

William E. Fox, MD MACP is the Chair Emeritus of the American College of Physicians, the country's largest medical specialty organization, representing internal medicine physicians, related subspecialists, and medical students.

A resident of Charlottesville, VA, Dr. Fox is a founding partner of Fox & Brantley Internal Medicine in Charlottesville, a still independent medical practice. Before entering independent practice, he spent five years with the National Health Service Corps at Central Virginia Community Health Center in Buckingham, VA, while also serving as Clinical Assistant Professor of Internal Medicine at The University of Virginia.

Dr. Fox earned his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania's Perelman School of Medicine, where he received the Anna Marie Chirico Prize for distinguished work in primary care. He completed his postgraduate training in internal medicine at The University of Virginia. He has attained Mastership in ACP, an honorary designation reserved for individuals demonstrating significant impact in practice, leadership, health policy, or in medical research.

Dr. Fox served on ACP's Board of Regents for six years, concluding in April 2025. The Board of Regents manages the business and affairs of ACP and is the main policy-making body of the College. Prior to that, he was the Chair of ACP's Medical Practice and Quality Committee, a committee tasked with developing physician payment policy. He served for six years as a representative to the AMA's Relative Value Update Committee (RUC) between 2012 and 2019. The RUC is charged with making recommendations to Medicare regarding the value of physician services. He has also served as one of the College's delegates to the American Medical Association since 2020.

Previously, Dr. Fox served as Chair of ACP's Board of Governors, and prior to that, he served as Governor of ACP's Virginia Chapter. Dr. Fox has received numerous honors and recognitions, including the American College of Physicians Virginia Young Internist of the Year award in 2010, the Paul Florentino Volunteerism Award in 2013, and the Richard Neubauer Advocate for Internal Medicine Award in 2014.
