

Celeste Drake is the Trade & Globalization Policy Specialist at the AFL-CIO. She has been actively following negotiations for the Trans-Pacific Partnership Free Trade Agreement (TPP), the US-EU FTA (known as TTIP), and the International Services Agreement (ISA). She also covers issues related to the World Trade Organization, economic development, manufacturing policy, and global worker rights, among others. She has testified before the Executive Branch's GSP Subcommittee on worker rights violations in Georgia, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Fiji, and Iraq and before the House Subcommittees on Asia and the Pacific and Terrorism, Nonproliferation, and Trade on the TPP.

In 2012, Ms. Drake's article "U.S. Trade and Economic Policy: Workers Need More Than Strong Labor Chapters" was published in the *American Bar Association Journal of Labor & Employment Law* (27 ABA J. Labor & Employment L. 455).

Prior to joining the AFL-CIO, she served as Legislative Director for Congresswoman Linda T. Sánchez (D-CA) from 2006-2011, primarily handling labor, trade, appropriations, and health issues. While in the Sánchez office, Ms. Drake was responsible for advising the Congresswoman on her work with the Ways and Means Trade Subcommittee and the Education and Labor Committee. Ms. Drake also served as the staff director for the Congressional Labor and Working Families Caucus. Prior to serving with Congresswoman Sánchez, Celeste was Legislative Counsel for Congressman Lloyd Doggett (D-TX) and clerked for the Honorable David R. Thompson of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit.

Ms. Drake earned a J.D. and M.P.P. from UCLA in 2002. While there, Ms. Drake, won UCLA's Roscoe Pound Moot Court Tournament and was named Best Oral Advocate at the American College of Trial Lawyers National Moot Court Competition. In 2009, she was named the UCLA Luskin School of Public Affairs' Alumna of the Year. Before law school, Ms. Drake, a native Californian, taught World History and Economics at Granite Hills High School in El Cajon, CA.
