1. As a result of the PHE and subsequent temporary rules, multiple ancillary health professionals have been able to conduct evaluations via telehealth ("telehealth eligible providers") over the last 4 years. This includes occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech therapists and audiologists. If the current flexibilities are not continued, what kind of impact will that have on patients who may have issues with access, such as those who may not have these providers in their community or not have the means to travel?
