"Biden's LNG Export Ban: How Rush-to-Green Politics Hurts Local Communities an U. S.

Energy Security"

Honorable Committee Chair and Members,

I begin this dialogue with a commendable "thank you" for allowing indulgence from the municipal government which has jurisdiction where this affected facility is situated. I, in no way am here to bash or discredit the Biden – Harris Administration on its position on the matter of permitting, however, I do appeal to the said administration to reconsider and subsequently abandon its present course of discontinuance or disallowing the permitting process to go forward.

Committee, I implore you to seek an amicable resolve to the present position by agencies which have authority to bring about the compromise needed to continue the economic growth for our fair city and provide a life sustaining environmentally friendly co-existence of the industrial neighbors with the residents of Port Arthur, Texas.
