1. In prepared testimony, you testified that the Chamber “organized a coalition of more than 300 business, environmental, and labor organizations in support of environmentally and economically responsible bipartisan infrastructure legislation” and that “the Bipartisan Infrastructure Framework is exactly the type of bold, economy-growing action needed to address climate change.” However, in response to Rep. Wasserman Schultz’s question regarding the Chamber’s spending in opposition to the Build Back Better Act, you testified, “I don’t have that number off the top of my head.”

How much has the Chamber spent to defeat the Build Back Better Act or weaken its provisions, including provisions within the American Jobs Plan and American Families Plan, either directly or indirectly through the funding of third-party organizations?

The Chamber regularly discloses its lobbying activities and funding consistent with the requirements of the Lobbying Disclosure Act of 1995 (“LDA”). Enclosed with this response is the Chamber’s most recent LDA Lobbying Report from the third quarter of 2021. The Chamber will file a report on its activities from the fourth quarter of 2021 in early 2022.

2. Please provide a list of all funding provided by the Chamber to individuals, foundations, advocacy organizations, business associations, research institutions, or policy institutions, including funding intended to be transferred to other entities, from 1991 to the present for any projects or activities related to the science, policy, or advocacy associated with climate change.
 - a. In particular, please provide (1) the identity of the individuals or organizations that received the funding, (2) the amounts of funding and the dates it was provided, and (3) a description of the activity that was funded and the results sought or achieved.

We are currently reviewing information related to this request as part of our ongoing response to the Committee’s November 2, 2021, subpoena (“Subpoena”). The Chamber is in communication with Committee staff on this response, as well as the priority areas the Committee has identified, and we are working to provide responsive non-privileged information.

- 3. Please provide accounting records including corporate ledger or journal entries, invoices, checks, receipts, and other supporting documentation showing any and all funds provided by the Chamber to any groups or organizations that have publicly rejected or continue to publicly reject climate science, from 1991 to the present, including (1) the amount of such funding and (2) the date(s) such funding was provided.**

The Chamber is in communication with Committee staff on this response, as well as the priority areas the Committee has identified, and we are working to provide responsive non-privileged information.

The Honorable Chairman Ro Khanna (D-CA)

- 1. In your written testimony to the Oversight Committee, you asserted that “our message is clear: inaction is not an option,” and “[w]e have focused our work on advancing effective climate solutions.” However, as previously noted in our letter to you, the Chamber of Commerce has engaged in wide-ranging efforts to oppose the attempts to address climate change through regulatory actions. During the Trump Administration, for example, the Chamber lobbied to repeal emissions regulations, including methane standards, and funded a study that was cited by former President Trump as a reason to withdraw from the Paris Agreement.**

In light of this apparent discrepancy, please provide all internal memoranda, analyses, and reports prepared by or on behalf of the Chamber from 1991 to the present, that:

- a. Contain predictions of possible negative impacts of climate change or global warming on the planet, humans, or the organization’s or member companies’ business activities; or**
- b. Evaluate the veracity or scientific validity of public-facing Chamber statements related to the reality or effect of climate change or global warming on the planet, the human race, or the organization’s or member companies’ business activities.**

We are currently reviewing information related to this request as part of our ongoing response to the Committee’s Subpoena. The Chamber is in communication with Committee staff on this response, as well as the priority areas the Committee has identified, and we are working to provide responsive non-privileged information.

- 2. Please provide all documents from 1991 to the present related to concerns or objections raised by Chamber employees, board members, member companies, or civil society groups about the veracity or scientific validity of public-facing Chamber statements related to the reality or effect of climate change or global warming on the planet, humans, or the company’s business activities.**

We are currently reviewing information related to this request as part of our ongoing response to the Committee’s Subpoena. The Chamber is in communication with Committee staff on this response, as well as the priority areas the Committee has identified, and we are working to provide responsive non-privileged information.

The Honorable Cori Bush (D-MO)

1. Did you know before 1988 that communities of color would be hit earliest and disproportionately hard by climate change? Before 1980?

The Chamber recognizes that environmental burdens can fall disproportionately on disadvantaged communities and is committed to finding solutions to climate change that include meaningful involvement of affected communities.

2. Do you have modeling that has not been shared that suggests that certain places would and will flood and burn?

To our knowledge the Chamber has no such modeling. We note that the Chamber believes in leveraging the power of business to build climate resilient infrastructure. That is one reason the Chamber supported the passage of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act—the single largest investment in innovation, efficiency, and resiliency to address climate change in U.S. history.

3. Is an oil refinery more likely to be sited in a predominantly Black or a predominantly white community?

The Chamber is an advocacy organization representing the interests of companies of all sizes across every sector of the economy. The Chamber does not have a definitive position on this issue and, therefore, is not in a position to respond to this specific request. Many of our members in the business community are modeling meaningful approaches to address environmental justice, including efforts to tailor community engagement, support local sustainability efforts, and create economic opportunity. The Chamber applauds those efforts.

4. Have you ever targeted people of color with marketing campaigns concerning climate change and energy of any sort?
