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*The Chair. The committee will come to order. The chair recognizes herself for an opening statement. Today the Committee on Energy and Commerce is taking action on 13 bipartisan bills from the Health Subcommittee to improve the health and well-being of the American people. It is also Mr. James's -- although he is not here -- first full committee markup. I know he has hit the ground running on the committee as a bill on the agenda today, so I am thankful for his contributions.

A number of bills today continue the important work of the committee to support moms and children. For example, the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act will make it easier for children enrolled in Medicaid to get the important specialty care they need. Dr. Miller-Meeks has been a leader on this legislation, and we have heard testimony from Iowa Children's Hospital of the needless and detrimental delays in care due to red tape. The bill is even more important now, with exciting innovation in cell and gene therapies that could cure children with sickle cell and other rare diseases, but potentially require children to travel across the country. Next, the SHINE for Autumn Act, which passed this

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committee and the House floor overwhelmingly last Congress. This is the second piece of legislation that we have moved to help prevent the heartbreaking tragedy of stillbirth. I want to share a special thanks to Debbie Haine, who is in the audience today, for her steady, steadfast support and dedication to raising awareness on stillbirths for over a decade. This bill is named after her daughter, Autumn Joy, who was born still on July 8, 2011, and we are honored to remember Autumn today and to thank Debbie for her tireless advocacy.

In addition, my friend, Representative Chris Smith, has for decades led the effort for more research into autism and the best ways to support the entire population of individuals with autism and their families. The latest reauthorization of the Autism CARES Act, which I am proud to support today, continues important HHS-wide programs to further these goals.

We will also move Representative Obernolte's HOLD Act forward to further support living organ donors who give the miraculous gift of life to patients in need.

And while not included on today's agenda, reauthorizing the Pediatric Rare Disease Priority Review Voucher Program at

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FDA ahead of its September 30 expiration remains a top priority. Patients with rare diseases and their families continue to push for action, and by continuing to work together we can pass it out of this committee with broad, bipartisan support.

We are also voting on four bills to improve program integrity in Medicaid. Bills from Representatives Bilirakis, Miller-Meeks, D'Esposito, and Garcia will reduce the rate of improper payments by ensuring that only current living beneficiaries are enrolled in Medicaid, and only legitimate providers participate in the program. Bills that require timely disenrolling of deceased beneficiaries from Medicaid may seem obvious, but the Office of Inspector General continues to find it is an issue. I am glad these members have prioritized being good stewards of Medicaid funds. And finally, I want to highlight the work of the committee as we continue to help seniors access health care. This committee led on site-neutral reforms as a part of the Lower Costs, More Transparency Act to make sure seniors paid the same out of pocket for drug administration, regardless of whether it was administered in a hospital or a doctor's

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office.
During COVID-19 seniors were able to get specialty medications directly from their oncologists, but this is no longer the case. Mrs. Harshbarger's legislation will reestablish this option for seniors for another five years, and we will continue to work to improve access to telehealth in Medicare.

Mr. James legislation will ensure program integrity measures are in place so that we can more effectively see how telehealth is working for patients on Medicare.

Mrs. Steel's legislation will make telehealth more accessible for patients with limited English proficiency.

I will note members and our staff continue to work on a fully paid package to extend telehealth flexibilities for seniors, and include additional priorities on diabetic and cardiac care. I am optimistic we will be able to move the package before the August recess, and well before those authorities expire at the end of the year.

I want to thank all the members for their hard work on these bills and taking the time necessary to get the policy right and move policies in a fiscally responsible way. All

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of the legislation today that increases spending in Medicare or Medicaid is offset with reductions in Medicare or Medicaid spending, and I am proud that -- of all that we have and continue to accomplish when we work together.

I yield back. I now recognize the gentleman from New Jersey, the ranking member, Representative Pallone, for five minutes for his opening statement.
*Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair, and thanks for all your efforts to achieve bipartisan bills today. The committee is marking up 13 bills, all of which have bipartisan support, and we will begin by considering a few bills to strengthen our public health programs.

I am pleased we are advancing legislation championed by Representative Boyle, who will allow HHS to evaluate -- this bill will allow HHS, I should say, to evaluate existing research on women and underserved populations and correlations to lung cancer. And this bill is important because it allows scientists and policy-makers to identify opportunities to accelerate research in this area and develop a public awareness campaign on lung cancer screening to better reach underserved populations.

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I am also pleased we are advancing this SHINE for Autumn Act, led by Representative Castor on the Democratic side. This legislation was spearheaded by Debbie Haines, who I understand was originally from my district, and the purpose is to give meaning and purpose to the tragic loss of her daughter, Autumn, which -- and it is going to put a needed focus on preventing stillbirths through enhanced data collection, research, education, and awareness. This bill is the beginning of a long-term solution to reducing stillbirth rates that tragically affect many families.

Next we will consider a bill to strengthen the Medicaid program. I am pleased we will consider H.R. 4758, the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act. And this bipartisan bill streamlines the process for out-of-state pediatric providers to enroll in Medicaid so that children who need specialized treatment outside of their home state can access that care in a timely manner. And I want to thank Representative Trahan for her leadership on this bill, and I hope that it will bring some peace of mind to the families of children who face unnecessary and devastating delays in getting the care they need.

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We will also consider a bipartisan amendment to the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act that includes a prohibition on spread pricing in Medicaid. spread pricing occurs when pharmacy benefit managers keep a portion of the amount paid to them for prescription drugs, instead of passing those payments on to pharmacies, and this practice unnecessarily drives up pharmaceutical spending. Banning spread pricing in Medicaid was part of the bipartisan Lower Costs, More Transparency Act passed by the House in December, and $I$ hope that it can soon become law.

I am also pleased that we will consider 4 bipartisan Medicaid program integrity bills, including H.R. 8111, which will require states to collect beneficiary address information from Medicaid managed care plans. And this simple policy will help state Medicaid agencies stay in better contact with beneficiaries to renew their eligibility, while ensuring that beneficiaries who no longer live in the state do not remain enrolled in the program.

Then there is H.R. 8084, the Live Beneficiaries Act that requires states to more regularly check Social Security Administration death records, ensuring Medicaid is not making

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monthly payments to managed care plans for beneficiaries who have passed away.

Now, turning to Medicare, I am glad we found a bipartisan path forward on H.R. 5526. Congress enacted the physician self-referral law, also known as the Stark Law, to ensure that physician financial considerations do not influence patient care. Under the Stark Law, physicians are prohibited from making referrals to entities in which the physician has a financial stake. Medicare beneficiaries deserve the independent judgment of their physicians and access to treatment that is medically appropriate and necessary for them, and the Stark Law is critical in ensuring that financial arrangements do not distort physicians' decision-making or raise health care costs.

And while $I$ have strong concerns with weakening the Stark Law, I believe there are limited instances in which it may be necessary for a caregiver or a family member to pick up prescription drugs for patients or for prescription drugs to be mailed, which is currently prohibited under the Stark Law. I believe this narrow Stark exception would help patients receive necessary medications but still protect

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Medicare beneficiaries by ensuring that provider decisions are made on the basis of clinical criteria. So I am pleased we were able to include additional guardrails to ensure that patients have access to treatment and care that is based on medical necessity.

I am concerned that some technical assistance provided by CMS has not yet been incorporated, but I understand that Chair Rodgers has committed to work with me to address the agency's feedback before the bill is considered on the House floor. So I would like to thank the chair again for this truly bipartisan process, and for only moving forward on bills with bipartisan support today.

There are other health priorities, including telehealth, that just were not ready for today, but $I$ look forward to continuing to work together on these outstanding bills.

And with that $I$ yield back, Madam Chair, the balance of my time.
*The Chair. The gentleman yields back. The chair reminds members that, pursuant to committee rules, all members' opening statements will be made part of the record.

Are there further opening statements?

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The chair recognizes Mr. Guthrie for five minutes.
*Mr. Guthrie. Thank you, Madam Chair. Today's full committee markup represents another important step to ensuring Americans receive the highest quality and the most affordable health care they need. Today we are marking up legislation to provide greater access to lifesaving care for kids; access to critical telehealth services for our seniors; address critical program integrity issues in the Medicaid program to provide access to care for vulnerable populations.

I would like to thank all the Health Subcommittee colleagues and the staff for advancing these bills to the full committee and for the bipartisanship on such important issues.

Specifically, I would like to thank Representatives Miller-Meeks and Bilirakis for their bipartisan work to address program integrity issues in the Medicaid program.

We also have legislation, the Honor Our Living Donors Act, that will help patients in need of a transplant gain access to potential donors by making common-sense reforms to the current program.

And while we are not addressing the more major bills or

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comprehensive bills on telehealth today, we do have some bills on telehealth. And thanks to Representative James and Representative Steel for leading these important bills to help seniors struggling in behavioral health care needs, in addition to making telehealth more accessible to non-native English speakers. And I know there is work to continue on the more comprehensive telehealth bills and the Pediatric Priority Review Voucher. I look forward to that work. Mr. Bilirakis and Ms. Eshoo continue to work on legislation for the Pediatric Priority Review and make other important changes for rare disease drug development that we heard testimony in the subcommittee on Rare Disease Day.

I look forward to discussion today, and I yield back.
*The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there further opening statements?

The chair recognizes Ms. Eshoo for three minutes for an opening statement.
*Ms. Eshoo. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman, and good morning, colleagues. Today, as the members have said, we are considering 13 bills.

First, we will consider several bills to make the

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Medicaid program more efficient by ensuring enrollment information for physicians and patients is up to date.

Second, we will consider the SHINE for Autumn Act, legislation introduced by Congresswomen Castor and Kelly to close gaps in stillbirth data, research, and awareness to ensure that all moms have healthy babies.

Third, we will consider the Women and Lung Cancer Research and Preventive Services Act, legislation to move the needle on the alarming increase of lung cancer diagnoses among young women who have never smoked by commissioning more research on prevention and treatment.

Unfortunately, we haven't reached bipartisan agreement yet on my legislation, the Innovation in Pediatric Drugs Act. I plan to continue bipartisan negotiations with you, Madam Chairwoman, and our ranking member, Mr. Pallone, and Congressman Bilirakis to identify an offset or a workaround to accommodate increased funding for the NIH Best Pharmaceuticals for Children Act program. The program is critical for studying new uses for drugs to treat children once the drugs lose their patent protections.

I appreciate and thank the chairwoman, our ranking

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member, and Mr. Bilirakis for working with me on this important issue. It is hard to find an agreement, and I thank you and your staff for working closely with myself and my staff to get the legislation to where it is today. And where we are today, I believe, is very close to the finish line. I look forward to finding, as I said, a bipartisan solution.

I applaud the work that has gone into the bills that are before us, and I look forward to this productive markup.

And I yield back.
*The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Are there further opening statements?

The chair recognizes Mr. Bilirakis for three minutes for the purposes of offering an opening statement.
*Mr. Bilirakis. Thank you so much, Madam Chair. I will be brief.

But I want to reiterate our commitment to work towards a strong bipartisan resolution on the pediatric rare disease package we put together a subcommittee under the Give Kids a Chance Act. While I am disappointed that we couldn't consider that legislation here today in the full committee

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markup, I remain optimistic that we will be able to notice and vote out as strong of a bipartisan showing as possible in the next markup we schedule. I am fully committed to continuing to negotiate and work out an agreement with my friend and colleague, Representative Eshoo, and I know we are very close to doing that, so I want to thank her for her good faith efforts thus far. I know we both care about this issue greatly, and I want to ensure we are incentivizing new treatments and cures for children with rare diseases and cancers.

We must move forward quickly to reauthorize the Rare Pediatric Priority Review Voucher, which expires in September. I know we are going to get it right. I also want to thank the fellow co-leads on that bill, and that is Representatives Trahan, Barragan, and Burgess for their steadfast support and commitment to get this across the finish line.

In the interim we have great policies in the -- on the agenda today, including the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act, the SPEAK Act, and SHINE for Autumn Act, among many others. I thank the chair and the ranking member for putting

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together this markup, and I look forward to supporting all of
these bills out of committee today.

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*The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill?

The chair recognizes Mr. Obernolte for five minutes to speak on the bill.
*Mr. Obernolte. Well, thank you, Madam Chair. I move to strike the last word.
*The Chair. The gentleman is recognized.
*Mr. Obernolte. Thank you, Madam Chair. It is an honor to be able to speak in support of my bill, H.R. 6020, the Honoring our Living Donor Act.

I think we can all agree that one of the most selfless acts that someone can commit is the donation of an organ to someone else, and yet it happens thousands of times each year. In fact, in 2022 nearly 6,500 lives were saved through the donation of a living -- of an organ by a living donor. And yet there is a desperate need for more of these donations. There are currently more than 100,000 Americans on the waiting list awaiting a transplant. And in 2021, 6,000 people in the United States died while waiting for a transplant.

Between 2006 and 2021 there -- the list of Americans

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waiting for a kidney donation rose by over 50 percent. But unfortunately, kidney donations declined by seven percent. And this year over 100 Americans are added to that waiting list every single day. And the reason for this is that it is a huge commitment to be a living organ donor.

In addition to the medical commitment, the typical living organ donor spends over 10 percent of their annual income just to be a donor. On average, they have to take two weeks off of work -- it is six weeks off of work if the work involves physical exertion -- and it is a huge burden on these people. So we want to make it easier for people to be living organ donors.

In 2007 Congress established the National Living Organ Donor Assistance Center, which provides assistance financially to donors who make less than 350 percent of the poverty line. However, that means test is applied not only to the income of the donor, but also to the income of the recipient, which is actually pretty nonsensical and has resulted in many people who would be eligible for assistance to not be eligible for that assistance.

This bill, H.R. 6020, would correct that problem by

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clarifying that the means test applies only to the donor and not to the recipient of the organ. Hopefully, this will incentivize more people to take the selfless step of becoming living organ donors, and get those organ donations back up to where they are more meeting the need.

I would like to thank Congresswoman Susan DelBene for her work on this bill and for co-leading the bill with me. This is a common-sense bill that passed out of subcommittee unanimously. I would request -- respectfully request your support on the bill.

*Ms. Matsui. I am glad to see the committee taking up legislation to address the shortage of available organs for transplant. I support the HOLD Act, and I am confident it

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will save lives. But we still have a lot of work left to do to address the national organ shortage.

Every day 17 Americans die waiting for an organ, Americans we could save with updated public policy. We need bold action to prevent this needless loss of life. That is why, at the start of this Congress, I introduced the Organ Donation Clarification Act, which includes language to ensure more potential donors are eligible for Federal support. This language is mirrored in the HOLD Act, which I am supporting today.

Beyond the language before us today, my bill would ensure potential donors would receive the comprehensive support they need to be able to donate. It would also allow for the testing of new and innovative technologies or methods to increase donations. Today there are over 100,000 patients waiting for a kidney. Most of them will never get one. This is a national crisis. To meet the magnitude of this crisis, we must do more. We should pass the HOLD Act today, and I hope this committee can continue to work on this issue, including by taking up my Organ Donation Clarification Act.

But I want to also particularly thank Chair Rodgers and Ranking Member Pallone. You all have been consistent in your support and encouragement for this legislation along the way, all -- including the professional staff. So thank you, as well.

The SHINE for Autumn Act is not new to this committee. We passed it unanimously at the last Congress out of committee. It passed the House. We just need to get it across the finish line in the Senate because the need for action is urgent.

The bill is named for Autumn Joy, who was born still on July 8, 2011. Her mother, Debbie, has turned Autumn's tragic death into a mission to increase stillbirth awareness and education, and ultimately to decrease the number of families who experience such a heartbreaking loss. Many of you met have met Debbie. And if you haven't, just know that she is a force for positive change.

Thank you, Debbie, for galvanizing families across America to get Congress to act because stillbirth is a public health crisis in the United States, with over 21,000 stillbirths every year, almost 60 babies dying every day.

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That exceeds the number of deaths for children age 0 to 14 from guns, accidents, pre-term births, SIDS, drowning, fire, and flu combined.

And like too many other maternal and child health issues, there are persistent and longstanding disparities, with Black women more than twice as likely to experience stillbirth than White women. At least one out of four stillbirths is estimated to be preventable, but there is still so much that we don't know. That is why we need real change. We need measurable improvements for families.

The SHINE for Autumn Act will improve surveillance and data collection relating to stillbirth nationwide. It will invest in research to examine the causes and risk factors. Additionally, it will seek to increase education and awareness around stillbirth. Parents deserve better data and science, and I know that until an issue has been carefully researched, analyzed, and quantified, it is nearly impossible to take meaningful action.

We need a clearer picture as to why babies are dying if we want to make progress towards reducing stillbirth rates and improving outcomes. So with timely and accurate data, we

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can begin to understand the underlying causes and guide policy actions and much-needed strategies for prevention. Together our committee can address the serious maternal and infant health crisis that is tearing so many families apart and causing significant pain and trauma.

And I know there are others here today who are among the 91 bipartisan cosponsors. Thank you. Thank you for your unanimous vote last Congress. Thank you for helping us get it past the House, and talk to your Senators about making this a priority, too. Thank you again for your vote today to support Debbie and Autumn Joy, and all the other families who have been impacted by this public health crisis. Thank you for focusing on solutions.

Black women, Medicaid recipients, and residents of rural areas bear a disproportionate share of these tragic losses, underscoring the urgent need for targeted interventions and equitable access to care.

These disparities in our maternity care system have profound consequences. Maternity and newborn care account for a significant portion of hospital expenditures for most commercial insurers and state Medicaid programs. With Medicaid covering 42 percent of births in the United States, the Federal Government bears substantial responsibility for ensuring the quality and value of maternal newborn care.

We cannot remain complacent. We can and must do more to mitigate the risk of stillbirth and offer support to those who have suffered such a traumatic loss. That is why I am proud to join the bipartisan SHINE for Autumn Act, along with

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my colleagues, Representative Castor, my co-chair of the bipartisan Maternity Care Caucus, Representative Young Kim, and Representative Joyce.

Importantly, these bills allocate funds, as you have heard, to enhance data collection, increase training in perinatal pathology, and disseminate educational materials on stillbirths. This legislation will give families a true chance to thrive and is vital for bridging research gaps. For these reasons I urge my colleagues to once again support this bill so that no mother has to endure the heartbreak of having a stillborn baby.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, over 5.4 million U.S. adults were estimated to have autism spectrum disorder, or ASD, in 2017. This accounts for a 178 percent increase in the prevalence since 2000. Further, 1 in every 36 children were diagnosed with ASD in 2020.

The programs and activities authorized under the Autism CARES Act serve as the primary driver of autism research, services, training, and monitoring across the Federal Government. This AINS makes certain improvements to the current programing, including ensuring that programs are appropriately channeling resources towards the most impactful forms of research and services, as well as coordinating across the various programs at the NIH, CDC, and HRSA.

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Most importantly, this bill takes steps to ensure the public and all individuals with the ASD community have an opportunity to engage in and are included in the research process and other activities related to autism.

Lastly, while $I$ know the Death Master File is a highly accurate record of information, sometimes mistakes do occur, and they really do occur, Madam Chair, we have evidence that they do. The amendment importantly provides a process for reenrollment, should the information from the database turn out to be incorrect. We certainly agree that we don't want to inadvertently disenroll Medicaid patients that are still alive, and this amendment makes that clarification.

*Mr. Guthrie. Thank you, Madam Chair. H.R. 8112 is simple: we do not let -- we should not let bad doctors in the Medicaid program.

One way that we try to maintain the integrity of the program is by entering doctors into the Data EXchange, or DEX, which is a database managed by CMS that monitors doctors who have been terminated from the Medicare and Medicaid program.

To be clear, doctors are not removed casually from either program. You have to commit fraud or harm patients in order to be terminated from the programs. The issue here is that states are not always actively checking the DEX. If a doctor breaks the law in Ohio or Tennessee and is removed from the state's Medicaid program, the doctor will be entered into the DEX. However, if my home state of Kentucky isn't checking the DEX, we may inadvertently let the doctor practice in our state.

The amendment today incorporates technical assistance from CMS that would require monthly screenings for the DEX,

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rather than the initially-proposed quarterly screenings, to
ensure they are diligent in protecting the Medicaid program.
This bill is straightforward, and I hope we will all agree
that keeping bad doctors out of Medicaid is in everyone's
best interest.

*Mrs. Trahan. Thank you, Madam Chair. My amendment makes technical adjustments to this bipartisan bill which $I$ introduced alongside Congresswoman Miller-Meeks.

When necessary, clinical care is determined for a child by medical professionals, there should be no reason that administrative burdens get in the way. The Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act is designed to cut through red tape and get kids the appropriate care and often lifesaving care that they need.

To express the importance of getting this legislation over the finish line, $I$ would like to highlight a story from a patient who was negatively impacted by the burdensome and time-consuming Medicaid provider screening and enrollment process. Almost three years ago, a baby -- and I will call her Lily -- was born in a rural state with her esophagus in two separate segments and connected abnormally to the windpipe. Because this condition requires a particularly complicated procedure to correct it, doctors explained to the family there are only two places in the country where it

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could be done. One of them was Boston Children's Hospital in my home state of Massachusetts.

Immediately, Lily and her parents were ready to travel to Boston, where the surgeons were standing by to perform the lifesaving operation. But instead, Lily, who was a Medicaid recipient, was waiting for her home state to enroll the eight providers at Boston Children's who needed to perform this complex surgery. Her state, confused about the rules concerning out-of-state provider enrollment, wouldn't authorize the services provided by Boston Children's.

Lily's surgery was rescheduled more than three times, and delayed over seven months. As Lily waited, she lived with a floppy airwave -- airway, excuse me -- that could have collapsed at any moment, a weakened immune system, and routine breathing difficulties. This situation was not just a delay in paperwork. It was a delay that put a child's life at significant risk. Every day that passed was a day where her condition could have taken a fatal turn.

And Lily's story is one of many across our country. That is why it is crucial for us to pass the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act. The stakes are simply too high to

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allow bureaucratic hurdles to stand in the way of urgent medical care for our most vulnerable children. When care is delayed for kids with complex medical hurdles -- excuse me, issues -- who need to cross over state lines, the consequences are severe and far reaching. Delays in accessing appropriate care can lead to increased mortality rates and worsened health outcomes for pediatric patients.

Additionally, families face significant financial and psychological strain when care is delayed. These delays also contribute to increased use of emergency services and high overall health care costs.

I want to thank my colleague, Congresswoman MillerMeeks, for working with me on this important legislation, and I strongly urge my colleagues on this committee to support the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act today so that we can ensure that no child on Medicaid has to endure unnecessary delays in receiving critical medical care across state lines.

*Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I would like to express my support for the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act, which will help families access lifesaving care for children with complex medical conditions.

In Georgia we are blessed to have world-class children's hospitals that care for kids across the country. However, in some cases, patients with rare and complex diseases have to travel out of state to receive specialized care when the services they need are not available in their own state. The process is difficult, and it is full of red tape, often delaying children and their families from receiving the care they desperately need and, in some cases, blocking access to care altogether.

The Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act will allow states to streamline the process for out-of-state pediatric care providers to enroll in another state's Medicaid program, while also providing important guardrails. This is common-

sense policy that will help children with complex medical conditions access critical care.

I am also pleased to see the bipartisan amendment include crucial pharmacy benefit manager reforms from my Drug Price Transparency and Medicaid Act. This provision would prohibit spread pricing in Medicaid, and clarify that states should reimburse PBMs contracting with Medicaid-managed care organizations for an administrative fee for managing the pharmacy benefit for Medicaid beneficiaries. This will save taxpayers roughly $\$ 300$ million, and will protect patients, pharmacies, and others from middleman tactics that drive up prescription drug costs.

I commend Dr. Miller-Meeks and Representative Trahan for working on this issue, and I urge my colleagues to support the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act.

*Ms. Eshoo. Thank you. I rise to speak in support of this bill, and $I$ want to thank Representatives Trahan and Miller-Meeks for leading on this important effort to ensure children in need of lifesaving care can receive it.

Today, when a child with cancer, a rare disease, or much-needed surgery needs to travel to another state to receive treatment, the physician and sometimes the entire health care team treating the child must be screened and enrolled in the child's home state Medicaid program. This is a highly -- as other members have stated, this is a highly burdensome process. It is filled with red tape for physicians, and it delays the lifesaving care for children who really can't afford to wait. I have seen this happen over and over again because I have the Lucile Packard Children's Hospital in the heart of my district.

This legislation fixes exactly what the title of the bill says by creating a voluntary and streamlined process to allow physicians to enroll in another state's Medicaid program.

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So I fully support this effort. I thank the members that are leading it. And I think it deserves a unanimous vote so it can become law this year.

*Mr. Hudson. Thank you. I am so glad to see this bill come forth. It directly impacts thousands of children and their access to needed out-of-state care.

I want to put a face on this, though. I want to tell you a story of a two-year-old boy named Gabe from Texas. He was finally medically stable enough to make the waitlist for a thymus transplant at Duke Children's Hospital and Health Center just outside my district. The surgeons at Duke are some of the only people in the country that can provide this surgery. Yet Texas Medicaid decided it wasn't medically necessary for him to have this transplant.

I can't imagine the anger, the frustration, the stress I

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would feel as a father in that situation. Gabe had to fight for his life every day because his family can't receive a timely approval like others who have private insurance. The life expectancy of the form of DiGeorge syndrome he has is typically two or three years.

When Gabe was four, they found another path with Duke coordinators transporting them up to North Carolina again, only to have to turn around and go back to Texas because of technical tax codes changing.

After years of disappointments, months in the hospital, the hardships Gabe's parents and siblings had to face, and the sadness of living the opposite of a normal childhood, Gabe finally got the transplant at Duke that he needed. This bill will save thousands of kids and families from going through the same struggles and hurdles that Gabe's family did.

I look forward to voting in favor of this bill, and with that I yield back.

This is a very important next step on the bipartisan work the Energy and Commerce Committee has done over the years. In 2019 the committee passed the ACE Kids Act. It was a bill I led with Congressman Bilirakis and Representative Eshoo and Congresswoman Herrera Beutler.

As you all know, Medicaid is the largest insurer of children in the United States, especially for children with complex medical conditions, or cancer, or a rare disease. And children with complex medical conditions often need specialized treatment that is not available in their community or in their state. So the ACE Kids Act created a new state option under Medicaid that, in conjunction with our children's hospitals, that would create -- it creates medical homes in those children's hospitals, and it allows children to cross state lines to get the care they need.

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The goal of that effort was to put kids with complex medical conditions and their families first by allowing these states to implement these medical homes through Medicaid that coordinate care, they lower costs, they save time for families and providers.

Now the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act is the important next step that needs to happen to make it easier for qualified pediatric providers to enroll in multiple Medicaid programs. The bill is going to make it easier for families.

I think about the fantastic children's hospitals in the Sunshine State, two in the Tampa Bay area, Johns Hopkins All Children's and then Saint Joseph's Children's Hospital. Sometimes they will have the providers that can serve the needs of a child in Georgia or in South Carolina. We shouldn't be so stringent under the Medicaid laws that a child with a complex medical condition cannot get the care they need and see the specialists that they need.

Overall, this is going to -- this is a godsend to families. I am proud to be a cosponsor, and I look forward to voting yes today. I hope everyone will vote yes. Thank

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you.

*Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Thank you, Madam Chair. I am proud to lead the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act with my colleague, Representative Lori Trahan.

This legislation would streamline administrative processes for providers who need to enroll in another state's Medicaid program due to a lack of services provided in a patient's home state.

I was also proud to have a fellow Iowan and constituent doctor, Alec Bassuk, testify before the committee in February to support the legislation and highlight the positive impact it would have on Iowa families.

There is currently no standardized Federal pathway for this process, meaning that providers must enroll in each individual state's Medicaid program whenever they see a

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patient from that state, and must maintain regular paperwork to remain enrolled in each state's Medicaid program. When a child from a different state is visiting a doctor, as may be the case if a child from another state travels to lowa for care, which -- given that we are less than an hour away from places in Illinois and Missouri, there are often delays in care as the providers must sift through weeks of paperwork, risking the health of children with critical, lifethreatening conditions.

I would also like to thank Congressman Buddy Carter for advocating for a ban on spread pricing in Medicaid, which saves the program $\$ 300$ million, and is the pay-for for this policy.

Again, I am proud to see this committee move this critical piece of legislation. I applaud the committee and the chair for bringing forth this legislation, and I encourage my colleagues to vote yes on the AINS and on the underlying bill.

I want to thank Representative Harshbarger and Representative Wasserman Schultz for what is a really simple piece of legislation that solves a problem that can be very dangerous, particularly to our seniors and people with disabilities.

You know, when a prescription is at the drugstore but you happen to be a senior that doesn't have transportation, or you are very ill and you can't get to the pharmacy or wherever you can pick up your prescription in a timely way, which can be so very, very important -- and that is what it is right now, you have to show up. But this legislation says that a family member will be able to pick up that prescription, or a caregiver will be able to have the right

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to pick up that prescription for the person that needs it.
And so I think this is such a sensible change that can make a real difference in people's lives, and so $I$ urge all my colleagues to support this bill.

I first want to say $I$ appreciate the ongoing efforts and commitment to preserving seniors' access to medications. In rural districts like mine this makes a world of difference for patients. I represent a district in North Carolina, where some folks will drive hours to see their providers, and then another distance to pick up their medications. For years we have allowed beneficiaries to retrieve certain medications for their loved ones, and then CMS issued FAQs that deliberately limit access to potentially lifesaving

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medications.
I am glad that we have been joined by so many in this room over the years to push for better and easier access to critical medications for our loved ones, and I am glad to see this bill moving forward, and I look forward to voting for it.

Thank you, and I would like to yield to my colleague, Mr. Carter.
*Mr. Carter. I thank the gentleman for yielding.
As a pharmacist, $I$ know firsthand the importance of cancer patients getting their medications in a timely manner without any obstacles. Oncology practices should easily be able to deliver the medications they dispense, or have a family member pick up the medications for them. However, CMS is suggesting that patients should rely on PBM mail service to get their medications. This is a non-starter, because there will be delays and denials.

We need to pass this simple solution that is in H.R. 5526, the Seniors' Access to Critical Medications Act, for the sake of Medicare seniors and those disabled. That is why I applaud Representative Harshbarger for introducing this

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bill, and I urge my colleagues to support it.

Today we are voting on legislation to extend a commonsense policy established during the COVID pandemic to extend what was established during the pandemic that made it easier for patients, cancer patients, to get their drugs mailed directly to them by their oncologists. The flexibility limited cancer patients' potential exposure to COVID, it kept them safe and healthy while it ensured that they could continue to receive treatment from their oncologists. It also offered cancer patients peace of mind, knowing they didn't have to worry about whether they would be too sick to

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drive to their oncologist to pick up their drugs.
After an oncology practice opens an on-site pharmacy, studies have found patients starting their treatments more quickly after their diagnosis which is, obviously, highly positive. When anyone has cancer, they can't afford to wait. That is why I voted in favor of extending this policy during our Health Subcommittee markup earlier this year.

I am glad that a bipartisan agreement was reached to reinstate this flexibility for five years, with the stipulation that oncologists complete one face-to-face visit with their patients before oncology drugs can be sent to their homes, and that the oncologist's relationship with the patient be an ongoing one. This requirement is a commonsense guardrail to limit the chance of fraud, which I know colleagues had concerns about.

We should be proud that we are making treatments more accessible to cancer patients by advancing this proposal today. Obviously, I urge a unanimous vote on this.

This amendment represents a bipartisan compromise to the important legislation that $I$ introduced with Representative Wasserman Schultz, and which has strong bipartisan cosponsor support from many members on this committee. I want to thank Chairs Rodgers, Guthrie, Pallone, and Eshoo for working with me to advance this consensus clarification of the Medicare Stark Law.

This would provide continuation of pandemic-era flexibilities for specialty physicians and other health providers to be able to deliver oral medications to patients by mail delivery or courier, or allow a designated caregiver or family member to pick up these medications for patients. This is critically important for the well-being of cancer patients and others with serious diseases who are too sick to pick up their medications in person, who live in rural areas distant from their physicians, or who simply do not have

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transportation.
The AINS represents a consensus modification to my originally introduced bill, H.R. 5526. The AINS would extend these drug delivery and access flexibilities under Medicare for vulnerable patients for five years, clarifying that this would not violate the Medicare Stark Law's self-referral provisions.

The AINS also adds common-sense guardrails for these flexibilities by requiring, within one year prior, the Medicare beneficiary must have a face-to-face encounter with the prescriber, not including a telehealth encounter, and only if the Medicare beneficiary has an ongoing preexisting relationship with the provider.

It also adds a requirement that within three years of enactment HHS will submit a report to Congress on data resulting from this arrangement, including how many Medicare beneficiaries received specialty drugs under this arrangement, any changes in drug expenditures, a description of which drugs were furnished under this arrangement, and any impact on the prices for such drugs.

The very minimal cost of these reforms would be fully

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paid for and offset by including in the AINS the provisions of H.R. 5397, which passed unanimously out of our full committee in December 2023 by a vote of 46 to 0 . These provisions in section three of the AINS would expand access to home infusion treatments by classifying certain approved drugs as DME, and ensure that these lifesaving treatments are covered under Medicare benefits.

And finally, it provides that excess savings be credited to the Medicare Improvement Act.

So I urge my colleagues to support this AINS's compromise because we shouldn't be forcing patients, especially our seniors, to take an arduous journey or have their access to critical medications threatened.

I commend the inclusion of H.R. 6033, the Supporting Patients Education and Knowledge Act, which I am proud to colead with my Representatives Steel and several of my colleagues on both sides of the aisle.

This legislation empowers patients to make informed decisions about their health by providing them with vital resources and support in their preferred language, the preferred way that they would like to communicate.

Clear communication between patients and providers improves health outcomes, but also enhances the efficiency of the health care system, reducing misunderstandings, costly delays, and potentially life-threatening errors. This

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legislation is a critical step in addressing these challenges and improving the health care experience for millions.

I have seen firsthand how language barriers can impact patient care. For example, I, being the youngest of 11 children, both of my parents raised in Mexico, their English was very, very limited. So my mother, when she went to the doctor, would pick one of her 11 children to go with her to actually interpret for her. Normally, we would be able to interpret for her at the front desk of the clinic or wherever she is seeking health care. Then we would be able to walk down the hall, or what have you, with her and help interpret. But when she was in the room with the doctor, that is when we were dismissed to go back to the waiting room. That is not an effective and efficient way for providing service to people, especially when it comes to their health care.

In addition to that, my father was so uncomfortable speaking in English that he never went to the doctor. That is not a measure of good health care outcomes or good practice by any means. Of course, this is incumbent upon people like my father and my mother to try their best to learn how to communicate in the language of English. But at

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the same time, when it comes to health care and when it comes to effective and efficient health care, we need to make sure that we try our best to do what we can not only as legislators, but as a system to make sure that we have the best communication possible so that men, women, and children can get the best care possible in the language that they prefer or need to be communicated with.

Again, all this bill does is direct the Secretary of Health and Human Services to convene a task force to assess barriers and develop recommendations to improve access to health information systems for non-English speakers in our great country.

So with that $I$ would like to once again ask my colleagues to please support this legislation. So far we are 11 for 11 on fully aye votes, unanimous decisions in this committee. Today, hopefully, we will continue with that record on the last two bills, including this one.

*Mr. James. Chairwoman Rodgers, it is my honor to be sitting for my first full committee markup as the newest member of the Energy and Commerce Committee, and it is my even bigger honor to have my oldest son, also John James from Michigan --
*The Chair. All right.
*Mr. James. -- to sit beside me on one of my firsts, as well.
*The Chair. Yay, welcome, John James.

*The Chair. Both John Jameses.
*Mr. James. John, you get to witness on your first time here Congress truly working well, every single one of us voting unanimously to benefit the American people.

Chairwoman Rodgers, I would like to strike the last word.
*The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five

*Mr. James. Again, I would like to express my gratitude to the House Energy and Commerce Committee for the opportunity to participate in this full committee hearing, and with my son, and to offer this crucial piece of legislation. Your dedication to improving our health care system is commendable, and it is an honor to sit before you here today to discuss a bill that holds significant promise for our nation.

The bill we are considering here is more than just a piece of legislation. It is a pathway to enhancing health care delivery for millions. It is, at its core, a bill that ensures patients receive the care they need, when and in the manner that upholds the highest standards of integrity and efficiency.

Telehealth expands access to quality health care for all Americans, breaking down geographic and economic barriers to ensure everyone receives the care they need and deserve. My bill is designed to support the sustainability and integrity of our health care programs by implementing measures that promote transparency, accountability, and prudent use of

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resources. We can safeguard these programs for future generations.

Ensuring program integrity is not just about preventing fraud, waste, and abuse. It is about maintaining the trust of the American people in our health care system. My bill represents a step forward in our ongoing efforts to improve the integrity and to ensure patients are fully benefitting from expanded access to telehealth care services.

This bill is a win for patients. It is a win for the integrity of our health care programs.
*Mr. James, Jr. Thank you, Chair Rodgers, and thank you to the members of the House Energy and Commerce Committee for your attention and consideration. Together we can make a meaningful difference in the lives of countless Americans.
*Mr. James. Thank you, Madam Chair.
[Applause.]
*Mr. James. With that we yield.
*The Chair. All right. That may be the best speech yet. All right. The gentlemen, John James and his son, John James, yield back. All right.

*Mrs. Dingell. Thank you, Madam Chair.
Like many of my colleagues, I am deeply supportive of telehealth, and appreciative of the changes this bill is making to improve delivery of mental health services via telehealth. This bill will implement a coding modifier for mental health services furnished via telehealth to improve delivery of these critical services.

Mental health matters, and this bill takes steps to improve Americans' -- especially those in rural communities -- access to the mental health care they need and deserve, and I thank my colleague from Michigan for leading it.

During past hearings we have heard from a variety of witnesses that telehealth is being used, is trusted, and is effective. But the new data captured by this bill will show us even more what is further needed to strengthen access to important telehealth services.

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On a broader issue, I would like to highlight the bipartisan work on another bill, H.R. 7623, the Telehealth Modernization Act. This legislation would make permanent the COVID-era telehealth flexibilities that are set to expire at the end of this year, and remove originating and geographic site restrictions which would allow patients to access telehealth from their homes, and would support patients in both rural and urban areas.

This legislation also would make permanent the ability of federally-qualified health centers and rural health clinics to provide telehealth services and provide adequate reimbursement in those settings to ensure continued provision of virtual services. These services are critical for helping all patients access the care they need from the comfort and safety of their own homes, especially when they don't have providers near them, don't have transportation, or are older or sick.

I am grateful for this committee's focus on telehealth and the good it is doing in communities across America, and optimistic that the committee will continue to work on broader legislation, as well. I urge my colleagues to

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support the Telehealth Enhancement for Mental Health Act, but
also urge this committee to bring the more -- the broader
bill as soon as we can for reauthorization.
