Kevin Anderson has worked in the Consumer Protection Division of the North Carolina Department of Justice for more than 21 years, under three different Attorneys General, and has served as Senior Deputy Attorney General and the Director of the Consumer Protection Division since 2011. He supervises the office's work on all consumer protection-related matters including fraud, price gouging, lending, antitrust, utilities, and charities.

During his tenure in the Consumer Protection Division, Mr. Anderson has been the lead attorney on a wide range of cases involving health care, financial fraud, telecommunications, and Internet issues. He was a member of the negotiation team in many high-profile multistate settlements, including pharmaceutical settlements and the \$26 billion National Mortgage Settlement, and is currently a member of the negotiation team in the opioids-related multistate involving pharmaceutical manufacturers and distributors. He has argued multiple appellate cases before the North Carolina Supreme Court, including a precedent setting case involving a major utility. He brought the office's landmark do-not-call case that went to trial in federal court and resulted in a \$18.6 million judgment for North Carolina.

Mr. Anderson previously served as Assistant Counsel for a subcommittee of the Judiciary Committee of the U.S. House of Representatives, and worked in private practice at the Washington, D.C. law firm of Arnold & Porter.

Mr. Anderson graduated with high honors from the University of North Carolina (UNC) School of Law where he was a member of the law review. He has been an adjunct instructor at the UNC School of Law where he taught legal writing and appellate advocacy and at Duke University's Sanford School of Public Policy where he taught a seminar on consumer protection. He has presented and served on panels at numerous conferences, including the National Association of Attorneys General (NAAG) Consumer Protection Conference.
