13 (i) the ability of the Corps of Engi-
14 neers to execute its mission;

15 (ii) the finances of the Corps of Engi-
16 neers;

17 (iii) the workforce of the Corps of En-
18 gineers; and

19 (iv) stakeholders (including State
20 agencies, conservation districts, and the
21 public); and

22 (C) a summary of any comments received
23 under paragraph (2) and the Secretary's re-
24 sponse to such comments.

11 to such non-Federal interests and congressional dele-
12 gations a schedule for completion of the final report
13 of the Chief of Engineers and other project decision
14 documents including—

17 (B) any separable elements, actionable ele-
18 ments, phases, reaches, or features expected to
19 be advanced and the anticipated timeline for

4 Impact Statement and Tentatively Selected

9 (2) BRIEFINGS.—Until completion of the final
10 report of the Chief of Engineers and other decision
11 documents described in paragraph (1), the Secretary
12 shall brief the non-Federal interests and congres-
13 sional delegations not less frequently than once per
14 quarter on the status of the project, including
15 progress toward the milestones identified under
16 paragraph (1).

17 (3) CONGRESSIONAL REPORTS.—Not later than
18 6 months after the date of enactment of this Act,
19 and annually thereafter for a period of 5 years, the
20 Secretary shall submit to Congress a report detailing
21 the progress on the schedule for completion required
22 under this subsection.

9 (a) ASSESSMENT.—Not later than 1 year after the
10 date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall conduct
11 an assessment of federally authorized emerging harbors
12 that have experienced deferred maintenance, inadequate
13 operations and maintenance funding, or recurring naviga-
14 tion deficiencies.

15 (b) CONTENTS.—In conducting the assessment under
16 subsection (a), the Secretary shall identify, for each
17 emerging harbor—

18 (1) the authorized dimensions and current con-
19 dition of the harbor and associated Federal naviga-
20 tion features;

21 (2) the extent of deferred maintenance and
22 dredging needs;

23 (3) the economic, public safety, emergency re-
24 sponse, commercial fishing, Tribal, and recreational
25 impacts associated with deferred maintenance;

1 (4) whether the harbor has been unable to re-
2 ceive regular maintenance because of current ben-
3 efit-cost methodologies or other Federal policies;

4 (5) whether the harbor has not received Federal
5 operations and maintenance funding for a period of
6 not less than 10 years and the impacts of such lack
7 of maintenance on navigation, safety, and local eco-
8 nomic activity;

9 (6) recommendations for addressing identified
10 maintenance backlogs; and

11 (7) a determination of—

12 (A) the interest of State, local, and Tribal
13 governments, and port authorities, in assuming
14 responsibility for the operation and mainte-
15 nance of the emerging harbor; and

16 (B) any legal, financial, or operational bar-
17 riers to such assumption of responsibility.

18 (c) CONSULTATION.—In conducting the assessment
19 under this section, the Secretary shall consult with State,
20 local, Tribal, and port authorities regarding—

21 (1) the potential deauthorization of federally
22 authorized emerging harbors;

23 (2) the interest of non-Federal public entities in
24 assuming responsibility for the operation and main-
25 tenance of such harbors; and

1 (3) the authorities, funding mechanisms, and
2 technical assistance that may be necessary to facili-
3 tate such transfers.

4 (d) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after
6 the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary
7 shall submit to the Committee on Transportation
8 and Infrastructure of the House of Representatives
9 and the Committee on Environment and Public
10 Works of the Senate a report containing the results
11 of the assessment conducted under this section and
12 recommendations for administrative or legislative ac-
13 tions to address any identified backlogs, including
14 any recommendations regarding the transfer of oper-
15 ation and maintenance responsibilities to interested
16 non-Federal entities.

17 (2) PRIORITY LIST.—The Secretary shall in-
18 clude in the report under paragraph (1) a prioritized
19 list of emerging harbor maintenance projects based
20 on economic importance, public safety, commercial
21 fishing activity, Tribal reliance, emergency access
22 needs, and the extent of deferred maintenance.

23 (e) EMERGING HARBOR DEFINED.—In this section,
24 the term “emerging harbor” has the meaning given the

1 term in section 210(f)(2) of the Water Resources Develop-
2 ment Act of 1986 (33 U.S.C. 2238(f)(2)).

11 (b) REPORT.—Not later than December 31, 2026,
12 the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Transpor-
13 tation and Infrastructure of the House of Representatives
14 and the Committee on Environment and Public Works of
15 the Senate a report on the After-Action Review described
16 in subsection (a), including—

17 (1) a description of the rationale of the Sec-
18 retary, including identification of any factors and
19 any processes used by the Secretary, in deciding to
20 implement the Lake Okeechobee Recovery Oper-
21 ations that occurred between December 2024 and
22 June 2025;

23 (2) an assessment by the Secretary of such Re-
24 covery Operations, including identification and as-

1 sessment of the effects, if any, of such Recovery Op-
2 erations on—

3 (A) the subaquatic vegetation and fauna in
4 and around Lake Okeechobee;

5 (B) the ecology of estuaries and lagoons
6 that received water transfers from Lake Okee-
7 chobee, including effects on subaquatic vegeta-
8 tion, adult oyster populations, and oyster repro-
9 duction rates in such estuaries and lagoons;

10 (C) congressionally authorized project pur-
11 poses of flood protection, water supply, protec-
12 tion of fish and wildlife resources, and naviga-
13 tion; and

14 (D) the total quantity of water, measured
15 in cubic-feet, transferred through congression-
16 ally authorized or funded projects;

17 (3) the identification of any periods during the
18 18-month period beginning on June 30, 2025, of
19 water excess or water shortage in Lake Okeechobee,
20 a canal used for navigation in the vicinity of Lake
21 Okeehcobee, or sources of water for drinking or
22 other consumption located in the area south of Lake
23 Okeechobee;

24 (4) an assessment of the ability of the Corps of
25 Engineers to undertake Lake Okeechobee Recovery

1 Operations again during the 5-year period beginning
2 on the date of enactment of this Act; and

3 (5) an assessment of whether or not there may
4 have been any adverse effects to water supply or
5 other Congressionally authorized purposes, included
6 but not limited to flood protection, protection of fish
7 and wildlife resources, and navigation as a result of
8 Lake Okeechobee Recovery Operations.

9 (c) LIMITATION.—In the report under subsection (b),
10 the Secretary may not recommend—

11 (1) expanding Federal authority or oversight
12 over waters or environmental programs of a State;
13 or

14 (2) anything contrary to the original goals, pri-
15 orities, or authorizations of the project for ecosystem
16 restoration, Central and South Florida, Comprehen-
17 sive Everglades Restoration Program, Lake Okee-
18 chobee Watershed Restoration, Florida, authorized
19 pursuant to section 601(d)(2)(B) of the Water Re-
20 sources Development Act of 2000 (114 Stat. 2680;
21 121 Stat. 1179; 134 Stat. 2673; 136 Stat. 3761;
22 138 Stat. 3067).
