Just as the Statue of Liberty has inspired generations of Immigrants coming to our shores, a centrally placed monument signifying the great achievement of women's suffrage—won by courage, sacrifice, and a shared belief that all Americans are equal—will not only preserve an important historical memory, but will remind us of the sanctity of the vote. "With no sacredness of the ballot," wrote Ida B. Wells who worked for women's suffrage to not only exercise women's rights but to stop lynching and achieve Black equality, "there can be no sacredness of human life itself."

Thank you again for your consideration of this historic project. I hope you will support H.R. 1318. Your leadership in placing the Women's Suffrage National Monument on the National Mall—the most visited National Park in the United States—is so important to our shared understandings of the importance of women's rights—an understanding which in turn helps to bind us as a nation.
