

Shalin Jyotishi is a nationally recognized expert at the intersection of workforce development, economic development, and emerging technology policy. He is the Founder and Managing Director of New America's Future of Work and Innovation Economy (FOWIE) initiative, a nonpartisan research and technical assistance program dedicated to strengthening the relationship between tech-based economic growth and expanded economic security for workers and families. He is also a *Forbes* contributor covering the future of work and a visiting scholar at Arizona State University.

Jyotishi's recent work has focused on strengthening the capacity and impact of higher education institutions in regional tech-based economic and workforce development and in navigating technological change.

Jyotishi's expertise on education, the workforce, emerging technologies, manufacturing, policy, and their intersections has appeared in *NPR*, *Politico*, *Financial Times*, *Fast Company*, and *USA Today*, and he is a frequent speaker at high-level forums, including the United Nations, SXSW, and Davos.

Previously, he led research on AI and job quality at the World Economic Forum and oversaw labor economics research at the Burning Glass Institute. He led initiatives at the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities that equipped university executives with strategies and practices for university-based economic and workforce development.

He served as CEO and managing publisher of the internationally acclaimed *Journal of Science Policy and Governance* and later served as a visiting scholar in Science at the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He is a co-author of a forthcoming MIT Press book, *Beyond Sputnik: U.S. Science Policy in the 21st Century*. He has also held policy positions at the American Academy of Arts & Sciences and the University of Michigan.

He has served on advisory and governing boards for the Bipartisan Policy Center, the American Enterprise Institute, the Education Writers Association, the International Telecommunications Union, and the International Economic Development Council. He is a graduate of the University of Georgia and Arizona State University and completed a fellowship at Stanford University.
