Re: Committee Business Meeting on July 25, 2019

On Thursday, July 25, 2019, at 10:00 am, in room 2154 of the Rayburn House Office Building, the Committee will hold a business meeting to mark up:

1. A resolution and report recommending that Kellyanne Conway, Senior Counselor to the President, be held in contempt of Congress for her refusal to comply with the Committee's duly authorized subpoena compelling her testimony on July 15, 2019, and authorizing Chairman Elijah E. Cummings to take all necessary steps to enforce the subpoena;
2. A resolution authorizing Chairman Elijah E. Cummings to subpoena records relating to the Committee's investigation into the use of non-official electronic messaging accounts by non-career officials at the White House;
3. S. 406, the Federal Rotational Cyber Workforce Program Act of 2019;
4. H.R. ____ the ONDCP Technical Corrections Act; and
5. Postal naming measures.

I. KELLYANNE CONWAY CONTEMPT RESOLUTION

The Committee will consider a resolution and report recommending that Kellyanne Conway, Senior Counselor to the President, be held in contempt of Congress for her refusal to comply with the Committee's duly authorized subpoena compelling her testimony on July 15, 2019. The resolution would authorize Chairman Elijah E. Cummings to take all necessary steps to enforce the subpoena authorized by the Committee and duly issued by the Chairman for the appearance of Kellyanne Conway by all necessary means, including by seeking authority from the House of Representatives through a vote of the Bipartisan Legal Advisory Group pursuant to clause 8(b) of rule II and H.Res. 430 to file a civil action in the appropriate United States District Court.

II. NON-OFFICIAL ELECTRONIC MESSAGING ACCOUNTS SUBPOENA RESOLUTION

The Committee will consider a resolution authorizing Chairman Elijah E. Cummings to subpoena records relating to the Committee's investigation into the use of non-official electronic messaging accounts by non-career officials at the White House, including from Acting White House Chief of Staff John Michael "Mick" Mulvaney.

III. S. 406, THE FEDERAL ROTATIONAL CYBER WORKFORCE PROGRAM ACT OF 2019

S. 406, the Federal Rotational Cyber Workforce Program Act of 2019, was introduced on February 7, 2019, by Senators Gary Peters, John Hoeven, Margaret Hassan, and Ron Johnson. The bill was ordered reported favorably by the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs on February 13, 2019, and passed the Senate by unanimous consent on April 30, 2019.

The bill would create a federal rotational cyber workforce program in which cyber personnel could be detailed to other agencies to develop additional skills and to help fill skills gaps in agency cyber functions. The legislation would require agencies to determine which cyber positions should be eligible for the rotation and report those positions to the Office of Personnel Management (OPM). OPM would be required to distribute to each agency a list of positions available for participation in the program.

The bill also would require OPM, the Chief Human Capital Officers Council, and Department of Homeland Security to develop an operational plan for the program, including a merit-based selection process. Employee details would be limited to 180 days, with the option for 60-day extensions up to a maximum of one year. Cyber detailees would be required to return to their employing agencies to serve for period equal in length to the period of their details. The rotational program would sunset five years after the date of the bill's enactment.

IV. H.R. ____, THE ONDCP TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS ACT

H.R. ____, the ONDCP Technical Corrections Act, will be introduced by Subcommittee Chairman Harley Rouda and Subcommittee Ranking Member Mark Meadows prior to the markup. The legislation would update the Substance Abuse Prevention Act (P.L. 115-271, Title VIII, Subtitle K), which reauthorized the Office of National Drug Control Policy, to address grammatical and referencing errors.

- H.R. 3314, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 1750 McCulloch Boulevard North in Lake Havasu City, Arizona, as the “Lake Havasu City Combat Veterans Memorial Post Office Building.”
- H.R. 3329, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 5186 Benito Street in Montclair, California, as the “Paul Eaton Post Office Building.”
