# A BILL

- To require the Secretary of the Treasury to carry out a study on Chinese support for Afghan illicit finance, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Exposing China's Sup-
- 5 port for the Taliban Act".

### 6 SEC. 2. STUDY ON CHINESE SUPPORT FOR AFGHAN ILLICIT

- 7 **FINANCE**.
- 8 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

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(1) Though China and Afghanistan share only
 a small land border, when it comes to illicit financial
 activity between the two countries, China has a dem onstrated history of permissiveness regarding traf ficking and money laundering that could support
 both the Taliban and its associates.

7 (2) A 2014 Financial Action Task Force report 8 titled, "Financial Flows Linked to the Production 9 and Trafficking of Afghan Opiates" found evidence 10 of import/export companies registered in China that 11 were transferring funds to Afghanistan, likely as 12 part of trade-based money laundering schemes cen-13 tered around illicit opium production and trafficking, 14 which, per the United Nations Office on Drugs and 15 Crime (UNODC), is one of the Taliban's main sources of income. 16

17 (3) Since the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan
18 in August 2021, China has announced its willingness
19 to lend financial support and legitimacy to the
20 Taliban-led government in Afghanistan, including
21 Afghan Interior Minister, Sirajuddin Haqqani, a
22 member of the U.S.-sanctions designated Foreign
23 Terrorist Organization, the Haqqani Network.

24 (4) China's permissive policies regarding Af-25 ghan illicit finance run counter to the strategic in-

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terests of the United States with respect to coun tering trafficking and preventing terrorist groups
 from accessing the international financial system.

4 (5) China's role as a critical source of financial 5 wherewithal for the Taliban and its associates to 6 process and implement drug and other illicit-activity 7 transactions warrants further study as these actions 8 pose a threat both to the safety and security of the 9 people of Afghanistan and the international commu-10 nity.

(6) Congress needs to better understand how
China could leverage its relationships and resources
within Afghanistan and how these activities could directly or indirectly provide financial support to terrorist organizations, including the Taliban and its
associates.

17 (b) Study.—

(1) REQUIREMENT.—Not later than one year
after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of the Treasury shall provide to the Committee on Financial Services of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs of the Senate a report on the
financial activities of China and Chinese entities in

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connection with the finances of Afghanistan and the
 Taliban.

3 (2) MATTERS INCLUDED.—The report under
4 paragraph (1) shall include the following:

5 (A) An assessment of the activities under-6 taken by the People's Republic of China and 7 Chinese-registered companies to support illicit 8 financial networks in Afghanistan, particularly 9 such networks involved in narcotics trafficking, 10 illicit financial transactions, official corruption, 11 natural resources exploitation, and terrorist net-12 works.

(B) An assessment of financial, commercial, and economic activities undertaken by
China and Chinese companies in Afghanistan to
support Chinese policies counter to American
strategic interests.

18 (C) Any recommendations to Congress re19 garding legislative or regulatory improvements
20 necessary to support the identification and dis21 ruption of Chinese-supported illicit financial
22 networks in Afghanistan.

23 (3) FORM.—The report under paragraph (1)
24 may include a classified annex.
