Chair Grijalva Statement on H.R. 7098 – Saguaro Expansion Subcommittee on National Parks, Forests, and Public Lands Legislative Hearing July 13, 2020

- Thank you, Madam Chair, for holding this hearing and the opportunity to testify.
- I know from my time as Chair and Ranking Member of this subcommittee, that there are a lot of locally specific measures to process, and I appreciate the opportunity to talk about my bill and learn about the others on today's schedule.
- My bill to expand the boundaries of Saguaro National Park is something I have been working on for several years, and this latest version is a critical conservation gain with widespread community support.
- I am back home in Tucson and thought about testifying from one of the proposed additions to the park as a backdrop, but it is 110 degrees today, so I am logging in from the comfort of my district office.

- I'd welcome any of my colleagues to come for a visit when the weather is cooler and once public health concerns have abated.
- Putting the heat aside, being surrounded by the Sonoran Desert and the protected corridors of Saguaro National Park is what makes Southern Arizona such a special place to live.
- For those who have never visited, the City of Tucson is fortunate to be encompassed by the national park the Tucson Mountain District in the west and the Rincon Mountain District in the east.
- It draws visitors to our humble corner of the country and is a refuge and place of solace for residents.
- H.R. 7098 would modify the boundaries of Saguaro National Park and authorize the Secretary of the Interior to acquire land adjacent to and near the park's two districts.

- Incorporating these parcels into the park will preserve important wildlife habitat and ensure quality recreation opportunities for the greater Tucson region.
- One important highlight is that the expansion will create a critical linkage connecting Saguaro National Park and Pima County's Sweetwater Preserve.
- Altogether, the proposed additions will protect biodiverse riparian areas, wildlife habitat, scenic views, and important archaeological sites.
- By increasing habitat connectivity and recreational trail linkages in the area, this expansion bill is a win-win for both nature and people.
- That's why I have been supporting this project for so long, but I cannot by any means take all the credit – we have had strong community partners like Pima County, the Tucson Mountain Association, and the National Parks Conservation Association.

- I'd like to welcome Kevin Dahl (Doll), the Arizona State Director of N-P-C-A, to the hearing, and thank him for taking the time to visit with us today.
- He has put a tremendous amount of energy into this project, and I look forward to hearing his perspective on how the bill came together and about the broad support for this proposal in Tucson.
- With that, I will yield the rest of my time, and once again thank the Chair and all the witnesses for visiting with us today.
