

Andrew Stettner is a senior fellow at The Century Foundation, researching issues related to the future of work, labor rights and the safety net. He has advocated for economic security reforms over the last 2 decades. At NELP, Andrew spearheaded a decade-long effort to realign the unemployment insurance safety net and trade adjustment assistance with the needs of the modern workforce that culminated with a multi-billion dollar package of reforms enacted in the Recovery Act in 2009. In 2010, he was elected to the National Academy of Social Insurance in recognition of his leadership, and received the Jewish Funds for Justice Cornerstone Award recognizing social justice leaders under 40. After working at NELP, he took his research on low take up of social insurance into action designing and implementing multi-million dollar benefits enrollment initiatives first at Seedco and then at Single Stop USA.

At TCF, he has published numerous reports on topics ranging from child poverty to technology related job loss. Andrew created the High Wage America campaign, developing the first bottoms-up federal agenda focused on revitalizing manufacturing communities. His research on unemployment insurance technology, data and policy issues has helped to shape and oversee the historic CARES Act responses to the COVID19 crisis. He is a graduate of Columbia University where he earned a B.A. in Psychology, and also holds an M.P.P. in Public Policy from Georgetown University.
