

Alvaro Bedoya is the founding Executive Director of Georgetown Law's Center on Privacy & Technology. He is an expert on digital privacy issues, including face recognition, commercial data collection, and government surveillance. Recently, he co-authored *The Perpetual Line-Up*, the first comprehensive investigation on police use of face recognition technology and its impact on privacy, civil liberties, and civil rights. He often serves as an informational resource to Democratic and Republican policymakers alike.

Prior to joining the Center, Alvaro served as Chief Counsel to Senator Al Franken and to the U.S. Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Privacy, Technology and the Law. Starting work on the Senator's first day in office, he served as his advisor for legislation and oversight on geolocation privacy, cybersecurity, NSA transparency and biometric technology like face recognition and fingerprinting. He also served as the Senator's lead advisor in two Supreme Court confirmation hearings.

Alvaro serves on the Board of Directors of Free Press, a digital rights NGO, and the Esperanza Education Fund, a non-profit college scholarship program he co-founded that has awarded more than \$700,000 in scholarships since 2009. Previously, he served on the Board of Directors of the Hispanic Bar Association of the District of Columbia.

Alvaro is married to Sima Zadeh Bedoya, a pediatric psychologist at the National Institutes of Health's National Cancer Institute. He is a graduate of Harvard College and Yale Law School, where he received the Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowship for New Americans.
