# A BILL

To provide for the International Security Affairs authorities of the Department of State.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

TITLE IV—INTERNATIONAL

SECURITY AFFAIRS

SEC. 401. UNDER SECRETARY FOR INTERNATIONAL SECURITY AFFAIRS.

(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There shall be in the Department an Under Secretary for International Security Affairs who shall be responsible to the Secretary for matters

10 pertaining to international security policy and assistance,

1	arms control, nonproliferation, disarmament, nuclear
2	weapons policy, international counterterrorism,
3	transnational organized crime, international narcotics con-
4	trol, emerging threats, political-military affairs, and such
5	other related duties as the Secretary may from time to
6	time designate.
7	(b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In addition to the respon-
8	sibilities described under subsection (a), the Under Sec-
9	retary of State for International Security Affairs shall
10	maintain continuous observation and coordination of all
11	matters pertaining to international security in the conduct
12	of foreign policy, including, as appropriate, the following
13	(1) Developing policies for consideration by the
14	Secretary and Deputy Secretary related to inter-
15	national security policy, including, as appropriate—
16	(A) in the areas of nonproliferation, arms
17	control, strategic export controls, regional secu-
18	rity and defense relations;
19	(B) United States military-related activi-
20	ties with foreign policy implications; and
21	(C) arms transfers, security assistance
22	international counterterrorism, transnational
23	organized crime, international narcotics con-
24	trols, and other related matters

- 1 (2) Leading engagements with other agencies of 2 the United States Government and in bilateral and 3 multilateral engagements related to such matters as 4 described in this section.
- 5 (3) Providing guidance to Department per-6 sonnel in the United States and overseas who con-7 duct or implement policies, programs, and activities 8 related to matters described in this section.

#### 9 SEC. 402. OFFICE TO MONITOR AND COMBAT TRAFFICKING.

# 10 (a) IN GENERAL.—

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(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish within the Department an Office to Monitor and Combat Trafficking, which shall provide assistance to the Interagency Task Force to Monitor and Combat Trafficking and shall report directly to the Under Secretary for International Security Affairs for matters relating to day-to-day administration and coordination of activities and programs. Any such Office shall be headed by a Director, who shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, with the rank of Ambassador-at-Large, and shall have two deputy directors. The Director shall report to the Secretary and shall have the primary responsibility for assisting the Secretary in carrying out the purposes of the

- Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (22
  U.S.C. 7101 et seq.) and may have additional responsibilities as determined by the Secretary. The
  Director shall consult with nongovernmental organizations and multilateral organizations, and with
  trafficking victims or other affected persons. The Director shall have the authority to take evidence in
- 9 (2) STAFF.—The heads of each of the Federal
  10 departments and agencies represented on the Inter11 agency Task Force to Monitor and Combat Traf12 ficking are authorized to provide staff to the Office
  13 on a non-reimbursable basis.

public hearings or by other means.

- 14 (b) UNITED STATES ASSISTANCE.—The Director 15 shall additionally be responsible for—
  - (1) all policy, funding, and programming decisions regarding funds made available for trafficking in persons programs that are centrally controlled by the Office to Monitor and Combat Trafficking;
  - (2) coordinating any trafficking in persons programs of the Department or of other Federal Government agencies;
- 23 (3) compiling, drafting, and coordinating the 24 production and issuing of the annual report;

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1 (4) ensuring, in coordination with other rel-2 evant officials, that all Department staff have com-3 pleted annual anti-trafficking training pursuant to section 107(c)(4) of the Trafficking Victims Protec-4 tion Act of 2000 (22 U.S.C. 7105(c)(4)) and section 5 708(a) of the Foreign Service Act of 1980 (22 6 7 U.S.C. 4028(a)); 8 (5) encouraging the inclusion in country and re-9 gional planning of a counter-trafficking in persons 10 analytic component to guide foreign assistance pro-11 gram design and implementation and to inform diplomatic engagement pursuant to section 105(f) of 12 13 the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (22) U.S.C. 7103(f)); and 14 15 (6) organizing and coordinating the Trafficking 16 in Persons Report Heroes Award. 17 SEC. 403. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS **FOR** 18 INTERNATIONAL SECURITY AFFAIRS. 19 Of the funds authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary of State under section 141, the Under Secretary 21 for International Security Affairs shall receive the funds necessary to fulfill the Under Secretary's responsibilities 22

for fiscal years 2026 and 2027.

1	SEC. 404. ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR POLITICAL-MILI-
2	TARY AFFAIRS.
3	There is authorized to be in the Department an As-
4	sistant Secretary for Political-Military Affairs who shall
5	be responsible to the Under Secretary for International
6	Security Affairs for matters pertaining to coordination
7	with the Department of Defense or foreign militaries, and
8	such other related duties as the Secretary may from time
9	to time designate.
10	SEC. 405. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR PO-
11	LITICAL-MILITARY AFFAIRS.
12	(a) ADMINISTRATION OF ACCOUNTS.—The Assistant
13	Secretary for Political-Military Affairs shall direct, over-
14	see, and otherwise exercise responsibility of funds made
15	available for—
16	(1) international military education and train-
17	ing; and
18	(2) the national security engagement account.
19	(b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—Of the
20	funds authorized to be appropriated to the Under Sec-
21	retary for International Security Affairs under section
22	403, the Assistant Secretary for Political-Military Affairs
23	shall receive the funds necessary to fulfill Bureau func-
24	tions and the Assistant Secretary's responsibilities for fis-
25	cal years 2026 and 2027.

1	SEC. 406. ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR INTERNATIONAL
2	NARCOTICS AND LAW ENFORCEMENT AF-
3	FAIRS.
4	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is authorized to be in
5	the Department an Assistant Secretary for International
6	Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs who shall be re-
7	sponsible to the Under Secretary for International Secu-
8	rity Affairs for matters pertaining to international nar-
9	cotics, anti-crime, and law enforcement affairs, and such
10	other related duties as the Secretary may from time to
11	time designate.
12	(b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In addition to the respon-
13	sibilities described under subsection (a), the Assistant Sec-
14	retary for International Narcotics and Law Enforcement
15	Affairs shall maintain continuous observation and coordi-
16	nation of all matters pertaining to narcotics, transnational
17	crime, and law enforcement affairs in the conduct of for-
18	eign policy by the Department, including, as appropriate,
19	the following:
20	(1) Leading the coordination of programs car-
21	ried out by United States Government agencies
22	abroad.
23	(2) Overall supervision of policy and resources
24	of international narcotics, anti-crime, and law en-
2.5	forcement activities.

- 1 (3) Combating international narcotics produc-2 tion and trafficking, including by carrying out rel-3 evant delegated responsibilities under chapter 8 of 4 part I of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961.
  - (4) Strengthening foreign justice systems, including judicial and prosecutorial capacity, appeals systems, law enforcement agencies, prison systems, and the sharing of recovered assets, for the purposes of investigating, prosecuting, and litigating criminal cases related to illicit narcotics production and trafficking and transnational organized crime.
  - (5) Training and equipping foreign police, border control, other government officials, and other civilian law enforcement authorities for anti-crime purposes, including ensuring that no foreign security unit or member of such unit shall receive such assistance from the United States Government absent appropriate vetting.
  - (6) Combatting all forms of transnational organized crime, including human trafficking, illicit trafficking in arms and cultural property, migrant smuggling and facilitating illegal immigration for profit, corruption, money laundering, the illicit smuggling of bulk cash, other forms of illicit finance,

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- the licit use of financial systems for malign purposes, and other new and emerging forms of crime.
  - (7) Identifying and responding to global corruption in accordance with United States national security interests and foreign policy objectives, including strengthening the capacity of foreign government institutions responsible for addressing financial crimes.
    - (8) Coordinating with the Office of National Drug Control Policy to ensure lessons learned from other Federal departments and agencies are available to the Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs of the Department.
    - (9) Developing standard requirements for monitoring and evaluation of Bureau programs, including metrics for success that do not rely solely on the amounts of illegal drugs that are produced or seized.
    - (10) Carrying out timely and substantive consultation with chiefs of mission and, as appropriate, the heads of other United States Government agencies to ensure effective coordination of all international narcotics and law enforcement programs carried out overseas by the Department and such other agencies.

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- 1 (11) In coordination with the Under Secretary
  2 for International Security Affairs, annually certi3 fying in writing to the Committee on Foreign Rela4 tions of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign
  5 Affairs of the House of Representatives that United
  6 States enforcement personnel posted abroad whose
- 7 activities are funded to any extent by the Bureau of
- 8 International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Af-
- 9 fairs are complying with section 207 of the Foreign
- 10 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 3927).
- 11 (12) Performing such other duties as the Under
- 12 Secretary for International Security Affairs may
- from time to time designate.
- 14 SEC. 407. BUREAU OF INTERNATIONAL NARCOTICS AND
- 15 LAW ENFORCEMENT AFFAIRS.
- 16 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish
- 17 a Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforce-
- 18 ment Affairs, which shall perform such functions related
- 19 to international narcotics, anti-crime, law enforcement,
- 20 and transnational crime as the Under Secretary for Inter-
- 21 national Security Affairs may prescribe.
- 22 (b) Assistant Secretary.—The Assistant Sec-
- 23 retary for International Narcotics and Law Enforcement
- 24 Affairs shall be the head of the Bureau of International
- 25 Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs.

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1	SEC. 408. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR
2	INTERNATIONAL NARCOTICS AND LAW EN-
3	FORCEMENT AFFAIRS.
4	(a) Administration of Accounts.—The Assistant
5	Secretary for International Narcotics and Law Enforce-
6	ment Affairs shall direct, oversee, and otherwise exercise
7	responsibility of funds made available for international
8	narcotics control and law enforcement.
9	(b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—Of the
10	funds authorized to be appropriated to the Under Sec-
11	retary for International Security Affairs under section
12	403, the Assistant Secretary for International Narcotics
13	and Law Enforcement Affairs shall receive the funds nec-
14	essary to fulfill Bureau functions and the Assistant Sec-
15	retary's responsibilities for fiscal years 2026 and 2027.
16	SEC. 409. BUREAU OF ARMS CONTROL AND NON-
17	PROLIFERATION.
18	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish
19	a Bureau of Arms Control and Nonproliferation, which
20	shall perform such functions related to verification and

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- 21 compliance with international arms control, nonprolifera-
- 22 tion, disarmament agreements or commitments, and other
- 23 related international security policy issues, as the Under
- 24 Secretary for International Security Affairs may prescribe.

1	(b) Assistant Secretary.—The Assistant Sec-
2	retary for Arms Control and Nonproliferation shall be the
3	head of the Bureau of Arms Control and Nonproliferation.
4	SEC. 410. ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR COUNTERTER-
5	RORISM.
6	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is authorized to be in
7	the Department an Assistant Secretary for Counterter-
8	rorism who shall be responsible to the Under Secretary
9	for International Security Affairs for matters pertaining
10	to international counterterrorism activities and programs
11	and such other related duties as the Secretary may from
12	time to time designate.
13	(b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In addition to the respon-
14	sibilities described under subsection (a), the Assistant Sec-
15	retary for Counterterrorism shall maintain continuous ob-
16	servation and coordination of all matters pertaining to
17	international counterterrorism matters in the conduct of
18	foreign policy, including, as appropriate, the following:
19	(1) Overall supervision, including policy over-
20	sight of resources, of international counterterrorism
21	activities.
22	(2) Serving as the principal policy advisor to
23	the Secretary regarding international counterter-
24	rorism matters.

- 1 (3) Representing the Secretary on international 2 counterterrorism issues in international and inter-3 agency meetings, as appropriate.
  - (4) Countering, in conjunction with other relevant bureaus of the Department and other Federal departments and agencies, all forms of international terrorism.
- 8 (5) Leading United States foreign policy for 9 counterterrorism efforts, including cooperation, co-10 ordination, and assistance that advances the inter-11 est, safety, and economic prosperity of the American 12 people.
- 13 (6) Performing such other duties as the Under 14 Secretary for International Security Affairs may 15 from time to time designate.
- 16 SEC. 411. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR COUNTERTERRORISM.
- Of the funds authorized to be appropriated to the
- 19 Under Secretary for International Security Affairs under
- 20 section 403, the Assistant Secretary for Counterterrorism
- 21 shall receive the funds necessary to fulfill Bureau func-
- 22 tions and the Assistant Secretary's responsibilities for fis-
- 23 cal years 2026 and 2027.

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1	SEC. 412. ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR EMERGING
2	THREATS.
3	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is authorized to be in
4	the Department an Assistant Secretary for Emerging
5	Threats who shall be responsible to the Under Secretary
6	for International Security Affairs for matters pertaining
7	to emerging security threats and such other related duties
8	as the Secretary may from time to time designate.
9	(b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—In addition to the respon-
10	sibilities described under subsection (a), the Assistant Sec-
11	retary for Emerging Threats shall maintain continuous
12	observation and coordination of all matters pertaining to
13	emerging security threats in the conduct of foreign policy,
14	including, as appropriate, the following:
15	(1) Serving as the principal emerging security
16	threats official within the senior management of the
17	Department and as the advisor to the Secretary for
18	emerging security threats, including with respect to
19	lethal autonomous systems, engineered bioweapons,
20	and emerging uses of artificial intelligence, bio-
21	technology, quantum information science, and
22	emerging foundational technologies.
23	(2) Mitigating threats resulting from military
24	applications of emerging technologies, including in
25	the fields of artificial intelligence, biotechnology, and

- quantum information science, in support of United States foreign policy and national security.
- 3 (3) Leading engagement, in coordination with 4 relevant executive branch agencies, on development 5 of diplomatic policy for national security related ac-6 tivities and emerging threats in the polar regions, 7 outer space, and undersea domains.
- 8 (4) Leading engagement, in coordination with 9 relevant executive branch agencies, on the develop-10 ment of diplomatic policy for quantum information 11 science, including in the field of quantum cryptog-12 raphy, navigation and timing, spectrum, imaging, 13 and detection; sensors and computing.
- 14 (5) Performing such other duties as the Under 15 Secretary for International Security Affairs may 16 from time to time designate.

## 17 SEC. 413. BUREAU OF EMERGING THREATS.

- 18 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall establish
- 19 a Bureau of Emerging Threats, which shall perform such
- 20 functions related to emerging security threats, including
- 21 with respect to lethal autonomous systems, engineered bio-
- 22 weapons, military application of cyberspace operations,
- 23 undersea and outer space domains, emerging and
- 24 foundational technologies, associated security issues in
- 25 polar regions, and emerging uses of artificial intelligence,

- 1 biotechnology, quantum information science, as the Under
- 2 Secretary for International Security Affairs may prescribe.
- 3 (b) Assistant Secretary.—The Assistant Sec-
- 4 retary for Emerging Threats shall be the head of the Bu-
- 5 reau of Emerging Threats.
- 6 SEC. 414. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR

4	SEC. 416. CLASSIFICATION TO UNITED STATES CODE.
5	The Office of Law Revision Counsel is directed to-
6	(1) utilize sections 98-128 of title 22, United
7	States Code, to classify the sections of this title; and
8	(2) maintain the legislative history, under edi-
9	torial notes, of repealed law which previously occu-
10	pied the corresponding sections of United States
11	Code.

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
