1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the "FEMA Assistance Relief Act of 2020". 3

4 SEC. 2. COST SHARE.

5 (a) TEMPORARY FEDERAL SHARE.—Notwithstanding sections 403(b), 403(c)(4), 404(a), 406(b), 6 408(d), 408(g)(2), 428(e)(2)(B), and 503(a) of the Robert 7 T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act 8 9 (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.), for any emergency or major disaster declared by the President under such Act during the 10 11 period beginning on January 1, 2020 and ending on December 31, 2020, the Federal share of assistance provided 12 under such sections shall be not less than 90 percent of 13 the eligible cost of such assistance. 14

15 (b) Cost Share Under COVID Emergency Dec-LARATION.—Notwithstanding subsection (a), assistance 16 provided under the emergency declaration issued by the 17 18 President on March 13, 2020, pursuant to section 501(b)

of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency
 Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5191(b)), and under any subse quent major disaster declaration under section 401 of such
 Act (42 U.S.C. 5170) that supersedes such emergency
 declaration, shall be at a 100 percent Federal cost share.

6 SEC. 3. CLARIFICATION OF ASSISTANCE.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—For the emergency declared on
8 March 13, 2020 by the President under section 501 of
9 the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency As10 sistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5191), the President may provide
11 assistance for activities, costs, and purchases of States,
12 Indian tribal governments, or local governments, includ13 ing—

(1) activities eligible for assistance under sections 301, 415, 416, and 426 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act
(42 U.S.C. 5141, 5182, 5183, 5189d);

(2) backfill costs for first responders and otheressential employees who are ill or quarantined;

20 (3) increased operating costs for essential gov21 ernment services due to such emergency, including
22 costs for implementing continuity plans, and shel23 tering or housing for first responders, emergency
24 managers, health providers and other essential em25 ployees;

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1	(4) costs of providing guidance and information
2	to the public and for call centers to disseminate such
3	guidance and information, including private non-
4	profit organizations;
5	(5) costs associated with establishing and oper-
6	ating virtual services;
7	(6) costs for establishing and operating remote
8	test sites, including comprehensive community based
9	testing;
10	(7) training provided specifically in anticipation
11	of or in response to the event on which such emer-
12	gency declaration is predicated;
13	(8) personal protective equipment and other
14	critical supplies and services for first responders and
15	other essential employees, including individuals
16	working in public schools, courthouses, and public

21	(10) public health costs, including provision and

(12) costs of establishing and operating shelters 3 4 and providing services, including transportation, that 5 help alleviate the need of individuals for shelter; and 6 (13) costs, including costs incurred by private 7 nonprofit organizations, of procuring and distrib-8 uting food to individuals affected by the pandemic 9 through networks established by State, local, or 10 Tribal governments, or other organizations, includ-11 ing restaurants and farms, and for the purchase of 12 food directly from food producers and farmers.

(b) APPLICATION TO SUBSEQUENT MAJOR DISASTER.—The activities described in subsection (a) may
also be eligible for assistance under any major disaster declared by the President under section 401 of such Act (42)
U.S.C. 5170) that supersedes the emergency declaration
described in such subsection.

(c) FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR FUNERAL EXPENSES.—For any emergency or major disaster described
in subsection (a) or (b), the President shall provide financial assistance to an individual or household to meet disaster-related funeral expenses under section 408(e)(1) of
such Act (42 U.S.C. 5174(e)).

25 (d) Advanced Assistance.—

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1 (1) IN GENERAL.—In order to facilitate activities 2 under this section, the President, acting through the Ad-3 ministrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agen-4 cy, may provide assistance in advance to an eligible appli-5 cant if a failure to do so would prevent the applicant from 6 carrying out such activities.

7 (2) ANNUAL REPORT.—The Administrator shall sub8 mit to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastruc9 ture of the House of Representatives and the Committee
10 on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs a report
11 on assistance provided in advance pursuant to paragraph
12 (1).

(e) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this section shall be construed to make ineligible any assistance
that would otherwise be eligible under section 403, 408,
or 502 of such Act (42 U.S.C. 5170b, 5192).

(f) STATE; INDIAN TRIBAL GOVERNMENT; LOCAL
GOVERNMENT DEFINED.—In this section, the terms
"State", "Indian tribal government", and "local government" have the meanings given such terms in section 102
of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency
Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5122).

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
