

The Gulf Energy Alliance (GEA) applauds the leadership of House Committee on Natural Resources Chairman Bruce Westerman, Subcommittee on Energy and Mineral Resources Chairman Pete Stauber, and U.S. Rep. Garrett Graves for bringing forward the Transparency, Accountability, Permitting and Production of (TAPP) American Resources Act. Modernizing the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) is fundamental to an “all of the above” approach to energy security and energy justice, and the permitting and process reforms included in the TAPP Act will ensure that energy infrastructure projects—both for oil and natural gas and those needed to support the energy transition—will no longer be stymied by an outdated and inefficient regulatory framework.

Importantly, the Act mandates that the Department of Interior complete the legally required 5-year plan for offshore oil and natural gas development to ensure that at least two area wide offshore lease sales are held every year. The offshore industry—and the production that it supplies to the American people—depends on predictable and regular lease sales. The Act ensures that predictability and will help spur additional investments and production of the cleanest barrels on the planet from the Gulf of Mexico.
