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# A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to carry out a pilot program to provide service dogs to certain veterans with severe post-traumatic stress disorder.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

**3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Puppies Assisting  
5 Wounded Servicemembers (PAWS) Act of 2016”.

**6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7       Congress makes the following findings:

(3) Animals such as dogs can buffer this stress response when humans fail to provide social support.

(4) Interaction with dogs has been shown to modulate symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder, such as anxiety, including fear response and hyperarousal, interpersonal difficulties, social isolation, physical pain, and sleep disturbances.

18 SEC. 3. PILOT PROGRAM ON DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS  
19 AFFAIRS PROVISION OF SERVICE DOGS TO  
20 CERTAIN VETERANS WITH SEVERE POST-  
21 TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER.

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans Af-  
23 fairs, acting through the Office of Patient Centered Care  
24 and Cultural Transformation, shall carry out a pilot pro-  
25 gram under which the Secretary shall provide to eligible

1 veterans with service dogs. The provision of a service dog  
2 under the pilot program shall be done in addition to other  
3 types of treatment provided for post-traumatic stress dis-  
4 order and shall not replace established treatment modali-  
5 ties. The Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall furnish vet-  
6 erinary health insurance for each dog provided under the  
7 pilot program.

8 (b) ELIGIBILITY.—

9 (1) INITIAL ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible for a  
10 service dog under the pilot program a veteran  
11 shall—

12 (A) be diagnosed with post-traumatic  
13 stress disorder rated at a severity level of three  
14 or four on the Clinician-Administered PTSD  
15 Scale for DSM-5 (CAPS-5);

16 (B) have been treated and have completed  
17 an established evidence-based treatment and re-  
18 main significantly symptomatic, as evidenced by  
19 the Global Assessment of Functioning or a  
20 similar clinical metric;

21 (C) have served on active duty in the  
22 Armed Forces on or after September 11, 2001;  
23 and

24 (D) have not experienced satisfactory im-  
25 provement in post-traumatic stress disorder

1           symptoms after being treated with established  
2           evidence-based therapies.

3           (2) ONGOING ELIGIBILITY.—To remain eligible  
4           to receive canine health insurance furnished by the  
5           Department of Veterans Affairs, a veteran shall see  
6           a physician who is a primary care provider or mental  
7           health care provider at a Department of Veterans  
8           Affairs medical facility at least quarterly.

9           (c) CONTRACT AUTHORITY.—

10          (1) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out the pilot  
11          program under this section, the Secretary shall enter  
12          into such contracts as may be necessary for the pro-  
13          curement and training of service dogs with appro-  
14          priate providers that are certified by Assistance  
15          Dogs International or a similar organization that—

16           (A) on average, provides one-on-one train-  
17           ing for each service canine for a minimum of 30  
18           hours over at least 90 days including a wellness  
19           verification from a licensed veterinarian;

20           (B) provides an in-house residential facility  
21           in which service dog recipients stay for a min-  
22           imum of ten days while receiving at least 30  
23           hours of training with their new service canine;

24           (C) ensures all service canines pass the  
25           American Kennel Club Canine Good Citizen

1           test prior to permanent placement with a recipi-  
2           ent; and

3           (D) provides follow-up support service for  
4           the life of the service canine.

5           (2) LIMITATION.—The Secretary may not obli-  
6           gate or expend more than \$27,000 for the procure-  
7           ment and training of any dog under a contract en-  
8           tered into under this subsection.

9           (d) GAO STUDY.—Not later than 180 days after the  
10          termination of the pilot program under this section, the  
11          Comptroller General of the United States shall submit to  
12          Congress a report on the pilot program. Such report shall  
13          include—

14           (1) an evaluation of the effectiveness of the  
15          pilot program with respect to—

16           (A) helping veterans with severe post-trau-  
17           matic stress disorder live normally;

18           (B) relevant metrics, including reduction in  
19           metrics such as reduction in scores under the  
20           post-traumatic stress disorder checklist (PCL),  
21           improvement in psychosocial function, and  
22           therapeutic compliance;

23           (C) lessening the symptoms of post-trau-  
24           matic stress disorder; and

(D) reducing the dependence of participants on prescription narcotics and psychotropic medication; and

7 (e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is  
8 authorized to be appropriated for each of fiscal years 2017  
9 through 2022 \$10,000,000 to carry out the pilot program  
10 under this section.

11           (f) OFFSET.—The amounts otherwise authorized to  
12 be appropriated for Department of Veterans Affairs Office  
13 of Human Resources and Administration for each of fiscal  
14 years 2017 through 2022 shall be reduced by  
15 \$10,000,000.

16       (g) TERMINATION.—The authority to carry out a  
17 pilot program under this section shall terminate on the  
18 date that is five years after the date of the enactment of  
19 this Act.
