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73 *The Chair. The committee will come to order.

74 The chair recognizes herself for an opening statement.

75 Today the Committee on Energy and Commerce is taking
76 action on 13 bipartisan bills from the Health Subcommittee to
77 improve the health and well-being of the American people. It
78 is also Mr. James's -- although he is not here -- first full
79 committee markup. I know he has hit the ground running on
80 the committee as a bill on the agenda today, so I am thankful
81 for his contributions.

82 A number of bills today continue the important work of
83 the committee to support moms and children. For example, the
84 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act will make it easier for
85 children enrolled in Medicaid to get the important specialty
86 care they need. Dr. Miller-Meeks has been a leader on this
87 legislation, and we have heard testimony from Iowa Children's
88 Hospital of the needless and detrimental delays in care due
89 to red tape. The bill is even more important now, with
90 exciting innovation in cell and gene therapies that could
91 cure children with sickle cell and other rare diseases, but
92 potentially require children to travel across the country.

93 Next, the SHINE for Autumn Act, which passed this

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94 committee and the House floor overwhelmingly last Congress.
95 This is the second piece of legislation that we have moved to
96 help prevent the heartbreaking tragedy of stillbirth. I want
97 to share a special thanks to Debbie Haine, who is in the
98 audience today, for her steady, steadfast support and
99 dedication to raising awareness on stillbirths for over a
100 decade. This bill is named after her daughter, Autumn Joy,
101 who was born still on July 8, 2011, and we are honored to
102 remember Autumn today and to thank Debbie for her tireless
103 advocacy.

104 In addition, my friend, Representative Chris Smith, has
105 for decades led the effort for more research into autism and
106 the best ways to support the entire population of individuals
107 with autism and their families. The latest reauthorization
108 of the Autism CARES Act, which I am proud to support today,
109 continues important HHS-wide programs to further these goals.

110 We will also move Representative Obernolte's HOLD Act
111 forward to further support living organ donors who give the
112 miraculous gift of life to patients in need.

113 And while not included on today's agenda, reauthorizing
114 the Pediatric Rare Disease Priority Review Voucher Program at

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115 FDA ahead of its September 30 expiration remains a top
116 priority. Patients with rare diseases and their families
117 continue to push for action, and by continuing to work
118 together we can pass it out of this committee with broad,
119 bipartisan support.

120 We are also voting on four bills to improve program
121 integrity in Medicaid. Bills from Representatives Bilirakis,
122 Miller-Meeks, D'Esposito, and Garcia will reduce the rate of
123 improper payments by ensuring that only current living
124 beneficiaries are enrolled in Medicaid, and only legitimate
125 providers participate in the program. Bills that require
126 timely disenrolling of deceased beneficiaries from Medicaid
127 may seem obvious, but the Office of Inspector General
128 continues to find it is an issue. I am glad these members
129 have prioritized being good stewards of Medicaid funds.

130 And finally, I want to highlight the work of the
131 committee as we continue to help seniors access health care.
132 This committee led on site-neutral reforms as a part of the
133 Lower Costs, More Transparency Act to make sure seniors paid
134 the same out of pocket for drug administration, regardless of
135 whether it was administered in a hospital or a doctor's

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136 office.

137 During COVID-19 seniors were able to get specialty
138 medications directly from their oncologists, but this is no
139 longer the case. Mrs. Harshbarger's legislation will
140 reestablish this option for seniors for another five years,
141 and we will continue to work to improve access to telehealth
142 in Medicare.

143 Mr. James legislation will ensure program integrity
144 measures are in place so that we can more effectively see how
145 telehealth is working for patients on Medicare.

146 Mrs. Steel's legislation will make telehealth more
147 accessible for patients with limited English proficiency.

148 I will note members and our staff continue to work on a
149 fully paid package to extend telehealth flexibilities for
150 seniors, and include additional priorities on diabetic and
151 cardiac care. I am optimistic we will be able to move the
152 package before the August recess, and well before those
153 authorities expire at the end of the year.

154 I want to thank all the members for their hard work on
155 these bills and taking the time necessary to get the policy
156 right and move policies in a fiscally responsible way. All

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157 of the legislation today that increases spending in Medicare
158 or Medicaid is offset with reductions in Medicare or Medicaid
159 spending, and I am proud that -- of all that we have and
160 continue to accomplish when we work together.

161 I yield back. I now recognize the gentleman from New
162 Jersey, the ranking member, Representative Pallone, for five
163 minutes for his opening statement.

164 *Mr. Pallone. Thank you, Madam Chair, and thanks for
165 all your efforts to achieve bipartisan bills today. The
166 committee is marking up 13 bills, all of which have
167 bipartisan support, and we will begin by considering a few
168 bills to strengthen our public health programs.

169 I am pleased we are advancing legislation championed by
170 Representative Boyle, who will allow HHS to evaluate -- this
171 bill will allow HHS, I should say, to evaluate existing
172 research on women and underserved populations and
173 correlations to lung cancer. And this bill is important
174 because it allows scientists and policy-makers to identify
175 opportunities to accelerate research in this area and develop
176 a public awareness campaign on lung cancer screening to
177 better reach underserved populations.

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178 I am also pleased we are advancing this SHINE for Autumn
179 Act, led by Representative Castor on the Democratic side.
180 This legislation was spearheaded by Debbie Haines, who I
181 understand was originally from my district, and the purpose
182 is to give meaning and purpose to the tragic loss of her
183 daughter, Autumn, which -- and it is going to put a needed
184 focus on preventing stillbirths through enhanced data
185 collection, research, education, and awareness. This bill is
186 the beginning of a long-term solution to reducing stillbirth
187 rates that tragically affect many families.

188 Next we will consider a bill to strengthen the Medicaid
189 program. I am pleased we will consider H.R. 4758, the
190 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act. And this bipartisan
191 bill streamlines the process for out-of-state pediatric
192 providers to enroll in Medicaid so that children who need
193 specialized treatment outside of their home state can access
194 that care in a timely manner. And I want to thank
195 Representative Trahan for her leadership on this bill, and I
196 hope that it will bring some peace of mind to the families of
197 children who face unnecessary and devastating delays in
198 getting the care they need.

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199 We will also consider a bipartisan amendment to the
200 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act that includes a
201 prohibition on spread pricing in Medicaid. Spread pricing
202 occurs when pharmacy benefit managers keep a portion of the
203 amount paid to them for prescription drugs, instead of
204 passing those payments on to pharmacies, and this practice
205 unnecessarily drives up pharmaceutical spending. Banning
206 spread pricing in Medicaid was part of the bipartisan Lower
207 Costs, More Transparency Act passed by the House in December,
208 and I hope that it can soon become law.

209 I am also pleased that we will consider 4 bipartisan
210 Medicaid program integrity bills, including H.R. 8111, which
211 will require states to collect beneficiary address
212 information from Medicaid managed care plans. And this
213 simple policy will help state Medicaid agencies stay in
214 better contact with beneficiaries to renew their eligibility,
215 while ensuring that beneficiaries who no longer live in the
216 state do not remain enrolled in the program.

217 Then there is H.R. 8084, the Live Beneficiaries Act that
218 requires states to more regularly check Social Security
219 Administration death records, ensuring Medicaid is not making

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220 monthly payments to managed care plans for beneficiaries who
221 have passed away.

222 Now, turning to Medicare, I am glad we found a
223 bipartisan path forward on H.R. 5526. Congress enacted the
224 physician self-referral law, also known as the Stark Law, to
225 ensure that physician financial considerations do not
226 influence patient care. Under the Stark Law, physicians are
227 prohibited from making referrals to entities in which the
228 physician has a financial stake. Medicare beneficiaries
229 deserve the independent judgment of their physicians and
230 access to treatment that is medically appropriate and
231 necessary for them, and the Stark Law is critical in ensuring
232 that financial arrangements do not distort physicians'
233 decision-making or raise health care costs.

234 And while I have strong concerns with weakening the
235 Stark Law, I believe there are limited instances in which it
236 may be necessary for a caregiver or a family member to pick
237 up prescription drugs for patients or for prescription drugs
238 to be mailed, which is currently prohibited under the Stark
239 Law. I believe this narrow Stark exception would help
240 patients receive necessary medications but still protect

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241 Medicare beneficiaries by ensuring that provider decisions
242 are made on the basis of clinical criteria. So I am pleased
243 we were able to include additional guardrails to ensure that
244 patients have access to treatment and care that is based on
245 medical necessity.

246 I am concerned that some technical assistance provided
247 by CMS has not yet been incorporated, but I understand that
248 Chair Rodgers has committed to work with me to address the
249 agency's feedback before the bill is considered on the House
250 floor. So I would like to thank the chair again for this
251 truly bipartisan process, and for only moving forward on
252 bills with bipartisan support today.

253 There are other health priorities, including telehealth,
254 that just were not ready for today, but I look forward to
255 continuing to work together on these outstanding bills.

256 And with that I yield back, Madam Chair, the balance of
257 my time.

258 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. The chair
259 reminds members that, pursuant to committee rules, all
260 members' opening statements will be made part of the record.

261 Are there further opening statements?

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262 The chair recognizes Mr. Guthrie for five minutes.

263 *Mr. Guthrie. Thank you, Madam Chair. Today's full
264 committee markup represents another important step to
265 ensuring Americans receive the highest quality and the most
266 affordable health care they need. Today we are marking up
267 legislation to provide greater access to lifesaving care for
268 kids; access to critical telehealth services for our seniors;
269 address critical program integrity issues in the Medicaid
270 program to provide access to care for vulnerable populations.

271 I would like to thank all the Health Subcommittee
272 colleagues and the staff for advancing these bills to the
273 full committee and for the bipartisanship on such important
274 issues.

275 Specifically, I would like to thank Representatives
276 Miller-Meeks and Bilirakis for their bipartisan work to
277 address program integrity issues in the Medicaid program.

278 We also have legislation, the Honor Our Living Donors
279 Act, that will help patients in need of a transplant gain
280 access to potential donors by making common-sense reforms to
281 the current program.

282 And while we are not addressing the more major bills or

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283 comprehensive bills on telehealth today, we do have some
284 bills on telehealth. And thanks to Representative James and
285 Representative Steel for leading these important bills to
286 help seniors struggling in behavioral health care needs, in
287 addition to making telehealth more accessible to non-native
288 English speakers. And I know there is work to continue on
289 the more comprehensive telehealth bills and the Pediatric
290 Priority Review Voucher. I look forward to that work. Mr.
291 Bilirakis and Ms. Eshoo continue to work on legislation for
292 the Pediatric Priority Review and make other important
293 changes for rare disease drug development that we heard
294 testimony in the subcommittee on Rare Disease Day.

295 I look forward to discussion today, and I yield back.

296 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there
297 further opening statements?

298 The chair recognizes Ms. Eshoo for three minutes for an
299 opening statement.

300 *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman, and good
301 morning, colleagues. Today, as the members have said, we are
302 considering 13 bills.

303 First, we will consider several bills to make the

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304 Medicaid program more efficient by ensuring enrollment
305 information for physicians and patients is up to date.

306 Second, we will consider the SHINE for Autumn Act,
307 legislation introduced by Congresswomen Castor and Kelly to
308 close gaps in stillbirth data, research, and awareness to
309 ensure that all moms have healthy babies.

310 Third, we will consider the Women and Lung Cancer
311 Research and Preventive Services Act, legislation to move the
312 needle on the alarming increase of lung cancer diagnoses
313 among young women who have never smoked by commissioning more
314 research on prevention and treatment.

315 Unfortunately, we haven't reached bipartisan agreement
316 yet on my legislation, the Innovation in Pediatric Drugs Act.
317 I plan to continue bipartisan negotiations with you, Madam
318 Chairwoman, and our ranking member, Mr. Pallone, and
319 Congressman Bilirakis to identify an offset or a workaround
320 to accommodate increased funding for the NIH Best
321 Pharmaceuticals for Children Act program. The program is
322 critical for studying new uses for drugs to treat children
323 once the drugs lose their patent protections.

324 I appreciate and thank the chairwoman, our ranking

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325 member, and Mr. Bilirakis for working with me on this
326 important issue. It is hard to find an agreement, and I
327 thank you and your staff for working closely with myself and
328 my staff to get the legislation to where it is today. And
329 where we are today, I believe, is very close to the finish
330 line. I look forward to finding, as I said, a bipartisan
331 solution.

332 I applaud the work that has gone into the bills that are
333 before us, and I look forward to this productive markup.

334 And I yield back.

335 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Are there
336 further opening statements?

337 The chair recognizes Mr. Bilirakis for three minutes for
338 the purposes of offering an opening statement.

339 *Mr. Bilirakis. Thank you so much, Madam Chair. I will
340 be brief.

341 But I want to reiterate our commitment to work towards a
342 strong bipartisan resolution on the pediatric rare disease
343 package we put together a subcommittee under the Give Kids a
344 Chance Act. While I am disappointed that we couldn't
345 consider that legislation here today in the full committee

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346 markup, I remain optimistic that we will be able to notice
347 and vote out as strong of a bipartisan showing as possible in
348 the next markup we schedule. I am fully committed to
349 continuing to negotiate and work out an agreement with my
350 friend and colleague, Representative Eshoo, and I know we are
351 very close to doing that, so I want to thank her for her good
352 faith efforts thus far. I know we both care about this issue
353 greatly, and I want to ensure we are incentivizing new
354 treatments and cures for children with rare diseases and
355 cancers.

356 We must move forward quickly to reauthorize the Rare
357 Pediatric Priority Review Voucher, which expires in
358 September. I know we are going to get it right. I also want
359 to thank the fellow co-leads on that bill, and that is
360 Representatives Trahan, Barragan, and Burgess for their
361 steadfast support and commitment to get this across the
362 finish line.

363 In the interim we have great policies in the -- on the
364 agenda today, including the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care
365 Act, the SPEAK Act, and SHINE for Autumn Act, among many
366 others. I thank the chair and the ranking member for putting

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367 together this markup, and I look forward to supporting all of
368 these bills out of committee today.

369 And I will yield back the balance of my time unless
370 somebody wants it.

371 Thank you. I yield back.

372 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Are there
373 further opening statements?

374 Seeing none, the chair calls up H.R. 6020, as amended by
375 the Subcommittee on Health, and asks the clerk to report.

376 *The Clerk. H.R. 6020, a bill to amend the Public
377 Health Service Act to eliminate consideration of the income
378 of organ recipients and providing reimbursement of expenses
379 to donating --

380 *The Chair. Without objection, the first reading of the
381 bill is dispensed with, and the bill will be open for
382 amendment at any point.

383 So ordered.

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388 *The Chair. Does anyone seek to be recognized on the
389 bill?

390 The chair recognizes Mr. Obernolte for five minutes to
391 speak on the bill.

392 *Mr. Obernolte. Well, thank you, Madam Chair. I move
393 to strike the last word.

394 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized.

395 *Mr. Obernolte. Thank you, Madam Chair. It is an honor
396 to be able to speak in support of my bill, H.R. 6020, the
397 Honoring our Living Donor Act.

398 I think we can all agree that one of the most selfless
399 acts that someone can commit is the donation of an organ to
400 someone else, and yet it happens thousands of times each
401 year. In fact, in 2022 nearly 6,500 lives were saved through
402 the donation of a living -- of an organ by a living donor.
403 And yet there is a desperate need for more of these
404 donations. There are currently more than 100,000 Americans
405 on the waiting list awaiting a transplant. And in 2021,
406 6,000 people in the United States died while waiting for a
407 transplant.

408 Between 2006 and 2021 there -- the list of Americans

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409 waiting for a kidney donation rose by over 50 percent. But
410 unfortunately, kidney donations declined by seven percent.
411 And this year over 100 Americans are added to that waiting
412 list every single day. And the reason for this is that it is
413 a huge commitment to be a living organ donor.

414 In addition to the medical commitment, the typical
415 living organ donor spends over 10 percent of their annual
416 income just to be a donor. On average, they have to take two
417 weeks off of work -- it is six weeks off of work if the work
418 involves physical exertion -- and it is a huge burden on
419 these people. So we want to make it easier for people to be
420 living organ donors.

421 In 2007 Congress established the National Living Organ
422 Donor Assistance Center, which provides assistance
423 financially to donors who make less than 350 percent of the
424 poverty line. However, that means test is applied not only
425 to the income of the donor, but also to the income of the
426 recipient, which is actually pretty nonsensical and has
427 resulted in many people who would be eligible for assistance
428 to not be eligible for that assistance.

429 This bill, H.R. 6020, would correct that problem by

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430 clarifying that the means test applies only to the donor and
431 not to the recipient of the organ. Hopefully, this will
432 incentivize more people to take the selfless step of becoming
433 living organ donors, and get those organ donations back up to
434 where they are more meeting the need.

435 I would like to thank Congresswoman Susan DelBene for
436 her work on this bill and for co-leading the bill with me.
437 This is a common-sense bill that passed out of subcommittee
438 unanimously. I would request -- respectfully request your
439 support on the bill.

440 I yield back.

441 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there
442 further discussion?

443 For what purpose does the gentlelady seek recognition?

444 *Ms. Matsui. Madam Chair, I move to strike the last
445 word.

446 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five
447 minutes.

448 *Ms. Matsui. I am glad to see the committee taking up
449 legislation to address the shortage of available organs for
450 transplant. I support the HOLD Act, and I am confident it

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451 will save lives. But we still have a lot of work left to do
452 to address the national organ shortage.

453 Every day 17 Americans die waiting for an organ,
454 Americans we could save with updated public policy. We need
455 bold action to prevent this needless loss of life. That is
456 why, at the start of this Congress, I introduced the Organ
457 Donation Clarification Act, which includes language to ensure
458 more potential donors are eligible for Federal support. This
459 language is mirrored in the HOLD Act, which I am supporting
460 today.

461 Beyond the language before us today, my bill would
462 ensure potential donors would receive the comprehensive
463 support they need to be able to donate. It would also allow
464 for the testing of new and innovative technologies or methods
465 to increase donations. Today there are over 100,000 patients
466 waiting for a kidney. Most of them will never get one. This
467 is a national crisis. To meet the magnitude of this crisis,
468 we must do more. We should pass the HOLD Act today, and I
469 hope this committee can continue to work on this issue,
470 including by taking up my Organ Donation Clarification Act.

471 I yield the balance of my time.

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472 *The Chair. The gentlelady, Ms. Matsui, yields back.

473 Is there further discussion?

1103 Thank you, Debbie, for galvanizing families across
1104 America to get Congress to act because stillbirth is a public
1105 health crisis in the United States, with over 21,000
1106 stillbirths every year, almost 60 babies dying every day.

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1107 That exceeds the number of deaths for children age 0 to 14
1108 from guns, accidents, pre-term births, SIDS, drowning, fire,
1109 and flu combined.

1110 And like too many other maternal and child health
1111 issues, there are persistent and longstanding disparities,
1112 with Black women more than twice as likely to experience
1113 stillbirth than White women. At least one out of four
1114 stillbirths is estimated to be preventable, but there is
1115 still so much that we don't know. That is why we need real
1116 change. We need measurable improvements for families.

1117 The SHINE for Autumn Act will improve surveillance and
1118 data collection relating to stillbirth nationwide. It will
1119 invest in research to examine the causes and risk factors.
1120 Additionally, it will seek to increase education and
1121 awareness around stillbirth. Parents deserve better data and
1122 science, and I know that until an issue has been carefully
1123 researched, analyzed, and quantified, it is nearly impossible
1124 to take meaningful action.

1125 We need a clearer picture as to why babies are dying if
1126 we want to make progress towards reducing stillbirth rates
1127 and improving outcomes. So with timely and accurate data, we

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1128 can begin to understand the underlying causes and guide
1129 policy actions and much-needed strategies for prevention.
1130 Together our committee can address the serious maternal and
1131 infant health crisis that is tearing so many families apart
1132 and causing significant pain and trauma.

1133 And I know there are others here today who are among the
1134 91 bipartisan cosponsors. Thank you. Thank you for your
1135 unanimous vote last Congress. Thank you for helping us get
1136 it past the House, and talk to your Senators about making
1137 this a priority, too. Thank you again for your vote today to
1138 support Debbie and Autumn Joy, and all the other families who
1139 have been impacted by this public health crisis. Thank you
1140 for focusing on solutions.

1141 I yield back.

1149 *Mr. Carter. Every year over 21,000 babies are still
1150 born in the United States. No family should endure such an
1151 unimaginable tragedy. The SHINE for Autumn Act aims to
1152 address these alarming statistics through enhanced data
1153 collection, research, education, and awareness.

1154 Thank you to Chairwoman Rodgers, Representative Kim, and
1155 Representative Castor for your leadership in bringing this
1156 bipartisan bill before this committee today.

1157 We need to pass this bill this Congress. This [sic] is
1158 absolutely no reason this should wait. I urge all my
1159 colleagues to support the SHINE Act, SHINE for Autumn Act, so
1160 we can move this bill forward and start making a difference
1161 in the lives of babies and families nationwide.

1162 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back.

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1170 there are over 20,000 stillborn babies each year in the
1171 United States. This is a deeply painful experience for
1172 mothers and family. And what is even more troubling,
1173 according to research, nearly a quarter of these stillbirths
1174 can be prevented, with the majority occurring in low-risk
1175 pregnancies.

1176 Black women, Medicaid recipients, and residents of rural
1177 areas bear a disproportionate share of these tragic losses,
1178 underscoring the urgent need for targeted interventions and
1179 equitable access to care.

1180 These disparities in our maternity care system have
1181 profound consequences. Maternity and newborn care account
1182 for a significant portion of hospital expenditures for most
1183 commercial insurers and state Medicaid programs. With
1184 Medicaid covering 42 percent of births in the United States,
1185 the Federal Government bears substantial responsibility for
1186 ensuring the quality and value of maternal newborn care.

1187 We cannot remain complacent. We can and must do more to
1188 mitigate the risk of stillbirth and offer support to those
1189 who have suffered such a traumatic loss. That is why I am
1190 proud to join the bipartisan SHINE for Autumn Act, along with

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1191 my colleagues, Representative Castor, my co-chair of the
1192 bipartisan Maternity Care Caucus, Representative Young Kim,
1193 and Representative Joyce.

1194 Importantly, these bills allocate funds, as you have
1195 heard, to enhance data collection, increase training in
1196 perinatal pathology, and disseminate educational materials on
1197 stillbirths. This legislation will give families a true
1198 chance to thrive and is vital for bridging research gaps.
1199 For these reasons I urge my colleagues to once again support
1200 this bill so that no mother has to endure the heartbreak of
1201 having a stillborn baby.

1202 Thank you, and I yield back.

1214 collection processes for the prevention of stillbirths.

1215 In 2021, 164 Iowans were stillborn, wreaking havoc on
1216 expecting mothers and families who wait 9 months for the
1217 joyful occasion, only to be met with tragedy and guilt and
1218 remorse.

1219 Stillbirth is possible for all pregnancies, even ones
1220 that are seemingly low risk. This legislation would create
1221 the first nationally coordinated effort to address and reduce
1222 stillbirths, and I am proud to be supportive of this effort.

1223 And I thank Autumn's mom for being here with us today
1224 and championing this cause.

1438 million U.S. adults were estimated to have autism spectrum
1439 disorder, or ASD, in 2017. This accounts for a 178 percent
1440 increase in the prevalence since 2000. Further, 1 in every
1441 36 children were diagnosed with ASD in 2020.

1442 The programs and activities authorized under the Autism
1443 CARES Act serve as the primary driver of autism research,
1444 services, training, and monitoring across the Federal
1445 Government. This AINS makes certain improvements to the
1446 current programing, including ensuring that programs are
1447 appropriately channeling resources towards the most impactful
1448 forms of research and services, as well as coordinating
1449 across the various programs at the NIH, CDC, and HRSA.

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1450 Most importantly, this bill takes steps to ensure the
1451 public and all individuals with the ASD community have an
1452 opportunity to engage in and are included in the research
1453 process and other activities related to autism.

1454 I am proud of the work that has been done on this bill,

1713 beneficiaries are not deceased.

1714 We also require immediate disenrollment of
1715 beneficiaries, should they verify the death of Medicaid
1716 enrollees. This repeals the current CMS guidance that forced

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1717 states to collect additional information about their
1718 beneficiaries to ensure their records are correct. I
1719 questioned Director Tsai about this unnecessary bureaucracy,
1720 and I am glad we can address it here with this particular
1721 amendment.

1722 Lastly, while I know the Death Master File is a highly
1723 accurate record of information, sometimes mistakes do occur,
1724 and they really do occur, Madam Chair, we have evidence that
1725 they do. The amendment importantly provides a process for
1726 reenrollment, should the information from the database turn
1727 out to be incorrect. We certainly agree that we don't want
1728 to inadvertently disenroll Medicaid patients that are still
1729 alive, and this amendment makes that clarification.

1730 I ask all my colleagues to support my AINS and support
1731 this common-sense proposal by passing, ultimately, H.R. 8084,
1732 as amended.

2462 into the DEX. However, if my home state of Kentucky isn't

2674 *Mrs. Trahan. Thank you, Madam Chair. My amendment
2675 makes technical adjustments to this bipartisan bill which I
2676 introduced alongside Congresswoman Miller-Meeks.

2677 When necessary, clinical care is determined for a child
2678 by medical professionals, there should be no reason that
2679 administrative burdens get in the way. The Accelerating
2680 Kids' Access to Care Act is designed to cut through red tape
2681 and get kids the appropriate care and often lifesaving care
2682 that they need.

2683 To express the importance of getting this legislation
2684 over the finish line, I would like to highlight a story from
2685 a patient who was negatively impacted by the burdensome and
2686 time-consuming Medicaid provider screening and enrollment
2687 process. Almost three years ago, a baby -- and I will call
2688 her Lily -- was born in a rural state with her esophagus in
2689 two separate segments and connected abnormally to the
2690 windpipe. Because this condition requires a particularly
2691 complicated procedure to correct it, doctors explained to the
2692 family there are only two places in the country where it

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2693 could be done. One of them was Boston Children's Hospital in
2694 my home state of Massachusetts.

2695 Immediately, Lily and her parents were ready to travel
2696 to Boston, where the surgeons were standing by to perform the
2697 lifesaving operation. But instead, Lily, who was a Medicaid
2698 recipient, was waiting for her home state to enroll the eight
2699 providers at Boston Children's who needed to perform this
2700 complex surgery. Her state, confused about the rules
2701 concerning out-of-state provider enrollment, wouldn't
2702 authorize the services provided by Boston Children's.

2703 Lily's surgery was rescheduled more than three times,
2704 and delayed over seven months. As Lily waited, she lived
2705 with a floppy airwave -- airway, excuse me -- that could have
2706 collapsed at any moment, a weakened immune system, and
2707 routine breathing difficulties. This situation was not just
2708 a delay in paperwork. It was a delay that put a child's life
2709 at significant risk. Every day that passed was a day where
2710 her condition could have taken a fatal turn.

2711 And Lily's story is one of many across our country.
2712 That is why it is crucial for us to pass the Accelerating
2713 Kids' Access to Care Act. The stakes are simply too high to

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2714 allow bureaucratic hurdles to stand in the way of urgent
2715 medical care for our most vulnerable children. When care is
2716 delayed for kids with complex medical hurdles -- excuse me,
2717 issues -- who need to cross over state lines, the
2718 consequences are severe and far reaching. Delays in
2719 accessing appropriate care can lead to increased mortality
2720 rates and worsened health outcomes for pediatric patients.

2721 Additionally, families face significant financial and
2722 psychological strain when care is delayed. These delays also
2723 contribute to increased use of emergency services and high
2724 overall health care costs.

2725 I want to thank my colleague, Congresswoman Miller-
2726 Meeks, for working with me on this important legislation, and
2727 I strongly urge my colleagues on this committee to support
2728 the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act today so that we
2729 can ensure that no child on Medicaid has to endure
2730 unnecessary delays in receiving critical medical care across
2731 state lines.

2740 support for the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act, which
2741 will help families access lifesaving care for children with
2742 complex medical conditions.

2743 In Georgia we are blessed to have world-class children's
2744 hospitals that care for kids across the country. However, in
2745 some cases, patients with rare and complex diseases have to
2746 travel out of state to receive specialized care when the
2747 services they need are not available in their own state. The
2748 process is difficult, and it is full of red tape, often
2749 delaying children and their families from receiving the care
2750 they desperately need and, in some cases, blocking access to
2751 care altogether.

2752 The Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act will allow
2753 states to streamline the process for out-of-state pediatric
2754 care providers to enroll in another state's Medicaid program,
2755 while also providing important guardrails. This is common-

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2756 sense policy that will help children with complex medical
2757 conditions access critical care.

2758 I am also pleased to see the bipartisan amendment
2759 include crucial pharmacy benefit manager reforms from my Drug
2760 Price Transparency and Medicaid Act. This provision would
2761 prohibit spread pricing in Medicaid, and clarify that states
2762 should reimburse PBMs contracting with Medicaid-managed care
2763 organizations for an administrative fee for managing the
2764 pharmacy benefit for Medicaid beneficiaries. This will save
2765 taxpayers roughly \$300 million, and will protect patients,
2766 pharmacies, and others from middleman tactics that drive up
2767 prescription drug costs.

2768 I commend Dr. Miller-Meeks and Representative Trahan for
2769 working on this issue, and I urge my colleagues to support
2770 the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act.

2771 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back.

2772 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there
2773 further discussion?

2774 For what purpose does Ms. Eshoo seek recognition?

2775 *Ms. Eshoo. I move to strike the last word, Madam
2776 Chairwoman.

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2777 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five
2778 minutes.

2779 *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you. I rise to speak in support of
2780 this bill, and I want to thank Representatives Trahan and
2781 Miller-Meeks for leading on this important effort to ensure
2782 children in need of lifesaving care can receive it.

2783 Today, when a child with cancer, a rare disease, or
2784 much-needed surgery needs to travel to another state to
2785 receive treatment, the physician and sometimes the entire
2786 health care team treating the child must be screened and
2787 enrolled in the child's home state Medicaid program. This is
2788 a highly -- as other members have stated, this is a highly
2789 burdensome process. It is filled with red tape for
2790 physicians, and it delays the lifesaving care for children
2791 who really can't afford to wait. I have seen this happen
2792 over and over again because I have the Lucile Packard
2793 Children's Hospital in the heart of my district.

2794 This legislation fixes exactly what the title of the
2795 bill says by creating a voluntary and streamlined process to
2796 allow physicians to enroll in another state's Medicaid
2797 program.

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2798 So I fully support this effort. I thank the members
2799 that are leading it. And I think it deserves a unanimous
2800 vote so it can become law this year.

2801 And with that, Madam Chairwoman, I yield back.

2802 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. For what
2803 purpose does Mr. Hudson seek recognition?

2804 *Mr. Hudson. To speak on the bill.

2805 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five
2806 minutes.

2807 *Mr. Hudson. Thank you. I am so glad to see this bill
2808 come forth. It directly impacts thousands of children and
2809 their access to needed out-of-state care.

2810 I want to put a face on this, though. I want to tell
2811 you a story of a two-year-old boy named Gabe from Texas. He
2812 was finally medically stable enough to make the waitlist for
2813 a thymus transplant at Duke Children's Hospital and Health
2814 Center just outside my district. The surgeons at Duke are
2815 some of the only people in the country that can provide this
2816 surgery. Yet Texas Medicaid decided it wasn't medically
2817 necessary for him to have this transplant.

2818 I can't imagine the anger, the frustration, the stress I

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2819 would feel as a father in that situation. Gabe had to fight
2820 for his life every day because his family can't receive a
2821 timely approval like others who have private insurance. The
2822 life expectancy of the form of DiGeorge syndrome he has is
2823 typically two or three years.

2824 When Gabe was four, they found another path with Duke
2825 coordinators transporting them up to North Carolina again,
2826 only to have to turn around and go back to Texas because of
2827 technical tax codes changing.

2828 After years of disappointments, months in the hospital,
2829 the hardships Gabe's parents and siblings had to face, and
2830 the sadness of living the opposite of a normal childhood,
2831 Gabe finally got the transplant at Duke that he needed. This
2832 bill will save thousands of kids and families from going
2833 through the same struggles and hurdles that Gabe's family
2834 did.

2835 I look forward to voting in favor of this bill, and with
2836 that I yield back.

2837 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there
2838 further discussion?

2839 For what purpose does Ms. Castor seek recognition?

2840 *Ms. Castor. To strike the last word.

2841 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five
2842 minutes.

2843 *Ms. Castor. Thank you, Madam Chair. I want to thank
2844 Representatives Trahan and Miller-Meeks for bringing the
2845 Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act.

2846 This is a very important next step on the bipartisan
2847 work the Energy and Commerce Committee has done over the
2848 years. In 2019 the committee passed the ACE Kids Act. It
2849 was a bill I led with Congressman Bilirakis and
2850 Representative Eshoo and Congresswoman Herrera Beutler.

2851 As you all know, Medicaid is the largest insurer of
2852 children in the United States, especially for children with
2853 complex medical conditions, or cancer, or a rare disease.
2854 And children with complex medical conditions often need
2855 specialized treatment that is not available in their
2856 community or in their state. So the ACE Kids Act created a
2857 new state option under Medicaid that, in conjunction with our
2858 children's hospitals, that would create -- it creates medical
2859 homes in those children's hospitals, and it allows children
2860 to cross state lines to get the care they need.

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2861 The goal of that effort was to put kids with complex
2862 medical conditions and their families first by allowing these
2863 states to implement these medical homes through Medicaid that
2864 coordinate care, they lower costs, they save time for
2865 families and providers.

2866 Now the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act is the
2867 important next step that needs to happen to make it easier
2868 for qualified pediatric providers to enroll in multiple
2869 Medicaid programs. The bill is going to make it easier for
2870 families.

2871 I think about the fantastic children's hospitals in the
2872 Sunshine State, two in the Tampa Bay area, Johns Hopkins All
2873 Children's and then Saint Joseph's Children's Hospital.
2874 Sometimes they will have the providers that can serve the
2875 needs of a child in Georgia or in South Carolina. We
2876 shouldn't be so stringent under the Medicaid laws that a
2877 child with a complex medical condition cannot get the care
2878 they need and see the specialists that they need.

2879 Overall, this is going to -- this is a godsend to
2880 families. I am proud to be a cosponsor, and I look forward
2881 to voting yes today. I hope everyone will vote yes. Thank

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2882 you.

2883 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. For what
2884 purpose does Mrs. Miller-Meeks seek recognition?

2885 *Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Madam Chair, I move to strike the
2886 last word and speak in favor of the bill.

2887 *The Chair. The gentlelady is recognized for five
2888 minutes.

2889 *Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Thank you, Madam Chair. I am proud
2890 to lead the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act with my
2891 colleague, Representative Lori Trahan.

2892 This legislation would streamline administrative
2893 processes for providers who need to enroll in another state's
2894 Medicaid program due to a lack of services provided in a
2895 patient's home state.

2896 I was also proud to have a fellow Iowan and constituent
2897 doctor, Alec Bassuk, testify before the committee in February
2898 to support the legislation and highlight the positive impact
2899 it would have on Iowa families.

2900 There is currently no standardized Federal pathway for
2901 this process, meaning that providers must enroll in each
2902 individual state's Medicaid program whenever they see a

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2903 patient from that state, and must maintain regular paperwork
2904 to remain enrolled in each state's Medicaid program. When a
2905 child from a different state is visiting a doctor, as may be
2906 the case if a child from another state travels to Iowa for
2907 care, which -- given that we are less than an hour away from
2908 places in Illinois and Missouri, there are often delays in
2909 care as the providers must sift through weeks of paperwork,
2910 risking the health of children with critical, life-
2911 threatening conditions.

2912 I would also like to thank Congressman Buddy Carter for
2913 advocating for a ban on spread pricing in Medicaid, which
2914 saves the program \$300 million, and is the pay-for for this
2915 policy.

2916 Again, I am proud to see this committee move this
2917 critical piece of legislation. I applaud the committee and
2918 the chair for bringing forth this legislation, and I
2919 encourage my colleagues to vote yes on the AINS and on the
2920 underlying bill.

2921 I yield back the balance --

2922 *Mr. Cardenas. Will the gentlelady yield?

2923 *Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Yes.

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2924 *Mr. Cardenas. Thank you. I just wanted to point out,
2925 Madam Chairwoman, that this is a fine moment in the
2926 legislation going on in the United States Congress. We have
2927 a newer member on this committee, a Democrat, and another
2928 newer member on this committee, a Republican, working
2929 together. And you heard the examples of the difficulties and
2930 the unfortunate, life-risking situation of not correcting our
2931 system. And this bill will be practical, it will be
2932 responsible, and it is something that is long, long overdue.

2933 What is unfortunate is that this fine piece of
2934 legislation and this cooperation and this coming together to
2935 do the right thing will probably not be on television
2936 tonight. It will probably not make tweets, et cetera, et
2937 cetera. So the American people will probably not even hear
2938 about it or know about it.

2939 And on top of that, we have many bills today that are
2940 going through this committee unanimously, with every
2941 Republican and Democrat speaking positively about the
2942 cooperation with each other and the work that the staff and
2943 all of us have been doing -- for many, many years, in some
2944 cases -- to finally culminate in good, positive legislation

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2945 for the American people.

2946 So I just wanted to point out this fine, fine moment of
2947 this incredible committee, and these incredible members who
2948 have come together to do the right thing. So I want -- and
2949 also one more thing that I want to point out.

2950 Yes, it is not lost on me that the two leads on this are
2951 both women.

2952 Thank you very much, and I yield back.

2953 *Mrs. Miller-Meeks. Thank you, Representative --

3159 I want to thank Representative Harshbarger and
3160 Representative Wasserman Schultz for what is a really simple
3161 piece of legislation that solves a problem that can be very
3162 dangerous, particularly to our seniors and people with
3163 disabilities.

3164 You know, when a prescription is at the drugstore but
3165 you happen to be a senior that doesn't have transportation,
3166 or you are very ill and you can't get to the pharmacy or
3167 wherever you can pick up your prescription in a timely way,
3168 which can be so very, very important -- and that is what it
3169 is right now, you have to show up. But this legislation says
3170 that a family member will be able to pick up that
3171 prescription, or a caregiver will be able to have the right

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3172 to pick up that prescription for the person that needs it.

3173 And so I think this is such a sensible change that can
3174 make a real difference in people's lives, and so I urge all
3175 my colleagues to support this bill.

3176 And I yield back.

3177 *The Chair. The gentlelady yields back. Is there
3178 further discussion?

3179 For what purpose does Mr. Hudson seek recognition?

3180 *Mr. Hudson. To speak on the underlying bill.

3181 *The Chair. The gentleman is recognized for five
3182 minutes.

3183 *Mr. Hudson. Thank you.

3184 I first want to say I appreciate the ongoing efforts and
3185 commitment to preserving seniors' access to medications. In
3186 rural districts like mine this makes a world of difference
3187 for patients. I represent a district in North Carolina,
3188 where some folks will drive hours to see their providers, and
3189 then another distance to pick up their medications. For
3190 years we have allowed beneficiaries to retrieve certain
3191 medications for their loved ones, and then CMS issued FAQs
3192 that deliberately limit access to potentially lifesaving

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3193 medications.

3194 I am glad that we have been joined by so many in this
3195 room over the years to push for better and easier access to
3196 critical medications for our loved ones, and I am glad to see
3197 this bill moving forward, and I look forward to voting for
3198 it.

3199 Thank you, and I would like to yield to my colleague,
3200 Mr. Carter.

3201 *Mr. Carter. I thank the gentleman for yielding.

3202 As a pharmacist, I know firsthand the importance of
3203 cancer patients getting their medications in a timely manner
3204 without any obstacles. Oncology practices should easily be
3205 able to deliver the medications they dispense, or have a
3206 family member pick up the medications for them. However, CMS
3207 is suggesting that patients should rely on PBM mail service
3208 to get their medications. This is a non-starter, because
3209 there will be delays and denials.

3210 We need to pass this simple solution that is in H.R.
3211 5526, the Seniors' Access to Critical Medications Act, for
3212 the sake of Medicare seniors and those disabled. That is why
3213 I applaud Representative Harshbarger for introducing this

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3214 bill, and I urge my colleagues to support it.

3215 Thank you, Madam Chair, and I yield back.

3216 *Mr. Hudson. I yield back.

3217 *The Chair. The gentleman yields back. Is there
3218 further discussion?

3221 and speak in support of the bill.

3224 *Ms. Eshoo. Thank you.

3225 Today we are voting on legislation to extend a common-
3226 sense policy established during the COVID pandemic to extend
3227 what was established during the pandemic that made it easier
3228 for patients, cancer patients, to get their drugs mailed
3229 directly to them by their oncologists. The flexibility
3230 limited cancer patients' potential exposure to COVID, it kept
3231 them safe and healthy while it ensured that they could
3232 continue to receive treatment from their oncologists. It
3233 also offered cancer patients peace of mind, knowing they
3234 didn't have to worry about whether they would be too sick to

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3235 drive to their oncologist to pick up their drugs.

3236 After an oncology practice opens an on-site pharmacy,
3237 studies have found patients starting their treatments more
3238 quickly after their diagnosis which is, obviously, highly
3239 positive. When anyone has cancer, they can't afford to wait.
3240 That is why I voted in favor of extending this policy during
3241 our Health Subcommittee markup earlier this year.

3242 I am glad that a bipartisan agreement was reached to
3243 reinstate this flexibility for five years, with the
3244 stipulation that oncologists complete one face-to-face visit
3245 with their patients before oncology drugs can be sent to
3246 their homes, and that the oncologist's relationship with the
3247 patient be an ongoing one. This requirement is a common-
3248 sense guardrail to limit the chance of fraud, which I know
3249 colleagues had concerns about.

3250 We should be proud that we are making treatments more
3251 accessible to cancer patients by advancing this proposal
3252 today. Obviously, I urge a unanimous vote on this.

3253 And with that, I yield back, Chairwoman, and thank you.

3271 *Mrs. Harshbarger. Okay, thank you, Madam Chair, and
3272 thank you to all the members who spoke in support of this
3273 bill.

3274 This amendment represents a bipartisan compromise to the
3275 important legislation that I introduced with Representative
3276 Wasserman Schultz, and which has strong bipartisan cosponsor
3277 support from many members on this committee. I want to thank
3278 Chairs Rodgers, Guthrie, Pallone, and Eshoo for working with
3279 me to advance this consensus clarification of the Medicare
3280 Stark Law.

3281 This would provide continuation of pandemic-era
3282 flexibilities for specialty physicians and other health
3283 providers to be able to deliver oral medications to patients
3284 by mail delivery or courier, or allow a designated caregiver
3285 or family member to pick up these medications for patients.
3286 This is critically important for the well-being of cancer
3287 patients and others with serious diseases who are too sick to
3288 pick up their medications in person, who live in rural areas
3289 distant from their physicians, or who simply do not have

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3290 transportation.

3291 The AINS represents a consensus modification to my
3292 originally introduced bill, H.R. 5526. The AINS would extend
3293 these drug delivery and access flexibilities under Medicare
3294 for vulnerable patients for five years, clarifying that this
3295 would not violate the Medicare Stark Law's self-referral
3296 provisions.

3297 The AINS also adds common-sense guardrails for these
3298 flexibilities by requiring, within one year prior, the
3299 Medicare beneficiary must have a face-to-face encounter with
3300 the prescriber, not including a telehealth encounter, and
3301 only if the Medicare beneficiary has an ongoing preexisting
3302 relationship with the provider.

3303 It also adds a requirement that within three years of
3304 enactment HHS will submit a report to Congress on data
3305 resulting from this arrangement, including how many Medicare
3306 beneficiaries received specialty drugs under this
3307 arrangement, any changes in drug expenditures, a description
3308 of which drugs were furnished under this arrangement, and any
3309 impact on the prices for such drugs.

3310 The very minimal cost of these reforms would be fully

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3311 paid for and offset by including in the AINS the provisions
3312 of H.R. 5397, which passed unanimously out of our full
3313 committee in December 2023 by a vote of 46 to 0. These
3314 provisions in section three of the AINS would expand access
3315 to home infusion treatments by classifying certain approved
3316 drugs as DME, and ensure that these lifesaving treatments are
3317 covered under Medicare benefits.

3318 And finally, it provides that excess savings be credited
3319 to the Medicare Improvement Act.

3320 So I urge my colleagues to support this AINS's
3321 compromise because we shouldn't be forcing patients,
3322 especially our seniors, to take an arduous journey or have
3323 their access to critical medications threatened.

3324 And with that, Madam Chair, thank you, and I yield back.

3526 colleagues on both sides of the aisle.

3527 This legislation empowers patients to make informed
3528 decisions about their health by providing them with vital
3529 resources and support in their preferred language, the
3530 preferred way that they would like to communicate.

3531 Clear communication between patients and providers
3532 improves health outcomes, but also enhances the efficiency of
3533 the health care system, reducing misunderstandings, costly
3534 delays, and potentially life-threatening errors. This

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3535 legislation is a critical step in addressing these challenges
3536 and improving the health care experience for millions.

3537 I have seen firsthand how language barriers can impact
3538 patient care. For example, I, being the youngest of 11
3539 children, both of my parents raised in Mexico, their English
3540 was very, very limited. So my mother, when she went to the
3541 doctor, would pick one of her 11 children to go with her to
3542 actually interpret for her. Normally, we would be able to
3543 interpret for her at the front desk of the clinic or wherever
3544 she is seeking health care. Then we would be able to walk
3545 down the hall, or what have you, with her and help interpret.
3546 But when she was in the room with the doctor, that is when we
3547 were dismissed to go back to the waiting room. That is not
3548 an effective and efficient way for providing service to
3549 people, especially when it comes to their health care.

3550 In addition to that, my father was so uncomfortable
3551 speaking in English that he never went to the doctor. That
3552 is not a measure of good health care outcomes or good
3553 practice by any means. Of course, this is incumbent upon
3554 people like my father and my mother to try their best to
3555 learn how to communicate in the language of English. But at

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3556 the same time, when it comes to health care and when it comes
3557 to effective and efficient health care, we need to make sure
3558 that we try our best to do what we can not only as
3559 legislators, but as a system to make sure that we have the
3560 best communication possible so that men, women, and children
3561 can get the best care possible in the language that they
3562 prefer or need to be communicated with.

3563 Again, all this bill does is direct the Secretary of
3564 Health and Human Services to convene a task force to assess
3565 barriers and develop recommendations to improve access to
3566 health information systems for non-English speakers in our
3567 great country.

3568 So with that I would like to once again ask my
3569 colleagues to please support this legislation. So far we are
3570 11 for 11 on fully aye votes, unanimous decisions in this
3571 committee. Today, hopefully, we will continue with that
3572 record on the last two bills, including this one.

3573 With that, Madam Chair, I yield back.

3585 Florida. Many of them are seniors. Some of them are
3586 children, as well. That is why I applaud Representatives
3587 Steel and Gomez for introducing the bipartisan SPEAK Act,
3588 directing the HHS Secretary to convene a task force to assess
3589 barriers and develop recommendations to improve access to
3590 health care for non-English speakers.

3591 There are many potential solutions to these issues, like
3592 interpreters via telehealth, an area we have been working on
3593 quite a bit in this committee, as well as artificial
3594 intelligence and hiring folks who can speak various
3595 languages. It is the right thing to do to save lives. It
3596 also could save money by encouraging access to health care,
3597 and by preventing health conditions from getting worse among

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3598 many of these communities.

3599 As a nation of immigrants, this has been a long time
3600 coming, and I applaud the committee for going forward on
3601 this.

3819 The bill we are considering here is more than just a
3820 piece of legislation. It is a pathway to enhancing health
3821 care delivery for millions. It is, at its core, a bill that
3822 ensures patients receive the care they need, when and in the
3823 manner that upholds the highest standards of integrity and
3824 efficiency.

3825 Telehealth expands access to quality health care for all
3826 Americans, breaking down geographic and economic barriers to
3827 ensure everyone receives the care they need and deserve. My
3828 bill is designed to support the sustainability and integrity
3829 of our health care programs by implementing measures that
3830 promote transparency, accountability, and prudent use of

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3831 resources. We can safeguard these programs for future
3832 generations.

3833 Ensuring program integrity is not just about preventing
3834 fraud, waste, and abuse. It is about maintaining the trust
3835 of the American people in our health care system. My bill
3836 represents a step forward in our ongoing efforts to improve
3837 the integrity and to ensure patients are fully benefitting
3838 from expanded access to telehealth care services.

3839 This bill is a win for patients. It is a win for the
3840 integrity of our health care programs.

3843 your attention and consideration. Together we can make a
3844 meaningful difference in the lives of countless Americans.

3858 Like many of my colleagues, I am deeply supportive of
3859 telehealth, and appreciative of the changes this bill is
3860 making to improve delivery of mental health services via
3861 telehealth. This bill will implement a coding modifier for
3862 mental health services furnished via telehealth to improve
3863 delivery of these critical services.

3864 Mental health matters, and this bill takes steps to
3865 improve Americans' -- especially those in rural communities
3866 -- access to the mental health care they need and deserve,
3867 and I thank my colleague from Michigan for leading it.

3868 During past hearings we have heard from a variety of
3869 witnesses that telehealth is being used, is trusted, and is
3870 effective. But the new data captured by this bill will show
3871 us even more what is further needed to strengthen access to
3872 important telehealth services.

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3873 On a broader issue, I would like to highlight the
3874 bipartisan work on another bill, H.R. 7623, the Telehealth
3875 Modernization Act. This legislation would make permanent the
3876 COVID-era telehealth flexibilities that are set to expire at
3877 the end of this year, and remove originating and geographic
3878 site restrictions which would allow patients to access
3879 telehealth from their homes, and would support patients in
3880 both rural and urban areas.

3881 This legislation also would make permanent the ability
3882 of federally-qualified health centers and rural health
3883 clinics to provide telehealth services and provide adequate
3884 reimbursement in those settings to ensure continued provision
3885 of virtual services. These services are critical for helping
3886 all patients access the care they need from the comfort and
3887 safety of their own homes, especially when they don't have
3888 providers near them, don't have transportation, or are older
3889 or sick.

3890 I am grateful for this committee's focus on telehealth
3891 and the good it is doing in communities across America, and
3892 optimistic that the committee will continue to work on
3893 broader legislation, as well. I urge my colleagues to

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3894 support the Telehealth Enhancement for Mental Health Act, but
3895 also urge this committee to bring the more -- the broader
3896 bill as soon as we can for reauthorization.

3897 Thank you, and I yield back, Madam Chair.
