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Ms. Meredith Broadbent serves as a senior adviser (non-resident) with the Economics Program and Scholl Chair in International Business at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. A former chair of the U.S. International Trade Commission, she was assistant U.S. trade representative for industry, market access, and telecommunications from 2002-2008. In that position, she was responsible for developing U.S. policies that affected trade in industrial goods, telecommunications, and ecommerce. She led the U.S. negotiating team for the Doha Round negotiations to reduce tariff and non-tariff barriers on industrial goods. From 2008 to 2010, she was a trade adviser at the Global Business Dialogue.

Earlier in her career, Ms. Broadbent served as a senior professional staff member with the Committee on Ways and Means of the U.S. House of Representatives from 1982-2003, where she drafted and managed major portions of the Trade and Development Act of 2000 and the Trade Act of 2002, which included trade promotion authority. She was instrumental in the development and House passage of the implementing bills for the North American Free Trade Agreement and Uruguay Round Agreements.

Ms. Broadbent holds a Bachelor of Arts in history from Middlebury College and a Master of Business Administration from the George Washington University School of Business and Public Management.
