Strassburger is also Vice President, Vehicle Safety & Harmonization for the Alliance of Automobile Manufacturers, Inc. (Alliance), a national trade association of twelve car and light truck manufacturers and has been affiliated with the automotive industry in various capacities for over 38 years. Previously, Strassburger was Director of Government Affairs for Nissan North America. Prior to joining Nissan, Strassburger held several safety, engineering and vehicle emissions positions at Mazda North American Operations.

In 2004, Strassburger was appointed by Governor Bill Richardson (D-NM) to the governor's Task Force on Ignition Interlock Technology and Deployment.

Strassburger served on MADD's National Board of Directors between 2007 and 2013, the last two years as the Chairman of the Board.

In 2008, Strassburger was appointed by Governor Martin O'Malley (D-MD) to the governor's Quiet Vehicle and Pedestrian Safety Task Force. Strassburger also served on New Mexico's Quiet Vehicle Task Force.

In 2011, Strassburger was presented the Distinguished Service Award by the National Federation of the Blind for his leadership in championing the enactment of the federal Pedestrian Safety Enhancement Act.
