 - **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.
 - 4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
 - 5 "Keeping Girls in School Act".

3 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

- 4 In this Act:
- 5 (1) The term "appropriate congressional com-6 mittees" means— 7 (A) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and 8 the Committee on Appropriations of the House 9 of Representatives; and (B) the Committee on Foreign Relations 10 11 and the Committee on Appropriations of the 12 Senate. (2) The term "Administrator" means the Ad-13 14 ministrator of the United States Agency for Inter-15 national Development. (3) The term "gender parity in secondary edu-16 17 cation" means that girls and boys have equal access 18 to quality secondary education, in accordance with 19 the definition of "gender parity in basic education" 20 in section 2 of the Reinforcing Education Account-21 ability in Development Act (22 U.S.C. 2151c note).

1	(4) The term "USAID" means the United
2	States Agency for International Development.
3	(5) The term "Secretary" means the Secretary
4	of State.
5	SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.
6	It is the sense of Congress that—
7	(1) every child, regardless of gender or place of
8	birth, deserves an equal opportunity to access qual-
9	ity education;
10	(2) education is a key investment in the future,
11	well-being, and prosperity of girls, as well as the sta-
12	bility and productivity of their communities;
13	(3) the United States has been a global leader
14	in efforts to expand and improve access to quality
15	basic education for all, particularly marginalized and
16	vulnerable populations, including women and girls;
17	(4) gains with respect to girls' secondary edu-
18	cation and empowerment have been proven to cor-
19	relate strongly with efforts to advance women's
20	rights and gender equality, a stated priority of
21	United States foreign policy and national security;
22	and
23	(5) achieving equal access to and quality of
24	educational opportunity for girls contributes signifi-

cantly to economic growth and development, thereby
 lowering the risk for violence and instability.

3 SEC. 4. SECONDARY EDUCATION FOR ADOLESCENT GIRLS.

4 (a) AUTHORITY.—The Secretary of State and the Ad-5 ministrator of the United States Agency for International Development shall promote access to quality education for 6 7 girls globally and shall seek to enter into agreements to 8 support adolescent girls' access to quality secondary edu-9 cation, particularly in countries where adolescent girls are significantly more likely to drop out of school than their 10 11 peers. Activities shall—

- (1) be informed by a context-specific, evidencebased analysis of the challenges that girls face in
 successfully transitioning to, remaining enrolled in,
 and completing secondary school;
- (2) improve safe, inclusive, and quality educational opportunities for girls and advance girls'
 empowerment so that girls can successfully transition to, remain enrolled in, and complete secondary
 school, achieve positive life and learning outcomes,
 and make healthy transitions into adulthood; and

(3) seek to use United States Government
strategies and frameworks relevant to international
basic education, women's and girls' empowerment,
and gender equality to integrate multi-sectoral, evi-

denced-based approaches to adolescent girls' edu cation and well-being.

3 (b) ACCEPTANCE OF PROPOSALS OR APPLICATIONS
4 FOR AWARDS.—The Administrator shall seek proposals or
5 applications for awards, pursuant to the authority in sub6 section (a), to conduct activities carried out under agree7 ments pursuant to subsection (a) beginning not later than
8 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act.

9 (c) MONITORING AND EVALUATION.—The Adminis10 trator shall seek to ensure that activities carried out under
11 agreements pursuant to subsection (a)—

(1) employ rigorous monitoring and evaluation
methodologies, including measurable goals, outcomes, and benchmarks, to ensure that such activities demonstrably improve adolescent girls' access to
secondary education, close the gap in gender parity
for secondary education, and improve the quality of
girls' education;

(2) disaggregate data collected and reported by
age, gender, marital and motherhood status, disability, and geographic location, to the extent practicable and appropriate; and

(3) use, to the extent possible, indicators and
methodologies identified by the Interagency Working

- Group for the Strategy on International Basic Edu cation.
- 3 (d) COORDINATION AND OVERSIGHT.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, in coordina5 tion with the Administrator, shall be responsible for
6 the oversight and coordination of all activities of the
7 United States Government carried out under this
8 section, as appropriate.

9 (2) DEVELOPMENT OF AGREEMENTS.—In the 10 development of agreements described in subsection 11 (a), the Secretary, in coordination with the Adminis-12 trator, shall consult with representatives across Fed-13 eral departments and agencies who are implementing 14 the global strategy described in section 5.

15 (3) COORDINATION REQUIREMENTS.—In car-16 rying out the activities described in paragraphs (1) 17 and (2), the Secretary and the Administrator shall 18 coordinate with the USAID Coordinator for Inter-19 national Basic Education Assistance, the USAID 20 Youth Coordinator, and the most senior USAID and 21 Department of State officials on advancing women's 22 rights and gender equality.

(4) COORDINATION WITH OTHER STRATEGIES.—Activities carried out under this section shall
also be carried out in coordination with—

(A) the United States global strategy to
 empower adolescent girls described in section 5;
 and

4 (B) the United States Government Strat5 egy on International Basic Education, including
6 its objective to expand access to quality basic
7 education for all, particularly marginalized and
8 vulnerable populations.

9 SEC. 5. GLOBAL STRATEGY REQUIREMENT.

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the
11 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary, in coordi12 nation with the Administrator, shall—

(1) review and update a United States global
strategy to empower adolescent girls, which includes
a focus on girls' access to quality, inclusive secondary education and subsequent agency implementation plans; and

18 (2) submit the updated strategy to the appro-19 priate congressional committees.

(b) 5-YEAR UPDATE OF STRATEGY.—Not later than
5 years after the date of the enactment of this Act, the
Secretary, in coordination with the Administrator, shall
submit to the appropriate congressional committees a further update and revision of the strategy and implementation plans described in such subsection.

(c) CONSULTATION REQUIRED.—In reviewing and
 updating the strategy and implementation plans described
 in subsection (a), the Secretary, in coordination with the
 Administrator, shall consult with and provide meaningful
 opportunity for review to—

6 (1) the heads of relevant Federal departments7 and agencies (or their designees);

8 (2) the appropriate congressional committees;9 and

10 (3) representatives of United States and inter-11 national civil society and multilateral organizations 12 with demonstrated experience and expertise in em-13 powering adolescent girls and promoting women's 14 empowerment and gender equality, including local 15 civil society organizations, faith-based organizations, 16 and, where possible, program participants.

(d) COORDINATION REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying
out the activities described in section 5 the Secretary and
the Administrator shall coordinate with the USAID Coordinator for International Basic Education Assistance, the
USAID Youth Coordinator, and the most senior USAID
and Department of State officials on advancing women's
rights and gender equality.

1 SEC. 6. TRANSPARENCY AND REPORTING TO CONGRESS.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the
3 submission of the first strategy required by section 5, and
4 biennially thereafter for 4 years, the Secretary, in coordi5 nation with the Administrator, shall submit to the appro6 priate congressional committees a report describing—

7 (1) the activities initiated under agreements8 under the authorities provided by this Act; and

9 (2) the manner and extent to which such activi10 ties are monitored and evaluated, in accordance with
11 section 4(d).

(b) AVAILABILITY.—The reports required by subsection (a) shall be made available on a text-based, searchable, and publicly available website of USAID.
