

Bio of Professor Michele Goodwin

Professor Michele Bratcher Goodwin is a Chancellor's Professor at the University of California, Irvine. She is the founding director of the Center for Biotechnology and Global Health Policy and Senior Lecturer at Harvard Medical School. She is an acclaimed constitutional law scholar, bioethicist, and prolific author. She directed the first ABA accredited health law program in the nation and established the first law center focused on race and bioethics.

Professor Goodwin is an elected member of the American Law Institute as well as an elected Fellow of the American Bar Foundation and the Hastings Center (the organization central to the founding of bioethics). She is the 2022 recipient of the American Bar Association's Margaret Brent Award. Dr. Goodwin is also the recipient of the 2020-21 Distinguished Senior Faculty Award for Research, the highest honor bestowed by the University of California.

Professor Goodwin is the author of the award-winning book, *Policing The Womb: Invisible Women and the Criminalization of Motherhood*. Her constitutional law scholarship appears in the *Harvard Law Review*, *Yale Law Journal*, *Chicago Law Review*, *Cornell Law Review*, *University of Pennsylvania Law Review*, *California Law Review*, *Michigan Law Review*, *New York Law Review*, and *Northwestern Law Review* among others. She is the author/editor of six books.
