A BILL

To require the Administrator of the Small Business Administration to ensure that the small business regulatory budget for a fiscal year is not greater than zero, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Small Business Regu-
5 latory Reduction Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION RULEMAKING**
2 **COSTS TO SMALL BUSINESS CONCERNS.**

3 (a) **IN GENERAL.**—The Administrator shall ensure
4 that the small business regulatory budget for a fiscal year
5 is not greater than zero.

6 (b) **REPORT.**—Not later than 60 days after the last
7 day of a fiscal year, the Administrator shall submit to
8 Congress a report on any regulations issued by other Fed-
9 eral agencies that have an impact on small business con-
10 cerns. Such report shall include rules issued during the
11 fiscal year preceding and the fiscal year following the date
12 of the report and such rules shall be disaggregated by the
13 issuing Federal agency.

14 (c) **SMALL BUSINESS REGULATORY BUDGET DE-**
15 **FINED.**—In this section, the term “small business regu-
16 latory budget” means the cost to small business concerns
17 (as defined under section 3 of the Small Business Act (15
18 U.S.C. 632)) of rulemaking (including the cost of a new
19 rule and any modification to or repeal of a rule) by the
20 Administrator of the Small Business Administration.

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
