Wendy Morgan has been the Chief of the Public Protection Division of the Vermont Attorney General's Office since 1997. Wendy Morgan was born in San Francisco, California, was raised in Hanover, New Hampshire and received a BS in Computer Science from the University of California at Berkeley. She attended Berkeley Law School (Boalt Hall) where she was an editor of the Ecology Law Quarterly and served as President of the Berkeley Law Foundation. During law school, she worked for Judge James L. Oakes of the Second Circuit Court of Appeals and Judge Albert W. Coffrin of the Vermont Federal District Court. After graduation, she clerked for Judge Coffrin for a year, as his first female law clerk.

Ms. Morgan spent nineteen years with Vermont Legal Aid in St. Johnsbury, eventually serving as its Deputy Director. In 1997 she was appointed Chief of the Public Protection Division of the Vermont Attorney General's Office by Attorney General William H. Sorrell, and was also elected President of the Vermont Bar Association. Ms. Morgan has served Vermont in a variety of ways, including as a member of the Governor's Commission on Women, the Governor's Commission for Public Oversight of Healthcare, the Vermont Board of Bar Examiners, President of Catamount Arts, and founding board member of the Thaddeus Stevens School.
