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Huang has written extensively on China and global health. He has published numerous reports, journal articles, and book chapters, including articles in *Survival*, *Foreign Affairs*, *Public Health*, *Bioterrorism and Biosecurity*, and *Journal of Contemporary China*, as well as op-ed pieces in the *New York Times*, *International Herald Tribune*, *YaleGlobal*, and *South China Morning Post*, among others. In 2006, he coauthored the first scholarly article that systematically examined China's soft power. He is the author of *Governing Health in Contemporary China*. His book *Toxic Politics: China's Environmental Health Crisis and its Challenge to the Chinese State* is forthcoming from Cambridge University Press. He has testified many times before congressional committees and is regularly consulted by major media outlets, the private sector, and governmental and nongovernmental organizations on global health issues and China. He is a life member of the Council on Foreign Relations, a member of the National Committee on United States-China Relations, a board member of the Institute of Global Health (Georgia), and an Academic Advisor of the Center for China and Globalization. In 2012, he was listed by *InsideJersey* magazine as one of the "20 Brainiest People in New Jersey." He was a research associate at the National Asia Research Program, a public intellectuals fellow at the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, an associate fellow at the Asia Society, a visiting senior research fellow at the National University of Singapore, and a visiting fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. He has taught at Barnard College, Columbia University and Tsinghua University. He obtained his B.A. and M.A. degrees in international politics from Fudan University and his Ph.D. degree in political science from the University of Chicago.
