Conflict of Interest Statement: Foreign Sources of Funding

Foreign funding requires discretion because of NBR's fundamental mission of providing America's decision-makers with expertise and information on topics that bear on U.S. interests in Asia. As such, NBR works to ensure that:

- Foreign funding is balanced by U.S. funding or funding from different nations (this is especially prudent when a foreign source wishes to fund a project that has implications for U.S. policy toward this funder's home country).
- Foreign funding does not exceed 33 percent of its annual total budget.
- Foreign entities will not exercise effective control over NBR's operations, development, or planning.
- Funding from non-democratic foreign governments will not be accepted.

By the nature of the contemporary international economy, the "foreignness" of many multinational corporations is ambiguous. NBR takes a conservative perspective, considering corporations to be foreign by virtue of where they, or their parent companies, are based.
