AMENDMENT TO H.R.

OFFERED BY MR. GRAVES OF LOUISIANA

At the end of title III of the bill, add the following:

1 SEC. ___. ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONAL FOUNDATION

2	FOR RESILIENCE.
3	(a) Establishment.—
4	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than October 1,
5	2021, the Administrator, in consultation with the
6	Secretary, the Department of Transportation, and
7	the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administra-
8	tion, shall establish, or partner with, a nonprofit cor-
9	poration to be known as the "National Foundation
10	for Resilience''.
11	(2) Status.—The Foundation shall not be an
12	agency or instrumentality of the Federal Govern-
13	ment.
14	(3) Nonapplicability of faca.—The Federal
15	Advisory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not
16	apply to the Foundation.
17	(4) Nonprofit status.—The Foundation
18	shall be an organization described in section 501(c)
19	of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and exempt
20	from taxation under subsection (a) of such section.

1	(5) Board of directors.—
2	(A) In General.—The Foundation shall
3	operate under a board of directors.
4	(B) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—The board
5	shall hire an Executive Director who shall carry
6	out such duties and responsibilities as the board
7	may prescribe and shall serve at the pleasure of
8	the board.
9	(C) Initial appointment.—The initial
10	appointment of the board of directors shall be
11	facilitated by the Administrator.
12	(D) Composition.—To the maximum ex-
13	tent practicable, the board of directors shall in-
14	clude representatives from a diverse range of
15	communities, including—
16	(i) the academic community;
17	(ii) the business community, which
18	may include professional associations with
19	relevant expertise;
20	(iii) nonprofit organizations;
21	(iv) the communities surrounding the
22	facilities of the Agency;
23	(v) local communities impacted by a
24	nationally declared disaster in past 10
25	years; and

1	(vi) former FEMA administrators.
2	(E) RESTRICTION ON MEMBERSHIP.—No
3	employee of the Agency shall be appointed as a
4	member of the board of directors.
5	(b) Purpose; Activities.—
6	(1) Purpose.—
7	(A) the purpose of the Foundation is to
8	support a public private partnership to advance
9	the research mission of the Agency by sup-
10	porting research activities with respect to resil-
11	iency that have national significance, includ-
12	ing—
13	(i) reducing local, State, Federal, and
14	Tribal costs associated with natural disas-
15	ters and severe weather;
16	(ii) determining resilience measures
17	that are cost effective and substantially re-
18	duce the risk of, or increase resilience to,
19	future damage, hardship, loss, or suffering
20	in any area affected by a declared disaster;
21	(iii) mitigate and reduce the risk of
22	recurring damage, or the cost of future re-
23	pair, from extreme weather events, flood-
24	ing, or other natural disasters;

1	(iv) improved forecasting of tropical
2	weather systems;
3	(v) accurate basin-wide flood pre-
4	diction models;
5	(vi) interactions between storm surge
6	and high water levels in river systems;
7	(vii) water and flood management
8	techniques;
9	(viii) wildfire and forest management
10	techniques;
11	(ix) reducing risks and improving re-
12	siliency of agricultural practices and sys-
13	tems to protect crop production;
14	(x) sea-level rise in coastal commu-
15	nities;
16	(xi) utilizing natural infrastructure
17	and other restoration, conservation, and
18	sustainable land management techniques to
19	lessen the impact of severe weather;
20	(xii) developing new construction tech-
21	niques for roads, bridges, rail, and related
22	transportation infrastructure and residen-
23	tial, commercial, and industrial infrastruc-
24	ture that are capable of withstanding ex-

1	treme weather events and natural disas-
2	ters;
3	(xiii) new materials and improving the
4	performance and resiliency of existing ma-
5	terials for the construction of roads,
6	bridges, rail, and related transportation in-
7	frastructure and residential, commercial,
8	and industrial infrastructure;
9	(xiv) recommendations for new, local,
10	regional, State, and Tribal permitting, zon-
11	ing, and business codes to ensure transpor-
12	tation and building safety during natural
13	disasters and extreme weather;
14	(xv) innovative technologies and ap-
15	proaches to pre-mitigate against severe
16	weather; and
17	(xvi) recommendations of best prac-
18	tices for prioritizing resilience projects and
19	investments; and
20	(B) fostering collaboration and partner-
21	ships with researchers from the Federal Gov-
22	ernment, State governments, institutions of
23	higher education, federally funded research and
24	development centers, industry, and nonprofit
25	organizations for the research, development, or

1	commercialization of transformative energy
2	technologies.
3	(2) Activities.—
4	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Foundation may—
5	(i) award grants to, or enter into con-
6	tracts, memoranda of understanding, or
7	cooperative agreements with, scientists and
8	entities, university consortia, public-private
9	partnerships, institutions of higher edu-
10	cation, nonprofit organizations, and indus-
11	try, to efficiently and effectively advance
12	the goals and priorities of the Foundation;
13	(ii) solicit and accept gifts, grants,
14	and other donations, establish accounts,
15	and invest and expend funds in support of
16	the activities and programs described in
17	this section;
18	(iii) conduct demonstrations, pilot
19	programs, or similar mechanisms when ap-
20	propriate to enhance research efforts and
21	test effectiveness of research;
22	(iv) in consultation with the Adminis-
23	trator—
24	(I) identify existing and proposed
25	Federal intramural and extramural

1	research and development programs
2	relating to the purposes of the Foun-
3	dation;
4	(II) coordinate Foundation activi-
5	ties with those programs so as to min-
6	imize duplication of existing efforts
7	and to avoid conflicts; and
8	(III) document the consultation
9	process and include a summary of the
10	results in the annual report required
11	in subsection $(f)(2)(A)$;
12	(v) identify unmet and emerging resil-
13	ience research needs;
14	(vi) facilitate technology transfer and
15	release of information and data gathered
16	from the activities of the Foundation to
17	the resilience research community;
18	(vii) promote and encourage the devel-
19	opment of the next generation of resilience
20	research scientists; and
21	(viii) carry out supplementary pro-
22	grams—
23	(I) to conduct and support fo-
24	rums, meetings, conferences, courses,
25	and training workshops consistent

1	with the purpose of the Foundation in
2	paragraph (1);
3	(II) for writing, editing, printing,
4	publishing, and vending books and
5	other materials relating to research
6	carried out under the Foundation;
7	and
8	(III) to conduct other activities
9	to carry out and support the purpose
10	of the Foundation described in para-
11	graph (1).
12	(B) Administrative control.—No par-
13	ticipant in a program under this paragraph or
14	employee of the Foundation shall exercise any
15	administrative control over any Federal em-
16	ployee.
17	(C) RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER ACTIVI-
18	TIES.—The activities described in subparagraph
19	(A) shall be supplemental to any other activities
20	at the Agency and shall not preempt any au-
21	thority or responsibility of the Agency under
22	another provision of law.
23	(c) Support Services.—The Administrator may
24	provide facilities, utilities, and support services to the

1	Foundation if it is determined by the Administrator to be
2	advantageous to the research programs of the Agency.
3	(d) Liability.—The United States shall not be liable
4	for any debts, defaults, acts, or omissions of the Founda-
5	tion nor shall the full faith and credit of the United States
6	extend to any obligations of the Foundation.
7	(e) Funds.—
8	(1) In general.—There are authorized to be
9	appropriated to carry out this section \$5,000,000 for
10	each of fiscal years 2021 through 2025.
11	(2) Conditions on Expenditure.—The
12	Foundation may use the funds made available under
13	paragraph (1) to carry out the purposes of the
14	Foundation only to the extent that the Foundation
15	secures an equal amount of non-appropriated Fed-
16	eral funds or non-Federal matching funds for each
17	expenditure.
18	(3) Prohibition on Construction.—None of
19	the funds made available under paragraph (1) may
20	be used for construction to build a new facility for
21	the Foundation.
22	(f) Records.—
23	(1) Audits.—The Foundation shall—
24	(A) provide for annual audits of the finan-
25	cial condition of the Foundation; and

1	(B) make the audits, and all other records,
2	documents, and other papers of the Founda-
3	tion, available to the Secretary and the Comp-
4	troller General of the United States for exam-
5	ination or audit.
6	(2) Reports.—
7	(A) Annual report on foundation.—
8	(i) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 5
9	months following the end of each fiscal
10	year, the Foundation shall publish and
11	post online a report for the preceding fiscal
12	year that includes—
13	(I) a description of Foundation
14	activities, including accomplishments
15	and how those activities align to the
16	challenges identified in the strategic
17	plan under subparagraph (D);
18	(II) a comprehensive statement
19	of the operations and financial condi-
20	tion of the Foundation; and
21	(III) a description of available re-
22	search programs and priorities for the
23	upcoming fiscal year.
24	(ii) Financial condition.—Each re-
25	port under this paragraph shall include a

1	description of all gifts, grants, devises, or
2	bequests to the Foundation of real or per-
3	sonal property or money, which shall in-
4	clude—
5	(I) the source of the gifts, grants,
6	devises, or bequests; and
7	(II) any restrictions on the pur-
8	poses for which the gift, grant, devise,
9	or bequest may be used.
10	(iii) Public meeting.—The board
11	shall hold an annual public meeting to
12	summarize the activities of the Founda-
13	tion.
14	(B) Grant reporting.—Any recipient of
15	a grant under this section shall provide the
16	Foundation with a report at the conclusion of
17	any research or studies conducted that de-
18	scribes the results of the research or studies, in-
19	cluding any data generated.
20	(C) STAKEHOLDER NOTICE.—The Founda-
21	tion shall publish an annual notice with a de-
22	scription of research priorities under this sec-
23	tion for the upcoming fiscal year, including—
24	(i) a schedule for funding competi-
25	tions;

1	(ii) a discussion of how applications
2	for funding will be evaluated; and
3	(iii) how the Foundation will commu-
4	nicate information about funded awards to
5	the public to ensure that grantees and
6	partners understand the objectives of the
7	Foundation.
8	(D) STRATEGIC PLAN.—Not later than 1
9	year after December 20, 2024, the Foundation
10	shall submit to the Committee on Transpor-
11	tation and Infrastructure of the House of Rep-
12	resentatives and the Committee on Homeland
13	Security and Government Affairs and the Com-
14	mittee on Environment and Public Works of the
15	Senate a strategic plan describing a path for
16	the Foundation to become self-sustaining, in-
17	cluding—
18	(i) a forecast of major resilience and
19	adaptation challenge opportunities identi-
20	fied by the scientific advisory councils of
21	the Foundation and approved by the
22	board, including short- and long-term ob-
23	jectives;
24	(ii) an overview of the efforts that the
25	Foundation will take to be transparent in

1	each of the processes of the Foundation;
2	and
3	(iii) a description of financial goals
4	and benchmarks for the next 10 years, in-
5	cluding a detailed plan for raising funds
6	and soliciting additional resources.
7	(g) Definitions.—In this section:
8	(1) Agency; Fema.—The terms "Agency" and
9	"FEMA" mean the Federal Emergency Manage-
10	ment Agency.
11	(2) FOUNDATION.—The term "Foundation"
12	means the National Foundation for Resilience estab-
13	lished under subsection (a).
14	(3) Administrator.—The term "Adminis-
15	trator" means the Administrator of FEMA.
