## David C. Grabowski, PhD



David C. Grabowski, PhD, is a professor of health care policy in the Department of Health Care Policy at Harvard Medical School. His research interests are in the economics of aging with a particular focus in the areas of long-term care and post-acute care. He has conducted a series of studies related to the payment, organization, and delivery of these services for older adults.

Dr. Grabowski has published over 160 peer reviewed papers in leading health policy, economics, clinical and aging journals. His research has been funded by a number of government and private organizations including the National Institute on Aging, the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the Commonwealth Fund, Warren Alpert Foundation, Donaghue Foundation, and Arnold Foundation.

Dr. Grabowski is a member of the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission (MedPAC), which is an independent agency established to advise the U.S. Congress on issues affecting the Medicare program. He was recently named to the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) independent Coronavirus Commission for Safety and Quality in Nursing Homes. He has also served on several CMS technical expert panels (TEPs) related to post-acute care payment and quality including the Nursing Home Compare TEP. He previously served on Pennsylvania's Nursing Home Task Force.

Dr. Grabowski has taught health policy and lectured on issues related to long-term care at Harvard since 2004 including classes at the medical school, the school of public health, the policy school, and health policy graduate and undergraduate students. He was the 2004 recipient of the John D. Thompson Prize for Young Investigators from the Association of University Programs in Health Administration.

Dr. Grabowski is an associate editor of the journal *Forum for Health Economics and Policy* and he is a member of the editorial boards of *American Journal of Health Economics* and *B.E. Journals in Economic Analysis & Policy*. His undergraduate degree was from Duke University and his PhD in public policy was from the Irving B. Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago.
