


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Andrew S. Natsios is an executive professor at the Bush School of Government and Public Service at Texas A&M University (2012-present) and director of the Scowcroft Institute of International Affairs (2013-present). Natsios was formerly a Distinguished Professor in the Practice of Diplomacy at the Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University from 2006-2012 and former administrator of the US Agency for International Development (USAID). As USAID administrator from 2001-2006, Natsios managed reconstruction programs in Afghanistan, Iraq, and Sudan. He also served as US special envoy to Sudan in 2006-2007. Retired from the US Army Reserves at the rank of lieutenant colonel after twenty-three years, Natsios is a veteran of the Gulf War. From 1993 to 1998, he was vice president of World Vision US, the largest faith-based nongovernmental organization in the world, with programs in 103 countries. Earlier in his career, Natsios served in the Massachusetts House of Representatives for twelve years

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He is the author of three books: *U.S. Foreign Policy and the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse* (1997); *The Great North Korean Famine* (2001); and his latest book, *Sudan, South Sudan and Darfur: What Everyone Needs to Know*, published in 2012 by Oxford University Press. He has contributed to 14 other books. He has published over 50 articles in *Foreign Affairs*, the *New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Washington Quarterly*, *Foreign Service Journal*, and *Wall Street Journal*.
