2	This Act may be cited as the "9–8–8 Lifeline Cyber-
3	security Responsibility Act".
4	SEC. 2. PROTECTING SUICIDE PREVENTION LIFELINE
5	FROM CYBERSECURITY INCIDENTS.
6	(a) National Suicide Prevention Lifeline Pro-
7	GRAM.—Section 520E-3(b) of the Public Health Service
8	Act (42 U.S.C. 290bb–36c(b)) is amended—
9	(1) in paragraph (4), by striking "and" at the
10	end;
11	(2) in paragraph (5), by striking the period at
12	the end and inserting "; and"; and
13	(3) by adding at the end the following:
14	"(6) coordinating with the Chief Information
15	Security Officer of the Department of Health and
16	Human Services to take such steps as may be nec-
17	essary to ensure the program is protected from cy-

1	bersecurity incidents and eliminates known cyberse-
2	curity vulnerabilities.".
3	(b) Reporting.—Section 520E-3 of the Public
4	Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 290bb–36c) is amended—
5	(1) by redesignating subsection (f) as sub-
6	section (g); and
7	(2) by inserting after subsection (e) the fol-
8	lowing:
9	"(f) Cybersecurity Reporting.—
10	"(1) In general.—
11	"(A) IN GENERAL.—The program's net-
12	work administrator receiving Federal funding
13	pursuant to subsection (a) shall report to the
14	Assistant Secretary, in a manner that protects
15	personal privacy, consistent with applicable
16	Federal and State privacy laws—
17	"(i) any identified cybersecurity
18	vulnerabilities to the program immediately
19	upon identification of such a vulnerability;
20	and
21	"(ii) any identified cybersecurity inci-
22	dents to the program immediately upon
23	identification of such incident.
24	"(B) Local and regional crisis cen-
25	TERS.—Local and regional crisis centers par-

1	ticipating in the program shall report to the
2	program's network administrator identified in
3	subparagraph (A), in a manner that protects
4	personal privacy, consistent with applicable
5	Federal and State privacy laws—
6	"(i) any identified cybersecurity
7	vulnerabilities to the program immediately
8	upon identification of such vulnerability;
9	and
10	"(ii) any identified cybersecurity inci-
11	dents to the program immediately upon
12	identification of such incident.
13	"(2) Notification.—If the program's network
14	administrator receiving funding pursuant to sub-
15	section (a) discovers, or is informed by a local or re-
16	gional crisis center pursuant to paragraph (1)(B) of,
17	a cybersecurity vulnerability, incident, such entity
18	shall immediately report that discovery to the Assist-
19	ant Secretary.
20	"(3) Clarification.—
21	"(A) Oversight.—
22	"(i) Local and regional crisis
23	CENTER.—Except as provided in clause
24	(ii), local and regional crisis centers par-
25	ticipating in the program shall oversee all

1	technology each center employs in the pro-
2	vision of services as a participant in the
3	program.
4	"(ii) Network administrator.—
5	The program's network administrator re-
6	ceiving Federal funding pursuant to sub-
7	section (a) shall oversee the technology
8	each crisis center employs in the provision
9	of services as a participant in the program
10	if such oversight responsibilities are estab-
11	lished in the applicable network participa-
12	tion agreement.
13	"(B) Supplement, not supplant.—The
14	cybersecurity incident reporting requirements
15	under this subsection shall supplement, and not
16	supplant, cybersecurity incident reporting re-
17	quirements under other provisions of applicable
18	Federal law that are in effect on the date of the
19	enactment of the 9–8–8 Lifeline Cybersecurity
20	Responsibility Act.".
21	(c) Study.—Not later than 180 days after the date
22	of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General of
23	the United States shall—
24	(1) conduct and complete a study that evaluates
25	cybersecurity risks and vulnerabilities associated

1	with the $9-8-8$ National Suicide Prevention Lifeline;
2	and
3	(2) submit a report of the findings of such
4	study to the Committee on Energy and Commerce of
5	the House of Representatives and the Committee on
6	Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of the Sen-
7	ate.
