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73 *The Chair. The committee will come to order. The chair recognizes herself for an opening statement. 74 75 Today the Committee on Energy and Commerce is taking action on 13 bipartisan bills from the Health Subcommittee to 76 improve the health and well-being of the American people. It 77 is also Mr. James's -- although he is not here -- first full 78 committee markup. I know he has hit the ground running on 79 80 the committee as a bill on the agenda today, so I am thankful for his contributions. 81 A number of bills today continue the important work of 82 the committee to support moms and children. For example, the 83 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act will make it easier for 84 children enrolled in Medicaid to get the important specialty 85 care they need. Dr. Miller-Meeks has been a leader on this 86 legislation, and we have heard testimony from Iowa Children's 87 Hospital of the needless and detrimental delays in care due 88 to red tape. The bill is even more important now, with 89 90 exciting innovation in cell and gene therapies that could cure children with sickle cell and other rare diseases, but 91 potentially require children to travel across the country. 92 Next, the SHINE for Autumn Act, which passed this 93

94 committee and the House floor overwhelmingly last Congress. This is the second piece of legislation that we have moved to 95 96 help prevent the heartbreaking tragedy of stillbirth. I want to share a special thanks to Debbie Haine, who is in the 97 audience today, for her steady, steadfast support and 98 dedication to raising awareness on stillbirths for over a 99 This bill is named after her daughter, Autumn Joy, 100 who was born still on July 8, 2011, and we are honored to 101 remember Autumn today and to thank Debbie for her tireless 102 advocacv. 103 In addition, my friend, Representative Chris Smith, has 104 for decades led the effort for more research into autism and 105 the best ways to support the entire population of individuals 106 with autism and their families. The latest reauthorization 107 of the Autism CARES Act, which I am proud to support today, 108 continues important HHS-wide programs to further these goals. 109 We will also move Representative Obernolte's HOLD Act 110 111 forward to further support living organ donors who give the miraculous gift of life to patients in need. 112 And while not included on today's agenda, reauthorizing 113 the Pediatric Rare Disease Priority Review Voucher Program at 114

115 FDA ahead of its September 30 expiration remains a top priority. Patients with rare diseases and their families 116 117 continue to push for action, and by continuing to work together we can pass it out of this committee with broad, 118 bipartisan support. 119 We are also voting on four bills to improve program 120 integrity in Medicaid. Bills from Representatives Bilirakis, 121 Miller-Meeks, D'Esposito, and Garcia will reduce the rate of 122 improper payments by ensuring that only current living 123 beneficiaries are enrolled in Medicaid, and only legitimate 124 providers participate in the program. Bills that require 125 timely disenrolling of deceased beneficiaries from Medicaid 126 may seem obvious, but the Office of Inspector General 127 continues to find it is an issue. I am glad these members 128 have prioritized being good stewards of Medicaid funds. 129 And finally, I want to highlight the work of the 130 committee as we continue to help seniors access health care. 131 132 This committee led on site-neutral reforms as a part of the Lower Costs, More Transparency Act to make sure seniors paid 133 the same out of pocket for drug administration, regardless of 134 whether it was administered in a hospital or a doctor's 135

136 office. During COVID-19 seniors were able to get specialty 137 138 medications directly from their oncologists, but this is no longer the case. Mrs. Harshbarger's legislation will 139 reestablish this option for seniors for another five years, 140 and we will continue to work to improve access to telehealth 141 in Medicare. 142 143 Mr. James legislation will ensure program integrity measures are in place so that we can more effectively see how 144 telehealth is working for patients on Medicare. 145 Mrs. Steel's legislation will make telehealth more 146 accessible for patients with limited English proficiency. 147 I will note members and our staff continue to work on a 148 fully paid package to extend telehealth flexibilities for 149 seniors, and include additional priorities on diabetic and 150 cardiac care. I am optimistic we will be able to move the 151 package before the August recess, and well before those 152 153 authorities expire at the end of the year. I want to thank all the members for their hard work on 154 these bills and taking the time necessary to get the policy 155 right and move policies in a fiscally responsible way. All 156

157 of the legislation today that increases spending in Medicare or Medicaid is offset with reductions in Medicare or Medicaid 158 159 spending, and I am proud that -- of all that we have and continue to accomplish when we work together. 160 I yield back. I now recognize the gentleman from New 161 Jersey, the ranking member, Representative Pallone, for five 162 minutes for his opening statement. 163 164 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair, and thanks for all your efforts to achieve bipartisan bills today. 165 committee is marking up 13 bills, all of which have 166 bipartisan support, and we will begin by considering a few 167 bills to strengthen our public health programs. 168 I am pleased we are advancing legislation championed by 169 Representative Boyle, who will allow HHS to evaluate -- this 170 bill will allow HHS, I should say, to evaluate existing 171 research on women and underserved populations and 172 correlations to lung cancer. And this bill is important 173 174 because it allows scientists and policy-makers to identify opportunities to accelerate research in this area and develop 175 a public awareness campaign on lung cancer screening to 176 better reach underserved populations. 177

178 I am also pleased we are advancing this SHINE for Autumn Act, led by Representative Castor on the Democratic side. 179 180 This legislation was spearheaded by Debbie Haines, who I understand was originally from my district, and the purpose 181 is to give meaning and purpose to the tragic loss of her 182 daughter, Autumn, which -- and it is going to put a needed 183 focus on preventing stillbirths through enhanced data 184 185 collection, research, education, and awareness. This bill is the beginning of a long-term solution to reducing stillbirth 186 rates that tragically affect many families. 187 Next we will consider a bill to strengthen the Medicaid 188 I am pleased we will consider H.R. 4758, the 189 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act. And this bipartisan 190 bill streamlines the process for out-of-state pediatric 191 providers to enroll in Medicaid so that children who need 192 specialized treatment outside of their home state can access 193 that care in a timely manner. And I want to thank 194 Representative Trahan for her leadership on this bill, and I 195 hope that it will bring some peace of mind to the families of 196 children who face unnecessary and devastating delays in 197 getting the care they need. 198

199 We will also consider a bipartisan amendment to the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act that includes a 200 201 prohibition on spread pricing in Medicaid. Spread pricing occurs when pharmacy benefit managers keep a portion of the 202 amount paid to them for prescription drugs, instead of 203 passing those payments on to pharmacies, and this practice 204 unnecessarily drives up pharmaceutical spending. Banning 205 206 spread pricing in Medicaid was part of the bipartisan Lower Costs, More Transparency Act passed by the House in December, 207 and I hope that it can soon become law. 208 I am also pleased that we will consider 4 bipartisan 209 Medicaid program integrity bills, including H.R. 8111, which 210 will require states to collect beneficiary address 211 information from Medicaid managed care plans. And this 212 simple policy will help state Medicaid agencies stay in 213 better contact with beneficiaries to renew their eligibility, 214 while ensuring that beneficiaries who no longer live in the 215 216 state do not remain enrolled in the program. Then there is H.R. 8084, the Live Beneficiaries Act that 217 requires states to more regularly check Social Security 218 Administration death records, ensuring Medicaid is not making 219

220 monthly payments to managed care plans for beneficiaries who have passed away. 221 222 Now, turning to Medicare, I am glad we found a bipartisan path forward on H.R. 5526. Congress enacted the 223 physician self-referral law, also known as the Stark Law, to 224 ensure that physician financial considerations do not 225 influence patient care. Under the Stark Law, physicians are 226 227 prohibited from making referrals to entities in which the physician has a financial stake. Medicare beneficiaries 228 deserve the independent judgment of their physicians and 229 access to treatment that is medically appropriate and 230 necessary for them, and the Stark Law is critical in ensuring 231 that financial arrangements do not distort physicians' 232 decision-making or raise health care costs. 233 And while I have strong concerns with weakening the 234 Stark Law, I believe there are limited instances in which it 235 may be necessary for a caregiver or a family member to pick 236 237 up prescription drugs for patients or for prescription drugs to be mailed, which is currently prohibited under the Stark 238 I believe this narrow Stark exception would help 239 patients receive necessary medications but still protect 240

241 Medicare beneficiaries by ensuring that provider decisions are made on the basis of clinical criteria. So I am pleased 242 243 we were able to include additional guardrails to ensure that patients have access to treatment and care that is based on 244 medical necessity. 245 I am concerned that some technical assistance provided 246 by CMS has not yet been incorporated, but I understand that 247 248 Chair Rodgers has committed to work with me to address the agency's feedback before the bill is considered on the House 249 floor. So I would like to thank the chair again for this 250 truly bipartisan process, and for only moving forward on 251 bills with bipartisan support today. 252 There are other health priorities, including telehealth, 253 that just were not ready for today, but I look forward to 254 continuing to work together on these outstanding bills. 255 And with that I yield back, Madam Chair, the balance of 256 my time. 257 258 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. reminds members that, pursuant to committee rules, all 259 members' opening statements will be made part of the record. 260 Are there further opening statements? 261

262 The chair recognizes Mr. Guthrie for five minutes. *Mr. Guthrie. Thank you, Madam Chair. Today's full 263 264 committee markup represents another important step to ensuring Americans receive the highest quality and the most 265 affordable health care they need. Today we are marking up 266 legislation to provide greater access to lifesaving care for 267 kids; access to critical telehealth services for our seniors; 268 269 address critical program integrity issues in the Medicaid program to provide access to care for vulnerable populations. 270 I would like to thank all the Health Subcommittee 271 colleagues and the staff for advancing these bills to the 272 full committee and for the bipartisanship on such important 273 274 issues. Specifically, I would like to thank Representatives 275 Miller-Meeks and Bilirakis for their bipartisan work to 276 address program integrity issues in the Medicaid program. 277 We also have legislation, the Honor Our Living Donors 278 Act, that will help patients in need of a transplant gain 279 access to potential donors by making common-sense reforms to 280 the current program. 281 And while we are not addressing the more major bills or 282

283 comprehensive bills on telehealth today, we do have some bills on telehealth. And thanks to Representative James and 284 285 Representative Steel for leading these important bills to help seniors struggling in behavioral health care needs, in 286 addition to making telehealth more accessible to non-native 287 English speakers. And I know there is work to continue on 288 the more comprehensive telehealth bills and the Pediatric 289 290 Priority Review Voucher. I look forward to that work. Mr. Bilirakis and Ms. Eshoo continue to work on legislation for 291 the Pediatric Priority Review and make other important 292 changes for rare disease drug development that we heard 293 testimony in the subcommittee on Rare Disease Day. 294 I look forward to discussion today, and I yield back. 295 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there 296 further opening statements? 297 The chair recognizes Ms. Eshoo for three minutes for an 298 opening statement. 299 300 *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman, and good morning, colleagues. Today, as the members have said, we are 301 considering 13 bills. 302

First, we will consider several bills to make the

303

304 Medicaid program more efficient by ensuring enrollment 305 information for physicians and patients is up to date. 306 Second, we will consider the SHINE for Autumn Act, legislation introduced by Congresswomen Castor and Kelly to 307 close gaps in stillbirth data, research, and awareness to 308 ensure that all moms have healthy babies. 309 Third, we will consider the Women and Lung Cancer 310 Research and Preventive Services Act, legislation to move the 311 needle on the alarming increase of lung cancer diagnoses 312 among young women who have never smoked by commissioning more 313 research on prevention and treatment. 314 Unfortunately, we haven't reached bipartisan agreement 315 316 yet on my legislation, the Innovation in Pediatric Drugs Act. I plan to continue bipartisan negotiations with you, Madam 317 Chairwoman, and our ranking member, Mr. Pallone, and 318 Congressman Bilirakis to identify an offset or a workaround 319 to accommodate increased funding for the NIH Best 320 321 Pharmaceuticals for Children Act program. The program is critical for studying new uses for drugs to treat children 322 once the drugs lose their patent protections. 323 I appreciate and thank the chairwoman, our ranking 324

325 member, and Mr. Bilirakis for working with me on this important issue. It is hard to find an agreement, and I 326 327 thank you and your staff for working closely with myself and my staff to get the legislation to where it is today. And 328 where we are today, I believe, is very close to the finish 329 line. I look forward to finding, as I said, a bipartisan 330 solution. 331 332 I applaud the work that has gone into the bills that are before us, and I look forward to this productive markup. 333 And I yield back. 334 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Are there 335 further opening statements? 336 337 The chair recognizes Mr. Bilirakis for three minutes for the purposes of offering an opening statement. 338 *Mr. Bilirakis. Thank you so much, Madam Chair. I will 339 be brief. 340 But I want to reiterate our commitment to work towards a 341 342 strong bipartisan resolution on the pediatric rare disease package we put together a subcommittee under the Give Kids a 343 Chance Act. While I am disappointed that we couldn't 344 consider that legislation here today in the full committee 345

346 markup, I remain optimistic that we will be able to notice and vote out as strong of a bipartisan showing as possible in 347 348 the next markup we schedule. I am fully committed to continuing to negotiate and work out an agreement with my 349 friend and colleague, Representative Eshoo, and I know we are 350 very close to doing that, so I want to thank her for her good 351 faith efforts thus far. I know we both care about this issue 352 353 greatly, and I want to ensure we are incentivizing new treatments and cures for children with rare diseases and 354 cancers. 355 We must move forward quickly to reauthorize the Rare 356 Pediatric Priority Review Voucher, which expires in 357 September. I know we are going to get it right. I also want 358 to thank the fellow co-leads on that bill, and that is 359 Representatives Trahan, Barragan, and Burgess for their 360 steadfast support and commitment to get this across the 361 finish line. 362 In the interim we have great policies in the -- on the 363 agenda today, including the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care 364 Act, the SPEAK Act, and SHINE for Autumn Act, among many 365 others. I thank the chair and the ranking member for putting 366

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- 388 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the bill? 389 390 The chair recognizes Mr. Obernolte for five minutes to speak on the bill. 391 *Mr. Obernolte. Well, thank you, Madam Chair. I move 392 to strike the last word. 393 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized. 394 395 *Mr. Obernolte. Thank you, Madam Chair. It is an honor to be able to speak in support of my bill, H.R. 6020, the 396 Honoring our Living Donor Act. 397 I think we can all agree that one of the most selfless 398 acts that someone can commit is the donation of an organ to 399 someone else, and yet it happens thousands of times each 400 year. In fact, in 2022 nearly 6,500 lives were saved through 401 the donation of a living -- of an organ by a living donor. 402 And yet there is a desperate need for more of these 403 donations. There are currently more than 100,000 Americans 404 405 on the waiting list awaiting a transplant. And in 2021, 6,000 people in the United States died while waiting for a 406 transplant. 407
- Between 2006 and 2021 there -- the list of Americans

409 waiting for a kidney donation rose by over 50 percent. unfortunately, kidney donations declined by seven percent. 410 411 And this year over 100 Americans are added to that waiting list every single day. And the reason for this is that it is 412 a huge commitment to be a living organ donor. 413 In addition to the medical commitment, the typical 414 living organ donor spends over 10 percent of their annual 415 416 income just to be a donor. On average, they have to take two weeks off of work -- it is six weeks off of work if the work 417 involves physical exertion -- and it is a huge burden on 418 these people. So we want to make it easier for people to be 419 420 living organ donors. 421 In 2007 Congress established the National Living Organ Donor Assistance Center, which provides assistance 422 financially to donors who make less than 350 percent of the 423 poverty line. However, that means test is applied not only 424 to the income of the donor, but also to the income of the 425 426 recipient, which is actually pretty nonsensical and has resulted in many people who would be eligible for assistance 427 to not be eligible for that assistance. 428 This bill, H.R. 6020, would correct that problem by 429

clarifying that the means test applies only to the donor and 430 not to the recipient of the organ. Hopefully, this will 431 432 incentivize more people to take the selfless step of becoming living organ donors, and get those organ donations back up to 433 where they are more meeting the need. 434 I would like to thank Congresswoman Susan DelBene for 435 her work on this bill and for co-leading the bill with me. 436 437 This is a common-sense bill that passed out of subcommittee unanimously. I would request -- respectfully request your 438 support on the bill. 439 I yield back. 440 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 441 442 further discussion? For what purpose does the gentlelady seek recognition? 443 *Ms. Matsui. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 444 word. 445 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five 446 447 minutes. *Ms. Matsui. I am glad to see the committee taking up 448 legislation to address the shortage of available organs for 449

transplant. I support the HOLD Act, and I am confident it

450

will save lives. But we still have a lot of work left to do 451 to address the national organ shortage. 452 453 Every day 17 Americans die waiting for an organ, Americans we could save with updated public policy. We need 454 bold action to prevent this needless loss of life. That is 455 why, at the start of this Congress, I introduced the Organ 456 Donation Clarification Act, which includes language to ensure 457 458 more potential donors are eligible for Federal support. language is mirrored in the HOLD Act, which I am supporting 459 today. 460 Beyond the language before us today, my bill would 461 ensure potential donors would receive the comprehensive 462 support they need to be able to donate. It would also allow 463 for the testing of new and innovative technologies or methods 464 to increase donations. Today there are over 100,000 patients 465 waiting for a kidney. Most of them will never get one. 466 is a national crisis. To meet the magnitude of this crisis, 467 468 we must do more. We should pass the HOLD Act today, and I hope this committee can continue to work on this issue, 469 including by taking up my Organ Donation Clarification Act. 470 I yield the balance of my time. 471

We need 837 to address the disparity in lung cancer cases between men and 838 women so we can save more lives. That is why this bipartisan 839 bill, H.R. 4534, the Women in Lung Cancer Research and 840 Preventative Services Act that I cosponsored, is so 841 important. 842 I am -- and I would like to thank my colleagues, 843 844 Representative Lisa Blunt Rochester and Representative Boyle on Ways and Means for their work on this legislation. 845 This bill would require HHS and the Department of 846 Defense and the VA to collaborate on an interagency review of 847

848 women in lung cancer and preventative services, as well as identify opportunities for improving research. It would also 849 850 increase public awareness of this disease. 1107 That exceeds the number of deaths for children age 0 to 14 from guns, accidents, pre-term births, SIDS, drowning, fire, 1108 1109 and flu combined. And like too many other maternal and child health 1110 issues, there are persistent and longstanding disparities, 1111 with Black women more than twice as likely to experience 1112 stillbirth than White women. At least one out of four 1113 1114 stillbirths is estimated to be preventable, but there is 1115 still so much that we don't know. That is why we need real change. We need measurable improvements for families. 1116 The SHINE for Autumn Act will improve surveillance and 1117 data collection relating to stillbirth nationwide. It will 1118 1119 invest in research to examine the causes and risk factors. Additionally, it will seek to increase education and 1120 awareness around stillbirth. Parents deserve better data and 1121 science, and I know that until an issue has been carefully 1122 researched, analyzed, and quantified, it is nearly impossible 1123 1124 to take meaningful action. We need a clearer picture as to why babies are dying if 1125 we want to make progress towards reducing stillbirth rates 1126 and improving outcomes. So with timely and accurate data, we 1127

1128 can begin to understand the underlying causes and guide policy actions and much-needed strategies for prevention. 1129 1130 Together our committee can address the serious maternal and infant health crisis that is tearing so many families apart 1131 and causing significant pain and trauma. 1132 And I know there are others here today who are among the 1133 91 bipartisan cosponsors. Thank you. Thank you for your 1134 1135 unanimous vote last Congress. Thank you for helping us get it past the House, and talk to your Senators about making 1136 this a priority, too. Thank you again for your vote today to 1137 support Debbie and Autumn Joy, and all the other families who 1138 have been impacted by this public health crisis. Thank you 1139 for focusing on solutions. 1140 1141 I yield back. *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there 1142 further discussion? 1143 For what purpose does Mr. Carter seek recognition? 1144 1145 *Mr. Carter. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 1146 word. *The Chair. 1149 *Mr. Carter. Every year over 21,000 babies are still born in the United States. No family should endure such an 1150 1151 unimaginable tragedy. The SHINE for Autumn Act aims to address these alarming statistics through enhanced data 1152 collection, research, education, and awareness. 1153 Thank you to Chairwoman Rodgers, Representative Kim, and 1154 Representative Castor for your leadership in bringing this 1155 1156 bipartisan bill before this committee today. 1157 We need to pass this bill this Congress. This [sic] is absolutely no reason this should wait. I urge all my 1158 colleagues to support the SHINE Act, SHINE for Autumn Act, so 1159 we can move this bill forward and start making a difference 1160 in the lives of babies and families nationwide. 1161 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 1162 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there 1163 further discussion? 1164 The chair recognizes -- or for what purpose does Ms. 1165 1166 Kelly seek recognition? *Ms. Kelly. I move to strike the last word. 1167 *The Chair. The gentlelady recognized for five minutes. 1168 *Ms. Kelly. Thank you, Madam Chair. As you have heard, 1169

1170 there are over 20,000 stillborn babies each year in the United States. This is a deeply painful experience for 1171 1172 mothers and family. And what is even more troubling, according to research, nearly a quarter of these stillbirths 1173 can be prevented, with the majority occurring in low-risk 1174 pregnancies. 1175 Black women, Medicaid recipients, and residents of rural 1176 1177 areas bear a disproportionate share of these tragic losses, 1178 underscoring the urgent need for targeted interventions and equitable access to care. 1179 These disparities in our maternity care system have 1180 profound consequences. Maternity and newborn care account 1181 1182 for a significant portion of hospital expenditures for most commercial insurers and state Medicaid programs. 1183 Medicaid covering 42 percent of births in the United States, 1184 the Federal Government bears substantial responsibility for 1185 ensuring the quality and value of maternal newborn care. 1186 1187 We cannot remain complacent. We can and must do more to mitigate the risk of stillbirth and offer support to those 1188 who have suffered such a traumatic loss. That is why I am 1189 proud to join the bipartisan SHINE for Autumn Act, along with 1190

1191 my colleagues, Representative Castor, my co-chair of the bipartisan Maternity Care Caucus, Representative Young Kim, 1192 1193 and Representative Joyce. Importantly, these bills allocate funds, as you have 1194 heard, to enhance data collection, increase training in 1195 perinatal pathology, and disseminate educational materials on 1196 stillbirths. This legislation will give families a true 1197 1198 chance to thrive and is vital for bridging research gaps. For these reasons I urge my colleagues to once again support 1199 this bill so that no mother has to endure the heartbreak of 1200 having a stillborn baby. 1201 Thank you, and I yield back. 1202 1203 *The Chair. 1212 sponsored by my friend and colleague, Young Kim. legislation would authorize grants and improve data 1213 1214 collection processes for the prevention of stillbirths. 1215 In 2021, 164 Iowans were stillborn, wreaking havoc on expecting mothers and families who wait 9 months for the 1216 joyful occasion, only to be met with tragedy and guilt and 1217 1218 remorse. 1219 Stillbirth is possible for all pregnancies, even ones that are seemingly low risk. This legislation would create 1220 the first nationally coordinated effort to address and reduce 1221 stillbirths, and I am proud to be supportive of this effort. 1222 And I thank Autumn's mom for being here with us today 1223 1224 and championing this cause. 1225 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back the balance of my time. 1226 *The Chair. Thank you, Madam Chair. want to offer this AINS to my bipartisan bill, the -- it is 1699 H.R. 8084, the Leveraging Integrity and Verification of 1700 Eligibility, or LIVE, Beneficiaries Act. 1701 I am grateful to work alongside Representative Craiq, 1702 1703 and thank her for her support. It is a common-sense bill, and it is focused on Medicaid 1704 program integrity and preventing fraud, waste, and abuse to 1705 save tax dollars. 1706 The AINS incorporates technical assistance we received 1707 1708 from CMS to ensure that states are certifying, at least on a quarterly basis, that enrollees are not listed on the Social 1709 Security Administration's Death Master File database. 1710 We also included a provision to give states the ability 1711 to check other death records to make sure Medicaid 1712 1713 beneficiaries are not deceased. We also require immediate disenrollment of 1714 beneficiaries, should they verify the death of Medicaid 1715 enrollees. This repeals the current CMS quidance that forced 1716

states to collect additional information about their 1717 beneficiaries to ensure their records are correct. I 1718 1719 questioned Director Tsai about this unnecessary bureaucracy, and I am glad we can address it here with this particular 1720 1721 amendment. Lastly, while I know the Death Master File is a highly 1722 accurate record of information, sometimes mistakes do occur, 1723 and they really do occur, Madam Chair, we have evidence that 1724 they do. The amendment importantly provides a process for 1725 reenrollment, should the information from the database turn 1726 out to be incorrect. We certainly agree that we don't want 1727 to inadvertently disenroll Medicaid patients that are still 1728 1729 alive, and this amendment makes that clarification. 1730 I ask all my colleagues to support my AINS and support this common-sense proposal by passing, ultimately, H.R. 8084, 1731 1732 as amended. H.R. 8112 is simple: we do not let -- we should not let bad doctors in 2449 2450 the Medicaid program. One way that we try to maintain the integrity of the 2451 program is by entering doctors into the Data EXchange, or 2452 2453 DEX, which is a database managed by CMS that monitors doctors who have been terminated from the Medicare and Medicaid 2454 program. 2455 To be clear, doctors are not removed casually from 2456 2457 either program. You have to commit fraud or harm patients in 2458 order to be terminated from the programs. The issue here is that states are not always actively checking the DEX. If a 2459 doctor breaks the law in Ohio or Tennessee and is removed 2460 from the state's Medicaid program, the doctor will be entered 2461 into the DEX. However, if my home state of Kentucky isn't 2462 2463 checking the DEX, we may inadvertently let the doctor 2464 practice in our state. The amendment today incorporates technical assistance 2465 from CMS that would require monthly screenings for the DEX, 2466

My amendment makes technical adjustments to this bipartisan bill which I 2675 introduced alongside Congresswoman Miller-Meeks. 2676 When necessary, clinical care is determined for a child 2677 by medical professionals, there should be no reason that 2678 2679 administrative burdens get in the way. The Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act is designed to cut through red tape 2680 and get kids the appropriate care and often lifesaving care 2681 that they need. 2682 To express the importance of getting this legislation 2683 2684 over the finish line, I would like to highlight a story from a patient who was negatively impacted by the burdensome and 2685 time-consuming Medicaid provider screening and enrollment 2686 process. Almost three years ago, a baby -- and I will call 2687 her Lily -- was born in a rural state with her esophagus in 2688 2689 two separate segments and connected abnormally to the windpipe. Because this condition requires a particularly 2690 complicated procedure to correct it, doctors explained to the 2691 family there are only two places in the country where it 2692

2693 could be done. One of them was Boston Children's Hospital in my home state of Massachusetts. 2694 Immediately, Lily and her parents were ready to travel 2695 to Boston, where the surgeons were standing by to perform the 2696 lifesaving operation. But instead, Lily, who was a Medicaid 2697 recipient, was waiting for her home state to enroll the eight 2698 providers at Boston Children's who needed to perform this 2699 2700 complex surgery. Her state, confused about the rules concerning out-of-state provider enrollment, wouldn't 2701 authorize the services provided by Boston Children's. 2702 Lily's surgery was rescheduled more than three times, 2703 and delayed over seven months. As Lily waited, she lived 2704 with a floppy airwave -- airway, excuse me -- that could have 2705 2706 collapsed at any moment, a weakened immune system, and routine breathing difficulties. This situation was not just 2707 a delay in paperwork. It was a delay that put a child's life 2708 at significant risk. Every day that passed was a day where 2709 2710 her condition could have taken a fatal turn. And Lily's story is one of many across our country. 2711 That is why it is crucial for us to pass the Accelerating 2712 Kids' Access to Care Act. The stakes are simply too high to 2713

2714 allow bureaucratic hurdles to stand in the way of urgent medical care for our most vulnerable children. When care is 2715 2716 delayed for kids with complex medical hurdles -- excuse me, issues -- who need to cross over state lines, the 2717 consequences are severe and far reaching. Delays in 2718 accessing appropriate care can lead to increased mortality 2719 rates and worsened health outcomes for pediatric patients. 2720 2721 Additionally, families face significant financial and 2722 psychological strain when care is delayed. These delays also contribute to increased use of emergency services and high 2723 overall health care costs. 2724 I want to thank my colleague, Congresswoman Miller-2725 2726 Meeks, for working with me on this important legislation, and I strongly urge my colleagues on this committee to support 2727 the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act today so that we 2728 can ensure that no child on Medicaid has to endure 2729 unnecessary delays in receiving critical medical care across 2730 2731 state lines. Madam Chair, I would like to express my 2739 support for the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act, which 2740 will help families access lifesaving care for children with 2741 2742 complex medical conditions. 2743 In Georgia we are blessed to have world-class children's hospitals that care for kids across the country. However, in 2744 some cases, patients with rare and complex diseases have to 2745 travel out of state to receive specialized care when the 2746 2747 services they need are not available in their own state. The process is difficult, and it is full of red tape, often 2748 delaying children and their families from receiving the care 2749 they desperately need and, in some cases, blocking access to 2750 care altogether. 2751 2752 The Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act will allow states to streamline the process for out-of-state pediatric 2753 care providers to enroll in another state's Medicaid program, 2754 while also providing important quardrails. This is common-2755

2756 sense policy that will help children with complex medical conditions access critical care. 2757 2758 I am also pleased to see the bipartisan amendment include crucial pharmacy benefit manager reforms from my Drug 2759 Price Transparency and Medicaid Act. This provision would 2760 prohibit spread pricing in Medicaid, and clarify that states 2761 should reimburse PBMs contracting with Medicaid-managed care 2762 2763 organizations for an administrative fee for managing the pharmacy benefit for Medicaid beneficiaries. This will save 2764 taxpayers roughly \$300 million, and will protect patients, 2765 pharmacies, and others from middleman tactics that drive up 2766 2767 prescription drug costs. 2768 I commend Dr. Miller-Meeks and Representative Trahan for 2769 working on this issue, and I urge my colleagues to support the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act. 2770 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 2771 *The Chair. I rise to speak in support of this bill, and I want to thank Representatives Trahan and 2780 Miller-Meeks for leading on this important effort to ensure 2781 children in need of lifesaving care can receive it. 2782 Today, when a child with cancer, a rare disease, or 2783 2784 much-needed surgery needs to travel to another state to 2785 receive treatment, the physician and sometimes the entire health care team treating the child must be screened and 2786 enrolled in the child's home state Medicaid program. 2787 a highly -- as other members have stated, this is a highly 2788 2789 burdensome process. It is filled with red tape for physicians, and it delays the lifesaving care for children 2790 who really can't afford to wait. I have seen this happen 2791 over and over again because I have the Lucile Packard 2792 Children's Hospital in the heart of my district. 2793 2794 This legislation fixes exactly what the title of the bill says by creating a voluntary and streamlined process to 2795 allow physicians to enroll in another state's Medicaid 2796 program. 2797

I want to thank *Ms. Castor. 2843 Representatives Trahan and Miller-Meeks for bringing the 2844 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act. 2845 This is a very important next step on the bipartisan 2846 2847 work the Energy and Commerce Committee has done over the In 2019 the committee passed the ACE Kids Act. 2848 was a bill I led with Congressman Bilirakis and 2849 Representative Eshoo and Congresswoman Herrera Beutler. 2850 2851 As you all know, Medicaid is the largest insurer of 2852 children in the United States, especially for children with complex medical conditions, or cancer, or a rare disease. 2853 And children with complex medical conditions often need 2854 specialized treatment that is not available in their 2855 community or in their state. So the ACE Kids Act created a 2856 2857 new state option under Medicaid that, in conjunction with our children's hospitals, that would create -- it creates medical 2858 homes in those children's hospitals, and it allows children 2859 to cross state lines to get the care they need. 2860

2861 The goal of that effort was to put kids with complex medical conditions and their families first by allowing these 2862 2863 states to implement these medical homes through Medicaid that coordinate care, they lower costs, they save time for 2864 families and providers. 2865 Now the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act is the 2866 important next step that needs to happen to make it easier 2867 2868 for qualified pediatric providers to enroll in multiple Medicaid programs. The bill is going to make it easier for 2869 families. 2870 I think about the fantastic children's hospitals in the 2871 Sunshine State, two in the Tampa Bay area, Johns Hopkins All 2872 2873 Children's and then Saint Joseph's Children's Hospital. Sometimes they will have the providers that can serve the 2874 needs of a child in Georgia or in South Carolina. 2875 shouldn't be so stringent under the Medicaid laws that a 2876 child with a complex medical condition cannot get the care 2877 2878 they need and see the specialists that they need. Overall, this is going to -- this is a godsend to 2879 families. I am proud to be a cosponsor, and I look forward 2880 to voting yes today. I hope everyone will vote yes. 2881

I represent a district in North Carolina, 3187 where some folks will drive hours to see their providers, and 3188 3189 then another distance to pick up their medications. years we have allowed beneficiaries to retrieve certain 3190 medications for their loved ones, and then CMS issued FAQs 3191 that deliberately limit access to potentially lifesaving 3192

3193 medications. I am glad that we have been joined by so many in this 3194 3195 room over the years to push for better and easier access to critical medications for our loved ones, and I am glad to see 3196 this bill moving forward, and I look forward to voting for 3197 it. 3198 Thank you, and I would like to yield to my colleague, 3199 Mr. Carter. 3200 3201 *Mr. Carter. I thank the gentleman for yielding. As a pharmacist, I know firsthand the importance of 3202 cancer patients getting their medications in a timely manner 3203 without any obstacles. Oncology practices should easily be 3204 3205 able to deliver the medications they dispense, or have a family member pick up the medications for them. However, CMS 3206 is suggesting that patients should rely on PBM mail service 3207 to get their medications. This is a non-starter, because 3208 there will be delays and denials. 3209 3210 We need to pass this simple solution that is in H.R. 5526, the Seniors' Access to Critical Medications Act, for 3211 the sake of Medicare seniors and those disabled. That is why 3212 I applaud Representative Harshbarger for introducing this 3213

bill, and I urge my colleagues to support it. 3214 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back. 3215 3216 *Mr. Hudson. I yield back. *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. 3217 Is there further discussion? 3218 For what purpose does Ms. Eshoo seek recognition? 3219 *Ms. Eshoo. To strike the last word, Madam Chairwoman, 3220 3221 and speak in support of the bill. *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five 3222 3223 minutes. *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you. 3224 Today we are voting on legislation to extend a common-3225 sense policy established during the COVID pandemic to extend 3226 what was established during the pandemic that made it easier 3227 for patients, cancer patients, to get their drugs mailed 3228 directly to them by their oncologists. The flexibility 3229 limited cancer patients' potential exposure to COVID, it kept 3230 3231 them safe and healthy while it ensured that they could continue to receive treatment from their oncologists. It 3232 also offered cancer patients peace of mind, knowing they 3233 didn't have to worry about whether they would be too sick to 3234

3235 drive to their oncologist to pick up their drugs. After an oncology practice opens an on-site pharmacy, 3236 3237 studies have found patients starting their treatments more quickly after their diagnosis which is, obviously, highly 3238 positive. When anyone has cancer, they can't afford to wait. 3239 That is why I voted in favor of extending this policy during 3240 our Health Subcommittee markup earlier this year. 3241 3242 I am glad that a bipartisan agreement was reached to reinstate this flexibility for five years, with the 3243 stipulation that oncologists complete one face-to-face visit 3244 with their patients before oncology drugs can be sent to 3245 their homes, and that the oncologist's relationship with the 3246 patient be an ongoing one. This requirement is a common-3247 sense quardrail to limit the chance of fraud, which I know 3248 colleagues had concerns about. 3249 We should be proud that we are making treatments more 3250 accessible to cancer patients by advancing this proposal 3251 3252 today. Okay, thank you, Madam Chair, and thank you to all the members who spoke in support of this 3272 bill. 3273 This amendment represents a bipartisan compromise to the 3274 important legislation that I introduced with Representative 3275 3276 Wasserman Schultz, and which has strong bipartisan cosponsor support from many members on this committee. I want to thank 3277 Chairs Rodgers, Guthrie, Pallone, and Eshoo for working with 3278 me to advance this consensus clarification of the Medicare 3279 3280 Stark Law. This would provide continuation of pandemic-era 3281 flexibilities for specialty physicians and other health 3282 providers to be able to deliver oral medications to patients 3283 by mail delivery or courier, or allow a designated caregiver 3284 or family member to pick up these medications for patients. 3285 3286 This is critically important for the well-being of cancer patients and others with serious diseases who are too sick to 3287 pick up their medications in person, who live in rural areas 3288 distant from their physicians, or who simply do not have 3289

3290 transportation. The AINS represents a consensus modification to my 3291 3292 originally introduced bill, H.R. 5526. The AINS would extend these drug delivery and access flexibilities under Medicare 3293 for vulnerable patients for five years, clarifying that this 3294 would not violate the Medicare Stark Law's self-referral 3295 provisions. 3296 3297 The AINS also adds common-sense quardrails for these flexibilities by requiring, within one year prior, the 3298 Medicare beneficiary must have a face-to-face encounter with 3299 the prescriber, not including a telehealth encounter, and 3300 only if the Medicare beneficiary has an ongoing preexisting 3301 3302 relationship with the provider. It also adds a requirement that within three years of 3303 enactment HHS will submit a report to Congress on data 3304 resulting from this arrangement, including how many Medicare 3305 beneficiaries received specialty drugs under this 3306 3307 arrangement, any changes in drug expenditures, a description of which drugs were furnished under this arrangement, and any 3308 impact on the prices for such drugs. 3309 The very minimal cost of these reforms would be fully 3310

paid for and offset by including in the AINS the provisions 3311 of H.R. 5397, which passed unanimously out of our full 3312 3313 committee in December 2023 by a vote of 46 to 0. provisions in section three of the AINS would expand access 3314 to home infusion treatments by classifying certain approved 3315 drugs as DME, and ensure that these lifesaving treatments are 3316 covered under Medicare benefits. 3317 3318 And finally, it provides that excess savings be credited to the Medicare Improvement Act. 3319 So I urge my colleagues to support this AINS's 3320 compromise because we shouldn't be forcing patients, 3321 especially our seniors, to take an arduous journey or have 3322 their access to critical medications threatened. 3323 And with that, Madam Chair, thank you, and I yield back. 3324 *The Chair. 3535 legislation is a critical step in addressing these challenges and improving the health care experience for millions. 3536 3537 I have seen firsthand how language barriers can impact patient care. For example, I, being the youngest of 11 3538 children, both of my parents raised in Mexico, their English 3539 was very, very limited. So my mother, when she went to the 3540 doctor, would pick one of her 11 children to go with her to 3541 3542 actually interpret for her. Normally, we would be able to interpret for her at the front desk of the clinic or wherever 3543 she is seeking health care. Then we would be able to walk 3544 down the hall, or what have you, with her and help interpret. 3545 But when she was in the room with the doctor, that is when we 3546 3547 were dismissed to go back to the waiting room. That is not an effective and efficient way for providing service to 3548 people, especially when it comes to their health care. 3549 In addition to that, my father was so uncomfortable 3550 speaking in English that he never went to the doctor. 3551 3552 is not a measure of good health care outcomes or good practice by any means. Of course, this is incumbent upon 3553 people like my father and my mother to try their best to 3554 learn how to communicate in the language of English. But at 3555

It is, at its core, a bill that 3821 ensures patients receive the care they need, when and in the 3822 3823 manner that upholds the highest standards of integrity and efficiency. 3824 Telehealth expands access to quality health care for all 3825 Americans, breaking down geographic and economic barriers to 3826 3827 ensure everyone receives the care they need and deserve. bill is designed to support the sustainability and integrity 3828 of our health care programs by implementing measures that 3829 promote transparency, accountability, and prudent use of 3830

3831 resources. We can safequard these programs for future generations. 3832 3833 Ensuring program integrity is not just about preventing fraud, waste, and abuse. It is about maintaining the trust 3834 of the American people in our health care system. My bill 3835 represents a step forward in our ongoing efforts to improve 3836 the integrity and to ensure patients are fully benefitting 3837 3838 from expanded access to telehealth care services. This bill is a win for patients. For what purpose does Mrs. Dingell seek recognition? 3852 *Mrs. Dingell. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last 3853 3854 word. *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five 3855 3856 minutes. *Mrs. Dingell. Thank you, Madam Chair. 3857 Like many of my colleagues, I am deeply supportive of 3858 3859 telehealth, and appreciative of the changes this bill is making to improve delivery of mental health services via 3860 telehealth. This bill will implement a coding modifier for 3861 mental health services furnished via telehealth to improve 3862 delivery of these critical services. 3863 Mental health matters, and this bill takes steps to 3864 improve Americans' -- especially those in rural communities 3865 -- access to the mental health care they need and deserve, 3866 and I thank my colleague from Michigan for leading it. 3867 During past hearings we have heard from a variety of 3868 3869 witnesses that telehealth is being used, is trusted, and is effective. But the new data captured by this bill will show 3870 us even more what is further needed to strengthen access to 3871 important telehealth services. 3872

3873 On a broader issue, I would like to highlight the bipartisan work on another bill, H.R. 7623, the Telehealth 3874 3875 Modernization Act. This legislation would make permanent the COVID-era telehealth flexibilities that are set to expire at 3876 the end of this year, and remove originating and geographic 3877 site restrictions which would allow patients to access 3878 telehealth from their homes, and would support patients in 3879 3880 both rural and urban areas. 3881 This legislation also would make permanent the ability of federally-qualified health centers and rural health 3882 clinics to provide telehealth services and provide adequate 3883 reimbursement in those settings to ensure continued provision 3884 of virtual services. These services are critical for helping 3885 all patients access the care they need from the comfort and 3886 safety of their own homes, especially when they don't have 3887 providers near them, don't have transportation, or are older 3888 or sick. 3889 3890 I am grateful for this committee's focus on telehealth and the good it is doing in communities across America, and 3891 optimistic that the committee will continue to work on 3892 broader legislation, as well. I urge my colleagues to 3893
