

Dr. Henry is a general internist in the Division of General Medicine and Geriatrics at Emory University School of medicine. Dr. Henry obtained her MS in Neuroscience at Tulane University, MD at Georgetown University and her MPH from Johns Hopkins University. Subsequently, she completed her residency at Ochsner Clinic Foundation in New Orleans, LA. During her residency, she served on the Louisiana State Medical Society Board of Governors and was later awarded the American Medical Association's (AMA)'s Paul Ambrose Award for Leadership Among Resident Physicians, the Ochsner Alumni Association Outstanding Fellow and Resident Award and featured as one of the Gambit's Weekly Top 40 under 40 for her accomplishments and contributions to the city of New Orleans. During that time, she also served as a member of the ACP's National Council of Resident/Fellow members for which she held a national forum addressing physician wellbeing for residents/fellows in training and co-chaired the ACP IM 2015 Annual Meeting luncheon and educational series on High Value Care. Dr. Henry has held many other leadership roles in organized medicine which include serving as the American Medical Student Association (AMSA)'s Board of Regional Directors and the Regions 6 Political Advocacy Liaison for the Student National Medical Association (SNMA) for which she was awarded the SNMA Regional 6 Member of the Year. She has served on several committees for both the AMA Resident Fellows Section and Young Physician Section, served as a Regional chair, was an AMPAC Candidate and Campaign School graduate and currently serves on the ACP's delegation to the AMA House of Delegates. She also was elected and served as the Executive Council President of her medical school. Dr. Henry completed a Health Policy Fellowship at Georgetown University where she studied primary care related health policies, healthcare delivery systems and alternative payment models including value based models.

As community service is important to her, she has volunteered and mentored youth over the years through her church, sorority and the Big Brother/Big Sister program. She gives women's health talks at college/university groups concentrating on breast, cervical and ovarian cancer prevention and early detection, provided ACT and college prep information sessions. Additionally, she has both organized and participated in multiple AMA's Doctor's Back to School programs where she engages socioeconomically disadvantaged youth's interest in the health professional fields and has organized and served as a medical volunteer for several local free clinics. As a result of mentorship efforts, Dr. Henry was awarded the 2016 AMA Women Physicians Section Inspirational Physician award. She is currently a mentor for the Emory Student National Medical Association. She was also recently involved with the Health Careers Academy in Atlanta, GA where she served as an honorary judge to assist high students in identifying, and propose solutions to public health issues through video format. Most recently, Dr. Henry has created a new program at Emory University School of Medicine called *EMPACT* to **E**ngage, **M**entor, **P**rep, **A**dvocate for, **C**ultivate, and **T**each URM medical students in a supportive and inclusive learning environment.

Currently, Dr. Henry is an Assistant Professor of Medicine at Emory University's Department of Medicine where she is a clinical educator and attending physician in both inpatient and outpatient medicine. She is an Assistant Health Director in the Grady Primary Care Center and the Director of Policy Curriculum in the Internal Medicine Program's Primary Care Track. Dr. Henry also holds an appointment at Georgia State University School of Public Health. In addition, she conducts research in health disparities, primary care and behavioral health integration including its impact on health outcomes for racial/ethnic minorities. Her research includes using information from national databases for analysis for subsequent policy recommendations. She has published several scientific papers, presented her research at several medical conferences, contributed to AHRQ's National Healthcare Quality and Disparities Reports and multiple position papers with the American College

of Physicians (ACP)'s including topics such as Telemedicine, Behavioral Health Integration, Substance Abuse and Opioid Crisis and Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems. She has also written a health policy brief for ensuring diversity in the healthcare workforce with the Association of Clinicians for the Underserved. Most recently, Dr. Henry was selected amongst a national pool of applicants, as a **2017 Presidential Leadership Scholar**, a program designed for leaders from multi-sector backgrounds who share a commitment to facing society's greatest challenges and the 2018 National Medical Fellowships Emerging Leader Award.

Finally, Dr. Henry's ultimate goal is a healthier society in which she strives to achieve it by linking both the medical and public health paradigms. She is an inaugural member of the Atlanta Trauma Alliance and serve on the board of the Mental Health America of Georgia where she is working to improve mental health awareness and advocating for health delivery payment reform that includes funding for integrated care services. Currently, she is the **Vice-Chair** of the Medical Association of Georgia's Young Physician Section. She also serves both on the Georgia and the National ACP's Health and Public Policy Committee, ACP's National Council of Early Career Physicians, **Chair** of the Georgia Chapter of Early Career Physicians and recently completed her term as the AMA representative to the National Board of Medical Examiners.
