AMENDMENT TO HIK. 3962

OFFERED BY MR. HASTINGS OF FLORIDA

Base text: HR 3962 as introduced

Add at the end of title V of division C the following (and conform the table of contents in section 2001(a) accordingly):

Subtitle F—National Commission for Improving Long-term Care and Community Services

4 SEC. 2601. ESTABLISHMENT; POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

AND COM

AND COMPREHENSIVE NATIONAL STRATEGY.

6 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Not later than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of 7 Health and Human Services (in this subtitle referred to 8 as the "Secretary") shall establish a commission (in this 9 10 subtitle referred to as the "Commission") that is designed 11 to construct a comprehensive national strategy (described 12 in subsection (b)(2) on how to increase the affordability, 13 accessibility, and effectiveness of long-term care and community services in the United States and United States 14 15 Territories.

16 (b) POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS AND COMPREHEN17 SIVE NATIONAL STRATEGY.—

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1 (1) POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS.—The Commis-2 sion's policy recommendations under this subtitle 3 must address economic, geographic, cultural, social, 4 transportation, workforce, and other factors that 5 limit access to quality home, community, and insti-6 tutional services that can result in the need for more 7 costly and less effective care, compromise the finan-8 cial, mental, and physical well-being of caregivers, 9 compromise the independence, mental health, phys-10 ical health and dignity of individuals, or result in the 11 foregoing of needed services.

(2) COMPREHENSIVE NATIONAL STRATEGY.—
The comprehensive national strategy described in
this paragraph shall be developed not later than 2
years after the date of the enactment of this Act and
shall provide recommendations on how to—

17 (A) facilitate and maintain necessary
18 changes in business practices, public policy,
19 care processes, and administrative systems to
20 support a consumer-oriented long-term care
21 system that delivers efficient, cost-effective, and
22 patient-centered care and services;

(B) address issues of waste, fraud, and
abuse by providers, agencies, facilities, profes. sional and paraprofessional staff, and others in-

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volved in institutional, home, and community health settings by targeting chronically poor performing providers, decertifying persistently substandard providers, and monitoring institutional, home, and community entities to ensure compliance with State and Federal quality standards and criteria;

(C) make priorities of preventive health and the effective management of chronic dis-10 eases such as heart and respiratory disease, diabetes, HIV/AIDS, stroke, and obesity, in order 12 to prevent them from becoming permanently debilitating or disabling and help decrease future 14 dependence on long-term care;

(D) establish and support existing and future evidence-based research efforts among States, government entities, organizations, and stakeholders that are designed to address gaps in data and knowledge about long-term care and the populations in need of these services, and provide information on the effectiveness and consequences of long-term care programs and policies;

24 (E) facilitate partnership and coordination among State and Federal health care entities to 25

improve working conditions, training, manage ment, requirements, and competencies for long term care workers (particularly home health
 aides and other paraprofessionals) to prevent
 turnover rates, staff shortages, patient abuse,
 and improve job skills, job satisfaction, and de livery of care;

8 (F) identify and address flaws in reim-9 bursement policies for long-term care services 10 through Medicare under title XVIII of the So-11 cial Security Act and Medicaid under title XIX 12 of such Act, and decrease the reliance on out-13 of-pocket-spending for long-term care;

(G) improve access to affordable and safe
housing and transportation options for persons
requiring long-term care and community services;

(H) increase access to home and community based services through Medicaid to meet
consumer demands and preferences and emphasize cost-effective non-institutional care alternatives that provide satisfaction and high quality care to all those requiring long-term care
services;

1 (I) assist agencies and the private sector 2 on effectively disseminating information to con-3 sumers about the various types of long-term 4 care networks and options available to patients, 5 educate consumers about the potential benefits 6 and risks of certain long-care options, and in-7 form consumers about State-specific informa-8 tion regarding long-term care services;

9 (J) increase the use and affordability of 10 long-term care insurance and other fiscally re-11 sponsible measures to finance long-term care 12 services;

13 (K) sufficiently fund and support pro14 grams, facilities, and initiatives that have prov15 en to ameliorate the financial, physical, and
16 mental stress on informal caregivers, and im17 prove their ability to deliver services to individ18 uals requiring long-term care; and

(L) sufficiently fund and support programs, entities, and initiatives that have proven
to help individuals achieve and maintain their
highest possible level of independence, health,
and function.

The comprehensive national strategy would includeas available, pursuant to request by the Committee

to the Congressional Budget Office, an analysis of
 the costs and savings that would result from exe cuting this comprehensive strategy on long-term care
 to the extent possible.

5 SEC. 2602. MEMBERSHIP.

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Commission shall be com-7 posed of 15 members who are appointed by the President and who are from federal agencies such as the Social Secu-8 rity Administration, Institute of Medicine, Health Care 9 Financing Administration, Administration on Aging, Cen-10 11 ters for Disease Control, Centers for Medicare and Med-12 icaid Services, Health Resources Services Administration, 13 and other national stakeholders.

14 (b) TERMS.—Each member shall be appointed for the15 life of the Commission.

(c) VACANCIES.—A vacancy in the Commission shall
be filled in the manner in which the original appointment
was made.

(d) BASIC PAY.—Members of the Commission shallserve without pay.

(e) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Each member shall receive
travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence,
in accordance with sections 5702 and 5703 of title 5,
United States Code.

(f) QUORUM.—8 members of the Commission shall
 constitute a quorum but a lesser number may hold hear ings.

4 SEC. 2603. CHAIRPERSON.

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Chairperson of the Commis6 sion shall be elected by the members not later than 30
7 days after the date on which all of the original members
8 of the Commission have been appointed.

9 (b) PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENT.—If the members 10 of the Commission are unable to elect the Chairperson in 11 accordance with subsection (a), the President shall ap-12 point a member of the Commission to be the Chairperson. 13 SEC. 2604. MEETINGS.

14 The Commission shall meet at the call of the Chair-15 person.

16 SEC. 2605. STAFF.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Chairperson may appoint and
fix the pay of the personnel of the Commission as the
Chairperson considers appropriate.

(b) APPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN CIVIL SERVICE
LAWS.—The staff of the Commission shall be appointed
subject to the provisions of title 5, United States Code,
governing appointments in the competitive service, and
shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of chapter

1 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title relating
 2 to classification and General Schedule pay rates.

3 (c) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Upon request
4 of the Chairperson, the head of any Federal department
5 or agency may detail, on a reimbursable basis, any of the
6 personnel of that department or agency to the Commission
7 to assist it in carrying out its duties under this subtitle.
8 SEC. 2606. POWERS.

9 (a) HEARINGS AND SESSIONS.—The Commission 10 may, for the purpose of carrying out this subtitle, hold 11 hearings, sit and act at times and places, take testimony, 12 and receive evidence as the Commission considers appro-13 priate. The Commission may administer oaths or affirma-14 tions to witnesses appearing before it.

(b) POWERS OF MEMBERS AND AGENTS.—Any member or agent of the Commission may, if authorized by the
Commission, take any action which the Commission is authorized to take by this section.

(c) OBTAINING OFFICIAL DATA.—The Commission
may secure directly from any Federal department or agency information necessary to enable it to carry out this subtitle. Upon request of the Chairperson of the Commission,
the head of that department or agency shall provide that
information to the Commission.

(d) MAIL.—The Commission may use the United
 States mail in the same manner and under the same con ditions as other Federal departments and agencies.

4 (e) ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES.—Upon 5 the request of the Commission, the Administrator of Gen-6 eral Services shall provide to the Commission, on a reim-7 bursable basis, the administrative support services nec-8 essary for the Commission to carry out its responsibilities 9 under this subtitle.

10 SEC. 2607. REPORT.

11 Not later than 2 years after the date on which all 12 original members have been appointed to the Commission, 13 the Commission shall transmit to the President, Congress, 14 and the general public a report that contains a detailed 15 statement of the findings and policy recommendations of 16 the Commission, including the comprehensive national 17 strategy described in section 2601(b)(2).

18 SEC. 2608. TERMINATION.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Commission shall terminate
60 days after the date of submission of the report under
section 2607.

(b) ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES BEFORE TERMINATION.—The Commission may use the 60-day period referred to in subsection (a) for the purpose of concluding

1 its activities, including providing testimony to committees

2 of Congress concerning the report under section 2607.

3 SEC. 2609. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

4 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums

5 as are necessar for use in the development and implemen-

6 tation of plans under this subtitle.

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
