



Anthony Carroll is lawyer and international affairs consultant in Washington DC. He is founding managing director of Acorus Capital, a private equity fund investing in Africa and Adjunct Professor at Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies. He began his work in Africa as a Peace Corps volunteer in Botswana from 1976–1978 and returned to the agency during the Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush administrations as assistant general counsel from 1986 to 1989. In that role he provided liaison with Congress and served as legal advisor to Paul Coverdell prior to his ascendancy to the U.S. Senate. Since then, he has advised foundations, universities, corporations, private voluntary organizations, the World Bank, the U.S. Agency for International Development and other bi-lateral development organizations, regional economic communities, international organizations and business associations on trade, investment, and development matters. He was instrumental in the design and passage of the Africa Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA), the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) and more recently, the Global HOPE Bill. He has testified before Congress on U.S.-Africa economic and political issues. In addition, Mr. Carroll has served on several advisory boards including for the Export-Import Bank, the Overseas Private Investment Corporation, and the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative and frequently writes and lectures on the role of innovation and development. For many years he was Chairman of the American Bar Association's Africa Law Committee and a founding member of the ABA's Foreign Corrupt Practices Task Force and International Health Law Committee and the Corporate Council on Africa (CCA). He also was on the Board of the U.S.-South Africa Business Council and Street Law for many years and is currently on the Board of the Global Community Engagement and Resilience Fund (GCERF), Global HOPE (Hematology-Oncology-Pediatric-Excellence) and The Presidential Precinct (UVA). He is active as an author and convenor in the Atlantic Council's Africa program, a former Senior Associate at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), board member to the Woodrow Wilson Center's Africa program and lecturer at the Foreign Services Institute. He is on the Board of Visitors at the University of Wisconsin at

Madison and the International Legal Studies Program and the University of Denver's College of Law. He has published widely on Africa business and economic matters. Mr. Carroll holds a BA (economics) and JD from the University of Denver and an MPA from the University of Wisconsin. He was also an AMAX Graduate Fellow at the Colorado School of Mines. He has been admitted to the Colorado and United States Supreme Court bars. He is married to Alison Carroll and they have four children.
