John G. Malcolm is the Vice President of the Institute for Constitutional Government, Director of the Meese Center for Legal and Judicial Studies, and the Ed Gilbertson and Sherry Lindberg Gilbertson Senior Legal Fellow at The Heritage Foundation, where he writes on a variety of legal issues.

An honors graduate from Columbia College and Harvard Law School, John clerked for federal judges in the Northern District of Georgia and on the Eleventh Circuit Court of Appeals.
