836 Clean Air Act's decade-old processes now make it more 8837 difficult for states to achieve new health standards. 8838 air in communities today is far better than in 1977 or even 8839 8840 in 1990. What is not better are requirements designed for the 1970s, not the 21st century. 8841 Tight review timelines force states to scramble to focus 8842 on new standards before they can even implement existing 8843 standards. And convoluted rules mean the most effective ways 8844 to improve air quality and to meet the standards like 8845 wildfire mitigation are prevented by red tape and litigation. 8846 Meanwhile, important provisions Congress enacted 50 years 8847 ago, requirements to consider the negative welfare and public 8848 health impacts of standards implementation, have been totally 8849 8850 ignored. Yet these requirements are more important than 8851 ever. H.R. 7650 takes practical steps to update the Clean Air 8852 Act so it can work for people, not against them. It elevates 8853

8854 the role of EPA's co-regulators, the states, in setting air quality standards. It makes essential reforms to encourage 8855 8856 proactive steps to mitigate wildfires, a major source of emissions. It provides authority to ensure standards are 8857 attainable after confirming they are protective of public 8858 It puts in measures to avoid harmful public health 8859 effects ignored by EPA. It protects the states from being 8860 8861 punished for emissions they cannot control. It requires the agency to produce guidance and regulations to help states 8862 implement air quality standards. It creates a process for 8863 the states to work proactively with the EPA to develop 8864 acceptable state implementation plans, and provides time to 8865 reduce permit gridlock over PM standards. 8866 8867 Simply put, H.R. 7650 helps states implement health standards. 8868 Unfortunately, these practical reforms have been clouded 8869 by a sea of partisan talking points. Like a broken record, 8870 8871 our Democratic colleagues will assert that we are putting polluters over people, undermining public health, and harming 8872 at-risk communities. 8873

Contrary to these baseless talking points, we should

8874

8875 look at the facts: to produce metals and metal products, the U.S. is approximately 20 percent less emissions-intensive 8876 8877 with respect to nitrogen oxides, 30 percent less intensive in terms of volatile organic compounds, and 47 percent less 8878 intensive for particulate matter. We also already have the 8879 highest standards in the world by a large margin. 8880 Rather than building on our excellence and supporting 8881 8882 the economic development that brings vitality to our communities, the Biden Administration is ignoring the law of 8883 diminishing returns and plowing forward with punitive air 8884 quality measures such as the revised PM 2.5 standard and the 8885 so-called Good Neighbor Rule. 8886 8887 Regarding PM 2.5, 25 states, half the country, have sued the EPA. For the Good Neighbor Rule, 23 state implementation 8888 plans were denied, and 12 states are now before the Supreme 8889 Court seeking a stay. These entities are the agency's co-8890 regulators. So much for cooperative federalism. This is not 8891 8892 how the Clean Air Act is supposed to operate. H.R. 7650 updates the Clean Air Act so it serves its 8893 role to help states implement health standards and ensure 8894 opportunity and prosperity for their citizens. I urge my 8895

8896 colleagues to support the Air Quality Standards Implementation Act of 2024, and I yield back. 8897 8898 Does anyone care to be recognized on the bill? The chair recognizes the gentlelady from Michigan, Mrs. 8899 Dingell, for five minutes. 8900 *Mrs. Dingell. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I move to 8901 strike the last word. 8902 8903 *Mr. Carter. So ordered. *Mrs. Dingell. I know many of us support streamlined 8904 permitting that protects public health and our environment 8905 without unnecessary delays. Some of my colleagues in support 8906 of this bill cite the need for the EPA to act on permits and 8907 implementation plans in a timely manner. But unfortunately, 8908 this bill won't accomplish that goal, and does nothing to 8909 help state agencies process permits expeditiously or the EPA 8910 in their efforts to support the states. 8911 The legislation asks our regulators to do far more, 8912 8913 which requires more people, more resources. However, this bill does not provide any additional funding for the EPA to 8914 carry out these responsibilities. In fact, my Republican 8915 colleagues have voted time and time again to slash the EPA's 8916

8917 budget. My top priority is protecting the health of my 8918 8919 constituents in Michigan's 6th district and the health of people across America. I support strong air quality 8920 standards while also being deeply committed to ensuring we 8921 stay globally competitive. Globally competitive, that does 8922 matter, but this bill does not do that. 8923 8924 I am proud of the work that we have done to enact 8925 climate policies that will promote clean air for our communities. Let me be clear. This legislation threatens to 8926 undercut our air quality standards and it endangers our 8927 public health. And that is why I cannot vote for it today. 8928 8929 And some of the examples that you are giving? I have been in a school that is sitting there with some of those 8930 ambient air quality standards that have violated rules, and I 8931 had an asthma attack, the pollution was so bad. 8932 We need to protect our communities, and that is 8933 8934 something we all have a responsibility to do. That is why I 8935 oppose this bill. Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and I yield back. 8936 *Mr. Carter. The gentlelady yields back. The chair 8937

8938 recognizes the gentleman from Georgia, Mr. Allen, for five 8939 minutes. 8940 *Mr. Allen. Mr. Chairman, I move to strike the last word to speak in favor of 7650. 8941 *Mr. Carter. So ordered. 8942 *Mr. Allen. This bill, led by my colleague, Congressman 8943 Buddy Carter, is required because the Biden Administration's 8944 8945 Environmental Protection Agency continues to propose regulations that would place undue burden on economic 8946 development and manufacturing nationwide, most recently with 8947 its finalized standard for fine particulate matter, PM 2.5. 8948 I filed a Congressional Review Act resolution to nullify 8949 the finalized 2.5 standards, as this new standard would have 8950 negative economic impacts on all sectors of our economy. 8951 This is an example of the need to update the process for 8952 setting National Ambient Air Quality Standards. 8953 We have heard from many industries and stakeholders on 8954 8955 the improvements needed for setting air quality standards. Many of these voices come from the states that are charged 8956 with implementing these standards. H.R. 7650 gives more 8957 opportunity for the states to weigh in on these regulations 8958

8959 and work with the agency to construct acceptable state implementation plans. 8960 8961 Specifically, this bill requires that the Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee include at least three members 8962 from the state air pollution board air pollution control 8963 agencies, and ensures such membership represents different 8964 regions of the country. 8965 8966 This bill also provides timely quidance for the state implementation plans, and ensures that revisions to air 8967 quality standards will not allow to pre-construction permits 8968 until implementation guidance is issued [sic]. 8969 H.R. 7650 provides many common-sense changes to the 8970 National Ambient Air Quality standards-setting process, and I 8971 urge all my colleagues to support this bill. 8972 And with that, I thank you and yield back. 8973 *Mr. Carter. The gentleman yields back. Is there 8974 anyone to seek to be recognized on the bill? 8975 8976 On the Democratic side? My amendment is simple, and it fixes one of the most egregious provisions in 9101 the bill, the consideration of likely attainability in the 9102 NAAQS-setting process. 9103 And let's not pretend that we are making minor changes 9104 9105 to the program or applying common sense. This is a radical provision that would allow polluters to override scientists. 9106 9107 It would require EPA to set air quality standards based on corporate polluter profits, rather than public health. 9108 The bill would make so-called likely attainability a 9109 9110 factor in the scientific decision about how much pollution is safe for a child to breathe. Requiring EPA to consider 9111 attainability, or the potential cost of attaining an air 9112 quality standard, is a dangerous precedent that ignores the 9113 history and purpose of the Clean Air Act. Since 1970 the 9114 9115 law's science-based, health-protective standards keep our focus on the end goal: healthy air for everyone. 9116 Cooperative federalism allows EPA to set clean air 9117 standards and states to decide how best to achieve them. 9118

9119 Furthermore, this provision would overturn a unanimous Supreme Court decision saying that the goal of the Clean Air 9120 9121 Act is to achieve air quality that is safe to breathe. 2001 the late Justice Scalia wrote that the Clean Air Act 9122 and I quote "unambiguously bars cost considerations from 9123 the NAAQS-setting process, and thus ends the matter for us, 9124 as well as the EPA.'' 9125 9126 The scientific determination of what is safe to breathe does not and cannot depend on the technology attainability or 9127 cost of cleaning up pollution. This is not to say that these 9128 factors aren't considered at any point. They come to play in 9129 the second step of the process, when states decide the most 9130 effective way to meet their air quality goals, and that is 9131 the appropriate time to consider costs. 9132 But section 2(b) turns this extremely effective approach 9133 on its head. The considerations set up by this section are 9134 equivalent to a doctor basing a patient's diagnosis on the 9135 9136 cost of treatment and likeliness of a cure. It endangers the health of American families, children, and workers. 9137 So my amendment would restore current law and ensure 9138 that the NAAQS continue to be purely health-based standards, 9139

9140 leaving the consideration of cost and attainability to the We must stop fearmongering and presenting false 9141 states. 9142 choices between health and our economy. Almost every time EPA proposes a significant new requirement, polluters tell us 9143 it can't be done, that it will cost too much, or that it will 9144 turn off the lights. And Republicans are once again peddling 9145 these doomsday scenarios. 9146 9147 Section 2(b) is just the latest in a string of legislative attacks on these purely health-based air quality 9148 standards, which could unravel the entire framework of the 9149 Clean Air Act. 9150 And I should note that during the Environment 9151 Subcommittee markup, Republicans asserted that this bill 9152 should be bipartisan. I strongly disagree. Endangering 9153 public health should not be a bipartisan goal. 9154 Congress should be redoubling our efforts to guarantee clean 9155 and healthy air for all Americans. This was the 9156 9157 overwhelmingly bipartisan goal when we first enacted and subsequently amended the Clean Air Act in this committee, and 9158 we should be fighting for Americans to have both clean air 9159 and a thriving economy, as they have endured throughout the 9160

9161 history of the successful law. But let's stop selling the American people short. I 9162 9163 urge adoption of my amendment to ensure we protect the health of the American people, rather than the pockets of corporate 9164 9165 polluters. 9434 *Mr. Carter. And the gentleman from New York is recognized for five minutes in support of the amendment. 9435 9436 *Mr. Tonko. Thank you, Mr. Chair. I want to again express my concerns about the underlying legislation, which I 9437 view as undermining a science-based, well-understood and 9438 effective process to determine health protective air 9439 pollution standards by allowing cost and other considerations 9440 9441 to enter into standards-setting. 9442 There are many provisions within the proposal that I oppose, but I would like to once again, as I did at the 9443 subcommittee markup, offer an amendment that I do not believe 9444 9445 is unreasonable. 9446 EPA's Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee is required by law to consist of seven members, at least one of 9447 which is required to be a physician, one a National Academies 9448 member, and one a state representative. And as I have stated 9449 on several occasions, I am not inherently opposed to having 9450 9451 greater state representation on the CASAC, provided that the committee continues to have the technical and the scientific 9452 expertise necessary to properly advise the administrator. 9453 Section 2© of the bill before us changes the composition 9454

9455 of the committee by increasing the required number of state representatives from one to three, while keeping the other 9456 9457 representation requirements the same. This amendment proposes increasing the number of members from 7 to 13, and 9458 requiring that, along with the three state representatives, 9459 there are also three physicians and three National Academies 9460 members. 9461 9462 If the majority's position is to include more perspectives on the committee, I believe this amendment would 9463 address that concern. This would clearly allow more states 9464 the opportunity to participate in this aspect of the NAAQS 9465 process, without risking erosion of the committee's technical 9466 9467 expertise. 9468 Unfortunately, this amendment was rejected on a partyline vote at the subcommittee markup. It was suggested that 9469 this amendment was just an attempt to maintain status quo. 9470 If that were true, I could easily propose an amendment to 9471 9472 strike the provision entirely. That would certainly be my preference. But this is a genuine attempt to understand the 9473 majority's stated concerns and find a workable solution. 9474 So if members would like to have greater state 9475

Ladies and gentleman, this is nothing more than a cheeky

9497 attempt to maintain the status quo operation of the CASAC. By increasing the total members of the committee and 9498 9499 maintaining at least language for all those except state air pollution control agencies, this language would do nothing to 9500 remedy the diminished voice of the states of the CASAC. 9501 According to testimony received by this subcommittee in 9502 by this committee in September, the latest PM 2.5 review 9503 9504 was conducted by the seven-person chartered Clean Air Science Advisory Committee, CASAC, plus 15 additional panel members, 9505 22 total. Twenty were university research professors and 9506 only one person represented state air pollution control 9507 9508 agencies. 9509 Members of the National Academy of Sciences and physicians are already well represented through the CASAC and 9510 additional adjunct panels. The intent of the Republican 9511 provision is to increase the role of EPA's co-regulators, the 9512 9513 states. 9514 If the gentleman would like to withdraw the amendment, I will be happy to continue to working with him toward the full 9515 committee. There are these are the kinds of discussions we 9516 look forward to having if we both share the goal of working 9517

9518 towards a bipartisan bill. If the amendment is not to be withdrawn, I urge a no 9519 9520 vote, and I will yield back. 9521 Any further discussion? The gentleman from the chair recognizes the gentleman 9522 from Maryland, Mr. Sarbanes. 9523 *Mr. Sarbanes. Thank you very much, Mr. Chair. I want 9524 9525 to support I move to strike the last word. *Mr. Carter. So ordered. 9526 *Mr. Sarbanes. And I want to support Ranking Member 9527 Tonko's very common-sense amendment to H.R. 7650. 9528 We have seen versions of this bill in previous 9529 9530 Congresses. Each time its goal is to impair the Clean Air Act by undermining the National Ambient Air Quality 9531 Standards, or NAAQs, as the ranking member indicated. 9532 Instead of equipping EPA to make science-based determinations 9533 to set reasonable health protective standards, this is 9534 9535 legislation that would strip critical subject matter expertise from the agency's decision-making process, and it 9536 elevates unfounded industry claims. 9537

Every five years EPA must review the most up-to-date

9538

9539 research and decide if the latest science indicates that the current NAAQS sufficiently protect public health, or if they 9540 9541 need to be revised to do so. And the Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee, or CASAC, provides independent advice for 9542 this determination based on technical analysis of the latest 9543 scientific information. 9544 Section 20 of the bill under consideration today, 9545 9546 unfortunately, would change the makeup of the CASAC by increasing the number of members who represent states, but 9547 maintaining the current number of members with scientific and 9548 medical expertise. The effect of this would be to dilute the 9549 ratio of scientists and medical professionals in relation to 9550 other stakeholders, and it would dampen the critical 9551 scientific input into a calculus that must be informed by the 9552 best available data and insights, which is unacceptable. 9553 The amendment offered by Representative Tonko today 9554 would rebalance the CASAC in the underlying bill by 9555 9556 increasing the ratio of members who have the technical expertise to advise EPA on the latest scientific and medical 9557 information. 9558

9747 *Mr. Carter. And the gentlelady from Florida is recognized for five minutes in support of the amendment. 9748 9749 *Ms. Castor. Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman. is a simple, targeted amendment that strikes section 2(e) of 9750 the bill, which is a provision that creates a very dangerous 9751 loophole in the Clean Air Act. 9752 I think we all recognize that the Clean Air Act has 9753 9754 saved lives by improving the air we breathe over time. Like you, I have seen improvements in air quality in the Tampa Bay 9755 area since the Clean Air Act was adopted. The air has 9756 improved year after year, yet we still have many challenges. 9757 Air pollution presents a very serious health risk to our 9758 communities every day. Over 100 million Americans live in 9759 counties with unhealthy levels of air pollution, with 9760 children and the elderly, working-class communities, 9761 communities of color disproportionately at risk. 9762 Air pollution is associated with over 100,000 premature 9763 9764 deaths in the United States every year, and particulate matter is among the most dangerous forms of air pollution. 9765 It is linked to many serious health problems like cancer, 9766 stroke, heart disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, 9767

9768 obesity, and reproductive, neurological and immune system disorders. 9769 9770 And in this committee we work together very collaboratively on health issues. And I think this is an 9771 area where we should also be working together more closely on 9772 the prevention side, preventing cancer, preventing COPD, 9773 ensuring that everyone has clean air to breathe in their 9774 9775 lives. So this amendment, like I said, would not allow you to 9776 open up this dangerous loophole. So I really I recommend 9777 it to you. So let me get into a little explanation. 9778 Under the Clean Air Act it requires any major new or 9779 expanding sources of air pollution to obtain permits before 9780 they start construction. The Act recognizes that part of 9781 cleaning up ongoing pollution is to minimize the amount of 9782 new pollution, according to the existing standards. 9783 obtain a permit for a new source, an applicant must first 9784 9785 determine which pollution controls it will install to reduce that facility's pollution. Then the applicant must estimate 9786 how much pollution the facility will admit, maybe they will 9787 install pollution controls, and then show that this quantity 9788

9789 of pollution will not cause the area to exceed the current standard. If the new facility's pollution will cause a 9790 9791 violation of an air quality standard, the applicant must take additional steps to cut its pollution or obtain offsets for 9792 the excess pollution. 9793 Now, EPA updates and strengthens the national air 9794 quality standards when the science says that it is necessary 9795 9796 to protect the human health. But the GOP bill would allow certain facilities to pollute, to disregard the science, and 9797 ignore a new standard when obtaining a permit. Under this 9798 bill, if EPA doesn't issue rules and quidance at the same 9799 time that it issues a new air quality standard, the old 9800 protective standard applies for purposes of a pre-9801 construction permit. This means that when a facility is 9802 demonstrating whether its emissions will violate the air 9803 quality standard, it would use the old, weaker standard as a 9804 9805 benchmark. 9806 In effect, this bill gives new polluters amnesty, a free pass for them, and dirtier air for everyone else. It will 9807 create exemptions to allow that would allow polluters to 9808 pollute more. It is completely unnecessary. I don't know 9809

why you would put polluters over the public interest here. 9810 After all, states and air quality management agencies 9811 9812 have previously weighed in on this bill. Their common concern is that this provision would slow down the permitting 9813 process. It would unnecessarily exempt facilities from 9814 meeting health protective air quality standards. And on top 9815 of that, this loophole will be bad for business. 9816 9817 facility emits more than its fair share of pollution, that means the other facilities eventually will have to pick up 9818 the slack and control more. 9819 So by granting amnesty to new sources of pollution, the 9820 bill shifts the pollution control responsibility to existing 9821 businesses. That is not fair. This shift will raise 9822 pollution control costs overall for the manufacturing sector. 9823 And as the Clean Air Act has long recognized, it is 9824 generally far more efficient and cost effective to build 9825 pollution controls into a facility up front, rather than 9826 9827 adding them later. But this provision does the opposite. allows new facilities to be built with insufficient pollution 9828 controls, forcing more expensive controls on existing 9829 businesses. That makes no sense. 9830

9831 So I urge support of the amendment, and I urge you to strike the amnesty provision from the bill. 9832 9833 I yield back. *Mr. Carter. The gentlelady yields back. Is there 9834 further discussion on the amendment? 9835 The chair recognizes himself for five minutes to speak 9836 against the amendment. 9837 9838 This amendment strikes an important provision of the 9839 bill, which requires EPA to issue implementation guidance when it issues new standards. If EPA fails to provide such 9840 information, the standards will not apply to pre-construction 9841 permits until it has been promulgated. This provision 9842 creates an incentive for EPA to be more efficient, and 9843 provides relief for states burdened by regulatory deadlines 9844 and, frequently, a lack of needed quidance from the agency. 9845 EPA has been very slow to issue guidance for states. 9846 According to a CRS review for the committee in all cases when 9847 9848 issuing new or revising standards, EPA guidance has taken four to eight years to be issued. This creates great 9849 uncertainty for the states and delays permitting projects. 9850 Nothing in this language prevents states, local, or 9851

9852 tribal permitting authorities from imposing more stringent permitting requirements for permit applicants, and new 9853 9854 manufacturing and industrial facilities still must install best available control technology to reduce emissions, even 9855 when EPA fails to issue guidance. 9856 There is no reason EPA shouldn't issue timely 9857 implementing regulations and guidance when it issues new 9858 9859 standards. I ask my colleagues, ask your state regulators if 9860 they want timely guidance. I urge a no vote on this amendment, and I yield back. 9861 Any other discussion on this amendment? 9862 9863 The chair recognizes the gentlelady from Colorado, Ms. 9864 DeGette. *Ms. DeGette. Thank you. I rise in support of this 9865 amendment. 9866 Regulated entities claim EPA isn't issuing 9867 implementation rules and quidance quickly enough after 9868 9869 updating a National Ambient Air Quality Standard, or NAAQS. The bill concludes the solution is to sacrifice public health 9870 by allowing facilities to ignore the new standard. I don't 9871 think we should have this kind of trade-off. I am not 9872

9873 willing to expose our kids to unhealthy air to speed up permits. 9874 9875 But let's say you were willing to sacrifice air quality for faster permits. That is not even what this bill does. 9876 This bill allows some facilities to pollute more while doing 9877 nothing to expedite the permitting process. In fact, it 9878 could do just the opposite. 9879 9880 Under the Clean Air Act, a company that wants to build a new facility must obtain a pre-construction permit that 9881 requires the facility to control its pollution. The goal of 9882 this permitting process is simple: to ensure the facility 9883 will not significantly increase air pollution above levels 9884 that are safe to breathe. Under section 2(e) of this bill, 9885 if EPA issues a new National Ambient Air Quality Standard, 9886 that standard doesn't apply for permitting purposes unless 9887 and until EPA has issued implementation rules and quidance 9888 for the new standard. 9889 9890 Besides allowing unhealthy levels of air pollution, the provision doesn't even help states speed up permitting. 9891 Witnesses have testified concurrent guidance isn't always 9892 practical or necessary. EPA has told the committee that most 9893

9894 quidance evolves after a standard takes effect, as states and industry raise questions that require EPA guidance. 9895 9896 So it is unclear how EPA could provide guidance on solving problems even before they know what the problems are. 9897 It is really a Catch-22 for the agency. 9898 On the one hand, EPA could hurry to issue guidance 9899 before hearing questions from states and industry, but then 9900 9901 that quidance would be incomplete, and it wouldn't address issues that only emerge during the implementation process. 9902 An industry group that wanted to delay implementation of the 9903 new air quality standard could file a lawsuit saying EPA's 9904 quidance wasn't sufficient. 9905 9906 On the other hand, EPA could wait to issue more robust and helpful quidance, but in the meantime facilities would be 9907 able to obtain permits under the old air quality standard. A 9908 company could build a facility that is allowed to release 9909 more pollution than it would under current law. 9910 9911 In both scenarios, pollution wins and public health loses, and this would provide an opportunity for even more 9912 lawsuits and delay. You can just see it. Downwind 9913 communities and nearby businesses might challenge a permit 9914

9915 that allows a new facility to pollute more, and shifts the burden of pollution reduction on to them. 9916 9917 So in summary, this provision amounts to more litigation, more confusion, and more pollution. I don't 9918 think it is going to result in faster permitting. 9919 Ms. Castor's amendment would strike the language in the 9920 bill that exempts facilities from complying with new air 9921 9922 quality standards. And so for that reason I really urge everybody to support this amendment. 9923 And I yield back. 9924 *Mr. Carter. The gentlelady yields back. Is there any 9925 more discussion on the amendment? 9926 9927 Hearing none, the vote occurs on the amendment. For over 50 years the Clean Air Act has successfully 10107 cleaned up toxic pollution and reduced health care costs. 10108 The Republicans' legislation would undermine that success and 10109 endanger the health of the American people. This legislation 10110 10111 would weaken the process EPA uses to set the National Ambient 10112 Air Quality Standard. It would also delay implementation of stronger health protective standards, and it would give 10113 polluters a free pass to contaminate our air. 10114 My amendment would ensure that this legislation would 10115 10116 not go into effect until EPA, in consultation with the Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee, determines it will not 10117 increase negative health outcomes for minority and low-income 10118 communities. 10119 Far too communities [sic] of color, including Latino 10120 10121 communities, suffer from unhealthy levels of toxic pollution in the air, such as particulate matter and ozone. 10122 pollution is a silent killer that leads to premature deaths, 10123 cancers, and respiratory diseases such as asthma. It is also 10124

10125 a killer for productivity. Poor air quality is linked to higher school and work absences. For every \$1 invested into 10126 10127 air pollution, there is a \$30 benefit in reduced health care costs and greater productivity. 10128 Unfortunately, the Republicans' legislation sacrifices 10129 the health of our communities for the profits of polluters. 10130 We can have both clean air and good-paying jobs. We should 10131 10132 not be forced to choose. It is important that EPA can set science-based air quality standards that are protective of 10133 public health to hold polluters accountable. The American 10134 10135 people deserve clean, safe air. I urge my colleagues to support this amendment, and with 10136 10137 that I want to yield time to my colleague, Representative 10138 Cardenas. *Mr. Cardenas. Thank you very much, Congresswoman 10139 Barragan, for introducing your amendment. I agree with your 10140 amendment. It would ensure that it will not harm this 10141 10142 bill, H.R. 7650, will not harm vulnerable populations, 10143 particularly minority and low-income communities. The underlying bill, which is more appropriately 10144 referred to as the smoggy skies act, will endanger the health 10145

10146 and safety of communities by forcing the EPA to set weaker standards and allowing polluting industries to pollute more. 10147 The smog under growing up in the 1960s and 70s, the 10148 smog stung my eyes, burned our lungs, and induced headaches 10149 and forced kids like myself and elderly community members to 10150 stay indoors when I grew up in Los Angeles. We now know that 10151 high levels of air pollution can also have serious long-term 10152 10153 health effects, including increased risk of cancer, cardiovascular disease, respiratory diseases, and 10154 reproductive, neurological, and immune system disorders. 10155 Thankfully, Federal standards and stringent state 10156 regulations pushed industries to make changes that drove 10157 10158 innovation, cut emissions, and significantly improved the air 10159 quality in Los Angeles and many communities across the country. Cleaner air has meant healthier communities and, 10160 unlike when I was a child, my children and grandchildren 10161 today have never known what it is like to have to stay 10162 10163 indoors because of a smog alert. It is undeniable that the attainment challenges that lie 10164 ahead for California and other parts of the country are 10165 difficult to address. However, H.R. 7650, which would cut 10166
