The Committee on Appropriations submits the following report in
 explanation of the accompanying bill making appropriations for the
 Departments of Transportation, and Housing and Urban Develop-
 ment, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30,
 2027.

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PROGRAM, PROJECT, AND ACTIVITY

During fiscal year 2027, the terms “program, project, and activ-
 ity” (PPA) shall mean any item for which a dollar amount is con-
 tained in appropriations acts (including joint resolutions providing
 continuing appropriations), accompanying reports of the House and
 Senate Committees on Appropriations, or accompanying conference
 reports and joint explanatory statements of the committee of con-
 ference. This definition shall apply to all programs for which new

budget (obligational) authority is provided, as well as to discretionary grants and discretionary grant allocations made through either bill or report language. References to the “budget request” or “the request” should be interpreted to mean the budget of the U.S. Government for fiscal year 2027 that was submitted to Congress on April 3, 2026.

The Committee directs the departments and agencies funded by this Act to address each number listed in the reports in their respective operating plans and warns that efforts to operate programs at levels contrary to the levels recommended and directed in these reports would not be advised.

OPERATING PLANS AND REPROGRAMMING GUIDELINES

The Committee includes a provision (section 405) establishing the authority by which funding made available to the agencies funded by this Act may be reprogrammed for other purposes. The provision requires notification and advance approval of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations of any proposal to reprogram funds that:

- creates a new program;
- eliminates a PPA;
- increases funds or personnel for any PPA for which funds have been denied or restricted by Congress;
 - redirects funds that were directed in such reports for a specific activity to a different purpose;
 - augments an existing PPA in excess of \$5,000,000 or 10 percent, whichever is less;
 - reduces an existing PPA by \$5,000,000 or 10 percent, whichever is less; or
 - creates, reorganizes, or restructures offices different from the congressional budget justifications or the table at the end of the Committee report, whichever is more detailed.

The Committee includes a requirement that each agency submit an operating plan to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations not later than 60 days after enactment of this Act to establish the baseline for application of reprogramming and transfer authorities provided in this Act. Specifically, each agency must provide a table for each appropriation with columns displaying the prior year enacted level; budget request; adjustments made by Congress; adjustments for rescissions, if appropriate; and the fiscal year enacted level.

The table shall delineate the appropriation and prior year enacted level both by object class and by PPA, as detailed in this Act, accompanying reports of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations, accompanying conference reports and joint explanatory statements of the committee of conference, or in the budget appendix for the respective appropriations, whichever is more detailed, and shall apply to all items for which new budget (obligational) authority is provided, as well as to discretionary grants and discretionary grant allocations. The operating plan also must identify items of special Congressional interest. Should the agency create, alter, discontinue, or otherwise change any program as described in the agency’s budget justification, those changes must be a part of the agency’s operating plan. Finally, the agency shall submit with the operating plan a summary of the reporting

requirements contained in this Act, the House and Senate reports, and the accompanying conference reports and joint explanatory statements of the committee of conference. The summary should also include Inspector General and Government Accountability Office (GAO) reports. In certain instances, the Committee may direct the agency to submit a revised operating plan for approval or may direct changes to the operating plan, if the plan is not consistent with the directives of the accompanying conference reports and joint explanatory statements of the committee of conference.

The Committee expects the agencies and bureaus to submit reprogramming requests in a timely manner and to provide a thorough explanation of the proposed reallocations, including a detailed justification of increases and reductions and the specific impact of proposed changes on the budget request for the following fiscal year. Any reprogramming request shall include any out-year budgetary impacts and a separate accounting of program or mission impacts on estimated carryover funds. Reprogramming procedures shall apply to funds provided in this Act, unobligated balances from previous appropriations Acts that are available for obligation or expenditure in fiscal year 2027, and non-appropriated resources such as fee collections that are used to meet program requirements in fiscal year 2027.

The Committee expects each agency to manage its programs and activities within the amounts appropriated by Congress. The Committee reminds agencies that reprogramming requests should be submitted only in the case of an unforeseeable emergency or a situation that could not have been anticipated when formulating the budget request for the current fiscal year. Except in emergency situations, reprogramming requests should be submitted no later than June 30, 2027. Further, the Committee notes that when an agency submits a reprogramming or transfer request to the Committees on Appropriations and does not receive identical responses from the House and Senate, it is the responsibility of the agency to reconcile the House and Senate differences before proceeding and, if reconciliation is not possible, to consider the request to reprogram funds unapproved.

The Committee would also like to clarify that this section applies to working capital funds of both the Department of Transportation (DOT) and the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and that no funds may be obligated from working capital fund accounts to augment programs, projects, or activities for which appropriations have been specifically rejected by Congress, or to increase funds or personnel for any PPA above the amounts appropriated by this Act.

CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET JUSTIFICATIONS

Budget justifications are the primary tool used by the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations to evaluate the resource requirements and fiscal needs of agencies. The Committee is aware that the format and presentation of budget materials is largely left to the agency within presentation objectives set forth by the Office of Management and Budget. The Committee expects all the budget justifications to provide the data needed to make appropriate and meaningful funding decisions. The Committee continues the direction that justifications submitted with the fiscal year 2027 budget

request by agencies funded by this Act contain the customary level of detailed data and explanatory statements to support the appropriations requests at the level of detail contained in the funding table included at the end of this report. Among other items, agencies shall provide a detailed discussion of proposed new initiatives, proposed changes in the agency's financial plan from prior year enactment, detailed data on all programs, and comprehensive information on any office or agency restructurings. At a minimum, each agency must also provide adequate justification for funding and staffing changes for each individual office and materials that compare programs, projects, and activities that are proposed for fiscal year 2028 to the fiscal year 2027 enacted levels.

The Committee is aware that the analytical materials required for review by the Committee are unique to each agency in this Act. Therefore, the Committee expects that each agency will coordinate with the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations in advance on its planned presentation for its budget justification materials in support of the fiscal year 2028 budget request. The Committee also reminds all agencies funded by this Act to provide accurate organizational charts in the budget justifications. The Committee considers any changes to the organizational charts to be a reprogramming requiring approval of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations under section 405 of this Act.

TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

Surface transportation reauthorization.—The Committee notes the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (P.L. 117–58) provided authorizations and policy direction for the Nation's highway, transit, rail, safety, and hazmat programs through fiscal year 2026. The President's budget request proposes a 2.1 percent increase for highway, safety, and transit programs funded out of the Highway Trust Fund [HTF]. Unfortunately, the Administration's budget proposal does not address the long-term solvency of the HTF and does not include related policy proposals for the reauthorization. While Congress continues its work to enact a long-term surface transportation reauthorization bill, the Committee directs the Department to provide regular updates to Congress on the status of the HTF and to continue working with the appropriate authorizing committees to reauthorize surface transportation programs.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

Section 3 of the Department of Transportation Act (P.L. 89–670) provides for the establishment of the Office of the Secretary of Transportation [OST].

Office of the Secretary.—The Office of the Secretary has primary responsibility to provide overall planning, direction, and control of departmental affairs.

Office of the Deputy Secretary.—The Office of the Deputy Secretary assists the Office of the Secretary and the Deputy Secretary serves as the Department's chief operating officer.

Office of the General Counsel.—The Office of the General Counsel provides legal services to the Office of the Secretary and coordinates and reviews the legal work of the chief counsels' offices of the operating administrations.

Office of the Under Secretary of Transportation for Policy.—The Office of the Under Secretary of Transportation for Policy provides leadership in the development of policies for the Department, developing proposals and providing advice to the Secretary regarding legislative and regulatory initiatives across all modes of transportation.

Office of the Assistant Secretary for Budget and Programs.—The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Budget and Programs directs and coordinates all of the Department's budget, performance, and finance activities.

Office of the Assistant Secretary for Governmental Affairs.—The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Governmental Affairs is responsible for Congressional and intergovernmental relations.

Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration.—The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration establishes policies and provides operational services with respect to acquisition, office space and facilities, security, and human resources.

Office of Public Affairs and Public Liaison.—The Office of Public Affairs and Public Liaison is responsible for the Department's press releases, social media, fact sheets, and responses to press inquiries and creating opportunities for direct dialogue with the public.

Office of the Executive Secretariat.—The Office of the Executive Secretariat assists the Secretary and Deputy Secretary in carrying out their responsibilities by controlling and coordinating internal and external documents.

Office of Intelligence, Security, and Emergency Response.—The Office of Intelligence, Security, and Emergency Response is responsible for intelligence, security policy, preparedness, training and exercises, national security, and operations.

Office of the Chief Digital and Information Officer.—The Office of the Chief Digital and Information Officer serves as the principal advisor to the Secretary on information technology [IT] operations, systems, management, and security.

Office of Tribal Government Affairs.—The Office of Tribal Government Affairs plans, coordinates, and implements policies and programs serving Indian Tribes and is responsible for Tribal relations.

Office of Multimodal Freight Infrastructure and Policy.—The Office of Multimodal Freight Infrastructure and Policy develops and manages the National Freight Strategic Plan and the National Multimodal Freight Network and oversees the development and updating of state freight plans.

Office of Civil Rights.—The Office of Civil Rights is responsible for advising the Secretary on civil rights and equal opportunity issues and ensuring the full implementation of the civil rights laws

and departmental civil rights policies in all official actions and programs.

Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization and Outreach.—The Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization and Outreach assists small, disadvantaged businesses and businesses owned by minorities and women in competing for contracting opportunities with the Department and Department-funded contracts or grants for transportation-related projects.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$218,142,000 for the salaries and expenses of the offices comprising the Office of the Secretary of Transportation [OST], to remain available until September 30, 2028. The Committee recommendation supports the requested IT modernization. The recommendation also supports the consolidation of the Office of Civil Rights and the Office of Small Business Utilization and Outreach into the account.

The recommendation does not include further consolidation of human resources into the Working Capital Fund. The recommendation also does not support the budget request to transfer communications, government affairs, and civil rights FTE from the operating administrations.

Airport access study.—The Committee recognizes the importance of airport facilities, including gates, baggage handling, and check-in areas, to an efficient and competitive airline industry. The Committee notes that the Department’s last comprehensive study of airport business practices and their impact on commercial air carriers was conducted in 1999. Given the significant evolution of the airline industry over the past two decades, the Committee encourages the Department to update the October 1999 “Airport Business Practices and Their Impact on Airline Competition” report to reflect the current operating environment.

Baggage handling facilities.—The Committee looks forward to the report required by House Report 119–212 regarding luggage irregularities and baggage facility modernization efforts.

Beautifying transportation infrastructure council.—The Committee is encouraged by the Department’s Beautifying Transportation Infrastructure Council, which is charged with identifying best practices, aesthetic performance metrics, and advising on projects that enhance public spaces and reflect local character. The Committee directs the Department to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding the work of the Council, including proposed recommendations on policies, designs, and funding priorities to beautify transportation infrastructure while maintaining safety and efficiency. The Committee expects this briefing within 1 year of enactment of this Act.

Cargo theft prevention.—The Committee continues the direction for DOT to coordinate with the Federal Bureau of Investigations and Department of Justice, the Department of Homeland Security Supply Chain Resilience Center, and relevant stakeholders regarding cargo theft. The Committee looks forward to the report included in the explanatory statement accompanying division D of P.L. 119–75.

Chinese light detection and ranging technology.—The Committee is aware of Chinese light detection and ranging [LiDAR] manufacturers are targeting deployment of LiDAR sensors on U.S. critical infrastructure as part of “Smart City” technology at ports, intersections, drawbridges, crosswalks and other U.S. infrastructure. Chinese LiDAR, typically deployed through U.S.-based companies, gathers vast data on U.S. geography and behaviors, thus creating vulnerabilities for foreign adversaries like China to exploit. Therefore, the Committee directs DOT to not contract for, and to prohibit contractors or recipients of Federal financial assistance from the operation, procurement, or contracting action for LiDAR sensors made by Chinese companies or other foreign adversaries that create a national or homeland security risk in projects receiving USDOT funding. DOT is further directed to work with the Department of Homeland Security, as Co-Sector-Specific Agencies for the Transportation Systems Sector under Presidential Policy Directive 21 [PPD–21], to develop guidance concerning use of LiDAR sensors made by Chinese companies or other foreign adversaries.

Customer experience.—The Committee continues to support efforts to improve agency customer experience. The Committee encourages the Department to develop standards to improve customer experience and incorporate the standards into the performance plans required under title 31, United States Code.

Dig once.—The Committee recognizes that coordination between initial phases of construction on infrastructure projects and utility installation can reduce the need for future excavations, which minimizes disruptions to communities, reduces long-term costs, and improves infrastructure efficiency. Therefore, the Committee continues to urge the Department to consider actions that encourage grantees to employ a “dig once” policy.

Digital identity solutions.—The Committee notes the growing need to modernize online identity verification solutions across government to protect against fraud, strengthen digital identity nationwide, and support American users. Therefore, the Committee

directs the Department to utilize commercially available, user-consented and reusable digital identity solutions that support high-assurance identity proofing and authentication independently certified to meet or exceed National Institute of Standards and Technology [NIST] Identity Assurance Level 2 [IAL2] guidelines to achieve the highest possible pass rates, fraud prevention, and cost reduction. The Department will follow the NIST standards on assessing the assurance levels needed for a system based on the system categorization, data sensitivity, and other risk considerations, and implement IAL accordingly.

Digitalization technologies.—The Committee supports the Department and its operating administrations dedicating resources and finding opportunities to help communities incorporate digitalization technologies to increase the resiliency of their infrastructure, enhance safety, and improve accessibility.

Discretionary grants.—The Committee recognizes that navigating the competitive grant process at DOT can be challenging for applicants, particularly small, rural, and tribal communities. The Committee further recognizes that the evaluation and selection process for programs can vary widely depending on statute and additional considerations brought forth by the Department. The Committee continues to urge the Secretary to consider streamlining and standardizing the application process for competitive grants, such as through a “common application” for multiple grant programs. The Committee also encourages the Secretary to provide increased transparency in the evaluation and award selection process for discretionary grants.

Distressed coal communities.—To diversify and enhance economic opportunities, the Committee encourages the Secretary to prioritize discretionary funding to distressed counties within the Central Appalachian region to help communities and regions that have been affected by job losses in coal mining, coal power plant operations, and coal-related supply chain industries due to the economic downturn of the coal industry.

Freight logistics optimization works.—The Committee continues to support the DOT’s freight logistics optimization works [FLOW] program. Within the total appropriation for the Under Secretary of Transportation for Policy, the Committee provides \$3,000,000 for the FLOW program. The Committee continues to encourage the use of commercially available AI and machine learning tools in the Department’s scaling-up of the FLOW program.

Land port of entry infrastructure.—The Committee recognizes there is no existing infrastructure program at the Department dedicated to our land ports of entry. As such, the Committee continues to encourage the Department to consider how current discretionary grant programs can assist localities with improving the infrastructure of land ports of entry along the Southern Border.

Privacy review of U.S. airlines.—The Committee encourages the Department to continue existing efforts to review airline privacy policies and procedures.

Protective security division.—The recommendation does not include the development of unmanned aircraft system capability for the protective security division as requested in the budget.

Suicide prevention infrastructure.—The Committee recognizes suicide as a significant safety concern at certain transportation fa-

cilities, including bridges, buildings, parking garages, highway-rail grade crossings, and rail stations, and notes that evidence-based physical deterrents, such as nets or barriers, are effective in preventing suicide attempts. The Committee notes FRA and FTA have existing resources and toolkits regarding suicide prevention infrastructure and other safety measures for grantees. The Committee encourages the Secretary to support project sponsors to prioritize, where appropriate, the installation of suicide-deterrent infrastructure through existing safety and capital programs and to share best practices with state and local governments, as well as other relevant stakeholders.

Transmission right-of-way.—The Committee notes the Department’s efforts to leverage alternative uses of rail and highway rights-of-way for co-location of electric transmission infrastructure. Co-location can accelerate the development of a more reliable electric grid, lower energy costs for consumers, and generate revenue for transportation agencies. The Committee encourages the Department to identify engineering and safety best practices for these projects.

Transportation workforce outreach program.—The Committee strongly supports initiatives to encourage young, midcareer, and experienced workers to consider careers in the transportation sector. The Committee encourages DOT to increase public awareness of professional opportunities in the transportation sector as part of its ongoing public affairs strategy and activities.

Tribal engagement in transportation safety.—The Committee reminds DOT that the explanatory statement accompanying division F of P.L. 118–42 provided \$2,000,000 to establish a pilot program to evaluate traffic fatalities on tribal lands. The Committee urges DOT to move forward with implementation of this pilot program and further engage in other activities to increase awareness of available transportation safety resources for Tribal nations.

Vehicle-to-Everything safety technology.—Building on the direction in Senate Report 119–47 regarding vehicle-to-everything [V2X] technology, the Committee requests a briefing from DOT no later than 180 days of enactment of this Act on any coordinated actions taken by the Operating Administrations to deploy V2X, including any updates on incorporating V2X into the new car assessment program.

RESEARCH AND TECHNOLOGY

The Office of the Assistant Secretary for Research and Technology coordinates, facilitates, and reviews the Department’s research and development programs and activities; coordinates and develops positioning, navigation, and timing [PNT] technology; maintains PNT policy, coordination, and spectrum management; manages the nationwide differential global positioning system [GPS]; and oversees and provides direction to the Bureau of Transportation Statistics [BTS], the Intelligent Transportation Systems Joint Program Office, the University Transportation Centers

[UTCs] program, the John A. Volpe National Transportation Systems Center, and the Transportation Safety Institute.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$48,500,000 for research and technology activities, of which \$30,000,000 is available until expended.

Automation and ultra high-performance concrete in bridges research.—The Committee recommendation includes \$5,000,000 to develop construction automation technologies that improve the durability, efficiency, and resilience of transportation infrastructure, particularly bridge construction and accelerated bridge delivery. Such research should be led by a Tier One University Transportation Center with continuous experience in innovative bridge technologies and accelerated bridge construction.

Digital twin technology.—The Committee understands that digital twin technologies have the potential to enhance transportation planning and operational decision-making in highway traffic management and public transportation systems. The Committee reminds DOT of the directive included in House Report 119–212 regarding leveraging digital twin technology and urges DOT, where consistent with existing authorities, to encourage the consideration and use of digital twin technologies during the planning, design, and construction phases of major projects.

Drone infrastructure inspection grant program.—The Committee recommendation includes \$5,000,000 for the drone infrastructure inspection grant program to support the use of drones and other small, unmanned aircraft systems for inspecting, repairing, or constructing road infrastructure.

Inland waterway transportation research.—The Committee recommendation includes \$10,000,000 for research on system reliability, operational efficiency, and resilience of inland waterway transportation to be led by the lead member of a University Transportation Center that conducts research on maritime and multimodal transportation logistics.

PNT and GPS backup technologies.—The Committee provides \$3,000,000 to support the GPS backup/complementary PNT technologies program established by Congress in 2022. This program allows for the wide adoption of multiple technologies that provide the necessary GPS backup and complementary PNT as identified in 2021 in the “Complementary PNT and GPS Backup Technologies Demonstration Report” [DOT–VNTSC–20–07]. The Committee supports the Department’s use of enhanced contracting authority such as Other Transactional Authority [OTA] or SBIR Phase 3 to deploy complementary PNT services.

Transportation resilience and nuclear technology research.—The Committee recommendation includes \$7,000,000 to expand research in transportation resilience and nuclear technology to be led by consortium members of the National Center for Transportation Cyber security and Resiliency University Transportation Center as defined under 20 U.S.C. 1067q(a)(1).

The national infrastructure investments program was established in division A of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (P.L. 111–5). The Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development [BUILD] grant program [formerly known as both RAISE and TIGER] was authorized in section 21202 of the IIJA to provide grants and credit assistance to state and local governments, tribal governments, United States territories, transit agencies, port authorities, metropolitan planning organizations, or a combination of such entities to improve the nation’s transportation infrastructure. Eligible projects include highways and bridges, public transportation, freight and passenger rail, port infrastructure, and bicycle and pedestrian improvements. The national infrastructure investments program awards funds on a competitive basis to projects that will have a significant local or regional impact.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$550,000,000 for the BUILD grant program, made available by transfer of the unobligated balances from the National Culvert Removal, Replacement, and Restoration Grant Program from Division J of the IIJA. Of this total, \$350,000,000 is provided for grants to areas of high growth, as defined by the top 40 Metropolitan Statistical Areas ranked by the Census Bureau by percentage of cumulative change between 2020 and 2025.

Grant priorities.—The Committee is aware of the safety and economic benefits the BUILD grant program brings to communities, especially in rural areas. Of the amounts provided under regular competition, the bill continues to direct the Secretary to award half of these grants to rural communities, as required by 49 U.S.C. 6702(f)(1)(A).

Multimodal inland ports and discretionary grants.—The Committee recognizes the important role that multimodal inland ports play in supporting regional economic development, strengthening domestic supply chains, and enhancing the efficient movement of goods. Accordingly, the Committee encourages the Department to consider the unique value and economic impact of multimodal inland ports, including those with significant airport components, when evaluating applications for discretionary grant programs. The Committee directs the Department to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations within 180 days of enactment of this Act on which discretionary programs can support multimodal freight infrastructure projects, including inland ports and cargo airports, as well as level of applications and awards for multimodal freight projects in DOT discretionary grant program.

The National Surface Transportation and Innovative Finance Bureau [Bureau] administers and coordinates the Department’s existing transportation finance programs and INFRA competitive grant program and provides technical assistance and outreach to communities on financing and funding opportunities for transportation infrastructure.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$5,000,000 for the Bureau.

Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act [TIFIA] for Airports.—The Committee directs the Secretary to promote policies and administrative practices that encourage private sector investment in airport infrastructure projects, including those eligible for assistance under TIFIA. The Committee further encourages the Department, when evaluating airport projects for TIFIA loans, to consider to the maximum extent possible, the total cost of the project, rather than distinguishing between revenue-generating and non-revenue-generating components. The Committee believes that integrated terminal, landside, and passenger-facilitation investments function collectively to improve system performance, enhance safety and security, and support economic growth.

Transit-oriented development in TIFIA and RRIF.—The Committee acknowledges and supports efforts to enable TIFIA and the Railroad Rehabilitation and Improvement Financing [RRIF] loans to support housing and mixed-used development projects. The IJA amended TIFIA and RRIF eligibilities to include housing development projects in relation to transportation infrastructure. However, housing developers and local governments have experienced difficulty in obtaining TIFIA and RRIF funding due to significant differences in creditworthiness standards required for housing projects as opposed to transit projects. As a result, housing developers have found it difficult to take full advantage of these financing opportunities. Therefore, the Committee directs the Secretary, in collaboration with the Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development [HUD] to develop more appropriate creditworthiness standards for housing and mixed-use development projects seeking financing through TIFIA and RRIF.

Value capture.—Value capture is a funding tool which ensures that some of the revenue and value generated by public sector investment in development of land can be reinvested back into community and city services. The Committee urges the Department to continue providing technical assistance on the use of value capture, which may include guidance on state and local policies and procedures necessary to establish value capture districts.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$5,000,000 for the rural and tribal infrastructure advancement program. The Committee notes that the program received a contract authorization totaling \$10,000,000 under the IIJA.

The D.C. Safe and Beautiful program makes grants to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority [WMATA] and the Union Station Redevelopment Corporation [USRC] to improve public safety and address deferred maintenance and capital upgrades at stations and properties around the District of Columbia [D.C.]. The program also allows the Secretary to make grants that improve public safety and appearances of D.C. infrastructure and public spaces.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$100,000,000 for the D.C. Safe and Beautiful program. Of this total, the recommendation provides \$30,000,000 for WMATA and \$70,000,000 for USRC to rehabilitate Union Stations. The amounts provided are available by transfer of the unobligated balances from the Fed-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail appropriation from division J of P.L. 117-58.

RAILROAD REHABILITATION AND IMPROVEMENT FINANCING PROGRAM

The railroad rehabilitation and improvement financing [RRIF] program provides direct loans and loan guarantees to State and local governments, government-sponsored entities, and railroads. Credit assistance under the RRIF program may be used for rehabilitating or developing rail equipment or facilities and developing or establishing intermodal facilities.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Act authorizes the Secretary to issue direct loans and loan guarantees pursuant to chapter 224 of title 49, United States Code.

Limiting loans for high-speed rail projects.—The Committee continues to urge that, with respect to any RRIF loans or loan guarantees issued to high-speed rail projects; (a) any debt senior the RRIF loan, or the debt guaranteed by the RRIF credit instrument, should have an investment grade rating; (b) prior to receiving a disbursement of funds under such RRIF loan, or debt guaranteed by the RRIF credit instrument, the high-speed rail project shall have received a permit to construct from the Surface Transportation Board to ensure responsible planning of infrastructure projects; and (c) the high-speed rail project is to be constructed to the same ‘standard’ track gauge as the general system of rail transportation.

The cyber security initiatives account is an effort to close performance gaps in the Department’s cyber security. The account includes support for essential program enhancements, infrastructure improvements, and contractual resources to enhance the security of the Department’s computer network and to reduce the risk of security breaches.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The recommendation provides \$60,000,000 to provide the necessary resources for DOT to enhance its cyber security program and capabilities.

Cybersecurity strategy.—The Committee notes the increasing frequency and sophistication of cybersecurity threats targeting the nation’s transportation infrastructure, including ports, rail networks, and aviation systems. Vulnerabilities and security misconfigurations in the IT systems that support this infrastruc-

ture undermine the Department’s ability to safeguard sensitive data and maintain the operational continuity of the national transportation network. Accordingly, the Committee directs the Department to provide a briefing within 60 days of enactment of this Act on its strategy for utilizing enterprise-wide security services to protect the Department’s entire digital ecosystem.

The Office of Civil Rights is responsible for advising the Secretary on civil rights and equal opportunity issues and ensuring the full implementation of the civil rights laws and departmental civil rights policies in all official actions and programs. This office is responsible for enforcing laws and regulations that prohibit discrimination in Federally operated and Federally assisted transportation programs and enabling access to transportation providers. The Office of Civil Rights also handles all civil rights cases affecting Department employees.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$7,647,000 for the Office of Civil Rights within the salaries and expenses account of the Office of the Secretary. The Committee recommendation continues to permit the consolidation of shared IT and procurement services for the Office of Civil Rights into OST’s Working Capital Fund.

This appropriation finances research activities and studies related to the planning, analysis, and information development used in the formulation of national transportation policies and plans. It also finances the staff necessary to conduct these efforts. The overall program is carried out primarily through contracts with other Federal agencies, educational institutions, non-profit research organizations, and private firms.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$26,436,000 for transportation planning, research, and development activities, of which \$5,436,000 is for the Interagency Infrastructure Permitting Improvement Center.

Streamlining permitting reviews.—The Committee is concerned that prolonged environmental permitting review timelines are con-

tributing to significant delays in the planning, commencement, and completion of projects funded by DOT. The Committee encourages DOT to continue efforts to reduce permitting delays and improve project delivery efficiency across Federally funded transportation programs.

Telematics demonstration.—Building upon the directive included in House Report 119–212 regarding utilization of telematics services data, the recommendation includes \$5,000,000 for a demonstration that establishes and operationalizes the use of telematics data and advanced mobility analytics within transportation planning, programming, operational, and safety management processes. Eligible participants in the demonstration include State departments of transportation, metropolitan planning organizations, Tribal governments, and units of local or regional transportation agencies responsible for roadway planning, project selection, or system operations. Funds may be used for acquisition of telematics data, integration into State and local transportation agency decision systems, evaluation of completed projects improvements to congestion and safety versus estimations, and establishment and institutionalization of these capabilities within program administration.

The Working Capital Fund [WCF] was created to provide common administrative services to the Department's operating administrations and outside entities that contract for the fund's services. The WCF operates on a fee-for-service basis and receives no direct appropriations. It is fully self-sustaining and must achieve full cost recovery.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends a limitation of \$827,039,000 on the Department's WCF administrative, information technology, and procurement activities.

Consolidation proposal.—The Committee notes that the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2026 (P.L. 119–75) and the accompanying joint explanatory statement included several requirements regarding the newly permitted consolidation of non-commodity IT and procurement services. The Committee notes the transfer of personnel and related costs to OST from the participating operating administrations in the initial consolidations is ongoing, and projected cost and operational efficiencies have yet to be fully realized. Therefore, the Committee does not support the request to consolidate human resources activities and personnel into the WCF in fiscal year 2027. The Committee looks forward to the continued monthly reports and briefings regarding the initial consolidation.

The Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization and Outreach [OSDBU] assists small, disadvantaged businesses and businesses owned by minorities and women in competing for contracting opportunities with the Department and Department-funded contracts or grants for transportation-related projects. The office also provides technical and financial assistance, bonding education, training, counseling, and procurement assistance, and administers the Department’s Small Business Transportation Resource Center program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$5,001,000 for the Office of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization and Outreach within the salaries and expenses account of the Office of the Secretary. The Committee recommendation permits the consolidation of shared IT and procurement services for the Office of Civil Rights into OST’s Working Capital Fund.

The Essential Air Service [EAS] program provides subsidies to air carriers to maintain a minimal level of scheduled air service to small communities that had received air service prior to the Airline Deregulation Act of 1978. Since 1998, the source of funding for the EAS program has been “overflight fees,” which are charged to carriers for Federal Aviation Administration navigational and surveillance services for flights that traverse, but neither take off from nor land in, the United States.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The following table shows the appropriation, overflight fees, and total program levels for the EAS program.

The Committee directs the Department to utilize all collected overflight fees, including accumulated unobligated balances, and

provides an additional \$538,264,000 for this vital service for small communities.

Program updates.—The Department is directed to continue providing the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations quarterly updates on the timing and amount of fee collections, obligations, outlays, and carrier contracts associated with the EAS program.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF
TRANSPORTATION

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

Section 101 prohibits the Office of the Secretary of Transportation from approving assessments or reimbursable agreements pertaining to funds appropriated to the operating administrations in this Act, unless such assessments or agreements have completed the normal reprogramming process for congressional notification.

Section 102 requires the Secretary to post on the internet a schedule of all Council on Credit and Finance meetings, agendas, and meeting minutes.

Section 103 allows the Department's WCF to provide payments in advance to vendors for the Federal transit pass fringe benefit program and to provide full or partial payments to, and to accept reimbursements from, Federal agencies for transit benefit distribution services.

Section 104 allows the Department's WCF to utilize not more than \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2023 unused transit and van pool benefits to provide contractual services in support of section 189 of this Act.

Section 105 prohibits the use of funds for certain employee bonuses without the prior written approval of the Assistant Secretary for Administration.

Section 106 permits the WCF to transfer certain information technology, equipment, software and systems under certain circumstances.

Section 107 requires congressional notification before the Department provides credit assistance under the Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act program.

Section 108 allows the Secretary to transfer and consolidate administrative resources for certain programs.

Section 109 allows the Operating Administrations to transfer funds to the Office of Tribal Government Affairs for recipients of the Tribal transportation self-governance program.

Section 109A modifies the amount of funding reserved for planning grants under the Safe Streets and Roads for All programs.

Section 109B provides \$57,814,000 for the expenses related to DOT's headquarters building space and related services.

FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is responsible for the safety of civil aviation, navigation and surveillance, and airports. The Federal government's regulatory role in civil aviation dates back to 1926. When the Department of Transportation (DOT) began its operations in 1967, the FAA became one of several modal administrations within DOT. The FAA's mission expanded in 1995

with the transfer of the Office of Commercial Space Transportation from the Office of the Secretary and contracted in December 2001 with the transfer of civil aviation security activities to the Transportation Security Administration.

OPERATIONS

This appropriation provides funds for the operation, maintenance, communications, and logistical support of the air traffic control and air navigation systems. It also supports administrative and managerial costs for the FAA's regulatory, international, medical, engineering, and development programs as well as policy oversight and overall management functions.

The operations appropriation includes the following major activities: (1) operation of a national air traffic system on a 24-hour daily basis; (2) establishment and maintenance of a national system of aids to navigation; (3) establishment and surveillance of civil air regulations to ensure safety in aviation; (4) development of standards, rules and regulations governing the physical fitness of airmen, as well as the administration of an aviation medical research program; (5) administration of the acquisition, and research and development programs; (6) headquarters, administration, and other staff offices; and (7) development and distribution of aeronautical charts used by the flying public.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

Academy success.—The Committee directs the Administrator of the FAA to contract with the National Academy of Public Administration (NAPA), no later than 45 days after enactment of this Act, to conduct a study and make recommendations to address challenges related to student success at the FAA academy. The study shall include: an analysis of both voluntary (dropout) and involuntary (washout) separations to identify primary causes and accountability mechanisms; an evaluation of FAA candidate selection criteria and identification of any markers of candidates that excel during and after their academy training; identification of best practices and lessons learned from academic institutions that could be incorporated into the academy's training program. NAPA shall submit a final report to the FAA and the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations not later than 1 year after the date on which the contract is executed.

Academy instruction and controller training.—The recommendation provides a program increase of \$95,372,000 for controller hiring and training. The recommendation provides funding for additional training equipment and support services for air traffic controller candidates at the Academy, to include efforts of the FAA to better resource students through tutoring, simulation training, instructor office hours, and other activities. The Committee encour-

ages the FAA to also explore opportunities to partner with the private sector to better support students at the Academy.

The Committee also recognizes that training developmental controllers is dependent on the capacity of air traffic control facilities to facilitate such training. Accordingly, the Committee looks forward to receiving the corrective action plan directed under this heading in House Report 119–212.

Advanced aviation technology and innovation steering committee.—The Committee directs the FAA to provide the House and Senate Committees of Appropriations with a status update, within 90 days of enactment of this Act, on the Advanced Aviation Technology and Innovation Steering Committee mandated by the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024.

Aeromedical improvements.—The Committee encourages the FAA, in coordination with relevant federal and private sector health stakeholders, to evaluate the implementation of secure digital health capabilities that enable the standardized capture, transmission, and review of patient medical evidence associated with aeromedical certification and monitoring requirements. The Committee further encourages the FAA to explore solutions that support standardized clinical workflows, secure data exchange, and remote medical consultation capabilities, as appropriate, that may facilitate more efficient medical certification processes between potential certificate holders, aviation medical examiners, the FAA, and other medical specialists and practitioners, particularly for geographically dispersed aviation personnel.

Air tour agreements.—The Committee believes that public input should be considered before the approval of future air tour agreements established by the National Park Service (NPS) and FAA. The Committee directs the FAA to work with the NPS to provide opportunity for potentially impacted communities and stakeholders to provide input for FAA and NPS’s consideration.

Aircraft certification knowledge sharing opportunities.—The Committee expects FAA to continue its facilitation of knowledge-sharing opportunities in partnership with industry through workforce development programs and collaboration. The Committee believes exposure to real-world applications of certification practices strengthens the technical expertise of the aircraft certification workforce, builds familiarity with innovative technologies and designs, and improves safety processes and best practices.

Aircraft certification modernization.—Of the amounts provided for the Aviation Safety Oversight and Certification Organization, not less than \$5,000,000 is to be used to establish an automated process for submitting and tracking the status of applications for type certifications. The Committee expects the FAA will leverage digital tools and data-driven decision making using commercially available and widely-used products, including product lifecycle management and 3-D computer-aided design, to allow the digital consumption of data to improve processes to review designs, associated documentation, and other engineering products. This work should be consistent with the direction provided by Congress under Section 310 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63) and the resulting report.

Aircraft noise.—The Committee directs the FAA to support the continued reduction of aircraft noise and engage regularly with

communities affected by aircraft noise. The Committee further directs the FAA to implement the sections of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63) related to aircraft noise and noise mitigation, including establishing the aircraft noise advisory committee responsible for assessing alternative noise metrics to the day night level standard, updating AIP eligibilities related to noise barriers, evaluating noise impact as a consideration when implementing flight procedures, and others.

Airspace access for commercial space and hypersonics.—The Committee directs the AFAA to inform the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding any legislative barriers to and resources required for the integration of commercial space and hypersonic operations into the National Airspace System.

Artificial intelligence.—The Committee is concerned that aviation safety information remains fragmented across legacy systems and organizational units within the FAA, limiting the agency’s ability to identify, predict, and perform analysis on risks with the speed needed to prevent incidents. The Committee recognizes the FAA’s Safety Data Transformation Challenge (SDTC) as a promising effort to accelerate the use of advanced artificial intelligence and machine learning to identify and mitigate safety risks across the NAS. Therefore, the Committee directs the FAA to submit, to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations within 180 days of enactment of this Act, an implementation plan for deploying AI-enabled predictive decision-support tools that strengthen proactive safety oversight and risk mitigation and provide the FAA with capability to effectively fuse and analyze disparate safety data. The recommendation includes no less than \$15,000,000 to support this work.

Community collaboration program.—The Committee encourages the FAA to continue with the Community Collaboration Program as authorized under section 793 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63) and provide an update to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations.

Commercial space workforce.—The recommendation includes an increase of \$17,200,000 for an additional 35 FTEs consisting of engineers and analysts as well as funds to improve and provide specialized training and other resources needed to boost licensing capacity as well as review of modifications, waivers, and renewals.

Crew complements.—The presence of a minimum of two well-trained, qualified pilots in commercial aircraft is another example of safety through redundancy. Funding made available in this Act shall not support reductions in flight deck crew in commercial operations as provided under 14 CFR Part 121. This direction is not intended to limit FAA’s research and development activities related to unmanned aircraft systems.

Designee training resources.—The recommendation includes \$5,000,000 for the Office of Aviation Safety to continue to improve the use and expertise of credentialed individuals under 14 CFR sections 183.21, 183.23, 183.25, 183.27, 183.29, 183.31, and 183.33. The Office of Aviation Safety may use appropriate third-party providers, including educational institutions, to support related training. The Committee intends for this funding to facilitate the effective use of designees in support of activities regarding, among other

things, evaluation, testing, and approval of new and novel aviation products.

Digital access and secure electronic filing.—The Committee urges the FAA to accelerate the modernization of its aircraft maintenance documentation and record-retrieval systems—specifically, the filing and management of FAA Forms and the digital retrieval of aircraft records. The Committee encourages the FAA to create a roadmap for modernizing record-management systems and sunset antiquated processes such as mailed CDs, manual indexing, and non-digital submissions.

EIPP.—The Committee encourages the FAA collect and analyze the data gathered from the Electric Vertical Takeoff and Landing Integration Pilot Program (EIPP) in order to inform updates to FAA regulations, procedures, and guidance documents.

Engagement.—The Committee expects the FAA to engage with regulated entities, communities, safety organizations, peer regulators, and other appropriate audiences as specified in section 40104 of Title 49, United States Code, section 224 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63), and other relevant statutes.

Experimental certificates for former military aircraft.—The Committee is encouraged by the final rule published by the FAA in the Federal Register on July 18, 2025 which would create a new category of experimental airworthiness certificates for former military aircraft that support U.S. military activities. The Committee urges the FAA to continue to work with industry stakeholders and the Department of War on this matter as modifications are considered to FAA Order 8130.2.

FAA Organization.—The recommendation provides funding for the offices of the FAA consistent with its recent reorganization; however, the Committee is concerned that any efficiencies the agency seeks to gain from the reorganization will not be achieved without selecting qualified candidates to lead each office and minimizing the use of single individuals to fill multiple roles. The Committee directs the FAA, within 90 days of enactment of this Act, to have separate individuals leading the Office of Policy and Legal as well as each of the offices reporting to the Office of Policy and Legal. The FAA shall notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations when an individual is selected for each role, in a permanent or acting capacity.

FAA reauthorization implementation.—The Committee commends the FAA on the progress it has made towards completing the mandates required by the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024, but notes many mandates remain to be completed. The Committee directs the FAA to, not later than 120 days after the enactment of this Act, provide an update to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on its implementation of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 and the status of sections that are not yet complete, including all outstanding rulemakings.

High cadence launch and reentry operations.—The Committee recognizes the importance of being able to support a higher frequency of safe commercial space launch and reentry operations. The Committee directs the FAA to develop, publish, and implement regulations, advisory circulars, or other guidance materials that provide for alternative means of compliances for areas constrained

by prescriptive approaches, including probability-of-failure determinations and regulations with preset timelines.

Intelligent approach technologies.—The Committee notes the international use of intelligent approach arrival spacing tools in optimizing runway throughput and improving on-time performance in high-traffic environments. The Committee urges the FAA, in coordination with airport operators, air carriers, and relevant stakeholders, to continue the study directed under this heading in House Report 119–212 which should include potential implementation strategies for the potential use of intelligent approach technologies in areas with highly congested airspace and runways. The Committee reminds the FAA of the reporting directives included in the report.

International competitiveness.—The Committee expects FAA to continue addressing long-standing congressional direction to facilitate better outcomes for US manufacturers, training providers, and maintenance organizations in the validation and acceptance of aviation products and services in the international marketplace. The Committee directs FAA to provide the report required under section 358(c)(4) of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63) within 30 days of enactment of this Act to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations that details metrics of bilateral and multilateral validation programs and other related information. The Committee also directs the FAA to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on the usage of harmonized safety standards to facilitate product and service delivery in the international marketplace, and current challenges with other aviation authorities related to the validation of products and provision of services.

Medical certifications and clearances.—The recommendation includes \$100,000,000 in funding for the Office of Aviation Safety to provide sufficient staffing of all necessary personnel to ensure the Office of Aerospace Medicine can expedite and reduce the existing backlog of pilot and air traffic controller medical certifications, including special issuances, special considerations, and medication approvals.

The Committee encourages the Office of Aerospace Medicine to work with the Air Traffic Organization to improve awareness and recognition of mental health issues and integrate mental healthcare into the training of controllers. The Committee also looks forward to the briefing as required under this heading in the joint explanatory statement accompanying division D of P.L. 119–75.

Medications impacting certificates.—The Committee directs FAA to publish a user-friendly list of medications, providing more transparency and clarity about the medications that can and cannot be used without impacting medical certificates.

Mobile clearances for general aviation.—The Committee appreciates the work the FAA has done to date and continues to urge the FAA to implement Section 614 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63) and establish a pilot program for mobile clearances at five airports or heliports.

Military operations area.—The Committee directs the FAA to continue working with the United States Air Force and the Arkansas Air National Guard to develop and implement an updated mili-

tary operations area that can accommodate their foreign military training mission.

NAS participant report.—The Committee directs the FAA to conduct or commission a study evaluating and estimating the future mix of users operating in the national airspace system (NAS) by user type. The report should also estimate the annual fees and taxes collected by the Federal government by user type, assuming continuation of current law.

PAFI.—The Committee recognizes the urgent national need to safely eliminate and replace the use of leaded aviation gasoline for piston engine aircrafts. Congress has consistently supported the FAA’s Piston Aviation Fuels Initiative (PAFI) to support this objective and to ensure that a technically sound unleaded replacement fuel is identified, tested, and approved in time to meet the 2030 deadline. The Committee directs the FAA to prioritize and focus its resources on the timely approval of fuel candidates in the PAFI program.

Part 161.—The Committee encourages the FAA to work in good faith with airport operators pursuing the Part 161 process and provide clear feedback to applicants whose applications are not approved. The FAA should also review and improve Part 161 compliance guidance so that airports understand the conditions required for approval.

Parts manufacturer approval (PMA).—The Committee acknowledges the defined PMA process within FAA regulations and emphasizes that proprietary information specific to individual PMA applications should not be disclosed to competitors. The FAA must ensure that any third-party input into PMA-related decisions is fact-based and justified by operational data and technical merit, with documented rationale for such input. The Committee reminds the FAA of the briefing directed by the joint explanatory statement accompanying division D of Public Law 119–75, consistent with Section 349 of the FAA reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63).

Performance clauses.—The Committee directs the FAA to use maximum discretion when assessing vendor compliance with performance level clauses in federal contract tower contracts. The Committee directs the FAA to, at a minimum, consider (1) the labor market for controllers, (2) whether such vendor has made incremental improvement in performance and staffing, and (3) efforts of the vendor to address insufficient staffing or performance.

Portable oxygen concentrators.—The Committee is concerned that airlines have denied boarding access to oxygen patients who are carrying approved portable oxygen. The Committee encourages the FAA to work with airlines to clarify guidance regarding lithium battery regulations related to portable oxygen, and to provide a briefing to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations.

Public safety technologies.—The Committee recognizes the potential value of unmanned aircraft systems equipped with non-lethal de-escalation technologies to enhance public safety. To ensure emerging technologies can assist first responders without the necessary escalation to use of lethal force, including during active shooter situations, the Committee directs the FAA, in coordination with Federal, state, Tribal, and local partners, to assess the use of U.S.-manufactured non-lethal technology on unmanned aircraft.

The Committee directs the FAA, in partnership with the Department of Justice to evaluate safety, training, capabilities, and operational protocols and provide a report on its findings not later than 1 year after the date of enactment of this Act. The report should put consideration into a process by which law enforcement agencies can seek Federal authorization to operate UAS carrying non-lethal technologies.

Risks of counter UAS mechanisms.—The Committee directs the FAA to brief the House and Senate Appropriations Committees within 180 days of the enactment of this Act on the risks to the national airspace system of counter unmanned aircraft system (UAS) capabilities, including directed energy measures, deployed or potentially deployed by Federal, state, local, and private agencies, and the risk mitigations available to such agencies and the FAA. Such briefing should also cover efforts the FAA takes to coordinate with each of those entities for counter UAS deployment.

Risk-based approach to UAS authorizations.—The Committee encourages the FAA to further exercise its authorities, including under section 44807 of title 49, United States Code (as amended), to use risk-based approaches for authorizing UAS flights, without initiating rulemaking when possible.

Service providers.—The Committee is concerned by the backlog in instrument flight procedure development, maintenance, obstacle evaluation, and validation at general aviation airports. Building on the Committee's direction under this heading in House Report 119–212, the Committee directs the FAA to evaluate the use of non-Federal service providers to supplement the work of the FAA and address the backlog of flight procedures, particularly at general aviation airports, and encourages the FAA to use funding provided under this heading to contract with non-Federal service suppliers to begin such work. Within 180 days of enactment of this Act, the Committee directs the FAA to brief the House and Senate Appropriations Committees on any impediments to the use of non-Federal service providers for this purpose. The Committee also looks forward to receiving the briefing directed under this heading in House Report 119–212.

Smoke and fume event reporting.—The Committee directs the FAA to develop and deploy a standardized submission system for passenger-aircraft aviation employees to voluntarily report fume or smoke events on passenger aircraft, consistent with Section 362(b) of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024.

Spectrum coordination.—The Committee directs the FAA to coordinate with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) regarding the impact of spectrum utilization on national airspace system and aircraft operations. Specifically, the Committee directs the FAA to establish, with the FCC and any other relevant Federal partner, a permanent interagency working group to consult on potential spectrum impacts on aviation systems, including radio altimeters and other critical avionics. Any FAA-identified risks to aviation safety resulting from changes in spectrum use shall be communicated to the FCC. The Committee directs the FAA to update the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations within 90 days of enactment of this Act on the establishment of the interagency working group.

Staffing levels.—The Committee notes that the FAA has experienced a high rate of staffing changes in fiscal year 2025 and the beginning of fiscal year 2026 due to retirements, the deferred resignation program, and other administrative actions. The Committee notes that the FAA has numerous critical positions, including those that perform support functions like maintenance mechanics, aeronautical information specialists, and aviation safety assistants. The Committee emphasizes the importance of adequate staffing levels to support the FAA's core functions and directs the FAA to review staffing needs across all offices and to ensure that sufficient resources are allocated to maintain a fully operational and effective workforce.

The Committee is particularly interested in ensuring the FAA is properly staffed with the technicians needed to support the FAA's ATC modernization efforts and to ensure new systems and equipment are maintained in a good state-of-repair. The recommendation provides funding for technician recruitment, training, and retention.

UAS environmental assessments.—The Committee is concerned that the FAA is expending significant resources on additional environmental assessments for UAS operations that result in repetitive Findings of No Significant Impact. The Committee directs the FAA to expeditiously review, if necessary, and approve environmental assessments for UAS activities which are materially similar in nature based on findings of previous determinations.

UAS-based flight inspections.—The Committee directs the FAA to evaluate the use of small unmanned aircraft systems and commercially available software solutions to conduct flight inspections and validations of ground-based navigational aids. The FAA should work with existing FAA flight inspection offices to test the use of such technologies and assess their ability to replicate or enhance current inspection accuracy, reduce operational costs, and expand inspection capacity. Not later than 180 days after enactment of this Act, the FAA shall brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on such activities.

Upset recovery/spatial disorientation simulation training.—The Committee supports the FAA's efforts to institute upset recovery and special disorientation simulation training for Part 135, 91, and 91K pilots consistent with InFO 26003.

Weather service units.—The Committee is concerned about staffing shortages in National Weather Service (NWS) Center Weather Service Units at FAA's air route traffic control centers. The Committee urges that the FAA coordinate with the Director of the National Weather Service, the air traffic organization, and the National Weather Service to ensure each Center Weather Service Unit is adequately staffed in order to provide for the safe and efficient movement of aircraft.

Airport ground surveillance portfolio.—The Committee supports the FAA’s comprehensive strategy to reduce close calls on the runways of our nation’s airports. The recommendation provides \$11,000,000 for FAA’s airport ground surveillance portfolio, of which not less than \$2,500,000 is to further support the expansion of the Surface Awareness Initiative, or a follow-on program, and to provide additional functionality to SAI systems at airports of all sizes where automated alerting would address identified risks.

Airspace redesign.—The Committee directs the FAA to update the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on the work the FAA has accomplished using the funding directed under this heading in House Report 119–212 and the joint explanatory statement accompanying division D of Public Law 119–75.

ATC training equipment.—The Committee applauds the FAA’s goal of improving the success rate of air traffic control candidates in FAA’s air traffic control Academy. In balancing the facilities and equipment resource needs across the national airspace system with the needs of training and operational facilities supporting initial and ongoing controller education, the recommendation provides funding to support the equipment needs of FAA-operated air traffic controller training facilities but does not provide funding for similar purposes at non-Federally operated facilities, absent an authorized program for such purposes.

ATC modernization.—The Committee directs the Administrator to continue active engagement with industry, system users, manufacturers, and workforce representatives to identify opportunities to expedite ATC modernization timelines, streamline procurement processes, and deploy resilient, scalable technologies across the

NAS. Particular attention should be given to reducing dependence on legacy systems, improving data integration, and strengthening system redundancy and cybersecurity. The Committee recognizes that achieving a fully modernized and resilient NAS will require sustained and, where necessary, additional targeted investments, and expects the FAA to clearly articulate funding requirements aligned with accelerated modernization objectives. The Committee further expects the FAA to provide the House and Senate Appropriations Committees with any barriers to timely technology refresh and deployment, including legal and resource constraints.

Common automation platform.—The Committee continues to support the FAA’s efforts to consolidate and improve the integration of its current ATC systems and displays. As the FAA works with third parties to define, develop, test, procure, and implement these improvements, the FAA shall consult with appropriate Federal departments or agencies to fully vet risks, including cyber risks, posed by such third parties, including those that have legal or business relationships with the People’s Republic of China (PRC) or any other entity otherwise owned or controlled by any governmental organization of the PRC.

To the extent that there is a relationship between a third party supporting the common automation platform work of the FAA and the PRC, the FAA shall report to the House and Senate Appropriations Committees within 30 days of award of any contract, agreement, or other transaction with such third party providing on, with regard to their relationship with the PRC: (1) the risks posed to personnel, equipment, and operations of the FAA; (2) any measures that the FAA will take to mitigate such risks; (3) any measures that will be taken by that third party or other parties to mitigate such risks; and (4) any other matters the FAA determines to be relevant.

Common controller workstation.—The Committee recognizes the significant operational and long-term sustainment benefits of deploying a common controller workstation at FAA facilities. The Committee encourages the FAA to efficiently rollout common workstations across ATC facilities as the agency modernizes facilities and systems.

Contracting.—As the FAA works to modernize the air traffic management system, related components, and software, the Committee encourages the FAA to strongly consider the use of off-the-shelf systems, minimize one-off system specifications that increase costs, and ensure interoperability of future systems. The Committee also encourages the FAA to consider innovative contracting mechanisms and infrastructure-as-a-service models where the FAA can reduce total lifecycle costs of air traffic equipment and software. The FAA should engage industry and the FAA workforce on making these improvements.

Federal contract tower technologies.—The Committee believes that there are additional safety gains from equipping air traffic control towers with airborne position reference tools. The Committee looks forward to receiving information from the FAA related to this topic as directed by House Report 119–212 accompanying Public Law 119–75.

Landing and lighting portfolio.—The recommendation provides \$10,000,000 for procurement and installation of Precision Approach

Path Indicator (PAPI) lighting and related upgrades to this system which will reduce maintenance and operational costs, including the replacement of incandescent bulbs.

Radio frequency monitoring.—The Committee increasingly grows concerned about the possibility of radio frequency interference with aircraft avionics and ATC systems. The Committee directs the FAA to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on risks these technologies pose to the NAS and current mitigations or monitoring that is occurring for radio frequency disruptions. The Committee also encourages the FAA to consider whether the installation of radio frequency monitoring devices capable of identifying disruptions would provide benefit to the ATC system, and whether other Federal partners are already making investments in such systems that the FAA could utilize.

Remote towers.—The Committee recognizes the growing interest in the utilization of remote tower systems as a safe, cost-effective alternative to brick-and-mortar towers at small and non-towered airports across the country and as a potential opportunity to address controller resource constraints. The Committee urges the FAA to finish its system design review of such systems and move towards the approval of a performance-based standard for the technology so that airports may begin utilizing approved remote tower systems expeditiously.

Required navigation performance.—The Committee recognizes the safety, efficiency, community impact mitigation benefits of Required Navigation Performance (RNP) approach procedures and notes that many airports have published RNP procedures that remain underutilized. The Committee directs the FAA to develop a strategy to increase the use of RNP approach procedures at airports where such procedures are currently available and safe. This strategy should include: (1) identifying and mitigating barriers to operator use of RNP procedures; (2) establishing metrics and baselines for RNP utilization; (3) expanding controller training and facility level guidance to support routine use of RNP approaches where operationally beneficial; and (4) engaging with air carriers, airports, and labor organizations to ensure harmonized implementation and education. The Committee directs the FAA to update the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding the development and implementation of this strategy.

Terminal flight data manager.—The recommendation provides \$170,000,000 for the continued deployment and sustainment of TFDM. The Committee supports the FAA's efforts to sunset the use of antiquated paper flight strips at 89 airports and directs the FAA to further study and consider expanding the waterfall for terminal flight data manager (TFDM) to include other large, medium, and small hub airports, developing an investment analysis needed for expanded implementation within 210 days of the enactment of this Act. As part of this analysis the FAA should consider efficiency benefits and reduced maintenance costs resulting from also integrating the functionalities of other traffic flow management systems.

Tower replacements.—The Committee recognizes that there are multiple FAA-operated air traffic control towers in the NAS that are aging and beyond their useful life or located at airports that have seen immense growth and need to be considered for replace-

ment or significant updates. The recommendation includes \$30,000,000 to continue to address tower needs and the Committee encourages the FAA to evaluate all towers of concern for replacement, including at Baltimore/Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport and Gerald R. Ford International Airport.

William J. Hughes Technical Center sustainment.—The Committee provides funding for sustainment, including improving resiliency of critical systems and electrical systems.

This appropriation provides funding for long-term research, engineering, and development programs to improve the air traffic control system and to raise the level of aviation safety, as authorized by the Airport and Airway Improvement Act and the Federal Aviation Act. The appropriation also finances the research, engineering, and development needed to establish or modify Federal air regulations.

Advanced materials and structural safety.—The recommendation includes a total of \$6,300,000 for advanced materials/structural safety, of which at least \$3,000,000 shall be for Advanced Materials in Transport Aircraft Structures (AMTAS) to advance the use of fiber-reinforced composite materials in the commercial aviation industry through the FAA joint advanced materials and structures center of excellence.

Alternative conspicuity.—The Committee recognizes that broad participation in aircraft position reporting is essential to the safety and efficiency of the NAS. While Automatic Dependent Surveillance—Broadcast (ADS-B) Out has significantly improved surveillance, certain classes of aircraft operate under exemptions or alternative equipage arrangements and many operators are not required to equip. Advances in low-power, portable, and non-traditional avionics technologies may provide additional or alternative means of aircraft position reporting, reducing the risk of mid-air collisions and ensure all aircraft share position in all airspace. The Committee directs the FAA to evaluate and study technologies that enable alternative means of aircraft position reporting, and the feasibility of deploying such technologies for all users of the NAS. The FAA's work should focus on economically viable and commercially feasible, low-power, portable technologies that do not require full integration into cockpit avionics. The Committee directs the FAA to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on its progress and findings within 210 days of enactment of this Act.

Artificial intelligence and machine learning.—The recommendation provides \$2,500,000 for the FAA to work with the aviation industry and other stakeholders to develop a framework to guide the certification of technologies that employ artificial intelligence and machine learning across the full commercial avionics suite and non-safety critical use-cases, such as galley and cabin applications.

Aviation accessibility technologies.—The Committee encourages the FAA to support the development, testing and certification of aviation accessibility technologies, including solutions for passengers to travel onboard aircraft using power wheelchairs in cabins, accessible lavatories and other boarding and cabin technologies that would enable greater mobility and ease of travel. Such research shall prioritize solutions which minimize, to the greatest extent practicable, required cabin modifications.

Aviation safety technology evaluation.—The Committee is concerned by the continued increase in runway incursions, surface collisions, and low-visibility operational incidents at U.S. airports. While long-term airspace modernization remains a priority, the Committee believes that near-term, aircraft-based safety technologies capable of retrofit on existing fleets may offer immediate safety and operational benefits. Accordingly, the Committee encourages the FAA to engage with industry to evaluate safety technologies that could enhance pilot situational awareness during taxi, takeoff, approach, and landing, particularly in low-visibility or degraded visual environments for commercially operated transport category airplanes operated under 14 CFR Parts 121, 129, and 135, taking into consideration the human factors impacts of such technologies.

Aviation workforce development program.—The Committee supports increasing the strength and number of aviation professionals

who are well-trained and can be relied upon to make air travel safe and efficient. The Committee provides \$40,000,000 for the aviation workforce development program established by section 625 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018 (49 U.S.C. 40101 note), as amended by the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63).

Counter-UAS.—The recommendation provides \$7,000,000 within the “Unmanned Aircraft Systems Research” activity to support continued Counter-Unmanned Aircraft Systems (C-UAS) research through the acquisition and use of specialized instrumentation such as an anechoic chamber to establish a structured, controlled test environment. The FAA shall utilize these funds for structured laboratory and field validation efforts designed to inform FAA certification, safety guidance, and operational integration decisions, to mature methodologies necessary to ensure the safe integration of counter-UAS systems into the National Airspace System (NAS), and to conduct research to evaluate potential effects of counter-UAS technologies aircraft and NAS systems and equipment such as communications, navigation, surveillance assets, and other critical aviation components. This work shall leverage the assets of the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center and an R1 university with an active airport and demonstrated expertise in radar development, system integration, and test and evaluation. The recommendation also provides \$3,000,000 to establish a research, development, test, and evaluation program to assess the deployment and risks of high-power microwave (HPM) systems in domestic airspace, such as those used for counter UAS purposes, utilizing the assets of the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center and an R1 university with an active airport and demonstrated abilities to develop applicable technologies, systems integration, and conduct test and evaluation.

Landing system capabilities.—The recommendation provides \$1,000,000 to assess the capabilities of using the transponder landing systems (TLS) in the NAS at space and weather constrained airports such as those in Hawaii.

No-bleed environmental control systems.—The Committee directs the FAA to provide no less than \$3,000,000 for the study and development of environmental control systems that do not require the use of bleed air, sized and packaged to be used in commercial single aisle applications.

Radio altimeters.—The recommendation provides \$3,000,000 for the FAA to continue the work established in fiscal year 2024 at the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center, in partnership with aviation manufacturers, to accelerate testing, certification, and implementation of new radio altimeter capabilities consistent with the next generation avionics standards. The Committee directs FAA to provide an updated report to the Committee on the roadmap and timeline for development, testing and certification of the capabilities.

Tarmac safety and runway incursion prevention.—The Committee directs the FAA to provide an update to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding the research that the FAA is undertaking based on the direction provided under this heading in House Report 119–212.

Thermoplastic materials.—The recommendation includes \$2,000,000 for thermoplastic materials application research

through the FAA joint advanced materials and structures center of excellence.

Titanium cold dwell fatigue.—The recommendation includes \$1,500,000 for the maturation and validation of advanced titanium cold dwell fatigue inspection technology.

Transportation disaster preparedness and response using UAS.—The recommendation provides \$2,000,000 for transportation disaster preparedness and response research through the Alliance for System Safety of UAS through Research Excellence (ASSURE), using institutions that have demonstrated experience in damage assessment, collaboration with State transportation agencies, and applied UAS field testing.

Weight and balance.—The Committee is aware of emerging technologies potentially capable of measuring actual commercial aircraft weight and balance, as an alternative to the assumption-based methods currently in use. The Committee requests that the FAA brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on advancements in measured-weight systems, including any ongoing research, industry adoption, and potential safety or operational benefits or concerns.

This account provides grants for airport planning and development, noise compatibility and planning, the military airport programs, reliever airports, airport program administration, and other authorized activities.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

Commercial space port infrastructure.—The Committee looks forward to receiving the report directed under this heading in the joint explanatory statement accompanying division D of Public Law 119–75. The agreement directed the FAA to conduct a study on the current and expected unmet infrastructure needs of licensed commercial space ports, mechanisms available to the operators of such spaceports to fund infrastructure improvements and to provide matching funds for potential Federal grants, and suggested metrics that could be used to make competitive or formula-based grant determinations.

Discretionary grants.—The Committee encourages the FAA to consider the full range of aviation activities at an airport and their

associated metrics when considering projects for discretionary airport grants. The Committee also encourages the FAA to prioritize discretionary grants for tower projects at airports that do not have a tower but have been accepted into the Federal Contract Tower Program.

Noise abatement runway use.—The Committee encourages the FAA to work with small hub airports, particularly those that also serve military aircraft, with multiple runways to determine if designating a noise-preferred runway under a Noise Abatement Runway Use Program would maintain safety while providing community benefit.

Reimbursable agreements.—The Committee directs the FAA to report on its progress towards making reimbursable agreements with block grant states more transparent. The Committee reminds the FAA of the reporting requirement included in the Senate Report 119–47 under this heading and continues to encourage the FAA to make meaningful progress towards reforms.

Set-asides.—Within amounts available, \$160,000,000 is for administration, \$15,000,000 is for the Airport Cooperative Research Program, \$42,173,000 is for Airport Technology Research, and \$15,000,000 is for the Small Community Air Service Development Program, by transfer to the “Office of the Secretary, Salaries and Expenses”.

This funding provides grants for specific airport infrastructure projects, as directed by the Committee.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation includes \$240,860,000 in discretionary funding, which is available for community projects in accordance with the table at the end of this report, an additional \$17,500,000 to support the transition of airports to fluorine-free fire-fighting foams and solutions, as authorized by section 767 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 (Public Law 118–63) and for purposes of collecting and removing uncontained contaminants on and around airport property caused by polyfluorinated substances resulting solely from aviation operations, and \$12,500,000 for the advanced air mobility pilot program authorized by section 101 of division Q of Public Law 117–328 (49 U.S.C. note) as amended by the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION

Section 110 allows no more than 600 technical staff-years at the center for advanced aviation systems development.

Section 111 prohibits funds for adopting guidelines or regulations requiring airport sponsors to provide FAA “without cost” building construction, space, or related accommodations.

Section 112 allows reimbursement for fees collected and credited under 49 U.S.C. 45303.

Section 113 allows reimbursement of funds for providing technical assistance to foreign aviation authorities to be credited to the operations account.

Section 114 prohibits funds for Sunday premium pay unless work was actually performed on a Sunday.

Section 115 prohibits funds from being used to buy store gift cards with Government issued credit cards.

Section 116 requires the Secretary to block the identifying information of an owner or operator's aircraft in the aircraft in any flight tracking display to the public upon the request of an owner or operator.

Section 117 prohibits funds for salaries and expenses of more than nine political and Presidential appointees in the FAA.

Section 118 prohibits funds to increase fees under 49 U.S.C. 44721 until the FAA provides a report to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations that justifies all fees related to aeronautical navigation products and explains how such fees are consistent with Executive Order No. 13642.

Section 119 requires the FAA to notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations at least 90 days before closing a regional operations center or reducing the services provided.

Section 119A prohibits funds from being used to change weight restrictions or prior permission rules at Teterboro Airport in New Jersey.

Section 119B prohibits funds from being used to withhold from consideration and approval certain application for participation in the contract tower program, or for certain reevaluations of cost share program participation.

Section 119C prohibits funds from being used to open, close, redesignate, or reorganize a regional office, the aeronautical center, or the technical center subject to the normal reprogramming requirements outlined under section 405 of this Act.

Section 119D allows for organizational changes consistent with the budget request and this Act.

Section 119E allows funds from the "Grants-in-Aid for Airports" account to reimburse airports affected by temporary flight restrictions for residences of the President.

Section 119F specifies terms for a transfer of air traffic systems or equipment.

Section 119G prohibits funds for the privatization or separation of the air traffic organization from the FAA.

Section 119H prohibits funds for a second air traffic control training academy.

Section 199I allows an increase of the annual rate of pay for positions in the Office of Aerospace Medicine.

Section 119J requires a spend plan and briefing on activities funded by this act and by section 40003 of P.L. 119-21 for air traffic control modernization efforts.

Section 119K sets conditions for investments under P.L. 119-21.

Section 119L limits funds related to commercial space activities.

FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) provides financial assistance to states to construct and improve roads and highways. It also provides technical assistance to other agencies and organizations involved in road building activities. Title 23 of the United States Code and other supporting statutes provide authority for the activities of the FHWA. Funding is provided by contract authority, while program levels are established by annual limitations on obligations, as set forth in appropriations Acts.

The limitation on administrative expenses caps the amount from within the limitation on obligations that FHWA may spend on salaries and expenses necessary to conduct and administer the Federal-aid highway program, highway-related research, and most other Federal highway programs.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends a limitation on FHWA administrative expenses of \$507,435,977, of which \$3,248,000 is for the administrative expenses of the Appalachian Regional Commission.

The Federal-aid highways program is funded by contract authority, and liquidating cash appropriations are subsequently provided to fund resulting outlays. The Committee sets, through the annual appropriations process, an overall limitation on the total contract authority that can be obligated under the program in a given year. Programs included within the Federal-aid highways program are financed from the Highway Trust Fund (HTF).

Federal-aid highways and bridges are managed through a Federal-state partnership. States and localities maintain ownership of and responsibility for the maintenance, repair, and new construction of roads. State highway departments have the authority to initiate Federal-aid projects, subject to FHWA approval of the plans,

specifications, and cost estimates. The Federal government provides financial support, on a reimbursable basis, for construction and repair through matching grants.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends an obligation limitation of \$62,657,105,821 for the regular Federal-aid highway program in fiscal year 2027.

Asphalt research.—The Committee continues to encourage the FHWA to evaluate research initiatives eligible under the FHWA’s highway research and Development Program Focusing on the properties of purified bituminous coal waste as a source of high-quality carbon to be used as an additive for asphalt road building. The Committee also encourages the FHWA to use public-private partnerships to advance its research on the use of purified carbon-rich materials as environmentally beneficial additives for road building material.

Bridge construction innovation.—The Committee recognizes the importance of advancing construction automation and next-generation materials, including Ultra High-Performance Concrete, to improve the durability, efficiency, and resilience of the Nation’s transportation infrastructure, particularly in bridge construction and accelerated bridge delivery.

CMAQ cost effectiveness tables.—The Committee encourages FHWA to ensure that the next update of the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Program Cost-Effectiveness Tables reflects and includes analysis of a broader set of alternative transportation fuels available to State and local project sponsors. The update should capture real-world fleet transition options and, at a minimum, include propane autogas and renewable propane among other fuels that meet the Energy Policy Act alternative fuel definitions found at 10 CFR 490.2.

Congestion pricing impact study.—The Committee directs FHWA, in coordination with the Federal Transit Administration, to conduct a comprehensive study of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority’s (MTA) Central Business District Tolling Program (CBDTP) financial impact on suburban commuters who travel by motor vehicle. The study shall be conducted utilizing existing departmental resources. The study should include a detailed breakdown of the projected annual toll burden on commuters by ZIP code of residence; an assessment of the availability, affordability, and safety of alternative transit options in those ZIP codes; and an analysis of the MTA’s financial management practices and operating expenditures over the past 10 years. The study shall also include specific recommendations for how the MTA can improve operational efficiency and reduce costs to meet its capital and operating needs without relying on congestion-based tolling revenues. The Committee directs the Department to submit the final report to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations no later than one year after enactment of this Act.

Digital project delivery.—The Committee understands the potential that digital infrastructure technologies, including software and related services, have in modernizing our nation’s network of bridges. The Committee supports the expansion of eligible uses of these tools and encourages FHWA to review eligibility require-

ments for other major Federal transportation grant programs, specifically software and related services that support full-scale digital project delivery.

Farm-to-market roads.—The Committee recognizes the impacts of agriculture trucks impacts on local road and bridges infrastructures in rather heavily agricultural areas across the country. The Committee urges the Department to prioritize projects funds under the Rural Surface Transportation Grant program located on farm-to-market roads for any county that has an annual gross agricultural production value of at least \$1,000,000,000 and agricultural production of at least \$500,000 per square mile, for all crops and livestock sold, adjusted annually for inflation in accordance with the Consumer Price Index published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Labor.

Highway guide sign legend design.—The Committee directs the Federal Highway Administration, within 180 days of enactment of this Act, to submit a report to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations evaluating the safety and operational effects of alternative legend designs for highway guide signs, including typefaces subject to Federal Highway Administration interim approvals prior to the 11th edition of the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, and to include in such report any recommendations regarding reinstatement of such approvals.

Improved pavement materials.—The Committee recognizes that advances in asphalt mixes and concrete blends, including nontraditional recycled, modified and underutilized materials, have the potential to reduce costs, enhance durability, strengthen domestic supply chains, and improve roadway safety and sustainability. The Committee encourages the FHWA, in coordination with State departments of transportation and other relevant stakeholders, to develop a collaborative process to research, test, and evaluate market-ready, alternative asphalt mixes and concrete blends to generate performance-based data to assist States in updating their materials specifications. The FHWA is further encouraged to facilitate the incorporation into States' material specifications of those blends and mixes determined through this examination to cost-effectively meet or exceed existing performance criteria.

Low population highway infrastructure.—The Committee encourages the Department to take proactive measures to ensure that meritorious grant applications for projects not included in a Statewide Transportation Improvement Program or Transportation Improvement Program, and from counties with populations less than 50,000, receive fair consideration.

Material neutrality.—The Committee supports the FHWA's work to promote research, development, and deployment of building solutions that advance the performance, sustainability, reliability, and resiliency of building materials. The Committee encourages the Department to support material neutral decisions that do not promote or provide preference for specific building materials. The Committee believes that Federal resources are best utilized when all materials are considered on their own merits, allowing for the best solutions to address our infrastructure challenges.

National recreation areas.—Within available funding, the Committee directs the Department to prioritize awards for roadway maintenance and construction projects submitted under the Fed-

eral Lands Transportation Program which improve the safety, efficiency, and capacity of transportation corridors within National Recreation Areas established after 1997 whose boundaries span two or more state lines.

National toll interoperability.—The Committee affirms that national electronic toll collection interoperability, as required by section 1512(b) of the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (Public Law 112–141), is an important national transportation objective. The Committee encourages the Federal Highway Administration to continue working with States, toll facility operators, and industry partners to facilitate implementation, including providing technical assistance, coordination support, and resources to help agencies achieve seamless interoperability while protecting customer privacy and data security.

Permeable pavements.—The Committee continues to encourage the Secretary to accelerate deployment of permeable pavements, including permeable pavers, to achieve flood mitigation, pollutant reduction, stormwater runoff reduction, and resilience in new road construction and retrofitting existing roads and other facilities. The Secretary is also encouraged to support the use of permeable pavements and permeable pavers in Federal lands highway projects.

Ports-to-plains corridor.—The Committee recognizes the national and regional significance of developing a continuous north–south future interstate corridor connecting key agricultural, energy, and manufacturing regions across the central United States. The Committee notes that Congressionally designated High Priority Corridors—including portions of the Ports-to-Plains Corridor, the Heartland Expressway, and the Theodore Roosevelt Expressway—serve critical roles in freight mobility, rural connectivity, and access to domestic and international markets. The Committee is aware of a multi-state effort, led by State departments of transportation to conduct a feasibility study evaluating the conversion of these corridors to Interstate standards. Such a study would assess safety improvements, freight efficiency, travel time reliability, economic impacts, and national defense mobility benefits associated with full Interstate designation. Given the multi-state nature and national economic importance of this corridor, the Committee encourages the Department, in coordination with FHWA, to prioritize available planning and research funding, as appropriate, to support completion of a comprehensive Future Interstate feasibility study for these designated corridors.

Reuse of surplus toll plaza facilities.—The Committee recognizes that many tolling agencies have transitioned to all-electronic tolling and that certain toll plazas have become surplus to operational needs. The Committee encourages the FHWA to provide guidance, technical assistance, and administrative flexibilities to tolling agencies to support the safe and productive reuse of such assets in ways that enhance safety, improve system performance, strengthen economic development, and improve the user experience within transportation corridors.

Underutilized land.—The Committee directs FHWA to submit a report to Congress, not later than one year after enactment of this Act, identifying and estimating the number, acreage, and geographic distribution of parcels previously acquired with Federal funding that may be underutilized, including but not limited to

parking lots and other properties acquired with FHWA funding. The report shall, to the extent practicable, evaluate the potential suitability of such parcels for redevelopment, including for housing, and identify any statutory, regulatory, or administrative barriers to such reuse.

Unmanned aircraft systems for infrastructure maintenance.—The Committee encourages the FHWA to evaluate and disseminate information on the use of domestically manufactured UAS and robotic systems for infrastructure maintenance activities, including bridge preservation, protective coating, and cleaning, that are eligible for funding under Federal-aid highway programs. The Committee further encourages FHWA to consider the inclusion of UAS-based maintenance technologies in guidance and technical assistance provided to State departments of transportation.

West Virginia Corridor H.—The Committee is concerned by ongoing delays in the design and environmental review for the Parsons to Davis segment of Corridor H in West Virginia. The Committee urges the Federal Highway Administration and the West Virginia Division of Highways to expedite all remaining permitting actions for this segment and directs FHWA to report to the Committee within 90 days of enactment of this Act on the status of outstanding Federal permits, including any permits pending with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers or the Environmental Protection Agency, and any administrative steps that could advance the projected August 2026 design completion timeline.

Wildlife-vehicle collisions.—The Committee supports the Wildlife Crossing Pilot Program established under P.L. 117–58 to reduce wildlife vehicle collisions while improving habitat connectivity for terrestrial and aquatic species through competitive grants. The Committee urges the Department to work with States to expeditiously distribute grants provided by this program and identify options to further the objectives of the program once all available funding is exhausted.

The Committee recommends a liquidating cash appropriation of \$63,396,105,821. This is the amount required to pay the outstanding obligations of the highway program at levels provided in the Act and prior appropriations Acts.

The IIJA provides contract authority for Highway programs funded from the Highway Trust Fund. This account provides additional funds from the General Fund of the Treasury for the programs funded by formula under the IIJA and important safety and management priorities administered by FHWA.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$1,135,161,350 for Highway Infrastructure Programs, of which \$725,161,350 is for community project funding in accordance with the table at the end of this report.

Tribal transportation.—The bill includes \$200,000,000 to improve the transportation infrastructure conditions of Tribal communities. Tribal infrastructure is a top priority for this Committee. DOT has a key role in fulfilling the trust obligations of the U.S. government to Tribes. The Committee urges DOT and FHWA to maximize the set-asides for Tribes in various programs as authorized by law, and to work with State departments of transportation to provide maximum flexibility to Tribal organizations.

Truck parking.—The bill includes \$200,000,000 to address the critical shortage of safe and adequate truck parking along the National Highway System, which poses significant safety risks to commercial motor vehicle operators and undermines the efficiency of the Nation's freight network. In fiscal year 2026, the Committee initiated a grant program administered by the FHWA to address this shortage through investments in truck parking construction, improvement, and expansion on or adjacent to the National Highway System. The fiscal year 2027 funding provided for truck parking builds on this initiative with grants to States, metropolitan planning organizations, and units of local government.

Pedestrian safety.—The bill includes \$5,000,000 for pedestrian safety projects as authorized by section 11502 of IIJA. The Committee remains concerned by the staggering number of pedestrian fatalities each year involving vehicles and is aware that an increasing number of municipalities are developing plans to significantly reduce these incidents. The Committee requests FHWA to continue developing resources and providing technical assistance to help state and local stakeholders develop strategies to reduce pedestrian fatalities and serious injuries.

Regional infrastructure accelerator.—The bill includes \$5,000,000 for the Regional Infrastructure Accelerator program. This program encourages collaboration among local governments, private sector partners, and other stakeholders to expedite the planning, design, and construction of key infrastructure projects. By streamlining these efforts, these accelerators will help generate jobs, attract in-

vestment, and drive long-term economic development in regions that need it most.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION

Section 120 distributes obligation authority among Federal-aid highway programs.

Section 121 credits funds received by the Bureau of Transportation Statistics to the Federal-aid highways account.

Section 122 provides requirements for any waiver of the Buy America requirements.

Section 123 requires 60-day notification to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations of any grants as authorized under 23 U.S.C. 117.

Section 124 allows state DOTs to repurpose certain highway project funding to be used within 25 miles of its original designation.

Section 125 prohibits funds for automated traffic enforcement cameras with exceptions.

FEDERAL MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY ADMINISTRATION

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) was established within the Department of Transportation by Congress through the Motor Carrier Safety Improvement Act of 1999 (P.L. 106–159). The FMCSA’s mission is to promote safe commercial motor vehicle operations and to reduce truck and bus crashes. The FMCSA works with Federal, state, and local entities, the motor carrier industry, highway safety organizations, and the public to further its mission. The FMCSA resources are used to prevent and mitigate commercial vehicle accidents through regulation, enforcement, stakeholder training, technological innovation, and improved information systems. The FMCSA also is responsible for enforcing Federal motor carrier safety and hazardous materials regulations for all commercial vehicles entering the United States along its southern and northern borders.

The limitation on obligations establishes the FMCSA’s spending level for salaries, operating expenses, and research to support motor carrier safety program activities and to maintain the agency’s administrative infrastructure. This funding supports nationwide motor carrier safety and consumer enforcement efforts, including the compliance, safety, and accountability program, regulation and enforcement of freight transport, and Federal safety enforcement at the U.S. borders. These resources also fund regulatory

development and implementation, information management, research and technology, safety education and outreach, and the safety and consumer telephone hotline.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides a liquidation of contract authorization and a limitation on obligations of \$390,000,000 for the operations and programs account, consistent with the amounts authorized in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

Staffing.—The Committee recognizes FMCSA’s ongoing initiatives to improve compliance, enforce safety standards, and protect the traveling public, and appreciates the Department’s commitment to keeping the Nation’s roadways safe. However, the Committee remains concerned about safety-critical vacancies across the agency. Persistent staffing shortages may hinder FMCSA’s ability to conduct timely inspections, investigations, enforcement actions, and oversight activities. The Committee directs the Department to prioritize recruitment and retention efforts to ensure that safety and district administrator positions are filled expeditiously and that the Agency is equipped with the personnel necessary to effectively carry out its mission. The Committee directs the Department to provide, within 90 days of enactment of this Act, a briefing detailing current vacancy rates, hiring timelines, and steps being taken to strengthen the Agency’s workforce capacity.

Alternative warning devices.—The Committee is aware that companies have developed a solution that can be used in lieu of traditional warning triangle devices required by current regulations to be placed on the roadway around a stopped commercial motor vehicle (CMV) while maintaining an equivalent or greater level of safety. Specifically, the light-based safety device would allow a CMV to utilize a set of cab-mounted warning beacons to provide faster and effective notice to approaching motorists of the presence of the CMV whenever it is stopped or pulled over on the shoulder of a highway. Studies found that this flashing light-based system was equally or more effective when compared to traditional warning devices in enabling road users to detect, recognize, and react to the hazard presented by a CMV parked or disabled on the roadway. It is much more dangerous to be outside of a parked or disabled CMV on the road or highway than it is to stay inside the CMV. FMCSA regulations require drivers to exit the CMV, walk along the road or highway, and place warning devices on the road when it may not otherwise be required for drivers to exit the CMV and without any data to support such requirements.

Roadside inspections for autonomous vehicles.—The Committee notes that commercial vehicles are prohibited from being operated without passing pre-trip, post-trip, and roadside inspections (Sections 392.7, 396.9, and 396.11 of Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations). These inspections are critical to road safety. However, while autonomous commercial vehicles are subject to the same series of inspections, Federal standards do not currently include any unique standards or guidance for inspecting autonomous vehicles. The Committee directs the Department to review the current inspection requirements to determine what additional pre-trip, post-trip, and roadside inspection standards are necessary to ensure the safety of these vehicles, to consider new rulemakings clarifying these new,

additional requirements for autonomous vehicles, and to submit a report to the Committee within 180 days of enactment of this Act on the actions the Department intends to take regarding these inspections.

Predatory towing.—The Committee is aware that, like the States, the FMCSA does not have explicit statutory authority to regulate towing fees, which has allowed some bad actors to charge excessive fees and left the owner or operator of the stranded motor vehicle without legal recourse to demand reasonable rates or to seek recovery of the excess. Predatory towing can lead to supply chain disruptions when motor carriers are held hostage to unethical practices in towing and recovery. House Report 119–212 directed FMCSA to study current practices concerning towing and recovery regulation and fees in order to ensure fair and equitable treatment of roadway safety clearance opportunities for motor carriers. Within 90 days of enactment of this Act, FMCSA is directed to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on this research and recommendations for implementing a public awareness campaign to inform the public of resources to protect themselves from these predatory practices.

School bus driver employer notification.—The Committee is aware that employers of school bus drivers may not receive timely notification when an employee's commercial driver's license status changes due to a conviction for a moving violation, license suspension or revocation, failure to appear, or other adverse action against driving privileges. The Committee believes that prompt employer awareness of such changes is important to protecting the safety of schoolchildren. The Committee encourages FMCSA, in consultation with State Driver Licensing Agencies and relevant stakeholders, to examine the feasibility of establishing or expanding existing systems to provide timely employer notification of material changes to the driving records of school bus drivers holding commercial driver's licenses, and to identify any statutory, regulatory, technical, or intergovernmental barriers to implementation.

Automated driving systems.—The Committee is concerned that the rapid development and deployment of automated driving systems (ADS) in commercial motor vehicles could circumvent existing Federal safety requirements applicable to commercial motor vehicle operators. The Committee reminds the Department that current law under 49 U.S.C. § 31302 requires that individuals performing the dynamic driving task of a commercial motor vehicle hold an appropriate commercial driver's license, and that such operators are subject to hours of service requirements under 49 CFR Part 395, along with drug and alcohol testing requirements under 49 CFR Parts 382 and 655.

Human trafficking prevention.—The Committee encourages FMCSA to engage with state transportation departments to implement anti-human trafficking awareness and prevention programs for commercial motor vehicle operators and agency professional staff.

The limitation on obligations controls the FMCSA’s spending level for motor carrier safety grants. These grants are used to support compliance reviews in the states, identify and apprehend traffic violators, conduct roadside inspections, and conduct safety audits of new entrant carriers. Additionally, grants are provided to states for the improvement of state commercial driver’s license oversight activities and to nonprofit organizations to assist in training non-Federal employees who conduct commercial motor vehicle enforcement activities.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides a liquidation of contract authorization and a limitation on obligations of \$536,600,000 for motor carrier safety grants. The following table provides funding levels for activities within this account.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—FEDERAL MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY
ADMINISTRATION

Section 130 prohibits funds from being used to enforce the electronic logging device rule with respect to carriers transporting livestock or insects.

Section 131 prohibits funds from being used to require the use of inward-facing cameras or require a motor carrier to be enrolled in the Department of Labor’s registered apprenticeship program as conditions for participation in the Safe Driver Apprenticeship Pilot program.

Section 132 prohibits funds from being used to make changes to the current Federal preemption determinations.

NATIONAL HIGHWAY TRAFFIC SAFETY ADMINISTRATION

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) was established in March 1970 to administer motor vehicle and highway safety programs. It was the successor agency to the National Highway Safety Bureau, which was housed in the Federal Highway Administration. NHTSA establishes and ensures compliance with fuel economy standards, investigates odometer fraud, es-

establishes and enforces vehicle anti-theft regulations, and provides consumer information on a variety of motor vehicle safety topics.

NHTSA’s mission is to save lives, prevent injuries, and reduce economic costs due to road traffic crashes through education, research, safety standards, and enforcement activity. To accomplish these goals, NHTSA establishes and enforces safety performance standards for motor vehicles and motor vehicle equipment, investigates safety defects in motor vehicles, and conducts research on driver behavior and traffic safety.

NHTSA provides grants and technical assistance to state and local governments to enable them to conduct effective local highway safety programs. Together with state and local partners, NHTSA works to reduce the threat of drunk, impaired, and distracted drivers, and to promote policies and devices with demonstrated safety benefits including helmets, child safety seats, airbags, and graduated driver’s licenses.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

For vehicle safety programs, funded by the general fund, the Committee recommends \$202,000,000, of which \$50,000,000 is derived from prior year funds.

ADAS lifecycle evaluation.—The Committee recognizes the safety benefits of advanced driver assistance systems (ADAS) and notes the growing prevalence of these systems on new motor vehicles. The Committee is concerned, however, that as motor vehicles age, get into crashes, or are inadequately repaired, ADAS sensors and components may degrade or lose safety functionality. The Committee directs NHTSA to collect data on the functionality of ADAS installed in passenger motor vehicles prior to and after repair, and to perform the necessary research, which may include laboratory testing and real-world inspection data, to produce guidelines to ensure the proper functionality of those systems throughout a vehicle’s lifetime. The Committee recommends up to \$3,500,000 to support this research and requests that NHTSA brief the Committees no later than 180 days after enactment of this Act on the study’s progress.

ADS and ADAS crash reporting.—The Committee is aware that automated vehicle technologies are critical to reducing crashes and improving safety on U.S. roadways. The Committee is likewise concerned that the data collected and published under NHTSA’s Standing General Order 2021–01 for crashes involving automated driving systems and advanced driver assistance systems is limited and lacks context required to fully and accurately understand incident rates. Though context data can be valuable for aggregate research purposes, NHTSA has normally prioritized investigation information in the SGO’s reporting elements. This allows the SGO to

provide NHTSA with timely notice of crashes soon after they occur, in order to gather information and follow up while evidence is fresh. The Committee encourages NHTSA to consider whether context data could be added to the SGO without undermining its value in supporting timely information gathering for NHTSA investigations.

Advanced crash test dummies.—The Committee recognizes the importance of ensuring that Federal vehicle safety testing keeps pace with advances in crash test dummy technology. While NHTSA has made progress in developing advanced anthropomorphic test devices, the Committee is concerned that the pace of validation and incorporation into Federal testing protocols continues to lag behind available technology. The Committee urges NHTSA to accelerate the evaluation, approval, and integration of the most advanced anthropomorphic female test dummies and to ensure they are incorporated into government crash testing in the driver and front passenger positions, with the ultimate goal of including advanced female crash test dummies in the same capacity and regularity as their male counterparts, and evaluating the effects of different types of crashes on a large range of human body types and sizes.

CAFE Program.—The Committee recognizes NHTSA's essential work to rescind and replace prior CAFE rules to bring the CAFE program into alignment with applicable law and create a level regulatory playing field for automakers to design and produce the type of vehicles American families and businesses want and need. The Committee encourages the Secretary to continue this work and to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on updates to this regulatory framework as additional progress is made.

Consumer privacy protections in rulemaking.—The Committee continues to acknowledge that protecting consumer privacy is an essential component of NHTSA's work in the development of an impaired driving prevention technology safety standard, and that success with any new standard will depend on public acceptance and understanding of the technology. The Committee directs NHTSA to build privacy protections into any related new standards that will prevent inappropriate or unauthorized access to and misuse of driver data, while ensuring that vehicle owners retain the ability to control, manage, and grant real time access to vehicle generated data in a secure and efficient manner.

Consumer recall support.—NHTSA's "State Process for Informing Consumers of Recalls" grant program is intended to reduce the number of vehicles that have not been repaired appropriately for a vehicle safety recall. This program has been shown to be a cost-effective way to improve safety and reduce the burden on vehicle owners. However, State notification processes could be further streamlined and enhanced by leveraging NHTSA's recall lookup tool on an aggregate basis. The Committee recommends that NHTSA examine establishing intergovernmental partnerships with States for this purpose and, to the extent necessary to cover related expenses, consider reallocating funds appropriated for the "State Process for Informing Consumers of Recalls" grant program.

Federal role in state safety laws.—The Committee recognizes the importance of both maintaining long-standing Federal jurisdiction, such as the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's jurisdiction over motor vehicle safety standards, as well as preserving

the rights of states to exercise authorities available to them under current law to address new and novel technologies on their roadways. Specifically, the Committee does not support efforts to create new limitations on such state authorities, including prohibiting states from promulgating requirements concerning the presence of human operators onboard commercial motor vehicles.

Headlight intensity.—The Committee urges the Secretary of Transportation to brief the Committees on Appropriations regarding existing research and any gaps therein related to the impact of the intensity of low beam headlamps on the vision and safety of drivers, pedestrians, and other road users, including the effect of varied terrain.

Pedestrians and bicyclists roadway protection.—Pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities comprise nearly 20 percent of all traffic fatalities with approximately 7,000 pedestrian deaths and 1,000 bicyclist deaths. Another 60,000 pedestrians and 42,000 bicyclists are injured in roadway crashes annually according to Federal Highway Administration data. The Committee encourages NHTSA to establish Federal standards testing protocols and pedestrian test devices with thermal signatures and other characteristics representative of real-world pedestrians and bicyclists in representative lighting conditions based on real-world crashes.

Pedestrian fatality prevention.—The Committee urges the Secretary to conduct a study on how changes in State law have impacted pedestrian safety and the impact of vehicle safety standards. The Committee is concerned with the delays in next steps after its September 19, 2024 request for comment on the notice of proposed rulemaking for vehicle safety standards (Pedestrian Head Protection, Docket No. NHTSA–NHTSA–2024–0057), and directs the Secretary to provide the Committee with the Department’s plans on vehicle safety standards to mitigate the risk of serious to fatal injury in child and adult pedestrian crashes, including an update regarding national traffic fatalities data collected by NHTSA.

This limitation on obligations controls NHTSA’s spending for highway safety research and development programs. Many of these programs are conducted in partnership with state and local governments, the private sector, universities, research units, and various safety associations and organizations. Programs funded by this account include research, demonstrations, and technical assistance to state and local governments around behavioral aspects of driver, occupant, and pedestrian behavior. This account also funds NHTSA’s National Center for Statistics and Analysis which collects

and analyzes crash data and provides technical assistance to support state highway safety activities.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

For behavioral safety research funded by the operations and research account, the Committee recommends \$209,600,000 in liquidating cash and obligation limitation.

Cannabis-related impairment and technology.—The Committee recognizes that as more jurisdictions legalize the use of recreational cannabis, law enforcement officers will need additional reliable tools to protect drivers and other road users. The Committee directs NHTSA, in coordination with other relevant Federal agencies, to assess currently available and potentially commercially feasible technology that could be used by highway enforcement authorities to assess cannabis presence. The Committee directs NHTSA to provide a preliminary briefing on the plans for this assessment within 180 days of enactment of this Act. The Committee simultaneously supports the development of an objective standard to measure marijuana to identify recent cannabis use and/or a related field test to ensure highway safety.

E-bike safety plan.—The Committee recommends that NHTSA prioritize funds where possible within available resources to support states that have implemented or plan to create an electric bike safety plan, which should include that any shared e-bike systems comply with safety requirements. The Committee urges NHTSA to consider requiring proper helmet safety education, adequate first responder resources, and crash data transparency related to e-bike programs, and to consult with other agencies including the Consumer Product Safety Commission on such topics as appropriate.

Emergency medical services/911.—The Committee recognizes the increasingly complex role of 911 professionals. NHTSA is encouraged to continue to provide technical assistance to EMS and 911 professionals as part of a comprehensive highway and traffic safety system. Further, continuing to note the significant number of people who experience sudden, out-of-hospital cardiac arrest every year, the Committee continues to encourage NHTSA to disseminate training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation to state and local emergency dispatchers. Such training may include evidence-based protocols, continuing education, and performance measures.

Interagency impaired-driving task force.—The Committee is concerned with the rising number of crashes associated with drivers operating their motor vehicles while impaired. The Committee notes the existence of the Federal Drug-Impaired Driving Working Group and urges NHTSA to consider the merits of creating an interagency Impaired Driving Task Force or other partnerships to increase cross-agency collaboration among Federal, State, and local levels to prevent and respond to impaired driving. The Committee directs NHTSA to brief the Committees on Appropriations regarding any cross-agency initiatives to reduce the number of crashes and deaths associated with impaired driving that are identified as a result of this collaboration.

This limitation controls NHTSA’s spending on highway traffic safety grants to states. The grant programs funded here include: highway safety programs, the national priority safety program, and the high visibility enforcement program. These grants provide flexible funding to states that develop a highway safety plan to address state highway safety issues. This account also includes incentive grants to states that meet specific statutory criteria in areas such as impaired and distracted driving, occupant protection, motorcyclist safety, and nonmotorized safety.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$849,654,625 in liquidating cash from the Highway Trust Fund to pay outstanding obligations of the highway traffic safety grant programs at the levels provided in this Act and prior Appropriations Acts. The Committee also recommends limiting obligations from the Highway Trust Fund in fiscal year 2027 for the highway traffic safety grant programs to \$849,654,625. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—NATIONAL HIGHWAY TRAFFIC SAFETY
ADMINISTRATION

Section 140 exempts from the current fiscal year’s obligation limitation any obligation authority that was made available in previous public laws.

Section 141 prohibits funds under this heading to encourage illegal drug or alcohol use in NHTSA’s impaired driving advertising campaigns.

Section 142 clarifies that the agency can use amounts available for grant administrative expenses to provide technical assistance to States implementing highway traffic safety grants.

FEDERAL RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION

The Federal Railroad Administration [FRA] was established by the Department of Transportation Act (P.L. 89–670) on October 15,

1966. FRA plans, develops, and administers programs and regulations to promote the safe operation of freight and passenger rail transportation in the United States. The U.S. freight railroad system consists of approximately 615 railroads and 140,000 miles of track, which deliver over 4,000,000 tons of goods each day. In addition, FRA oversees grants to the National Railroad Passenger Corporation [Amtrak] with the goal of assisting Amtrak with improving its intercity passenger rail service and physical infrastructure.

The safety and operations account provides funding for FRA's safety program activities related to passenger and freight railroads. Funding also supports salaries and expenses and other operating activities related to FRA staff and programs.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$271,151,000 for the safety and operations account. The recommendation does not support the budget request to transfer human resources activities of FRA into DOT's Working Capital Fund.

Automated track inspection program [ATIP].—The Committee recommendation continues to support the inspection of passenger rail routes, commuter rail routes, routes that carry energy products and other hazardous materials, and to enhance the ATIP's inspection capabilities. FRA shall continue to prioritize the inspection of routes transporting passengers and hazardous materials.

Confidential Close Call Reporting System [C3RS].—The Committee acknowledges FRA's work to grow the program with industry, but remains concerned with the low level of participation from Class I freight railroads as only two of the six Class I freight railroads implemented a pilot program; one railroad ended its participation in 2025, whereas the other railroad has extended its program through August of 2026. The Committee supports further enrollment and directs FRA to continue to work with railroads on ways to improve the C3RS program to expand enrollment and maintain protections for railroad employees who report close calls and unsafe events.

The Committee recognizes the findings of the 2024 evaluation of the C3RS program conducted by Volpe and encourages FRA, and all stakeholders, to implement the recommendations of that study as soon as practicable. This includes the use of a revised IMOU to

address weaknesses identified by the Volpe evaluation, which will both continue to ensure protections are maintained for railroad employees properly reporting close calls to keep their identities confidential and not be subject to discipline or adverse actions including by their employer or FRA, and increase industry participation in the program.

Rail bogie equipment.—The Committee continues to urge FRA to establish standards for critical rail bogie equipment replacement cycles, limit the amount of time a rail car may sit idle before affecting the life and performance of critical rail bogie equipment, and limit the maximum time in service of critical rail bogie equipment.

Railroad safety improvements utilizing next generation 9–1–1 technologies.—The Committee acknowledges the issuance of the Final Rule of the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration titled, “Hazardous Materials: FAST Act Requirements for Real-Time Train Consist Information” [89 FR 52956; HM–263] and notes the potential for freight rail carriers to coordinate with Emergency Communications Centers for incident reporting and response, including through utilization of Next Generation 9–1–1 technologies.

Railroad safety inspectors staffing levels.—The Committee looks forward to the briefing required by House Report 119–212 regarding inspector staffing levels. The Committee urges FRA to prioritize sustained hiring, placement, and retention of rail safety inspectors across all six technical disciplines and to use available resources to address staffing gaps in high-risk regions.

Trespasser prevention.—The Committee reminds FRA of the directive included in the explanatory statement accompanying division D of P.L. 119–75 regarding FRA resources used to decrease trespasser incidents and fatalities.

Upholding grant requirements.—The Committee appreciates the Administration’s actions to bring all new passenger rail carriers into compliance with the grant conditions specified in 49 U.S.C. 22905(b). The Committee encourages the Administration to continue including these conditions in its grants.

The railroad research and development program provides support for FRA’s policy and regulatory efforts. The program’s objectives are to reduce the frequency and severity of railroad accidents through scientific advancement, and to support technological innovations in conventional and high-speed railroads.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$26,200,000 for the railroad research and development program. Of the total funds provided, up to \$3,000,000 is available to make improvements at the transportation technology center [TTC] as authorized by section 22102(c) of the IIJA (P.L. 117–58).

Short-line safety.—The Committee provides \$2,750,000 to continue to improve safety practices and training for class II and class III freight railroads, including efforts to improve the safe transportation of hazardous materials, other freight, and passenger rail.

The Federal-state partnership for intercity passenger rail grant program is authorized by section 24911 of title 49, United States Code. Eligible activities include capital projects, as well as planning, environmental studies, and final design of capital projects, to: (1) replace, rehabilitate, or repair infrastructure, equipment, or a facility used for providing intercity passenger rail service to bring such assets into a state of good repair; (2) improve intercity passenger rail service performance; and (3) expand or establish new intercity passenger rail service. States, a group of states, interstate compacts, public agencies or publicly chartered authorities established by one or more states, political subdivisions of a state, Amtrak, Tribes, or a combination of such entities are eligible to apply for this competitive grant program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends no additional funding for the Federal-state partnership for intercity passenger rail grant program.

Great Lakes corridor.—The Committee reminds FRA of the briefing requested in the explanatory statement accompanying division D of P.L. 119–75 regarding the feasibility of expanding passenger rail service in the Great Lakes region.

Maglev technology.—The Committee recognizes that appropriate training will be critical to enabling FRA to effectively oversee the safe implementation of any new technologies, including magnetic levitation technology. However, the timing of that training must be balanced with the technology’s expected evolution to avoid the training becoming obsolete before the technology is realized. Accordingly, the Committee urges FRA to monitor any proposed maglev project and, if the project is advancing, to take on necessary training efforts.

Passenger rail from San Antonio to Laredo.—The Committee notes that a 2017 study conducted FRA, in coordination with Texas Department of Transportation and Oklahoma Department of Transportation found that establishing passenger rail service between the U.S. and Mexico “would require further environmental and feasibility studies and strong interest and funding support from both countries.” The Committee requests an update to this briefing regarding the current status of potential passenger rail development and recommended action for relevant state and Federal agencies and their Mexican counterparts to eliminate barriers to facilitating passenger rail between the U.S. and Mexico in Texas, and other international land crossings. The Committee expects this

briefing to be provided to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations no later than 1 year after enactment of this Act.

The consolidated rail infrastructure and safety improvements grant program is authorized by section 22907 of title 49, United States Code, to improve the safety, efficiency, and reliability of passenger and freight rail transportation systems. Eligible activities include a wide range of capital, safety technology deployment, trespassing prevention measures, regional and corridor planning, environmental analyses, research, workforce development, and training projects. States, a group of states, interstate compacts, public agencies or publicly chartered authorities established by one or more states, political subdivisions of a state, Tribes, Amtrak or other intercity passenger rail operators, class II or class III railroads and associations representing such railroads, rail carriers and rail equipment manufacturers in partnership with a public entity, the transportation research board, university transportation centers, and non-profit rail labor organizations are eligible to apply for this competitive grant program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$522,775,411 for the CRISI grant program, of which \$22,775,411 is community project funding in accordance with the table at the end of this report. \$500,000,000 of the amounts provided are available by transfer of the unobligated balances from the Fed-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail appropriation from division J of the IIJA.

Agricultural economies.—The Committee supports FRA’s consideration of cost effectiveness when awarding CRISI grants and encourages FRA to also take into consideration projects that facilitate the movement of agricultural commodities when making CRISI awards at the state and national levels.

Technology eligibility.—The Committee notes that CRISI funds may be used for the acquisition and installation of advanced grade crossing safety technologies, including systems that utilize artificial intelligence, visual cameras, lidar, and other sensor-based technologies, to detect hazards and provide real-time alerts at grade crossings and other controlled rail settings. The Committee encourages FRA to work with freight and passenger rail stakeholders to support their deployment in a variety of geographic and operational environments, and to establish a testing and evaluation study on the benefits of such technology in reducing safety incidents at grade crossings and other areas of rail safety concern.

The Railroad Crossing Elimination Program is authorized by section 22909 of title 49, United States Code, to improve safety and the mobility of people and goods. Eligible projects include grade separations and closures, track relocation, and improvements to or installation of protection devices, as well as planning, environmental review, and design of such projects. Eligible recipients include states, local governments, federally recognized Indian Tribes, public port authorities, and metropolitan planning organizations.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$100,000,000 for the railroad crossing elimination program. The amounts provided are available by transfer from the unobligated balances from the Fed-State Partnership Program for Intercity Passenger Rail appropriation in division J of the IIJA.

GRANTS TO THE NATIONAL RAILROAD PASSENGER CORPORATION
[AMTRAK]

Amtrak was created by Congress in the Rail Passenger Service Act of 1970 (P.L. 91-518) to operate intercity passenger rail service, which was previously operated by private railroads. Amtrak assumed the common carrier obligations of the private railroads in exchange for the right to access to the private railroad tracks for an incremental cost.

The IIJA authorizes funding for northeast corridor [NEC] grants to Amtrak and national network grants to Amtrak, which encompasses Amtrak’s state-supported and long-distance routes, as well as other non-NEC activities.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides a total of \$2,100,000,000 for Amtrak through the northeast corridor grants and national network grants accounts.

Baby changing on board.—The Committee encourages Amtrak to assess the feasibility of retrofitting existing equipment to provide baby changing accommodations on board where possible.

Grant and legislative report.—The Committee finds Amtrak’s 2027 “General and Legislative Annual Report” to be an inadequate display of how the Corporation would use the proposed amounts by FRA for fiscal year 2027, or any recommendation separate from the President’s budget request. Lack of detail on use of Federal assistance by the Corporation is unacceptable and in violation of prior direction and expectation of the Committee. The Committee expects, even if Amtrak does not have its own distinct budget request, that it presents a report to Congress that explains how it would use the amounts presented in FRA’s budget request. Amtrak

shall submit a budget request for fiscal year 2028 to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations in similar format and substance to the 2026 Grant and Legislative Annual Report.

Procurement practices.—The Committee recognizes that as a Federally-chartered organization operated as a private for-profit corporation, Amtrak has a unique set of business considerations that guide its processes, including its procurement policies. The Committee directs Amtrak to provide a briefing to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations within 90 days of enactment of this Act on its approach to liability in its procurement transactions for architecture/engineering and construction management agreements. The briefing shall include details regarding Amtrak’s commercial procurement framework, including how it supports market-based engagement, a wide and competitive contractor base, and effective, commercially reasonable approaches to risk allocation.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$1,450,000,000 for national network grants to Amtrak to support capital, debt, and operating needs of Amtrak’s long-distance and state-supported routes, and other non-NEC activities. The Committee recommendation includes up to \$3,000,000 for SAIPRC. The recommendations does not provide additional funding for the interstate rail compacts grant program. The amounts provided are available by transfer of the unobligated balances from the Fed-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail appropriation from division J of the IIJA.

Great Lakes stations improvements.—The Committee looks forward to the briefing required by the explanatory statement accompanying division D of P.L. 119–75 regarding Great Lakes intercity passenger rail. The Committee directs Amtrak to provide a briefing to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations within 270 days of enactment of this Act on the conditions of Midwest Amtrak stations, including status of ADA accessibility, potential safety improvements, passenger experience feedback, and operational reliability.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—FEDERAL RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION
(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

Section 150 allows FRA to transfer certain amounts made available in this and prior Acts to the financial assistance oversight and technical assistance account to support the award, administration, project management oversight, and technical assistance of grants administered by FRA, with an exception.

Section 151 limits overtime to \$35,000 per Amtrak employee and allows Amtrak's president to waive this restriction for specific employees for safety or operational efficiency reasons. It also requires Amtrak to submit a report to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations no later than 60 days after enactment of this Act summarizing overtime payments incurred by Amtrak for calendar year 2023 and the three prior calendar years. The summary shall include the total number of employees that received waivers and the total overtime payments paid to employees receiving waivers for each month for 2023 and the three prior calendar years.

Section 152 prohibits funds from being used to reduce Amtrak police department officers patrolling on board passenger trains or at stations, facilities or rights-of-way below the May 1, 2019 staffing level.

Section 153 permits the Union Station Redevelopment Corporation [USRC] to be an eligible recipient for the FSP program and reiterates certain statutory responsibilities of the USRC.

Section 154 prohibits funds from being used for a high-speed rail project in the state of Texas.

Section 155 changes certain requirements regarding the Railroad Crossing Elimination program.

Section 156 requires Amtrak to submit a report to Congress describing use of funds detailed by category from a budget request in fiscal year 2028 and reduces funds if requirement is not met.

FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION

The Federal Transit Administration [FTA] was established as a component of the Department of Transportation on July 1, 1968, when most of the functions and programs under the Federal Transit Act (78 Stat. 302; 49 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.) were transferred from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The FTA administers Federal financial assistance programs for planning, developing, and improving comprehensive mass transportation systems in both urban and non-urban areas. The most recent authorization for the programs under FTA is contained in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (P.L. 117–58). Annual appropriations Acts include annual limitations on obligations for the transit for-

mula grants programs, and direct appropriations of budget authority from the general fund of the Treasury for capital investment grants and other programs.

Authorization acts provide contract authority for the transit formula grant programs from the mass transit account of the Highway Trust Fund. These programs include: urbanized area formula grants, state of good repair grants, formula grants for rural areas, growing states and high-density states, mobility for seniors and persons with disabilities, buses and bus facilities grants, bus testing facilities, planning programs, transit-oriented development, a pilot program for enhanced mobility, public transportation innovation, technical assistance and workforce development, the national transit database, and the FTA's administrative expenses. This Act sets an annual obligation limitation for such authority and provides liquidating cash. This account is the only FTA account funded from the Highway Trust Fund.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides a liquidation of contract authorization and a limitation on obligations of \$14,642,000,000 for transit formula grants and programs, equal to the fiscal year 2026 enacted level.

Aging infrastructure.—The Committee looks forward to reviewing FTA's national assessment on the condition of commuter rail bridges as included in the explanatory statement accompanying division D of P.L. 119–75 outlined in the report and working with Congress to support funding for commuter rail bridge modernization.

Agricultural worker transportation.—The Committee encourages the FTA, through the national rural transportation assistance program, in coordination with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Housing Service, to develop materials and best practices that can be disseminated to local governments, nonprofit organizations, and operators of public transportation with the goal of identifying options to establish or expand affordable and reliable transit services for farmworkers. The FTA is directed to report to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on these efforts no later than one year after enactment of this Act.

Drug and alcohol testing for transit operators.—The Committee notes that drug and alcohol testing for safety sensitive personnel

is required under Section 5331 of Title 49, United States Code, and Part 655 of Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations. The testing requirements in Part 655 apply to all safety sensitive personnel operating vehicles in revenue service either directly for or under contract with a recipient of Federal transit funds. The Committee urges the FTA to ensure these requirements are consistently and universally applied to all contractors of transit systems nationwide.

Electric heavy-duty buses.—The Committee appreciates FTA’s awareness of operational challenges with electric heavy-duty transit buses. Local and rural transit agencies who previously purchased these buses through transit formula grants are now struggling with parts availability and warranty support. The Committee encourages efforts by FTA to provide waiver opportunities of FTA operational maintenance requirements for transit agencies who purchased these buses and urges FTA to make these waiver processes as seamless as possible.

Fare evasion reporting.—The Committee is concerned that turnstile evasion and other forms of fare evasion may be causing significant revenue losses for large urban transit systems, including the Metropolitan Transportation Authority. Accordingly, the Committee directs FTA, within 270 days of enactment of this Act, to assess the feasibility of requiring recipients of Federal transit assistance to report estimated annual revenue losses attributable to fare evasion, including subway turnstile evasion where applicable, through existing Federal transit reporting systems. The FTA shall brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on the results of this assessment, including proposed methodologies, data limitations, and recommendations for improving uniformity, transparency, and accountability in fare-evasion reporting.

Public transportation and economic competitiveness.—The Committee notes that public transportation can serve not only as a mobility service, but as a catalyst for commerce, small business growth, and supply-chain stability.

Transit access and ridership study.—The Committee looks forward to the results of the GAO report requested in House Report 119–212 regarding ridership trends and community impacts. The Committee encourages FTA to work with public transportation stakeholders, including states, local governments, and private sector entities in the public transportation space to identify best practices and solutions to help address operating budget shortfalls.

Transit to airports.—The Committee is supportive of efforts by State and local governments to connect communities to their airports with transit options. The Committee directs FTA to provide a briefing to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding the feasibility and benefits of creating a new grant program to build and improve transit options to airports. The report should also include best practices and recommendations for communities to connect public transit to their airports. The Committee expects this briefing within 180 days of enactment of this Act.

Transit worker safety.—The Committee is concerned that there is no uniform FTA requirement for protected storage of audio/video [A/V] recording of transit vehicle operators, vehicle surroundings, or vehicle interiors. In 2020, FTA issued nonbinding guidance encouraging rail transit agencies to invest in these protected storage capabilities, but many transit vehicles continue to operate without

such protected storage of A/V recordings. The Committee directs FTA to review potential methods to encourage further deployment of A/V technology for fire and crash protected data storage and requests a briefing from FTA within 180 days of enactment of this Act.

Transit-oriented development.—The Committee acknowledges that restrictive local zoning and planning policies can hinder community access to public transit, employment, and public services. Therefore, the Committee urges FTA to encourage states and metropolitan planning organizations to strongly consider transit-oriented development in their project selections. Such policies may include reducing or eliminating minimum lot sizes, height limits, or parking minimums, or establishing by-right and objective approval processes in areas located in the vicinity of transit facilities.

Authorization acts provide contract authority for the transit formula grant programs from the mass transit account of the Highway Trust Fund. This account provides additional funding from the general fund of the Treasury for transit priorities authorized under chapter 53 of title 49, United States Code.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$973,177,200 in transit infrastructure grants. Of this amount, \$86,677,200 is for community project funding in accordance with the table at the end of this report, \$1,500,000 is for bus testing as authorized under section 5318 of Title 49, United States Code, \$875,000,000 is for transportation assistance to support the mobility needs of the international quadrennial Olympic and Paralympic events, and \$10,000,000 is for bus driver protection barriers.

Olympic and paralympic games.—The Committee recognizes there are locations outside of California hosting events for the LA28 games. As such, the recommendation continues to provide funding for transportation and infrastructure needs of LA28 via a formula that includes all host cities, including Oklahoma City, Queens, Columbus, Nashville, and St. Louis.

Transit vehicle innovation deployment center [TVIDC].—The Committee urges FTA to utilize the TVIDC program to research efficiency improvements, component testing including the use of FTA-appointed component testing centers, and technical assistance coordination. FTA is encouraged to focus TVIDC on increasing transit agency planning, procuring, and advanced technology deployment skills using the TVIDC’s national and industry-wide coordination structure.

The IIJA authorizes the FTA to provide technical assistance under section 5314 of title 49, United States Code, for standards development, human resource and training activities, and workforce development programs.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$7,500,000 for technical assistance and training authorized under section 5314 of title 49, United States Code.

Small-urban, rural, and tribal transit providers.—The Committee directs that not less than \$1,500,000 shall be for a cooperative agreement through which the FTA assists small-urban, rural, and tribal public transit recipients and planning organizations with applied innovation and capacity building.

Workforce development and standards-based training.—The Committee directs that not less than \$2,500,000 shall be for a cooperative agreement through which FTA assists transit recipients with frontline workforce development and standards-based training in maintenance and operations. The cooperative agreement should be with a national nonprofit organization with a demonstrated capacity to develop and provide such programs through labor management partnerships and apprenticeships.

Public transit vehicle maintenance workforce training.—The Committee notes that the Transit Workforce Center [TWC] and National Transit Institute [NTI] serve as training hubs for transit workers. However, the Committee acknowledges that innovation in public transit vehicles and related technologies requires upskilling for transit workers, particularly maintenance workers. The Committee encourages FTA, through the TWC and NTI to continue to look to adapt to transit workforce training needs as innovation in the industry continues.

The capital investment grants [CIG] program is authorized by section 5309 of title 49, United States Code, to provide discretionary grants for transit capital investment in rail or other fixed guideway systems, including heavy rail, commuter rail, light rail, streetcars, and bus rapid transit. Eligible recipients include public bodies and agencies including states, municipalities, other political subdivisions of states; public agencies and instrumentalities of one

or more states; and certain public corporations, boards, and commissions under state law.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$737,193,000 for capital investment grants, with amounts made available by transfer from the Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail program in division J of P.L. 117-58. The recommendation provides funding that, when combined with \$1,930,763,000 in unallocated balances from prior year Appropriations, there are sufficient balances to support all projects ready for a full funding grant agreement in 2027. From those total budgetary resources, the following projects are funded in the following amounts.

The recommendation provides \$1,107,830,000 for all current and on-going full funding grant agreements [FFGAs].

Finally, the Committee’s recommendation includes \$7,299,000 for oversight activities related to the investments of this account.

Affordable and workforce housing consideration.—The Committee understands that FTA evaluates affordable housing under both the economic development and land use criteria of the CIG program. The Committee is encouraged by the update to the CIG policy guidance in December 2024 regarding economic development and land use. The Committee encourages FTA to fully consider land use and workforce housing as factors that merit added consideration when evaluating a project.

CIG administration.—The Committee directs the FTA to continue to update the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations, monthly, on the status of projects that are in the current CIG funding pipeline, as well as allocations made and remaining unallocated balances in the CIG program.

The Committee reminds the FTA that section 5309 of title 49, United States Code, requires the FTA to issue policy guidance each time significant changes are made to such processes and criteria not less than once every two years. The Committee notes CIG policy guidance was revised in November 2025, and that FTA is in process of further revisions. The Committee requests a briefing within 60 days of enactment of this Act regarding any additional revisions to the policy guidance and specific implications for each project in the CIG pipeline. The Committee urges FTA to approach any further revisions to CIG guidance with careful consideration with respect to how such changes may create delays and cost increases, and to ensure CIG projects already in the pipeline with a rating are not subject to a new rating if they are making measurable project toward reaching an FFGA or SSGA.

The recommendation requires the Secretary to submit the fiscal year 2028 annual report on funding recommendations as required by section 5309 of title 49, United States Code, with the fiscal year 2028 budget request, and to include proposed funding allocations for fiscal year 2028. Further, the Committee directs the FTA to maintain the Federal funding commitments for all existing grant agreements, to identify all projects with a medium or higher rating that anticipate requesting a grant agreement in fiscal year 2028, and to submit a list of projects to which it expects to award an FFGA or small starts grant agreement during the budget year.

FFGAs.—Section 5309 of title 49, United States Code, requires that the FTA notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations as well as the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure and the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs not later than 15 days prior to executing a FFGA. In its notification to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations, the Committee directs the FTA to include the following: (1) a copy of the proposed FFGA; (2) the total and annual Federal appropriations amount required for the project; (3) yearly and total Federal appropriations amount that can be reasonably planned or anticipated for future FFGAs for each fiscal year through 2028; (4) a detailed analysis of annual commitments for current and anticipated FFGAs against the program authorization, by individual project; (5) a financial analysis of the project's cost and the sponsor's ability to finance the project, which shall be conducted by an independent examiner, and shall include an assessment of the capital cost estimate and finance plan; (6) the source and security of all public- and private-sector financial instruments; (7) the project's operating plan, which enumerates the project's future revenue and ridership forecasts; and (8) a listing of all planned contingencies and possible risks associated with the project.

The Committee continues to direct the FTA to inform the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations in writing 30 days prior to approving schedule, scope, or budget changes to any FFGA. Correspondence relating to such changes shall include any budget revi-

sions or program changes that materially alter the project as originally stipulated in the FFGA, including any proposed change in rail car procurements.

In addition, the Committee directs the FTA to continue reporting monthly to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on the status of each project with a FFGA or that is within two years of executing a FFGA. The Committee directs that such monthly reporting includes any requests for letters of no prejudice and the level of funds allocated and obligated, by fiscal year.

This program provides grants to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) for capital investment and asset rehabilitation activities as authorized by the IIJA. These funds, along with funds provided under the FTA’s core formula programs, will help return the existing system to a state of good repair and improve the safety and reliability of service. Federal funds provided under this account are matched dollar-for-dollar by Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia in equal proportions.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$150,000,000 for WMATA for critical capital and safety improvements. The three WMATA jurisdictions collectively match this funding with another \$150,000,000 each year.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS—FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION

Section 160 exempts previously made transit obligations from limitations on obligations.

Section 161 allows funds provided in this Act that remain unobligated by September 30, 2030, for capital investment grants projects to be available for other projects to use the funds for the purposes for which they were originally provided.

Section 162 allows for the transfer of appropriations made prior to October 1, 2026, from older accounts to be merged into new accounts with similar, current activities.

Section 163 prohibits the enforcement of the Rostenkowski test.

Section 164 prohibits the use of funds for awarding or amending a contract or subcontract to an entity that meets criteria described in 49 U.S.C. 5323(u).

GREAT LAKES ST. LAWRENCE SEAWAY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

The Great Lakes St. Lawrence Seaway navigation system is a binational, 15-lock system jointly operated by the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation [GLS] and its Canadian counterpart, the Canadian St. Lawrence Seaway Management

Corporation. The GLS was established by the St. Lawrence Seaway Act of 1954, is a wholly owned government corporation, as well as an operating administration of the U.S. Department of Transportation. The GLS is charged with operating and maintaining the U.S. portion of the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Seaway, which includes the two U.S. locks in Massena, New York, vessel traffic control in portions of the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario, and trade development functions to enhance the utilization of the Great Lakes St. Lawrence Seaway. The Water Resources Development Act of 1986 (P.L. 99-662) authorized the harbor maintenance trust fund as a source of appropriations for the GLS operations and maintenance. Additionally, the GLS generates non-Federal revenues which can be used for operations and maintenance.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$42,219,000 to fund the operations, maintenance, and capital infrastructure activities of the GLS. Of the total funds provided, not less than \$18,231,000 is for the seaway infrastructure program.

Market development and promotion.—Within the amount provided, \$1,000,000 is for marketing and trade development and promotion of the Great Lakes navigation system, to be carried out in cooperation with system stakeholders.

MARITIME ADMINISTRATION

The Maritime Administration [MARAD] is responsible for strengthening the U.S. maritime industry in support of the nation's security and economic needs, as authorized by the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 (P.L. 74-835). MARAD's mission is to promote the development and maintenance of a U.S. merchant marine sufficient to carry the nation's waterborne domestic commerce and a substantial portion of its waterborne foreign commerce, and to serve as a naval and military auxiliary in time of war or national emergency.

MARAD, working with the Department of Defense [DOD], provides a seamless, time-phased transition from peacetime to war-time operations, while balancing the defense and commercial elements of the maritime transportation system. MARAD also manages the Maritime Security Program, the Cable Security Fleet Program, the Tanker Security Fleet Program, the Voluntary Intermodal Sealift Agreement Program, and the Ready Reserve Force, which assures DOD access to commercial and strategic sealift and associated intermodal capability. Further, MARAD's education and training programs through the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy and six state maritime academies help develop skilled U.S. merchant marine officers.

Maritime security trust fund [MSTF].—The Committee acknowledges the budget request includes significant increases for MARAD, with \$1,412,000,000 of the total \$2,566,000,000 funded through a proposed trust fund, the MSTF. The Committee notes that the budget does not present legislative language to authorize this new trust fund as well as critical implementation details, including specific sources of fees to capitalize the fund. Therefore, the Committee does not support the budget requests MSTF for fiscal year 2027. The recommendation supports several authorized initiatives proposed in the budget to be funded in part or in whole through the MSTF through budget authority instead. The Committee urges MARAD to work with the relevant authorizing committees to develop the MSTF through the proper legislative process.

The Maritime Security Program [MSP] is authorized by chapter 531 of title 46, United States Code, to maintain and preserve a flag merchant fleet to serve the national security needs of the United States. MSP provides direct payments to U.S. flagship operators engaged in U.S.-foreign trade. Participating operators are required to keep vessels in active commercial service and are required to provide intermodal sealift support to the DOD in times of war or national emergency.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$372,000,000 for the maritime security program.

Surge capacity in crisis and conflict.—The Committee recognizes that a military crisis and conflict with a near peer competitor could strain MARAD's National Defense Reserve Fleet and Maritime Security Program fleet. The Committee reminds MARAD of the requirement included in House Report 119–212 regarding submission of U.S. sealift capability assessment to the House and Senate Appropriations Committees.

The cable security fleet program is authorized by chapter 532 of title 46, United States Code. The purpose of the cable security fleet program is to establish and maintain a fleet of United States-documented cable vessels to meet the national security requirements of the United States. The program will provide direct payments to U.S. flagship operators, and participating operators are in turn required to operate in commercial service providing cable services and to make the vessel available upon the request of the DOD.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$10,000,000 for the cable security fleet program.

The tanker security fleet program is authorized by chapter 534 of title 46, United States Code. The purpose of the tanker security fleet program is to establish and maintain a fleet of active, commercially viable, militarily useful, privately-owned product tank vessels to meet the national defense and other security requirements of the United States. The program provides direct payments to U.S. flagship operators, and participating operators are in turn required to operate in U.S. foreign commerce, mixed U.S. foreign commerce, and domestic trade and to make the vessel available upon the request of the DOD.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$81,300,000 for the tanker security fleet program. In addition, the Committee recommends a rescission of \$29,300,000 from unused prior year balances. The recommendation accommodates the vessel operating agreement funding level as authorized by P.L. 118–159 which shall be made payable as directed by section 3531 of such public law.

Expansion of vessels in program.—The Committee acknowledges the growing need for fuel tankers to meet DOD surge sealift requirements and notes the budget request continues the request to increase the number of vessels in the program from 10 to 20 ships. The Committee reminds MARAD of the requirement included in House Report 119–212 to identify vessel capacity demands and other requirements for expansion of the TSP fleet, and directs MARAD to brief the Committee of its findings within 30 days of enactment of this Act.

Maritime workforce development.—The Committee recognizes the strategic importance of domestic shipbuilding and a robust mariner workforce to the Nation's economic and national security. The growing shortage of credentialed mariners threatens the viability of U.S. sealift capabilities and the commercial maritime sector. As such, the recommendation includes \$30,000,000 for the Centers of Excellence for Maritime Workforce Training and Education as authorized by section 51706 of title 46, United States Code. As part of this recommendation, the Committee directs MARAD to review eligibilities of the program, including potential use of grant funds for grants to students to help lower the cost of training.

The Committee directs MARAD to proactively support developing maritime education programs, including through the development of a comprehensive maritime workforce strategy in coordination with the U.S. Coast Guard and industry partners to expand the pipeline of qualified mariners. This strategy should identify barriers to credentialing and career advancement, streamline licensing pathways, and ensure training programs nationwide are equipped to meet current and projected workforce demands. The Committee further encourages MARAD to prioritize outreach to transitioning military personnel and underrepresented communities to broaden the mariner talent pool.

In addition, the Committee encourages MARAD to proactively support further programming, including the potential establishment of new state maritime academies, by providing technical assistance and prioritizing the timely review of curricula, licensing pathways, and training programs. The Committee continues to direct MARAD to coordinate with the U.S. Coast Guard, facilitate industry partnerships to meet certification requirements, and establish clear timelines, points of contact, and guidance materials to assist emerging programs in navigating the Federal review and certification process.

Maritime workforce promotion and recruitment.—The Committee encourages MARAD to prioritize its marketing and advertising budget to develop and implement a comprehensive marketing, recruiting, and public relations campaign to attract workers to the U.S.-flag merchant marine and shipbuilding industries.

Space wharf.—The Committee supports interagency collaboration for the construction of multipurpose commercial ports of entry near major government space and aeronautics facilities.

USMMA capital improvement projects (CIP).—The Committee directs MARAD to continue to use the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to facilitate and execute facility improvements as expeditiously as possible in order to attract new entrants to serve as future leaders in the United States Merchant Marine and provide the next generation of service obligated Merchant Marine Officers with the quality of education they deserve and the Nation needs.

USMMA honor code investigation.—The Committee urges the Secretary of Transportation, in coordination with the Assistant Secretary for Administration, to ensure that the Superintendent of the Merchant Marine Academy assesses and updates the honor and conduct system guidance to ensure that the intended range of due process protections available to students accused of honor and conduct offenses are fully and clearly articulated.

MARAD serves as the Federal government’s disposal agent for government-owned merchant vessels weighing 1,500 gross tons or more. These vessels pose a significant environmental threat due to the presence of hazardous substances such as asbestos and solid and liquid polychlorinated biphenyls.

The port infrastructure development program is authorized by section 54301 of title 46, United States Code, to improve port facilities and the transportation networks and flows of cargo in, around, and through ports. Port authorities, states and local governments, tribal governments, publicly chartered entities, and special purpose districts with a transportation function are eligible to apply for this competitive grant program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$538,242,000 for the port infrastructure development program (PIDP), of which \$38,242,000 is provided for community project funding in accordance with the table at the end of this report. \$500,000,000 of the amounts provided are available by transfer of the unobligated balances from the Federal State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail program from division J of the IIJA.

Small and inland ports.—The Committee recognizes the importance of IIJA’s PIDP funds to advance critical priorities at our nation’s ports and acknowledges the need to continue upgrading vital infrastructure at small and inland ports with deepwater shipping channels. The Committee supports MARAD’s consideration of cost-effectiveness when awarding PIDP grants and encourages the Secretary to also consider geographic diversity in its award of PIDP awards at the state and national levels.

Increasing shipbuilding and repair capacity.—The Committee is concerned that existing constraints in domestic shipbuilding, ship repair, and dry dock capacity pose increasing risks to supply chain resilience, surge sealift readiness, and the operational availability of U.S.-flag and government-owned vessels. A modernized and expanded shipyard and repair industrial base is essential to meeting defense mobility requirements, supporting combatant commander needs, and ensuring the United States can sustain maritime operations during times of crisis or conflict. The Committee encourages MARAD to expand the use of Port Infrastructure Development Program (PIDP) funds to include projects at or adjacent to industrial waterfront facilities that increase both commercial and military access to existing shipbuilding and ship repair infrastructure and dry dock capacity.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION—MARITIME ADMINISTRATION

Section 170 authorizes MARAD to furnish utilities and services and to make necessary repairs in connection with any lease, contract, or occupancy involving government property under control of MARAD and allows payments received to be credited to the Treasury and to remain available until expended.

PIPELINE AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS SAFETY ADMINISTRATION

The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) administers nationwide safety programs designed to protect the public and the environment from risks inherent in the commercial transportation of hazardous materials by pipeline, air, rail, vessel, and highway. Many of these materials are essential to the national economy. The PHMSA's highest priority is safety, and it uses safety management principles and security assessments to promote the safe transport of hazardous materials and the security of the nation's pipelines, aboveground storage tanks, underground natural gas storage facilities, and liquefied natural gas facilities.

This account funds the operational costs of the PHMSA, including the agency-wide functions of administration, management, policy development, legal counsel, budget, financial management, civil rights, human resources, acquisition services, information technology, and governmental and public affairs.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$28,647,000 for the operational expenses account. Of the total funds provided, \$2,000,000 shall be for pipeline safety information grants to communities as authorized by section 60130 of title 49, United States Code, and \$2,500,000 shall be for emergency response grants as authorized by section 60125(b) of title 49, United States Code.

The hazardous materials safety account advances the safe and secure transport of hazardous materials in commerce by air, highway, rail, and vessel. The PHMSA evaluates hazardous materials safety risks, develops and enforces regulations for transporting hazardous materials, educates shippers and carriers, investigates hazardous materials incidents and failures, conducts research, and provides grants to improve emergency response to transportation incidents involving hazardous materials.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$68,000,000 for the hazardous materials safety account, of which \$8,570,000 shall remain available until 2028. Funds made available until September 30, 2028 are for long-term research and development contracts, grants, and, in a more limited scope, contract safety programs.

Of the total funds provided, \$1,000,000 shall be for community safety grants as authorized by section 5107(i) of title 49, United States Code and \$1,000,000 shall be for the state hazardous materials safety inspection program. This funding level supports \$7,570,000 for PHMSA's Hazardous Materials Research and Development Program.

Transportation of lithium battery powered devices.—The Committee is concerned about reports of the illegal and dangerous importation of mislabeled or mis-declared lithium battery powered electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS) devices on commercial and cargo aircraft. The Committee understands DOT enforces strict regulations governing the transport of lithium batteries due to their fire risk and potential thermal runaway hazard. The Committee directs the Secretary and the Administrator of PHMSA to work with the FAA, U.S. Attorney General, Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security, Commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration and other relevant officials to increase efforts to prevent the illegal importation of lithium battery powered ENDS devices, mitigate the danger they pose to the flying public, and bring all available criminal and civil tools to bear against such activity.

Transportation technology center research plan.—The Committee continues to recognize the growing capital needs and importance to advance life-saving research and development to address emerging safety hazards arising from the deployment of novel technologies including energetic materials and the transmission of hazardous materials. The Committee directs PHMSA to finalize its updated research plan and issue the required report to Congress no later than 180 days after the enactment of this Act.

The PHMSA oversees the safety, security, and environmental protection of approximately 3,400,000 miles of pipelines, 168 liquefied natural gas facilities, and 400 underground natural gas storage facilities through analysis of data, damage prevention, education and training, development and enforcement of regulations and policies, research and development, grants for safety programs, and emergency planning and response to accidents. The pipeline safety program is responsible for a national regulatory program to protect the public against the risks to life and property in the transportation of natural gas, petroleum, and other hazardous materials by pipeline and facilities that liquefy natural gas and store natural gas underground.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$218,186,000 for the pipeline safety account to continue pipeline safety operations, research and development, and grants. Of the total funds provided, \$30,000,000 is from the oil spill liability trust fund, \$180,876,000 is from the pipeline safety fund, \$200,000 is from the liquefied natural gas siting account within the pipeline safety fund, \$200,000 is from the pipeline safety design review account, and \$7,000,000 is from the underground natural gas storage facility safety account within the pipeline safety fund. The Hazardous Materials Transportation Uniform Safety Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-615) requires the PHMSA to: (1) develop and implement a reimbursable emergency preparedness grants program; (2) monitor public sector emergency response training and planning and provide technical assistance to states, political subdivisions, and tribal governments; and (3) develop and periodically update a mandatory training curriculum for emergency responders.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides an obligation limitation of \$46,825,000 for the emergency preparedness grants, to remain available until 2029.

Hazardous materials registration fees.—The Committee urges PHMSA to ensure that any hazardous materials registration fee increases are reasonable and that such increases do not disproportionately impact small businesses.

The Office of Inspector General [OIG] was established in 1978 to provide an objective and independent organization that would be more effective in: (1) preventing and detecting fraud, waste, and abuse in departmental programs and operations; and (2) providing a means of keeping the Secretary of Transportation and the Congress fully and currently informed of problems and deficiencies in the administration of such programs and operations. According to the authorizing legislation, the Inspector General is to report dually to the Secretary of Transportation and to Congress.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$104,802,000 for the Office of Inspector General.

Oversight of IIJA implementation.—As the Department and its Operating Administrations continue to expend IIJA funds, the Committee continues to direct the OIG to notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations immediately of any significant problems, abuses, or deficiencies it finds through its monitoring of IIJA spending.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

Section 180 provides authorization for the DOT to maintain and operate aircraft, hire passenger motor vehicles and aircraft, purchase liability insurance, pay for uniforms, and purchase and operate unmanned aircraft systems.

Section 181 limits appropriations for services authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109 up to the rate permitted for an executive level IV.

Section 182 prohibits recipients of funds in this act from disseminating personal information obtained by state departments of motor vehicles in connection to motor vehicle records with an exception.

Section 183 prohibits funds in this act for salaries and expenses of more than 125 political and presidential appointees in the Department of Transportation.

Section 184 stipulates that revenue collected by the FHWA and the FRA from states, counties, municipalities, other public authorities, and private sources for training may be credited to specific accounts within the agencies, with an exception for state rail safety inspectors participating in training.

Section 185 prohibits the DOT from using funds to make, terminate, withdraw, or rescind (except at the request of the recipient),

a loan, loan guarantee, line of credit, letter of intent, Federally funded cooperative agreement, full funding grant agreement, or discretionary grant unless the DOT gives a 3-day advance notice to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations. The provision requires the DOT to provide a comprehensive list of all such loans, loan guarantees, lines of credit, letters of intent, Federally funded cooperative agreements, full funding grant agreements, and discretionary grants that will be announced or changed with a 3-day advance notice to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations. The provision also requires concurrent notice of any “quick release” of funds from the FHWA’s emergency relief program and prohibits notifications from involving funds not available for obligation.

Section 186 allows funds received from rebates, refunds, and similar sources to be credited to appropriations of the DOT.

Section 187 requires reprogramming actions to be approved or denied by the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations, and reprogramming notifications shall be transmitted solely to the Appropriations Committees.

Section 188 allows funds appropriated to operating administrations to be obligated for the Office of the Secretary for costs related to assessments only when such funds provide a direct benefit to the operating administrations.

Section 189 authorizes the Secretary to carry out a program that establishes uniform standards for developing and supporting agency transit pass and transit benefits, including distribution of transit benefits.

Section 190 allows the use of funds to assist a contract utilizing geographic, economic, or other hiring preference not otherwise authorized by law, only if certain requirements are met related to availability of local labor, displacement of existing employees, and delays in transportation plans.

Section 191 directs the Secretary of Transportation to work with the Secretaries of Homeland Security and Commerce to ensure that best practices for industrial control systems procurement are up to date and are considered for all systems procured with funds provided under this title.

Section 192 prohibits funds from being used in contravention of the American Security Drone Act of 2023.

Section 193 prohibits funds made available to the DOT from being used to enforce a mask mandate in response to the COVID-19 virus.

Section 194 prohibits funds to facilitate scheduled air transportation to, or pass through, property confiscated by the Cuban government.

Section 195 prohibits funds to license, facilitate, coordinate, or otherwise allow officials of a country designated as a state sponsor of terrorism within the past three fiscal years to, in their official capacity, observe, tour, visit, or confer with DOT employees, including the FAA.

Section 196 prohibits funds made available to the DOT from being used to disseminate advertisements on behalf of certain entities.

Section 197 prohibits funds from being used for AI transcription in meetings and conversations with the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations.

TITLE II—DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

Consideration of rural and distressed communities.—The Committee urges the Department to enhance its efforts to provide decent, affordable housing and to promote economic development for Americans living in rural areas. When designing programs and making funding decisions across all HUD offices and programs, the Department shall take into consideration the unique conditions, challenges, and scale of rural areas. Further, the Committee reiterates its prior encouragement for the Secretary to prioritize meeting the needs of distressed counties within the Central Appalachian region discretionary funding to distressed counties within the Central Appalachian region.

Pre-reviewed Building Designs.—The Committee encourages HUD to consider the benefits of pre-reviewed building designs when working with communities and stakeholders to advance housing affordability.

Strategic hiring.—The Committee acknowledges that HUD has been significantly impacted by staff reductions and encourages the Department to prioritize its hiring efforts to address staffing gaps strategically, particularly in key areas such as grant management, regulatory oversight, and policy implementation.

The Administrative Support Offices (ASO) appropriation pays for the staff and activity cost that cannot be attributable to a specific departmental program. ASO offices provide Department-wide services for both the programs and the program staff. Specifically, these offices are: the Office of the Chief Financial Officer, the Office of the General Counsel, Office of Administration, the Office of the Chief Human Capital Officer, the Office of the Chief Procurement Officer, the Office of Field Policy and Management, the Office of Departmental Equal Employment Opportunity, and the Office of the Chief Information Officer.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$619,000,000 for the Administrative Support Offices, to be allocated consistent with the table below. When submitting the Operating Plan required by section 405 of this Act, the Department shall include each office identified below as an individual PPA and shall comply with the reprogramming thresholds under section 405 accordingly.

The recommendation provides up to \$30,000,000 of the amounts available for the Office of the Chief Financial Officer to support the payment integrity initiative. Not to exceed \$12,000,000 of these amounts may be transferred to the heading “Information Technology Fund” to support the IT needs of the payment integrity initiative.

Agency customer experience efforts.—The Committee continues to support efforts to improve agency customer experience. The Committee directs all Departments and agencies funded by this Act to develop standards to improve customer experience and incorporate the standards into the performance plans required under title 31 of the United States Code. The Committee directs all agencies funded by this Act to report on their implementation plans regarding this subject no later than 90 days after enactment of this Act.

Hiring and separation report.—The Committee requests HUD to continue providing hiring and separation reports as directed in the joint explanatory statement accompanying division F of P.L. 118–42.

Office functions and duties.—The Committee directs the Department to maintain the following Office functions and duties for fiscal year 2027:

- The Office of the Chief Financial Officer (OCFO) leads HUD’s financial management to ensure integrity, accountability, and effective stewardship of public resources. OCFO

advises the Secretary and Department leadership on budget and financial matters, including matters of appropriations law; serves as the primary liaison between the Agency and the Committee on Appropriations; ensures compliance with applicable laws and directives; and supports Agency priorities through performance reporting and operational excellence.

- The Office of General Counsel (OGC) provides the highest quality legal services to support and facilitate the achievement of HUD's mission consistent with the highest standards of ethics and professionalism.

- The Office of Administration, led by the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) supplies mission-critical support to the agency through effective space and facilities management, compliant FOIA and records management programs, and high-quality graphics and broadcasting services, ensuring transparency, accountability, and operational readiness in service to the public.

- The Office of the Chief Human Capital Officer (OCHCO) provides strategic leadership in human capital management by developing and implementing policies and programs that support HUD's mission. OCHCO advises the Secretary and senior leadership on all workforce matters and leads workforce planning and development efforts to ensure a skilled, diverse, and mission-ready workforce.

- The Office of the Chief Procurement Officer (OCPO) delivers efficient, timely, and cost-effective acquisition of goods and services to support HUD's strategic objectives. OCPO provides critical support to program and support offices by promoting sound business practices, ensuring compliance, and maintaining responsible stewardship of public resources.

- The Office of Field Policy and Management (FPM) provides national leadership and oversight of HUD's regional and field offices to ensure consistent and effective program delivery across communities. FPM supports the Secretary and Department leadership, coordinates across program offices, ensures compliance with labor standards and related requirements, and delivers stakeholder engagement, intergovernmental coordination, and field operations to advance Departmental priorities and improve service to the public.

- The Office of Departmental Equal Employment Opportunity (ODEEO) leads HUD's efforts to prevent unlawful discrimination and to enforce Federal laws that prohibit discrimination in all aspects of the Department's employment practices. ODEEO is committed to ensuring equal employment opportunity for all HUD employees and applicants, and to fostering a fair, merit-based, and compliant workplace.

- The Office of the Chief Information Officer (OCIO) leads HUD's information technology to enable the delivery of programs, services, and management processes. OCIO supports the Secretary and Department leadership, ensures compliance with Federal IT and cybersecurity requirements, and delivers enterprise technology, data, and cybersecurity services to modernize systems, strengthen performance and collaboration, and improve customer-focused service delivery.

The Department shall treat the termination of any function or duty from any Office, or the realignment of any function or duty from one Office to another, as a reprogramming of funds and follow the procedures established under section 405 of the Act.

Procurement capacity.—The Committee recognizes that a successful procurement operation is essential to the success of the Department’s mission. The Committee recommends \$31,000,000 for the Office of the Chief Procurement Officer. The Committee directs the Department to include a breakout of its planned uses of this funding among additional hiring, contractor support, and interagency agreements in its Operating Plan for fiscal year 2027.

S&E execution strategy.—The Committee notes that it has provided additional flexibility to the Department in the execution of its ASO and PO salaries and expenses funding, and that such flexibility will require the Department to adjust its budget execution procedures and funds controls. The Committee directs the Office of the Chief Financial Officer to brief the Committees on its revised budget execution and funds control strategy no later than 45 days after enactment of this Act.

Shared services and interagency agreements.—During fiscal year 2026, the Department has undergone changes to its operational environment, including the termination of its HR and Travel shared services agreements with the Bureau of the Fiscal Service and the significant increase in acquisition support provided through shared services agreements or interagency agreements with the General Services Administration. Agency shared services and interagency arrangements are important tools for achieving the Department’s mission that require careful attention to ensure that the Agency and the American people get the full benefit of these appropriated dollars. Consistent with Executive Order 14271 (April 15, 2025), the Committee reiterates the longstanding Federal requirements that, for all shared services and interagency agreements entered into by the Department, appropriate senior leadership must first determine that there is no commercial enterprise that could provide those same goods or services as conveniently or cheaply as the other Federal agency, and that using the Federal shared services or interagency agreement is a good financial decision for the Department.

- The Office of Public and Indian Housing, which oversees the administration of the public housing, housing choice voucher, and all of HUD’s Native American and Native Hawaiian programs.
- The Office of Community Planning and Development, which is responsible for the administration of community development block grants (CDBG), the HOME investment part-

nerships, homeless assistance grants, and other community development programs.

- The Office of Housing, which implements Federal Housing Administration multi- and single-family homeownership programs and assisted rental housing programs.
- The Office of Policy Development and Research, which directs the Department’s annual research agenda to support the research and evaluation of housing and other departmental initiatives to improve HUD’s effectiveness and operational efficiencies.
- The Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity, which receives, investigates, conciliates, and recommends the issuance of charges of discrimination and determinations of non-compliance for complaints filed under title VIII and other civil rights authorities.
- The Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes, which is responsible for the lead-based paint hazard reduction program and addressing multiple housing-related hazards affecting the health of residents, particularly children.

Unmet need.—The Office of Policy Development and Research, in coordination as needed with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Small Business Administration (SBA) and the Office of Community Planning and Development, shall update unmet need projections for the Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG–DR) program no less than quarterly, and shall provide such projections to the Committees upon request consistent with the requirements of section 422 of this Act.

The Information Technology (IT) Fund finances the information technology systems that support departmental programs and operations, including mortgage insurance, housing assistance and grant programs, and core financial and general operations.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$264,307,000 for the information technology fund, to be allocated by the Department to support operations and maintenance (O&M) as well as development, modernization and enhancement (DME) needs.

Clear and transparent financial information.—The Committee expects the Office of the Chief Information Officer to work closely with the Office of the Chief Financial Officer so that the financial information it provides to the Committees is consistent with the information presented in the President’s budget, congressional justifications, and Operating Plans submitted by the Department. The Chief Information Officer is directed to include specific information about the financial impacts of any IT modernization efforts, including any anticipated or actual savings achieved, in its quarterly briefings.

Quarterly briefings.—The Committee expects the Department to continue providing quarterly briefings on IT modernization efforts as directed in the joint explanatory statement accompanying division F of P.L. 118–42.

This account administers the tenant-based section 8 rental assistance program otherwise known as the housing choice voucher program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$38,083,000,000 for tenant-based rental assistance. The Committee continues the advance of \$4,000,000,000 of the funds appropriated under this heading for section 8 programs to October 1, 2027. Administrative cost-savings measures.—The Committee is supportive of the Department’s efforts to streamline program requirements to reduce overhead and create cost-savings in the tenant-based rental assistance program. The Committee does not prohibit the re-leasing of housing choice vouchers that become available upon turnover.

HUD–VASH availability at the southern border.—The Committee notes that there are many homeless veterans living near the United States-Mexico border, many of whom have not historically been counted in the point-in-time homelessness survey. The Committee encourages HUD to ensure that HUD–VASH vouchers are available to eligible members of this population. The Committee looks forward to reviewing the work directed in House Report 117–402 to develop strategies and recommendations for addressing and reducing veteran homelessness on the southern border.

Service-related disability compensation.—The Committee urges the Secretary of HUD to coordinate with the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to consider the policy implications of excluding service-related disability compensation from annual income calculations for purposes of the HUD–VASH program.

Shortfall prevention team mobilization.—The Committee directs the Department of Housing and Urban Development to pay special attention to changing rental markets where rates are increasing quickly with a focus on markets with low rental availability. The Committee recognizes that different communities have different needs and encourages the Department to provide dedicated staff to areas with special needs.

Support for veterans with serious mental illness.—The Committee continues to support the HUD–VASH program and commends its success in decreasing the rate of homeless veterans. The Committee is aware that not all low-income veterans that suffer from serious mental illness, including post-traumatic stress disorder and other service-related conditions, and face housing insecurity fit the traditional Federal definition of homelessness. The Committee continues to encourage HUD and the VA to evaluate potential avenues to expand HUD–VASH eligibility to include these veterans, and awaits the briefing requested in House Report 119–212 on this issue.

HOUSING CERTIFICATE FUND
(INCLUDING RESCISSIONS OF FUNDS)

The housing certificate fund, until fiscal year 2005, provided funding for both the project-based and tenant-based components of the section 8 program. Project-based rental assistance and tenant-based rental assistance are now separately funded accounts. The housing certificate fund retains balances from previous years’ appropriations.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Act allows unobligated balances in the housing certificate fund to be used for the renewal of or amendments to section 8 project-based contracts and for performance-based contract administrators.

The public housing fund provides funding for public housing capital programs, including public housing development and modernization. Examples of capital modernization projects include replacing roofs and windows, improving common spaces, upgrading electrical and plumbing systems, and renovating the interior of an apartment.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$7,068,650,000 for the public housing fund to support the operating and capital expenses of public housing units in calendar year 2027.

Operating and capital formula grants.—The Committee recommendation provides \$4,687,393,000 to allocate to PHAs by formula to support the operating expenses of public housing, and \$2,286,257,000 to allocate to PHAs for capital needs. Language is provided to allow PHAs to exercise flexibility in their use of capital and operating fund allocations.

Operating shortfalls.—The Committee recommendation provides \$50,000,000 for shortfall prevention to reduce the risk of financial insolvency for high risk PHAs.

Emergency and disaster grants.—The Committee recommendation provides \$30,000,000 for emergency capital needs, excluding Presidentially-declared disasters.

Administrative and judicial receiverships.—The Committee recommendation provides \$15,000,000 to support the costs of administrative and judicial receiverships.

The Assisted Housing Inspections and Risk Assessments account will support residents of HUD housing in providing financial, health, and safety inspections to over 2.4 million units of subsidized and affordable housing.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$25,000,000 for the account. This will allow HUD’s Real Estate Assessment Center to

evaluate HUD rental housing assistance programs for which the new National Standards for the Physical Inspection of Real Estate apply. Prior to fiscal year 2024, this activity was previously funded under the Public Housing Fund and multiple Office of Housing accounts.

NSPIRE protocols.—The Committee notes HUD’s extension of the start date for scoring new NSPIRE affirmative requirements to October 1, 2026, and directs HUD, using Information Technology Fund resources, to prioritize stabilization, training, and consistent inspection operations during this period. HUD shall avoid material transitions that could reduce inspection throughput or delay remediation.

The self-sufficiency programs account funds several programs which help low-income individuals and families living in subsidized housing enhance job skills, increase earnings, and improve their economic security. The family self-sufficiency (FSS) program provides grants for FSS coordinators to public housing authorities (PHAs). The resident opportunity and self-sufficiency (ROSS) program funds service coordinators to work with residents of public and Indian housing, and the jobs-plus initiative provides grants to PHAs, who partner with jobs centers.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$175,000,000 for the self-sufficiency programs account. The following table provides funding levels for activities within this account.

The Native American programs account funds the Native American housing block grants and Indian community development block grant programs. The Native American housing block grants

program, authorized by the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 1996 (NAHASDA), provides funding to American Indian Tribes and tribally designated housing entities (TDHEs) to help address affordable housing needs in tribal communities. The Indian community development block grant program, authorized under title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, provides American Indian Tribes the opportunity to compete for funding to address tribal community development needs.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$1,400,000,000 for the Native American programs account. The recommendation includes the legislative proposal referenced in the budget request to increase flexibility for new housing construction by Indian tribes in the Indian Community Development Block Grant program. The recommendation also includes added flexibility for tribes participating in the Tribal HUD-VASH program to use Formula Current Assisted Stock when needed.

Native American housing block grant formula.—The Committee recommendation provides \$1,157,000,000 for Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG) program formula grants. The Committee places a high priority on meeting the housing treaty and trust responsibilities of the Federal government to Tribes through its formula grants.

Training and technical assistance.—The Committee recommendation provides \$7,000,000 for training and technical assistance needs in Indian country to support the Native American housing block grants program, the Indian community development block grant program, and other HUD programs in order to meet the needs of Native American families and tribal communities. The Committee directs HUD to use this funding to aid Tribes with capacity challenges. The funding should be used for training, contract expertise, inspections, and other services necessary to address needs identified by Tribes. Of the total funding provided for training and technical assistance, not less than \$2,000,000 shall be awarded to a national organization as authorized by section 703 of NAHASDA.

Section 184 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992 established a loan guarantee program for Native American individuals, Tribes, and tribally designated housing entities to build new housing or purchase existing housing on trust land. This program provides access to private financing that otherwise might be unavailable because of the unique legal status of Indian trust land.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$1,400,000 for the Indian housing loan guarantee fund program account. The recommendation allows HUD to use prior year unobligated balances to support the cost of section 184 guaranteed loans.

Upfront fee increases.—The Committee notes that the Department’s proposed increase of Section 184 program upfront fees will provide nominal savings to the government by increasing the costs of home ownership for individual borrowers. The Committee directs the Secretary to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding the cost-benefit analysis undertaken to support this policy proposal no later than 30 days after the enactment of this Act.

The Hawaiian Homelands Homeownership Act of 2000 created the Native Hawaiian housing block grant program to provide grants to the State of Hawaii Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) for housing activities on Hawaiian home lands to develop, maintain, and operate affordable housing for eligible low-income Native Hawaiians.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$15,000,000 for Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grants.

The housing opportunities for persons with AIDS (HOPWA) program provides states and localities with resources to address the housing needs of low-income persons living with HIV/AIDS. Stable housing can reduce risky behavior, improve adherence to medication, and reduce HIV transmission. Funding is distributed primarily by formula to qualifying states and metropolitan areas based on the number of individuals living with HIV/AIDS reported to the Centers for Disease Control, housing costs, and poverty rates. Government grantees are required to have a HUD-approved comprehensive plan.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$529,000,000 for HOPWA. The recommendation does not include folding the HOPWA program into an expanded Emergency Solutions Grants [ESG] program as the budget proposes.

The community development fund, authorized by the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et seq.), provides funding, primarily through community development block grants (CDBG), to state and local governments and other eligible entities to carry out community and economic development activities.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends a total of \$5,852,707,616 for the community development fund. Of the total, the Committee recommendation provides \$3,300,000,000 for the CDBG formula program. In addition, the community development fund recommendation includes \$30,000,000 for activities authorized under section 8071 of the SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act. The Committee recommendation continues to require HUD to notify grantees of their formula allocation within 60 days of enactment of this Act.

In addition, under this heading, the Community Development Fund total provides \$2,522,707,616 for community project funding through the Economic Development Initiative (EDI) program in accordance with the table at the end of this report to finance a variety of targeted housing, economic, and community development initiatives.

Colonias.—The Committee urges HUD to ensure that technical and grant assistance is provided to the recipients of the 10 percent state CDBG colonias set aside to ensure effective implementation of the funding. The Committee encourages HUD to evaluate the effectiveness of its technical assistance for smaller and mid-sized communities.

EDIs.—The Committee continues to direct HUD to provide semi-annual briefings to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on the implementation of EDIs and the Department's oversight of projects. The recommendation also directs HUD to provide regular written updates of technical changes to projects that require congressional approval as well as a regular status update on all grants which have not yet resulted in a fully executed grant agreement.

Neighborhood blight.—The Committee is concerned that there is a lack in Federal resources designated for addressing vacant, abandoned, and deteriorated properties, and that these property conditions harm surrounding neighborhoods by creating unsafe conditions, increasing the risk of crime, and limiting the supply of safe and affordable housing. The Committee directs GAO to conduct a study on existing HUD programs and resources for state and local governments to address property blight, vacancy, and abandonment. The Committee directs the GAO to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations on its preliminary findings within 180 days of enactment of this Act and to provide a full report upon completion.

Utility cost savings.—The Committee encourages HUD to provide technical assistance to communities that are evaluating energy efficiency options for public utilities, including the use of thermal energy recovery technologies, for community facilities and community development projects supported through the CDBG program.

Unmet need.—The Committee recognizes the effort by HUD to collaborate with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Small Business Administration (SBA) in a manner which allows for rapid and timely data collection and sharing as it relates to Federal disaster assistance, including the determination of financial need, for the Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) program. Further, the Committee notes the lack of consistent, timely estimates regarding unmet need for qualified disasters. Therefore, the Committee directs the Department to provide the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations with quarterly up-to-date estimates of unmet housing, infrastructure, and economic recovery needs for qualified disasters.

The HOME investment partnerships program (HOME) provides block grants to participating jurisdictions (states and units of general local government) to undertake activities that expand the supply of affordable housing. HOME block grants are distributed based on formula allocations. Upon receipt of these Federal funds, state and local governments develop a housing affordability strategy to acquire, rehabilitate, or construct new affordable housing, or to provide rental assistance to eligible families.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$500,000,000 for the HOME program.

The self-help and assisted homeownership opportunity program account funds several programs. The self-help homeownership op-

portunity program (SHOP) supports low-income homeownership by providing funding to non-profit organizations and consortia that utilize the sweat-equity model to build housing for first-time homeowners. Funds are distributed through grants for land acquisition and improvements associated with developing new, quality housing for low-income people. This account also funds the capacity building for affordable housing and community development program, known as section 4, and assistance to rural communities, as authorized by the HUD Demonstration Act of 1993 (P.L. 103-120), which provides grants to build and expand the capacity of non-profit organizations to develop affordable housing and carry out community development activities that benefit low-income persons.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$60,000,000 for the self-help and assisted homeownership opportunity program account. The following table provides funding levels for activities within this account:

Self-help homeownership opportunity program (SHOP) and Section 4 notice of funding (NOFO) delay.—The Committee is concerned with the delay of the release of fiscal year 2024 and fiscal year 2025 appropriated funds for the SHOP and Section 4 programs, and urges HUD to release these NOFOs expeditiously.

Homeless assistance grants provide funding for programs under title IV of the McKinney Act, as amended by the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act of 2009. HEARTH Act programs include the continuum of care (CoC) competitive grants, the ESG program, and the rural housing stability grants program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$4,160,741,000 for homeless assistance grants. The Committee recommendation does not include the request to consolidate HOPWA, CoC, and ESG programs. The recommendation also does not include the modification of the ESG formula. The Committee strongly urges HUD to pursue these changes through the relevant authorizing committees. Funding for homeless

Childcare.—The Committee recognizes that access to safe, affordable childcare is critical community development infrastructure for survivors of domestic violence with young children. The Committee encourages HUD to support community development activities that expand childcare access, family stabilization services, and related facility and operational capacity for community-based organizations serving families in crisis.

Homeless definition.—The Committee is concerned that the term “homeless with a disability” is not descriptive enough to define the various ailments afflicting our homeless population. The Committee urges HUD to work with SAMHSA and the Veterans Administration to devise a more specific definition to ensure that homeless individuals with disabilities are receiving adequate care, depending on the severity of their disability.

Performance metrics.—The Committee urges HUD to incorporate performance metrics into its homeless assistance programs that analyze the extent to which grantees connect homeless individuals with mental health and substance abuse treatment services, and to prioritize funding for programs demonstrating improved outcomes in housing stability and reductions in homelessness.

Tiny homes.—Tiny homes are potentially an innovative strategy to combat homelessness among a variety of populations, including veterans and those living in rural areas. HUD is encouraged to consult with Continuums of Care and other recipients of Homeless Assistance Grants funds to determine if the construction of tiny homes is a worthwhile strategy to mitigate the impacts of homelessness. HUD is encouraged to brief the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations within one year of enactment of this Act on its findings.

Victim service providers.—The Committee is aware that well-designed victim service providers transitional housing programs have been effective in meeting the needs of this population. Therefore, the Committee directs the Department to issue clarifying guidance on how victim service providers transitional housing can be an appropriate model, and an eligible and effective use of funding through the CoC grant competition.

The project-based rental assistance (PBRA) account provides a rental subsidy to private landlords tied to a specific housing unit so that the properties themselves, rather than the individual living in the unit, remain subsidized. PBRA provides safe, stable, and affordable housing to over 1.2 million low-income and very low-income households at approximately 17,500 multifamily housing properties each year. Funding provided through this account supports the renewal of expiring project-based contracts, including section 8, moderate rehabilitation, and single room occupancy contracts; amendments to section 8 project-based contracts; and administrative costs for contract administration.

The Housing Counseling Assistance program, authorized under section 106 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, works with a nationwide network of housing counseling agencies and counselors to provide tools to current and prospective homeowners and renters so that they can make responsible choices to address their housing needs. Housing counseling services range from addressing homelessness and preventing foreclosures and evictions to planning for first-time home purchases. Housing counselors also provide assistance to victims of natural disasters.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$26,000,000 for housing counseling assistance.

The Office of Manufactured Housing Programs (OMHP) establishes and enforces Federal standards for the design and construction of manufactured homes to assure quality, durability, safety, and affordability. All manufactured homes are required to meet the Federal standards, and fees are charged to producers to cover the costs of administering the program.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$14,000,000 for the manufactured housing standards programs, to be funded from fees collected and deposited into the manufactured housing fees trust fund account. The Committee encourages the Department of Housing and Urban Development to continue supporting efforts that preserve and expand access to manufactured housing, including improvements in financing options, and clarity in regulatory guidance. The Committee urges HUD to brief the House and Senate Appropriations Committees within 180 days of enactment of this Act on current initiatives related to manufactured housing and recommend actions to improve market access, affordability, and long-term durability.

FHA Title I personal property loans.—The Committee recognizes the challenges with using a Federal Housing Administration loan to purchase a manufactured home. Accordingly, the Committee encourages the Federal Housing Administration to update the limits

for FHA Title I personal property loans to allow for realistic use to purchase a manufactured home that is not on a permanent foundation, and to coordinate with Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to identify similar activities within their portfolios.

Manufactured housing.—The Committee recognizes the significance of manufactured housing as a major source of affordable homeownership and its role in addressing national housing supply challenges. The Committee encourages HUD to continue supporting efforts that preserve and expand access to manufactured housing, including updates to the HUD Code, improvements in financing options, and clarity in regulatory guidance. The Committee is supportive of the steps taken in the January 8, 2025, Adoption of the Uniform Residential Loan Application (URLA) (Title I Letter 489) easing the Title I manufactured home loan application process, and encourages HUD to continue to align Title I to match Title II requirements to lower barriers. The Committee is also encouraged by the February 8, 2024 final rule (89 FR 14582) that increased Title I loan limits by annually indexing to inflation. The Committee continues to support additional increases in loan limits to ensure more homebuyers are able to participate. The Committee directs the Secretary to prepare a report on current initiatives related to manufactured housing and recommend actions to improve market access, affordability, and long-term durability and to submit this report to the Committees no later than 180 days of enactment of this Act.

Modular housing.—The Committee recognizes that modular housing, which are built in factories and assembled on site, hold great potential in increasing the housing supply. The Committee directs the Secretary to prepare a report exploring the potential of a singular HUD code for modular housing, similar to HUD’s code for manufactured home, and to submit this report to the Committees no later than 180 days of enactment of this Act.

The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) provides mortgage insurance for the purchase, refinance, and rehabilitation of single-family homes. FHA mortgage insurance is designed to encourage lenders to make credit available to borrowers whom the conventional market perceives as bearing more risk, including first-time homebuyers, minorities, lower-income families, and residents of underserved areas.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends a limitation of \$1,000,000 for direct loans, \$400,000,000 for guaranteed loans, and \$175,000,000 for administrative contract expenses.

The FHA’s general insurance and special risk insurance (GI and SRI) program account includes 17 different programs administered by FHA. The GI fund includes a wide variety of insurance programs for special-purpose single and multifamily loans, including loans for property improvements, manufactured housing, multi-family rental housing, condominiums, housing for the elderly, hospitals, group practice facilities, and nursing homes. The SRI fund includes insurance programs for mortgages in older, declining urban areas that would not be otherwise eligible for insurance, mortgages with interest reduction payments, and mortgages for experimental housing and for high-risk mortgagors who would not normally be eligible for mortgage insurance without housing counseling.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends a limitation of \$1,000,000 for direct loans and \$35,000,000,000 for guaranteed loans, the same as fiscal year 2026 enacted levels.

Conflict of interest protections.—The Committee recognizes the importance of independent, third-party oversight in the Claims Without Conveyance of Title (CWCOT) sale process, which ensures maximum recovery for the FHA Mutual Mortgage Insurance Fund. The Committee directs HUD to maintain existing Conflict of Interest protections that prevent mortgagees from utilizing affiliated or subsidiary entities for auction services where the mortgagee is the mortgage holder. The Committee further directs that no changes to these standards be finalized until the Department briefs the Committee and assesses that such changes will not result in decreased transparency or increased costs to the taxpayer.

Environmental review requirements.—HUD has previously clarified that issuance of single family FHA mortgage insurance in the Section 203(k) program does not require environmental review. However, for multi-family Section 223(a)(7) refinancing transactions, environmental review is required. Consistent with the changes to NEPA in the Fiscal Responsibility Act, which specifies that “The term ‘major Federal action’ does not include . . . loans, loan guarantees, or other forms of financial assistance . . .”, the Committee encourages HUD to make its environmental review policy consistent across programs and to adopt the position that the agency’s extensions of mortgage insurance and loan guarantees are

not major Federal actions significantly affecting the quality of the human environment within the meaning of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

FHA loan limits.—Homeowners across the country that live near but outside cities are increasingly struggling to access homeownership because the applicable FHA loan limit for the relevant metropolitan statistical area (MSA) is much lower than the actual price of a home in their neighborhood. Accordingly, for MSAs that are at least 1,300 square miles or more in land area, the Committee encourages the Secretary of HUD to use the highest possible median house price to calculate FHA loan limits for Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) that experienced a drop in FHA loan limits of 20 percent or more when the Housing Economic Recovery Act went into effect.

Manufactured housing loans.—The Committee recognizes the challenges with using a Federal Housing Administration loan to purchase a manufactured home. Accordingly, the Committee encourages the Federal Housing Administration to update the limits for FHA Title I personal property loans to allow for realistic use to purchase a manufactured home that is not on a permanent foundation.

Modern credit scoring models.—The Committee encourages FHA to evaluate and adopt modern credit scoring models that incorporate alternative and trended data for FHA-insured mortgage programs, consistent with FHA's independent authority under HUD Handbook 4000.1. The Committee notes that FHFA has previously directed Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac to accept such models pursuant to the Credit Score Competition Act (P.L. 115–174, Section 310). The Committee directs FHA to brief the Committees on Appropriations no later than 90 days after enactment of this Act on: (1) FHA's plans and timeline for evaluating and accepting modern credit scoring models for FHA-insured loans, (2) any analysis FHA has conducted on the performance of such models for FHA-insured portfolios, and (3) any coordination with FHFA or other Federal agencies on credit score modernization.

Mortgage insurance premium exemptions.—The Committee directs the Secretary to conduct a study on the feasibility of a program that exempts first-time homebuyers who are first responders or schoolteachers from monthly insurance premiums and a down payment. The study shall examine the benefits and detriments of such a program; the cost of the program and the impact on the mutual mortgage insurance fund; how such a program can remain solvent; an analysis of the expected premiums that would be needed for the program to have a negative credit subsidy rate; any statutory or regulatory changes needed to implement such a program; and recommendations that describe similar solutions or alternatives if this program isn't feasible. The Secretary is encouraged to consult with the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, as well as other relevant Federal agencies and stakeholders, including with respect to whether elements of the Department of Veterans Affairs Home Loan Program could be incorporated into such a program. Not later than 180 days after enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall submit a report to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Senate detailing the findings of the study and providing any policy recommendations.

Radon testing requirements.—The Committee recognizes the importance of protecting tenants from radon exposure, the second leading cause of lung cancer, and encourages the FHA to continue the 2020 policy requirement for radon testing, and radon mitigation as needed, performed by Radon Professionals according to the applicable ANSI/AARST industry consensus standard.

Quarterly reports.—Upon enactment of this Act, the Committee directs FHA to provide quarterly reports on the status of all non-personnel expenses, including travel, training, conferences, contracts, and supplies. In addition, FHA is directed to expand these reports to include the status of personnel compensation and benefits costs, as well as staffing levels by office. The reports should compare planned or projected estimates to actuals to date.

The Government National Mortgage Association guarantees the timely payment of principal and interest on mortgage-backed securities issued by private institutions such as mortgage companies and banks. The only loans in these privately issued securities are mortgages either issued or guaranteed by Federal Housing Administration and U.S. Departments of Veterans Affairs and Agriculture.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends a loan limitation of \$600,000,000,000 and \$56,000,000 for administrative expenses.

Quarterly reports.—The Committee directs GNMA to continue providing quarterly reports on the status of all non-personnel expenses as outlined in the joint explanatory statement accompanying division F of P.L. 118–42. In addition, GNMA is directed to expand these reports to include the status of personnel compensation and benefits costs, as well as staffing levels by office. The reports should compare planned or projected estimates to actuals to date.

Title V of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1970, as amended, directs the Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development to undertake programs of research, evaluation, and reports relating to the Department's mission and programs. These functions are carried out internally and through grants and contracts with industry, nonprofit research organizations, educational institutions, and through agreements with state and local governments, and other Federal agencies. The research programs seek ways to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HUD programs and to identify methods to achieve cost reductions. This appropriation is used to support HUD evaluation and monitoring activities and to conduct housing surveys. Finally, funds under this heading are used to support technical assistance activities to the various states, communities, and agencies that are charged with administering HUD's programs and funds.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$95,000,000 for this account. Funding is provided in the amounts shown in the following table:

Core research and technology.—The recommendation provides not less than \$47,000,000 for the core research programs, including market surveys, research support and dissemination, data acquisition, housing finance studies, research partnerships, and housing technology, of which \$5,000,000 is for cooperative agreements and research partnerships with Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Tribal Colleges and Universities, Hispanic-Serving Institutions, and Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions. The Committee recognizes that the Department has significant carryover in this account and recommends that the Secretary utilize available balances to fully fund the Core R&T budget request.

Digitizing housing code violations.—The Committee continues to be troubled by reports of deplorable living conditions found in HUD-subsidized properties and properties in the rental market in cities and towns that receive funding through the community development block grant (CDBG) program. The scope of this issue spans geographic regions and highlights systemic problems in the affordable housing rental market. Individuals and families have the right to know if the home they may be renting has had repeated housing code violations without having to file a Freedom of Information Act request. In fiscal year 2022, House Report 117–99 directed HUD to complete a feasibility study of the extent to which HUD can help cities and localities digitize housing codes for public view, including the associated costs. The Committee notes the importance of this assessment and looks forward to the review of study outcomes.

Eviction data standardization.—The Committee recognizes that HUD's rental assistance programs capture eviction data differently

and encourages the Office of Policy Development and Research to continue its work to standardize how to measure court-ordered evictions among assisted households. The Committee encourages the Department to consider how its available resources, including for technical assistance, can support ongoing national work by non-profit organizations, who standardize court records, collect data on court-ordered evictions, and make court records available to researchers and policymakers.

Higher education and community partnerships.—The Committee believes that investing in research partnerships between HUD and anchor institutions will ensure that HUD has access to innovative research and technology advances to best address modern housing problems. The Committee encourages HUD to competitively award a cooperative agreement for institutions of higher education in urban settings to conduct research or provide technical assistance on matters related to economic opportunity, reducing homelessness, or stable homeownership. In addition, the Committee urges the Department to include funding for its Office of University Partnerships in its fiscal year 2028 Congressional Budget Justification.

Home appreciation partnerships.—The Committee continues to recognize the challenges middle-class families face in building wealth through traditional homeownership models and encourages the Department of Housing and Urban Development to explore innovative financial instruments that support both housing mobility and long-term wealth-building. The Committee awaits the report requested in House Report 119–212 regarding the opportunities, risks, and potential pathways for incorporating Home Appreciation Partnerships into existing housing finance frameworks.

Mortgage portability study.—The Committee urges the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, in coordination with the Director of the Federal Housing Finance Agency, to conduct a study on the feasibility and potential impacts of allowing federally backed mortgage loans to be portable between properties. The study shall examine administrative and operational feasibility; potential impacts on the housing market; any changes to rulemaking and regulations at the department or agency; the potential effects on the safety and soundness of the government-sponsored enterprises, including Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac; any statutory or regulatory changes that would be necessary to implement such portability; and recommendations for similar solutions or alternative program designs. The Secretary and the Director are encouraged to consult with relevant Federal agencies, lenders, servicers, and other stakeholders as appropriate. Not later than 180 days after enactment of this Act, HUD and FHFA shall submit a joint report to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Senate detailing the findings of the study and providing any policy recommendations.

Recovery housing.—The Committee recognizes the importance of providing stakeholders training and technical assistance on evidenced-based approaches to recovery housing and substance use disorder treatment services, to expand the quality and capacity of recovery housing across the country. Of the amounts provided for technical assistance, up to \$2,500,000 shall be used to provide technical assistance and research in recovery housing to communities

and stakeholders for developing evidence-based recovery housing programs.

Removing barriers to broadband infrastructure.—The Committee recognizes that broadband infrastructure barriers and high monthly costs to households result in HUD-assisted households often receiving inadequate access to the internet, and expects the Department to complete an analysis of this issue, the results of which are to be made publicly available within one year of enactment. The Committee further expects the Department to explore potential mechanisms for providing high-quality, subsidized broadband to assisted households, including through the expansion of monthly utility subsidies to include broadband.

Rent reporting for affordable housing residents.—The Committee recognizes that some affordable housing providers do not provide credit bureaus with reports of timely renters’ rent payments, putting such renters at a disadvantage in terms of building their credit scores and having the ability to secure mortgages to purchase their first homes or rent from the private market. Accordingly, up to \$750,000 of the amounts available under this heading (in addition to prior year amounts) shall be used to provide training and technical assistance to encourage the implementation of positive rental payment data sharing in affordable housing programs in diverse areas, including Native American housing providers. These programs shall operate at no charge to residents, with an affirmative opt-in, and in compliance with strong Federal privacy and state protections. HUD shall report to the Committees on the roll-out and outcomes of this approach.

Research, evaluations, and demonstrations.—The recommendation provides up to \$8,000,000 for new and continuing studies and demonstration evaluations.

Technical assistance.—The recommendation includes up to \$40,000,000 for technical assistance. The Committee directs HUD to provide no less than 30 days’ advance notice to the House and Senate Committees on any cancellations it plans to make to Community Compass awards and simultaneously provide details on an appeals process for these grantees.

The Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity (FHEO) is responsible for developing policies and guidance, and for providing technical support for enforcement of the Fair Housing Act and the civil rights statutes. FHEO serves as the central point for the formulation, clearance and dissemination of policies, intra-departmental clearances, and public information related to fair housing issues. FHEO receives, investigates, conciliates, and recommends the issuance of charges of discrimination and determinations of non-compliance for complaints filed under Title VIII and other civil

rights authorities. Additionally, FHEO conducts civil rights compliance reviews.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$28,500,000 for the Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity. The following table provides funding levels for fair housing activities undertaken by the office:

Price fixing and anticompetitive practices by residential landlords.—The Committee directs the Office of Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity to submit a report to Congress, not later than 1 year after enactment of the act, identifying methods by which residential landlords may obtain, share, and distribute information including historical or contemporaneous prices, supply levels, or lease or rental contract termination and renewal dates of residential dwelling units, that may be used to set or modify rental unit prices in a non-competitive manner. The report shall evaluate methods by which such noncompetitive practices can be identified, and shall provide a list of recommendations to prevent future occurrences of noncompetitive rent price setting, including new enforcement authorities for HUD.

The Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes (OLHCHH) is responsible for the administration of the Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction program authorized by Title X of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992. Through the Healthy Homes Initiative (HHI), the office also addresses multiple housing-related hazards affecting the health of residents, particularly children. The office develops lead-based paint regulations, guidelines, and policies applicable to HUD programs, and enforces the Lead Disclosure Rule issued under Title X. For both lead-related and healthy homes issues, the office designs and administers programs for grants, training, research, demonstration, and education.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$295,600,000 for the Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes. Funding is provided in the amounts shown in the following table:

Asbestos in housing.—The Committee recognizes the potential impacts of building materials which contain asbestos on an individual’s health and safety. The Secretary is encouraged to engage regularly with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency and the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services to discuss potential strategies to mitigate the harms of building materials in homes that contain asbestos.

Lead hazard reduction interagency coordination.—The Committee urges HUD to strengthen collaboration with external public and private sector partners to ensure that lead hazard control efforts are integrated with broader housing rehabilitation and neighborhood revitalization strategies. The Committee directs HUD to provide a report within 180 days of enactment of this Act detailing current coordination efforts and opportunities to better align funding streams, inspection protocols, and remediation strategies across programs.

New financing mechanism pilot.—The Committee applauds the establishment of the new financing mechanism pilot under the Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes, which represents an important step toward modernizing financing tools available to address lead and other residential environmental stressors in low-income communities with older housing stock. The Committee recognizes the Department’s efforts to implement this pilot in a manner that encourages innovation, leverages non-Federal investment, and promotes effective stewardship of Federal resources. The Committee directs the Department to continue implementing this pilot, to evaluate its performance and outcomes, and to identify lessons learned that may inform future financing efforts. The Committee remains supportive of these endeavors and expects the Department to keep the Committee informed of the pilot’s progress and any recommendations for refinement or expansion.

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) provides agency-wide audit and investigative functions to identify and correct management and administrative deficiencies that create conditions for waste, fraud, and mismanagement. The audit function provides internal audit,

contract audit, and inspection services. Contract audits provide professional advice to agency contracting officials on accounting and financial matters related to negotiation, award, administration, re-pricing, and settlement of contracts. Internal audits evaluate all facets of agency operations. Inspection services provide detailed technical evaluations of agency operations. The investigative function provides for the detection and investigation of improper and illegal activities involving programs, personnel, and operations.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$143,000,000 for the Office of Inspector General.

Audit reports.—The Committee directs the OIG to continue transmitting all audit reports to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations immediately after they are issued, and to make the Committee aware immediately of any review that recommends significant budgetary savings.

Priority open recommendations.—The Committee continues to find the OIG's priority open recommendations to be a useful resource and encourages the OIG to update the report and accompanying dashboard on an ongoing basis.

Section 204 relates to the availability of funds for services and facilities for GSEs and others subject to the Government Corporation Control Act and the Housing Act, and to the expenditure of funds for corporations and agencies subject to the Government Corporation Control Act.

Section 205 prohibits the use of funds in excess of the budget estimates, unless provided otherwise.

Section 206 relates to the expenditure of funds for corporations and agencies subject to the Government Corporation Control Act.

Section 207 exempts GNMA from certain requirements of the Federal Credit Reform Act of 1990.

Section 208 authorizes HUD to transfer debt and use agreements from an obsolete project to a viable project, provided that no additional costs are incurred and other conditions are met.

Section 209 sets forth requirements for section 8 eligibility and includes consideration for persons with disabilities.

Section 210 distributes Native American housing block grants to the same Native Alaskan recipients as in fiscal year 2005.

Section 211 instructs HUD on managing and disposing of any multifamily property that is owned or held by HUD.

Section 212 allows PHAs that own and operate 400 or fewer units of public housing to be exempt from asset management requirements.

Section 213 restricts the Secretary from imposing any requirements or guidelines relating to asset management that restrict or limit the use of capital funds for central office costs.

Section 214 requires that no employee of the Department be designated as an allotment holder unless the CFO determines that such employee has received certain training.

Section 215 requires the Secretary to publish all notices of funding opportunities for competitively awarded funds and establishes how such notification may occur.

Section 216 requires attorney fees for programmatic litigation to be paid from the individual program office and Office of General Counsel salaries and expenses appropriations.

Section 217 allows the Secretary to transfer up to 10 percent of funds or \$5,000,000, whichever is less, appropriated under the headings "Administrative Support Offices" or "Program Offices" to any other office funded under such headings.

Section 218 requires HUD to take certain actions against owners receiving rental subsidies that do not maintain safe properties.

Section 219 places a salary and bonus limit on public housing agency officials and employees.

Section 220 requires the Secretary to notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations at least 3 full business days before grant awards are announced, including information by state and congressional district.

Section 221 prohibits funds for HUD financing of mortgages for properties that have been subject to eminent domain.

Section 222 prohibits the use of funds to terminate the status of a unit of general local government as a metropolitan city with respect to grants under section 106 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

Section 223 allows funding for research, evaluation, and statistical purposes that is unexpended at the time of completion of the contract, grant, or cooperative agreement to be re-obligated for additional research.

Section 224 prohibits funds for financial awards for employees subject to administrative discipline.

Section 225 allows program income as an eligible match for 2015 through 2027 continuum of care funds.

Section 226 permits HUD to provide one year transition grants under the continuum of care program.

Section 227 maintains current promise zone designations and agreements.

Section 228 addresses the establishment of reserves for public housing agencies designated as MTW agencies.

Section 229 prohibits funds from being used to make certain eligibility limitations as part of a notice of funding opportunity for competitive grant awards under the public housing fund.

Section 230 addresses the manner in which HUD may make adjustments for formula allocation corrections.

Section 231 allows for transfers to the Information Technology Fund.

Section 232 requires compliance with all process requirements when revising any annual contributions contract.

Section 233 prohibits the use of funds by HUD to issue a solicitation or accept bids on any solicitation that is substantially equivalent to the draft solicitation entitled "Housing Assistance Payments (HAP) Contract Support Services (HAPSS)" posted on July 27, 2022.

Section 234 clarifies the use of funds for the family self-sufficiency program.

Section 235 allows the Secretary to waive or specify alternatives for certain requirements for the mainstream and family unification voucher programs.

Section 236 prohibits the use of funds to direct a grantee to undertake specific changes to existing zoning laws as part of carrying out the interim final rule entitled "Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Revisions."

Section 237 applies whistleblower protections to funded contracts, consistent with 41 U.S.C. 4712.

Section 238 allows the Office of Housing to provide direct support to small properties and owners converting assistance under the rental assistance demonstration.

Section 239 requires that foregone increases to tenant rent payments due to resident participation in the jobs-plus program be factored into rental assistance renewal eligibility within the appropriate account.

Section 240 permits the Secretary to provide rent adjustments of not more than 3 percent for certain assisted properties.

Section 241 prohibits the use of funds to enforce the temporary moratorium on eviction filings.

Section 242 prohibits the implementation of certain minimum energy efficiency standards and notices.

Section 243 mandates a review of the implementation of the Build America, Buy America Act for certain activities.

Section 244 authorizes the Secretary to enter into recovery agreements with PHAs meeting certain requirements.

Section 245 prohibits the renewal of certain contracts after September 30, 2030.

Section 246 amends the "Rental Assistance Demonstration" by striking the fourth proviso.

Section 247 authorizes the Secretary to provide lump-sum payments under certain conditions.

Section 248 rescinds unobligated balances.

Section 249 extends the period of expenditure of certain prior year funds.

The United States Access Board [Access Board] was established by section 502 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 with the mission of promoting equality for people with disabilities through accessible design and the development of accessibility guidelines and standards for the built environment, transportation, communication, medical diagnostic equipment, and information technology.

The Access Board is responsible for developing guidelines under the Americans with Disabilities Act, the Architectural Barriers Act, and the Communications Act, as well as for developing standards under the Rehabilitation Act for accessible electronic and information technology used by Federal agencies. The Access Board enforces the Architectural Barriers Act and provides training and technical assistance on its guidelines and standards. The Access Board serves on the election assistance commission's board of advisors and technical guidelines development committee to assist in developing voluntary guidelines for voting systems, including accessibility for people with disabilities. Additionally, the Access Board maintains a small research program that develops technical assistance materials and provides information needed for rulemaking.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$9,955,000 for the Access Board.

Established in 1961, the Federal Maritime Commission [FMC] is an independent agency responsible for the regulation of oceanborne transportation in the foreign commerce of the United States. FMC monitors ocean common carriers, marine terminal operators, conferences, ports, and ocean transportation intermediaries to ensure they maintain just and reasonable practices. Among other activities, FMC also maintains a trade monitoring and enforcement program, monitors the laws and practices of foreign governments and their impacts on shipping conditions in the U.S., and enforces special regulatory requirements as they apply to controlled carriers.

The principal shipping statutes administered by FMC are the Shipping Act of 1984 (46 U.S.C. 40101–44106); the Foreign Shipping Practices Act of 1988 (46 U.S.C. 42301–42307); section 19 of the Merchant Marine Act, 1920 (46 U.S.C. 42101–42109); sections 2 and 3 of Public Law 89–777; section 834 of the Frank LoBiondo Coast Guard Authorization Act of 2018 (P.L. 115–82); and the Ocean Shipping Reform Act of 2022 (P.L. 117–146).

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$40,000,000 for the FMC. The Committee urges FMC to continue to assist U.S. exporters and importers, ocean transportation intermediaries, and truckers in engaging with vessel-operating common carriers and marine terminal operators, and as requested, intercede on their behalf in disputes with such entities.

The Office of Inspector General [OIG] is an independent, objective unit responsible for detecting and preventing fraud, waste, abuse, and violations of law and for promoting efficiencies and effectiveness at Amtrak.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides \$31,088,000 for the OIG. The recommendation will allow the OIG to undertake audits, evaluations, and investigations and will ensure effective oversight of Amtrak’s programs and operations. The OIG’s efforts have resulted in valuable reports and recommendations for the Committee and for Amtrak that have yielded cost savings and management improvements.

The National Transportation Safety Board [NTSB] is an independent Federal agency charged by Congress with investigating every civil aviation accident in the United States, as well as significant accidents in other modes of transportation—including railroad, highway, marine, and pipeline—and issuing safety recommendations aimed at preventing future accidents.

In addition to its investigatory duties, the NTSB is responsible for maintaining the government's database of civil aviation accidents and conducting special studies of transportation safety issues of national significance. Furthermore, in accordance with the provisions of international treaties, the NTSB supplies investigators to serve as U.S.-accredited representatives for aviation accidents overseas involving U.S.-registered aircraft or involving aircraft or major components of U.S. manufacture.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$175,000,000 for fiscal year 2027 and directs the NTSB to continue to prioritize the recruitment, hiring, and training of accident investigators as well as staff supporting accident investigations. The recommendation includes \$30,000,000 to support the relocation of NTSB headquarters.

Vulnerability assessments and risk reduction for bridges.—The Committee notes the findings of the NTSB regarding bridge vulnerabilities associated with vessel strikes in navigable waterways frequently transited by ocean-going vessels. The Committee recognizes that these findings underscore the importance of conducting vulnerability assessments and implementing risk reduction measures for bridges over navigable waterways in coordination with bridge owners and other relevant stakeholders.

The Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation (NRC) was created by the Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation Act (title VI of the Housing and Community Development Amendments of 1978). The NRC now operates under the trade name “NeighborWorks America” and helps local communities establish working partnerships between residents and representatives of the public and private sectors. These partnership-based organizations are independent, tax-exempt, community-based nonprofit entities, often referred to as NeighborWorks network organizations.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$125,000,000 for fiscal year 2027. The Committee does not recommend the wind-down of NeighborWorks operations, as proposed in the budget request. NeighborWorks is directed to provide appropriate resources for salaries and expenses and grants to the NeighborWorks Network.

Grant notifications.—Consistent with directives from previous years, NeighborWorks shall provide at least three days’ advance notice to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations prior to the announcement of a grant exceeding \$50,000 that is awarded to NeighborWorks network organization.

Oversight of NRC grants and operations.—The Committee appreciates efforts by NeighborWorks to strengthen its oversight capacity, including submitting recent semiannual reports to Congress and prompt publishing of financial audit reports, among others. The Committee directs NeighborWorks to continue these actions, as well as those enumerated in the joint explanatory statement accompanying in division F of P.L. 118–47.

The Surface Transportation Board [STB] was created by the ICC Termination Act of 1995 (P.L. 104–88) and is the successor agency to the Interstate Commerce Commission. The STB is an economic regulatory and adjudicatory body charged by Congress with resolving railroad rate and service disputes and reviewing proposed railroad mergers, and the regulation of other surface transportation carriers, including the intercity bus industry and surface pipeline carriers, and household-good carriers. The Surface Transportation Board Reauthorization Act of 2015 (P.L. 114–110) established the STB as a wholly independent agency.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommendation provides an appropriation of \$40,799,000 for the STB. The STB is estimated to collect \$1,250,000 in fees, which will offset the appropriation for a total program cost of \$39,549,000.

Jurisdiction and review of merger.—The Committee recognizes that the STB has exclusive jurisdiction to approve or disapprove railroad mergers under 49 U.S.C. §§ 11321–11328 and notes that if an application is accepted, the proposed Union Pacific–Norfolk Southern consolidation is expected to undergo STB review over a 12 to 18-month period. The Committee notes that the STB’s revised 2001 merger rules, which raised the regulatory bar for any future Class I mergers by requiring applicants to not only preserve rail-to-rail competition but deliver enhanced competitive options for railroad shippers, while also ensuring the proposal serves the public interest, have never been applied in a major Class I merger proceeding. The Committee urges the STB to conduct a rigorous and comprehensive review of the proposed transaction to ensure it delivers substantial public benefits, enhanced competition for rail shippers, and protections for the U.S. economy and consumers.

The mission of the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) is to coordinate multi-agency Federal response to homelessness.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recommends \$200,000 for fiscal year 2027 for the wind-down of the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness.

TITLE IV

GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS ACT

Section 401 prohibits the use of funds for the planning or execution of any program to pay the expenses of, or otherwise compensate, non-Federal parties intervening in regulatory or adjudicatory proceedings.

Section 402 prohibits the obligation of funds beyond the current fiscal year and the transfer of funds to other appropriations, unless expressly provided.

Section 403 limits consulting service expenditures through procurement contracts to those contracts contained in the public record, except where otherwise provided under existing law.

Section 404 prohibits funds from being used for certain types of employee training.

Section 405 specifies requirements for the reprogramming of funds and requires agencies to submit an operating plan to establish the baseline for the application of reprogramming and transfer authorities.

Section 406 provides that not to exceed 50 percent of unobligated balances for salaries and expenses may remain available until September 30, 2028, for each account for the purposes authorized, subject to the approval of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations.

Section 407 prohibits the use of funds for any project that seeks to use the power of eminent domain unless eminent domain is employed only for public use.

Section 408 prohibits funds from being transferred to any department, agency, or instrumentality of the U.S. Government, except where transfer authority is provided in this or any other appropriations act.

Section 409 prohibits funds from being used by an entity unless the expenditure complies with the Buy American Act.

Section 410 prohibits funds from being made available to any person or entity that has been convicted of violating the Buy American Act.

Section 411 prohibits funds from being used for first-class airline accommodations in contravention of sections 301–10.122 and 301–10.123 of title 41, Code of Federal Regulations.

Section 412 restricts the number of employees that agencies may send to international conferences unless such attendance is important to the national interest.

Section 413 caps the amount of fees the STB can charge or collect for rate or practice complaints filed at the amount authorized for district court civil suit filing fees.

Section 414 prohibits funds from being used to maintain or establish computer networks unless such networks block the viewing, downloading, or exchange of pornography.

Section 415 prohibits funds from being used to deny an Inspector General timely access to any records, documents, or other materials available to the department or agency over which that Inspector General has responsibilities, or to prevent or impede that Inspector General's access to such records, documents, or other materials.

Section 416 prohibits funds from being used to pay award or incentive fees for contractors whose performance is below satisfactory, behind schedule, over budget, or failed to meet requirements of the contract, with exceptions.

Section 417 prohibits funds from being used to permanently replace an employee intent on returning to his or her past occupation following completion of military service.

Section 418 prohibits funds from being used for the approval of a new foreign air carrier permit or exemption application if that approval would contravene United States law or Article 17 bis of the U.S.-E.U.-Iceland-Norway Air Transport Agreement.

Section 419 prohibits funds from being used to contravene 42 U.S.C. 1436a and 8 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.

Section 420 prohibits the use of funds in this Act and the IJA for activities designed to support or defeat legislation pending before Congress, other than in normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships.

Section 421 sets conditions on the purchase of promotional materials.

Section 422 requires the Departments to submit quarterly financial reports.

Section 423 makes technical corrections to Congressionally designated projects.

Section 424 establishes a spending reduction account.

No provision of this bill establishes or reauthorizes a program of the Federal Government known to be duplicative of another Federal program, a program that was included in any report from the Government Accountability Office to Congress pursuant to section 21 of Public Law 111-139, or a program related to a program identified in the most recent Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance.

CHANGES IN THE APPLICATION OF EXISTING LAW

Pursuant to clause 3(f)(1)(A) of rule XIII of the Rules of the House of Representatives, the following statements are submitted describing the effect of provisions in the accompanying bill that directly or indirectly change the application of existing law. The bill includes a number of provisions which place limitations on the use of funds in the bill or change existing limitations and that might, under some circumstances, be construed as changing the application of existing law:

TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Salaries and Expenses” which specifies certain amounts for the Office of the Secretary and official reception and representation expenses, specifies the period of availability of those funds, species transfer authority among individual offices of the Office of the Secretary, clarifies reprogramming requirements, consolidates certain offices, and allows up to \$2,500,000 in user fees to be credited to the account.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Research and Technology” which limits the availability of funds, changes the availability of funds, provides funds for specified activities, allows funds received from other entities to be credited to the account, and deems the title of the office.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “National Infrastructure Investments” which appropriates grant funding for surface transportation infrastructure to be competitively awarded at the discretion of the Secretary, limits the availability of funds, specifies grantee and project eligibility requirements, provides a portion of funds for certain areas, specifies minimum and maximum grant sizes, sets aside amounts for specified activities, estab-

lishes minimum funding amounts for certain projects meeting certain criteria, and transfers funds from Public Law 117-58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “National Surface Transportation and Innovative Finance Bureau” which makes funding available until expended, allows fees received from other entities to be credited to the account, and authorizes the Secretary to use funds for departmental administrative costs.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Rural and Tribal Infrastructure Advancement” which allows the Secretary to enter into cooperative agreements with certain entities for technical assistance activities.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “DC Safe and Beautiful” which authorizes and appropriates funds for certain activities related to certain D.C. transportation facilities, limits the availability of funds, transfers funds from Public Law 117-58, and designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Railroad Rehabilitation and Improvement Financing Program” which authorizes the Secretary to issue direct loans and loan guarantees under chapter 224 of title 49, United States Code.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Financial Management Capital” which provides funds for financial systems and business process upgrades and changes the availability of funds.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Cyber Security Initiatives” which provides funds for information technology security upgrades and changes the availability of funds.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Transportation Planning, Research, and Development” which provides funds for conducting transportation planning, research, and development activities and making grants, changes the availability of funds, specifies funding minimums for and authorities related to the Interagency Infrastructure Permitting Improvement Center, and the Drone Infrastructure Inspection Grant Program Language is included under the Office of the Secretary that limits operating costs and capital outlays of the Working Capital Fund (WCF) for the Department of Transportation (DOT); provides that services shall be provided on a competitive basis, except for non-DOT entities or funds provided in Public Law 117-58; restricts the transfer for any funds to the Working Capital Fund with certain approvals; and limits special assessments or reimbursable agreements levied against any program, project, or activity funded in this Act to only those assessments or reimbursable agreements that are presented to and approved by the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations; allows consolidation of non-commodity IT and procurement; sets terms for consolidation of these activities; requires briefings and budgetary information to be provided to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations regarding these activities; limits WCF services to only those specified.

Language is included under the Office of the Secretary, “Payments to Air Carriers” which allows the Secretary of Transportation to consider subsidy requirements when determining service to a community, eliminates the requirement that carriers use at least 15-passenger aircraft, prohibits funds for communities within

a certain distance of a small hub airport without a cost-share, allows amounts to be made available from the Federal Aviation Administration, and allows the reimbursement of such amounts from overflight fees.

Section 101 prohibits the Office of the Secretary of Transportation from approving assessments or reimbursable agreements pertaining to funds appropriated to the operating administrations in this Act unless such assessments or agreements have completed the normal reprogramming process for congressional notification.

Section 102 requires the Secretary to post on the internet a schedule of all Council on Credit and Finance meetings, agendas, and meeting minutes.

Section 103 allows the Department's WCF to provide payments in advance to vendors for the Federal transit pass fringe benefit program and to provide full or partial payments to, and to accept reimbursements from, Federal agencies for transit benefit distribution services.

Section 104 allows the Department's WCF to utilize not more than \$1,000,000 in fiscal year 2024 unused transit and van pool benefits to provide contractual services in support of section 189 of this Act.

Section 105 prohibits the use of funds for certain employee bonuses without the prior written approval of the Assistant Secretary for Administration.

Section 106 permits the WCF to transfer certain information technology, equipment, software, and systems under certain circumstances.

Section 107 requires congressional notification before the Department provides credit assistance under the Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act program.

Section 108 allows the secretary to transfer and consolidate administrative resources for certain programs.

Section 109 allows the Operating Administrations to transfer funds to the Office of Tribal Government Affairs for tribal entities who receive funding under an intergovernmental compact through the Tribal Transportation Self Governance program.

Section 109A modifies amount of funding set aside for planning under the Safe Streets and Roads for All program.

Section 109B specifies funds for related expenses for the Department's Headquarters.

Language is included under Federal Aviation Administration, "Operations" that specifies funds for certain activities; limits the availability of funds; derives funds from the General Fund and the Airport and Airway Trust Fund; specifies reprogramming authorities among activities; requires various staffing plans by a certain date with financial penalties for late submissions; permits the use of funds to enter into a grant agreement with a nonprofit standard setting organization to develop aviation safety standards; prohibits the use of funds for new applicants of the second career training program; prohibits funds to plan, finalize, or implement any regulation that would promulgate new aviation user fees not specifically authorized by law; credits funds received from other entities for expenses incurred in the provision of agency services; and specifies funds for the contract tower program; and prohibits funds from certain activities coordinated through the Working Capital Fund.

Language is included under Federal Aviation Administration, “Facilities and Equipment” that specifies funds for certain activities; derives funds from the Airport and Airway Trust Fund; transfers in funds from Public Law 117-58; limits the availability of funds; credits funds received from other entities for expenses incurred in the modernization of air navigation systems; and requires a capital investment plan.

Language is included under Federal Aviation Administration, “Research, Engineering, and Development” that derives funds from the Airport and Airway Trust Fund; limits the availability of funds; credits funds received from other entities for expenses incurred for in research, engineering, and development to the account; requires funds to be used in accordance with the report accompanying this Act; and specifies reprogramming authorities.

Language is included under Federal Aviation Administration, “Grants-in-aid for Airports” that provides funds from the Airport and Airway Trust Fund and from the General Fund; specifies the availability of funds; prohibits funds for certain activities; sets a cost share requirement on certain airport construction projects; limits the availability of funds for certain activities; allows the participation of certain additional airports; allows funds to be used for administrative expenses, research, and the “Small Community Air Service Development Program”; defines airport eligibility; and allows funds to be transferred to the Office of the Secretary to carry out the small community air service development program.

Section 110 allows no more than 600 technical staff-years at the center for advanced aviation systems development.

Section 111 prohibits funds from being used to adopt guidelines or regulations requiring airport sponsors to provide FAA “without cost” building construction space, and related accommodation services.

Section 112 allows reimbursement for fees collected and credited under 49 U.S.C. 45303.

Section 113 allows reimbursement of funds for providing technical assistance to foreign aviation authorities to be credited to the operations account.

Section 114 prohibits funds from being used for Sunday premium pay unless work was performed on a Sunday.

Section 115 prohibits funds from being used to buy store gift cards with Government-issued credit cards.

Section 116 requires, upon the request of an owner or operator, the Secretary to block the identifying information of an owner or operator’s aircraft in any flight tracking display to the public.

Section 117 prohibits funds from being used for salaries and expenses of more than nine political and Presidential appointees in the FAA.

Section 118 prohibits funds from being used to increase fees under 49 U.S.C. 44721 until the FAA provides a report to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations that justifies all fees related to aeronautical navigation products and explains how such fees are consistent with Executive Order 13642.

Section 119 requires the FAA to notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations at least 90 days before closing a regional operations center or reducing the services provided.

Section 119A prohibits funds from being used to change weight restrictions or prior permission rules at Teterboro Airport in New Jersey.

Section 119B prohibits funds from being used to withhold from consideration and approval certain applications for participation in the contract tower program or for certain reevaluations of cost-share program participation.

Section 119C prohibits funds from being used to open, close, redesignate, or reorganize a regional office, aeronautical center, or technical center subject to the normal reprogramming requirements outlined under section 405 of this Act.

Section 119D specifies requirements related to FAA organizational units.

Section 119E allows funds from the "Grants-in-Aid for Airports" account to reimburse airports affected by temporary flight restrictions for residences of the President.

Section 119F specifies terms for a transfer of air traffic systems or equipment.

Section 119G prohibits funds for the privatization or separation of the air traffic organization from the FAA.

Section 119H prohibits funds for a second air traffic control training academy.

Section 119I allows an increase of the annual rate of pay for positions in the Office of Aerospace Medicine.

Section 119J requires a spend plan and briefing on activities funded by this act and by section 40003 of P.L. 119-21 for air traffic control modernization efforts.

Section 119K sets conditions for investments under P.L. 119-21.

Section 119L limits funds related to commercial space activities.

Language is included under the Federal Highway Administration, "Limitation on Administrative Expenses" which limits the amount to be paid, together with advances and reimbursements received, for the administrative expenses of the agency or transferred to the Appalachian Regional Commission for administrative expenses associated with the Appalachian Development Highway System.

Language is included under the Federal Highway Administration, "Federal-aid Highways" which limits the obligations for Federal-aid highways and highway safety construction programs.

Language is included under the Federal Highway Administration, "Federal-aid Highways" which liquidates contract authority from the Highway Trust Fund.

Language is included under the Federal Highway Administration, "Highway Infrastructure Programs" which authorizes and appropriates additional amounts. Language modifies various statutory requirements for certain funding and specifies the availability of funds; and allocates funding for the Nationally Significant Multimodal Freight and Highway Projects program.

Section 120 distributes obligation authority among Federal-aid highways programs.

Section 121 credits funds received by the Bureau of Transportation Statistics to the Federal-aid highways account.

Section 122 provides requirements for any waiver of the Buy America requirements.

Section 123 requires 60-day notification to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations of any grants as authorized under 23 U.S.C. 117.

Section 124 allows state departments of transportation to repurpose certain highway project funding to be used within 25 miles of its original designation.

Section 125 prohibits funds for automated traffic enforcement cameras with exceptions.

Language is included under the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, "Motor Carrier Safety Operations and Programs" which provides a limitation on obligations and liquidation of contract authorization, changes the availability of funds, and specifies amounts available for specific activities.

Language is included under the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, "Motor Carrier Safety Grants" which provides limitation on obligations and liquidation of contract authorization, modifies the availability of certain funds, and specifies amounts available for various programs.

Section 130 prohibits funds from being used to enforce the electronic logging device rule with respect to carriers transporting livestock or insects.

Section 131 prohibits funds from being used to require the use of inward facing cameras as a condition for the apprenticeship pilot program.

Section 132 prohibits funds to be used to modify the preemption determinations published by FMSCSA.

Language is included under National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, "Operations and Research" which provides funds for vehicle safety activities, modifies the period of availability of certain funds, transfers unobligated balances, and designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5.

Language is included under National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, "Operations and Research" which provides a limitation on obligations and a liquidation of contract authorization from the Highway Trust Fund, transfers funds, specifies amounts for various programs, modifies the period of availability of certain funds; and specifies that amounts for certain activities are in addition to any other funds provided for such purposes in this Act.

Language is included under National Highway Traffic Safety Administration "Highway Traffic Safety Grants" which provides a limitation on obligations, changes the availability of funds, provides a liquidation of contract authorization from the Highway Trust Fund, specifies the amounts for various programs, prohibits and limits funds for specific purposes, and requires certain congressional notifications.

Section 140 exempts from the current fiscal year's obligation limitation any obligation authority that was made available in previous public laws.

Section 141 prohibits any funds provided under this heading to be used to encourage illegal drug or alcohol use in the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's impaired driving advertising campaigns.

Section 142 allows administrative funds from P.L. 117-58 and funds provided under this heading to be used for technical assistance.

Language is included under Federal Railroad Administration, “Safety and Operations” which provides funds and funding availability.

Language is included under Federal Railroad Administration, “Railroad Research and Development” which provides funds, provides funding availability, and allows the use of funding for specific purposes.

Language is included under Federal Railroad Administration, “Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements” which provides funds and funding availability, sets aside amounts for specified purposes, transfers funds from Public Law 117–58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118–5, expands project eligibility, and modifies preference relating to the Federal share of projects receiving awards, allows funds to be used for railroad systems planning, allows funds selected for commuter rail passenger transportation to be transferred by the Secretary to appropriate agencies, allows unobligated balances remaining after six years to be used for any eligible project, and allows the Secretary to withhold funding for a specified purpose.

Language is included under Federal Railroad Administration, “Railroad Crossing Elimination Program” which provides funds and funding availability, transfers funds from Public Law 117–58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118–5, allows a portion of funds to be available for certain activities, allows the Secretary to withhold funding for a specified purpose, and sets aside amounts for specified activities.

Language is included under Federal Railroad Administration, “Northeast Corridor Grants to the National Railroad Passenger Corporation” which provides funds and funding availability, transfers funds from Public Law 117–58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118–5, and allows the Secretary to withhold funding for specified purposes.

Language is included under Federal Railroad Administration, “National Network Grants to the National Railroad Passenger Corporation” which provides funding and funding availability, transfers funds from Public Law 117–58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118–5, allows the Secretary to retain funding to fund expenses associated with the State-Supported Route Committee.

Section 150 allows the Federal Railroad Administration to transfer certain amounts made available in this and prior Acts to the financial assistance oversight and technical assistance account to support the award, administration, project management oversight, and technical assistance of grants administered by the Federal Railroad Administration, with an exception.

Section 151 specifies certain restrictions and reporting requirements for the use of funds to pay for certain overtime costs.

Section 152 prohibits the National Railroad Passenger Corporation from using funds to reduce the total number of uniformed Amtrak Police Department officers below the staffing level on May 1, 2019.

Section 153 permits the Union Station Redevelopment Corporation to be eligible for the Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail Program and reiterates requirements of Public Law 97–125.

Section 154 prohibits funds from being used for high-speed rail in Texas.

Section 155 provides flexibility in transfer authority described under section 22909 of Title 49, United States Code.

Section 156 requires certain reporting from Amtrak regarding its budget.

Language is included under Federal Transit Administration, "Transit Formula Grants" which provides a limitation on obligations from the Highway Trust Fund, and for the liquidation of contract authority.

Language is included under Federal Transit Administration, "Transit Infrastructure Grants" which provides funding and funding availability for certain activities, specifies the Federal share for those activities, limits the availability and use of funds, transfers funds from Public Law 117-58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5, and clarifies that such funding is not subject to any limitation on obligations.

Language is included under Federal Transit Administration, "Technical Assistance and Training" which provides funding and funding availability for certain activities, specifies that such funding is in addition to any other amounts for such purposes, and clarifies that such funding is not subject to any limitation on obligations.

Language is included under Federal Transit Administration, "Capital Investment Grants" which provides funding and funding, specifies amounts for activities authorized by 49 U.S.C. 5309 and section 3005(b) of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act, requires fund to be used in accordance with the report accompanying this Act, sets limits on transfer authority, requires the Secretary to continue to administer the program pursuant to 49 U.S.C. 5309, transfers funds from Public Law 117-58, designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5.

Language is included under Federal Transit Administration, "Grants to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority" which provides funding and funding availability, requires the Secretary to review projects before a grant is made, and requires the Secretary to place the highest priority on safety investments.

Section 160 exempts previously made transit obligations from limitations on obligations.

Section 161 allows funds provided in this Act that remain unobligated by September 30, 2030, for capital investment grants projects to be available for other projects to use the funds for the purposes for which they were originally provided.

Section 162 allows for the transfer of appropriations made prior to October 1, 2026, from older accounts to be merged into new accounts with similar, current activities.

Section 163 prohibits funds to be used to adjust appointments or withhold funds from appointments pursuant to section 9503(e)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. 9503(e)(4)).

Section 164 prohibits the use of funds for awarding a contract or subcontract to an entity that meets criteria described in 49 U.S.C. 5323(u).

Language is included under Great Lakes St. Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation which authorizes expenditures, contracts, and commitments as may be necessary.

Language is included under Great Lakes St. Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation, "Operations and Maintenance" which provides funds derived from the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund and specifies a certain amount for the seaway infrastructure program. Language allows the Secretary to use unobligated balances from prior Acts for a specified purpose.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Maritime Security Program" which provides funds and funding availability.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Cable Security Fleet" which provides funds and funding availability.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Tanker Security Program" which provides funds and funding availability. It also includes a rescission of funds.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Operations and Training" which provides funds for specific purposes, limits funding availability, requires submission of the annual report on sexual assault and harassment at the United States Merchant Marine Academy, submission of a report on the Capital Improvement Plan, and allows the use of prior year recoveries for specific purposes.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "State Maritime Academy Operations" which provides funds for specific purposes, and limits funding availability.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Assistance to Small Shipyards" which provides funds and funding availability, transfers funds from Public Law 117-58, and designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Ship Disposal" which provides funds and funding availability.

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Maritime Guaranteed Loan (Title XI) Program Account" which provides funds, and transfers and merges funds with "Maritime Administration—Operations and Training".

Language is included under Maritime Administration, "Port Infrastructure Development Program" for funding and funding availability, transfers funds from Public Law 117-58, and designates funding in accordance with Public Law 118-5.

Section 170 authorizes the Maritime Administration to furnish utilities and services and to make necessary repairs in connection with any lease, contract, or occupancy involving government property under control of the Maritime Administration and allows payments received to be credited to the Treasury and to remain available until expended.

Language is included under Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, "Operational Expenses" which provides funding and funding availability.

Language is included under Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, "Hazardous Materials Safety" which provides funding and funding availability, allows fees collected under section 5108(g) of title 49, United States Code, to be deposited in the general fund of the Treasury, and allows credits to this appropriation for funds received from other entities for certain expenses.

Language is included under Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, "Pipeline Safety" which specifies amounts derived from the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund, the Pipeline Safety

Fund, the Liquefied Natural Gas Siting Account, the Pipeline Safety Design Review Account, and the Underground Natural Gas Storage Facility Safety Account; limits availability of funds; specifies a minimum amount for certain activities; specifies notification requirements for certain activities; requires the Secretary to complete certain reports and plans; and limits funding for certain purposes pending approval of such reports and plans.

Language is included under Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration, "Emergency Preparedness Grants" which specifies the amount derived from the Emergency Preparedness Fund, limits the availability of funds, allows up to four percent of funds for administrative costs, and allows the use of prior year recoveries for certain activities.

Language is included under Office of Inspector General, "Salaries and Expenses" which provides funding and provides the Inspector General with all necessary, independent authority to investigate allegations of fraud by any person or entity that is subject to regulation by the Department of Transportation.

Section 180 provides authorization for the Department of Transportation to maintain and operate aircraft, hire passenger motor vehicles and aircraft, purchase liability insurance, pay for uniforms, and purchase and operate unmanned aircraft systems.

Section 181 limits appropriations for services authorized by section 3109 of title 5, United States Code, up to the rate permitted for an executive level IV.

Section 182 prohibits recipients of funds in this Act from disseminating personal information obtained by state DMVs in connection to motor vehicle records with an exception.

Section 183 prohibits funds in this Act for salaries and expenses of more than 125 political and presidential appointees in the Department of Transportation.

Section 184 stipulates that revenue collected by the Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Railroad Administration from states, counties, municipalities, other public authorities, and private sources for training may be credited to specific accounts within the agencies with an exception for state rail safety inspectors participating in training.

Section 185 prohibits the Department of Transportation from using funds made available by this Act or in title VIII of division J of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (P.L. 117-58) to make a loan, loan guarantee, line of credit, letter of intent, Federally funded cooperative agreement, full funding grant agreement, or discretionary grant unless the Department of Transportation gives a 3-day advance notice to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations. The provision requires the Department of Transportation to provide a comprehensive list of all such loans, loan guarantees, lines of credit, letters of intent, Federally funded cooperative agreements, full funding grant agreements, and discretionary grants that will be announced with a 3-day advance notice to the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations. The provision also requires concurrent notice of any "quick release" of funds from the Federal Highway Administration's emergency relief program and prohibits notifications from involving funds not available for obligation.

Section 186 allows funds received from rebates, refunds, and similar sources to be credited to appropriations of the Department of Transportation.

Section 187 requires reprogramming actions to be approved or denied by the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations, and reprogramming notifications shall be transmitted solely to the Appropriations Committees.

Section 188 allows funds appropriated to operating administrations to be obligated for the Office of the Secretary for costs related to assessments only when such funds provide a direct benefit to the operating administrations.

Section 189 authorizes the Secretary to carry out a program that establishes uniform standards for developing and supporting agency transit pass and transit benefits, including distribution of transit benefits.

Section 190 allows the use of funds to assist a contract utilizing geographic, economic, or other hiring preference not otherwise authorized by law, only if certain requirements are met related to availability of local labor, displacement of existing employees, and delays in transportation plans.

Section 191 directs the Secretary of Transportation to work with the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of Commerce to ensure that best practices for industrial control systems procurement are up to date and that systems procured with funds provided under this title were procured using such practices.

Section 192 prohibits the use of funds to be used in contravention of the American Security Drone Act of 2023.

Section 193 prohibits funds to be used to enforce a mask mandate in response to the COVID-19 virus.

Section 194 prohibits funds to facilitate scheduled air transportation to, or pass through, property confiscated by the Cuban government.

Section 195 prohibits funds to be used to license, facilitate, coordinate, or allow officials of a country designated as a state sponsor of terrorism to observe, tour, visit, or confer with the employees of the Department of Transportation, including the Federal Aviation Administration.

Section 196 prohibits financial assistance to any organization that disseminates advertisements from any entity headquartered in China.

Section 197 prohibits funds for the Department of Transportation to use artificial intelligence to transcribe or record communications with the Appropriations Committee.

TITLE II—DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, “Management and Administration”, “Executive Offices” which provides funding and funding availability for Executive Offices and limits funds available for reception and representation expenses.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, “Management and Administration”, “Administrative Support Offices” which allows funds for certain administrative expenses.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Management and Administration", "Program Offices" which specifies the period of availability of funds and allows the use of funds for promotional activities.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Information Technology Fund" which specifies the period of availability and purpose of funds.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Tenant-Based Rental Assistance" which specifies funds for certain programs, activities and purposes and limits the use and availability of certain funds; specifies the methodology for allocation of renewal funding (including renewals of enhanced vouchers); directs the Secretary to provide renewal funding based on validated voucher system leasing and cost data for the prior year; directs the Secretary, to the extent necessary, to prorate each public housing agencies (PHA) allocation; directs the Secretary to notify PHAs of their annual budget the later of 60 days after enactment of the Act or March 1, 2027; allows the Secretary to extend the notification period with the prior approval of the House and Senate appropriations committees; specifies the amounts available to the Secretary to allocate to PHAs that need additional funds and for fees; provides funding for public housing agencies with vouchers that were not in use during the previous 12 month period in order to be available to meet a commitment pursuant to section 8(o)(13); provides that amounts made available under this paragraph may be available to provide calendar year 2027 assistance to public housing agencies that would otherwise be required to terminate Emergency Housing Voucher assistance for families as a result of insufficient funding; provides funding for various adjustments in the allocations for public housing agencies; allows the total number of unit months under lease to exceed a Moving to Work (MTW) PHA's authorized level of units under contract; and provides funding for public housing agencies that despite taking reasonable measures, would otherwise be required to terminate assistance for families as a result of insufficient funding.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Tenant-Based Rental Assistance" which provides funds for tenant protection vouchers; sets certain conditions for the Secretary to provide such vouchers; provides funds for residents of multi-family properties that would not otherwise have been eligible for tenant-protection vouchers; sets eligibility requirements for multi-family properties to participate in the program; requires the Secretary to issue guidance on requirements; and sets conditions for the reissuance of vouchers.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Tenant-Based Rental Assistance" which provides funds for administrative and other expenses of public housing agencies to administer the section 8 tenant-based rental assistance program; sets an amount to be available to PHAs that need additional funds to administer their section 8 programs, including fees to administer tenant protection assistance, Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing vouchers and other special purpose vouchers; provides for the distribution of funds; provides for a uniform percentage decrease of amounts to be allocated if funds are not sufficient; establishes that MTW agencies be funded pursuant to their MTW

agreements and in accordance with the requirements of the MTW program; and requires the Secretary to track special purpose vouchers.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Tenant-Based Rental Assistance" which provides funds and sets certain conditions for the family unification program and provides special conditions for providing funds for eligible youth.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Housing Certificate Fund" which rescinds prior year funds and allows the Secretary to use recaptures to fund project-based contracts and performance-based contract administrators.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Public Housing Fund" which specifies the total amount available for certain activities; limits the availability of funds; limits the delegation of certain waiver authorities; specifies an amount for administrative and judicial receiverships; and specifies an amount for emergency capital needs, and for safety and security measures.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Assisted Housing Inspections and Risk Assessments" which provides funding, limits availability of funds.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Self-Sufficiency Programs" which provides funding, limits availability of funds, allows the use of recaptured amounts, allows the Secretary to waive or specify certain requirements, establishes entities eligible to compete for funding, allows the establishment of escrow funds and utilization of rent incentives, allows the use of residual receipt accounts to hire coordinators for a number of sufficiency programs, and includes Project-based Rental Assistance properties as eligible entities for funding provided in this and prior Acts for family self-sufficiency coordinators.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Native American Programs" which provides funding and limits availability of funds. Language specifies amounts and conditions for the Native American Housing Block Grants formula program, guaranteed notes and obligations as defined in section 502 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, the Indian Community Development Block Grant program, and training and technical assistance. Language authorizes and appropriates funding for competitive grants through the Native American Housing Block Grants program to be awarded at the discretion of the Secretary, specifies considerations for the Secretary in making funding awards, and authorizes the use of additional amounts in prior Acts for administrative expenses. Language specifies amounts and conditions for rental assistance and administrative costs associated with tribal veteran vouchers.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Indian Housing Loan Guarantee Fund Program Account" which specifies the amount and availability of funds to subsidize total loan principal, specifies how to define the costs of modifying loans, sets a total loan principal, and allows the use of unobligated balances remaining from amounts made available under prior Acts for the cost of guaranteed loans.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Native Hawaiian Housing Loan Guarantee Fund Program Account" which sets a total loan principal and allows the Secretary to make commitments to refinance loans.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS" which limits availability of funds and requires grantee notification of formula allocations.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Community Development Fund" which limits the use and availability of certain funds; specifies the allocation of certain funds; prohibits grant recipients from selling, trading, or transferring funds; prohibits the provision of funds to for-profit entities for economic development projects unless certain conditions are met; specifies an amount for activities authorized under section 8071 of the SUPPORT Act; requires grantee notification of formula allocations; and provides funding for certain community projects specified in the report.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Community Development Loan Guarantees Program Account" which limits the principal amount of loan guarantees, directs the Secretary to collect fees from borrowers adequate to result in credit subsidy cost of zero, allows the Section 108 loan guarantee program to guarantee notes or other obligations issued by any State on behalf of non-entitlement communities in the State, and provides funds for competitive economic development grants for certain projects and allows for the reimbursement of eligible expenses related to these grants.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Home Investment Partnerships Program" which limits the availability of funds; specifies the allocation of certain funds for certain purposes; requires grantee notification; prohibits sections 218(g) and 231(b) of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act from applying with respect to the right of a jurisdiction to draw HOME funds that otherwise expired or would expire, or uninvested funds that were deducted or would be deducted, in 2020 through 2028; and waives certain requirements pertaining to Community Development Fund, Self-Help, and Assisted Homeownership Opportunity Fund, Public Housing Fund, and Native American Programs.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Self-help and Assisted Homeownership Opportunity Program" which provides funding; limits availability of funds; specifies funding amounts for certain programs, rural activities, and organizations; and allows multiyear agreements for certain programs subject to the availability of annual appropriations.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Homeless Assistance Grants" which limits the availability of funds, specifies the allocation of certain funds for certain purposes, specifies matching requirements, requires the Secretary to establish minimum performance thresholds for projects, requires the Secretary to prioritize funding to grant applicants that demonstrate a capacity to reallocate funding to higher performing projects, requires the Secretary to provide incentives for grantees to integrate homeless programs with other social service providers,

and requires notification of formula allocations. It also provides for homeless data and particularly discusses homeless youth.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Project-based Rental Assistance" which provides funds and funding availability, provides for some advance appropriations, specifies eligible activities, allows the cost associated with any foregone increases in tenant rent payments due to the implementation of rent incentives of the Job-Plus initiative to be included in housing assistance payments, specifies amounts for certain purposes, and allows the Secretary to recapture residual receipts from certain properties.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Housing for the Elderly" which limits the availability of funds; specifies the allocation of certain funds; designates certain funds to be used only for certain grants; allows the Secretary to give preference to capital advance projects under certain conditions; allows funds to be used to renew certain contracts; allows the Secretary to waive certain provisions governing contract terms and for intergenerational dwelling units; allows excess funds held in residual receipts accounts, after contract termination, to be deposited in this account for transferred purposes; allows for funding to be used for service coordinators, and limits the availability and use of these funds.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Housing for Persons with Disabilities" which limits the availability of funds, specifies the allocation of certain funds, allows the Secretary to give preference to capital advance projects under certain conditions, allows for certain repurposing of transferred funds, and allows funds to be used to renew certain contracts.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Payment to Manufactured Housing Fees Trust Fund" which permits fees to be assessed, modified, and collected for dispute resolution and installation programs; permits temporary borrowing authority from the general fund of the Treasury; provides that general fund amounts from collections offset the appropriation so that the resulting appropriation is a specified amount; requires fees collected to be deposited into the Manufactured Housing Fees Trust Fund; allows fees to be used for necessary expenses and limits their availability; and allows the Secretary to use approved service providers.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Mutual Mortgage Insurance Program Account" which limits new commitments to issue guarantees, limits new obligations to make direct loans, specifies that the Secretary may insure specific mortgages only under certain conditions, and limits the availability of funds.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "General and Special Risk Program Account" which limits new commitments to issue guarantees, limits new obligations to make direct loans, and limits the availability of funds.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Government National Mortgage Association" which limits new commitments to issue guarantees, provides funds for salaries and expenses derived from offsetting collections, allows

specified receipts to be credited as offsetting collections, and limits the availability of funds.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Policy Development and Research" which limits the availability of funds, specifies authorized uses, allows the Secretary to enter into cooperative agreements under specified circumstances, directs the submission of a spend plan, and prohibits funding for a specified use.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity" which provides or prohibits funds for certain purposes, limits the availability of funds, authorizes the Secretary to assess and collect fees, and for other purposes.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes" which specifies the period of availability of funds, specifies the amount of funds for specific purposes, specifies the treatment of certain grants, specifies a matching requirement for grants, requires a certification of adequate capacity, and authorizes the transfer of funds for the purposes of conducting research and studies.

Language is included under Department of Housing and Urban Development, "Office of Inspector General" which specifies the use of funds and directs that the Inspector General shall have independent authority over all personnel issues within the office.

Section 201 splits overpayments evenly between the Treasury and state HFAs.

Section 202 prohibits funds from being used to investigate or prosecute lawful activities under the Fair Housing Act.

Section 203 requires any grant or cooperative agreement to be made on a competitive basis, unless otherwise provided, in accordance with section 102 of the Department of Housing and Urban Development Reform Act of 1989.

Section 204 relates to the availability of funds for services and facilities for GSEs and others subject to the Government Corporation Control Act and the Housing Act, and to the expenditure of funds for corporations and agencies subject to the Government Corporation Control Act.

Section 205 prohibits the use of funds in excess of the budget estimates, unless provided otherwise.

Section 206 relates to the expenditure of funds for corporations and agencies subject to the Government Corporation Control Act.

Section 207 exempts GNMA from certain requirements of the Federal Credit Reform Act of 1990.

Section 208 authorizes HUD to transfer debt and use agreements from an obsolete project to a viable project, provided that no additional costs are incurred and other conditions are met.

Section 209 sets forth requirements for section 8 eligibility and includes consideration for persons with disabilities.

Section 210 distributes Native American housing block grants to the same Native Alaskan recipients as in fiscal year 2005.

Section 211 instructs HUD on managing and disposing of any multifamily property that is owned or held by HUD.

Section 212 allows PHAs that own and operate 400 or fewer units of public housing to be exempt from asset management requirements.

Section 213 restricts the Secretary from imposing any requirements or guidelines relating to asset management that restrict or limit the use of capital funds for central office costs.

Section 214 requires that no employee of the Department be designated as an allotment holder unless the CFO determines that such employee has received certain training.

Section 215 requires the Secretary to publish all notices of funding opportunities for competitively awarded funds and establishes how such notification may occur.

Section 216 requires attorney fees for programmatic litigation to be paid from the individual program office and Office of General Counsel salaries and expenses appropriations.

Section 217 allows the Secretary to transfer up to 10 percent of funds or \$5,000,000, whichever is less, appropriated under the headings "Administrative Support Offices" or "Program Offices" to any other office funded under such headings.

Section 218 requires HUD to take certain actions against owners receiving rental subsidies that do not maintain safe properties.

Section 219 places a salary and bonus limit on public housing agency officials and employees.

Section 220 requires the Secretary to notify the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations at least 3 full business days before grant awards are announced, including information by state and congressional district.

Section 221 prohibits funds for HUD financing of mortgages for properties that have been subject to eminent domain.

Section 222 prohibits the use of funds to terminate the status of a unit of general local government as a metropolitan city with respect to grants under section 106 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

Section 223 allows funding for research, evaluation, and statistical purposes that is unexpended at the time of completion of the contract, grant, or cooperative agreement to be re-obligated for additional research.

Section 224 prohibits funds for financial awards for employees subject to administrative discipline.

Section 225 allows program income as an eligible match for 2015 through 2027 continuum of care funds.

Section 226 permits HUD to provide one year transition grants under the continuum of care program.

Section 227 maintains current promise zone designations and agreements.

Section 228 addresses the establishment of reserves for public housing agencies designated as MTW agencies.

Section 229 prohibits funds from being used to make certain eligibility limitations as part of a notice of funding opportunity for competitive grant awards under the public housing fund.

Section 230 addresses the manner in which HUD may make adjustments for formula allocation corrections.

Section 231 allows for transfers to the Information Technology Fund.

Section 232 requires compliance with all process requirements when revising any annual contributions contract.

Section 233 prohibits the use of funds by HUD to issue a solicitation or accept bids on any solicitation that is substantially equivalent to the draft solicitation entitled “Housing Assistance Payments (HAP) Contract Support Services (HAPSS)” posted on July 27, 2022.

Section 234 clarifies the use of funds for the family self-sufficiency program.

Section 235 allows the Secretary to waive or specify alternatives for certain requirements for the mainstream and family unification voucher programs.

Section 236 prohibits the use of funds to direct a grantee to undertake specific changes to existing zoning laws as part of carrying out the interim final rule entitled “Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Revisions.”

Section 237 applies whistleblower protections to funded contracts, consistent with 41 U.S.C. 4712.

Section 238 allows the Office of Housing to provide direct support to small properties and owners converting assistance under the rental assistance demonstration.

Section 239 requires that foregone increases to tenant rent payments due to resident participation in the jobs-plus program be factored into rental assistance renewal eligibility within the appropriate account.

Section 240 permits the Secretary to provide rent adjustments of not more than 3 percent for certain assisted properties.

Section 241 prohibits the use of funds to enforce the temporary moratorium on eviction filings.

Section 242 prohibits the implementation of certain minimum energy efficiency standards and notices.

Section 243 mandates a review of the implementation of the Build America, Buy America Act for certain activities.

Section 244 authorizes the Secretary to enter into recovery agreements with PHAs meeting certain requirements.

Section 245 prohibits the renewal of certain contracts after September 30, 2030.

Section 246 amends the “Rental Assistance Demonstration” by striking the fourth proviso.

Section 247 authorizes the Secretary to provide lump-sum payments under certain conditions.

Section 248 rescinds unobligated balances.

Section 249 extends the period of expenditure for certain prior year funds.

TITLE III—RELATED AGENCIES

Language is included under Access Board, “Salaries and Expenses” which limits funds for necessary expenses.

Language is included under Federal Maritime Commission, “Salaries and Expenses” which provides funds for services authorized by 46 U.S.C. 46107 and 5 U.S.C. 3109, the hire of passenger motor vehicles, and uniforms or allowances therefor; and limits funds for official reception and representation expenses.

Language is included under National Railroad Passenger Corporation Office of Inspector General, “Salaries and Expenses”

which provides funds for an independent, objective unit responsible for detecting and preventing fraud, waste, abuse, and violations of law. Language allows the Inspector General (IG) to enter contracts and to select, appoint, or employ officers and employees to carry out its functions, and requires the IG to submit its budget request concurrently with the President's budget.

Language is included under National Transportation Safety Board, "Salaries and Expenses" which provides funds for hire of passenger motor vehicles and aircraft, services authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109, uniforms or allowances therefor, and limits funds for official reception and representation expenses.

Language is included under Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation, "Payment to the Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation" which provides funds for activities authorized by 42 U.S.C. 8101–8107.

Language is included under Surface Transportation Board, "Salaries and Expenses" which provides funds, specifies amounts for certain purposes, allows the collection of a specified level of fees established by the Surface Transportation Board, and provides that the sum appropriated from the general fund of the Treasury shall be reduced on a dollar-for-dollar basis as such fees are received.

TITLE IV—GENERAL PROVISIONS, THIS ACT

Section 401 prohibits the use of funds for the planning or execution of any program to pay the expenses of, or otherwise compensate, non-Federal parties intervening in regulatory or adjudicatory proceedings.

Section 402 prohibits the obligation of funds beyond the current fiscal year and the transfer of funds to other appropriations, unless expressly provided.

Section 403 limits consulting service expenditures through procurement contracts to those contracts contained in the public record, except where otherwise provided under existing law.

Section 404 prohibits funds from being used for certain types of employee training.

Section 405 specifies requirements for the reprogramming of funds and requires agencies to submit an operating plan to establish the baseline for the application of reprogramming and transfer authorities.

Section 406 provides that not to exceed 50 percent of unobligated balances for salaries and expenses may remain available until September 30, 2028, for each account for the purposes authorized, subject to the approval of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations.

Section 407 prohibits the use of funds for any project that seeks to use the power of eminent domain unless eminent domain is employed only for public use.

Section 408 prohibits funds from being transferred to any department, agency, or instrumentality of the U.S. Government, except where transfer authority is provided in this or any other appropriations act.

Section 409 prohibits funds from being used by an entity unless the expenditure complies with the Buy American Act.

Section 410 prohibits funds from being made available to any person or entity that has been convicted of violating the Buy American Act.

Section 411 prohibits funds from being used for first-class airline accommodations in contravention of sections 301–10.122 and 301–10.123 of title 41, Code of Federal Regulations.

Section 412 restricts the number of employees that agencies may send to international conferences unless such attendance is important to the national interest.

Section 413 caps the amount of fees the STB can charge or collect for rate or practice complaints filed at the amount authorized for district court civil suit filing fees.

Section 414 prohibits funds from being used to maintain or establish computer networks unless such networks block the viewing, downloading, or exchange of pornography.

Section 415 prohibits funds from being used to deny an Inspector General timely access to any records, documents, or other materials available to the department or agency over which that Inspector General has responsibilities, or to prevent or impede that Inspector General's access to such records, documents, or other materials.

Section 416 prohibits funds from being used to pay award or incentive fees for contractors whose performance is below satisfactory, behind schedule, over budget, or failed to meet requirements of the contract, with exceptions.

Section 417 prohibits funds from being used to permanently replace an employee intent on returning to his or her past occupation following completion of military service.

Section 418 prohibits funds from being used for the approval of a new foreign air carrier permit or exemption application if that approval would contravene United States law or Article 17 bis of the U.S.-E.U.-Iceland-Norway Air Transport Agreement.

Section 419 prohibits funds from being used to contravene 42 U.S.C. 1436a and 8 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.

Section 420 prohibits the use of funds in this Act and the IJJA for activities designed to support or defeat legislation pending before Congress, other than in normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships.

Section 421 sets conditions on the purchase of promotional materials.

Section 422 requires the Departments to submit quarterly financial reports.

Section 423 makes technical corrections to congressionally designated projects.

Section 424 establishes a spending reduction account.

TRANSFERS OF FUNDS

In title I, under Transportation Planning, Research, and Development, language is included to transfer funds into this account from other Federal agencies for expenses incurred by the Inter-agency Infrastructure Permitting Improvement Center that are not related to transportation infrastructure.

In title I, under Working Capital Fund, language is included to limit the transfer of funds into this account from any agency of the Department of Transportation.

In title I, under section 108, the Secretary may transfer and consolidate administrative resources for certain programs.

In title I, under Section 109, the Secretary may transfer awards to a Tribe under a funding agreement from the Department's Operating Administrations to the Office of Tribal Government Affairs.

In title I, under Grant-in-Aid for Airports (Airport and Airway Trust Fund), language is included to transfer funds to the Office of the Secretary to carry out the Small Community Air Service Development Program.

In title I, under Federal Highway Administration, Limitation on Administrative Expenses (Highway Trust Fund), language is included to transfer funds to the Appalachian Regional Commission.

In title I, under Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements, the Secretary may transfer amounts for projects selected for commuter rail passenger transportation to the appropriate agencies.

In title I, language is included in Section 150 to transfer certain amounts made available in this and prior Acts to the Secretary of Transportation or the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) to another FRA account to support the award, administration, project management oversight, and technical assistance of financial assistance administered by the FRA.

In title I, under Transit Infrastructure Grants, language is included to transfer funds to other offices and modes for administration and other purposes.

In title I, under Section 162, language is included to allow for the transfer of appropriations to be merged into new accounts with similar, current activities.

In title I, under Maritime Guaranteed Loan (Title XI) Program Account, language is included to transfer funds to the Operations and Training account for program administration.

In title II, under the Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes, language is included to transfer funds to the Office of Policy Development and Research.

In title II, language is included in section 217 to transfer funds between the Administrative Support Offices and Program Offices, with certain limitations.

In title II, language is included in section 231 to transfer amounts made available for salaries and expenses under all headings to the heading "Information Technology Fund" for information technology needs.

RESCISSIONS OF FUNDS

Pursuant to clause 3(f)(2) of rule XIII of the Rules of the House of Representatives, the following statements are submitted describing the rescissions in the accompanying bill:

In title I, under the Maritime Administration's Tanker Security Program, \$29,300,000 are rescinded from unobligated balances from prior year appropriations.

In title II, under Housing Certificate Fund, any obligated balances of contract authority from fiscal year 1974 and prior fiscal years that have been terminated are rescinded.

In title II, section 201 rescinds 50 percent of funds that are recaptured from projects described in section 1012(a) of the Steward B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Amendments Act of 1998.

In title II, Section 247 rescinds \$631,206,000 from the unobligated balances from prior year appropriations.
